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Father sentenced in kicking

A 41-year-old man accused of kicking his 2-year-old daughter as she rolled across a street in south Westland has been sentenced to 30 days in jail and fined \$200.

Norwayne neighborhood residents testified in court last month that Goodwin Wymond repeatedly kicked the toddler in the head and ribs. When the girl fell, Wymond yelled at her and said "Get up, you little bitch," witness Argella Firth said.

Westland police have said Wymond became angry because his daughter wasn't walking fast enough.

Authorities had initially charged Wymond with fourth-degree child abuse. But 18th District Judge Thomas G. Smith rejected that charge during Wymond's Feb. 6 trial and

found him guilty on a reduced charge of assault and battery.

Smith imposed the 20-day jail term and \$200 fine on Tuesday, when Wymond appeared before him for sentencing. The defendant could have received a 90-day sentence.

If Wymond had been convicted of the initial child abuse charge, he could have been jailed for a year.

"We felt that we had more than enough evidence to show child abuse, but the court didn't see it that way," said Sgt. Michael Terry of the Westland Police Department.

Considering the reduced charge, Terry said, "We are satisfied with the verdict."

Wymond had already served eight days in jail, leaving him with 12 days behind bars, an 18th District Court clerk said. Wymond won't have to receive counseling, the clerk said.

NORWAYNE RESIDENTS last month testified that they were appalled and horrified when they saw Wymond, walking with his two children, begin to kick the 2-year-old girl who fell while crossing Delton Street at the Darwin intersection. The incident occurred about 3:30 p.m. Dec. 19.

The child lived with her mother, Joanne Beljan, and 3-year-old brother. Wymond, a Detroit resident, had been visiting them in Norwayne.

In court, Beljan testified that Wymond did not cause bruises and abrasions that authorities saw on the child's body. The mother blamed some of the injuries on a fall and said others were caused when the child was hit by a toy that her brother threw at her.

Following Wymond's arrest, authorities seized custody of the children. A hearing to determine the children's long-term custody is

expected to be held in April in Wayne County Probate Court, Terry said.

Witnesses last month testified that Wymond kicked the 2-year-old and then picked her up by the hood of her coat and slammed her on the ground. Witness Kitty Carr said Wymond called the girl "a f---g idiot."

WYMOND ADMITTED in court that he "nudged her in the ass and told her to get on down the street." But he denied kicking her and said "If I did, she'd have broken ribs, wouldn't she?"

Moreover, Wymond conceded that he told authorities "It's my child, and I'll do whatever I want." But he denied abusing her and said "I got nothing to hide."

Assistant Wayne County Prosecutor Charles Grant disputed Wymond's testimony and called him "an outright liar."

Cliff Johnson, club spokesman, said the group expects a sellout and urged people to get their tickets early.

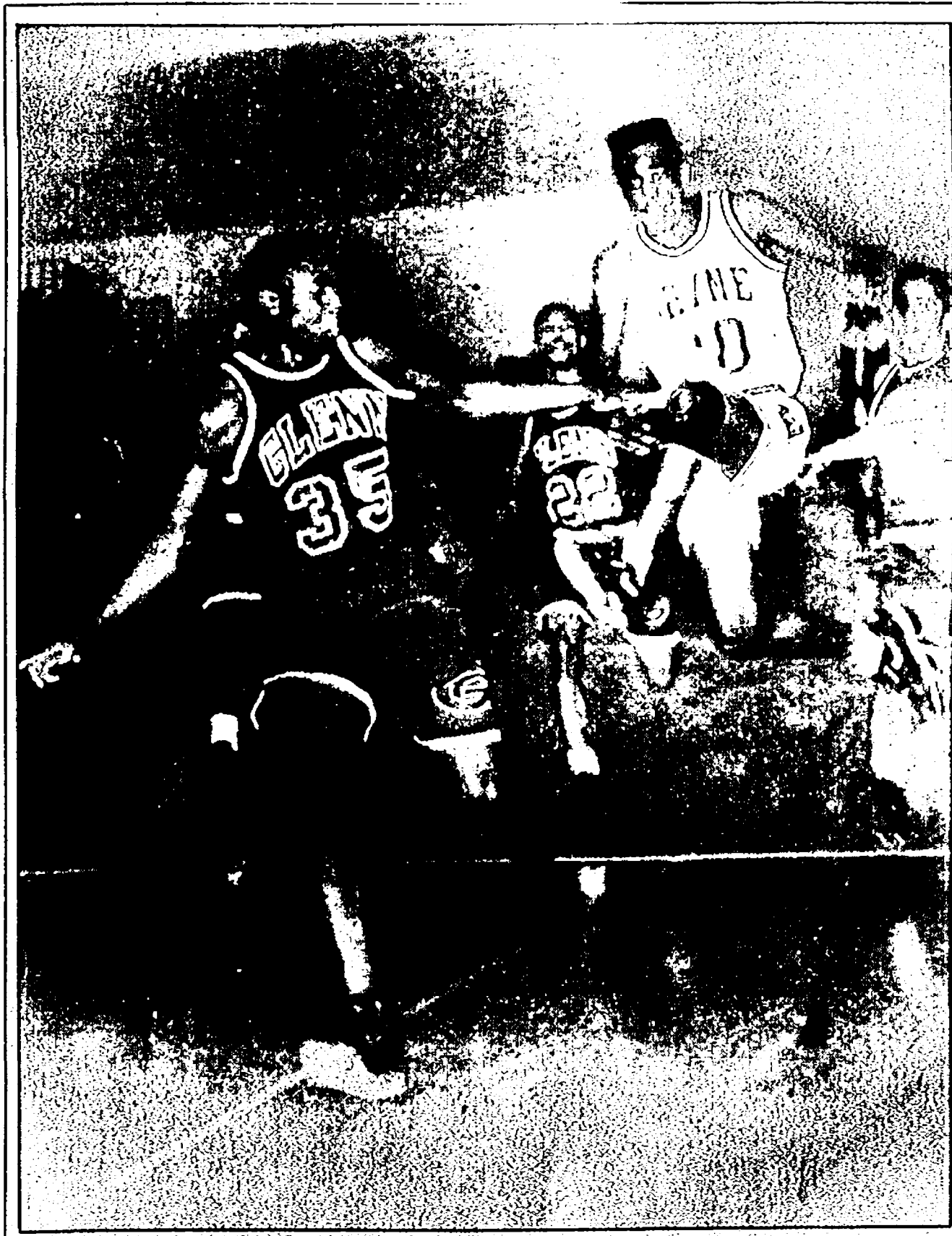

Party officials: Clinton leading, Brown gaining, Tsongas waning

Bill Clinton has the early lead, Jerry Brown is gaining and Paul Tsongas seems to be falling behind — at least in the race for key Wayne County supporters.

While Arkansas Gov. Clinton appears the clear Democratic front runner, observers aren't ruling out the possibility of a Brown upset in Tuesday's primary.

"I think Clinton is going to do very well. But with Brown, you get the sense that he has more support than we've been able to gauge," said Dan Patetko, chairman of the Redford/Southfield/Dearborn Heights area party organization.

Richard McKnight, head of the Livonia/Garden City party organization, was more skeptical.

"Brown may do well, but a victory probably isn't likely," he said.

No upsets are expected on the Republican side where President Bush is expected to handily defeat conservative columnist Patrick Buchanan.

"I think this area is pretty solidly behind the president," said Harry Greenleaf, chairman of the GOP organization representing Livonia/Plymouth area voters.

Just in case it isn't, however, Buchanan supporters have scheduled what they're calling an election night victory party for the Mayflower Meeting room in Plymouth.

Despite Clinton's strong early support, there are signs the Democratic race could be up for grabs.

Many local officials decided on a candidate only late last week, often at hastily called press conferences. Voters, too, could be waiting.

DESPITE THE state's importance, Livonia and Westland officials reported absentee ballots were barely keeping pace with those for the low interest 1990 gubernatorial primaries — a sign voters could wait until election day to decide or shun the primaries altogether.

Accused had score to settle with boss, witnesses testify

Frederick Morris, accused of murder, blamed his troubles on his former boss, Charles W. Piper of Westland, and vowed to settle the score, witnesses testified in court.

Morris, a Canton Township resident, "blamed all his troubles on Chuck, and he said Chuck would be paid back," David Drown, a friend of Morris, said Thursday in 29th District Court in Wayne.

Drown's remarks emerged as Morris appeared in court for a third day of testimony that will determine whether he will be bound over for trial in Detroit Recorder's Court.

Attorneys expect to complete the unusually long preliminary examination today. Afterward, Judge

Carolyn Archbold will decide whether Morris must stand trial on charges of first-degree murder, felony murder, armed robbery and a felony firearms violation.

Morris, 33, could face life in prison if convicted of killing 53-year-old Piper at Chuck's Cycle Service on Michigan Avenue, east of Hannan, in Wayne. Police found Piper dead about 5:30 p.m. Jan. 5, a Sunday. He had been shot in the head and at the base of his skull.

MORRIS BLAMED his problems on Piper after Piper fired him last summer, witnesses said Thursday.

Piper and Morris had been targeted by a lawsuit after the child of Morris' girlfriend, Sharon Brough-

Schools want thaw on tax rate freeze

Money for public schools vs. political credibility — those were the conflicting issues voiced by suburban school officials and state legislators Friday morning.

What the school board members and administrators want is a lifting of the state-imposed freeze on operating millage rates which also affect schools, cities, townships, counties and community colleges.

They feel that the freeze, along with the newly-imposed property assessment freeze, creates a "double burden" which costs the districts an expected increase in local property taxes.

But state Rep. James Kosteva, D-Canton Township, told the group of about 60 officials that he sees little success of a proposed lifting of the tax rate freeze. The proposed thawing was initiated by a lobbying group representing 10 western Wayne

Numbers tell both sides of the issue

Although property assessments and millage rates have been frozen for this year, school leaders want the ability to raise slightly the millage rate. Following are some of the numbers relating to the problem from the homeowners' view and the school boards' view. The first number next to the name of the district represents the maximum millage rate allowed under the Headlee Amendment; the second is what could be levied if school districts are successful in getting the rate freeze lifted, and the third is the financial impact for each district

ton, received burn injuries during a mishap that Broughton claims occurred at the cycle shop. The lawsuit contends the child was burned on the neck by flames that erupted as Morris was doing repairs at the motorcycle shop.

Morris and his girlfriend remain on good terms, according to assistant Wayne County prosecutor Michael Reynolds and Wayne police Lt. Kerry Webb.

Some witnesses have testified that Morris had become worried about having to possibly pay on the lawsuit. Others said he had indicated he believed he might even benefit from the suit if Piper had to pay on it.

"Fred thought he'd get money out of it," witness Russell Beck testified Thursday.

Morris told Beck that Piper "would pay one way or another" on the lawsuit, Beck said in court.

WITNESSES HAVE testified that Morris visited Piper at the cycle shop on Jan. 5, the same day Piper was later found dead. They discussed the lawsuit, witnesses have said.

Police discovered Piper's body after his fiancée telephoned them and told them she was worried because Piper hadn't come home.

Reynolds and defense attorney Joan Morgan have blamed the length of the preliminary examination on the circumstantial nature of the case. Morris has denied killing Piper.

"This is not a case where you have an eyewitness who saw it," Reynolds said.

Reynolds is expected today (Monday) to ask Wayne police officers who found Piper dead, lying face up on the shop floor, to testify. Both Reynolds and Morgan have indicated to Judge Archbold that the exam should be completed today.

County school districts.

Kosteva said approval of the bill before July would "be extremely difficult." But approval is possible after the November election when two property tax amendments will be on the ballot, he said.

Kosteva noted that all state representatives will be in the middle of an election year this year.

A MAJOR problem, he said, is the legislator's credibility among homeowners who expect their property taxes to be frozen this year after the assessment and tax rate freeze were approved last year.

If the millage rate freeze is lifted, the legislature would be subject to criticism by people who are still upset at it for the "notorious Lottery film-flam," he added.

But Gerald Dunn, executive director for the suburban schools' lobbying organization, said that "we, too, have a credibility gap" in that local school and city officials must deal with local programs and services.

Echoing his position was Kathy Chorbaglan, Wayne-Westland school board trustee.

In her district, the loss of funds would mean eliminating the general fund surplus and eliminating programs that were previously dropped and later restored.

The lobbying group, the Michigan Association for Improved School Legislation, represents 10 western Wayne County districts, including Livonia, Wayne-Westland, Garden City, Redford Union, and Plymouth Canton.

STATE REP. William Keith, D-Garden City, said he will introduce a bill lifting the tax rate freeze to enable local school boards to receive the property tax revenues expected through the proposed action.

He said his bill will be introduced soon and be the subject of a public hearing.

But he distributed a letter from Rep. H. Lynn Jondahl, House Taxation Committee chairman, which said that from a political view, the legislature shouldn't undo a tax

freeze by allowing the tax rate to be lifted.

"For the legislature to substantially undo the assessment freeze now by allowing automatic increases in tax rates would be almost impossible to defend," he said in a letter to Keith, chairman of the House Education Committee.

But Jondahl agreed to hold hearings on the upcoming bill, Keith told his audience Friday.

