## Judge's role in fraud case criticized

Two Wayne-Westland school district residents have filed a complaint with the Michigan Judicial Tenure Commission criticizing 18th District Court Judge Gail McKnight's handling of the adult education enrollment fraud case.

James Netter and Melvin Straight have formally asked for a commission inquiry based on McKnight's failure to "disqualify herself" and allow a visiting judge to preside over the preliminary examination. The exam ended April 17 when three of the four defendants accepted a plea agreement under which they pleaded no contest and were sentenced on lesser charges.

The fourth defendant has reportedly been offered the same plea agreement, but has yet to respond.

Straight is a Wayne Memorial High School counselor.

### How commission handles a complaint

Here's the lengthy procedure the Michigan Judicial Tenure Commission follows to resolve complaints, as outlined by a commission staff attorney:

Once a complaint is received a file is opened and the staff begins a preliminary investigation. The staff makes a recommendation to the nine-member commission.

A majority vote by the commissioners is required to continue the investigation at that point.

If the investigation proceeds, the commission may decide to send a letter of admonition to be included in the judge's file for non-serious offenses, the staff attorney said.

If the offense proves to be more serious, the commission may file a formal complaint and ask the state Supreme Court to appoint a judge to preside over a public hearing at which the alleged violating judge and an attorney representing him may present his side of the case.

After the hearing, the commission can send

the case to the Supreme Court with a recommendation for punitive action such as removal, suspension or censure of the judge.

The Supreme Court listens to arguments from both sides and isn't bound by the commission's recommendation.

The commission may drop the matter at any time if it determines further action isn't necessary.

"The whole process can take one or two years," the staff attorney said.

THE NOTARIZED complaint is dated April 4, although it wasn't mailed until last weekend, after the defendants were sentenced to \$300 in fines and court costs and 50 hours of community service. Netter said the complaint was made out in advance to avoid a charge of "sour grapes" against the complainants.

A staff attorney in the commission's Detroit office would neither confirm nor deny Tuesday that the complaint was filed.

"We don't publicly disclose inquiry requests unless the commission decides to hold a public hearing," said the attorney, who declined to give his name.

McKnight said Tuesday she would cooperate fully with any action taken by the commission regarding the complaint. She said it was the first time such a complaint had been made during her 4 1/2 years on the bench.

THE COMPLAINT argues that

McKnight should have removed herself from the case "because she cannot render an unprejudiced ruling," and lists six reasons.

The reasons are:  
• McKnight received financial contributions from school district administrators during her tenure on the Westland City Council.

• McKnight is supervisor over court administrator David Wlasek, whose wife Sylvia Kozorosky-Wlasek is a Wayne-Westland school board member.

• Kozorosky-Wlasek was director of school district's senior citizens program during 1982-84, the time period of alleged records falsification by the defendants (Some people in her program were enrolled in adult education classes, and authorities charged that the attendance records of some of those classes were falsified).

• Kozorosky-Wlasek's daughter, Melanie Sheridan, is a probation officer with the court.

• McKnight's husband, Richard, is a member of the Livonia school board and was active in the re-election campaign of Wayne-Westland school board member Terri Reighard Johnson.

## Council backs plan for more dispatchers

Mayor Charles Griffin's proposal to beef up the police and fire departments by hiring six additional dispatchers was endorsed by Westland City Council members Monday at a budget hearing.

In fact, the council initiated proposals to bring the dispatchers on sooner than planned and to hire two additional police patrol officers.

A public hearing on the proposed budget has been scheduled for Monday, May 15, during the regular council session. The council will vote on the budget following the public hearing.

The plan would put more police officers on Westland streets by next fall. Griffin's original proposal called for a phased-in hiring and training period that wouldn't take full effect until next January.

Under the council proposal, three dispatchers would be hired when the fiscal year begins July 1. Three more dispatchers and two patrol officers would be hired Sept. 1.

THE DEPARTMENT currently has 64 patrol officers.

"We need to get these people on board as soon as possible," said councilman William Ziemia. "I'd hate to fund them in July and not see them on line until January."

The total number of dispatchers serving the police and fire departments would increase from three to nine, freeing patrol officers currently handling dispatch duties, according to Griffin.

The cost for the new dispatchers will be \$157,000 in the first year. That figure is \$87,000 more than under the mayor's original proposal.

The cost for the additional officers will be about \$55,000 in the first year.

Money for the new hires will come from the current fund balance of \$1.4 million.

But Griffin expressed concern Monday on how the cost of two additional patrol officers would be paid for in the future. "I think we need to look at a long-term funding source so that we don't have to lay people off next year," Griffin said.

The dispatchers will be hired first, receive on-the-job training and then attend a 14-week training course, said Police Chief Paul Schnarr. Training will include work with the enhanced 9-1-1 system slated to go on line throughout western Wayne County June 9.

OTHER POLICE expenditures proposed by the council Monday included about \$100,000 to equip 22 patrol cars with on-board computers and between \$40,000 and \$50,000 for a comprehensive study of police and fire department efficiency and needs.

A grant may be obtained to fund the study.

The administration has proposed spending \$155,000 for replacement of 10 patrol cars and two unmarked cars. The police department has 43 vehicles.

## Local pizzeria owner waives exam

### Will stand trial on arson charges for Feb. 18 fire

The owner of Dominic's pizzeria waived a preliminary exam Monday and was ordered to stand trial on arson charges in connection with the Feb. 18 explosion and fire that destroyed the pizzeria and four adjacent businesses on the 2800 block of Warren Road.

Gail McKnight, 18th District Court judge, continued a \$100,000 cash bond for Anthony Nerkowski, who was returned to the Bay County Jail, where he is awaiting sentencing on federal charges of illegal possession of a firearm and conspiracy to deliver marijuana.

Nerkowski, 24, of Dearborn pleaded not guilty to one count of arson of real property. He will be arraigned on the charge in Detroit Recorder's

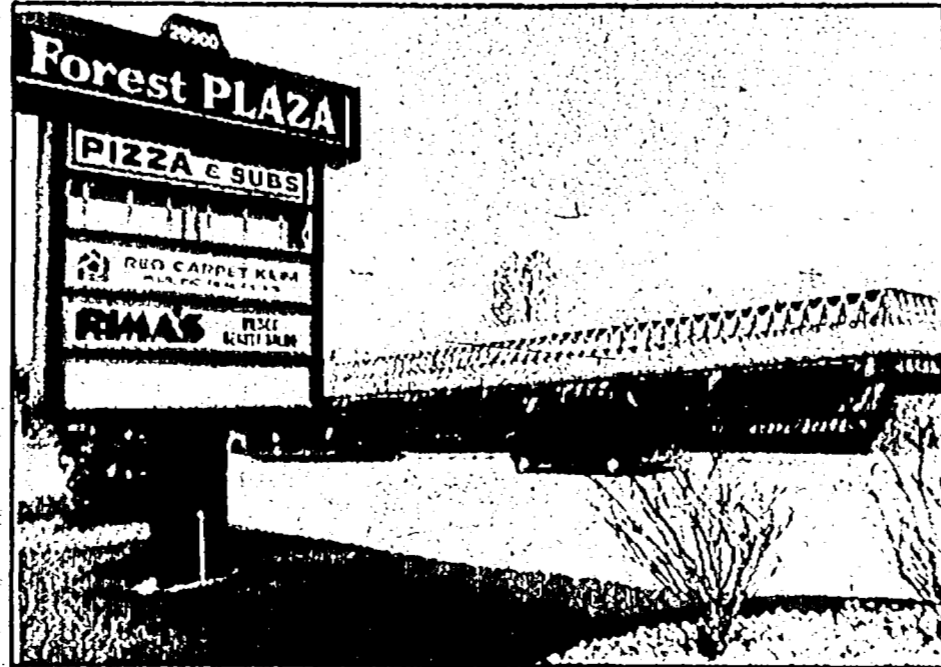
Court at 8:30 a.m. Monday, May 8. He could receive a maximum sentence of 10 years in prison if convicted of the arson charge.

Reconstruction of the strip center, destroyed by the blast is nearly complete.

Robert Salwa of Detroit, charged as an accomplice in the arson, pleaded guilty to one count of arson of a business last month. Salwa, a 17-year-old delinquent, received second-degree burns on his body and face as a result of the incident.

He was sentenced to probation in exchange for his agreement to testi-

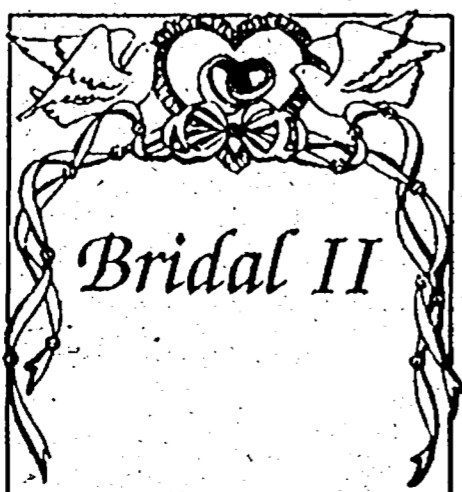

# Trail set for robbery suspect

A former Westland man will stand trial for last November's daylight armed robbery at Deluca's restaurant, Warren Road at Inkster Road.

Michael Alan Weaver, 40, was bound over for trial Monday by 18th District Judge Gall McKnight on four counts of armed robbery, one count of assault with intent to rob and one count of possession of a firearm during the commission of a felony.

Weaver faces a maximum penalty of life in prison if convicted. He has pleaded not guilty and will be arraigned on the charges in Detroit Recorder's Court May 8.

A man who police believe was working with a female accomplice escaped with several thousand dollars in the robbery at the popular Italian restaurant on the Westland-Garden City boundary.

Weaver, through defense attorney John Scavone, waived his preliminary examination after one witness had testified on behalf of the prosecution.

McKnight continued Weaver's \$500,000 cash bond.

**THE DEFENDANT** has also been bound over for trial on armed robbery charges stemming from an April 9 Farmington Hills incident. In that case, two men opened fire on a coin dealer in the parking lot of Mercy Center, 11 Mile and Middlebelt, following a coin show.

A 15-year-old bystander was grazed by a bullet in that incident, police said.

Weaver, a convicted felon with a criminal record dating back to the 1960s, is also facing charges in a 1988 Detroit armed robbery. He lived in Westland during the late 1970s and his last known address was Madison Heights, police said.

Weaver escaped from the custody of Wayne County Sheriff's deputies April 1 while being treated at Mt. Carmel Hospital, Detroit.

During Monday's exam, salesman Jeddar Potter testified that he was taking an order at Deluca's just before 1 p.m. Nov. 7 when somebody knocked at the back door.

A restaurant employee opened the door and admitted a man Potter identified as the defendant.

**POTTER SAID** he saw the man walk with restaurant co-owner James Deluca into the kitchen.

"He (the defendant) opened up an army field jacket and underneath it he had a sawed-off shotgun," Potter testified. "He said 'this is the real thing, where is the loot.'"

Potter said the defendant ordered him to open the safe, but he told the man he wasn't a restaurant employee and didn't know how. Deluca told Potter the bottom half of

the safe was unlocked and he (Potter) could open it.

The defendant ordered them to get on the floor and took the contents of the safe, Potter testified. He then ordered an employee to tie the two of them up and then tied up the employee.

After they were tied up, Potter said the defendant took each of their wallets. He said his wallet contained "five \$100 bills," credit cards and personal identification.

Two other salesman unwillingly came into the restaurant during the robbery and were ordered to the floor, Potter testified.

Although Potter identified Weaver as the culprit Monday, he told the court he couldn't pick him out of a police lineup earlier. "I told the police officer that I thought it was him, but I wasn't 100 percent sure," Potter testified.

Deluca said it was the first time the 32-year-old restaurant had been robbed.

Richard McKnight allegedly made a prejudicial comment concerning the case to Netter in August, 1987.

"All of the parties in this case were fully apprised and fully aware of my interconnectedness before we started, and nobody raised any objections to my handling it," McKnight said Monday in response to the first five charges.

On the last charge, the judge said: "I am a separate and distinct person from my husband and I have no idea what anybody may have said to him."

McKnight said the district court hears many cases involving the school district or the city. "Just knowing somebody who may come

before you isn't the criteria" for disassociating yourself from a case, she said.

**THE JUDGE** said the court looked at the case before indictments were handed down and "both myself and Judge (Thomas) Smith decided that if either of us knew any of the defendants the other judge would handle it."

The four defendants — three district employees and one former employee — were charged with one count each of falsifying school records and one count of conspiracy to falsify school records last November following a year-long grand jury investigation of the district's adult/community education enrollment practices.

# District millage rate dips slightly

Wayne-Westland school district residents will have their millage rate reduced slightly this year after the school administration decided not to ask for voters for a waiver of the Headlee tax limitation.

While homeowners will realize a modest drop of 1 mill (\$1 per \$1,000 of state equalized valuation) in the rate, the school board and administration will have to find \$1.8 million in budget savings for the next school year.

While the millage rate of \$43.12 will be reduced at least 1 mill, property tax bills will still be higher than last year because of an assessment increase of nearly 10 percent.

While the school board wasn't required to act on the recommendation of Superintendent Dennis O'Neill,

board members agreed with his decision and argued that the problem is with the failure of the state Legislature to agree on a school finance reform proposal.

O'Neill said that while the district can survive financially this coming year, the following year will be a major problem in that there may be a millage increase proposal to voters "in the neighborhood" of 5 mills, or \$5 per \$1,000 of SEV; a renewal of 2.75 mills, and a requested waiver of the Headlee tax limitation amendment.

In recommending against putting the Headlee waiver on the June 12 school board election ballot, O'Neill commented that the "voters' mood regarding taxes locally, statewide, and nationally, especially with SEV increases, aren't conducive for a successful election."

**WHILE** A public information campaign for a potential Headlee

waiver proposal on the ballot could have been mounted, the information for voters would have to be vague, he said, because the school district would not know the specific impact of the Headlee waiver until mid-May.

But the superintendent, whose comments were echoed by board members, said that the district will be in a "financially critical status" next year without school finance reform on the state level.

"With great difficulty along with depleting our fund balance, we can survive one more year," he said.

"However, without a substantial state funding improvement," the 1990-91 school year budget "is an impossibility without increasing the burden of our local taxpayers."

Kathleen Chorbagan, school board trustee, said that people must realize that the district is suffering and that state officials in Lansing are "playing politics and pushing the

problem further into the future. "We have to fight as a community to get financial reform."

She was also critical of Gov. James Blanchard downplaying the school money problems, quoting him as saying there was only one district in deficit while Donald Bemis, state school superintendent, said there were 28.

**WHILE TRUSTEE** Mathew McCusker chided the Legislature and governor for their "inaction," he was critical of two state business organizations for opposing the most recent proposal to raise the state sales tax a 1/4 cent to 4 1/4 percent.

The administration said that there is a \$4.1 million fund balance, or savings, on hand, but that is expected to be wiped out next year. The current operating budget is \$76 million.

The in-car computers will provide officers with instant access for license checks and other information. The Dearborn police department has offered free use of its mainframe computer until Westland buys one, said Schnarr.

The computer proposal drew a negative reaction from councilman Charles Pickering, who said he didn't think it was the "right time" for the purchase.

Council president Kenneth Mehl responded:

"We thought this was a great idea five or six years ago, and we blew it at that time."

fy on behalf of the prosecution at Nerkowski's trial, the prosecutor reported.

According to a statement by Salwa admitted into court records, Salwa went to the closed pizzeria with Nerkowski and parked across the street about 1 a.m. Feb. 18.

Salwa said Nerkowski told him to take a 5-gallon can of gasoline from behind the building and spread it around on the pizzeria floor, according to the statement.

Salwa was to return to the car and a third, unidentified person was supposed to come by later to light the fire, the statement said.

But the gasoline apparently touched off an explosion before Salwa could leave the building.

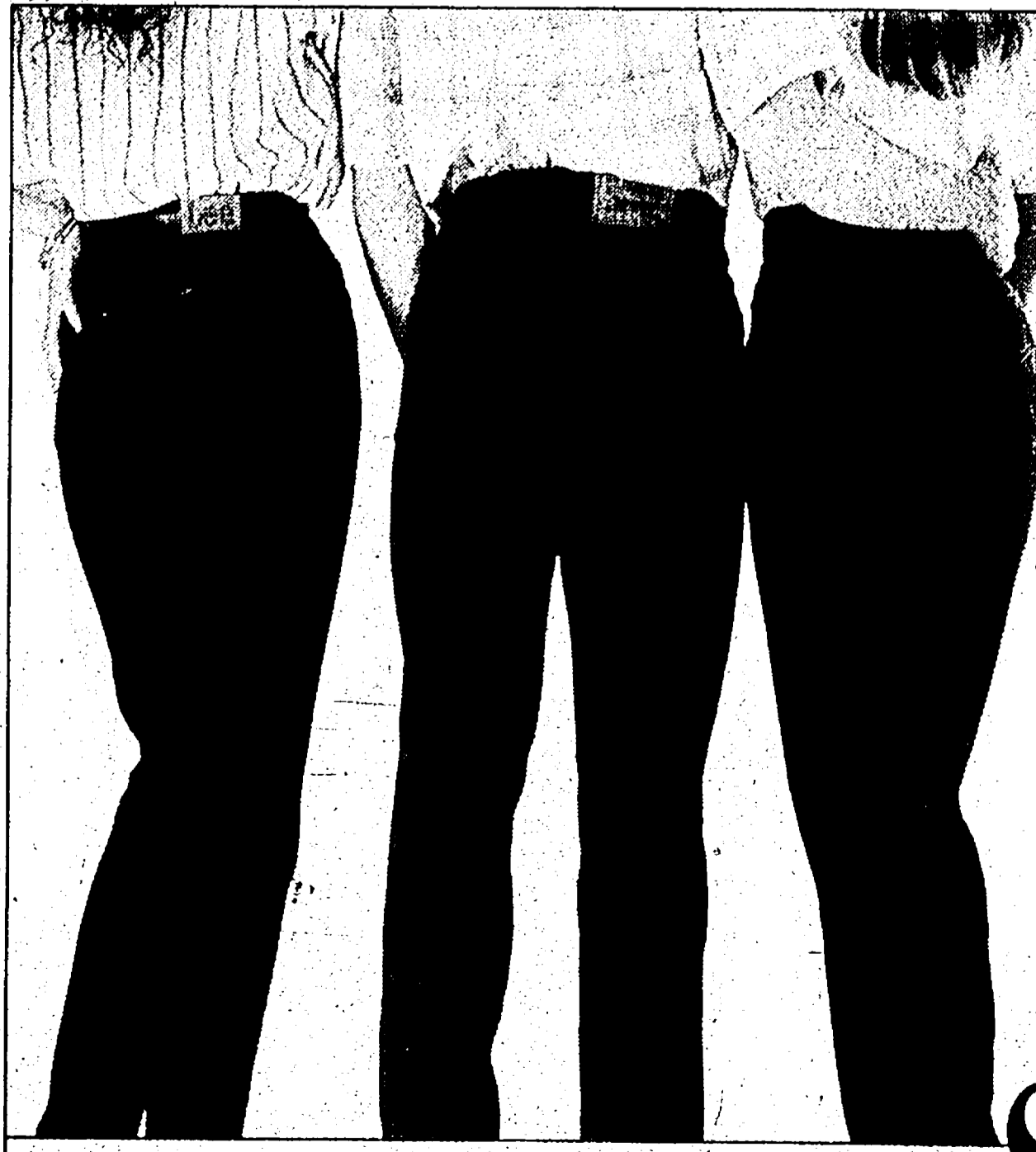

## Livonia school talks start before contract expires

The Livonia Public Schools and its 1,050 teachers already have started new contract talks, even though their current contract won't expire until August.

