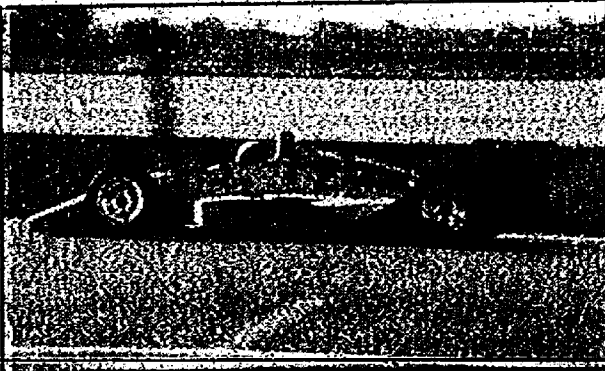

## Defense: No plot to murder



The defense attorney for one of two defendants currently being tried for murdering a local man says his client never intended to kill Everett Bowen Jr. Prosecutors contend Ian Cowen and the other defendants plotted to kill and rob the man.

Ian Bruce Cowen wanted to fight — not kill — Everett Earl Bowen Jr. to settle an earlier dispute in which Bowen stabbed Cowen eight times with a screwdriver, a defense attorney said Thursday.

But when Cowen, then a 16-year-old John Glenn High School student, sought help from two friends to arrange

a meeting with 19-year-old Bowen of Westland behind Adams Junior High School, events turned sour, attorney James Howarth said.

The friends, Jermaine Stevenson and Jerome Omar Ingram, both 18 and Westland residents, arranged the meeting by telling Bowen, a known drug and gun dealer, that they wanted to buy some crack cocaine, Howarth said. Stevenson and Ingram drove Bowen

and Bowen's friend, 20-year-old David Wayne Adkins, to the school. Cowen came to meet them — supposedly to fight Bowen, Howarth said. Another 16-year-old John Glenn student, Gregory Hister, came along.

But Cowen and Hister didn't know that Stevenson and Ingram had a "private agenda" to rob Bowen at gunpoint of his drugs and money, Howarth said.

That plan soured, resulting in Bowen being shot to death and Adkins surviving a gunshot wound to his head, the attorney said in opening remarks Thursday in Cowen's and Hister's murder trial in Detroit Recorder's Court.

Cowen had never indicated he wanted Bowen shot, Howarth said, and the in-

cident left him "a destroyed young man."

Cowen later told a friend that Stevenson and Ingram "went out of control," Howarth said.

All four Westland teens face charges of first-degree premeditated murder, conspiracy to murder and first-degree murder in the commission of another felony, robbery. Because of Adkins' injury, they also face a charge of assault with intent to murder.

Trials for Stevenson and Ingram hadn't been set Thursday. The four teens, who have been jailed since their arrest, following Bowen's death the

Wayne-Westland's school board president, under an increasingly bitter attack from her critics, has been accused of cronyism as she seeks a new term in the June 8 election.

But seven-year board member Sylvia Kozorosky-Wiacek has dismissed accusations of her political enemies and said, "Desperate people do desperate things."

In the latest attack, she came under fire from former Westland City Council member William Ziemia, Carol Gillentine and former school board candidate

Fredric Hagehorn, who also led an unsuccessful recall campaign against her.

The three signed election materials — sent to absentee voters — that accused Kozorosky-Wiacek of being self-serving and using her position as the city's senior citizens resource director for personal gain.

"She has continually used her perceived influence to manipulate the system and the people," they wrote. "Local politicians really believe she controls the absentee and senior vote."

The letter raised questions about "what she has been able to do for herself," noting that some of her family members either work or have worked for 18th District Court, the Wayne-Westland school system and the Nankin Transit Commission.

Most notably, her husband, David, is court administrator for 18th District Court.

Kozorosky-Wiacek shrugged off the criticism and pointed out that several other local officials also have relatives employed by the school system or the city. And she stressed that her relatives received their jobs based on their own

— based on their qualifications, not political strings she pulled.

"This is ludicrous," she said of the letter opposing her.

In their letter to absentee voters, Ziemia, Gillentine and Hagehorn, wrote, "Sylvia and her close friends want power, they want to control the system for their benefit, and they don't mind using you to get that power."

"Sylvia claims to control the absentee vote and senior vote — that is her machine," they added. "Whenever she wants something, she calls her people."

## Man upset at being blamed in friend's death

A 21-year-old Westland man said he suffered emotional turmoil because he drove the car in which his close friend died during a two-vehicle accident. But he's angry that police blamed him for the death.

Gerald K. Adams also said he's upset that prosecutors tried to get him to accept a plea bargain after he was charged

with negligent homicide in the death of his friend, William H. Swain.

"I know I didn't do it, so why should I say I'm guilty?" Adams asked Friday.

Adams telephoned the Observer after a story in Thursday's edition stated that he was found guilty in Detroit Recorder's Court of reckless driving, a lesser charge than negligent homicide.

Adams said he was "p-----d off" about accusations made against him.

The story noted that Westland police had accused Adams of driving 70 mph in a 40 mph zone during the Dec. 26 accident at Cherry Hill and Merriman roads. His car struck a vehicle that turned left in front of him.

The driver of that car, 34-year-old Jeffrey Lynn Grayson of Inkster, has been charged with involuntary manslaughter, but has not yet been tried.

# Friendship Center honors 3 seniors for helping others

Three longtime volunteers at Westland's senior citizens center were honored recently.

They are Flora D'Agostino, Gabe Orta and Mike Plesuk. Each was named Senior of the Year. Their photographs will join the other inductees hung at the Friendship Center.

D'Agostino, 73, is a Detroit native. She is the mother of three, grandmother of four and great-grandmother of two. She retired in 1982 from Michigan Bell, she was a Yellow Pages saleswoman and manager for many years.

For the past 10 years, she has been a volunteer at the Friendship Center. She has done office work, telephoned shut-ins, organized fund-raising dinners and more.

"I was very pleased," she said of the honor, which came during a May 19 ceremony. "I have been volunteering there for quite a few years. It's nice to be recognized."

She said she first got involved at the center taking sewing and other hobby classes. "To be honest, it just isn't my forte."

She found office work more to her liking. She has also tutored physically impaired young people at Schoolcraft College, and is a member of the retirees group, Michigan Bell Pioneers.

Orta, 82, is the father of two, grandfather of five and great-grandfather of two. He is a dedicated member of the center. He hasn't missed a day since 1975, and says he spends 2-3 hours on average. He and his late

wife Julie had attended the current center and its predecessor since 1970.

"I go over there and shoot pool and I go over for lunch. Some people play cards, but I don't do that anymore," he says.

Orta was born in Windber, Penna., "a coal mining town," he explains. He followed his father into the mines at age 12 but didn't stay long. He retired from the truck firm, Kelsey Hayes, after 24 years.

About the recognition he received, Orta says: "I was very surprised. I didn't expect it."

Plesuk, 84, is the father of three and grandfather of six. He retired from Fisher Body in Livonia after 17 years.

He has been a volunteer for 19 years at Kirk of Our Savior Church's senior nutrition site center. Though slowed by illness in recent years, Plesuk has provided transportation and done lawn work for friends. He has been involved at the senior center since 1970.

Just last week, he helped pass out milk and ice cream at a center lunch. He says he does his volunteering "just for helping."

He is a member of the Friendship Center's travel group, and says he particularly enjoys trips to Atlantic City. "I hit a jackpot of \$100 onee," on the slot machines, he recalls.

He says he has had four operations so far this year, and has another planned this month.

"I was kind of surprised," he says of his nomination to the hall of fame. "Especially after 84 years."

Galindo, sentenced to life in prison on a September 1989, two-count conviction, won a retrial after claiming he had an improper defense. His former attorney, Charles Campbell, has since died of a brain tumor.

Novack and Sahaydak each died from a single shot in the chest from a .22-caliber, single-shot rifle that a neighbor, Christopher Demeter, said he had loaned to Galindo.

Novack and Galindo shared the Norene residence with Galindo's mother, and Sahaydak had been staying there, testimony revealed.

Under questioning from attorneys Thursday, Robert Novack said Galindo had told him while they were drinking beer at a bar that he planned to kill the couple.

"He didn't like their relationship," Robert Novack said.

Glenda Pratt, another former girlfriend of Galindo, testified that Galindo came to her Port Huron residence the morning March 11, 1989, and said he had killed the couple hours earlier.

"He had a bag with some beer in it and a gun. He was drunk," Pratt

said. "He told me that he had shot Sharon and Archie, which I didn't believe."

Although much testimony centered on Galindo's anger over the romance between Novack and Sahaydak, Pratt indicated Galindo also was upset that the couple had told Galindo's mother that they wanted the master bedroom of the Norene Street residence.

Pratt said Galindo told her that Novack and Sahaydak "weren't going to hurt his mother anymore."

In Galindo's original trial, his longtime friend, Rita Cruse, had testified that he called her about 6:30 a.m. on the morning of March 11 and asked her to telephone the Westland police department to tell them of the dead bodies. Testimony has indicated that Galindo wanted the bodies removed before his mother, who had been away for the night, returned home.

Galindo was arrested after St. Clair County Sheriff's deputies spotted him in a 1988 Ford Taurus matching the description of a car sought by Westland police. The car belonged to Novack, police said.

night of Nov. 15, could face life in prison without parole if convicted.

Although Cowen and Hister are being tried simultaneously, Cowen has chosen to have his case decided by a jury, while Hister has chosen to have Judge Denise Page Hood decide his fate.

Several witnesses, including Adkins, who still has a bullet in his head, are prepared to testify in the trial that continues today on the second floor of Recorder's Court.

Hister's attorney didn't make opening remarks Thursday. But Howarth's statements about Cowen were the most detailed yet, though they differed from what the jury was told by assistant Wayne County prosecutor Robert Hood.

### Several witnesses, including David Wayne Adkins, who still has a bullet in his head, are prepared to testify in the trial that continues today on the second floor of Recorder's Court.

Hood described a scenario in which the teens met at Stevenson and Ingram's Westland apartment prior to meeting Bowen and Adkins. Hood called the apartment a "party headquarters."

Westland police have accused the teens of conspiring to murder Bowen. And after Bowen's death, the defendants returned to the apartment and split up the money that they robbed from Bowen, Hood said. Howarth has denied that

Cowen took any money.

Hood told the jury that a friend of Cowen's will be called to testify about statements Cowen made after Bowen's death.

Howarth, meanwhile, indicated the incident would have never occurred if Dearborn police had investigated a dispute several weeks earlier between Cowen and Bowen.

Cowen and his girlfriend had been riding on Michigan Avenue when a car with three males, in-

cluding Bowen, pulled alongside them. Comments were then made about the girl, Howarth said.

At one traffic light, the cars had stopped and Cowen got out, walked over and slapped Bowen, then returned to his car, Howarth said. At another stop down the road, Bowen came over to Cowen's car and, as Cowen started to get out, stabbed him eight times with a screwdriver, the attorney said.

Cowen was stabbed seven times in the leg and once in the foot, where the screwdriver became embedded, Howarth said.

Cowen and his family later tried to get Dearborn police to investigate, but became discouraged after police "did nothing," Howarth said.