Keith said that the problem must be brought to the surface so "we can all understand it."

The legislator added that he has a responsibility to introduce the bill lifting the rate freeze and have a public hearing.

But Keith, like Kosteva, admitted that it won't be easy to get approval.

OTHER SCHOOL officials said while the tax rate freeze costs up to \$2.7 million for some districts (see related story below), the impact to homeowners would be small, ranging from a tax bill increase of \$20 to \$40 a year, based on their valuation.

In some districts, the tax rate increase, if approved by the legislature, would be about a half-mill, or 50 cents per \$1,000 of state equalized valuation. The largest increase would be \$1.28 per \$1,000 in the Wayne-Westland district, or \$38.40 for home valued at \$60,000.

Michael Wilmot, Garden City school superintendent, explained the problem for the group of school, city and township officials.

He stressed that the school group only wants the right, as provided in the Headlee Amendment to the state Constitution, to raise millage rates up to the rate of inflation, which was 2.9 percent for 1991.

Dunn said the association's attorney feels that the legislative freeze on millage rates "abrogates" the constitution which allows for a tax rate increase.

Another problem, the school leaders told the legislators, is that the problem of a loss of property tax revenues would worsen the following year — unless the rate freeze is lifted.

in the upcoming school year. (One mill represents \$1 per \$1,000 of state equalized valuation.)

Democratic race could be up for grabs

"We're still getting a lot of complaints from people who say they don't want to register as either a Democrat or a Republican," Westland Clerk Diane Fritz said.

That means name support and political muscle could be even more important.

Clinton thus far has two big names on his side, Wayne County Executive Edward McNamara and former Gov. James Blanchard.

Both are state co-chairmen for the Clinton campaign. McNamara is also directing county field operations.

Events have included a \$100-per-person reception at which all three appeared and a \$1,000-per-couple dinner. Hillary Clinton, the candidate's wife, was scheduled to appear at McNamara's own St. Patrick's weekend fund-raiser Friday in Livonia.

Westland Mayor Robert Thomas also is among Clinton's area supporters.

But if Clinton has substantial fundraising and organizational might, he also has problems.

BIG LABOR has for the most part rejected him as a conservative from a right-to-work state. State AFL-CIO leader Frank Garrison has been vocal in his call for other candidates.

The departure of Iowa Sen. Thomas Harkin from the race has left many union households scrambling for a candidate.

"I don't see any one candidate getting all of Harkin's support," McKnight said.

Tabloid scandals about Clinton's personal life continue to cast a shadow.

"There is still the feeling that the other shoe is going to drop," said Wayne County Commissioner Bryan Amann, D-Wayne. Despite his close ties to McNamara, Amann has yet to issue an endorsement for any candidate.

Neither of the area's two Democratic Congressmen, William Ford, D-Taylor, and Sander Levin, D-Southfield, had issued endorsements as of Thursday, nor was either likely to, according to staffers.

Rep. Carl Pursell, R-Plymouth, has endorsed the president, a long-time friend.

Brown, no doubt spurred by Clinton's troubles with labor, is garnering support for his low-key, low-budget campaign as election day draws near.

Wayne County Commission Chairman Arthur Blackwell and fellow Commissioner Kay Beard, D-Westland — neither a stranger to union support — have backed the one-time California governor.

"His message hasn't changed down through the years, but it's especially important now," Beard said. "We need to do more for all our people."

TSONGAS SUPPORTERS, like their candidate, are more low-key.

While Sheriff Robert Ficano appeared at a press conference with the former Massachusetts senator, he said he hasn't officially endorsed Tsongas.

"Of the three, he's the one I'm most leaning to," Ficano said. "But there are some areas where I would disagree with him like the fast-track trade agreement and the replacement of striking workers."

Chief Wayne County Circuit Judge Richard Kaufman said he'll support Tsongas at the ballot box but not on the campaign trail.

"I'm voting for him, but as a judge, I really can't endorse anyone," Kaufman said.

Buchanan's expected appearance at the Mayflower would be his major western Wayne visit of the campaign. President Bush was in Detroit Friday; his wife, Barbara, is expected to appear this afternoon at Schoolcraft College, Livonia.

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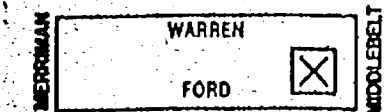
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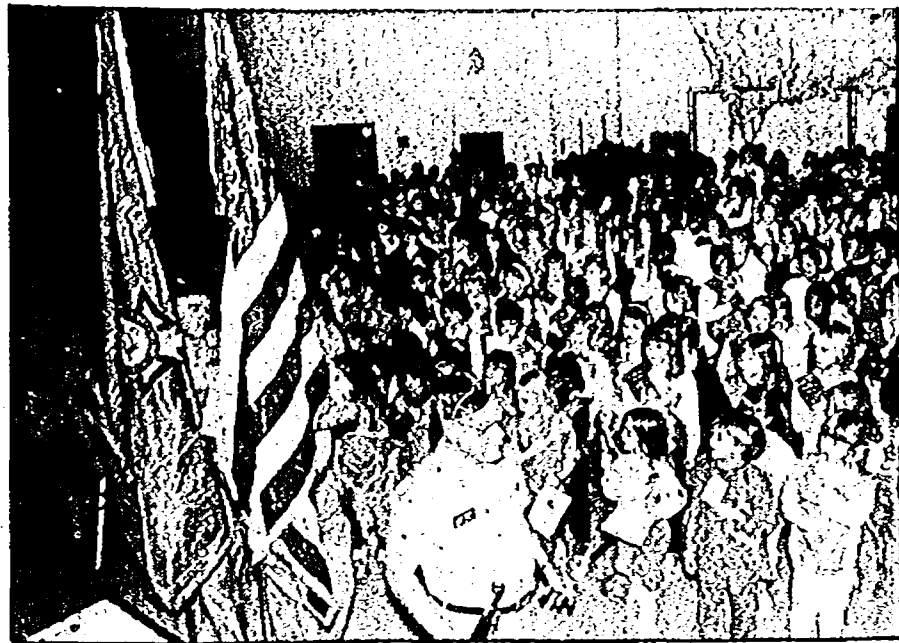

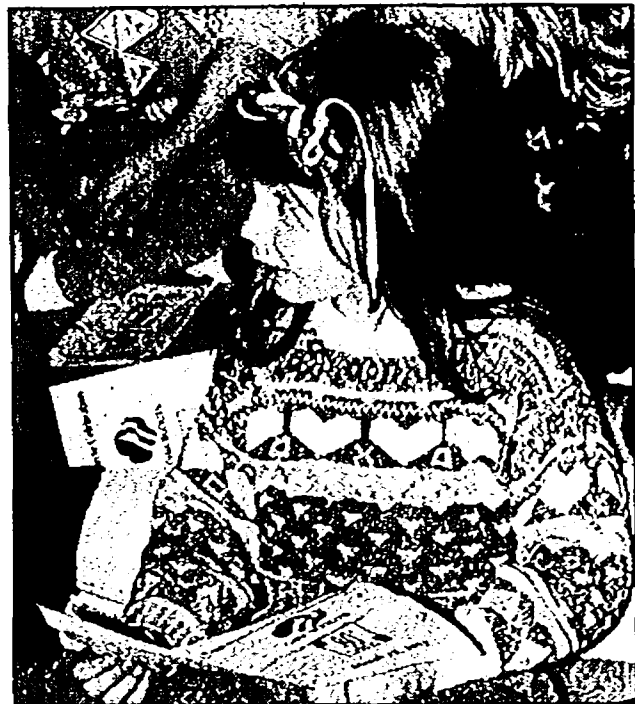
Girl Scouts mark 80th year

New state superintendent draws favorable response

Dr. Robert Schiller, the new Michigan superintendent of schools, admitted Wednesday night that local schools face "challenges and problems."

"We need to position ourselves" to attract companies and train students for the future, he told a gathering of educators from throughout Wayne County.

"Why not be the best?" he challenged the gathering of about 75 educators from throughout Wayne County attending a welcoming reception in his honor.

Thomas Svitkovich, Wayne-Westland school district deputy superintendent, said that Schiller, who was previously in eastern and southern states, may be able to bring to Michigan educators more options on solving school financial problems.

Where Schiller has worked, Svitkovich said, there is more of a reliance on sales and income taxes to support education instead of property taxes.

The new superintendent also has to give a state education department a "massive restructuring to become more clearer in its role" in relating to the state Legislature and local school districts.

Svitkovich liked Schiller's comment in calling local educators as "agents for change" in public education.

JOSEPH MARINELLI, superintendent of the Livonia school district which includes the northern section of Westland, called the problems facing Schiller and other Michigan educators "awesome."

"No single individual can solve our awesome problems," Marinelli said. "We need a united front by all members of the education community. Schiller comes across as an individual who has the interpersonal skills to bring all groups together — teachers, school boards, superintendents, PTA's and in and out-of-formula school districts — to solve our problems."

"We must be united on fiscal solutions or our legislators will continue to divide and conquer."

Schiller said that the state law which requires local districts to adopt a school improvement plan for each building shows that Michigan has the "dedication and commitment" to improve education, Schiller said.

"I will do my level best to find the resources and remove the inhibitions" that face local school districts.

"I hope to find solutions" to the problems facing education, Schiller continued. "We are the agents of change."

But he stressed that the state "can't remote-control change from Lansing."

Board to resolve varsity jacket issue

High school students in the Livonia district should learn tonight if they can wear non-athletic school awards on their school's varsity jacket.

Superintendent Joseph Marinelli, whose district includes the northern section of Westland, is expected to recommend to the board of education tonight how the varsity jacket-school letter controversy should be resolved.

Before reaching his decision, Marinelli polled students, parents and the district's three high school principals on the issue. Includes in the poll were those from Churchill, which serves the northwestern corner of Westland, and Franklin, which covers the northwestern section of the city.

OFFICIALS ALSO polled nearby districts to see how they handle school awards and letters.

They also got a legal opinion on whether the district might be violating any law for refusing to let non-athletes wear awards on the varsity jacket.

"It's not an issue worth getting into a long legal battle for," said Ken Watson, director of secondary education. "We're not anxious to go to court over the issue."

The controversy surfaced in January when members of the Churchill High Band Boosters charged the district with discrimination for only letting athletes wear awards and letters on the official school jacket.

Band Boosters president Michael Weldon and Churchill student Kristy Benz urged the board of education to change the rules so that all awards and letters can be worn on the school jacket.

"We went well beyond the issue of the marching band," Watson said. "We dealt with other things, too, things we wouldn't have done if this issue hadn't come up."

Marinelli does not have to abide by the recommendations made by Watson and the high school principals in a March 5 letter to Marinelli.

THEIR RECOMMENDATIONS include:

- Students who earn a band letter can put it on a school letter jacket.
- Make marching band an extracurricular activity instead of allowing only students taking a band class to participate.

"If a student wants to play sax in the band, he shouldn't have to take a marching band class," Watson said.

Conversely, under the recommendations, students who take the band class wouldn't have to participate in marching band.

• No letter should be awarded for a school activity that is not totally extracurricular in nature.

• Pom-pom participants should be able to earn a letter and display it on a school jacket.

• School letters should not be given for participation in the all-city orchestra.

Orchestra participants should get awards similar to those given to students in other programs which are co-curricular in nature or short term.

However, if letters are given for those programs, students earning one should be allowed to wear it on a school jacket.

"Our policy has never been that students should not be recognized, only that the recognition should come in a variety of ways," Watson said.

Watson said the controversy was "not necessarily a bad thing."

"Here we had a group of young people who followed appropriate channels to bring about change. That's not unhealthy. These kids are not apathetic. It would be hypocritical if we urged kids not to be apathetic and then acted with alarm if they did seek change."

Angry remarks that Wayne-Westland school board member Kathleen Chorbagan made about Steven Lind, a Wayne resident who wants to recall her and two other board members, could prompt a lawsuit, Lind said Friday.

In announcing she wouldn't seek re-election to the school board in June, Chorbagan lashed out at Lind and David Moranty, another of her critics, and called them "a couple of '90s KKK types."

But Lind said that, unlike Ku Klux Klan members, he and Moranty have never tried to hide their identities in voicing criticism of Chorbagan and other board members. Moranty is chairman of Wayne-Westland Citizens for Education, which has been outspoken against the district's administration and some board members.

"We have never hidden behind anything," Lind said. His group wants to recall Chorbagan and board members Leonard Posey and Andrew Splask for voting to give teachers an 11.9-percent raise over two years, despite threatened school program cuts for students.

Lind also took offense to Chorbagan's accusations that he "has told (recall) volunteers to tell the public that I have participated in immoral behavior."

Chorbagan, reading from a statement last Monday, said the recall volunteers claimed she made

MOREOVER, CHORBAGAN said, "They have told people that I stole money from the district and that I was paid by the teacher's union to vote 'yes' on the last contract."

Lind vehemently denied Chorbagan's accusations and said he may file a lawsuit against her.

In instructions that Lind handed out to recall volunteers, it's stated that helpers shouldn't get involved in name-calling or mudslinging in their quest to recall the board members, Lind said.

"We told people not to involve themselves in any issue, other than what's listed in the petition," he said. "I have written proof that this (Chorbagan's claims) did not happen."