And they hope to sign it in June, before teachers are off for the summer.

The district includes the northern section of Westland.

"If you can get it settled, you're dealing with knowns, rather than with what might happen," said Sam LaMonica, director of employee relations for the school district.

Steve Naumcheff, Livonia Education Association president, agreed. "We want to have it to our membership the week before school is out."

BY SETTLING before the contract expires, teachers are sure of the school calendar, their duties, class size and more, Naumcheff added.

Both sides have met five times so

far, and a sixth negotiation session was scheduled for 6-11 p.m. today at the central office, Naumcheff said.

The three-year contract between teachers and the LPS expires Aug. 15. It provided for 5.5 percent to 7.5 percent raises in various years of the contract — the yearly amount determined in part by how much property values increased in the district.

While both sides have agreed not to publicly discuss what they're seeking in talks, they touched on the issue of pay increases.

"We're competitive in all areas," LaMonica said. "In not all instances are we at the top (of salary scales) but we pay competitively."

Naumcheff said "our thrust is, the district has a high caliber of teacher. Eighty percent of the staff has advanced degrees.

"We have an experienced staff. We would like to be considered one of the reasons that 'great things are happening in the Livonia Public Schools.'"

In the metro Detroit area, teachers have been averaging 6 percent to

8 percent pay raises in the past year, Naumcheff said.

"Both sides would entertain a multi-year contract," Naumcheff said, LaMonica said, "We always start and attempt to go for three years."

Rising employee health insurance costs have sparked some employers to ask worker unions to help pay insurance costs.

"It's something that everyone's working on, it comes up at every negotiation," LaMonica said. He declined to say how concerns about insurance costs might effect negotiations.

Naumcheff said that in this negotiation session, both sides seek to rewrite the contract because the current contract — much amended and revised — was originally written in the '70s.

"We're not interested in having a third party decide what we agreed to," he said. "We want it to be clear and fair, so we don't have controversies that are going to be disruptive."

## cop calls

A WESTLAND man was shot in the chest with a .5mm pellet rifle early Friday during a dispute on the 34200 block of Erwin, police said.

The victim, 27, had a small wound in the left side of his chest but refused medical treatment, police said.

Officers were called to the house at 1:15 a.m. by a woman who said she and her male roommate had kicked the victim out earlier in the evening after he was "repeatedly causing trouble."

The man, who told police he was assaulted by the male roommate, apparently returned to the house, began pounding on the windows and threatening the occupants, police said.

At that point the man was shot at through the window, police said.

Police said it was unclear who fired the shot.

A WOMAN who called police to her home on the 28900 block of McDonald Sunday because her husband had allegedly hit her ended up being arrested after she struck her husband with a leather belt in the presence of police officers.

The woman was given violations for assault and battery and resisting arrest, police said.

Officers were called to the house at 8:35 p.m. by the woman, who said her husband had struck her with his fist during an argument and she wanted him removed from the house.

Police said the man didn't have visible bruises or other signs of being assaulted.

A discussion with the couple resulted in the woman agreeing to leave, police said.

But while she was packing a suitcase she apparently changed her mind and shouted, "This is my house. I'm not leaving," police said.

She then took a leather belt and struck her 36-year-old husband several times across the body and face, police said.

The husband wasn't seriously injured.

Officers said the woman forcibly resisted efforts to handcuff her for approximately 30 seconds before giving in.

A HOMEOWNER on the 7690 block of Louise Ct. reported that someone broke into her house early Sunday and stole \$76 cash from a purse left on the kitchen table.

The woman told police she was sleeping when the incident occurred between 1 and 8 a.m.

The woman said she woke up because the house felt cold even though the furnace was working. When she went to check, she found the front door open, the woman said.

Police said there were no signs of forced entry to the house.

# Counselor aids teens on their road to recovery

Prior to 1985, Crystal Noftz knew little about chemical dependency.

Since then, however, Noftz, a Livonia school psychologist since 1989, has made it a crusade to learn everything she can to fight what she says is "a more insidious drug problem."

Although a nationwide survey conducted by the University of Michigan reported a decline in drug use among high school seniors, alcohol use remained unchanged from previous years. And Noftz believes today's young substance abusers are more cunning.

"There are less kids using drugs stupidly in the maniacal heavy experimental way of the late '60s and early '70s," she said. "It's more a solid part of their lives. They know when to use, when not to use."

Noftz subscribes to the theory that drug use "is more determined by family history and genetic predisposition — not poverty. And availability, which is just as great anywhere you want it," she said.

Only three out of 430 students treated by Noftz did not have a family history of alcoholism or chemical dependency, and two of those three were adopted.

Noftz is the coordinator of Livonia Franklin High School's two year old experimental program dealing with substance abusers. Because of its success — better grades for participants, less absenteeism and early intervention with freshman identified at risk — the district is considering expanding the program to its two

other high schools, Churchill and Stevenson.

Noftz is an energetic woman who commutes from Birmingham to Livonia daily, then often attends meetings in Ann Arbor before returning home. Three days a week she attends Alanon meetings — a support group for families of alcoholics.

"I go to the meetings because it helps me deal with the kids. I get support because I am living with more addicts and alcoholics than most people," said Noftz, who serviced a number of schools across the district before her current appointment. Prior to that, she was on staff at the former Wayne County General Hospital.

In her small office in the school's counseling center, she is constantly dealing with students who casually drop in to say hello. She is clearly an anchor for her brood, behaving more like a mother than a counselor, lavishing praise and giving hugs.

"The kids know me as a special counselor," she said. "I also deal with other crisis. As a clinical psychologist, I'm trained to handle suicide threats, sex abuse, child abuse, pregnancies, whatever."

In fact many of those major traumas go hand in hand with substance abuse, she said.

She's proud that 70 percent of her referrals now come from students rather than administrators or staff. And staff has been very supportive of the program.

"There are a lot of 13-year-olds who don't know how to have fun on a Saturday night without drugs," Noftz

## A student's long battle back from drug addiction

Adam, 18, is a good looking high school senior. He's polite, soft spoken, a former football player with a loving, supportive family. He's also a recovering cocaine addict.

No one would suspect it, but cocaine and marijuana almost cost Adam (not his real name) his life two years ago. No one would suspect the young man with good grades and a spot on the school football team of smoking up to 25 marijuana cigarettes a day. But Adam says he did.

Adam started using drugs at 13 — later, he says, than many of his peers.

"I started doing cocaine at the beginning of 10th grade," he said.

Adam quickly became addicted. "From the first time I used it until I started selling was two or three weeks."

He was supplied by co-workers at his after-school restaurant job.

Adam's habit was three grams of coke (\$240 worth) every three days. He sold the drug to support his habit.

"I WOULD sell to anyone — kids at school, anywhere," said the local high school senior. Then he'd usually get high with them.

Adam and other students who have used drugs agree that the high school smoking areas (abolished in recent years in most western Wayne County school districts) were often used for drug trafficking.

"A lot of the activity in school lessened since the smoking lounge closed," he said.

Adam's life was absorbed by cocaine, something a local high school counselor called his "drug of choice."

"I slept every couple of days. I didn't eat. My weight went from 145 pounds to 125," he said. "When I stood up, I'd kind of black out."

## Plymouth Canton program garners top recognition

Nick Cooper has been involved with the Plymouth Canton Schools substance abuse program since its inception in 1980.

Cooper, a former counselor who is an alternative education teacher, said the program has been recognized nationally as one of the top programs in the country.

"We've had 25 school districts come look at our program this year — even with the cuts," he said.

A failed millage request has resulted in the loss of an alternative education program in the middle schools. Growth Works, an out-of-school program for kids who have experienced serious drug or alcohol problems, also got the ax.

But there is still a lot in place.

At the high school level, there are classes for recovering students, dealing with coping skills and readjusting to life without drugs or alcohol. There are student service centers for students at risk of developing serious problems.

"We also run student assistance groups for stress, new students, concerned persons which includes children of alcoholics, and a stop smoking group," Cooper said. "Parental permission is required for (participation in) all but the stop smoking group. We've also done sessions on divorce."

The 10-week sessions run one hour per week during a different rotating hour of the day so participants don't miss much from their regular school schedule.

"We began a modified program in the 1982-83 school year," said Cooper. "Part of that is implementing a

progressive discipline policy in the middle schools and high schools. We keep track of the kids from early on. Three offenses result in expulsion for sale or possession of drugs or alcohol. And the sale or distribution (of drugs or alcohol) counts for two offenses at the middle school level."

There is also an "intervention program. At the middle school level, for example, those caught with drugs or alcohol are mandated to attend special monthly meetings. There are also special programs for those with behavior or attendance problems, and drug prevention programs. By next year, Plymouth Canton hopes to adopt the Michigan Health Model prevention program for elementary students.

THE WAYNE WESTLAND district also has a number of programs in place to curb substance abuse.

There is a substance abuse task force in each of the seven secondary schools (junior and senior high), according to Ron Somers, executive director of secondary education for Wayne Westland.

"Each secondary school has a core team of five staff — three teachers, a counselor and an administrator," Somers said. "We are running groups for kids on self esteem, children of alcoholics, groups for new students, and support groups for recovering addicts."

Students are also referred to the Community Commission on Drug Abuse, supported by both the Livonia and Wayne Westland school districts and the cities of Livonia and Westland.

# ACLU warns of abuse in proposed wiretap bill

State officials are looking at wiretapping to get at top drug dealers amid warnings from the American Civil Liberties Union that electronic eavesdropping can be abused.

"It's a new tool — not to deal with drug dealers on the street or drug houses, but middle and upper class drug dealers," Donald Reising told the state Senate Judiciary Committee last week.

A former Ingham County prosecu-

tor and circuit judge, he is now Gov. Blanchard's "drug czar."

In a public hearing, Reising added, "The wiretap is needed to get up that ladder, to the middle and upper echelons, to the pipeline."

JUDICIARY committee chairman Rudy Nichols, R-Waterford, not only likes the bill but is confident there are safeguards against its abuse.

"Misuse would be a felony. That should discourage improper use of a tap," Nichols said.

"It certainly should," agreed Reising. "If I were in a prosecutorial position, I would prosecute those who misused wiretaps."

Sponsor of Senate Bill 125 is Nick Smith, R-Hillsdale County. The bill would "sunset" (automatically be repealed) after three years. Under it, a prosecutor would apply to a judge for authorization to wiretap for a 30-day period.

All wiretap applications would have to be reported to the attorney general, who would make an annual

report to the Legislature and governor.

HOWARD SIMON, state director of the ACLU, opposed the bill as of doubtful constitutionality because "a wiretap picks up all calls and violates the specificity of the Fourth Amendment."

Simon doubted the bill's effectiveness, noting a federal wiretap law has been on the books since the 1960s. "In 20 years, the impact has not been to break the back of crime," he said.

Then he twitted Republicans Nichols and Smith: "Conservatives, I thought, have a healthy suspicion of governmental power."

Simon's heaviest fire was at a provision allowing a prosecutor to apply for a wiretap not only when other methods have failed but seem "unlikely to succeed."

THE ACLU chief also objected to the "ex parte" nature of the judicial proceeding — the potential defendant had no chance to argue in court

against issuing the wiretap permit.

"That's the nature of it," replied Sen. John Kelly, D-Detroit.

"Ex parte justice is no justice," said Simon. "But an independent agency could be set up to challenge applications."

"An ombudsman?" asked Nichols. "Right — a public defender, or our agency," Simon answered.

Simon also proposed the wiretap permit not be renewable after 30 days as Smith's bill would allow. "Drop it if there's no charge, or else it's a fishing expedition," he said.

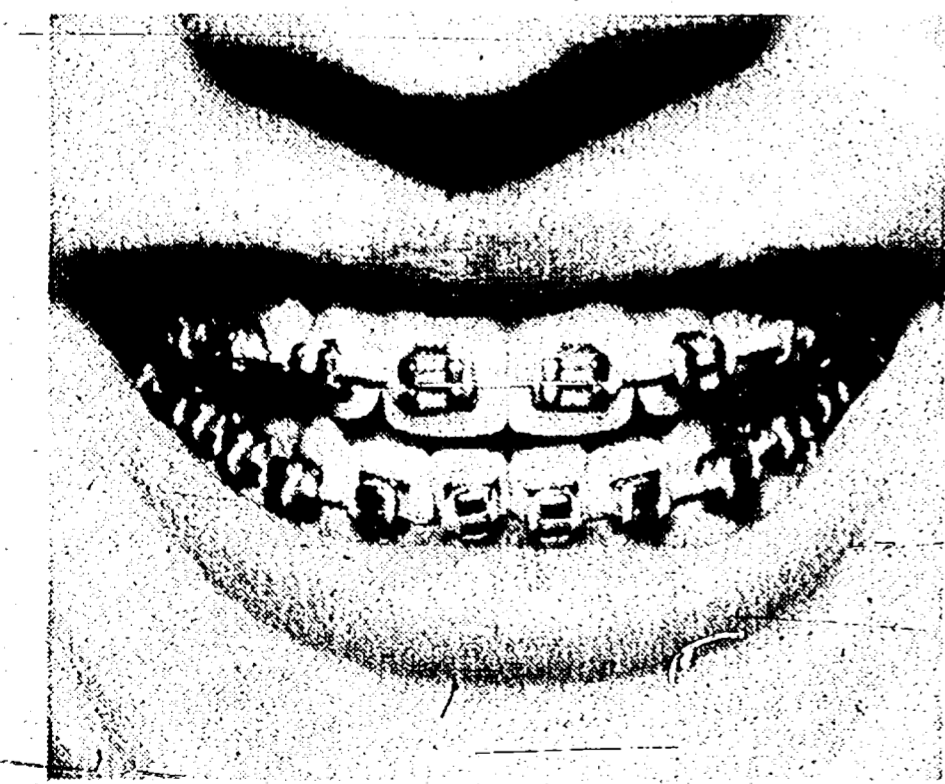

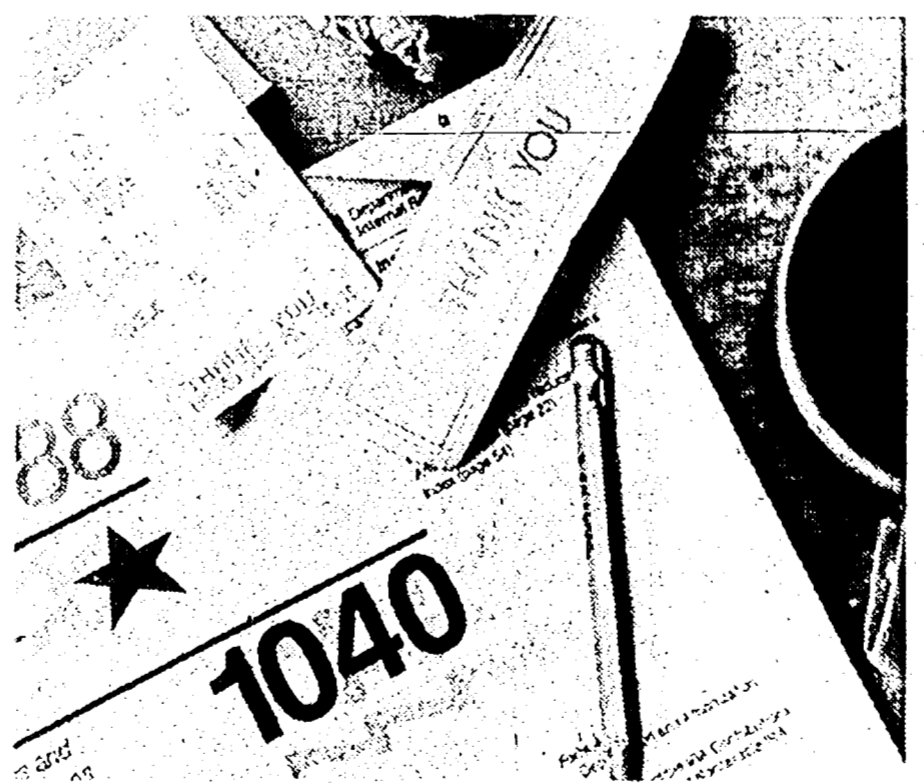

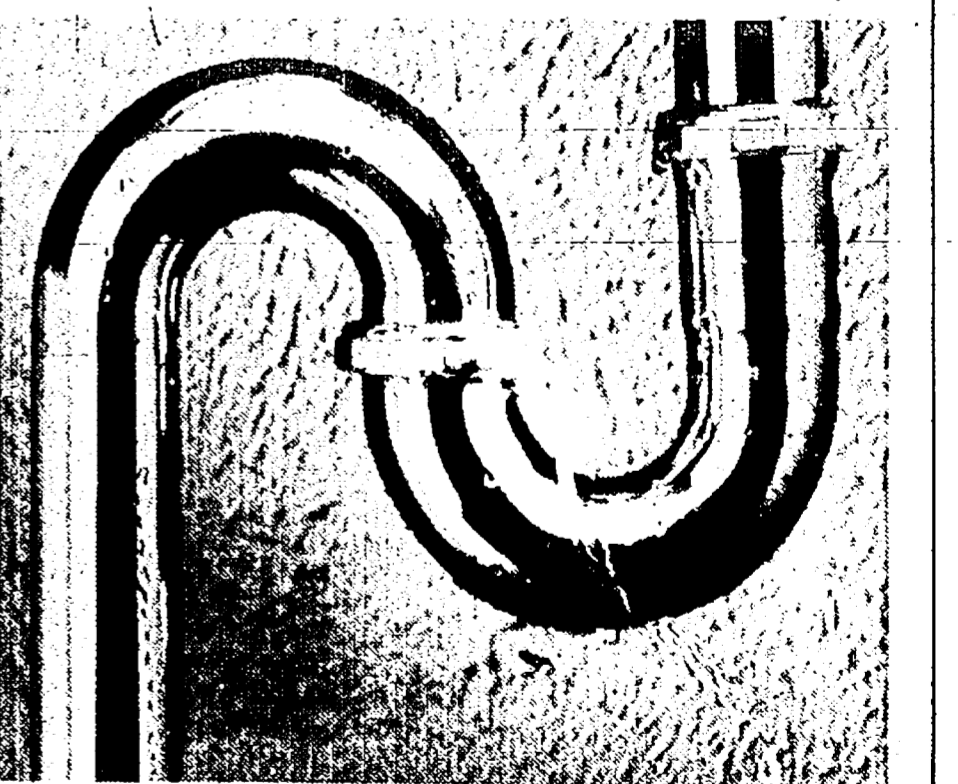

Even Adam's drug using friends began to tell him to ease off. Amazingly, his parents didn't suspect he was using drugs. Adam kept going to school and working as a busboy in a local restaurant.