# Scouts' honor for 50 years

During the past 50 years, the building on Middlebelt near Hennepin has grown and changed, and people have come and gone.

But the purpose of the Ford-Drake Scout Memorial has remained unchanged — to perpetuate Boy Scouting and the memories of the two youngsters whose names it carries.

Headquartered in what is known familiarly as the Boy Scout cabin, the Ford-Drake Scout Memorial marked its 50th anniversary May 29.

“It was originally a Ford car sales garage. Each side (addition) of the building was added in 1946,” Jack Kerstetter said. “Originally, there was just the center of the building with sliding doors like in a barn.”

The troop, originally called Garden City Troop No. 1, officially acquired the building in 1947 from Ford Motor for \$1, but actually had control and use of the property for several years earlier.

For nearly two years the troop, which was sponsored by a loosely organized group of residents, operated as GC-1. Then on Jan. 17, 1944, two troop members, Charles Wilmer Ford and Robert Drake, were killed in a school bus accident.

Ford and Drake, along with a

third student, Betty Krause, were killed when their overloaded school bus ran into a tree off Ford Road while transporting students to high school in Dearborn.

In August 1943, the group's incorporation papers were changed to honor their late friends.

“I knew Wilbur (Ford) very well from church,” Kerstetter said. “I didn't know Drake.”

Members of the troop, now called 1241, help keep the post going through their efforts, but also received help through donations over the years.

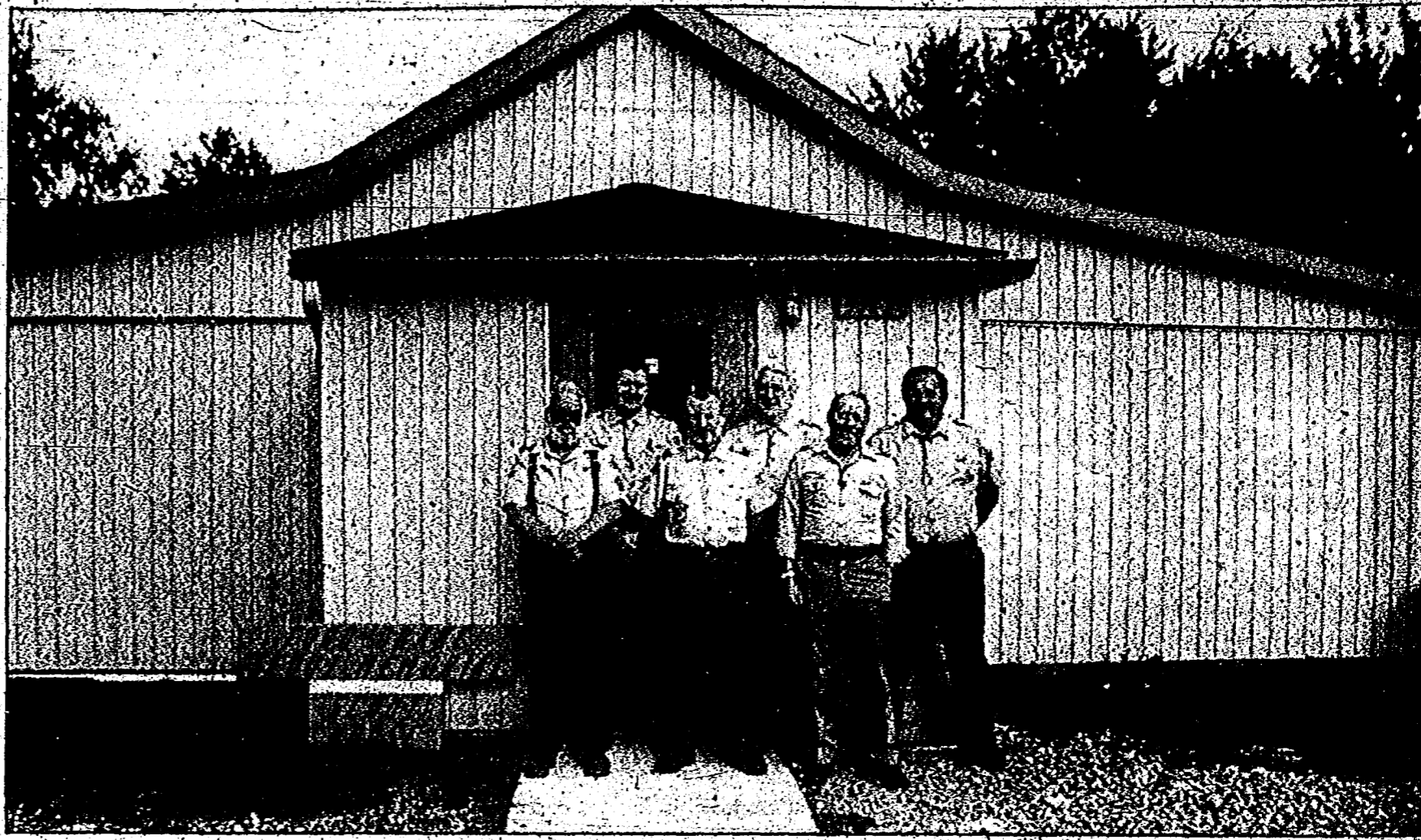
“I can still see Mr. and Mrs. Ford (Ford's parents) on Ford Road tearing down the old Stonerock Store and Bob Holland's electrical store,” Kerstetter said. “They dragged it down here to build the additions.”

Kerstetter, who came to troop himself in 1946, recalls pounding nails into the roof and side wall boards.

Over the years, members active in the troop and Ford-Drake have seen people come and go; the number of members went from more than 60 in the 1970s to about 21 today.

“A lot of us put a lot of time into the place and the guys before us did,” said chairman Leonard Flack.

## Area service stations help handicapped to get pumped

More than 1,100 service stations in Michigan, including 15 in Garden City and Westland, are pumping gasoline for the handicapped at their self-service prices.

The stations are listed in a new “Pump Guide,” published by members of the petroleum industry. It was presented May 18 during “The Event,” a statewide conference in Lansing attended by more than 1,500 handicapped residents.

The Pump Guide includes the names, brand names, addresses and telephone numbers of stations in 81 of the 83 counties that have volunteered to pump gasoline for the handicapped. Each listing includes the hours when service is available if the hours are limited. Participating stations will post a window decal, showing the traditional handicapped symbol and the hours when service is available.

Handicapped residents must have a valid plate or permit and no one else in the car who can assist.

The Guide is published by the three Lansing-based, associations representing the petroleum industry in the state: the members of the

Associated Petroleum Industries of Michigan, the Michigan Petroleum Association and the Service Station Dealers Association of Michigan, with the assistance of AAA Michigan.

“This is strictly a voluntary program, and we think the response has been tremendous,” says Denise McCourt, the project's coordinator, who is associate director of public affairs for Associated Petroleum.

The Guide was published in cooperation with the Michigan Commission on Handicapper Concerns, the state agency that advocates on behalf of all the handicapped.

“This directory is going to have a

positive impact on the lives of people with disabilities,” says Marsha Moers of East Lansing, chairperson of the 19-member commission. Moers headed up a subcommittee that first approached the association with concerns about assistance for handicapping.

More than 25,000 copies of the Pump Guide have been printed, and it will be distributed through handicapper organizations across the state. The Guide will also be available at AAA Michigan offices, Secretary of State branch offices and the Michigan Department of Transportation Welcome Centers.

There are about 6,500 licensed service stations in Michigan, McCourt says station owners and operators were surveyed earlier this year asking if they wanted to participate in the first-time effort, patterned after voluntary programs by Amoco and Sunoco.

“State fire laws and staffing situations make it impossible for every station to participate,” she says. “But we believe a voluntary program is better for both the stations and their customers.”

## Local site for Rouge Rescue needs a wave of volunteers

Local residents will join with the City of Westland and the Friends of the Rouge to clean up Tonquish Creek, a tributary of the middle Rouge River.

The site to be cleaned this year will be an area of the Tonquish Creek, just west of Wayne Road on the south side of Joy Road, which was a former access point to the Holiday Park Nature Preserve, from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. Saturday, June 6.

The annual campaign typically has volunteers from Westland.

Interested people may pre-register at one of three sites: Dorsey Center, 32716 Dorsey, south of Palmer and east of Veno, 595-0288; Bailey Center, 36651 Ford, between Wayne Road and Newburgh, 487-3255, and the Community Relations/Cable TV Center, 33465 Warren between Wayne Road and Veno, 467-3198.

Volunteers should wear old clothes such as long pants and long sleeve shirts, said a city spokesman. Shoes/boots should have a sturdy sole to prevent punctures. An extra change of clothing should be brought to the site in case there is full or partial immersion in the water.

Volunteers should be in good health with no open wounds or cuts. All immunizations should be up to date, particularly tetanus and polio. There will be a first aid station at the staging area.

While soft drinks will be provided, volunteers should bring a bag lunch and insect repellent. There will be facilities for the washing of hands and faces, prior to lunch, and a portable toilet will also be available on site.

The Nankin Mill site on Ann Arbor Trail east of Farmington Road will be considered the primary headquarters site.

Swain, whose head slammed through the windshield of Adams' car, suffered multiple injuries and died 10 days later at the University of Michigan Hospital.

Adams denied he was driving 70 mph and noted there was conflicting testimony at his trial about how fast his car had been moving. Police said he had not consumed alcohol prior to the accident.

Adams spoke critically of the negligent homicide charge that emerged from the accident and said police "should have done a more extensive investigation."

Police have said both Adams and Grayson were at fault in the accident, which occurred at 8:42 p.m. Christmas Day.

Adams strongly disagreed and said that's why he chose to have his case decided by a judge, instead of a jury.

Kozorosky-Wiacek has stressed that she has worked hard on issues for senior citizens and the school system — not for personal gain, but out of dedication. She has developed a loyalty among many seniors who have lauded her efforts on their behalf.

Early in the campaign, Kozorosky-Wiacek had predicted that her critics would mount an intense campaign to oust her.

# Junior high kids help kindergarteners

What do you get when you put 85 eighth and seventh graders and 75 kindergarteners together once a week? You get the best type of experiential learning there is.

That is what three "Family and Child" classes (pre-parenting education) at Adams Junior High School did this year.

Instead of the traditional in-house laboratory experiences, where children are invited to come to the Junior high for child development labs, Adams students walked across the field to nearby Lincoln Elementary School to be paired with a kindergarten "buddy."

The students and their teachers developed lessons to supplement the five year olds in their educational development, said Adams teachers Nancy Davis and Louise Hart.

The Adams buddies prepared learning activities weekly which complemented the kindergarten curriculum. The areas involved were writing, reading, colors, shapes, number recognition and counting.

Adams student LaWanda Robinson commented about her experiences: "I learned that being a teacher is difficult and now I appreciate my teachers and what they do."

I'll try to be better to my teachers not because they really need all the help they can get."

Classmate Tara Wells added: "I learned more responsibility and my child learned words, numbers and letters."

Charity Rrumi, another Adams student, said she enjoyed the arts and crafts she did with her little "buddy."

Teachers Davis and Hart observed that both groups seemed to have benefited equally from this learning experience.

The Adams students gained by becoming more focused on completing their assignments so they were fully prepared for their little "buddy," they said.