A telephone call to Chorbagan's residence Friday afternoon reached only an answering machine.

Lind didn't say when he expects to decide whether to sue Chorbagan, a 9½-year board member.

"But I am seriously considering it," he said. "She can't go on making statements like that unless she's prepared to back them up."

Except for the name-calling, most of Chorbagan's statement was made in good taste, Lind said.

"She could have gone out with dignity and style, if she had left out the name-calling," he said.

Delegates to be chosen after Tuesday's primary

Pat Buchanan must win 33 percent of the Republican vote in Tuesday's presidential primary. That's what he'll need, under state party rules, to get any of Michigan's 72 delegates to the Aug. 17 national convention in Houston.

For Michigan labor leaders — recommending an "uncommitted" vote — the goal is 15 percent. They want a brokered convention July 13 national convention in New York City, where the state will have 147 delegates.

Those are the parties' rules. Republican voters must ask for a Republican ballot at the polls, and the request will be recorded, but they won't have to sign anything.

Democrats will have to sign an affidavit that they're Democrats.

GOV. JOHN Engler, state campaign chair for President Bush, won the 33 percent threshold rule from the Republican State Committee in February, when the party decided on a more or less "open" primary.

Buchanan has been drawing 30 percent of the vote in many states, and party leaders fear polls that show the conservative columnist drawing 33 percent here. If he's short, Bush will take the entire delegation.

Helping the cause, state Rep. Jan. Dolan, R-Farmington Hills, and a dozen other GOP women last week called on Buchanan to "publicly retract his biased and prejudiced view on women."

Dolan said Buchanan "attacked the competence and abilities of women by claiming that women are psychologically less equipped to succeed in business and government." A news release was written by Engler's staff.

Among signers was Rep. Georgina Goss, R-Northville, whose district includes Plymouth and parts of Livonia and Canton Township.

David Duke, a Louisiana legislator and former Ku Klux Klan leader, will be on the ballot but hasn't campaigned in Michigan.

HERE'S HOW the GOP will pick its national delegates:

About one-fourth of the delegation will be elected at-large at a May 30 state convention in Detroit.

Delegates from the congressional districts will be picked in district caucuses the night before. The exact procedure is up in the air because Michigan's congressional redistricting is still before a panel of three federal judges. The state is scheduled to be pared from 18 U.S. repre-

sentative to 16.

Delegates to the state convention will be elected May 19 at county conventions attended by precinct delegates elected in 1990.

Engler likely will chair the Michigan delegation to Houston.

DEMOCRATIC voters may choose between Edmund G. (Jerry) Brown of California, Gov. Bill Clinton of Arkansas, Paul Tsongas of Massachusetts, Sen. Tom Harkin of Iowa, Sen. Bob Kerrey of Nebraska; the imprisoned Lyndon LaRouche, and "uncommitted."

The real battle will be between Clinton, endorsed by former Gov. James Blanchard and the Michigan Education Association; Tsongas; and Brown, preferred by labor chieftains after Harkin quit the race, and uncommitted.

The state has no provisions for removing Kerrey's and Harkin's names, and the LaRouche turnout is expected to be minimal.

THE POLITICAL director of the state Democratic Party, Jerry Moffitt, explained how Michigan's 147 delegates will be chosen:

- 86 will be allocated to the congressional districts.
- 14 will be state members of the Democratic National Committee.
- 28 at-large delegates will be chosen by the Democratic State Central Committee May 16 in Kalamazoo.
- 17 will be party leaders and elected officials pledged to candidates.
- Two will be "add-on" unpledged delegates.

THE 86 FROM congressional districts will be allocated on the basis of the primary vote.

To be awarded any delegates, a candidate — including uncommitted — must receive 15 percent of Tuesday's vote.

On May 9, congressional district conventions will be held across the state. To attend, one must be either:

- A precinct delegate elected in 1990.
- A 1991 party member.
- A 1992 party member by March 25.

The district conventions will break into candidate caucuses to pick national convention delegates. Those who attend must sign pledges of support for that candidate.

In practice, the candidates' campaigns will approve applicants for national delegate posts.

Each congressional district will be allotted four to six national convention delegates and zero to one alternate.

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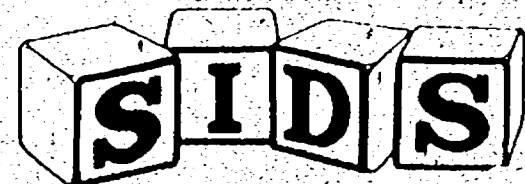

SMART's future still depends upon suburban money

SMART buses will keep running through June, 1993, but the transit service's long-term future rests with suburban taxpayers.

A short-term operating plan announced Thursday is expected to overcome \$7.7 million in current debt, and keep the Suburban Mobility Authority for Regional Transportation from incurring more debt next year.

Major SMART bus routes were to have shut down March 27.

SMART's plan also temporarily preserves Nankin Transit, a local bus service — financed through SMART — that serves people in a five-community area including Canton, Garden City and Westland.

"THIS GIVES Nankin Transit 15

more months to work on its own salvation," said Bryan Amann, the Wayne County delegate to the SMART board.

The plan includes:

- Budget cuts of \$4.3 million for 1992-93, including a wage freeze for SMART union workers. Next year's SMART operating budget will be cut 10 percent across-the-board.

- Additional savings of \$1.7 million, to be determined in 90 days among items ranging from health care to a first-ever early retirement plan.

Budget cuts range from large scale — \$326,524 from leaving currently vacant position unfilled — to small scale — \$6,000, in eliminating seminar travel and fees.

Even more fat could eventually be trimmed, said SMART opera-

"Everything we've presented is a safe estimate," said Majka, a former Garden City councilman. "I'm confident there's even more that can be saved."

Despite that, SMART officials soon expect to begin campaigning for a transit tax.

poning buying new buses, and selling SMART property in Birmingham, Bloomfield Hills and Detroit.

Both moves are expected to bring a combined \$1.45 million in savings and new revenue.

In addition, SMART will eliminate nearly \$4.5 million in what Duggan called "unnecessary reserves".

The move frees \$1 million held for self-insurance, as well as a \$3.45 million workers compensation reserve.

The \$1 million reserve fund isn't needed because of other assets already held by SMART, Duggan said. The \$3.45 million fund isn't needed, he added, because the state will already cover worker claims should SMART cease operating.

At \$47.8 million, SMART's projected 1992-93 is more than \$5.3

million less than this year's budget.

SMART officials still hope to merge with the Detroit Department of Transportation, though there have been no recent talks.

"We've been putting all our energy into this," Duggan said. Duggan, deputy Wayne County executive, has been SMART's chief officer for the past two weeks.

Not included was a proposed plan to tap an estimated \$10 million pension fund surplus.

Such a move would have required approval from the state Legislature. Former general manager James Aho, who advocated using pension fund money, resigned in a dispute with other officials.

Previously, SMART had been financed through state and federal grants, as well as bus fares.

Declining grant money and ridership prompted SMART's debt.

Right to Life presses for tougher informed consent law

A six-member House-Senate conference committee will have to give Right to Life of Michigan more of what it wants if an "informed consent" abortion bill is to become law.

Key issues will be whether a doctor (1) must show a patient enlarged pictures of fetuses and (2) read the patient a long list of bad effects of abortion.

"It won't be a long conference. You'll see the bill modified a bit," said Sen. Fred Dillingham, R-

Fowlerville, RTL supporter and member of the joint panel.

The Senate, which passed RTL's hard-line version in mid-1991, last week rejected House amendments, which RTL considered too soft.

Here's how area senators voted:
YES — Democrat George Z. Hart of Dearborn.

NO — Republican Robert Geake of Northville.

GEAKE SAID, "The bill has been very controversial and highly debated — evidence that it needs conference committee work."

"Those in favor said we should not

have to show pictures of fetuses and asked why abortion is different from other procedures.

"Abortion is unlike any other procedure in its emotional involvement by the mother and the taking of the life of the fetus. To compare abortion to other medical procedures trivializes abortion," Geake said.

Senate conferees include Republicans Dillingham and Jack Welborn of Kalamazoo, two of the upper chamber's strongest abortion foes; and Lana Pollack, D-Ann Arbor, the Senate's strongest pro-choice vote.

In a key decision, Senate majority

leader Dick Posthumus, R-Alto, bypassed pro-life Sen. John Schwarz, R-Battle Creek, who crossed over and opposed RTL's bill as "Big Brother" interference in the doctor-patient relationship. The House compromise was based largely on Schwarz's work.

House Speaker Lew Dodak, D-Birch Run, who regularly votes for

curbs on abortion, picked Curtis Hertel, D-Detroit; Jessie Dalman, R-Holland; and Maxine Berman, D-Southfield.

Hertel is considered pro-life but voted for the House compromise. Dalman stuck with RTL and voted against it. Berman, like Pollack, is vocally pro-choice and floor-managed the House compromise.

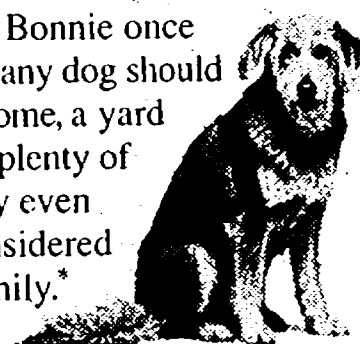

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Worker retraining is key issue facing state, says Clinton

Gov. Bill Clinton said he's the only presidential contender to support a plan requiring employers to spend 1 percent of payroll on training their existing workforces.

And the Arkansas Democrat, leading the polls prior to Tuesday's primary, said, "I would like to have (former Michigan Gov.) Jim Blanchard in some capacity in my administration."

The interview, during a drive between campaign stops Friday, concentrated on retraining the existing workforce, a key issue in Michigan as General Motors prepares to close plants with 9,000 workers.

"No matter what government policies we have, within the workforce we must mobilize for change," Clinton said.

"In America, companies spend a little more than 1 percent, on average, for training and education on average. But it's skewed. We spend 70 percent of our money on the top 10 percent in each corporation.

"Our European and Japanese competitors, who have higher rates of growth than we do now, spend more down and down the line, and try to put more decision-making in front-line workers.

"I think we ought to give adequate incentives to business to spend it, and if they don't I would ask them to put into a National Skills Development Center."

THE IDEA comes from "America's Choice: High Skills or Low Wages," by the National Center on Education and the Economy. That bipartisan panel was headed by former Labor Secretaries William Brock (Republican) and Ray Marshall (Democratic). One member was Arkansas first lady Hillary Clinton.

Companies that didn't do their own workforce training would be charged for it by the government.

Clinton called it "the best thing ever done in this country for education, and he 'absolutely' supports the same group's idea of national education performance standards for all students.

"When we drafted the national education goals, we asked for standards in five subjects with the option of adding more on, with reliable national examinations at fourth, eighth and 12th grades."

ON BLANCHARD, a key Michigan supporter, Clinton said, "I would very much like to have him involved. He's a very gifted man.

"When we worked together, most people thought he was one of the premier innovators among the governors.

"He and I were confronted, when

we were elected in 1982, with states that had very depressed economies; no national strategy to revitalize. So we thought of things we (states) could do.

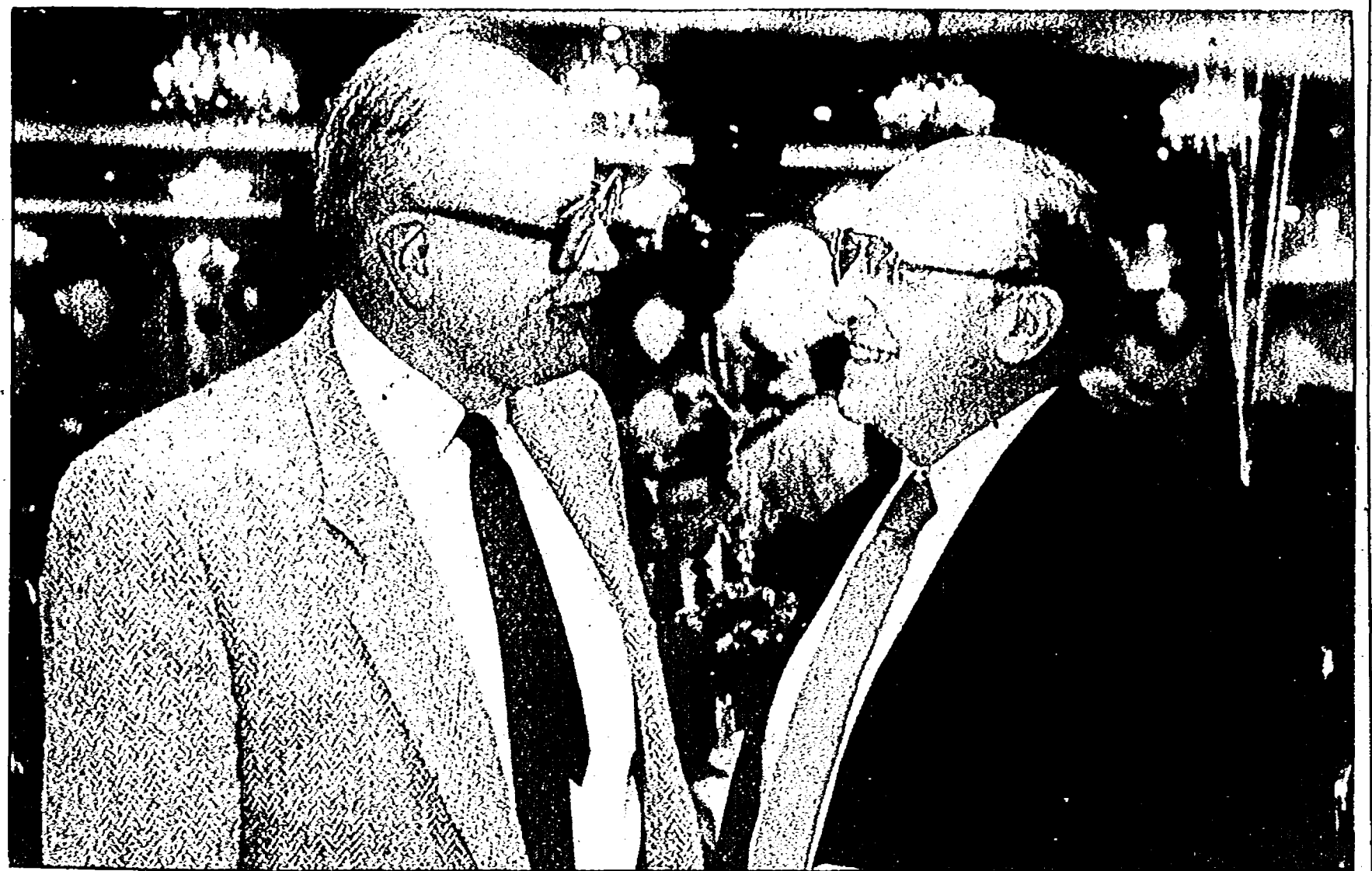
"Michigan has a very good skills development program, initiated in the Blanchard administration; a very good venture capital program; and a terrific college savings program, initiated in the Blanchard administration."