Adam's downward spiral took eight months. The grandson of an alcoholic, he has a genetic predisposition to chemical dependency, according to his counselor. While predisposition isn't the only factor, children or grandchildren of alcoholics are four times more likely than other children to become alcoholics, according to experts.

WHEN HIS older sister came home from college for summer vacation, Adam warned her that he might come home drunk or high. His sister, with whom he has never been particularly close, told his parents he was using drugs.

"At some level he knew he was near death," the counselor said. "His heart was being stressed. He suffered some brain damage."

Through an employee assistance program offered by his mother's employer, Adam found out about the Huron Oaks Rehabilitation Center for Chemical Dependency, affiliated with St. Joseph's Hospital, Ann Arbor.

Forty-two days of in-patient treatment followed. The first half of the program remains a fog to Adam. All he recalls is suffering from lots of headaches and feelings of general weakness.

"I was drying out," he said. Adam was part of an adolescent unit with 20 patients. He took part in group therapy, individual sessions and listened to formal presentations. There was a lot of role playing to prepare patients for what they would face on the outside.

ADAM RETURNED home in August 1987.

"I had to drop all my old friends. The first three or four months I

didn't go out much," he recalled. At school he'd avoid the old crowd but still have to face them in classes or hallways.

Adam's counselor said the double-edged sword for recovering kids is that former drug pals see them as turncoats and non-drug users still see them as drug abusers. In either case, no one wants to associate with them.

Adam was fortunate. An experimental program working with substance abusers was initiated the fall following his treatment at Huron Oaks.

ADAM NOW works as a student assistant three mornings a week. He also talks to younger students identified (because of declining grades and chronic absenteeism) at risk of abusing alcohol or drugs.

Like other reformed users, he believes "you've got to give it away to keep what you've got."

Regarding his parents, it took a long time to rebuild the trust, he said.

"They were real scared and real protective," he said. "I never held a grudge against my sister, she saved my life."

With continued therapy, Adam slowly started rebuilding confidence in himself.

His school grades are improving and he's made plans to enter U.S. military service after graduation.

His social life still centers on others who have suffered the same fate. Adam's girlfriend is a recovering

drug addict. So is his best friend.

Adam has been drug free since July 6, 1987 — never once relapsing since his first day of treatment. Clearly his story — a supportive family, his plea for help instead of denial and his stamina — isn't typical.

"I don't go to parties where there are drugs or alcohol," he said. "Except for weddings, and I can handle that. I'm sturdier now."

said: "Some kids start using drugs in third or fourth grade. They can't identify what's fun, they don't know."

Inspirational sayings are taped to the walls in her office, like this from Henry David Thoreau: "There is just as much beauty visible to us in the landscape as we are prepared to appreciate — not a grain more."

Noftz sees beauty in what others might consider hopeless.

The bottom line is that Noftz's students are not the academic all-stars. Many come from troubled homes. The grit is there — low grades, drugs, alcohol, suicide attempts, pregnancies, unresponsive families.

But Noftz concentrates on the positive. Many have overcome tremendous obstacles without reinforcement at home. Even those with supportive families have a lot to overcome. She finds good qualities in each individual, and she constantly challenges a student to be better, reach for higher goals.

A sixth hour class for recovering addicts is run like a group therapy session, with gripes aired, support and solutions offered. Everyone is encouraged to express their true feelings.

One boy who started using speed in the third grade and was formally banished from the school district a

couple years back is now a shining beacon in Noftz's class. She went to bat for him. Smart, articulate and clean, his goal now is to help other substance abusers.

"Her work has made an impact with the kids and their families," said Dr. Kenneth Watson, Franklin principal. "It's been very helpful. She has become intensely involved with each one. That's not something a counselor with a caseload of 300 students can do. We're extremely appreciative. We have grown to depend upon the work she has done."

An evaluation of the program dated Jan. 16, 1989 reports that Noftz has seen 430 students. She has assisted with following in-patient treatment programs for 13 students and a handful of adults, including two parents of students. She has also assisted with placement and follow-up in 14 incidents of out patient treatment.

Because of her success, the administration will ask the board of education to expand the program to the other two high schools.

"We'd like to establish a person like her in each building," said Robert Laundroche, Livonia's director of secondary education.

Noftz, instrumental in shaping the program, is pleased.

"It's going in the direction I hoped it would," she said.

# S'craft races bring large candidate turnout

Three incumbents and nine challengers have thrown their hats in the ring, making the Monday, June 12, Schoolcraft College trustee election one of the most crowded in the college's history.

Voters will elect three candidates to six-year terms on the college governing body, choosing from three incumbents and two challengers.

Voters will also elect one of seven

non-incumbents to a four-year board seat.

CANDIDATES running for six year seats include board president Mary Breen of Plymouth Township and fellow incumbents Harry Greenleaf and Jack Kirksey, both of Livonia. Challengers David Tatman of Plymouth Township and Lawrence Whitmarsh of Livonia are also in the race.

Breen is a retired administrator for the Livonia Schools. Greenleaf is a management supervisor with Ford

Motor Co., Livonia. Kirksey is community education director for the Livonia Schools. Tatman is a supervisor and Whitmarsh a manager at GM Hydra-Matic, Ypsilanti.

The crowded field for the four-year seat includes Ronaale Bowman, Richard Hayward, Thaddeus McCotter, Patricia Sacha, and M. Andrea Taylor, all of Livonia. Jeffrey Theodore of Canton Township and Thomas Davis of Northville Township.

Bowman is a trainer with Wayne

County Youth Assistance, Northville. Hayward is a self-employed consultant specializing in steel. McCotter is a clerk with a Livonia-based law firm and a law student at the University of Detroit. Sacha is a retired media specialist for the Birmingham Schools. Taylor is a cafeteria supervisor for the Plymouth-Canton Schools. Theodore is an assistant Wayne County prosecutor. Davis is a supervisor with Ford Motor Co. Dearborn. Trustees oversee academic and financial issues at School-

craft. The 12,500-student community college serves the Livonia, Westland, Garden City, Plymouth-Canton and Northville public school districts, as well as a small portion of the Novi Schools.

Schoolcraft levies a 2.11-mill property tax in those districts. The tax translates to roughly \$90 a year for persons living in homes assessed at \$85,000.

MAJOR COLLEGE issues include development of college-owned land by private developers.

The college maintains a main campus at 18600 Haggerty, Livonia. It also operates Schoolcraft College-Radcliff, 1751 Radcliff, Garden City and an extension center in the Plymouth-Canton Schools.

Rosina Raymond, the board's longest-serving trustee announced last month she wouldn't seek re-election but died April 11 before her term expired. Trustees were to decide Wednesday whether to appoint someone to complete the remaining weeks of Raymond's term.

## Courses offer tips on motorcycle safety

Three motorcycle safety courses are being offered this spring at Schoolcraft College, Livonia.

Courses teach motorcycle riding skills to beginning, intermediate and advanced riders. They include:

- **Motorcycle Rider** — The 18-20 hour course is designed by the Motorcycle Safety foundation for inexperienced riders of any age. It provides classroom and riding experience. Motorcycles are provided. Weeknight classes will be held June 5-15 and Aug. 14-31. The August

classes spend more time covering basic skills. Weekend classes will be offered May 19-21, June 2-4, June 23-25, Aug. 18-27 and Sept. 22-24. Weekend courses are considered more demanding and aren't recommended for those without previous riding experience.

- **Performance Based** — The one-day, eight-hour, course covers braking, counter-steering, turning, speed judgment and other safe riding techniques. Students must provide their own motorcycles. The

State of Michigan motorcycle skills test will be administered at the beginning of the course. Students under 18 must pass to qualify. The course will be offered April 30, May 13, June 17, July 9, Aug. 27, Sept. 17 and 30.

- **Experienced Rider** — The one-day course emphasizes riding skills for large touring motorcycles and sport bikes. Students must provide their own motorcycle. Motorcycles must pass a safety inspection. Riders must also provide proof of cycle en-

dorsement and insurance. The course meets June 23.

The fee is \$26 per course. Students in all courses must provide a helmet, gloves, over-the-ankle boots, heavy-duty pants, a jacket and rain or cold weather gear.

Weekend classes begin 6 p.m. Friday and continue for a full day Saturday and Sunday. Weekday evening classes begin at 5:30 p.m.

## Pioneer Gagnon: Community builder

**T**O MOST of his friends and political colleagues, he was known as Virg. But he will go down in Westland's history as Virgil Gagnon, a leader in the community's history both as an elected official and as a businessman.

Gagnon, who died two weeks ago at the age of 76, was preparing to return to his hometown after retiring 15 years ago and moving to Florida.

When the community, then Nankin Township, was developing its residential and commercial base, Virg was a visible leader, first in organizing the chamber of commerce and running it with his wife, Harriet, from their Gulf gas station on the corner of Wayne and Warren roads.

He later was elected to the Nankin Township Board of Trustees and the Westland City Charter Commission, helping to draft the charter which was adopted by voters 23 years ago this week.

Along with the charter being approved, voters also elected Gagnon to Westland's city council. When the township was converted into a city government on May 16, 1966, Gagnon's leadership skills were recognized by his colleagues who named him council president.

He served in that post for four years before stepping down to become city clerk.

Virg retired in 1974 to move to Florida with his wife, Harriet, also active in the chamber of commerce.

He will also be remembered for his enthusiasm and his numerous contributions to the development of the community when it was at a crossroads.

The community will always appreciate what he did to help build Westland.

### Virg will be missed by the Westland political and business community.

**HIS PASSING** generated a suggestion from another political pioneer (former mayor Eugene McKinney) which should be implemented.

McKinney's suggestion is to have community leaders who were active when the township was incorporated as a city in the spring of 1966 convene to exchange memories and views and — if nothing else — to organize information about the city's first days and years so residents and historians can later get an accurate account of those important days.

An important part of that activity should be videotaped interviews with those early pioneers, making it a living and oral history of the community at a crossroads in its development.

Video students at the William Ford Vocational/Technical Center have the equipment and know-how to do the job.

The Westland Historical Commission is in an excellent position to organize to identify the leaders to be interviewed, and store the tapes for later use.

We have seen the benefits of having the tapes of persons with something to say at other institutions and they are extremely valuable — for now and later years.

Now is the time to get the pioneers' comments on tape while their memories are fresh.

## City, suburbs Programs foster understanding

**W**E KNOW people who've never experienced the joys of early morning at Eastern Market. And it's not fresh corn they're afraid of.

We know some who think the best way to catch a Major League baseball game is by flicking the TV remote. The Tiger Stadium bleachers would be OK, if only the stadium was in some distant suburb.

We know people who when traveling tell out-of-town colleagues they're from (fill-in-the-blank), "that's kind of near — but not really that close — to Detroit."

These are the symptoms of a "deadly" disease, Detroit Paranoia. If it continues to go unchecked, this virus could be responsible for killing off cultural enrichment and diverse friendships for the next generation of suburban adults.

It may already be too late to save the current one.

Many of us who were born and grew up in Detroit's inner ring of suburbs — Redford Township, Southfield, Garden City — have somehow developed a fear of the city in a way our parents couldn't have imagined. Crime and perceptions about crime are a big part of that. So is economic blight. And even though some refuse to admit it, so is racism.

**FOR THOSE WHO** grew up in or have moved to the second suburban tier — Farmington Hills, West Bloomfield, Troy, Birmingham, etc. — the mistrust seemingly grows in concert with the distance from Detroit's borders.

What's happened is that we've let the city's bad characteristics overshadow the good, blotting those out almost entirely.

Our Detroit-born parents don't have this problem. Sure many picked up stakes and moved to the suburbs, fearing deterioration of the city's public schools, crime and declining property values. But pleasant memories of their city neighborhood's childhood hangouts and family outings to city landmarks created equal, positive, impressions.

Detroit Paranoia is a relatively recent phenomenon.

The preferred treatment for the current generation of suburbanites would be to cram as many city experiences into their lives as possible. That's assuming of course that they can be convinced to put their fears aside.

But it's also time to start working on our suburban children, so that the country's sixth-largest city, and all it has to offer, becomes something more than a dark, evil planet for them as they enter adulthood.

**Michigan Week, celebrated each May, would be the ideal platform to launch an intensive education effort between Detroit and its suburbs. Students in many communities take part in government programs, sometimes exchanging places with government leaders for a day. Creating student exchanges that cross city-suburban boundaries will help stop Detroit Paranoia from creeping any further.**

**WE NOTE THAT** some communities are off to a good start in this respect. Last week, a second grade class from Gill Elementary School in Farmington Hills made the half-hour bus trip from their school to the Focus:HOPE Center for Children, an infant/toddler day care center in Detroit. The two groups of children drew pictures, sang songs and listened to a storyteller.

This summer, a group of about 40 Detroit-area students will participate in the Michigan Coalition for Human Rights Freedom Tour, a trip through several Southern states that highlights this country's civil rights struggle. The trip will "be an opportunity for our youth to begin to break down the racial barriers that exist between the city and the suburbs," said Bernard Firestone, vice president of the Detroit Metropolitan AFL-CIO and a tour supporter.

Similar student exchange projects have been a common occurrence in Detroit and its suburbs for grade school to high school student during the past couple of years.

We applaud those efforts and we hope to see them expanded.

Michigan Week, celebrated each May, would be the ideal platform to launch an intensive education effort between Detroit and its suburbs. Students in many communities take part in government programs, sometimes exchanging places with government leaders for a day.

Creating student exchanges that cross city-suburban boundaries will help stop Detroit Paranoia from creeping any further.

We urge suburban government and school leaders to broach this idea with their Detroit counterparts so that such a program can be in place in time for Michigan Week 1990.



## Spring thoughts: Limit terms of office, greed

**SOME MISCELLANEOUS** thoughts on an almost-warm spring afternoon.

We've got a big job ahead of us — you and I. We've been avoiding it for awhile, but the task just won't go away.

I got to thinking about this recently after a visit to this office from Republican U.S. Rep. Carl Pursell. The congressman, recovered from a hard fought re-election challenge from state Sen. Lana Pollock, came to visit and talk about Washington politics.

With all the scandals we're seeing with pseudo-hero Ollie North, Speaker of the House Jim Wright and John Tower, failed Defense secretary-designate, it might be wise for the us to pull in the leash on the boys inside the Beltway.

Pursell does better than most in staying in touch with the folks at home. But after listening to him for a time, it's obviously impossible for anyone, no matter his intentions, to avoid the suffocating traditions of Congress.

In describing congressional operations, the congressman inadvertently paints a surrealistic picture of powerbrokers more interested in protecting their turf on the numer-

ous committees and subcommittees rather than statesmen who are concerned about doing the best for the country.

When faced with the question of limiting congressional terms to say, 10 or 12 years, he hedged a bit but finally admitted it might not be a bad idea.

Actually, it's about time the American public insists on it. Our national leaders are losing touch with the nation. By limiting terms, more people would have a chance to serve the country with a much fresher perspective.

This is an issue worth getting excited about. A frequent change in national leadership will have an impact on how your tax dollars are spent and on the quality of your life.

Now all we need is someone to start the ball rolling. Don't expect the folks in Washington to take the initiative. They aren't prone to kill the goose that lays the golden egg.

Sounds like a good idea for most

### TV programs are clarified

To the editor:

Thank you for your great article in the Westland Observer about my new position and goals as Continental's Cablevision's program manager. Our programming effort is particularly important to us and I am looking forward to the exciting opportunities this affords me to increase and improve our coverage of community events.

There is one important point of clarification, however, that must be made to prevent potential confusion. While it is true that Continental provides local programming on our own CTV-11 channel, we no longer have responsibility for the "public access" programming you referred to in your story.

Prior to April 1988, your statement would have been absolutely accurate. In fact, by our original franchise agreement with the City of Westland, Continental was providing for public access programming (channel 18), educational access programming (channels 4 and 15) and governmental access programming (Channel 8), as well as programming on CTV-11.

In 1988, the City of Westland wanted to buy the studio facility Continental has built and the equipment we had provided at our Warren Road location. As a result of our April 22, 1988, sale of the studios and equipment to them, the city assumed responsibility for all programming on Channels 4, 8, 15 and 18.

Though the city, through special arrangement with a management firm, is providing government access programming on Channel 8,

Continental does continue to provide the programming seen on these channels until the city is able to fill them.

I hope this clarifies what is an extremely important point.

# The battle's over But victory remains in doubt

**IT'S OVER.**  
The battle has been fought, a rather large victory has been won and the warriors are getting back to their normal lives.  
Everyone should live happily ever after. But I suspect that won't be the case.

The "warriors" in this case are Darrell Dawsey and his followers, a small band of black students who took over and occupied the student services building at Wayne State University for almost two weeks.

Their complaint, as near as I can tell, is that they felt "oppressed." That's a great word to throw out, especially if you're black, because, Lord knows, blacks have known more than their share of oppression over the years.

From slavery to physical violence to almost total discrimination to just plain bigotry, this country does not have a particularly clean record in its treatment of black people.

**MARTIN LUTHER** King Jr. and his followers fought against that kind of oppression. They fought for the rights of blacks to sit at the front of the bus, for the rights of blacks to be served at the same lunch counters as whites and for the rights of young black students to attend the same universities as their white counterparts, so that they would have equal opportunities in the workplace and in society in general.

But Dawsey and his crew didn't want equal opportunity; they wanted special treatment.

Their protest, which, according to Dawsey, grew in part out of a "general dissatisfaction with American society" and a "developing of race consciousness," zeroed in on what they perceived to be a dismantling of Wayne State's Center for Black Studies.

They (students, mind you) decided that what the university should do was spend almost a million dollars to turn the center into a full-blown academic department with more black faculty members and a major in Africana Studies.

They threw in some other demands, like firing faculty they didn't like and setting up a university holiday to honor Martin Luther King Jr. and Malcolm X, but the focus was on the Africana department.

**AND THEY CHOSE** as their course of action not to campaign and work for such a goal, but to take over a building and demand that the university do what they want.

That isn't terribly surprising. For all their talk about "oppression" and "racism," these students were react-

ing like many other members of today's "gimme" society: "I want it, therefore you should give it to me."

In that sense they were no different from the suburban housewife who, when she sees something she doesn't want to watch on television, doesn't want to have to change the channel. She wants it taken off the air.

What is surprising is that the university gave in. WSU ironman David Adamany, the president who would be king, knuckled under. The tough guy, who only last fall ordered the arrests of some picketing university employees who were involved in a perfectly legal strike, gave in to these immature young protestors.