The Junior high pupils were able to immediately apply guidance skills; review and reinforce their own basic skills, and learn the meaning of commitment and how important they became to their kindergarteners, the pair said.

The Adams students became very attached to their little "buddies."

Joy Pohl commented: "The hardest part was being strict with them."

"All kids are different and need TLC," says Bridget Szakaly.

As in all classrooms, there is a variety of learning levels, Hart and Davis said.

The cross-age tutoring setting provided an opportunity for Junior high students who usually don't experience high success to blossom and practice the parenting skills they learned in "family and child" class.

Students reported that the concepts they learned were used at home with their siblings and, also, while baby sitting.

Some expressed mixed emotions. Others felt they would be prepared to be good parents some day. Still others concluded that they would definitely postpone parenthood until they had much more preparation.

Michelle Kahler said: "Now I appreciate my mother more and I understand how hard it is to raise a child and I am going to help as much as I can."

Kindergarten teachers Joanelle Long and Sally Waterstone received a variety of progress indicators from the Adams students relaying information they learned about their child's educational progress.

The Adams "buddy" was able to work one on one with their kindergartener's special needs.

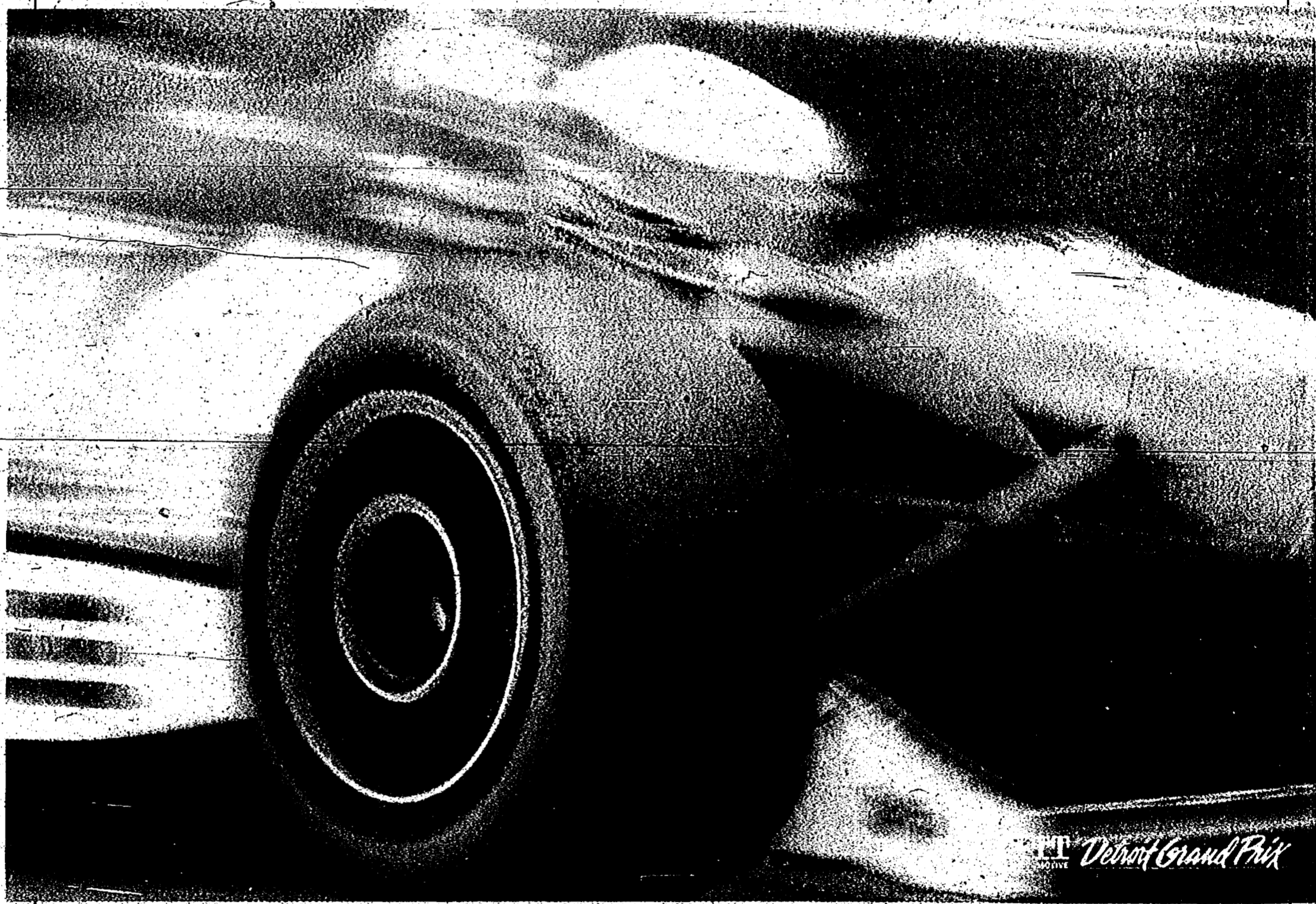

# SC students face big rise in tuition

This year's property tax freeze is good news for homeowners but bad news for Schoolcraft College students who this fall face one of the biggest tuition increases in college history.

Tuition is rising by 9.5 percent — to \$40 per credit hour — for students living within Schoolcraft's primary service area. Tuition is going up 8 percent — to \$60 per credit hour — for out-of-district students. It is also rising by 7.5 percent for Schoolcraft's small number of out-of-state students. They will now pay \$87.50 per credit hour.

Schoolcraft's primary service area includes the Livonia, Garden City, Plymouth-Canton, Clarenceville and Northville public school districts, as well as a small portion of Novi Schools.

Here's how Schoolcraft's new tuition rates stack up against current rates at other area community colleges:

- Henry Ford Community College — \$41 for residents of Dearborn Public Schools; \$64 for others.
- Oakland Community College — \$41 for county residents; \$69 for others; \$96 for out-of-state students.
- Wayne County Community College — \$37 for county residents not served by Schoolcraft or Henry Ford; \$52 for others.

Not all Schoolcraft trustees approved the tuition increase. "I think it's too high," Trustee Michael Burley said. "It comes out to about \$300,000 behind every teacher."

Others said it was necessary because of this year's property tax freeze.

freeze.

"If there's a time to do it, it's this year," Harry Greenleaf said. "We have a flat tax income."

Trustees Greenleaf, Mary Breen, Thaddeus McCotter, Stephen Ragan and Patricia Watson supported the tuition increase. Board president Jeanne Stempien joined Burley in voting against it.

The news is better for area taxpayers.

The college tax rate, 1.9231 mills remains unchanged under state law. Payments on three bond issues, raises the overall Schoolcraft tax rate to 1.9485 mills — roughly \$97.50 for a house assessed at \$100,000.

The tuition increase and college tax were approved as part of Schoolcraft's 1992-93 operating budget.

The \$31.3 million budget is increasing by just under 4.5 percent, one of the smallest increases in recent years.

Projected tax revenue is expected to rise by about 1 percent, to \$12.1 million. Schoolcraft expects to take in \$130,000 more in tax money for the next college year.

State revenue is expected to rise to \$8.6 million, a 3.5 percent increase — though state money is subject to cutbacks.

Tuition is expected to account for \$10.2 million.

On the expenditure side, slightly more than 60 percent of the college budget is earmarked for instruction, including professors' salaries and benefits.

College business services account for nearly 20 percent of the budget.

General administration, including salaries and benefits for college administrators.

# S'craft president gets good grades

Schoolcraft College president Richard McDowell made the grade with college trustees Wednesday during his annual evaluation session.

Trustees voted McDowell a 5 percent raise and improved his job benefits after evaluating his job performance in closed session.

"Basically, we're very pleased with his performance," said Trustee Mary Breen, who directed the session. "We're also pleased that he has addressed some of the concerns we had last year."

The raise brings McDowell's

salary to \$95,300. His annual performance bonus was raised to \$9,500 — a \$400 increase.

Trustees also extended McDowell's contract an extra year. His contract now runs through 1995.

The 5 percent raise matched those awarded other college executive administrators.

Trustees cited improved relations with college staff and adoption of target-specific bargaining — a break from more confrontational past practices — as among McDowell's major steps toward overcoming prior concerns.

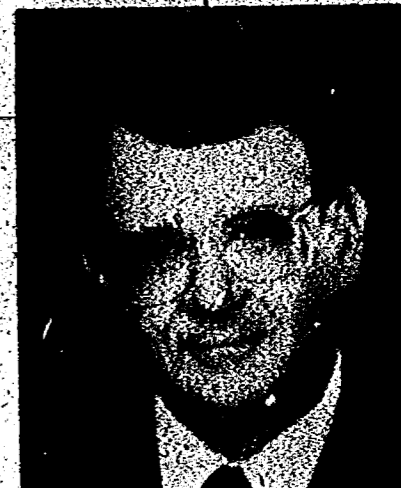
As in the past, McDowell drew

praise for his strong ties to the college business community.

The college reputation and income is at "all-time high," according to McDowell's formal evaluation statement.

The president's challenges for the coming year include finding new revenue sources, in light of shrinking state aid, and implementing a campus-wide recycling program.

McDowell has been Schoolcraft president since 1981. He is a past president of the Livonia Chamber of Commerce and serves on the Michigan Education Trust Fund Board of Directors.

# College sets new service contract guidelines

Not wanting to repeat a controversy that divided board members two years ago, Schoolcraft College trustees adopted a new policy Wednesday to guide review of college personal service contracts.

The college's legal representative, Law, Hemming, Essad & Polaczyk of Plymouth, will be the first agency reviewed under the new procedure at

the Wednesday, June 24, board meeting.

"There will probably be a motion of some kind seeking to continue the relationship and, if trustees object, we'd begin interviewing other firms," College president Richard McDowell said.

The selection of Law, Hemming two years ago divided the board. Trustee Jack Kirksey resigned after

alleging the firm, selected without competing bidders, had undue influence with then-board president Mary Breen.

Breen denied the allegations, but reopened the review process. Trustees subsequently re-selected Law, Hemming after interviewing other firms.

A review committee, headed by recently elected trustee Patricia

Watson was subsequently formed to draft a new review process.

The firm maintains no contract with Schoolcraft. Instead, it bills the college for services rendered.

The college auditor will also be reviewed, under the same procedure, but not until 1995. Trustees last year selected Plante, Moran as auditor.

## Cop takes on today's realities



What do you say about a band that would rather stew in contempt of reality and leave the answers to someone else. Or a band that sees the world as a ridiculous place and music as a way of dealing with and commenting on that. That's how Cop Shoot Cop sees things.

Through their dissonant sound and lyrics coated in bile, Cop Shoot Cop's no doubt delivering a dark wake up call.

The initial impetus is perhaps to stir the TV-impaired and generally inert masses into some vague concept of action: question the propaganda, defy the marketeers and shun crass commercialism. But Cop Shoot Cop could be perceived to carry a more chilling message on "White Noise," the Brooklyn band's second LP.

Interpreted, it's seemingly one of ultimate hopelessness and despair and all is indeed lost. Which in its most volatile realization is a dangerous state of mind revealed by the carnage of the recent LA riots.

Screams vocalist and bassist Tod A. like a wounded animal against the urban bass squall on "Hung Again": "I don't know why I try/Another day, another lie/It's just like sticking needles in your eye."