ON OTHER topics, Clinton said:

• He would give communities and regions flexibility in using federal transportation funds for mass transit, including construction and maintenance of rapid rail transit. "One of the things I'd like to see done, as we pare down the defense budget, is increase our investment in rapid transit — high-speed rail. More and more people will want to use it."

• Arkansas voters put "right to work" — a measure abhorrent to organized labor in Michigan — into the constitution decades ago, "and they have reaffirmed it recently. My own position is we don't want an anti-labor or anti-union administration because we don't want to give the impression we want a hard-work, low-wage economy, which is happening to 60 percent of our people (nationally)."

• He dislikes most proposed constitutional amendments except perhaps an executive line-item veto. Michigan and Arkansas have such a veto, and President Bush wants one. Clinton said, "It would add some discipline to our spending process," adding he uses it up to 20 times per legislative session.

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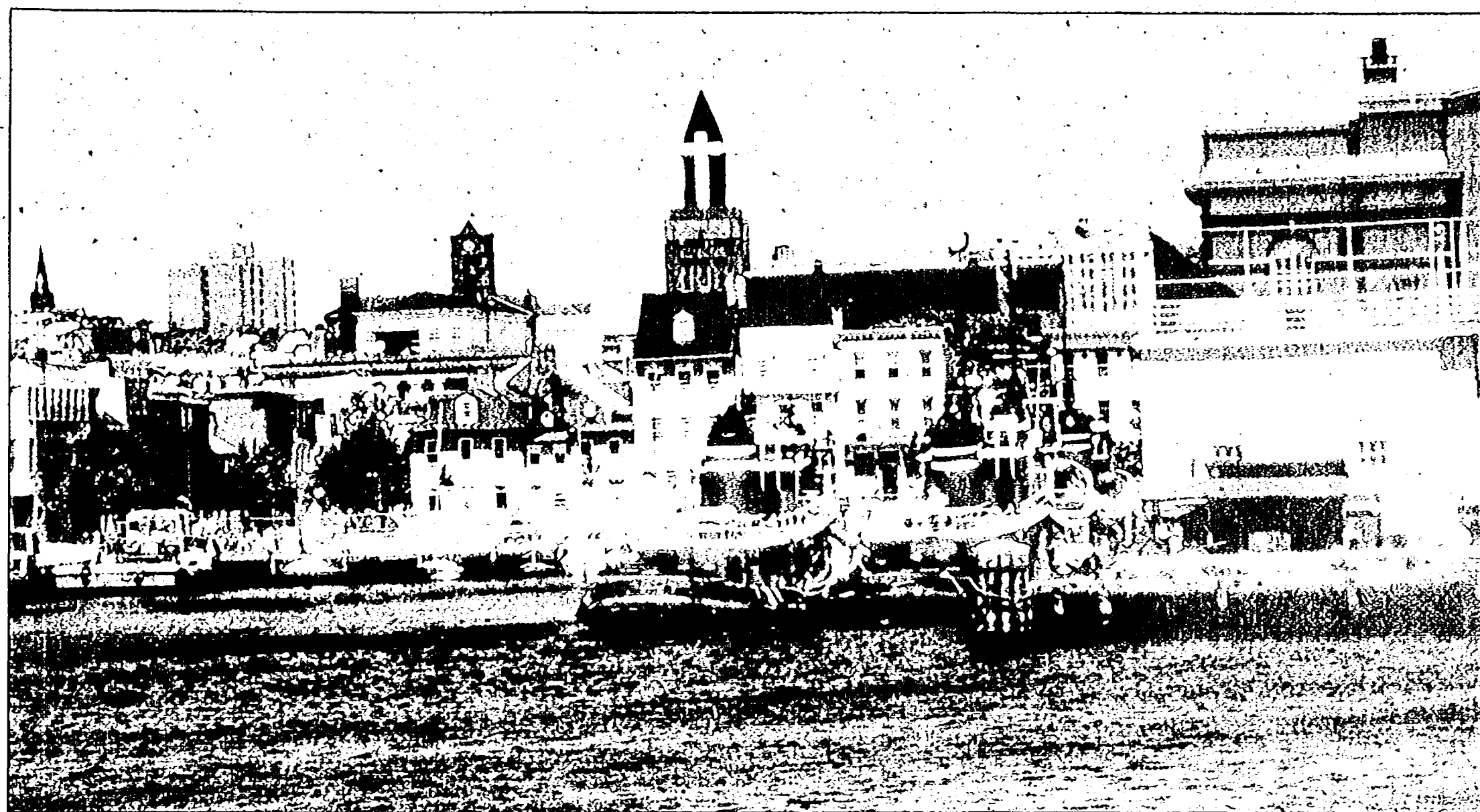

Babe Ruth's hometown sports new stadium

Baltimore will revel in the sporting life this spring, from the traditional running of the Maryland steeplechases to the Orioles' first season in their new ballpark at Camden Yards.

Oriole Park may not be the house that Ruth built, but its center field is the site of the house where the Babe lived. In sports-crazed Baltimore (Ruth's hometown), that's nearly as good.

The new \$105.4 million ballpark is just a few blocks west of the Inner Harbor on the west side of the city.

The opening of the ballpark will be marked by a parade down Pratt Street through the heart of

downtown at noon, April 5, and the inauguration, on April 6, of the first leg of metropolitan Baltimore's \$446.3 million Central Light Rail Line — a 13-mile section linking suburban Timonium on the city's north side with the downtown stadium.

The old-fashioned design of the 48,000-seat stadium — predominantly brick with a distinct turn-of-the-century style — incorporates a landmark Baltimore & Ohio Railroad warehouse that will provide office space for the ballclub and the Maryland Stadium Authority.

Architects nationwide have praised the new ballpark for its attempt to mesh with the "urban fabric" of downtown Baltimore.

Oriole Park is only a short walk from Federal Hill and Otterbein, two of the city's oldest and most historic neighborhoods. The districts are warrens of renovated late 18th- and early 19th-century brick row houses, narrow streets paved with Belgian blocks and lined with brick sidewalks.

Federal Hill, much of which is on the National Register of Historic Places, is built around teeming Cross Street Market, one of the city's

most active public markets, dating from 1846.

The hill from which the neighborhood takes its name, a Colonial-era observation point, offers a stunning view of the Inner Harbor, where an array of Tall Ships — sailing vessels from around the world — will be arriving throughout the spring and summer months.

SPORTING EVENTS

Tickets have long been sold out for the opening day at Oriole Park on April 6, when the Orioles play host to the Cleveland Indians.

However, baseball fans still have a chance to witness the first ball game in the new park when the Orioles meet the New York Mets at 3:05 p.m. on April 3 in an exhibition game. Tickets have yet to be sold. For more information call (410) 685-9800.

If you just want to see Oriole Park it will be open on April 2 from 11:30 a.m. to 2 p.m. Bring your own lunch.

On April 5, at 8:30 a.m., an 8-kilometer road race, limited to the first 2,000 runners who sign up, will follow the nearly 5-mile route from Memorial Stadium to Oriole Park. For more information call (410) 882-5454 or write, with self-addressed

stamped envelope, to 8K Home Run, P.O. Box 11394, Baltimore, Md. 21239.

On April 5, at 2 p.m. fans will be allowed to watch an Orioles workout in the new ballpark. Tickets will be \$3. On April 8, the Orioles will play their first night game, against the Indians, at 7:35 p.m.

The Babe Ruth Birthplace and Baltimore Orioles Museum (home of the Maryland Baseball Hall of Fame), a few blocks west of Oriole Park at 216 Emory St., is open from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. from April to October, but hours will be extended on game days until 7 p.m.

Admission to the museum is \$4; children, \$1.50; senior citizens, \$2.50. For more information call (410) 727-1539.

Though baseball may be the focus of this year's sporting season, no event harkens back to the cultural and social roots of the Chesapeake Bay region more than the annual spring running of the steeplechases in the hunt country north of the city.

The three major steeplechases of the season are held each year on the final three Saturdays in April — culminating with the running of the Maryland Hunt Cup, which horsemen regard as one of the most

grueling events of its kind on either side of the Atlantic.

Quebec's cuisine has new flavor

Beans and lard. Pea soup. Meat pies and maple syrup. The traditional cooking of Quebec was hearty lumberjack fare — and a cholesterol nightmare.

Since Expo '67 attracted French chefs and Escoffier cuisine to Montreal, Quebec's cuisine has been the butt of endless jokes.

A film starring the slapstick dou Ding et Dong (the Quebecois Laurel and Hardy) has the comedians ordering a pickle pizza. The joke was no doubt inspired by the Quebecois love of chunky homemade ketchups and relishes to lather the tourtiere — the ground-pork-and-beef pie that is the staple of any traditional meal.

In truth Quebec's gastronomy has two extremes. At one end are the fatty, sugary excesses served up in the cabanes a sucre or sucreries (maple-sugar shacks) in the spring. Specialties are fritters dribbled with maple syrup, fried eggs in maple syrup, maple-sweetened pork and beans, fried maple-smoked ham glazed with syrup, and oreilles de crisse (ear-shaped slivers of salted pork rind crisp-fried in oil — sometimes mispronounced as oreilles de Christ, or Christ's ears).

For dessert it's more maple-mania: maple sugar pie, maple pudding, molded maple sugar candy, miniature wafer cones filled with maple butter and maple taffy — boiling syrup poured over a long trough of fresh snow.

At the other end of the culinary spectrum is Quebec's contemporary cuisine, which uses fresh local products rather than the post-Expo imports from France.

As high-tech transportation and communications blur regional differences the world over, Quebec's

new generation of young chefs has banded together to assure the evolution of a distinctly Quebecois cuisine (independent from France and California) celebrating the differences of the province's 12 regions.

To be sure, Quebec's cuisine was and is still based on wild and domestic meat and game, fish and seafood.

The first settlers from Normandy and Brittany flavored their dishes with cinnamon and cloves, or herbes saalees (parsley, onions, parsnips, savory and celery leaves preserved in coarse salt), and left them to simmer or bake for the day.

Today's cuisine features leaner meat and a variety of vegetables that leaves the bean and potato in the dust.

The two culinary extremes are embodied in two restaurants: La Binerie Mont-Royal, or The Beanery, the cultural landmark celebrated in the Quebecois film based on Yves Beauchemin's novel of Montreal street life, "Le Matou" ("The Alley-cat"), and the uberge Clementine in the picturesque and now infamous (post-Mohawk rebellion) village of Oka, on the Lac de Deux Montagnes at the confluence of the Ottawa and St. Lawrence Rivers.

La Binerie's 50-year history proves there's abiding comfort in a bowl of beans. This family-owned, 18-seat restaurant serves up 27 tons of feves au lard ("les petites delicieuses") a year. The beans are simmered with pork for 18 hours over a low fire in a brick oven.

The nostalgic menu is hefty enough in calories to deforest the Laurentians, although owner Fernand Groulx stresses that all meats are defatted before use.

Some dishes are old Quebec favorites: ragout de pattes et de boulettes (meatball and pig's feet stew); coeur de veau (sliced veal heart with pota-

toes and carrots); sandwich au lard and lard sale froid (salted pork boiled in pea soup); baked beans with sausage; homemade pickles; and sticky-sweet puddings and fruit pies.