There was some bargaining, yes. No Malcolm X Day. No firing of fac-

ulty. Half a million instead of a million dollars for the first year of Africana studies. But Dawsey and company basically got what they wanted.

**THAT'S SCARY.** It's scary because their tactics, which Detroit Mayor Coleman Young called "heroic," were at best childish and at worst illegal and dangerous.

It's scary because, at a time when black students are becoming more and more militant at colleges across the state, the university's acquiescence to these spoiled young protestors could become precedent-setting.

And it's scary because whenever the specter of "racism" is mentioned, people seem to turn into quivering blobs, willing to give the protestors whatever they want, no matter how outrageous the demands.

Dawsey and his "warriors" (his word, not mine) may have won a temporal victory. But I'll tell you something, Darrell. You're no Martin Luther King Jr.

For those in our northern communities, a straight shot down I-75 will take you to the Michigan Humane Society (where the Interstate intersects with East Grand Boulevard), 7401 Chrysler Drive, Detroit 48211. Those in the western suburbs can donate towels to the School of Natural Resources at the University of Michigan, 430 E. University, Ann Arbor 48109-1115.

Both places are accepting clean towels by personal delivery or mail. If they announce they've reached their towel limit, the humane society will ask for donations to ship the towels to Valdez.

# Ways to prep a child

**Q:** I have a three year old son. I do not want to pressure my son but do want to help him get ready for school. What are the most beneficial experiences a parent can do for a child prior to entering kindergarten or preschool.

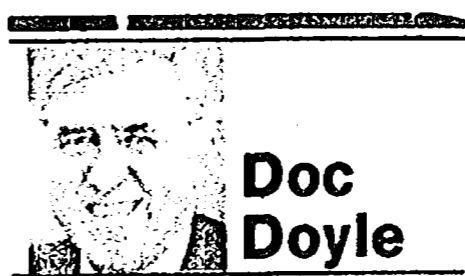
**A:** The most valuable experience that a parent or grandparent can do, in my opinion, for a young preschool child is to "read aloud" to the child. At the outset, you need to understand that there are two types of reading books for pre-preschoolers.

There are pattern books, for counting, identifying colors or letters of the alphabet. There are story books that, regardless of what age the book is written for, have characters (sometimes animals that act like people), some problem to solve and always a solution. Pattern books are fine for the little ones to learn numbers, colors and letters — to a point.

However, if every "read aloud" session with a child is pure memorization, drill and practice you may have a Fulbright kindergarten scholar that scores high on the kindergarten or first grade standardized test but who has little or no comprehension of life in his or her immediate environment.

Therefore, the reading should include a variety of interesting stories which are appropriate to the child's age.

The reading situation must be a natural, expected and anticipated experience; one to which the child looks forward. When you have creat-

ed a situation with your child or grandchild that triggers in their mind that this is now the time for reading, you are on target. The child will get the books and bring them to you. A little encouragement is fine but don't force the child. Make the experience fun and the child will take to it as a natural part of life.

Although pattern books are important, you need to enhance a child's higher "level" thinking and problem solving skills by involving the child into the reading as opposed to the child being a passive receptacle for your words of wisdom.

What do I mean? Most children have special books that have special meaning to them. Instead of just reading the book over and over to them, talk to them before the reading about the characters, have them identify characters in the book, have them predict outcomes. If it is a book read previously, ask questions like — Do you remember who this person is? What is going to happen in this story?

Start with the characters. For instance, one of my favorite books for reading to kindergarten children is "Billy Goats Gruff." This is a book that presents a problem for the "Goat" family of how to get across a

bridge under which an ugly, mean troll lives.

After a book of this nature has been read to a child over a period of time, key questions can be asked. What is this story about, what is going on? The child will pick up the story theme and in his/her own language and will amaze you in his comprehension of the story, of details, of the problem and the solution.

If we engender a love of books in preschoolers in this manner with, for example, "Billy Goats Gruff," the same principle can carry over in their lives when they read Victor Hugo's "Les Miserables."

Probably the most valuable benefit in reading aloud to a preschooler is the emotional bonding that develops between the adult and the child.

Sitting on the parent or grandparent's lap, sharing the story together, thinking through what is occurring is subtle yet a way to develop emotional linkages far and above treating the child to a double dip cone at the Dairy Queen.

Dr. Frank Smith of Ontario, Canada completed some major research regarding "reading aloud" to children and found that the more stories that children are exposed to the more their comprehension skills are developed.

He also found that reading a variety of different stories helped children develop a stronger vocabulary and greatly assisted them in grasping sentence structure.

To answer your question, what experience is most beneficial for pre-preschoolers? Teach the child the love of books and the love of reading in a warm caring environment. This total experience is far more valuable than the parent who solely drills the child in the alphabet and numbers so that the parent can brag how his child can count to a hundred by age two.

As a parent, you are modeling behavior. Project to the child that reading is enjoyable and your behavior will pay great dividends in the child learning character identification, comprehension, vocabulary development, sentence structure, problem solving and critical thinking skills later in life.

# Area firms assist in oil spill cleanup

Firms from Livonia and Farmington Hills are playing a role in cleaning damage caused by the recent Alaskan oil spill.

Crude Oil Recovery Corp. of Livonia has donated 1,600 pounds of oil absorbing material to assist in the cleanup.

The company bills the product, called QU1, as the most oil absorbent material available.

"What it is, is duck feathers compressed against a nylon mat," said James Magda of Crude Oil Recovery Corp., who arranged the donation. Feathers are obtained from ducks sold to supermarkets and restaurants, he said.

The Livonia-based company handles the product's distribution. The product is manufactured by Medbury & Sons Development Co. Inc. of Farmington Hills.

"We had the material and we felt an obligation to help," Magda said.

The material was sent to Cordova District Fishermen United, a 100-year-old Alaska-based environmental organization.

"WHAT WE wanted to do was

place it in the hands of someone who was interested in helping, but who lacked the resources," Magda said. Magda said he was made aware of the Alaskan organization through a telephone call to Greenpeace, a worldwide environmental action group.

The donation was valued at \$14,000, he said.

The material was flown to Alaska by a California-based air freight company.

The oil spill occurred March 24 when the oil tanker Exxon Valdez smashed into a reef in Prince William Sound, near Port Valdez, Alaska. The spill has since spread more than 100 nautical miles south, toward the Gulf of Alaska.

The spill has threatened wildlife, including fish, birds and water mammals, including whales, porpoises and sea otters.

Cleanup materials represent a small portion of company business, Magda said.

"Our primary function is to recover oil from tanks and wells," he said.

# Commission seeks aid for blacks

Wayne County commissioners have joined the Detroit City Council in calling on Congress to create a program to reimburse black Americans for indignities their ancestors suffered as slaves.

The commission resolution cites recent payments made to American Indian tribes, including Michigan's Ottawa and Chippewa tribes, as well as payments to Japanese-Americans interned during World War II as precedent.

Commission chairman Arthur Carter, D-Detroit, said the concept dates back even farther than those recent attempts.

"The concept dates back very far," Carter said, citing a 1886 proposal that would have guaranteed former slaves 40 acres of property and a mule.

The concept of reparations to black Americans was also endorsed at a summit meeting of African American leaders this past weekend in New Orleans.

THE COUNTY commission resolution states that slaves were denied wages and property, while the nation as a whole benefited from their la-

bor. While objectives are the same, there are differences between the county commission and Detroit council proposals.

The county commission proposal calls upon Congress to create a federal panel to establish damages and create a means to compensate those affected by slavery.

The panel would also investigate the elimination of "many other programs designed to right the wrongs of discrimination," including affirmative action programs.

The Detroit council proposal is more specific. It calls on Congress to create a \$40 billion education fund to provide scholarships to Americans of African descent.

COMMISSIONER Kay Beard, D-Inkster, said she supported the commission proposal because her own ancestors faced discrimination upon arriving in America.

"I'm Irish and the Irish have also faced discrimination," said Beard, whose district includes Westland and Garden City.

Commissioners Milton Mack, D-

Wayne, and Richard Manning, D-Redford Township, also supported the proposal. Mack's district includes Canton Township.

Susan Heintz, R-Northville Township, the board's vice chairwoman, cast the lone vote against the proposal.

"There wasn't anything in there about how the reparations would be paid," Heintz said.

Three suburban commissioners, Edward Bolke Jr., William O'Neil and Edward Plawewski, abstained from voting.

## Self-imposed recovery helps others

### Women face harder times as alcoholics

Jean Kirkpatrick has a mission in life, a mission that came out of 29 years of drinking.

At 66, the Quakerstown, Pa., resident — not to be confused with the former UN ambassador — spends a good part of her time stumping the country, meeting with women and giving them the courage to become recovering alcoholics.

"The years when I was drinking, it was believed you had to hit bottom before you could begin to recover; now we know that you can interrupt the cycle with a decision to quit," said Kirkpatrick, who was in Livonia last week for a Women for Sobriety meeting. "Today, women more and more are recognizing the symptoms at a younger age."

"I read 50 letters a week from women and three-quarters of them are from younger women who recognize that there's something different about their drinking and want to do something about it."

Kirkpatrick is the new kid on the block when it comes to support groups for recovering alcoholics. Going up against the better-known Alcoholics Anonymous, she founded WFS.

WFS came out of Kirkpatrick's one-year climb out of the bottle and her problem with what she calls "the heavy emphasis on men" in the AA program.

She stopped drinking in 1971. She was unable to get a job because she was too old, over-educated and a woman alcoholic. She knew she had to do something.

After being turned off by AA, she decided she had to help herself and came up with the New Life Acceptance Program. It was a case of one thing leading to another. She got the idea from writing brochures for women who had trouble fitting in with AA. That in turn led to the founding of WFS in 1976.

"THAT REALLY was the force behind putting Women for Sobriety together," she said. "I came up with it by hit or miss. I was so sick I had to devise a way to recover, so I tried different ways and in the process worked on the facets of my self-image to change myself."

Kirkpatrick remembers her first drink. She was junior in high school and was at a party, where alcoholic beverages were served. She thought it was "wonderful." "It invigorated me, made me feel super-charged," she said. "It acted almost like an amphetamine."

By the time she was 21, she had the warning signs of alcoholism — blackouts, loss of memory, the ability to consume large quantities of alcohol without a hang-over.

Her drinking progressed and she was "easily drinking a bottle a day" when she quit in 1971. Her decision to quit was made by her body. She was suffering from pancreatitis, her liver "was shot" and she had ulcers.

Kirkpatrick believes women alcoholics face different problems than men. They must deal with a poor self-image and the social stigma of being alcoholics. Women aren't suppose to have problems with alcohol and are hesitant to seek treatment because, in some states, they can lose custody of their children. They also can lose their jobs or be terminated. Women are expendable in the work place, she said.

## 'New Life' gives women new lives

There's a big difference between sobriety and recovery, when it comes to alcoholism. Sobriety means you've quit drinking; recovery means an acceptance of the illness and learning to change your behavior.

It's estimated that one of every 10 women will become an alcoholic. Unlike men, who tend to drink in groups, women tend to isolate themselves when they drink.

Although a physical disorder that can be corrected with the cessation of drinking, alcoholism's emotional and psychological scars remain, scars that must be examined in order for full recovery, according to Jean Kirkpatrick.

Kirkpatrick made a commitment to recovery in 1972 and since then, has been helping women across the country do the same thing through her New Life Acceptance Program.

The author of four books and a spokesman for the cause of women alcoholics, Kirkpatrick founded Women for Sobriety, a program that utilizes 13 statements of acceptance and a seven-level process of recovery she developed as part of her own recovery.

"I'm really lousy; I'm nobody, nobody loves me; nobody cares if I live or die; that's what I thought of myself and it's the theme song of an alcoholic," she said. "An alcoholic drinks like a person who takes two aspirin every four hours for a headache. They take maintenance dosages."

"As the tolerance grows, alcoholics interpret it as 'wow, I can drink everyone under the table.' Alcoholics develop a compulsive craving that's unknown to social drinkers."

AS THE NAME implies, Women For Sobriety is for women. It's goal is to help women take control of their lives by improving their self-image.

The first statement is to the point — "I have a drinking (life threatening) problem that once had me." It also is the first level of recovery.

At the second level, women work at getting rid of negative thoughts, putting guilt behind them and practicing a new way for viewing problems. That level zeroes in on the second, fourth and ninth statements of acceptance — "Negative emotions destroy only myself," "Problems bother me only to the degree I

permit them to" and "The past is gone forever." At the third level, women focus on creating and practicing a new view of themselves, following the fifth and 12th statements — "I am what I think" and "I am a competent woman and have much to give life."

The fourth level emphasizes using new attitudes to enforce new behavior problems, stressing the third, sixth and 11th statements — "Happiness is a habit I will develop," "Life can be ordinary or it can be great" and "Enthusiasm is my daily exercise."

At the fifth level, women work on relationships as a result of their new feelings about themselves, incorporating the seventh and 10th statements — "Love can change the course of my world" and "All love given returns twofold."

By the sixth level, women recognize their life's priorities, their emotional/spiritual growth and self-responsibility, based on the eighth and 13th statements — "The fundamental object of life is emotional and spiritual growth" and "I am responsible for myself and my actions."

THE FINAL level of the acceptance program is "liberation, freedom and happiness."

To make the program effective, women get up 15 minutes earlier than normal in the morning and go over the 13 statements. They think about each one individually and pick one to use continuously throughout the day.

In the evening, they review the use of the statement that day and what effects it had on themselves and their actions.

Within a WFS group, members discover the commonality of their problem, they make new friends in a surrounding where they are neither criticized or judged, Kirkpatrick said.

The groups are lead by certified moderators, trained so they know the WFS program thoroughly.

"Alcoholics need lifelong support for their recovery," Kirkpatrick said. "And a self-help group becomes a surrogate family for the alcoholic."

## Group finds its niche in area

The Detroit metropolitan area has been a mainstay for Women for Sobriety since the program started in the 1970s.

There are eight WFS groups and 17 certified moderators in the area, offering support group meetings in the afternoon and evenings Monday through Saturday.

Locally, WFS groups meet:

## Praise the Lord Chaplain brings God to work

Father Mulcahy didn't look like this. But the woman in the blue blouse, black skirt and silver heels is most certainly a chaplain.

And one in a rather unusual place at that — an automotive factory.

Nonetheless, Maybeline Evans fits right in among the din of the machinery at the General Motors Inland Plant in Livonia. She worked there as a sewing machine operator for a number of years until she was laid off.

Still, nearly every morning she can be found at the plant reaching out to those behind the machines who need someone to listen.

"They know me strictly as love," said Evans, in a Southern purr that reveals her South Carolina roots.

Perhaps not everyone knows her as love at the GM plant. But they do know this ordained minister-turned-autoworker-turned-chaplain.

As one shift lets out for lunch, many passers-by wave and say hello. One worker shouts a greeting, "Hey beautiful." Evans feigns a blush and gives an "awe shucks" gesture with her hand.

Chances are the workers have heard the stories of Evans in her 13 years as the unofficial official chaplain at the plant.

Like the times she has taken women into her home when they were having marital problems. Then there was the woman Evans bailed out of jail.

THE WOMAN was arrested after continually trying to enter the plant without a legal ID badge. She worked at the plant, but was to retire. Plans were to put her into Northville Regional Psychiatric Hospital until Evans intervened.

"She's doing fine today," Evans said. "She's at home working in her garden."

Most of the problems she hears are familiar ones, especially those that come with working in a cyclical industry where job security hinges on every quarterly car sales report.

"I see so much hurt," Evans said. "They may have built their lifestyle

with these types of wages . . . Now they're facing taking a \$5 an hour job."

"If you look at it, these people are facing insecurity every day because they're always facing layoff. They have mortgage on a home. They have children in college and they don't know what to do."

Evans knows how they feel because she's been there.

Her job as a sewing machine operator has been outsourced to Canada and Mexico. Bits of her personal background come out during her recitation of history.

Like, for instance, she slips in that she's been married and divorced from the same man four times "because I don't believe in divorce." Even so, there's no chance for reconciliation this time, she added.

Evans also relates how she tried to overdose on tranquilizers "two or three times."

"I had no desire to live," she said, recalling those times around her first divorce. "My husband was my god. Today, I know the God who created me in a personal and intimate way. Christ is my life."

FROM THE time she was 10, Evans said she wanted to do missionary work. She grew up in Johnsonville,

S.C., where her father was a Methodist minister.

Evans attended Free Will Baptist Bible College in Nashville, Tenn., and earned a bachelor's degree from Grace Christian College in Texas.

Evans and her spouse were a husband-wife ministerial team for a number of years. They owned and operated a non-denominational church in the Norwayne area of Westland and sold it eight years ago.

During that time, Evans also worked at the GM Inland plant where she was instrumental in starting the first chapel in a U.S. auto plant. The chapel was dedicated two years ago. Evans proudly shows the color photos from the occasion.

In addition to counseling other employees, Evans puts displays for holidays in the employee entrance area. She estimates spending \$7,000 a year out of her pocket for materials, decorations and food for needy families.

But Evans believes it's a small price to pay for what she considers a miracle. Management, seeing the benefits of having chaplain, has been very cooperative.

"They have given me so much freedom," she said. "God has opened the doors for me. It's miracle that a chapel can be open 24 hours a day to people in an automobile plant."

Her work is strictly non-denominational.

"I cater to everybody," she said. "I work with all faiths. I cannot con-

demn a Jehovah's Witness. I cannot condemn a Catholic. I cannot condemn anyone."

HER DAILY routine usually consists of getting up at 4:30 a.m. when she prays and jumps rope 200 times "so I can keep my shape." She goes to the plant at 7 a.m. and usually doesn't leave until 5 p.m.

Because Evans is laid off, she works through a job bank. She volunteers at the American Cancer Society.

When walking through the plant, Evans can tell who needs her help.

"That's the gift of the holy spirit," she said. "The other day I saw this woman. I could tell she had been crying. Her husband hadn't come home. I didn't have to say much. I just put my arm around her hugged her and told her, 'Honey, I've been there, too.'"

Evans said she gets calls at home from people having marital problems. She knows only too well how the stress of working in an auto factory often find its way into the home.

If the parents have problems, Evans worries about their children. Her goal is to have a prime-time television show for children.

"People go to their place of worship," she said. "Can they live it when they come to the work place on Monday?"

"Christ in us is our hope and glory."

"The bottom line is that coupled with a physical disorder, they have a poor feeling about themselves," she said. "What they need to do is correct the later and that's what the program does. It makes them stronger women by using practical ways to change their self-image."

Kirkpatrick is amazed at WFS' staying power. In fact, she thinks the group has been "lucky" to survive and flourish.

"The progress has been slower than I would have liked, but we have a program and that's a good omen."

WFA DIFFERS from AA in that its members are urged to reveal their names. It's not a prerequisite, but Kirkpatrick feels it's important.