The Cop Shoot Cop founding member, though, contends he does see hope but "only in a small

way." Their brooding apocalyptic — not to mention guitarless — sound merely speaks to realities of the day.

After all, as Tod A. added, rap music is already doing it.

"I don't think it's as bleak as some people may perceive it to be," said Tod in a telephone interview from Kansas City, Mo. "It's kind of like trying to explain the joke to somebody if they don't get it. We see the world as a ridiculous place... and the music is a way of dealing with that and commenting on that."

"I mean we're not completely humorless people."

An anarchist usually has ready made solutions, though, Cop Shoot Cop doesn't. They'd rather stew in contempt of reality and leave the answers to someone else.

Said Tod: "I don't think that's my job (to provide answers). Otherwise, we'd be in politics or become terrorists or something."

Their press bio nonetheless fuels the image of rebellion. Formed in a "roach-ridden" New York City apartment in 1988, Cop Shoot Cop set out to be anti-everything with a visceral urban cacophony.

Along the way, Cop Shoot Cop has released two LPs, including the first "Consumer Revolt" in 1990, successively toured Europe and two members were picked up awhile back on concealed weapons charges outside of CBGB's in New York.

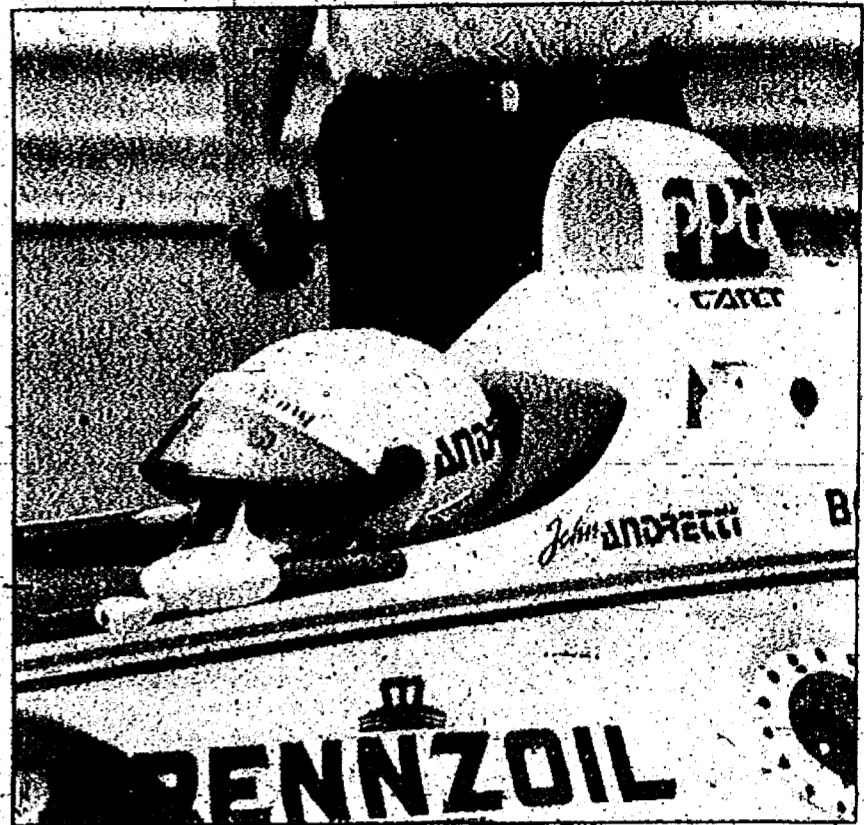
Tod A. said he'd rather not talk about the incident, though it is prominently mentioned in the band's press-kit.

What Tod A. will gladly discuss is the reaction or non-reaction to Cop Shoot Cop's reality wielding sound. He said he has doubts if people are getting the gist of the band's lyrical mission, especially live at shows.

"A lot of responses that we get at a live show are 'Wow, that was really loud' or 'You guys are really intense,'" he said. "I'm not convinced that live music is where you're actually communicating anything to someone other than just a certain amount of energy, like a cathartic sort of thing."

"And maybe they can get their aggression out through that as opposed some other more harmful way like going around and beating someone up or pulling them out of their car clabbing them to death."

## Speed and style on grand scale: It's at Belle Isle

Where's the cement barriers? Where's all the cyclone fencing? Where's the asphalt patching crews? Where's all the detour signs?

Come to think of it... Where's this Grand Prix thing?

Detroit Renaissance, with chief sponsor ITT Automotive, has moved this year's 11th Detroit Grand Prix to that peaceful little island just a short ways up stream from the downtown area.

Speed and style on the Isle, Belle Isle.

So why the Isle?

Bottom line is money. It just got too expensive to rip apart the heart of downtown Detroit to make way for three days of auto racing. And for race-fans who attend the race, the new locale will provide better sight lines than the downtown course as the many buildings give way to a few trees and one giant fountain.

Race officials claim that there is actually more area for general admission fans to mill about in, while everyone in attendance will be able to see more of the race than in the city.

And although Belle Isle is fresh and untested, present IndyCar and Formula One driver Emerson Fittipaldi was pleased with what he saw, likening the 2.1-mile, 14-turn temporary road circuit to a "romantic" European road course.

The speeds on the new track, which is shorter than the city course, will actually run about 30 mph faster on average (from 80 mph to 110 mph). The top speed on the course should reach around 160 mph.

If you're planning on attending, here's a few things you should know along with a couple that you already know and one thing that will just floor you.

Dates: Friday, June 5 (Free Prix Day), is for Trans Am, Indy Lights and IndyCar practice and qualify.

ing. Saturday, June 6, is for more Indy Lights and IndyCar qualifying. Trans Am cars race that afternoon.

Sunday, June 7, the Indy Lights and IndyCars warm up in the morning, followed by the Indy Lights race. Then, it's the finale, the 36-lap, 75.6-mile 1992 ITT Automotive Detroit Grand Prix.

Times: Gates open at 8 a.m. Race times vary due to mishaps on the course. The IndyCar race on Sunday is scheduled for 1 p.m. and, barring a major weather blast, has historically started on time.

Parking: This is a big deal. Since cars will not be allowed to park on the island, there will be a shuttle service running from in front of the Renaissance Center (on Jefferson Avenue) and from the Cobo Center (front entrance on Washington Boulevard).

There will be more than 50 shuttles — with more on call — to transport race fans throughout the weekend. Cost for the shuttle is \$3 per day and you can ride as many times as you like.

There also will be some neighborhood parking across from the island that's within walking distance of the race. And some area restaurants will be providing free shuttle service. Call in advance.

Tickets: General admission runs \$17 per day. Grandstand seats run \$27-47 per day. For more information, call 259-PRIX or 645-6666.

Bonus, bonus! When one adult pays, two kids under age 14 can enter free.

Directions: The best way to get there from the suburbs is to hop on I-96, the Lodge or Southfield freeways and race like hell (just kidding) down to Jefferson Avenue. Then either park at the RenCen or Cobo and catch a shuttle. Or weave in and out of traffic (just kidding again) until you get to East Grand Boulevard, MacArthur Bridge, the only access to the island, is just east of the boulevard.

Dear Alice,

Whenever I give advice on this subject I feel guilty because who knows what is too much and what is too little with each individual child. No one can really predict the outcome of parenting styles because so much depends on the child's disposition.

Small children like yours often need a lot of admiration and notice. The difficulty, as you recognize, is to not overdo it. At either end of the spectrum, much too much or far too little, advice is easy to give. It is clear that the scales are unbalanced. In a situation like yours where the scales may be only slight-

ly off kilter, greater balance is guesswork.

A concept has been developed to help us understand inevitably, imperfect parenting. It is the theory of the "good-enough" mother. This theory accepts that no mother can get it all right. It acknowledges that each infant and child will fill in where the mother falters.

When bottle feeding babies, the problem is to get the "right" number of holes in the "right" size nipple. What is "right" is determined by how hard that individual baby sucks. We must assume that if the baby is getting too much, he will stop sucking so hard, so he won't flood. The baby contributes to the

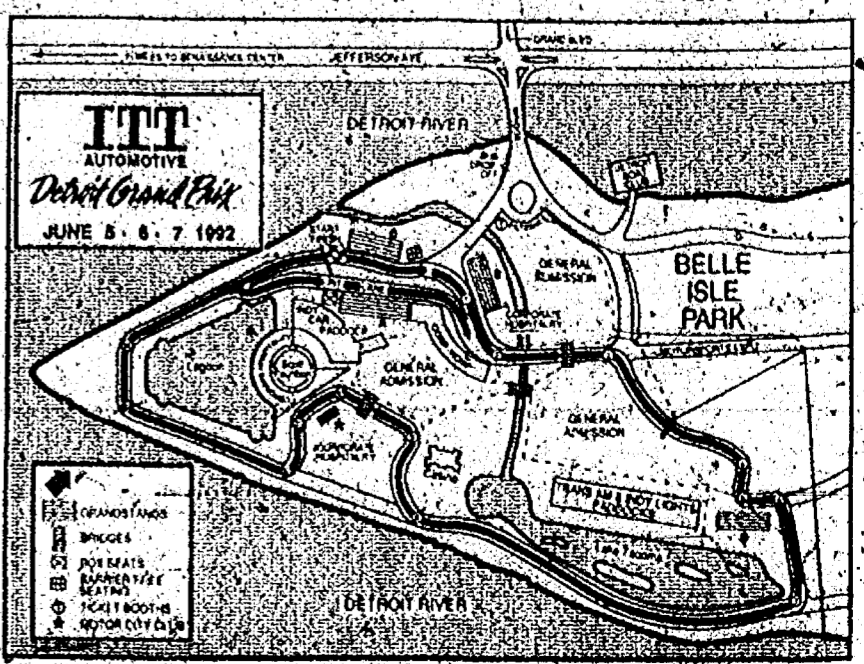
best balance.

Sometimes when we see a happy baby, we think "what a great mother," but maybe it is "what a great baby."

I wish I could give you a formula, but in truth, none exists. Your letter indicates that you are already a "good-enough" mother. The best advice is to enjoy your baby without the unrealistic burden of needing to be perfect.

# Racing

Boat owners: Public docking will not be permitted on the island. Boat owners are urged to contact well in advance the Detroit Yacht Club or any of the other marinas in the area about rental slips. Also, anchoring off the island near the course is prohibited.

**The Cars:** Three different types of cars will race at the ITT Automotive Detroit Grand Prix. The featured cars are the IndyCars. Made famous by the Indianapolis 500, IndyCars are the American version of Europe's popular Formula One race cars.

And although they're known for their prowess on the oval courses like Indy and the Michigan International Speedway, IndyCar "road courses" like Belle Isle, are now as much a part of the IndyCar championship as are the ovals.

The scaled-down version of the IndyCars are known as Indy Lights. Powered by V-6 Buick engines, the Indy Lights produce up to 450 horsepower (750 in the IndyCars), weigh about 150 pounds less than their counterpart, but produce speeds on the courses comparable to an IndyCar.

The final car they'll race at Belle Isle is the Sports Car Club of America Trans-Am class. Modeled after the classic American muscle cars like the Ford Mustang and Chevrolet Camaro, the SCAA Trans-Am circuit cars pack up to 625 horsepower in a carbon-fiber body that can reach speeds of up to 190 mph.