The prices at La Binerie are reasonable: about \$5, including dessert, before tip and federal and provincial tax of over 15 percent. All prices have been converted to United States dollars calculating the dollar at \$1.06 Canadian.

The new cuisine is well-represented at Auberge Clementine, a cozy 125-year-old waterfront cottage with

gaslights and lace curtains an hour's drive from Montreal. The chef, Michel Beaulneq, and his wife and pastry chef, Louise, marry tradition with invention in the manner of "la Cuisine renouvele du Quebec" ("the renovated cuisine of Quebec").

A la-carte prices at Clementine add up steeply: from \$4.75 to \$16 for appetizers, \$17 to \$26.50 for entrees and \$5.70 for desserts. But the seven-course menu gastronomique is a sumptuous bargain at \$50 a person, and two people ordering different selections can sample a variety of tastes and textures.

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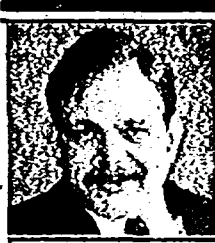

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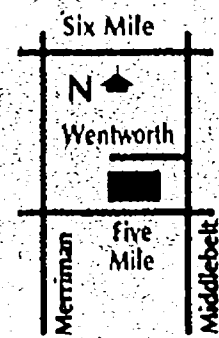
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Campaign heats up, Niki Tsongas fills in at area fund-raiser

Approaching the Presidential Primary in Michigan, candidates of every stripe made their pitches to ministers, auto workers, and the faithful at \$1,000 a plate hotel banquets.

Crisscrossing metro-Detroit were Democrats Jerry Brown, Bill Clinton and Paul Tsongas and Republicans Pat Buchanan and George Bush. Some sent surrogates, with vice president Dan Quayle visiting, too.

Brown's campaign got a boost last week when he picked up support from Michigan Teamsters and the International Union of Electrical Workers. Other labor leaders say they are attracted to Brown because of his record as governor of California but they stopped short of endorsing him.

In a brief press conference last Thursday at Detroit City Airport, Brown criticized Clinton's worker safety record and called for economic justice.

Although he stopped short of making any predictions in Tuesday's race, Brown said he was hoping to hear "a roar from Michigan voters."

Tsongas was the only candidate who planned to visit the Republican stronghold of Birmingham-Bloomfield this week, but his plans hit a snag on Wednesday when his plane got stuck in the mud at a Chicago airport.

Tsongas, who has been quoted as saying "if you don't have charisma, marry it," was represented at a Bloomfield Hills home fund-raiser

by his "charismatic" wife of 22 years, Niki.

Many guests said they wanted to learn more about what Tsongas stands for, others have already climbed on his bandwagon.

Dorothy Mahlin of Southfield measures Tsongas as honest, straightforward and with integrity. "What's really important is that he understands the issues."

"Why does a conservative support Paul Tsongas?" Mahlin said. "After reviewing the candidates, I find myself not against anybody but for him. He's pro choice, is supportive of Israel and would take the nuclear missiles out of Iraq."

Bloomfield Hills resident Diane Scholnick said she came to the tea "to be exposed and to learn so I can vote with knowledge."

Joyce Blum of Southfield is convinced "it's time for a change. I know the Tsongas' are interested in changes in the health care field and my husband is a pediatrician. This is important to us."

Niki and Paul Tsongas live in Lowell, Mass., where his home-state victory was celebrated the previous evening. They are the parents of three young children: 10, 14, and 18. "We try hard to make them feel a part of all this," she said.

An attorney, Niki Tsongas, went back to law school when her husband, stricken with lymphoma, declined to seek re-election to the Senate in 1986, earning her law degree from Boston College in 1988. "Paul's bone marrow transplant was in 1986

and he's in good health now. He's a better man and better candidate because of what he's been through.

"Paul can build coalitions and lead our country," she said. "We can't get a handle on our economic problems unless we find a way to create national wealth."

She said her husband is pro-choice, pro-environment and pro-civil rights. "And he has no anti-business bias. His national health plan was called viable by Time, Newsweek and other media. It calls for universal coverage including preventive care, with government setting the standards and maybe subsidizing."

"To Paul education is the key to economic recovery and he would invest heavily in vocational training. He believes there should be financial aid for everyone who wants to go to college."

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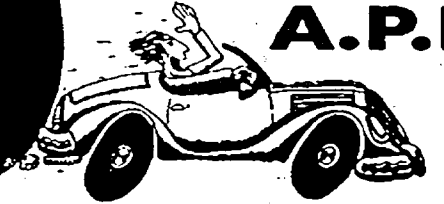
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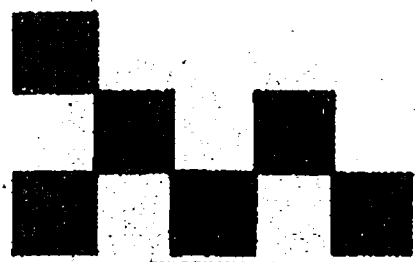

Potatoes stretch paychecks

The closest I can come to being Irish is the fact that while living Downriver, I was a "regular" at Patty's Pub.

The Janes Gang nevrly really seemed to get into the Irish spirit while I was growing up. We never taped cardboard cutout shamrocks to our front door two weeks before March 17.

As a matter of fact, we kids would stand in awe while the folks at Cahallan's Drug Store went wild painting all their windows green, and on St. Patrick's Day, throwing an in-store party that would have rivaled a Janes Gang New Year's.

I CAN remember one St. Patrick's Day, however, that wasn't ended in the traditional corned beef and cabbage cooked to death in the Nesco roaster. I must have been around 14 or so and remember dad not going to work for a few weeks because of something called a "layoff."

Being a staunch union man, dad rarely complained, but I can remember a few months where dinner consisted simply of vegetables and potatoes.

I can remember a tummy warming potato soup and bread dinner, another with simply scalloped potatoes and stewed tomatoes put up from the year priors' garden, and on Friday's when meat was never allowed in Catholic homes, potato pancakes.

Potatoes were first grown on a large scale in Ireland hence the name — Irish Fótato. It was during a famine that the spuds were found to be plentiful and easy to grow, especially in the moist, sandy soil.

Many Europeans viewed potatoes negatively because of their familiarity with the "nightshade family" (grown underground) which during the 16th century was known as "poison."

It really didn't help that there was no mention of potatoes in the Bible either.

POTATOES WERE first brought to North America in 1719 by Irish immigrants. As in Europe, North Americans were slow to adapt and potatoes were not grown on a large scale until the depression era of the 19th century.

Since 1950, the consumption of fresh potatoes has declined steadily while the use of processed potatoes has risen. Now more than half the total crop is processed.

Potatoes are used in starches and flour, canned soups, stews and hash, frozen food entrees, frozen French fries, dehydrated boxes, and made into chips and shoe strings.

Sometimes when cutting into a delectable, steamy spud, you will notice a slightly green tinge to the skin or a "hollow heart" or "blackheart" somewhere throughout the spud.

"Greening" occurs when the spuds are exposed to natural or artificial light for long periods of time. You will usually notice this for potatoes "held over" after the growing season is long over.

"HOLLOWHEART" IS the formation of a hollow cavity or hole inside the spud and usually requires only minor trimming.

"Blackheart" is a rotten spot that is easily trimmed and should be discarded.

High quality control by wholesalers, shippers and retailers make these problems few and far between.

Don't buy or use potatoes that are very green, wrinkled or spoiled because they can contain harmful amounts of a toxic alkaloid called Solanine.

Never eat the potato "greens" from the plant, and make sure to trim off all sprouts as they also contain this toxic alkaloid.

Potatoes are great family meal alternatives, and in the event of a budget crunch, great paycheck extenders.

'The Fry'

Friends reminisce about their favorite homeland foods

All that's lacking is the soft glow of a peat fire: Three Irish ladies chatting amiably over tea and scones, brown bread and thick-cut Irish marmalade, occasionally bursting into

hearty laughter.

They're American citizens now. Kitty Moran Heinzman, formerly of Westport County Mayo, now of Livonia, pours black Irish tea into translucent Belleek cups for guests Rosaline O'Sullivan Brennan, a West Bloomfield resident born in County Kerry, and Anne Curley Poppe.

Poppe came from Tipperary to the states seven years ago to work as a nanny, and met and married Jeff Poppe. The couple lives in Redford.

AS SO often happens when friends get together, the conversation turns to food. Someone mentions "The Fry."

"Every Irish person knows what 'The Fry' means," said Heinzman, slathering a raisiny scone with marmalade. "The classic Irish breakfast is eggs, brown bread, rashers (bacon) and sausages. The sausages are of two kinds: black pudding (what you call blood sausage), and white sausage, very fat and mealy. These sausages are what we call 'The Fry.'"

Obviously, cholesterol is not a ma-

job issue in Ireland.

"As far as I know, the only store in the States that imports these sausages is Irish Imports, in Dearborn. The owner, Jack Derrick, is from Westport, my hometown."

Anne Poppe speaks lovingly of "The Fry," also. "I go back home once a year, and I bring enough sau-

sage back to fill the freezer. That's all I eat for breakfast for three months after I return. My husband won't touch it."

ROSALINE BRENNAN recalls that Ash Wednesday and Good Friday were "Black Days," gastronomically speaking, in Ireland.

"On the black days, we had black

tea or coffee, no cream or sugar, no butter on our bread, and no meat. We had colcannon for dinner: Boiled new potatoes, mashed with chives, salt and pepper, lots of butter, baked until the top was light brown. That was our dinner on Black Days. (Dinner the main meal, is traditionally served at 12:30 p.m. in Ireland).

In Westport, recalls Heinzman, another potato dish, boxty was a staple during the six weeks of Lent.

"We only had meat once a day, if at all, and for the evening meal we often had boxty."

Heinzman's daughter, Elizabeth, is eager to learn Irish cooking, but traditional cookery is likely to rely on "dabs" and "pinches," and is difficult to write down in exact terms.

"I do love American potatoes," said Heinzman. "Especially the Idahoes. We don't have them in Ireland."

In the American mind, two items are generally associated with Irish cooking — corned beef and cabbage, and Irish soda bread.

All three of the ladies are quick to point out that there's no such thing as corned beef in Ireland — the authentic Irish dish is Irish ham and cabbage.

"In Kerry, ham and cabbage is a traditional meal," said Brennan. "Corned beef is the closest you can come to meaty, salty, Irish ham here in the States."

"THE DISH I most associate with home is ham and cabbage," said Poppe. "My mother made it twice a week, and you could smell it as soon as you walked in the door. I hated it."

So much for nostalgia! Whole meal soda bread, commonly called "brown bread," is a true Irish staple, served at every meal. A slightly sweeter version is made

Irish spirits are not blarney

Who invented the green beer served on St. Patrick's Day? Not the Irish. There are only two Irish beers (and they are not green) readily available across the United States. They are Harp Lager and Guinness Stout.

Harp Lager is amber-golden in color with intense barley aromas. It's a medium-weight brew that's fully flavored with a solid finish. Guinness Stout is a very dark, very malty tasting ale. Both the flavor and color come from the addition of roasted barley to the brew. Its appeal is the refreshing, slightly bitter finish.

The term whiskey is Gaelic in origin and there's no doubt that the Irish make some of the most distinctive. There is a common misconception that Irish whiskey is a potato whiskey. The Irish do refer to moonshine as poteen, but this word refers to the small, easily dismantled pot still, not potatoes.

Similar to Scotch whisky, Irish whiskey is distilled from a fermented mash of grains such as malted and unmalted barley, corn, rye, wheat and oats. By Irish law, it must be aged for a minimum of five years in previously used cooperage (such as sherry casks).

HOWEVER, IT is usually aged for seven or eight years and up to 12 years or 15 years for the heavier distillates requiring extended time to achieve roundness, and the essential smoothness.

Prestige Irish whiskeys are pot still single malts with a small amount of single grain whiskey added to enhance the malt character. They are distilled three times as compared to the double distillation used to make Scotch whisky.

Since 1608, in the small village of Bushmills, Ireland, the art of whiskey distilling has flourished in the Old

Bushmills Distillery, home of both Black Bush and Bushmills Irish whiskeys. While they have the same home, they are different and appeal to different audiences.

If you unfamiliar with either, our recommendation is to start with Bushmills. Drink it neat in a snifter. It's lighter and gentler with an elegant, finesseful finish. Once you've gained some experience, try Black Bush served the same way.

You'll notice the bigger, bolder aromas and flavors, many of which originate in the hand-picked sherry casks used during the aging year. If you like cognac, armagnac or single malt scotches, you'll take to Black Bush immediately.

ENHANCE THE aroma appreciation of both of these whiskeys with a few drops of water added to the snifter after the whiskey has been poured. Irish whiskeys may also be served on the rocks.

The big difference in taste between Scotch whisky and Irish whiskey stems from the fact that in Scotland the barley is dried over peat. The smoky or peaty character of Scotch whisky is absent in Irish whiskey.

Irish Mist is a blend of spicy-flavored Irish whiskey and heather honey liqueur from Tulloch Mhor. In 1692, the tale goes, the original recipe was lost during an exodus of warriors. Some time later, it was discovered in Austria and returned to Ireland.