"If you can't accept alcoholism and reveal yourself, how can you expect people to accept you for what you are," she said. "If you can't reveal your name, you're acting as if you have something to hide or be ashamed of."

"It's really necessary for the public good to stand up and be counted because we're not morally corrupt, we're physically ill."

Kirkpatrick would like to see WFS as well-known and as big as AA, so that women can make a choice. She would like to see women have every opportunity to know about WFS.

"After all, it's her ultimate choice as to how she wants to continue her recovery," she said. "It's wonderful to see women who can take control of their lives and have the power to do that."

# State offers list of child care centers

When searching for the right child-care alternative for your needs, a good starting point is the Michigan Department of Social Services.

I recently called their local number for day-care licensing and found that they will send out listings of licensed child-care facilities for specified areas, as well as the names and numbers of licensed private homes. I asked for a list of such facilities in the Birmingham-Bloomfield area.

By the next day, I received a seven-page computer printout of child-care facilities in those areas. The

helpful printout includes such information as the age range, hours and days of operation, months of operation and capacity. Phone numbers and complete addresses are also provided. Prices are not listed.

Note, however, that while many centers list programs for infants/toddlers between the ages of two weeks and two-and-a-half years, this is merely an indication that they are licensed for that age group.

In reality, few centers accept in-

fantants under six weeks of age, and many take them only at 12 months.

The agency also sent an alphabetized listing of registered day-care homes in Birmingham and Bloomfield Hills. The listing includes last name and phone number alone, but is also a good starting point if child

care in a private home is your preference.

The number to call for Oakland County is 858-1612. For Wayne County, call 256-3814. Be sure to state the specific city or cities for which you seek information. Consider asking for information in neighboring communities, especially those on your way to work.

# Christian unity marks service

Sunday worship services took on a slightly different form recently at the Canton Free Methodist Church.

A service of Christian unity was held at the church the evening of Sunday, April 16. Clergymen and members from a number of Canton churches participated in the ecumenical worship service.

"I thought it was very inspirational," said the Rev. Kerry Hettinger, pastor at the Canton Free Methodist Church.

This is the fourth year such a service has been offered by Canton churches. Each year's service gives worshippers a chance to learn about traditions and practices within different Christian churches.

"I think it's outstanding," Hettinger said. "We all are part of the body of Christ. To deny that is to hinder the work of Christ."

IN THE EARLY 1980s, Canton clergy representatives met for a dawn service held during the Canton Country Festival. Those services

weren't well-attended, so participants decided an evening service would be better.

"Sunday is a day of dedication to God," Hettinger said. "Sunday evening is a way of ending it in worship."

Hettinger was impressed with the spirit of unity among clergy and laypeople found at the Sunday, April 16, service.

Within his own church, worshippers believe the altar of God exists within their hearts. That belief doesn't preclude exercising free use of the altar in the sanctuary during worship services.

During the service, some worshippers came to the altar for a time of intercessory prayer.

"It's a time to present concerns, burdens and also praises to God," Hettinger said. Within some Free Methodist churches, worshippers leave notes at the altar rail.

Each year's service includes some tradition common within the host church. Other Canton churches participating in the service were: St. John Neumann Catholic Church;

Cherry Hill United Methodist Church; St. Thomas A Becket Catholic Church; St. Michael Lutheran Church; Geneva Presbyterian Church; Christ Community Church (Reformed); Faith Community Church; and the First Baptist Church of Canton.

EACH YEAR'S ecumenical service is hosted by a different Canton church; the message is given by the clergy representative who will host the next year's service.

The evening service Sunday, April 16, included prayers, hymns and readings. A choir including members from different churches sang, and an offering was taken to support the work of the Salvation Army.

The message was given by the Rev. Kenneth Gruebel, pastor at Geneva Presbyterian Church in Canton.

Gruebel told worshippers that caring costs, in emotional involvement and in financial resources, "and it sometimes costs in the criticism of others."

Gruebel held up the log book kept by clergy representatives who pro-

vide emergency chaplain service at Oakwood Canton Health Center. Those clergymen face the pain of people who've lost loved ones; heart attacks, strokes, accidents and suicides take their toll on many.

"I am here to remind you of the lonely widows who cry themselves to sleep," Gruebel said.

Cancer patients, people going through divorce, unemployed neighbors, depressed people and others have needs; Gruebel reminded worshippers "of those who go to bed hungry not in Appalachia but in Canton Township. I am here tonight simply to say caring costs. And it opens us up to all kinds of criticism."

Christians come from different traditions; their beliefs and practices will continue to divide them.

"We are different and maybe that's not all bad," Gruebel said. A spirit of caring is what brings Christians together.

"This is what it means to be a Christian at its very best. This is what it's all about," he said. "It's in caring that you will know that your life has counted, whatever the cost."

# The sea remains a mystery to us

"Forty-seven sailors killed at sea. The battleship USS Iowa returning to home port following explosion in No. 2 gun turret. Cause of accident being investigated."

It was an announcement that stunned a nation.

It was the second tragedy at sea in recent weeks. A fire aboard a Soviet submarine had been the cause of her sinking in the Norwegian Sea. The number of Russian sailors killed in the accident was slightly more than the number of American sailors killed aboard the USS Iowa.

The total number of dead from these two tragedies does not change much; the cumulative number of dead the sea has received in its years of life. Uncounted numbers of men, women and children have been received by the sea for their place of final rest.

It is likely that the cause of all their deaths is no better understood than the cause of 47 sailors being killed aboard the USS Iowa. We can describe what happened, but we seldom know why.

In the stories of life that shape and form our myths, in the stories that

give thought and description to our origin and purpose, the sea is the ultimate mystery.

THE SEA is more than anything that mankind can not control or bring to submission. The myths of creation and life know that only a power beyond human power can "bade the mighty ocean its own appointed limits keep . . . bid its angry tumult cease."

And there is more. In the Psalms of the Judeo-Christian heritage, as in writings of other religions, the sea is the home of Leviathan, the serpent of the deep. Leviathan is the enemy of life, the adversary of God.

William Whiting speaks of the deepest yearning of humanity's soul when he concludes each verse of his hymn with "oh, hear us when we cry to thee for those in peril on the sea."

No reports of the accidents that killed our young men aboard the USS Iowa or the Russian submarine suggest that they were killed by the expansive power of the sea or any monster from the deep.

A flawed design, malfunctioning equipment, human error — in the end, a judgment will be made on the evidence gathered and the accidents will be joined to those who fill the sea with our loved ones.

We may not know what caused the fire aboard the submarine nor the explosion aboard the USS Iowa, but in a larger sense, we do know. It is what happens when people and nations determine to engage one another in mortal conflict. It is what happens when we conclude that one shall rule another.

HUMANITY'S earliest days of life are not lived in the sea, but in the very process of birth, we live it out. We learn how to breathe, how to walk, to talk, to live together in community.

No official report will conclude Leviathan as the cause of the accidents that killed the American and Russian sailors at sea. But until we become more intentional and deliberate in learning how to live in community, how to talk together in peace, how to walk together in peace, there will be more tragedies at sea.

The cost of our failure to do so is too high. The lives of young men and women are too precious to give them as offerings to the demons of the deep.

"Oh, hear us when we cry to thee, for those in peril on the sea."

# Responsibility shared in protecting food sources

Q. You've referred to many government agencies that play different roles in protecting and/or regulating our food. Can you describe these agencies and their roles? Thank you.

A. The responsibility for protecting our food through monitoring, regulating the origin, quality, composition, safety, weight, labeling, packaging, marketing and distributing is shared equally by local, state and federal agencies.

The following is a short description of the major agencies and their relationship to each other.

## U.S. DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE (USDA):

Through inspection and grading, the USDA enforces standards for the wholesomeness and quality of meat, poultry and eggs produced in the U.S. They are involved in nutrition research and in educating the public about how to choose and cook foods.

The USDA food safety activities include inspecting poultry, eggs and domestic and imported meats; inspecting livestock and production plants; and making grading (quality) inspections for grains, fruits, vegetables, meat, poultry and dairy products.

## FOOD AND DRUG ADMINISTRATION (FDA):

The FDA is responsible for ensuring the safety and wholesomeness of all food sold in interstate commerce,

except meat, poultry and dairy products, which are under the USDA's jurisdiction.

The FDA develops standards for the composition, quality, nutrition and safety of foods including food and color additives. It sets standards for certain foods and enforces federal regulations on labeling, additives, food sanitation and food safety.

The FDA also inspects food plants, imported food products and feed mills that make feeds containing medications or nutritional supplements for animals intended for use as human food.

The FDA is part of the Department of Health and Human Services Public Health Service.

## NATIONAL MARINE FISHERIES SERVICE (NMFS):

As part of the Department of Commerce, the NMFS is responsible

for seafood quality and identification. They sponsor a voluntary inspection program for fish products.

## BUREAU OF ALCOHOL, TOBACCO AND FIREARMS (ATF):

ATF is an agency of the Department of the Treasury. It enforces the laws that cover the production, distribution and labeling of alcoholic beverages, except wine beverages containing less than seven percent alcohol, which are the FDA's responsibility.

## CENTER FOR DISEASE CONTROL (CDC):

Also a branch of the Department of Health and Human Services, CDC is the protector of food safety, including responding to emergencies when food-borne diseases are a factor.

The CDC surveys and studies environmental health problems and administers national programs for prevention and control of certain diseases.

## ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION AGENCY (EPA):

In the area of food, the EPA regulates pesticides. It determines the safety of new pesticides, sets tolerance levels for pesticide residue in foods, which the FDA enforces, and it publishes directions for the safe use of pesticides.

The EPA also establishes water quality standards which are used by the FDA to regulate bottled water sold in interstate commerce for human use.

## FEDERAL TRADE COMMISSION (FTC):

The FTC's Bureau of Consumer Protection is responsible for the regulation of advertising of foods.

## STATE AND LOCAL GOVERNMENTS:

State and local government agen-

cies cooperate with the federal government to insure the quality and safety of foods produced within their borders.

State agencies inspect restaurants, retail food establishments, dairies, mills and other food establishments.

Each state "owns" the fishing waters within its jurisdiction which gives them authority over fish, including shellfish, taken from those waters.

## FOREIGN GOVERNMENTS:

At least 40 nations are partners with the U.S. in ensuring food safety through a memoranda of understanding that covers over two food products.

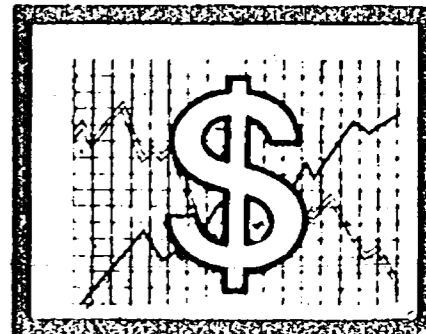

## Marketing firm has designs on diversity

For the most part, the client roster of the Livonia-based Richardson Media Design is what you would expect from a marketing communications and creative services firm.

There's the National Bank of Detroit, the Hotel Pontchartrains, the Arthur Andersons and the Elliott's Floral Designs.

But as you run down the list, you come across some rather non-corporate sounding names. Who are Tracy Lee & the Leonards? Or the Chenille Sisters?

They're a couple of the musical groups who've had their album covers or promotional posters done by Richardson Media Design. That might seem unusual for a company whose bread and butter is the conservative corporate world.

Then again, what do you expect from a company whose pipe-smoking founder and chief executive officer has a guitar and small amplifier sitting in his office?

"I think there's a creative connection," said John Richardson, who plays guitar in a band called The Desert Water Bags. "We find that we can communicate with musicians."

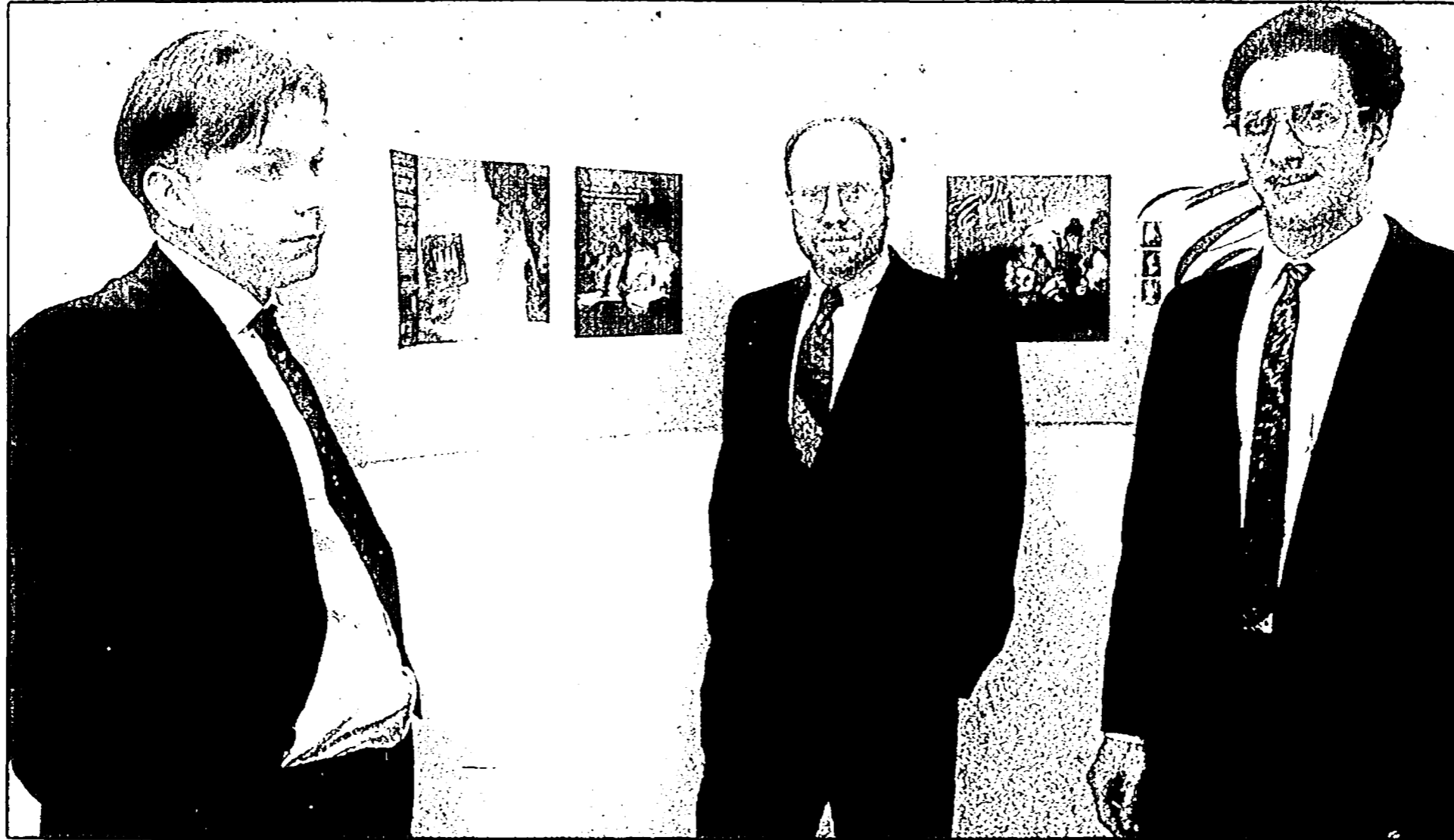
THE COMPANY'S entertainment base is an all-star lineup of Detroit-area musicians. The late J.C. Heard, Mark Braun (Mr. B), Dick Siegel, along with the Chenille Sisters and Tracy Lee and the Leonards, are clients.

So is Ann Arbor-based Prism Productions and the University of Michigan Office of Major Events, which promote concerts in the area.

Media designer and musician make for great partners in creativity — not financial gain.

"In order to survive in this business, you're not going to do it working with musicians," Richardson said. "We work with musicians because we like to do it."

"It's great for us because we get to make a much stronger statement.

It allows us to stretch and stay fresh."

Along the musical route, Richardson Media Design has been honored for excellence in typographic design for its Von Leopold poster by the Type Directors Club of New York, which has been holding annual international competitions for 35 years.

Media design and music have been Richardson's two best friends. After receiving a master's degree in philosophy from the University of Toronto, he started a music magazine in Ann Arbor where he also played guitar in area bands.

Detroit Music Times was part-professional journal, part fanzine. The magazine didn't last long, but the

friendships and connections Richardson made in the music field have.

BUT IT WAS BASEBALL, not music, that provided Richardson the right pitch for his big break. As president and co-founder of Local Color Productions, he designed a poster for the 1984 Detroit Tiger season.

At first, the print was designed as a promotional device. Bounded by the Tigers' pennant drive and the design of the print, which featured a light from the heavens shining on Tiger Stadium, sales skyrocketed.

The print sold for \$20 in poster galleries, but cost approximately \$1 to make. With 20,000 copies printed, sales of the poster provided Richard-

son with the capital to start his own business in 1985.

"It was one of those lucky things," he said.

Richardson was in touch with Mike Griffin, with whom he worked at the Detroit Music Times. Griffin is now senior vice president and creative director at Richardson Media Design. He was also founder and president of Brainstorm Design,

which later merged with Richardson Media Design in 1987. Griffin designed the award-winning Von Leopold poster to promote the 1987 release of Von Leopold's compact disc.

In the merger with Brainstorm, Louis King also joined the company. King is president and chief operating officer of Richardson.

The Richardson staff has grown to

nine. And everyone including the office receptionist participates in the creative process, according to Richardson.

ALL OF WHICH he believes helps keep Richardson Media Design at the forefront in a very competitive industry.

The company provides consulting, advertising, design and public relations services to clients. Along with the entertainment, the group works with those clients in high-tech and financial services.

"When a client asks for something, we want to surprise them," Richardson said. "If a client wants a blue, round object that is six inches in diameter, we say OK. We'll see you in two weeks."

"If we come back in two weeks with a blue, round object that is six inches in diameter, the customer is disappointed. They think, 'Heck, I could have done that.' We show them something completely different."

Richardson Media Design plans to continue to keep a diversified client base. The music side will continue to have a place with the corporate work.

Although their work has primarily been with independent record labels, Richardson said he would eventually like to work with a major label with an artist. He is hopeful the company will eventually expand into other media such as television commercial work.

Whatever the medium or whoever the client, the goal is pretty much the same.

"When you cut to the bone, there's really nothing separating from something being good for a musician and something being good for a corporation," Griffin said. "If the idea communicates the message that it's intended to communicate, then it's worthwhile."

## Managing growth key to long-term success

Achieving growth is something every entrepreneur strives for. As companies attempt to get bigger, there is a natural assumption that they will also get better.

But the process of working toward growth has spelled doom for thousands of businesses.

Statistics show that last year, more than 57,000 businesses failed. More than half of these were in operation for more than five years, pointing to mismanaged growth rather than business start-up problems. Joseph W. Duncan, Dun and Bradstreet's chief statistician, believes overexpansion or overly ambitious plans play a major role in three of every four business failures.