**Best Cheap Seats:** In looking at the layout of the course, we recommend the relatively treeless site between turns three and four. From there, spectators will be able to view three, possibly four turns and listen to a slew of gear changes.

**Radio and TV:** If you're out of town for the weekend, set your VCR to ABC for Sunday's IndyCar race. If you're in the ballpark, but still can't get to the island, WWJ-AM will broadcast the IndyCar and Trans-Am races live.

**No-No:** Remember, no coolers, bottles, cans, chairs, platforms, cranes or buildings are allowed inside the circuit. Thanks.

**Camping:** No!  
**Fun for all:** Yeah!

# Formula just doesn't work for 'Cop'

Sometimes if a film is really well done it can overcome the formula and predictability of its genre. Unfortunately "One Good Cop" isn't one of those exceptional films. It's predictable, at times incredibly dumb and ultimately forgettable.

Michael Keaton and Anthony LaPaglia are a couple New York police detectives working narcotics cases. LaPaglia is a widower with three young daughters. After a less than subtle set-up of him as a devoted dad, guilt-ridden because he ran around on his late wife, you just know he won't be around long. It's that guilt that leads to his death during a violent domestic dis-

pute in which the father is threatening to kill the mother. It seems like concern about who was going to raise his kids might have tempered his action. Instead he makes a split-second decision that costs him his life.

Naturally, Keaton feels responsible and takes the kids on a temporary basis. Yeah right, like there is even any suspense about whether he and his wife, who really wants children but can't have them, will keep the kids.

The other plot line of this film concerns Keaton's efforts to get at the drug dealer who supplied the dope to the guy who killed his partner. In a moment of bitter remorse, the man who actually did the shooting provides the information to get the investigation started.

I don't know which is worse—the sentimental drive involving the kids and the homefront or the unrealistic and morally lacking crime

aspect. Keaton and company knock lots of heads together which seems to be the largest part of their investigation. That and Keaton glaring behind dark glasses. Very intimidating.

Of course, it wouldn't be a predictable genre picture if Keaton didn't get the bejéaus beat out of him and shot at least once.

The two stories collide as Keaton needs cash to buy a home in order to keep the kids, he decides to rip-off the drug dealers he has been investigating. Apparently, the end is supposed to justify the means. This is reinforced when he drops the excess cash into a church poor box.

Based on the actions Keaton's character takes, I would have to assume the title of the film is meant to be ironic. He might have been a good cop before and clearly he's a loyal friend. But good cops aren't thieves and respect the law. The

# Wender's 'Until the End of the World' stretches on

It's 1999 and an errant nuclear satellite may be headed toward earth. As residents flee the cities, an auto accident occurs that changes the course of a woman's life. According to the narrator, "it may change the course

of the world." Everything in Wim Wender's latest movie, "Until the End of the World," is weighed down with this kind of importance. And sometimes the film, which plays Thursday and Friday at the Magic Bag Theatre in Ferndale, actually sucks an audience into the artsy urgency.

At the heart of the film is a mes-

sage about searching — whether for love, money, or the ability to see. It is the endless yearning of a pair of lovers (one of them played by William Hurt) that sets them on a collision course with each other.

Actually, the plot of "Until the End of the World" sounds pretty dopey on paper. Claire, a free-spirited French woman, gets mixed up with bank robbers who hire her to deliver money to another part of France.

She picks up the hitchhiking Sam (Hurt), who quickly takes off with part of the loot, leaving an I.O.U. behind. Claire falls inexplicably in love with the man and sets off in search of him across the globe.

The first half plays like a travelogue, as the chase jumps from one country to another, from Paris to Berlin to San Francisco and be-

yond. The Japanese sequence is among the most fascinating, filmed in one of the Tokyo hotels where overnight guests sleep in tiny glass-enclosed cubicles.

As pretty as it looks, "Until the End of the World" like a traveler on some whirlwind European bus tour, rarely stays in one place long enough to get a real feel for the terrain.

It does, however, convey an atmosphere of the near-future, where video — in the form of tiny handheld recording devices and the inevitable picture phones — is an even more integral part of daily life.

Hurt is sadly miscast as the mysterious Sam, who turns out to be a good guy after all. The government is "after him" to hand over a special video recording device that, when hooked up to the original viewer's memory, can replay images into a

blind person's brain. Sam's primary reason for globe-trotting is to visit all the people important to his mother, who is blind, and bring images of them back home for her. The experiments, set in a secluded outpost in the Australian desert, take up the second half of the film and lead to a fascinating conclusion.

The video machine, you see, can also unlock Claire's dreams and in a clever use of colorful video imagery, we see those nocturnal images splash across the screen. The effect will certainly be lost when the film comes to cable.

Wenders has wanted to make this film since 1977 and finally got his chance, packing "Until the End of the World" with brilliant, if sometimes incoherent, ideas. It is far less accessible than "Paris, Texas" and "Wings of Desire," whose success

probably led Warner Brothers to agree to distribute the director's latest work.

Months after the film played in other cities, Warners dropped it for a week into a suburban Detroit mall theater with no advance publicity. If nothing else, the film should appeal to modern rock fans, since the

soundtrack is laced with new material by Talking Heads, U2, R.E.M., Elvis Costello, Nick Cave and the Bad Seeds.

And even if they can't follow the plot, others should be fascinated simply by the ambition and passion that goes into each of Wender's projects. He's one of the screen's truly international directors.

"Blue Velvet" (USA — 1986), 8 p.m. June 1-3. David Lynch directed this inspired look at the dark side of suburbia. Kyle McLachlan plays a college student whose involvement with a mysterious torch singer (Isabella Rossellini) leads to weirdness.

Dennis Hopper has his best moments on screen as psychotic Frank Booth while Dean Stockwell does a kinky turn as a cross-dressing brothel proprietor.

"Until the End of the World" (USA — 1991), 8 p.m. June 4-5. Wim Wender's latest is a difficult but worthwhile odyssey through the human spirit. It's 1999 and, despite warnings of nuclear destruction on the horizon, a pair of lovers trek through several different countries on an endless search for truth. William Hurt stars.

"Daughters of the Dust" (USA — 1991). Set at the turn of the century, this first feature by director Julie Dash focuses on a group of women who reside on an island between South Carolina and Georgia. Although the film doesn't follow the usual rules of narrative, it's full of beautiful imagery.

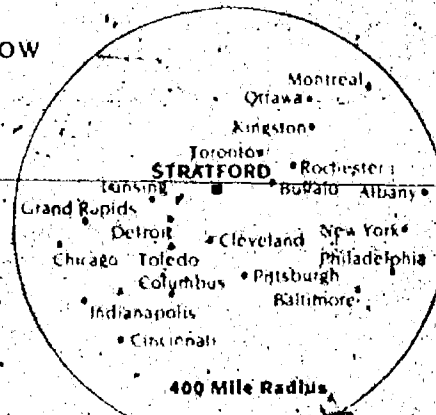

# Doing the Charleston Spoleto Festival U.S.A.

For 15 seasons Spoleto Festival U.S.A. has lured Charleston's high-mindedness from its drawing rooms, libraries and walled gardens to its streets and theaters.

This year there are more than 100 events scheduled until June 7, including United States premieres of opera and dance and dozens of chamber music, choral, jazz and orchestral performances.

At no other time of year does Charleston seem more endearing than during Spoleto, when the city turns its attentions from the past to the bustling life set before it — musicians carting instruments, street mimes and basket weavers, groups of theatergoers absorbed in conversation.

**The festival**

The disputes over artistic control that rocked the Spoleto Festival last year seem to have been resolved, resulting in a new season under the firm hand of the festival's founder, Gian Carlo Menotti.

This year's program carries forward his vision to produce in a single blow an astonishing variety of performances.

The performances may be traditional or radical ("shocking," Menotti called the production of Richard Strauss' "Elektra," to be performed with the American soprano Deborah Polaski on June 2 and 5), as intimate as chamber music or as grand as a choir.

And there are new features: late-night cabaret concerts and a one-night show throughout the festival by the Polish sculptor Igor Mitoraj.

The festival will close June 7 with a concert by the Duke Ellington Orchestra. The regular Spoleto events are augmented by 600, often free, Piccolo Spoleto performances.

## With Disney project, time shares come of age

While the recession lingers on like a bad cold, time shares are enjoying a modest boom.

Sales are up, according to the American Resort Development Association (ARDA), a trade organization for the time-share industry.

As of April 1992, there were 1.415 million time-share owners in the United States, an 18.2 percent jump from 1990.

There is also excitement about two new players who have recently entered the market.

In February, Hilton Hotels Corp. formed a partnership to build and market time shares with Grand Vacations Ltd., calling the new enterprise Hilton Grand Vacations.

But the start-up that prompted the most attention was made by The Walt Disney Co. In October 1991, it unveiled the Disney Vacation Club, a company to market Disney's first venture into time sharing.

The magical name of Disney was like a wave of Tinkerbell's wand to the industry. It seemed to signify that at long last, time shares had come of age.

For those in the time-share busi-

ness, this was no small achievement.

"There was a public perception that time shares meant lack of vacation flexibility," said W. Lynn Seldon Jr., publisher of time-share Travelog, a bimonthly newsletter for time-share owners. "If you had a time share at Hilton Head Island for the third week of August, people believed you were stuck forever with that week. That's just not true."

Then there was the problem of high-pressure sales techniques.

"You'd walk in and a salesman would explain that the unit was \$34,000 — but if you bought today you could have it for \$11,000. If you waited till tomorrow, the price went back up," said Mark Pacala, general manager of Disney Vacation Club.

"So the only sales they made were there, right on the spot. And if you didn't buy you left feeling beat up."

Most industry watchers agree, this has changed. Pacala notes that 70 percent of Disney's time-share purchases "are made by people after they get home. That's unprecedented in this business."

A time share is essentially a pre-paid vacation. It's marketed as a period of vacation time, usually seven days, at a specific resort.

The price depends on the type and size of accommodation, its location and the season in which it is

to be used. In time-share industry jargon, the colors red, white and blue are used to signify high, middle and low season, respectively.

A red week for a two-bedroom apartment at a top resort might cost \$12,000; a white week \$10,000 and a blue week \$8,000. The cost of an average time share, according to ARDA, is \$9,000.

In traditional real-estate, clients buy the property; with time shares, in effect, clients "own" the specific week in the specific property for the rest of their lives.

Owners can exchange their time-share week for a comparable week at another resort using the services of brokers such as Resort Condominiums International Inc. (RCI), a company that manages time-share resort exchanges for a nominal fee.

For example, it allows the owner of a red week at Hilton Head Island in August to make an exchange for a red week in Vail, Colo., at Christmas.

The time-share industry began in Europe in 1968 when owners of apartments in the French Alps allowed people to buy vacations a week at a time. The idea was to get to a favorite ski resort for the same week, year after year.

"It was the oil crisis of the mid-70s that awakened the industry in this country," said Brian Callaghan, who publishes "Endless Vacation," a travel magazine owned by RCI.

"You had all of these second homes built in the early '70s that were sitting unsold. Time shares began to spring up about 1973."

There were eight time-share resorts in the United States at the end of 1973, according to the ARDA's research. Currently, there are 1,329.