Today, Irish Creams originating in Ireland, are very popular as after-dinner pours. Fresh cream is blended with whiskey and stabilized so that it does not need refrigeration on the shelf.

Bailey's is the original Irish Cream. After it was first released, it was so popular that new cream liqueurs

tional 15 minutes.

For a sweeter white bread, use all white flour and add an egg, 1/4 cup sugar and raisins. Non-purists can add walnuts or chocolate chips.

were developed. They were made with imported spirits, mixed with American cream and bottled in the United States.

Besides Bailey's, there's Saint Brendan's, Emmets, Carolans and O'Darby. Our favorite for its excellent chocolate malt, white chocolate, and toasted coconut character is Saint Brendan's, easily recognized in the flagon-shaped bottle.

"Ireland sober is Ireland free!" James Joyce wrote. While this column speaks only of the Irish in terms of their famous alcoholic products,

with white flour and raisins are often added to it.

"For myself, I prefer the plain brown bread," said Heinsman, "But my mother gets up every morning of her life, builds a fire in the stove and bakes white soda bread for breakfast. She has an electric stove, but she says it tastes better baked in a wood stove. It must agree with her

— she's 83 years old and still working full time in the Westport Court House."

Everybody agrees that there's no salmon in the world like Irish salmon. Brennan's son, Kevin, executive chef at the Orchard Lake Country Club, explains why: "It's partly because of the fresh, clean, cold water, and partly because the salmon get a real workout when they go up-

stream. They're firm and lean — there's no fat left on them." (A cousin, Michael Connerly, is executive chef at the Bloomfield Hills Country Club.)

"It's the way it's cooked," said Rosaline Brennan. "We poach salmon in milk first, and then broil it for a few minutes. The milk removes the fish taste, and it doesn't dry out under the broiler because it's already cooked."

"To anyone coming from another country, the food available here is like a miracle," said Heinsman, as the others nod in agreement. "I'll never forget the first item I saw — a half gallon of Stroh's ice cream — I just couldn't believe it was ice cream, there was so much. I've been here 30 years, and I never have gotten over just walking into a fruit market. I never take it for granted."

MOMMA JANES' HEARTY POTATO SOUP

1 pound potatoes, peeled and cubed
1 large onion, chopped fine
1 small clove garlic, minced fine
2 quarts chicken broth or bouillon salt and white pepper
dash Tabasco or other hot sauce
1 cup milk
1/4 cup flour or cornstarch
Place the potatoes, onions and garlic in a large saucepan and cover with broth. Bring to a boil, reduce

heat and simmer until potatoes are tender when pierced with a fork. Stir in salt and pepper and hot sauce and correct taste as you prefer. In a separate bowl, whisk together milk and flour until a paste is formed. Whisk into hot soup and continue cooking over low heat until soup is thickened and cook for about 5 minutes. Taste again and correct seasonings if necessary.

VERMOUTH STUFFED POTATOES

4 large baking potatoes
4 tablespoons butter
1/4 cup heavy cream
1/4 cup vermouth

1 tablespoon minced parsley
Lightly grease the potato skins with oil. Bake as usual, until tender. Slice off top and scoop out pulp, being careful not to rip the skin. Mash the pulp with remaining ingredients and mix well. Stuff the skins with the mixture and sprinkle with paprika. Bake 30 minutes at 325 degrees.

IRLANDAISE

(serves 4)

(Great with leftover mashed potatoes!)

6-8 peeled potatoes for mashing
6 tablespoons butter
dash salt and pepper

1/4 cup heavy cream
1/4 cup finely chopped green onion
2 cups finely shredded green cabbage

From the potatoes, butter, seasonings and cream, make enough mashed potatoes for 4, allowing for seconds. Add the cream slowly as you may not need it all. Mix in the green onions, cover the pot and keep warm. Separately cook the cabbage in boiling water for 10 minutes. Do not overcook; cabbage should be crisp. Drain it well and stir into the potato mixture, mixing well. Serve at once.

Whole grain bread rich in fiber

AP — Load up on fiber-rich whole grains by slicing into a hearty home-baked yeast bread. For this easy twisted loaf, you can buy oat flour at a health food store or make your own. To make it, grind rolled oats in your blender or food processor until you have a coarse powder. You can use the oat flour in other baked recipes by substituting it for no more than one-third of the all-purpose flour specified.

OAT AND WHOLE-WHEAT LOAF

3 to 3 1/2 cups whole-wheat flour
1 package active dry yeast
1 1/2 cups warm water (120 degrees F to 130 degrees F)
2 tablespoons cooking oil
2 tablespoons honey or molasses
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 cup oat flour
Milk (optional)
Rolled oats (optional)

minutes. Stir in the oat flour and as much of the remaining whole-wheat flour as you can.

On lightly floured surface, knead in enough remaining whole-wheat flour to make a smooth and elastic, moderately stiff dough, about 6 to 8 minutes. Shape into ball. Place in a greased bowl; turn once. Cover; rise until double, about 1 1/2 hours.

Punch the dough down and divide in half. Cover; let rest for 10 minutes. Roll each half into a 12-inch-

long rope. Twist the ropes together three times; moisten and seal ends. Or shape both halves into one loaf. Place in a greased 8x4x2-inch loaf pan. Cover; let rise until double, about 30 to 45 minutes. Brush with milk and top with rolled oats, if desired.

Bake in a 375-degree F oven about 35 minutes or until loaf sounds hollow when tapped. If necessary, cover with foil the last 10 minutes to prevent overbrowning. Remove from

pan. Cool. Makes 1 loaf (16 slices).

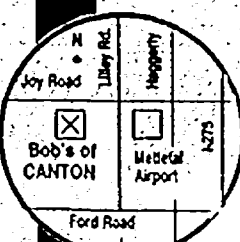

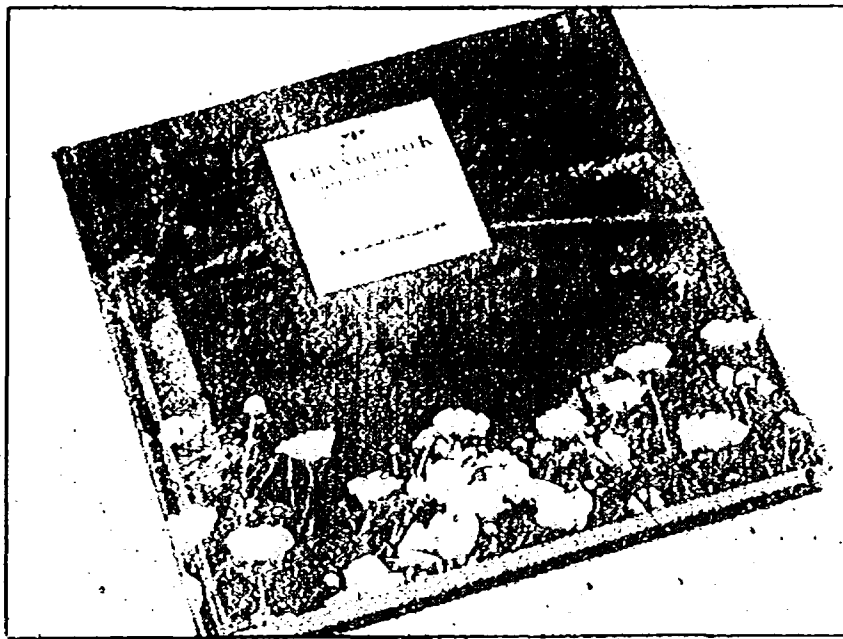

Make your own turkey sausage

AP — When you buy breakfast sausage, you may find that up to 80 percent of its calories come from fat. Fortunately, you can skip much of that fat, without missing out on sizzling sausage texture and flavor, by making your own turkey sausage patties. This sausage recipe uses the leanest turkey meat of all, skinless breast, so only 12 percent of the calories are fat calories. To make sure you're starting with really low-fat ground turkey, ask your butcher to grind the turkey breast meat for you.

TURKEY-APPLE SAUSAGE

- 1 egg white
- 1/4 cup soft bread crumbs
- 1/4 cup finely chopped peeled apple
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon ground sage
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 1/2 pound ground raw turkey breast or lean ground raw turkey

In a medium mixing bowl beat the egg white slightly with a fork. Stir in bread crumbs, apple, salt, sage and pepper. Add ground turkey, mix well. Shape into eight small patties, about 2 1/2 inches in diameter.

Place sausage patties on the unheated rack of a broiler pan. Broil 4 to 5 inches from the heat for 4 minutes. Turn and broil for 4 to 5 minutes more or until no longer pink. Pat sausage patties with paper towels. Makes 4 servings.

CAROLYN HASKINS, Executive Chef for the Townsend Hotel in Birmingham, had lots of good tips. She recommends using kosher salt and baking on parchment paper, it helps with cleanup.

"The secret to chopping garlic and shallots is to put a little salt on the board so they don't jump all over the board," she said. To keep the board from sliding, wet a towel and make a towel nest. Rest the board on top of the towel.

When she garnishes foods, Haskins

always garnishes in odd numbers 1, 3 or 5 for example.

"Unless you make something really awful, if your recipe doesn't turn out, make it into something else. Be creative, use the recipes as a guide," said Haskins.

IF SOMETHING is too salty, add lemon juice said Elwin Greenwald of Elwin's Tu-Go in Royal Oak. When he kneads dough he uses the heel of his hand.

Gadgets like food processors save time in the kitchen, but Greenwald offers this advice, "always do a recipe the first time by hand so you'll know how it's supposed to look."

from the seminar, garlic soup, which was prepared by Rick Halberg of R.I.K.'S in West Bloomfield. The recipe is for one gallon, you can reduce it for less. The soup is creamy, and very flavorful.

GARLIC SOUP

(Yields about one gallon)
6 ozs. unsalted butter

3 pounds coarsely chopped white onions
70 to 90 cloves whole peeled garlic
5 ozs. French bread (crust removed and diced)

1 1/2 quarts chicken broth (defatted)
1/4 gallon cream
Sachet bag with one bay leaf, 10 sprigs of parsley, and six sprigs of thyme

salt and pepper to taste

Melt butter in a five-quart pot and add onion and garlic, saute until lightly browned. Add chicken stock, bread and sachet bag. Bring to a boil and simmer for about one hour.

Remove sachet bag, puree and add cream. Season with salt and pepper. Adjust consistency, if necessary, with stock or cream and check seasoning. Garnish with crispy shallot rings or chopped parsley.

Thicken soups with pureed vegetables for less fat

AP — Creamy soups taste velvety rich and thick, but they can also score high on the fat chart. The good news is that you can still create smooth, thick and flavorful soups that are also low in fat. The secret is to thicken them with pureed vegetables instead of the traditional butter sauce and/or cream. Squash and Apple Soup is good served as an appetizer or as a sandwich go-along. It blends the flavors of carrot, onion, squash or pumpkin with apple juice

and ginger. Low-fat milk substitutes for the cream.

SQUASH AND APPLE SOUP

- 1/2 cup chopped onion
- 1 small carrot, sliced (about 1/2 cup)
- 1 1/4 cups apple cider or apple juice
- 1 teaspoon instant chicken bouillon granules
- 1 teaspoon lemon juice
- 1/4 teaspoon white pepper
- 1/4 teaspoon ground ginger
- 2 cups cooked, mashed acorn squash

or one 16-ounce can pumpkin
1 cup low-fat milk
Plain low-fat yogurt or reduced-calorie dairy sour cream (optional)
Snipped chives (optional)

In a large saucepan cook onion and carrot in apple cider or juice, covered, about 12 minutes or until very tender. Do not drain. Add bouillon granules, lemon juice, pepper and ginger.

Transfer the carrot mixture to a blender container or food processor bowl. Add mashed squash; cover and blend or process until smooth. Return mixture to saucepan; add milk. Bring to boiling, stirring constantly. Reduce heat; cover and simmer for 5 to 10 minutes or until flavors are blended, stirring once or twice. If desired, top each serving with yogurt or sour cream and chives. Makes 4 to 6 side-dish servings.

Note: To cook squash on the range:

Wash, quarter and remove seeds from two 1-pound acorn squash. Place squash in a large saucepan with 1 cup water. Bring to boiling; reduce heat. Cover and simmer for 20 to 25 minutes or until squash is tender. Drain.

Microwave Instructions: Wash, halve, remove seeds and prick skin of squash. In a 12x7 1/2x2-inch microwave-safe dish, place squash halves, skin side up; add 3 tablespoons water. Cover with plastic

wrap; turn back corner to vent. Cook, covered, on 100 percent power (high) for 12 to 15 minutes or until tender, rearranging once. Drain.