So how do business owners manage growth before it becomes a monster? Jeffrey Caponigro, executive vice president with Casey Communications Management, was charged with that task. Since joining the Southfield-based public relations company in late 1984, Caponigro was part of a five-person operation focused on expansion.

"Sooner or later, a business has to decide how small it wants to remain or how large it aspires to be," Caponigro said. As an example, he told how Casey's acquisition by Shandwick plc, a British public relations company, "allowed us to reach clients around the globe while maintaining our autonomy here in the Detroit market."

For smaller businesses that may have ignored growth opportunities for fear of failure, Caponigro stresses the importance of where the company wants to be as an organization and then following through on the right opportunities at the right time. He also suggests to prepare for unexpected calamities such as economic downturns.

"There are several contradictions that face any growth-oriented company such as becoming too depend-

ent on its business plan and then missing out on opportunities that require it to quickly change directions. On the other hand, spending too much money too soon can leave a company over-leveraged if the environment turns sour."

For Caponigro, the need to hire, train and evaluate large numbers of employees at the same time represented his greatest challenge.

"There wasn't any doubt that we needed good quality people to meet the growing demand for our services, but we also had to develop a strong system so we wouldn't lose them as time passed. We spent many hours designing policy handbooks, training seminars and evaluation procedures, all of which were crucial to our professional development effort."

Caponigro will discuss his experiences as a growth strategist and counselor to business as part of the daylong Professional Communicator's Business Conference Saturday, May 6, at Oakland University. His luncheon speech is called "Working Toward Growth . . . and Handling the Monster Once it Arrives." Conference topics include presentation planning, legal requirements for starting a business, client-oriented financial relationships, marketing communications, desktop publishing, special events and working with the media.

# Product must always be improving

"The product must satisfy customers — what they want is what they'll get."

As stated by E. Jerome McCarthy in his book, "Basic Marketing," developing the right product isn't easy, because customer needs and attitudes are constantly changing.

Before developing a product for sale or distribution, there must be a clear understanding as to what is meant by the word product. For example, how would you describe a new automobile?

WOULD IT be adequately defined as a certain number of "nuts, bolts, some sheet metal, an engine and four wheels?" And if someone is offering package, delivery services, are they selling a specific amount of

driver fatigue or wear and tear on the vehicle?

Of course not.

Rather, a product means the needs-satisfying offering of a business. In the case of a new car, all the customer asks is that the car runs efficiently, works well and looks good.

They aren't generally interested in the production process or in how many component parts the vehicle has. In the same sense, customers of a delivery service don't care how much out of the way a driver has to go or where he or she has been.

THEY JUST want their package picked up and delivered.

The idea of a product as potential

customer benefits is very important.

A product is more than just a physical good with its related features. It includes "accessories, installation, instruction on use, the package, perhaps a brand name which fills some psychological needs, a warranty, and confidence that service will be available after the purchase if it is needed," McCarthy said.

And when product takes the form of a specific service, customer satisfaction remains a top priority.

JUST AS we have life cycles as human beings, so do products. All products go through their related product life cycles, which represent the stages a new product goes through from the time it is first introduced to customers to the time it "dies" and is replaced by newer and

more advanced products.

The total length of a given product life cycle may be as short as 60-90 days (in the case of the Hula Hoop) to 90 years (automobiles). In general, though, product life cycles are getting shorter.

The increasing shortness of product life cycles suggests that entrepreneurs keep developing new products continuously. Next week, we will discuss the process involved in capitalizing on each of the life cycle stages of a new product to maximize customer satisfaction and company profitability.

"That's the most critical time in a business start-up," he said. "That's the time people need the information on what kind of computer they need, what kind of vehicle. We give them information on computers, legislation. We try to cover the whole spectrum of small business ownership." A "small" business is generally defined as one that employs up to 100 people.

Entrepreneur features standing columns by former pro football player Fran Tarkenton, who now runs an Atlanta management consulting firm, and Mark H. McCormack, author of "What They Don't Teach You at Harvard Business School." The May issue's cover story is a report on high-tech office equipment.

GM's acquisition of Hughes Aircraft, EDS Corp. and a smattering of artificial intelligence, robotics and other high-tech companies had loftier goals.

The doodad that was supposed to accomplish this is called the Etak navigator, a kind of miniature television set mounted on a stalk that displayed a tiny triangle, representing me and the Olds 88 I was driving, superimposed on a map of greater Los Angeles. As I drove, the map scrolled under the tiny triangle and the position of the car on the map changed.

IT WAS a fascinating concept, originally developed by a former sailboat racer who was having a tough time finding his marina. GM has high hopes for the Etak system, which already is in the hands of a few police departments and florists.

The actual navigation comes from a computer that records distance and the angle you turn the wheel, moving the display to account for

every gyration of the car with uncanny accuracy. I was so absorbed in watching the tiny triangle move over the map it took a couple of polite taps on the horn of the Datsun I was running off the road to make me return my attention to where I was going.

The maps themselves were contained in a series of tape cassettes that had to be loaded into the machine as you crossed a particular territory. They don't sound like much on the radio, I discovered.

BUT ONCE the map was inserted, the little triangle dutifully recorded my aimless circling to find the Ventura freeway, and even a side trip into a McDonald's parking lot to get some chicken McNuggets. Cross

street names on overpasses mainly coincided with the street names on the Etak map as I rolled along.

As it turned out, the Pacific Ocean showed up pretty much when the little triangle predicted it would, just as I was getting used to watching the little TV screen.

I was elated, feeling as if I'd experienced the future of the automobile and some of the conveniences that await the commuter of the brave new world.

Now I figure I'm ready to try one of those new little records with the big holes in the middle.

# Variable annuity insurance meets some needs well

Part II

Last week, we discussed several life insurance settlement options. Today we will deal with variable annuity options.

One of the major limitations of fixed annuity option is that it is, in effect, a savings account that earns a fixed interest rate for a specified period. Consequently, it does not provide a good hedge against inflation.

An alternative to fixed annuity is the variable annuity option. Simply stated, a variable annuity is a family of mutual funds within an annuity contract. Under this option, the insurance company offers an assort-

ment of stock, bond and money market funds and puts the responsibility of choosing between them squarely on the shoulders of the policyholder.

Variable annuity contract values fluctuate with the fund's value. When annuitized, the annual payouts also vary with the portfolio's performance.

For a mortality and risk-free 0.8 percent to 1.4 percent of assets, most variable annuities provide a guaranteed death benefit (if death precedes annuitization) of the greater of the total purchase payments, less any withdrawals, or the value of the account.

The fee also guarantees that annu-

ity payments will not be decreased should the insurance company incur adverse mortality experiences or increases in administrative costs.

Money left with insurance company

The final option for the benefici-

ary is to leave the money at a stipulated rate of interest with the insurance company, which acts as a trustee. The interest rate offered by the company may vary, depending upon the prevailing market conditions.

However, the guaranteed minimum interest rate paid is always ap-

proximately 4 percent. This option is the least attractive and is generally not preferred by most policy holders.

## Low-cost plan cuts broker commissions

Is it possible to acquire shares in a sizable number of companies and add to the investment every month without paying commissions? I've heard it's possible to invest just \$25 a month, but when I talked to a broker, he said it would be best to wait until I had \$2,000 and then come back and see him.

Let me answer your letter by describing an actual case that one reader told be about. This reader said he decided he would like to invest \$25 a month.

Rather than do it by himself, he got some friends together and formed an investment club. He could have done the same thing on his own. By March of 1988, they had met several times and decided how they would proceed. They decided to use the low-cost investment plan available through the National Association of Investors. More than 40 corporations make their stock available through that plan on an installment basis and pay most of the costs. They decided to begin with an investment in 12 companies as shown in Table I.

Note that they bought just one and a fraction shares of each stock. They owned shares in 12 corporations for

just \$580. They did have a service charge of \$5 per company, or \$60, to open the accounts.

Through the rest of 1988, the 16 people invested \$25 a month, and each month bought additional shares in one of the companies. As the end of 1988, their holdings were as shown in Table II.

They have paid \$7,564 of assets after just nine months of investing. They have paid just \$60 in costs for all those transactions.

The program is open only to members of the National Association of Investors Corp. Annual membership for individuals is \$30.



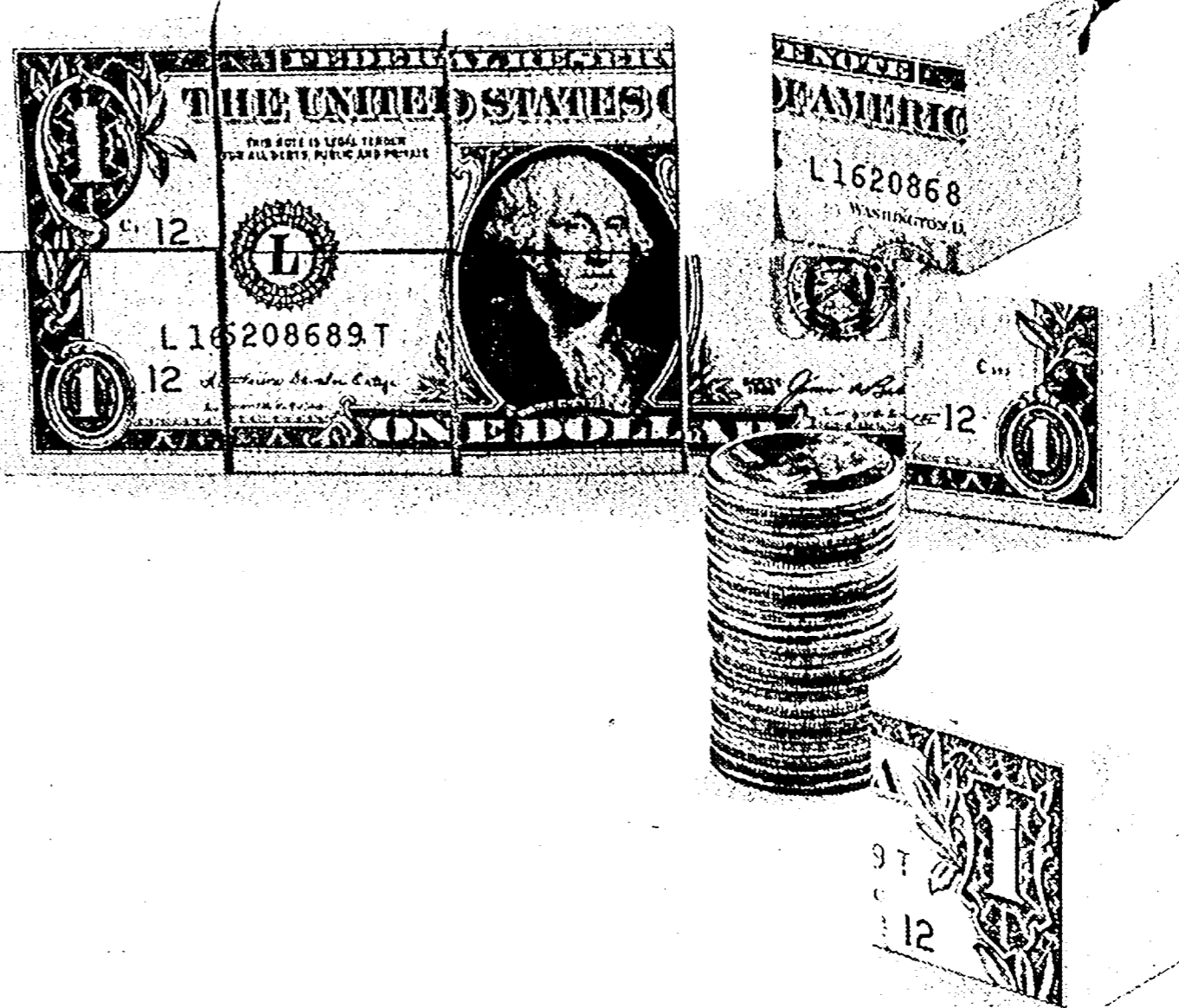

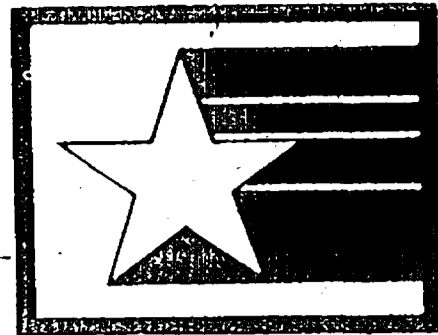

## What's-his-name makes Firehouse fun

He's called Ed Who. Ed Whatjamacallit and Ed Fromohio. Compared to his fellow Firehouse mates, guitarist Ed Crawford is quite an unknown entity.

So smack them upside the head with your American Express card or something. Tell 'em who you are, Edward.

"My dad was the music director at our high school," said Crawford, introducing us to his family.

"He's probably a little baffled by it all. I can tell he's not too sure what's going on. He offers suggestions like, 'Why don't you use your picture on the cover of your album?'"

If Firehouse did, people would point to the easily recognizable faces of George Hurley and Mike Watt and then say, "Who's he?" But without Crawford, the Firehouse would have never unrolled into one of the most enjoyable minimalist bands on the circuit.

Hurley and Watt were two-thirds of the famed punk outfit, The Minutemen. A van accident killed the group's lead singer, D. Boon, and The Minutemen went into permanent mourning.

Enter Ed Crawford, a big fan of The Minutemen from Toronto, Ohio.

Hurley to give it a second try under the name Firehouse. With that, the band went into the studio and recorded "Fromohio" (SST Records).

Though he's a new face, Crawford fits right in. He sounds much like Watt and Hurley when discussing the music they play, which has been described as punk, though the latest album has a rural feel to it, at times.

"I have a hard time dealing with that handle (punk)," said Crawford, who attended Ohio State University.

"I think we share the spirit but music has nothing to do with it. Punk is not a particular genre of music... it's an attitude more than anything."

**AN ATTITUDE** that — for the exception of a few groups like Sonic Youth and Firehouse — appears to have dried up. In Firehouse's case, a fusion of jazz, blues and funk takes place on stage. Their

## Tension builds up in Farmington Players production

Suppose the FBI asked to use your home as a surveillance post to observe your best friends across the street? They don't give you many de-

tails. It's top secret. But your government needs your help. And they're very persuasive. Would you agree? If it develops that your friends are involved in some shady activity, how would you feel about betraying their trust?

The Farmington Players successfully explores these and many more thought-provoking questions in its production of Hugh Whitmore's domestic melodrama "Pack of Lies."

At times, one might wish for acting with a more natural quality. But generally, director Bill Salisbury's

### review

cast creates and sustains a tension that evolves from a family facing the moral and emotional dilemma of trying to continue a friendship, while at the same time allowing the authorities to observe their friends' every move.

"Pack of Lies" is based on an actual 1960s' cold-war spy case, in-

volving the sale of NATO secrets to the KGB. The characters have been changed, but one essential element remains the same. Scotland Yard asks a family (the Jacksons) to help them collect information about their friends (the Krogers).

MUCH OF THE opening, cheery conversation designed to establish the friendship between the Jacksons and Krogers is a bit forced. But once the plot begins to unfold, the characters seem to ring true.

Ralph Rosati turns in a stellar

performance as Bob Jackson, an ordinary London suburbanite — caught between his duty as husband and father and his patriotic obligations to his country.

Helen Jackson is played by Jan Salisbury. Although a little stagey at times, she is quite convincing as a happy homemaker who slowly breaks down because she cannot cope with the deception and the ever-increasing demands of the authorities.

Judie Rosati scores as the energetic and earthy Mrs. Kroger. Lucien

Chocron, on the other hand, plays Mr. Kroger quite effectively as a laid-back type.

Michael Megerian looks and sounds perfect as the British intelligence agent, Stewart. One wishes, however, that there was a more manipulative side to his character — something in his speech or mannerisms that indicate he, too, is willing to deceive quite ordinary citizens in order to achieve his goals.

## Spartans reign at Lady Chiefs event

Livonia Stevenson was prepared for adversity Saturday in the annual Lady Chiefs Relays at Plymouth Canton.

Ironically, the anticipation of such might have helped the Spartans overcome another setback early in the meet and eventually win the 15-team, 14-event competition.

Stevenson was minus nearly a dozen athletes, including its top sprinter, middle-distance runner and long-distance specialist, who had gone to Boston with the school choir.

"Things couldn't have worked out much better," coach Paul Holmberg said. "I told the team afterward 'The kids who weren't here today won't know the joy of winning this meet. They'll have memories of the choir trip to Boston, but they won't have the memories you do of this meet.'"

The Spartans, who were expected to battle Farmington for first place and edged the runner-up Falcons by two points, faced adversity again when the shuttle hurdle team was disqualified after one of its members started too early.

IN AN EVENT Stevenson was counting on doing well, the Spartans were stunned to come away with nothing.

"It was the second running event, so the meet was just getting started," Holmberg said. "Those were some big points we lost. When you're expected to be in the top three and get no points, that's a big setback."

Holmberg was impressed at how quickly the Stevenson athletes recovered from that disappointment, refusing to let it affect their performance in other events.

In the next one — the 800-meter relay — the Spartans finished third while Farmington, which is strongest in the sprint relays, won the race.

"Two (Diane Sherwood and Lisa Christensen) came off the shuttle hurdles, and I think they ran with a little more determination than some others (on opposing teams)," Holmberg said. "It seemed to make those two kids run harder and better."

"We're not really known for our sprinters, but we had some girls who ran well and had good relays," he added. Stevenson was fourth in the sprint medley relay, also.

THE SPARTANS later showed their hurdling skill by winning the 300-meter relay. Christensen, who

had the best individual time of 48.1, Sherwood, Dana Carlan and Teresa Sarno comprised the unit.

Stevenson also excelled in the throwing events, taking first place in the discus and shot put and setting meet records in both. The Spartans had totals of 291-1 in the discus and 94-9 in the shot put.

Jessann Martin had her second-best throw of 113-10 1/2 in the discus, and Debbie Wroblewski and Krista Sachs had career bests in both events.

In addition to the throwers and hurdlers, Jeanne Magoulick and Suzanne Moore were Stevenson standouts, according to Holmberg, who said Moore's assignment might have been the most grueling of all. She ran a leg of the eight-mile relay, participated in the 3,200 relay and did the mile as part of the distance medley.

"We asked some kids to do some things they hadn't done before," Holmberg said, "and some to do more than we had the right to ask of them in terms of the number of events."

Others who contributed under demanding circumstances were Carrie Creehan, Nicole Todd, Carlan, Jennifer Pfander, Jennifer Knapp and Becky Adamczyk.

PFANDER HADN'T practiced in a week due to injury, but she took the Spartans from seventh place to third in the 3,200 relay on a gimpy leg, Holmberg said. Adamczyk's event is the 100 dash, but she led off the sprint medley with a 65-second quarter mile.