If a time share seems expensive, advocates urge consumers to consider the cost of a week's accommodation at their favorite resort and multiply it year after year.

"Time shares appeal to families for several reasons," Callaghan said. "They're a tremendous hedge against inflation because they fix your vacation costs. After five to seven years, you've broken even."

Families who visit Disney World during the same week every year are attracted by Disney Vacation Club. The company has already completed 175 of its first 197 time-share units in Orlando and 50 have been sold.

# Women get ready to take 'giant step back'

You've come a long way, baby. Rest room equity and country club equality were addressed during this session of the Michigan Legislature.

Both issues were precipitated by Oakland County lawmakers. In March, the Republican representative from Farmington Hills, introduced a new law requiring theaters, arenas to provide women with adequate rest room facilities.

And Mat Dunaskis, a Republican who represents the Rochester area, co-sponsored the House-Senate committee bill after months of haggling, put together a bill which guarantees women equal status at private country clubs.

Original introduced by Lana Pollack, an Ann Arbor Democrat, it passed the House and Senate last week and is now awaiting Gov. John Engler's signature.

Although publicity has focused on equal tee times, the bill also includes the right to eat and drink at men-only lounges — which actually may prove harder to enforce.

Randy Erskine, golf pro at Glen Oaks Country Club in Rochester, thinks women will still stay clear of the Stag Room, a bar overlooking the 10th hole, out of respect for tradition. Just whose tradition might that be?

On the surface, it appears that women are making some in-roads. But it's odd that both these bills, which seem so basic, are coming to fruition now.

After all, women have been standing in lines which extend out the doors of public restrooms for decades, while men moved in and out of theirs as if each had a revolving door.

And it's been some time since the workforce was so dominated by men as

to require that week-end golf tee times (and tennis courts) be designated for their use alone.

For instance, it's been at least 10 years since my friend, Sandy Rose, and I petitioned the Orchard Valley Swim and Tennis Club in West Bloomfield to allow "working women" to play tennis during what was labeled a men's mixer each Sunday morning.

That was granted for a couple of years. Then additional courts were built and four of six re-reserved for the "men's mixer."

Back to the question, why now? Perhaps it's the pressure the male-dominated Michigan Legislature is feeling from the influx of women who are making bids for public office. Maybe legislators feel that by passing a few laws to pacify women, that momentum will dissolve.

More likely the Legislature is throwing out a few morsels before voting to take the big bite. Legislators are priming to gobble up the right of the women in this state to decide whether or not to give birth to a child.

Remember the game, "Mother may I?" Everyone starts at the same point, then you ask the leader if you can move one or two steps or even a broad jump ahead. You must say "Mother may I?" If you don't, you're ordered to retreat.

In this context, the question has become "Father may I?"

The response: You've come a long way baby, now get ready to take a giant step back.

# Suburban lawmakers back regional control of water board

It's up to House Speaker Lew Dodak whether the Detroit-controlled water board becomes a regional authority.

Dodak, D-Birch Run, will decide this week which committee gets the Senate-passed regionalization bill.

"If it gets into this committee, it's dead on arrival," said Oakland County Drain Commissioner George Kuhn, his index finger stabbing the roster of the Housing and Urban Affairs Committee. It's chaired by Rep. Nelson Saunders, D-Detroit, and has 40 percent Detroit members.

"If it goes here —" Kuhn pointed to the Towns and Counties Committee chaired by Rep. Roland Niederstadt, D-Saginaw, and contains no big-city members. "I've talked to Niederstadt. All I want is to get the bill to the floor where it can be voted on."

The Senate Thursday gave a 16-

approval to SB 936, put on a fast track by sponsor David Honigman, R-West Bloomfield, after one of the most bitter Detroit-suburban-floor debates in years.

For 16 years suburban lawmakers like Rep. John Bennett, D-Redford, and Sen. Gil DiNello, D-East Detroit, had been shot down with efforts to establish a multi-county authority to take over the wholesaling of water and sewerage services from the city of Detroit. Kuhn, drain commissioner since 1973, was one of the local movers.

Honigman, a freshman senator, moved the bill through the upper chamber in only a few weeks.

Voting yes were 12 Republicans and nine Democrats, including Mike Bouchard, R-Birmingham, Mat Dunaskiss, R-Lake Orion, William Faust, D-Westland, Jack Faxton, D-Farmington Hills, Robert Geake, R-Northville, George Hart, R-DeARBorn, and Honigman.

Voting no were eight Republicans and eight Democrats, including De-

troit's five senators and GOP chief, tains such as majority leader Dick Posthumus of Alto.

One senator missed the vote: Lana Pollack, D-Ann Arbor.

As a former state senator (1967-76), Kuhn was able to get on the Senate floor with Honigman.

Kuhn said Honigman's bill differed from earlier efforts in setting up a procedure to pay off Detroit for any of its general fund money that might be in the system.

The system has been built largely with federal aid and from revenues, according to court documents. "Equity for Detroit is absolutely guaranteed," Kuhn said.

"Detroit senators didn't think so."

"You lay \$3 billion on the table, and maybe we might want to talk," said Democrat Michael O'Brien.

# Romney out, DeVos is in

Neighbors Ronna Romney and Andrea Fischer knocked each other out at Saturday's Republican State Convention, handing over the national committee woman seat to Betsy DeVos of Ada on the second ballot.

Romney, of Bloomfield, ran last on the first ballot in her bid for a third term, tearfully asking "friends and family" to "choose your candidate." Then she donned the pink cap that symbolized DeVos's "family values" campaign, which had religious undertones.

Result: Republicans broke their geographic balancing tradition by picking both their national committeeman and committeewoman from the Grand Rapids area. Re-elected committeeman, unopposed, was Chuck Yob.

First ballot results were 663 for DeVos, 641 for Fischer and 572 for Romney.

On the second ballot, Fischer, a Birmingham lawyer, was trailing by about 50 votes from more than 3,000 cast when she conceded to DeVos.

Fischer had strong support from people close to Gov. John Engler, for whom she was a fund-raiser, and open support

from Oakland County Executive hopeful L. Brooks Patterson.

The unpaid national committee member is a money-raiser and organization person rarely seen by the public. But the women's contest — practically the only race at the state convention — had some undercurrents:

- The 1996 U.S. Senate race — DeVos's husband, Dick, is a potential contender.

- Religion — DeVos is a trustee of two private schools, Ada Christian and Kendall College of Art & Design, and her supporters displayed anti-abortion stickers. Back-of-the-room talk noted that Fischer "isn't a saved Christian." Fischer, a partner in the law firm of Miller, Canfield, Paddock and Stone, is an Oakland University trustee.

- Term limitation — Romney had served eight years, and critics saw her as self-promoting rather than GOP-promoting. Perhaps, significantly, delegates supported a term-limitation proposal by a vote of 834 to 394.

There was no proposal on abortion before the state convention. Abortion will, however, be a platform issue when Michigan's 72 delegates travel to Houston Aug. 16 for the national convention. Pro-choice forces want the GOP to soften the party's anti-abortion stand.

# Look for partial eclipse June 15

At last, June has arrived. This is the month of the official start of summer, although many think summer begins on Memorial Day. (People who went camping over Memorial Day weekend may have thought it was the beginning

(PRO see on) in the constellation of Canis Minor, the Little Dog. Procyon is the eighth-brightest star in the sky and is about 11 light-years away.

Above and to the right of the moon on the 3rd are Pollux and Castor, the "twin" stars in Gemini. Pollux is actually slightly brighter than Castor and closer to us. The distance to Castor is 45 light-years; Pollux is 35 light-years away.

The moon is 16 degrees above Procyon on the evening of the 4th. Since one degree is equivalent to two full moon diameters, the distance separating these two objects is about 30 moon diameters.

On the evening of the 5th the moon is approaching the star Regulus (REG u lus) in Leo. To the left of Regulus is the giant planet, Jupiter. Jupiter is generally the 4th brightest object in the sky but, since Venus is not visible this month, we can consider Jupiter the third brightest object. (Only the sun and moon are brighter.)

The moon, Jupiter and Regulus form an equilateral triangle on the evening of the 6th. Jupiter is seven degrees from Regulus on the 6th; by the end of the month they will be 10 degrees apart.

First-quarter moon is at 4:47 p.m. on the 7th. It has completed the first-quarter of its orbit around the earth.

The moon is in Virgo, approaching the star Spica (SPY ka) on the evening of the 9th, and has passed that star by the following night. Spica is the 16th brightest star in the sky.

The bright star two degrees to the right of the moon on the evening of the 13th is Antares (an TAR ees), the "heart" of Scorpius. Directly above the moon and Scorpius is a constellation that covers one of the largest areas of the sky. This obscure star pattern honors a doctor. Its name is Ophiuchus (oh fee YOU kus). In his outstretched arms he holds the symbol of doctors; Serpens the serpents.

Ophiuchus (it sounds like profanity!) has been identified with Aesculapius, the first physician. According to mythology, this doctor was so good, he could restore life to the dead. That was something that irritated Pluto, god of the underworld, to no end.

Ophiuchus looks like a big lopsided follow-the-dot house leaning to the left, without any bright stars to help identify it. (Is there a doctor in the house?) Notice the bright blue-white star high in the east; this is Vega (VEE ga) in Lyra the lyre. A line drawn from Vega to Antares passes directly through Ophiuchus, passing nearly directly through the apex of the "house."

In the year 1604, astronomer Johann Kepler witnessed a supernova, which has since become known as Kepler's Star, in Ophiuchus. The ecliptic (path of the sun, moon and planets) runs through a portion of the bottom of this constellation, so it could be considered a thirteenth member of the zodiac. Actually, there is more of the ecliptic in Ophiuchus than in Scorpius!

## Full moon on 15th

The moon is full at 12:50 a.m. on June 15. The full moon that occurs in June has been called the Rose Moon, Strawberry Moon and Flower Moon by various native American tribes. Notice the low altitude of the full moon this month. Because the full moon is opposite the sun, it is low in the summer while the sun is at its highest. In winter the opposite occurs.

There will be a partial lunar eclipse, as the moon passes through the earth's shadow, and it will be visible (weather permitting) from our area. The moon enters the earth's umbra (darkest area of the shadow) at 11:27 p.m. on June 14. Maximum eclipse, when 69% of the moon is covered, occurs at 12:57 a.m. on the 15th. The illuminated portion of the moon will look like a smile in the sky. There is no hazard to your eyes in viewing an eclipse of the moon, and binoculars are just as good to use as a telescope.

By the way, the eclipse occurs within the constellation of Ophiuchus; the third magnitude star to the lower right of the eclipsed moon is Theta Ophiuchi, which is about 700 light-years distant. The moon leaves the umbra, essentially ending the eclipse, at 2:27 a.m.

Raymond Bullock is former coordinator of the planetarium and observatory at the Cranbrook Institute of Science, Bloomfield Hills. He now works for a Troy firm which specializes in laser displays and effects.

This year there will be a partial eclipse of the moon in June, a total eclipse of the sun (although it's not visible from our area) and Mercury puts in an excellent evening appearance.