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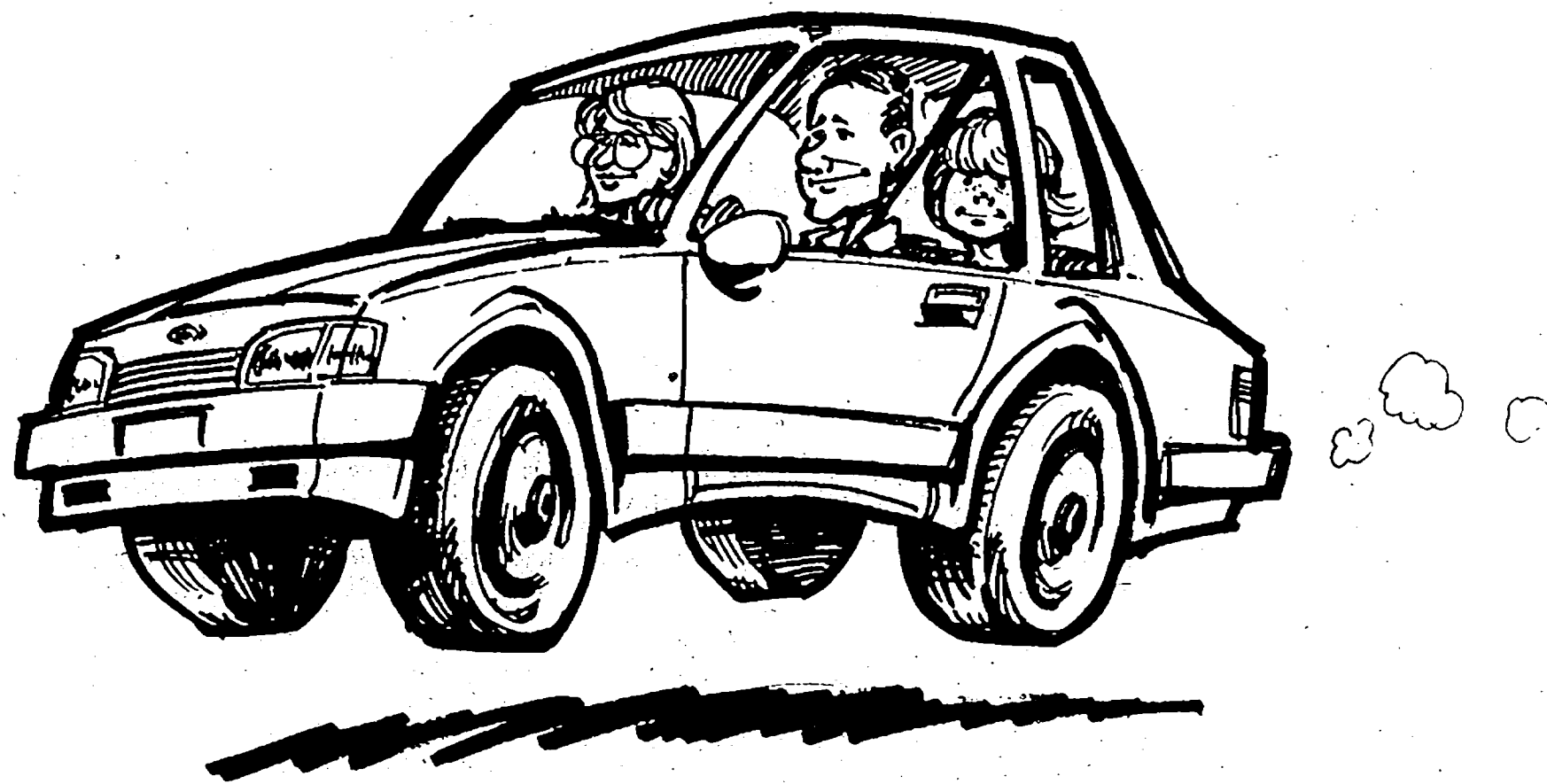

Crossed signals

JudyBats muddle their music on 'Shacks'

On their 1991 debut "Native Son," The JudyBats displayed an enormous amount of musical adroitness, forming a delectable synthesis of pop, jazz, folk and dance rhythms.

More so, the Sire Records release revealed a group with a clear, cohesive vision in genre too often beset by banality.

What happened? "Down in the Shacks Where the Satellite Dishes Grow," the follow-up from Knoxville, Tenn., seems muddled by comparison. On this release, the JudyBats sound like a band torn asunder rather than the brazen eclectic outfit showcased on "Native Son." The nine-word album title only mirrors the confusion.

The usual clichés could apply here. The six-member collection of mostly University of Tennessee students had its whole life to make the first album, less than a year to prepare its second.

VOCALIST AND songwriter Jeff Heiskell doesn't buy it.

"We had enough time, I think," said Heiskell, whose band performs Friday, March 20, at Todd's in Detroit. "In this business, people probably have too much time. We had 34 days in the studio. I wouldn't have wanted any more."

Heiskell writes a majority of the lyrics. He hunkered down in his basement for two weeks, churning out a wide array of brooding, melancholic themes.

When done, he realized the words spoke volumes about himself far more than he intended or would've liked.

"It made me feel a little bit exposed," Heiskell said. Vulnerability echoes through several numbers on "Down in the Shacks Where the Satellite Dishes Grow," which herein will be referred to as the second release.

This disarming approach may be the LP's lone saving grace and may lend further credence to The JudyBats' commitment to their craft.

Heiskell said the album documents "a lot of things," but adds the death of a friend sparked a tumult of emotions within himself for more than a year. In retrospect, those feelings of mourning found their way into his songwriting.

"Saturday," an example of Heiskell's detached commentaries on the human condition compiled in folders he keeps around. He wrote the song a few weeks after visiting an old friend in Florida.

"HERE HE was working the same job at some supermarket for six or seven years, living in a small cinderblock house with his wife. He was happy," Heiskell said. "Doing this kind of work, you're cut off from the real world."

The JudyBats in a sense have always been cut off — even initially from the Knoxville scene that would later embrace them.

The band, whose name is derived from a batwielding puppet in the Punch & Judy show, formed in 1986, a coalition of guitarist Ed Winters and Heiskell with neighbors Peggy Hambricht, who performs on keyboards, violins and vocals; Timothy Stutz, a bassist; and Johnny Sughrae, acoustic guitarist.

The latter three were joyous purveyors of a "thrash sound," according to Heiskell, while he and Winters possessed a folk sensibility. Together,

a dynamic was created that would sustain a creative thrust, unleashing a meld of rock, folk, jazz and pop upon somewhat puzzled thrash-saturated audiences in Knoxville.

"I was really paranoid when we started out," said Heiskell, noting the Knoxville area's thriving hard core scene at the time. "I was the only guy around who sang on key. . . . We didn't have any cutting edge axes to grind. We took a lot of flack in the beginning."

SOON, KNOXVILLE took to the band as well as Sire Records, which promptly released a maxi-single "When Southern Bells Sing" after signing The JudyBats. "Native Son" drew Billboard's Top-10 list.

With the same producer, Richard Gottettr (Ramones, Marshall Crenshaw, Blondie), the band returned to Bearsville Studios in order to try and recreate the magic.

"I wasn't aware we were going for something different when we went into the studio," Heiskell said. "The production was sparse this time. That was our doing. We all agreed the first record was overproduced."

Production aside, Heiskell maintains knowledge of what makes a good pop song.

"A good song will come out in the first three minutes you're goofing around with it. You just sense it."

The JudyBats will perform with guests, Paleface, on Friday, March 20, at Todd's, Seven Mile Road, two blocks east of Van Dyke Road, Detroit. Tickets are \$5.50 in advance. For information, call 366-8633.

This earnest booklet advises women how to avoid rape with a slew of tips and article clippings. The motto is "Read this. Copy it. Pass it along to a friend. Protect yourself. If it offends you — too bad."

Infantxine (\$1 to 501 Avis Drive, Suite 1, Box 130, Ann Arbor 48104): Every part of this 'zine is sure to offend someone. It treads the line between funny and disgusting. The style is the rantings and ravings of a madman. The troublesome thing is, the author seems to be serious.

Hailing Frequency: (U.S.S. Intrepid, P.O. Box 1094, Dearborn 48121): This isn't really a fanzine, but it's the newsletter for a local Star Trek club. Lorraine Hefner describes the club as an "alternative life style that we hope will lead to peace, caring for humanity, scientific discovery, advances in education and wholesome

social interactions." Sentient-beings who believe that Star Trek is not just a TV show but rather a set of guidelines to living one's life should contact the address above.

Several months ago, State Rep. Latin rhythms fuel 'Mambo Kings'

Fresh off the boat and bus from Havana in 1952, brothers Cesar and Nestor Castillo head for the swankiest Mambo palace in New York, The Palladium. Soon Cesar is on stage with Latin master Tito Puente, performing a hot drum solo.

Like your favorite stupid musical, "The Mambo Kings" is wildly entertaining, if not especially plausible, fueled by the belief that anything can happen with talent and guts.

It's a mess of a movie fueled by hairy-chested heroes and hot Latin rhythms.

Armand Assante has his flashiest role to date as Cesar, the more outgoing of the two brothers. He's disgustingly macho but loyal to family and friends. He remains wary of flashy managers who want to control his career.

Antonio Banderas, a regular in the films of Spanish director Pedro Almodovar, makes his American debut as Nestor. He can't seem to get Cuba on an old flame named Maria out of his head, even though he tries to share his brother's love of America and its opportunity.

IT BECOMES painfully obvious early on that guys dominate "The Mambo Kings." Marushcka Detmers, a powerful international actress, is relegated to the role of Nestor's long-suffering wife who watches him reach the top on a love song written for Maria, the woman whose name he mumbles in his sleep.

Cathy Moriarty has even less to do as Cesar's girlfriend. She pops in and out of the film while never establishing much of a character. It's

implied that Cesar remains faithful to her, despite his opportunities to sleep with any woman that catches the flash of his stiletto smile.

What first-time director Arne Glimcher lacks in basic storytelling he makes up in visuals and music. These keep "The Mambo Kings" plodding along through the soap opera elements of the plot, which was based on Oscar Hijuelos' Pulitzer Prize-winning novel.

Expect for a couple of graphic sex scenes, "The Mambo Kings" could have easily been made in the 1950s. The set design and clothes evoke the era, while the garish Technicolor compositions recall "Written on the Wind" and other campy melodramas by Douglas Sirk.

CHARACTERS cha-cha across the screen while the Castillo brothers' band, The Mambo Kings, struggle to

make a living as meat factory workers. On weekends, they play bar mitzvah, birthday and bachelor parties until they get offered a big break.

That break comes from none other than Desi Arnaz (grotesquely played by Desi Arnaz, Jr.), who gets the brothers a spot on the "I Love Lucy" show. In a brilliant bit of technical wizardry, the film will have you believing that Lucy is really performing a skit with them.

"The Mambo Kings" has simple goals and achieves them for the most part with style and flair. See it soon before you grow sick of Armand Assante, who is destined with this single film to become a household name and major American heartthrob.

'Month in Country' lacks strong plot

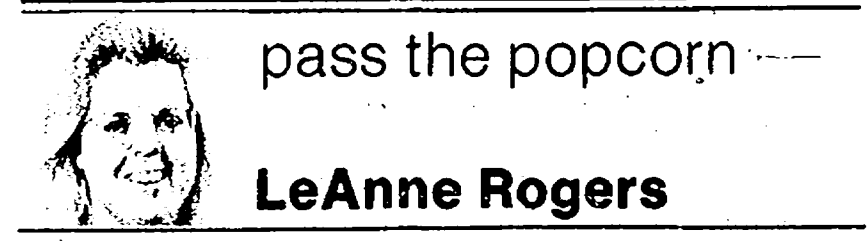
A terrified soldier fallen to the muddy ground on a battlefield in France during World War I. That's a brief scene, a nightmare of a British veteran, that resonates through the film "A Month in the Country."

With a pronounced stammer, Colin Firth plays the veteran, one of those walking wounded survivors of the war. Taking a commission to uncover a Medeval mural hidden by layers of paint on a church wall, he heads for Yorkshire, his hands trembling so badly he has a difficult time lighting his cigarette on the train.

Things don't get any less stressful for the man when he arrives at the church, met by a surly cleric who makes it clear he doesn't want the painting uncovered.

The sour-faced minister doesn't have much choice since its a requirement of a larger bequest from a wealthy congregation member. Revealing the religious painting will only distract the congregation from worship says the reverend. But while he's at it, Firth might as well add a bit of color to some of the more faded sections of the ancient work.

A SECOND project, funded by the same benefactor, is under way on the grounds surrounding the small country church. A second veteran, played by Kenneth Branagh, has



been hired to dig up the body of an ancient ancestor buried outside the church grounds. Branagh is using his funded purpose to underwrite his own personal archeological scheme on the site.

A more outgoing and friendly sort of chap, Branagh seems initially to have survived the war better than Firth. But he's developed a strong fondness for trenches.

Branagh sees the irony of being one of those who survived the war "intact" and bitterly wonders if it wouldn't have been easier to deal

with the loss of a limb or some other visible wound.

Rather reluctantly, Firth is sort of adopted by the local stationmaster's family and even roped into substituting for the father to preach to a small church service. He doesn't provide the usual fire and brimstone sermon the congregation gets from the stationmaster.

"A Month in the Country" is one of those films that really doesn't have a strong plot, it's really a character study. Firth and Branagh are young men who are weighed with grief at

their experiences and haunted by their memories of war.

THE LARGEST part of their emotional energy is spent trying not to deal with those memories. Both are drained and unable to move on to the rest of their lives with any success.

Firth develops a strong attraction for the reverend's rather young wife and is barely able to speak, let alone express those feelings. There is an aura of sadness about these young men that rarely seems to lighten.