Without the benefit of an outstanding jumper, the Spartans took third in the long jump through the combined efforts of "three kids who had respectable jumps," Holmberg said. Sherry Jahns, Sarno and Sherwood jumped in the 13- to 14-foot range.

"Two (Jahns and Sarno) had come down from the high jump where we had just bombed out," Holmberg said. "That's another case where we could have tucked out tails."

"Instead of pouting about it, they went down and turned in a real respectable performance in the long jump. That's the kind of thing that happened all day. We turned around and made it happen somewhere else."

# Trout opener another sign of spring

**D**IG OUT your dry files and waders and join the celebration. Trout season opens this weekend.

Thousands of anglers will line the shores of Michigan streams and creeks Saturday for the opening of trout season on trout streams and designated trout lakes.

For the avid trout fisherman, the arrival of opening day is a spring ritual.

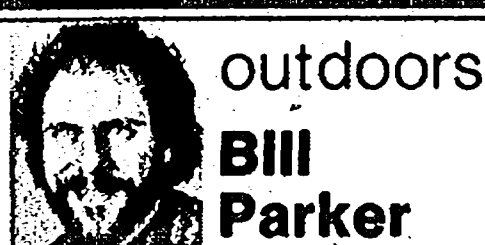
"I like to fish trout. I haven't missed an opener in 40 years," said Livonia's Herb Boldt. "But another nice thing about (trout opener) is that it's a sign of spring. There are several signs of spring; there's the Tigers' training camp and the proverbial first sighting of a robin. But for me, I know it's spring when the opening day of trout season arrives."

**THIS OPENING DAY** will be a special one for Boldt, who will be crowned National Trout King at the National Trout Festival in Kalkaska.

"It's mainly a fun thing," explained Boldt, a retired executive sports editor at the Detroit News and an outdoor writer for the Associated Press for the last two years. "They've held a festival in Kalkaska to mark the opening of trout season for 53 years. They have a parade, and a media dinner on Friday night when I'll get the robe and crown."

Bolt will join the ranks of some pretty notable past National Trout Kings such as Mort Neff, Dave Richey, Tom Opre and last year's King, Bob Garner.

So where will the Trout King fish on opening day? "On opening day I don't like the big streams, they're just too crowded. I'll sneak away and find a couple little streams tucked away somewhere," Boldt said. "I've got a couple in mind."

**LOCALLY, ANGLERS** have several streams to choose from when selecting an opening day niche.

Paint Creek, which begins in Lake Orion and connects with the Clinton River in downtown Rochester, is traditionally the hottest stream in southeastern Michigan. But Ron Spittler, DNR fisheries biologist at the Pontiac District office, feels the Huron River at Proud Lake will be the hot spot, come Saturday morning.

"It's going to be nuts over there beginning at midnight Friday," explained Spittler. "(In late March) we stocked some nice 14-16-inchers over there and it's been strictly catch-and-release since April 1. It's going to be jam-packed with fishermen."

**SEVERAL OTHER** southeastern Michigan streams are stocked annually and should produce trout. They include the Clinton River, which runs east from Pontiac to Lake St. Clair; East Mill Pond Creek, which runs east and west, north of Romeo, and connects with the Clinton at 32 Mile RD.; Kearsley Creek, north of Lake Louise in Ortonville; and Stony Creek Stream south from Lakeville Lake to Stony Creek Metropark.

"All the waters and streams we stock will be

stocked by the weekend," Spittler said. "But what people don't realize is that we don't stock catchable size fish."

"The best thing people could do to help us and the fish would be to get away from the bridges where they are stocked at. These smaller fish tend to stay near the bridges for a while. The best thing people could do is to fish the holes at least a quarter-mile away from the bridges and work the larger fish left over from last year."

The newly stocked fish should reach the legal keeping size of eight inches by midsummer, although most anglers release these smaller fish.

**TROUT FISHING** isn't the only activity awaiting outdoor enthusiasts this weekend. Walleye and pike season opens on Lower Peninsula inland lakes and the spring wild turkey season is in full swing. On top of that, with the warm weather we've had, panfish action is heating up in the shallows on inland lakes.

Top walleye lakes in the area include the Stony Creek Impoundment No. 1 and Cass Lake and White Lake in Oakland County. The Clinton has also produced some nice walleye and an occasional steelhead, is still being taken at Yates Cider Mill, although the run has slowed down considerably.

Wayne County walleye anglers can fish close to home at Belleville Lake, Ford Lake or the Huron River south from Flat Rock.

The best bets for pike include Cass Lake, Kent Lake, Lakeville Lake, Orchard Lake, Orion Lake and White Lake.

Gierczak allowed one run and one hit in three innings.

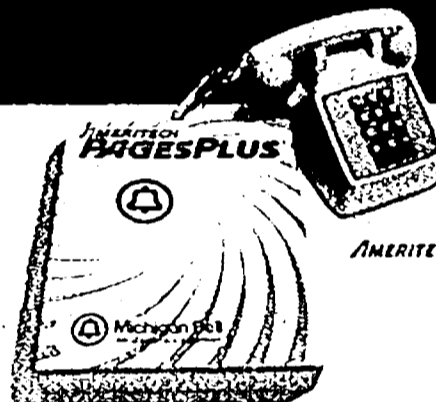

"John's pumped up, he'll do a good job," said the Madonna coach.



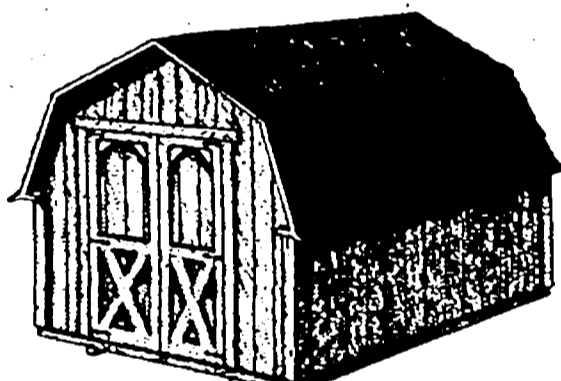

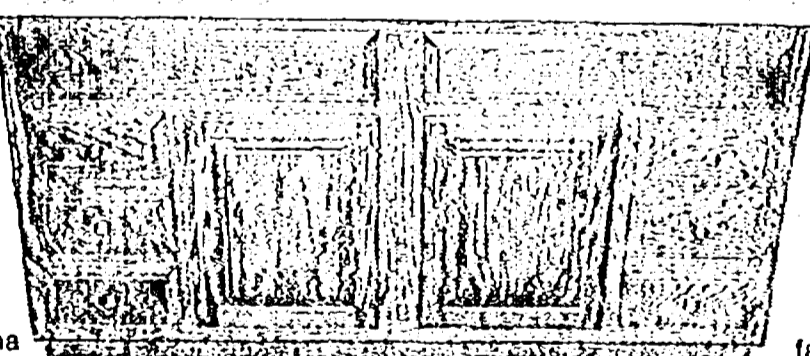

### Area students are eligible for study program

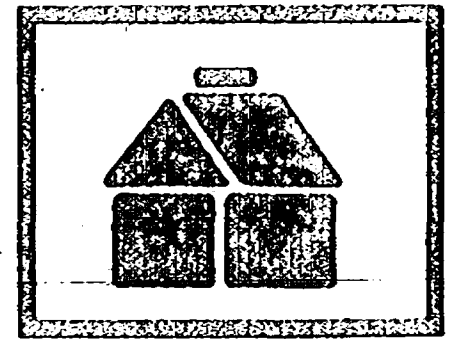

## Going buggy

### Everything's 'cricket' in magazine artist's new job

ONE OF the funniest fan letters Jean Gralley ever got was to an inchworm.

"Dear Marty," it said, "worms are my life." Gralley recalled the missive with a laugh. Writing and illustrating books for children is a lifelong goal, and with her recent addition to "Cricket Magazine" as staff illustrator, she draws for the monthly "Buggie" cartoon strip.

She's lucky for a number of reasons to have the "Cricket" job, she said.

"To be able to write and illustrate my own stories every month — not just illustrate someone else's ideas, but create my own and give it life — is the closest thing to book illustration," Gralley said.

Gralley inherited the Buggie strip from longtime friend Trina Schart Hyman, who originated it when "Cricket" began years ago as a successor to "St. Nicholas Magazine."

"ST. NICHOLAS MAGAZINE" is one of the oldest and best children's magazines, Gralley explained. "Cricket" is like the heir to that magazine.

Her characters include Cricket, Ladybug, Marty (a girl, not a boy inchworm, as Hyman pointed out to Gralley when she first started), and some new additions created by Gralley to bring the "gang's" number to some 20-odd characters.

"The actual age-span for readers is creeping up," Gralley noted, of her audience. "It used to be 8- to 12-year-olds, but it's spreading at both ends to 6- to 14-year-olds now."

Every month Gralley creates a story that will involve the "gang." She draws them to scale, she says, in a strip a little more than an inch high. The story starts on the "Letterbox" page, with letters to the characters, and ends on the last two or three pages.

THE CHARACTERS ALSO appear in the margins of short stories in the magazine, to explain unfamiliar words, Gralley said.

The most important thing to her was acceptance by the readers as the new artist of the strip. But her worries were groundless, as another fan letter proved.

"One kid wrote: 'Dear Gang, how does it feel being drawn by another artist,'" Gralley recalled. "I take that seriously, because readers do put a lot of belief in the characters."

As a protegee of Maurice Sendak (author-illustrator of "Where the Wild Things Are") when she studied at Parsons' School of Design in New York, she learned to "really respect kids," Gralley said. "You can't be fake with kids. I always try to be real. I know they're already dealing with the highest kinds of fears and deepest joys in their lives," she said.

IN ANOTHER INSTANCE, one girl had written to Gralley asking for advice. Her boyfriend was pressuring her to have sex, "and here she was, writing to a cricket, a ladybug, and a firefly about it," Gralley said.

Gralley, at the recommendation of Sendak, began doing freelance for "Cricket" while she was still a student at Parsons.

During the course of the association, she met and became

friends with Schart, a Caldecott award winner ("It's like the Academy Award for illustrators," Gralley said) for her book, "St. George and the Dragon."

"We sent cartoons back and forth to one another, for about eight years," Gralley said.

Hyman was ready to give the "Buggie" strip a rest and go on to other projects, Gralley said.

"She'd remembered all the cartoon letters we'd sent back and forth all those years ago," Gralley said, "and thought I might be the person to replace her."

For Gralley, it was "like magic," she said.

She'd always wanted to be a book illustrator, but before taking on "Cricket's" Buggies, she'd put her goal aside to make ends meet.

"I fell into doing regular illustrating for 'The New York Times,' 'The Detroit Free Press,' and J. Walter Thompson (ad agency) to pay the bills, Gralley said.

The offer from "Cricket" came just at the time when she'd decided she didn't want to put off her original goal any longer.

"When I took the job, we had a special ceremony (at the 'Crick-

et" offices in Peru, Ill.) Gralley said. "Trina passed on her Rapidograph (pens) to me, and a magic wand."

The wand — for inspiration — sits on the drawing board in Gralley's studio, a bright, cosy room in her Livonia home. A native New Yorker, the 37-year old Gralley found "New York was too frenetic" for her, and moved to Michigan eight years ago.

"Michigan is the place I really

want to be. It's a nice balance, and I felt it was the place I could work," she said.

Recently, she served as a member of the Livonia Arts Commission and was instrumental in the commission's adoption of its promotional logo, "Let There Be Art."

Gralley was once asked if every story she drew had a moral. She doesn't feel that's the purpose of writing for kids.

"There's so much unbelievable schlock out there for kids," she said. "If there's anything in the strip that teaches, if there are difficulties, there's always a plan to come out of them."

But her real purpose, she said, is to tell a good story. "The kind that finds a place to stay in you for a long time." And, she added, whenever it's done in a funny and original way. "That's a real accomplishment."

## Art deco group attracts crowd of enthusiasts

It started as a social club. "Ron Steinberg and I just sent out 50 or 60 letters to people we knew were interested in various facets of Art Deco," says Ann Duke, current president of the Detroit Area Art Deco Society and co-founder and owner of Duke Gallery of Birmingham. "Some people were interested in costume, some in jewelry, glass or architecture. We thought it would be fun to get together and share our interests."

That was just three years ago. DAADS now has more than 200 members and their interests have grown and changed. The society has become a major force in cataloging and preserving Detroit's rich and diverse Art Deco heritage. The purpose and aim of DAADS is formally stated in their stylish (and stylized) newsletter, "The Modern."

Education — To increase public awareness of the style and period;

Documentation — To do and preserve surveys, photography and research;

Design — Assist owners, contractors and architects with information on restoration and style preservation;

Entertainment — Communicate the sense of fun that characterizes the style and period through parties, shows and events.

"ART DECO," ALSO KNOWN as Style Moderne, is familiar to devotees of '20s and '30s Fred Astaire movies. "Top Hat," for example, was filmed against a sleek, sophisticated, Art Deco background. Ginger Rogers' costumes from the same movie were typical of the style. Sleek, sophisticated Jean Harlow is the personification of Style Moderne.

The intention of the movement was to create a sleek and anti-traditional elegance that symbolized wealth and sophistication. Frequently, industrial materials, such as chrome and plastic were used, but expensive materials such as crystal, ivory and silver were equally popular.

In any case, Art Deco was characterized by geometric shapes, smooth lines and streamlined forms. Detroit's Guardian Building is one of the nation's most-outstanding examples of Art Deco architecture.

DAADS acted as an adviser in the restoration of the Elwood Bar in Detroit's revitalized theater district and assisted Preservation Wayne's benefit, "Celebrate the Fox," Nov. 5. DAADS volunteers conducted tours of the renovated movie palace and were responsible for a fashion show of vintage gowns from the 1920s and through the 1940s.

Last October, Duke was invited by the Art Deco Societies of America to represent Detroit at the 42nd annual National Trust for Historic Preservation conference in Cincinnati.

Speaking on "Society and the Deco movement," Duke said, "... Deco buffs think of themselves as preservationists, first and foremost. Our goal is to communicate the legitimacy of Art Deco as an American architectural style and to learn techniques about how to protect 20th century structures."

IN KEEPING WITH ITS avowed "education and entertainment" aims, DAADS offers programs for members and non-members. Recent members-only programs have included a bus trip to Domino's Farms for a tour of the National Center for the Study of Frank Lloyd Wright (yes, they did eat pizza, but it was sleek and geometric), and a lecture

by Ric Emmett, of Coral Gables, Fla. on Art Deco glass. At the annual membership meeting to be held July 12 at Pasquale's in Royal Oak, there will be a discussion of Art Deco bronzes by authority Joe Delguidice.

To mark National Preservation Week, May 14-20, DAADS is sponsoring two walks to acquaint the public with Detroit's Art Deco architecture heritage.

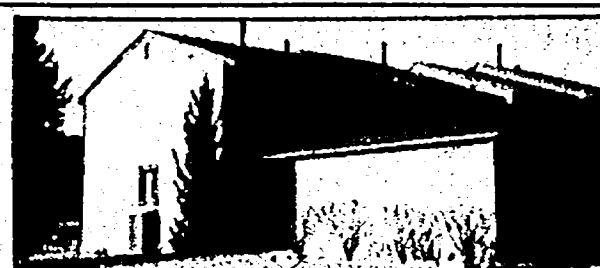

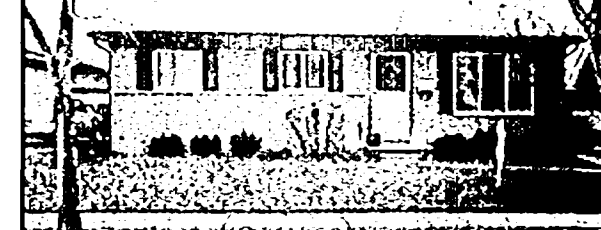

# Portfolio preparation takes time

**A** GAIN I am continuing with the questions most often asked by the parents of my students. Parents would die if they heard what their kids tell the teachers and I'm sure I, too, would be mortified if I heard what they tell the parents about us.

Somehow, no matter how clear you say it, kids get things misconstrued. One boy told his mom all we teach is colored pencil and then he told us that all his mom wanted him to do was colored pencil. That boy is probably smarter than all of us.

One little guy announced, "My mom says this cost her eight bucks 'n' I gotta do a new picture every week!" Setting down a picture of his aunt, he said, "This week I have to do her portrait."

Well, I'll make a deal with you parents, I'll believe about half of what I hear if you do the same. Of course, questions from the parents are critical to the success of the student. Many of the questions seem to be identical so I thought we might as well share them with other parents.

**Q:** Why does my 12-year-old only do black and white artwork?

**A:** It's a matter of success. This was one of my problems as a youth and even as an adult. As a matter of fact, I graduated from college with a predominantly black and white port-

folio. There are so many possibilities with color and only a gamut of grays in black and white. Even with the "push" of a teacher, it is difficult to persuade some to try full color.

**Q:** Why does my 16-year-old take so much time to do a single picture?

**A:** Some people can be such a perfectionist that it becomes a fault and even their undoing. Generally teens are desperately slow in their art. Most media are new to them and ironically the better their previous success, the slower they move in the present lesson, hoping to again be successful. This attitude, however, can freeze a student into being a one-media artist. The fear of failing in a new medium limits them to the one or two media they are comfortable with.

At its worst, this fear of failing can paralyze a student completely. They, in time, become bored with "their" media, yet their fear will not allow them to try anything new. Often, when I see a student at any age

have four or five projects turn out great, I warn them that you can't know what success is unless you occasionally fail.

**Q:** When should my daughter start working on her portfolio?

**A:** I would say 14 years to 16 years old is an ideal time to start a portfolio. A portfolio should be a collection of a student's best work in as many media as possible. A good portfolio should show an ability to be expressive both in the fine arts and commercial arts.

In my portfolio preparation classes, I try to slant my students portfolios more into the commercial world. Most of the people "out there" are hiring artists to do commercial projects and not to draw pastel still life. We do take a break occasionally from commercial lessons to do more artistic creations.

My immediate goal for my portfolio students is to require more from them. If a student wishes to enter the portfolio program, I want to talk to the parents and make sure I have their backing. Then we will begin a series of 15 lessons that will guarantee a well-rounded commercial portfolio.