The length of the day at the start of the month is nearly the same as at the end; 15 hours and 8 minutes versus 15 hours and 18 minutes. Sunrise on June is at 5:59 a.m. and sunset is at 9:07 p.m. On June 30 these times are 6:00 a.m. and 9:18 p.m. (All times are Eastern Daylight Time.)

## Venus obscured

Mercury and Jupiter will be visible in the evening sky this month; Mars and Saturn are in the pre-dawn sky. Venus is too close to the sun to be seen.

Face west on the evening of the 3rd and look for the waxing (growing) crescent moon, 45 minutes after sunset. Below and to the left of the moon, eight degrees above due west, is the bright star Procyon

**WHEN IS IT ALL RIGHT TO HURT?**  
Aching means something is amiss. However, there are aches which represent a re-occurring discomfort but not a condition leading to eventual crippling or impairment.  
One example of such an ache is the pain of tension. You may be a person who handles stress by a tightness of your muscles and joints; you have periods of aching which come and then suddenly leave. There are days you awaken well, and days you are tight all over. The aching settles in your shoulders and back as your mood reminds you that a great (emotional) weight rests upon you. You find that a hot shower helps, and the working out, if possible, or the distraction of recreation, eases the ache. If you watch carefully, you may find the connection between the pain and the event that upsets you.  
A second example is the aching that occurs after usual effort. Often you have more problem recognizing the connection than you would believe. As you age, your resiliency leaves before your sense of self acknowledges the loss of recuperative power. What you need as you grow older is more time to repair not a medical evaluation to uncover a secret of nature residing in your joints.  
If aching is accompanied by a swollen joint, or you lose use of your hands, shoulders or knees, the above does not apply. Then you seek a doctor's evaluation without delay.

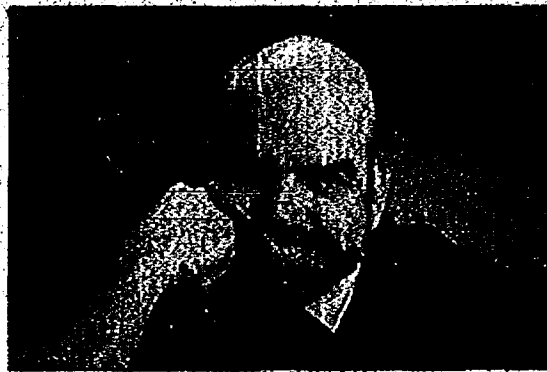

### Favorite foods taste better cooked on grill

Ask any of the Janes gang how they prefer their meat or fish cooked and the answer would be unanimous — "on the grill." Whether tossed on a \$6 bargain basement special or cooked to perfection on an \$800 outdoor range, you just can't beat a grill for cooking your favorite foods.

Maybe it's the look of the grilling marks, perfectly zig-zagged on a filet or the sumptuous sizzle from swordfish being brushed with an herb butter that makes the food so good. Maybe it's just being outside on a sultry summer's eve with a spatula in one hand and a cool drink in the other. There's no doubt about it, I love to cook on the grill.

Cooking on the grill can be exotic and expensive, as you well know. Standard grills require charcoal, start-up and plenty of long handled utensils which help avoid singed hands and arms.

Gas grills require propane, the same long handled utensils and a little more attention to cleanliness lest the burners get clogged with drippings and food residue. In addition to the cost of the grill, those are just for starters.

If you desire and can afford more, the list can escalate dramatically with the addition of special woods for that delicately imparted flavor and additional equipment that can make the job a little easier.

Charcoal chimneys, non-stick grill pans, speciality food holders and claw utensils not to mention meat thermometers, grill mitts and squirt bottles all make grilling more of a culinary fete, in addition to costing a bundle. What's hot and what's not?

### Hot gadgets

Here's a look at what's available and in descending order, what should be a priority should you wish to expand your summer grilling expertise.

If you happen to be like me, you're still relying on the famed old standby, a Weber kettle grill. This grill is the standard for the industry and performs well. In addition to the grill and charcoal, to make lighting easier, you need a charcoal chimney. This is nothing more than a tall coffee can with handles. Simply set the chimney in the grill, add a crumbled Taste section and top off with charcoal. Light the bottom and in 15 minutes or less, expect glowing coals.

Available anywhere grills are sold, expect to pay \$12 to \$20. Speaking of charcoal, you certainly get what you pay for. Look for genuine hardwood briquettes, no ifs, ands, or butts. They not only last longer, but in the long run, allow you to really use less, saving you more money for better gadget or food purchases.

Relatively new on the market within the last few years are non-stick grilling pans that sit right on the grill grids and allow the backyard barbequer an opportunity to cook a multitude of foods without ever having to worry about the food falling into the hot coals.

The first prototypes introduced were nothing more than cookie sheets with holes, but the market has improved itself and now heavier models are made of anodized aluminum. Non-stick surfaces make for a grilling pan with holes that will not warp and make cleanup a breeze. Prices vary dramatically with some models, depending on size, starting at \$15 and running the gamut to about \$75 for the top-of-the-line. I bought mine at a gourmet shop for about \$25 and wouldn't think of firing up the grill without it.

Claw tools and specialty baskets for burgers, meats and fish are cute, but it's my professional opinion that they are useless, especially when a top grid grilling pan is available.

### Flavor enhancers

Speciality woods seem to be the rage again this year, as in the past. Hickory chips, applewood and other assorted fruitwood chips supposedly add a distinct flavor, but unless you plan on covering the grill and allowing the smoky flavors to penetrate whatever it is you cook, they are expensive additions which do little.

Herbs are more readily available and can be tossed on the hot coals directly when fresh or can be soaked for a few minutes in liquid if dried. In my opinion, they are more flavorful and cost-effective than those fancy woods.

Lastly, I would like to mention two personal favorites. A few years back, I picked up one of those inexpensive plastic squirt bottles and a good instant read thermometer.

The thermometer is always useful for immediately registering internal meat temperatures while the squirt bottle is always kept loaded with wine, broth or water to douse flare-ups and help keep what's cooking moist. Trust me on those last two, you won't be disappointed with either.

So if the backyard beckons, or you happen to be looking for a few new ideas for Father's Day gift giving ideas, the above mentioned gadgets will surely please all who cook on the grill.

## DAIRY MOON

# something to moo about

You have to realize something right off the bat; the closest I've ever been to a cow was being chosen as a celebrity cow milker at last year's Michigan State Fair. I lost the competition because my cow "missy" inadvertently knocked over the milk pail when I assumed I grabbed her a little too ardently.

So when a packet of information heralding June as National Dairy Month crossed my desk, I couldn't wait to contact Irene Cameron from the Michigan Dairy Council, and a Livonia resident, to set up an interview with a dyed in the wool dairy farmer. I wanted to be ready and knowledgeable should that State Fair gig come up again this year.

I was surprised when she returned my call with information on one of Southeastern Michigan's premier dairy farms, owned and operated by Stanley and Sarah Gill just south of Canton in Wayne County!

This dairy farm, with close to 600 "bossies" in it's herd is one of the oldest and largest continually operating dairy farms in the Midwest. Owned and

operated by the Gill family, whose heritage traces back to England, it was founded in 1834 and is still being run by Stanley and Sarah Gill with their son Tom and his wife Sherry.

The visit was an eye opener. The Janes gang has long been avid milk drinkers, but never gave much thought to where milk comes from and how it got to the dairy case.

With a milking herd of about 480 cows, this dairy farm is in operation 24 hours a day. The Gills employ a crew of 17 who tend the cows, and farm more than 1,200 acres of prime alfalfa, hay and straw. The farmland helps generate feed for the milking herd, and the 100 or so bulls and 65 calves that keep the operation going at full swing.

The milking herd gets milked three times daily — 4 a.m., 11 a.m. and 7 p.m. Sarah Gill keeps tabs on the farmhouse, paperwork, and calves, while husband Stanley sees that more than 4,000 gallons of fresh milk get delivered through rain, snow and shine, 365 days a year to the Michigan Dairy in Eivonia.

For the uninitiated, that means the Gills' farm produces more than 13 million pounds of milk every year.

The Gills are proud to point out that their operation is one of the few that produces only pure, Grade A milk.

There are various grades of milk, but only the Grade A milk gets made into real butter, whole milk and ice cream. The other grades are processed into

other forms of milk products.

Cameron was quick to point out that in Michigan alone, there are more than 5,000 dairy farmers with over 850 of these that have been in business over 50 years.

"Together, dairy farmers and processors contribute more than \$15 billion to Michigan's economy." Hard to believe, but Michigan ranks only seventh in total milk production with over five billion pounds being produced annually.

"Technology, new milking practices, and the fluctuation of milk prices have dramatically changed the way dairy farmers do business," said Cammeron. Sarah Gill agrees and says, "Last year's price drop of \$1 per 100 pounds darn well near swept our feet right out from under us."

The Gills use computers and modern milking technology to get the highest volume from their milking herd. One of these technologies knocked the socks off this writer when I visited the Gills' state of the art eight stall herringbone milking parlor that can milk 16 cows simultaneously in less than 20 minutes. "It was a major investment," said Gill, "but it has paid for itself with the added speed and convenience."

In addition to her duties on the farm, Sarah Gill is also quite a cook. A recent visit found her preparing buttermilk biscuits from scratch that rivaled momma's. Here's a lady who eschews modern conveniences in the kitchen, but not



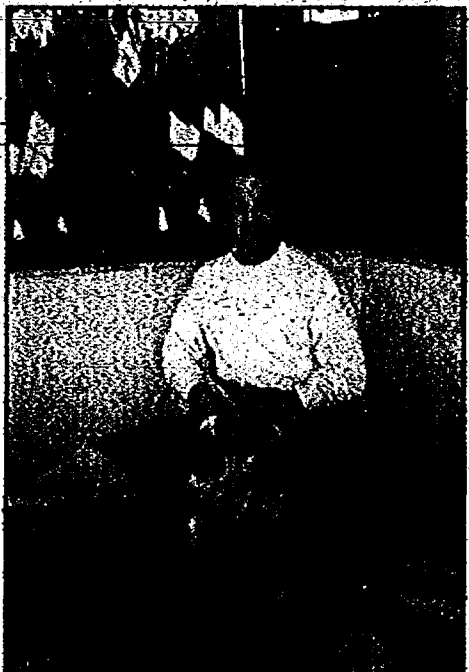

on the farm. She still washes her face with milk everyday, and looks pretty darned chipper for someone who works 365 days a year.

So the next time you pick up a gallon of milk, a hunk of cheese or some ice cream at the grocers, remember folks like Stanley and Sarah Gill who literally work around the clock to bring folks like us the best Michigan has to offer.

# Dairy farmer shares biscuit recipe

These biscuits rival momma's. They taste good alone with butter and jam, with a gravy, or strawberries and cream.

## SHARAH GILL'S HOMEMADE BUTTERMILK BISCUITS

2 cups sifted flour  
3 teaspoons baking powder  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1/4 teaspoon baking soda  
1/2 teaspoon sugar  
5 tablespoons shortening, at room temperature  
1 cup buttermilk

Sift together dry ingredients. Cut in the shortening with a fork

or pastry blender it will be coarse crumbs. Add buttermilk all at once and stir until the dough follows the fork around the bowl.