Even the cleric, who lives with his wife in a large house with few furnished rooms, isn't the usual rural pastor disappointed in seeking a larger parish. His sourness stems from his disappointment that his congregation members don't share his religious devoutness.

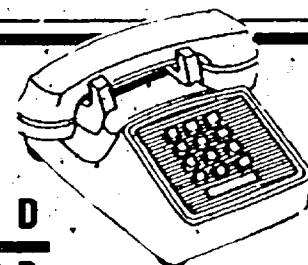

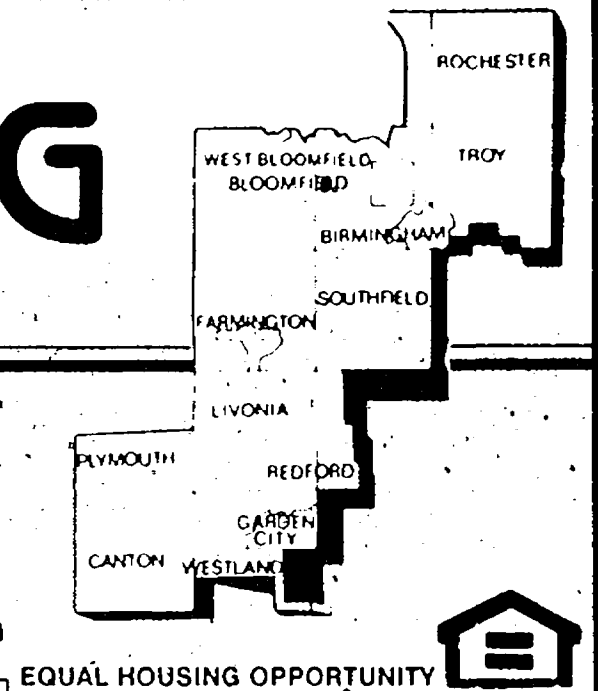

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89-49 verdict Wayne romps into regional

Coach Chuck Henry has now won five Class A district boys basketball titles at Wayne Memorial, but Friday's final tally had to be the most convincing.

The Zebras romped to an 89-49 victory at Garden City High, running their overall season record to 19-3.

The reward for winning the GC district is a date with perennial state power Detroit Cooley, which squeaked by city rival Cody on Friday, 68-66. Wayne and the Cardinals will square off at 5:30 p.m. Tuesday at Southfield High in the regional semifinals.

"Cooley is number one in the state and undefeated, but what impresses me more than anything about them is that several times (this season) they've been down by large margins and have come back," Henry said. "That means they have a group of kids who will really scratch and claw to win. They're mentally tough and that's what I respect more than anything about them."

Wayne was never in serious trouble against Glenn (12-10), a team

basketball

which has not beaten the Zebras in 10 years.

It was 18-10 after one quarter and 36-19 at intermission.

THE ROCKETS, a 72-53 loser to Wayne earlier this year, couldn't find the basket with a base fiddle, shooting a meager 24.2 percent from the field (8 of 33) on the night.

"In the first half we wanted to go inside and get penetration to the basket," Glenn coach Pat Bennett explained. "We got the ball in there, but didn't put it down. And we also wanted to get to the free throw line, and we didn't." (Glenn was seven of 12 from the line.)

Wayne senior forward Rick Barnes pumped in 17 of his game-high 21 in the opening half.

The Zebras continued their assault in the third quarter, outscoring Glenn 30-16 to put it way out of reach. During that stretch Wayne shot 70 percent (12 of 17) from the

floor. "Obviously we're very happy with the way things went," Henry said. "We were a little jittery early and missed some shots. And I was concerned about their big lineup."

"But I was surprised that things went our way as well as they did. We were consistent both offensively and defensively."

Twelve different Wayne players scored with junior guard Donte Prewitt coming off the bench to contribute 11.

"WAYNE'S QUICKNESS and depth get to you," Bennett said. "And the next thing you now they're making steals and baskets."

"Their defense is solid, too. They're a well-rounded team and take advantage of what's given to them."

Once again Glenn had problems keeping Wayne off the offensive glass.

"Barnes came flying in from I don't know where, sometimes out near the free throw line," Bennett said. "We talked and talked about getting body contact. The job was done, but not completely."

Marc Gondek cut Detroit Henry Ford star Marco Hammond off at the pass Friday night, then made the pass that helped send Redford Catholic Central to its second straight Class A district championship.

"That was the one play we worked on in practice, we've seen them do it at least six times in the tournament and knew it was coming," Ford coach William Carter said. "We didn't allow them to execute it the entire ballgame but our kids were tired and broke down mentally. It was the play that broke our backs."

The play, as usual, came after a CC timeout.

"It's a safe play and it's been good to us," Holowicki said. "Even the kids on the bench wanted to

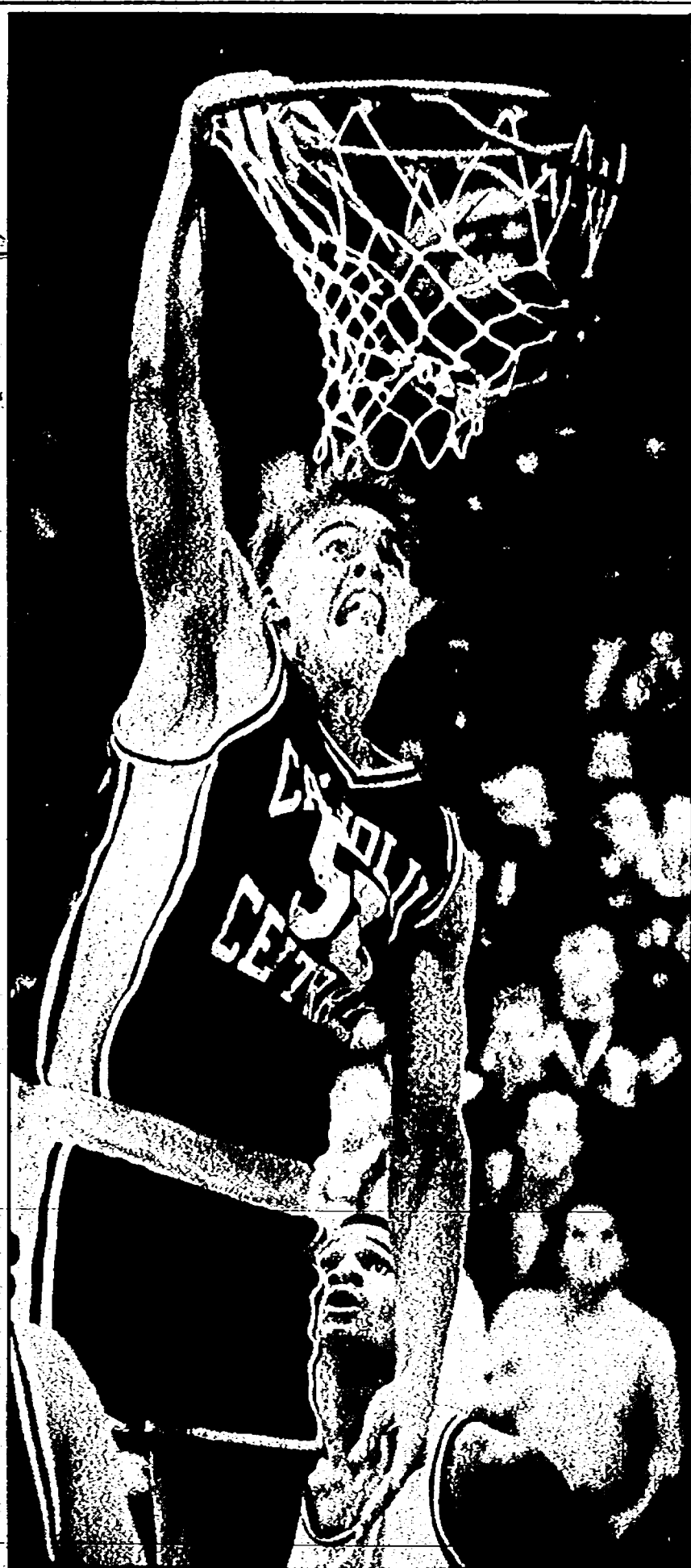

Canton bounces Spartans, 60-47

Plymouth Canton won a Class A boys basketball district championship Saturday night at Novi High, but now the Chiefs face an even taller order.

Literally. Canton whipped Livonia Stevenson 60-47 in the district final to earn a right to play towering Adrian in Wednesday's 7 p.m. regional semifinal at Ypsilanti High School. Adrian is 21-2 overall and has a 7-foot center and 6-foot-4 player, each of whom has signed with Division I schools.

"They're very good," Canton coach Dave Van Wagoner said.

The Chiefs (18-4) looked like giants against Stevenson, outbounding the smaller Spartans 53-25. Hal Heard, a 6-5 senior forward, led a balanced attack with 16 points and 16 rebounds. Senior guard Derrick McDonald also scored 16 points, while 6-7 senior center Tony Coshatt added 11 points and 11 rebounds.

The Chiefs led 32-30 at halftime before outscoring Stevenson 14-9 in the third quarter to open up a 46-39 lead. Stevenson (12-10 overall) missed its first seven shots of the quarter and for the game was 18 for 56 from the field (32 percent).

THE CHIEFS also struggled from the field (making 17 of 48 shots), but made 21 of 24 free throws, including 10 of 13 in the fourth quarter.

This was the second straight district championship for the Chiefs and the third victory over the Spartans this season.

"We felt going in that defense and rebounding would be the key," Van Wagoner said. "In the second half we started doing both extremely well. Both titles were very sweet. That (two straight championships) is a real accomplishment."

Seven seniors played for the final time in a Stevenson uniform, including guard Matt Grodzicki, who scored a team-high 19 points. Senior Collin Stockton added 14 points, but the Spartans tallest player, 6-4 senior Tony Stojov, had a less memorable final outing.

Stojov failed to score in double figures and fouled out with 8:17 remaining. Coach Jim McIntyre knew

"Every year you lose seniors, kids that have been around three years," he said. "You just have to re-establish a family. The senior kids are class young men and do an excellent job everywhere."

Canton also has seven seniors, including Brennan, who came up big in the second half. After an uninspired first half, Brennan finished with 14 rebounds and penetrated the key to set up his teammates on the wings.

Brennan scored only two second-half points, but had another two called off for offensive goaltending early in the third quarter on an impressive tip dunk. Even though the dunk didn't count, Brennan and the Canton crowd got fired up over it.

"I've done that in practice and I've wanted one all year in a game and finally got it done," Brennan said. "I felt the second half I played a little better. Coach was saying at halftime that the win (Wednesday) over Salem wouldn't mean a thing if we didn't make it to the regional."

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Fulks hired by Churchill

Don Albertson, Livonia Churchill's first-year athletic director, is stepping aside as girls basketball coach to make way for Gary Fulks.

The former Redford Union coach will take over the reins at Churchill after leading the Panthers to a pair of Class A district titles and seasons of 16-8 and 17-6, respectively.

Fulks began looking for a new coaching position after officially submitting his resignation from RU on Jan. 8.

"Being the A.D. (athletic director) has drawn me in all different directions, especially in the fall where I have to be at a lot of games," Albertson said. "But now we'll get someone else who is enthusiastic and who will hold it (the program) together, and take us beyond. I know Gary will establish a competitive program."

Albertson posted a record of 16-46 during the past three years, his second stint as girls basketball coach with the Chargers. (He was also varsity coach from 1978 to 1982.)

"It was a very difficult decision and I did not want to give it up because I enjoyed working with the young people," Albertson said.

BUT HIRING the 37-year-old Fulks was not a difficult decision.

"He's the immediate answer to Churchill's prayers," Albertson said. "I knew him way back when he was a JV coach at RU and I was JV coach at Churchill."

"I know he's well organized and a good coach. I saw he was available and I called him right away."

Fulks was a former standout athlete at RU, later going on to play baseball and basketball at Henry Ford Community College. He also played basketball two seasons at Columbus College (Ga.).

After graduating with a B.A. degree in science, Fulks served as varsity boys basketball coach for three

girls basketball

years at Flint Hamady, along with one-year stints at Lake Fenton and Bloomfield Hills Roper.

"This is going to be a good situation for me for a lot of years," said Fulks, a special education teacher at RU. "Churchill has a lot to offer academically and they have tremendous facilities. Having a big gym is going to be a big plus."

"And there are a lot of good people over there, that's why I was interested in the position. I feel comfortable with Don. And the principal (Rod Hosman) is honest, down-to-earth and committed. Both guys want the same thing, and we'll try to do the best we can for them."

FULKS HOPES to turn Churchill's fortunes around with a year-round program.

"We'll start at the elementary level, through the junior high and into the high school," said the new coach. "We'll be there Saturday mornings with the young kids and run an extensive summer program that will include weight training for grades 9-12."

"Livonia is obviously a larger school district (than RU) and there's an opportunity to do something with the program. They have an extensive community education program and we'll try to work through them. We'll try to out-hustle people and do some of the same things that made us successful at RU."

"It's a pride thing and obviously you have to work hard."

The new coach added that Fulks is ready to turn the losses into victories.

"There's a challenge and in every program," he said, "and I'm excited."