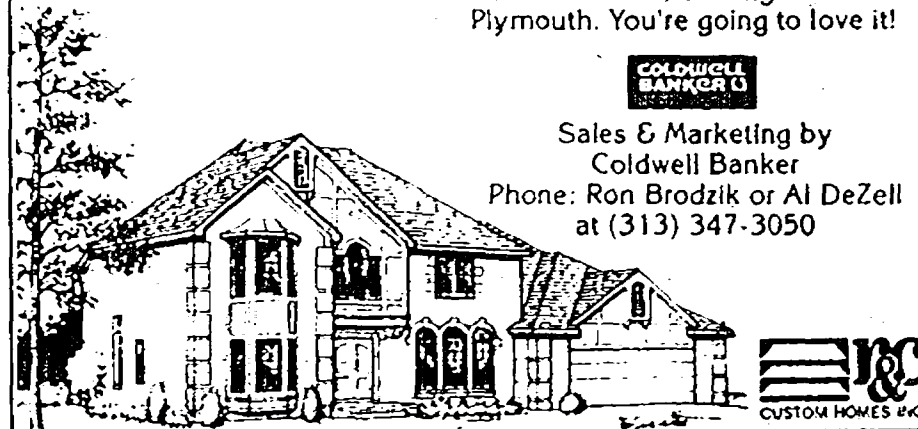
I have in the past been reluctant to ask for homework time and for me to assign a project was out of the question because I don't grade the students. But when you think of it, their portfolio is their grade and one of their best shots at getting a scholarship. So I am sending letters to my portfolio students and their parents to explain my new approach. I hope to install this program before summer, as students are off for the summer and could take a giant leap toward a very complete portfolio.

## Tips for getting and giving great gifts

**Y**OU'RE ENGAGED. Everyone wishes you well, people throw parties in your honor, you start planning the big day. Best of all, it's time to register for gifts.

Traditionally, bridal registries are a wonderful wish list of china, silver, crystal, kitchen, bathroom and bedroom items — all the goodies you and your beloved need to set up house.

With smart planning and the help of a good in-store bridal consultant, you just might end up with a host of useful, beautiful gifts you will cherish for years to come.

"The bridal registry also avoids the possibilities of many gift duplications and assures the couple of receiving things they want, in their taste," wrote Letitia Baldrige in "The Amy Vanderbilt Complete Book of Etiquette" (Doubleday).

"Most people like to have suggestions on what to buy as a wedding gift, and appreciate the chance to purchase something they know the bride and groom actually want and will use," she said.

**IF THE** world of bone china, sterling silver and fancy kitchen gizmos is a-mystery, turn to the pages of Geryl Kramer's "Bridal Registry Guide" (Turnbull and Willoughby).

Kramer not only explains the whole process of registering, but also offers a crash course on what all this stuff is. (There really is a difference between bone china and earthenware.)

She contends that registering is not as complicated as it seems. In fact, she said, the process can be broken down into seven simple steps:

- Determine your lifestyle. Are you a busy two-career couple who will value time-saving devices? Do you plan to entertain a lot? In what kind of style?
- Determine your taste. Shop around, read magazines, learn what each other likes. Her preference for whimsical contemporary table settings can mesh quite nicely with his love of the traditional.
- Pick a general color scheme for your home. This will give it a unified look.
- Coordinate your lifestyle, tastes and color preferences with those of

your fiance. For some couples this is easy, for others it takes some negotiating.

• Research and understand products carefully before making a selection. Learn the hallmarks of quality. Don't always assume that the most expensive or best-known brands are the best for you.

• Register at locations best suited to your needs. If your family and friends live in the same town, registering with local jewelers and specialty stores will do fine.

If you have a big family and wide circle of friends living far away, consider a department store with many branches and a computerized, inter-store bridal registry.

• Work closely with a bridal consultant or store manager to make your selections.

The other wonderful thing about bridal registries is that the services of a bridal consultant usually come with it. Look for one who will make an appointment with you — registering can take several hours.

Once you have made your choices, simply leave it to friends and family to

spread the word of where you are registered.

**SELECTING CHINA,** silver and crystal patterns is perhaps the most fun. You are starting your own family traditions.

Register for quality items that will have a place in your home for a long time. Mix ornate with simple, traditional with contemporary to create an eclectic, special look.

The prices and styles of china vary widely. Heirloom-quality imported china, such as Hutschenreuther from Germany or Wedgwood from England, tend to be more expensive.

Beyond that, patterns run the gamut from stately traditional floral and golden-edged dishes by Royal Doulton, Wedgwood and Lenox (very popular right now) to highly innovative and contemporary patterns from Swid Powell and Dansk.

You can register for both fine and everyday china, although most bridal consultants will encourage you to use your fine china as often as you like.

Next, select a silver pattern. Here again, the patterns run from very ornate baroque to simple and stately.

## Romancing the lace for lovely brides

**I**F THERE was ever any doubt that weddings are romantic, those doubts were put to rest with the debut of this year's gowns.

"Wedding gowns today are more romantic than ever before," said Bride's magazine editor-in-chief Barbara Tober. "I think the most important thing to remember is that they're very, very feminine."

This season's silhouettes are simpler and more elegant than a year ago. Whereas last year the skirts of many bridal gowns cascaded with lace and overflowed with pearls, this year, skirts are simplified.

"Many of the skirts are totally plain without any embellishments at all," explains Holly McMunn, director of public relations for Bridal Originals. "In fact, trains and skirts have unadorned fabric with just a touch of lace. The emphasis has really gone to the bodice of the gown."

Look for lavish hand beading and the use of appliques on both the front and back. Or, hand beading appears on sheer lace that covers flesh-tone organza, creating the illusion of a show-through look.

### Bride's Guide to Fabric and Lace

It's helpful to know the differences in fabrics and lace when you are shopping for your gown and attendants' dresses.

**Charmeuse.** Classic charmeuse is made of silk. Polyester blends are also available. It is a soft, lightweight cloth that drapes beautifully.

**Crepe de chine.** Silk or blended fabric with a floating quality.

**Faille.** A full-bodied pure silk or polyester fabric often used for autumn or wintertime gowns.

**Organza.** Crisp sheer silk, often accented with appliques.

**Taffeta.** That silk or silk-blend fabric known best for its rustle — just like Mammy's red silk taffeta petticoat in "Gone With the Wind."

**Tulle.** Looks like veiling, and many brides use it on their headpieces. Also nice in layers on a dress.

**Alencon lace.** An expensive lace from France. Beloved for its delicate leaf and floral patterns.

**Brussels lace.** Rare, delicate lace with subtle designs. Imported from Belgium. Used on the finest gowns.

**Chantilly lace.** Also from France, it is known for its delicate spider's web pattern. Authentic Chantilly is identified by its soft feel.

**Schiffli embroidery.** Made in the United States, it comes in delicate patterns resembling more expensive laces. It is embroidered on the gown.

**SOME GOWNS APPEAR** lingerie-inspired, mixing lace and embroidery for a feel borrowed from intimate apparel.

Necklines receive new emphasis, and this year, there are innovative alternatives to traditional high-neck styling. The portrait collars, capelets, fichus and scarf-tied looks that appear in ready-to-wear also influence bridal clothes.

Also important this season are wonderful décolletage — off-the-shoulder looks," said Tober, "and unusual necklines that billow into sheer bishop sleeves."

When shoulders are bared, look for bows or fabric rosettes that draw attention to the shoulders.

There also is significant back interest this season: Keyhole cutouts, V-designs filled in with pearls and ruffled bustles keep eyes trained on the bride as she glides down the aisle.

Peplums are another point of interest — they're more prominent and architectural than they have been the last few seasons.

Waistlines are slightly higher, and in more fashion-forward gowns may even be Empire.

"The sheath is another gown shape that's enjoying a resurgence," adds McMunn.

And if skirts are full at the hip, they may be pegged at the ankle, creating a dome shape that looks fresh now.

**ANOTHER STRONG** trend this year is the use of color in bridal gowns. Blush pink and icy gray-blue show up in trims and overskirts, providing options to the classic ecru, ivory and white.

The traditional fabrics are still popular — silks, satins, taffetas — but they are joined by fluid fabrics such as chiffon and georgette and iridescent fibers that create a frosted look.

Bridesmaids, too, are more colorful and florid than before. This is the year of the cabbage-rose. While the silhouette of bridesmaid dresses, like bridal gowns, is simpler, more ladylike, the fabrics burst into bloom with floral chintzes. Tulips and daisies also appear, as do polka dots.

Off-the-shoulder looks, ornamented with a simple ruffle at the neckline or a bow at the waist complete the English country feel.

As in ready-to-wear, the more classic

single or dual-tone attendant dresses are brighter than last year. Pastels are punched up. Look for brighter colors, such as mint and lemon ice, orchid, coral, turquoise blue and jade green.

These brighter gowns may have mini-ruffles on the skirt that create a tiered effect or an insert of matching lace on the bodice or at the bustline to enhance the design.

**WHILE THE FLORAL** bridesmaids' gowns frequently are cotton or

silk this year, the single-color dresses appear in classic taffeta and satin.

And what about the mother of the bride?

"They're in better shape and looking younger than ever," comments Tober. "We love to see them in chiffon dresses and beautiful, floating evening looks."

The perfect dress for the mother of the bride is one that reflects her per-

sonality. And there currently are many flattering options in late-day and evening silhouettes.

"What they want to avoid are dresses that look mousey and don't have the presence of glamour," said Tober.

If you can't find a look that suits you in the stores, join the 38 percent of brides who either sew or have their gowns made each year. And as patterns become more sophisticated, that means up-to-the-minute styles are available in pattern books the same season they appear in the stores.

As in store-bought gowns, said Cindy Rose, fashion director for Vogue/Butterick, this year's bridal patterns reflect a new interest in the neckline.

"Vogue and Butterick feature bare-shoulder looks, sweetheart necklines, and big bow detailing with bows at the shoulders and at the waist."

"ALSO NEW FROM Butterick, look for fitted gowns that hug the body to the knee, and then flare out at the bottom.

Sewing allows you to choose sequined lace or re-embroidered white lace that uses pale pink in the trim.

"Another way to use pink — a very important color this year," said Rose, "is as an underlining topped by sheer white or ecru."

The headpiece a bride chooses should suit her taste, personality and hairstyle. Sewing offers a great flexibility, not to mention a great price break for the bride's headpiece and veil.

"This year, women are choosing single, double and triple layer veils in a variety of lengths," said Rose. "Silk fabric flowers and dried flowers are very important, as are sequin appliques."

And as more women move away from traditional wreaths to more free-form veils, look for bows and layers of tulle that round out an ethereal, romantic look.

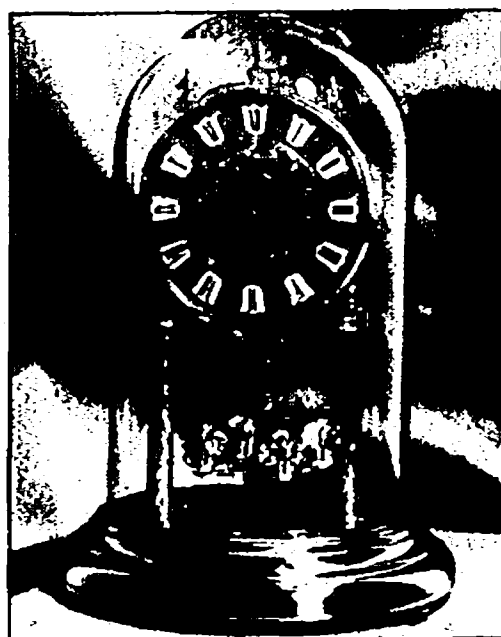

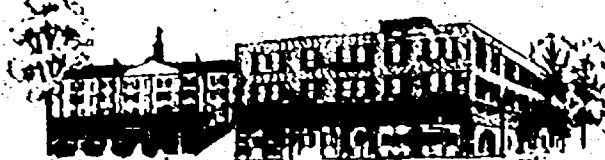

# How to work with wedding pros

**T**URNING wedding dreams into reality takes time... and help.

When you're ready to start planning your wedding, you may suddenly find yourself in charge of a crew of professionals — from caterers to musicians — who are all looking to you for directions. It's crucial you let your helping hands know from the start that you're the boss.

Below, some tips from the editors of "Bride's" magazine to prepare you to talk — and work — with your wedding professionals:

- Discuss everything with your partner first.

The options can seem endless, so

agree on the basics — such as where, when and how much you'll spend — together. Each decision will save time and headaches when you're ready to iron out the details with wedding experts. And there's an added bonus: Knowing that your finance supports your ideas will boost your confidence if you're faced with a stubborn florist or overly ambitious caterer.

- Investigate your options.

Ask anyone you know who has recently hosted a party to recommend musicians, caterers and party planning consultants who were especially cooperative and talented. Or get names of recent clients from experts you're considering, and contact them for an in-

side account of the experts' professional skill and personal style.

- Anticipate what each pro will need to know.

Be prepared with as many details as possible: how many guests will attend; if guests will have any special needs (such as diet); the size and layout of the wedding and reception sites; the availability of parking space, changing rooms, electrical outlets, etc.

- Interview the professional.

Ask direct questions and demand clear answers: How much — and for what exactly — will you be paying? Is all equipment included in the price, or will you find a bill for extra chafing dishes awaiting you when your honey-

moon is over? Will the band play on if the guests want to dance all night, and just how much will they charge for those extra fox-trots? If you suspect you're not being taken seriously, look elsewhere.

- Get everything in writing.

It's your only protection if friendly experts suddenly turn fiendish or simply "forget" your agreement with them.

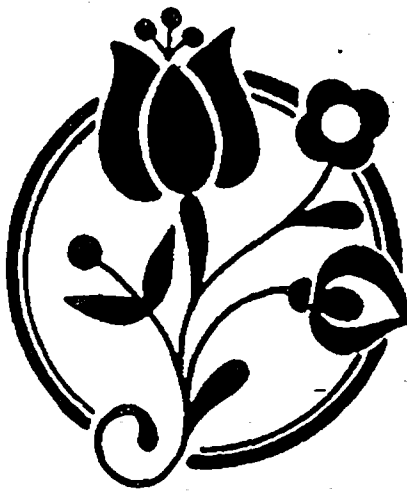
- Trust the people you've hired.

## Avoiding bridal woes: making it work

**F**ALLING IN love was so easy. Saying "I do" can be another story.

It's not the nuptials themselves that have many prospective brides and grooms thinking about eloping, but an unending chain of bills, an ever-changing guest list and a host of other minor hassles, ranging from etiquette to emotion, that nobody ever mentioned before the engagement was official.

It is possible, however, to get married without taking out a major loan, alienating the in-laws or offending every acquaintance who can't be invited to the wedding. Here is a rundown of common wedding dilemmas and some tips for conquering them before they hamper prenuptial bliss:

You're giving your hand in marriage but are a bit uncertain about who will foot the bill? Once upon a time, the bride's family paid for just about everything, but changing attitudes toward the nature of marriage have blurred the lines that dictate who pays for what.

For the first time, there's a definite trend toward sharing the wedding expenses, according to the editors of *Bride's* magazine. The groom's family and even the bride and groom themselves are taking on the lion's share, or at least a good chunk, of the financial responsibility.

WHEN YOU CONSIDER the average cost of a wedding is at least \$2,000, it's easy to understand why the bride's parents can't always be left standing with the bill. And since today's brides and grooms are older and established in their careers before they are married, they are more likely to plan the wedding of their dreams and then offer the financial support needed to pull it off.

Typical wedding expenses can be broken down into percentages: 30 percent for the reception; 30 percent for clothes and gifts; 12 percent miscellaneous, such as hotel accommodations for out-of-town bridesmaids; 11 percent for the ceremony; and 6 percent invitations and other stationery.

When dividing up the costs, many couples settle on specific expenses in advance, rather than splitting the cost of the whole wedding down the middle or into thirds. Another option is to let one family pay for the ceremony, while the other family picks up the tab for the reception.

It is, however, the prerogative of the bride's family to follow tradition and handle the bulk of the bill if they wish.

This still leaves the groom's family with a few expenses such as the rehearsal dinner, the bride's bouquet and going-away corsage, corsages for the mothers and boutonnieres for the men in the wedding party, and hotel

accommodations for groom's attendants who live out of town.

Today's wedding couples want a memorable celebration without incurring a debt that will keep them and their families in the red until their golden wedding anniversary. To save money without scrimping on quality:

- Consider an at-home wedding and reception, or borrow the well-tended garden of a friend as the setting for your vows.

- Comparison shop to find the best values offered by caterers, decorators, photographers and florists. Get in writing a list of everything that will be covered by the bid, including gratuities. Check references.

- Set priorities. Maybe you want to serve a sit-down dinner at your reception, but don't feel as strongly about hiring an orchestra for dancing afterward. Go with the dinner, and limit the music to a harpist or strolling musicians to cut down on the cost.

- Shop early to avoid paying higher prices by default. You might, for instance, be forced into spending more on your wedding dress if the one you had your eye on ends up on some other bride. Likewise, you might get a sizable discount if you secure lodgings for out-of-towners in advance.

- Recruit the help of a professional wedding planner, who can offer practical, money-saving advice and often solicit discounts.

An alternative would be to invest in a planning guide such as "Affordable Weddings: How to Have the Wedding of Your Dreams on the Budget of Your Choice," by Leta W. Clark (Simon & Schuster).

You'll have 30 bridesmaids if you include all your friends and sisters in the line, and the guest list is becoming insurmountable because of your all-too-friendly mother-in-law. What's a harried bride to do?

While there's no limit on the number of attendants a bride may have, she doesn't want to wear her guests out with too many introductions before they reach the end of the receiving line, either.

Experts suggest the honored bridesmaid positions should be reserved for close friends and family members. Meanwhile, the couple can seek out creative ways to involve other friends.

A former roommate, for instance, could attend to the wedding book, several young cousins could pass out rice bags and a sister-in-law could act as wedding trouble-shooter throughout the day.

To eliminate a burgeoning guest list, the bride and groom should establish a feasible number before everyone gets out paper and pens. That number should be based first on the wedding budget, second in the degree of formality. Both sides of the family should be

allowed to invite roughly the same number of guests.

If you're a second-time bride, you're not alone. Nearly 30 percent of all marriages today are remarriages.

Traditionally, remarrying couples faced strong pressure to keep their wedding a small, quiet affair. All that has changed, according to *Bride's*, and the emphasis is now on the importance of sharing a joyful new beginning rather than on time-worn rules.

Second or third-time brides can borrow from almost any tradition in the book, such as:

- Wearing an engagement ring and the dress of their choice. The bride is not banished to a plain cream-colored suit just because she's walking down the aisle again. But she should mix the veil, since it is a longtime symbol of youth and purity.

- Throwing a gala reception. The party can be complete with a receiving line, first dance and ceremonial toast if the couple wishes. Many choose to greet the guests themselves, leaving parents free to circulate.

- Having a prenuptial shower.

Prewedding parties always are in order, even for remarrying couples. Many will even involve his or her children.

The only real difference for brides or grooms who have been married before is that they, not their parents, do the inviting, according to *Copley News Service's* etiquette columnist Letitia Baldrige. In most situations, the couple also picks up the wedding-day tab the second time around.

A wedding can be a joyful time for everybody — including the divorced parents of the bride or groom.

Of course, it may not be easy. No matter how friendly the divorce or how many years have gone by, the situation may still be awkward and uncomfortable for both parties.

To handle the situation with tact and compassion, the bride and groom must become diplomats. It's best to begin by discussing the upcoming event with both parents and finding out what they need in order to enjoy themselves at the wedding, suggests *Bridal Guide* magazine.