Turn out and knead 5, 6 times. Be careful because too much handling makes dough tough. Roll 1/2 inch thick and cut with a cutter or glass. Brush biscuits with a little melted butter. Place in a baking dish and bake at 375 to 400 degrees for 10 to 12 minutes, depending on your oven. When baked, brush the tops again with butter and sprinkle a little sugar on top. Makes about 8 biscuits.

## EASY AMERICAN TART SHELL

3/4 cup (1 1/2 sticks) butter, softened

1/2 cup sugar  
1 egg  
1 1/2 cups all-purpose flour  
3/4 cup chopped almonds, toasted

Preheat oven to 375 degrees Fahrenheit. For shell, line 13 x 9-inch baking pan with heavy-duty aluminum foil. Cream butter and sugar in medium bowl. Add egg; beat well. Gradually stir in flour and nuts. Press evenly onto bottom and about 1 inch up sides of prepared pan. Bake 12 minutes or until lightly browned. Cool completely. Transfer to serving plate using foil to lift shell from pan; remove foil.

## TART FILLING

2 packages (3.4 ounces each) instant vanilla pudding mix  
2 cups milk  
2 teaspoons lemon juice  
1 teaspoon grated lemon peel  
1 cup whipping cream  
strawberries or raspberries  
blueberries or blackberries  
banana slices

For filling, beat together pudding mix, milk, lemon juice and peel. In separate bowl, beat whipping cream just until stiff peak form; gently fold into pudding mixture. Spread evenly in tart shell. Decorate to resemble flag using berries and banana slices to form stars and stripes.

## GRILLED GARLIC AND ONIONS

12 thin wooden skewers  
3 large sweet onions  
1 bulb garlic, peeled  
1 cup white wine  
salt and pepper to taste

Soak the wooden skewers in any liquid for about 1 hour before cooking to prevent burning.

Peel and quarter onions and alternately skewer on the stick with the garlic cloves. Grill over hot coals, frequently brushing or spraying with wine while cooking. Cook until vegetables are tender, about 15-20 minutes. Salt and pepper to taste. Serves 6.

## GRILLED FISH WITH CITRUS MAYONNAISE

1 pound fish suitable for grilling

juice from 2 lemons, limes or oranges  
1 cup mayonnaise  
1/4 cup Parmesan cheese

Allow the fish to come to room temperature before grilling. For optimum results, use only fresh citrus juice. Combine the juice with the mayonnaise and Parmesan cheese and mix well. Fish can be marinated in the mixture

for 1 hour before cooking, if desired.

Place fish over glowing coals, about 4 inches from heat. Remember, fish cooks quickly so keep brushing citrus mayonnaise mixture over fish while cooking to keep moist. Flip fish and brush with remaining sauce. Cook until fish flakes easily, about 3 minutes on each side for 1 1/2 inch thick fillet. Serves 4.

## KONA COCONUT MUFFINS

1/2 cup unsalted butter, at room temperature  
1/2 cup sugar  
1/2 cup lightly packed brown sugar  
2 eggs  
1 3/4 cups all-purpose flour  
1 tablespoon baking powder  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
1/2 cup brewed dark roast coffee, cooled slightly  
1/2 cup milk  
2 teaspoons vanilla extract  
1 1/2 cups coarsely chopped walnuts  
3/4 cup sweetened grated coconut

Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. Grease and flour 12 muffin cups or line them with paper baking cups.

In a large bowl, cream the butter with the sugars until light and fluffy. Beat in eggs one at a time.

In a small bowl, sift together dry ingredients. Combine coffee, milk and vanilla in another small bowl. Alternately blend the coffee and flour mixtures with the creamed butter. Stir in nuts and coconut.

Fill muffin tins and bake in a 350-degree F oven until a toothpick inserted in the center of a muffin comes out clean, 25 to 35 minutes. Cool briefly on a wire rack. Makes 12 muffins.

# Lighten up, add calcium to your diet

Dairy products are still one of the best dietary sources of calcium. If you're concerned about the fat, lighten up advises Florine Mark president and CEO of The Weight Watchers Group Inc.

\*Osteoporosis currently afflicts

one in four post-menopausal women in our country, and all American women have been advised to increase the amount of calcium in their diets," said Mark who offers this advice for keeping your diet low in fat.

Aim for two to three servings of dairy products a day. Instead of whole milk, choose skim; instead of whole milk cottage cheese and yogurt, choose the kind with one percent fat or nonfat. Instead of regular

cream cheese, choose reduced-fat Neufchâtel. Evaporated milk can be used instead of cream in soups and entrees. Low-fat cottage cheese can be whipped in a blender with a bit of skim milk and substituted for mayonnaise.

Put your coffee in the freezer: Whole beans will keep for about two months in the freezer; ground coffee will remain fresh for two to three weeks in the refrigerator.

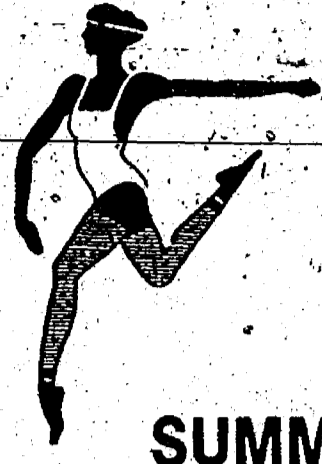

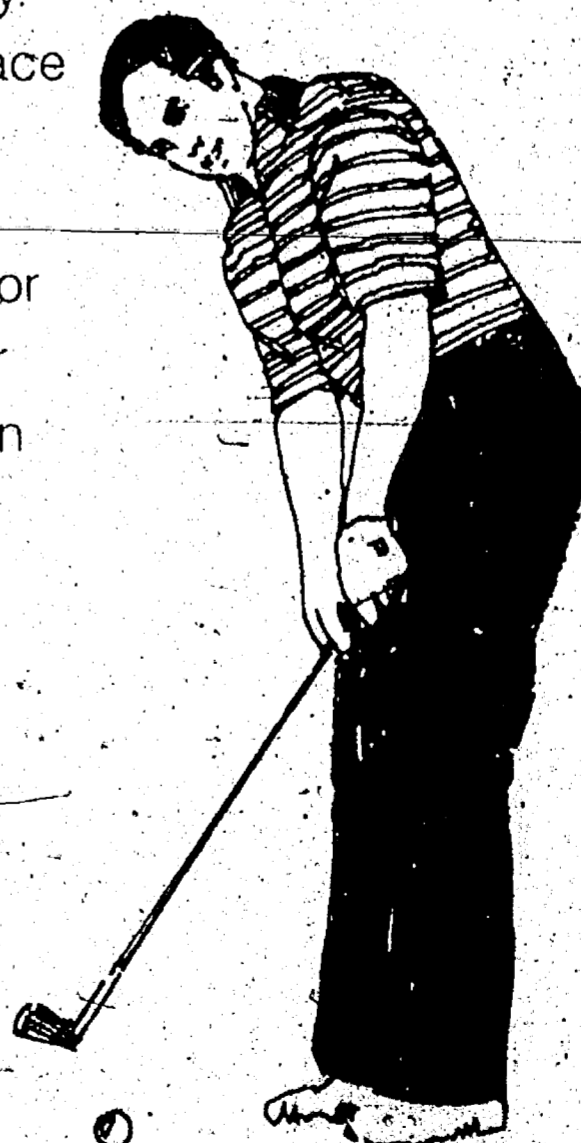

# Agency helps courts deal with spouse abusers

Throwing those who abuse their spouses behind bars is not always the best remedy. Prisons are overcrowded and taxpayers are tired of always "footing the bill."

District judges, including those in Westland and Livonia, are turning to an alternative means of dealing with abusers who they feel can be turned around without a prison sentence.

Education Training Research Services, based in Livonia, provides the courts with that alternative.

"Two years ago, Judge Gail McKnight (of 18th District Court in Westland) approached us about offering a program for domestic abuse. She had run out of ways of dealing with these individuals coming before her and was searching for an option which would offer the best benefit for the family," said Brian S. Smoly, ETRS executive director.

ETRS had offered programs in the areas of drug and alcohol abuse, but had not confronted the issues faced by men and women who were abusive in their most personal relationships.

Consultants with the firm, including Harriett Johnson, set about to create a program which would meet

the needs of the courts, the abusers and the abused. The program is already in such great demand that sessions are now offered quite frequently, according to Smoly, and a second program may soon be offered for the victims of this type of abuse.

### More violence

"We are seeing more and more domestic violence as a result of economic conditions and other external factors," he said. "This type of abuse crosses all boundaries and affects individuals from all walks of life."

District court judges now require those convicted of domestic abuse to complete the ETRS course as part of their probation. Abusers attend a 15-hour weekend course which involves intensive exploration of the reasons behind the abuse and then there are several follow-up sessions.

After completing the course, and at specific points during the process, ETRS consultants report back to the courts indicating whether or not they believe the individual to still be a threat.

### Clients blame everyone

"Clients come in here Friday night and they are angry at everything," Smoly said. "They blame their spouse or their girlfriend or their children."

By Sunday, Smoly estimates that 75 to 80 percent show a drastic change in attitude.

"They learn that there is no justification for abusing another person," he said.

The sessions are made up of mostly male offenders. More than one-half of the clients also have a problem with alcohol.

"We see corporate executives and low-income, blue-collar workers here. We do not judge them. We ask them only to look at their behavior and learn other ways of handling their anger and their feelings," Smoly said.

The offender starts the weekend session by explaining how he arrived at this point. He speaks in front of the group of offenders as well as a male and female instructor. At first, Smoly said, they find things and people to blame — money, nagging, etc.

"The instructors start right out saying that no one has the right to abuse another person," Smoly said. "As the weekend progresses, the clients are taught to talk their problems out and to negotiate and reason with their partner."

They are taught about interacting with women in a non-threatening, non-violent manner. They handle topics such as trust, support, honesty, fairness, accountability and sexual respect. Finally, the instruc-

tors lay the foundation for creating a partnership between the husband and wife and children by setting goals and setting parameters.

The offender who is propelled by alcohol to even worse behavior often requires more than the domestic abuse course, Smoly said.

"You cannot fix one problem without handling the other," Smoly said. "We will usually include them in our alcohol abuse program as well."

### Few returnees

The program is fairly new so there is no effective way to track the results, but with the clients who have gone through the program there seems to be little indication of recurrence.

"These people are not, in general, turning up in court again," he said. "That does not always mean the abuser has stopped, but we see it as a good sign."

Smoly also measures success by the number of clients who phone or write to let the instructors know how they are doing.

"After completing the program and making use of the skills they have learned, our clients are astounded by the changes in their lives."

Several past clients have returned to talk at sessions and discuss their relationships and how they have improved now that violence is no longer a factor.



One of the area's patrics in softball is no more.

Livonia Churchill, that's right, the 17-5 Chargers, are moving on to the Class A regional at Temperance-Bedford after eliminating Farmington Harrison (6-1) and Farmington High (15-1) in Saturday's district tourney at the Southfield Civic Center.

When was the last time Churchill won a district title in softball?

It's been awhile, so long in fact that first-year coach Dana Hardwidge couldn't locate a district plaque after scouring the school's trophy case.

"We knew we were one of the favorites," said Vicki Lucas, the Chargers' hard-hitting shortstop. "But we still had to make sure everybody's heads were in it."

Lucas personally guaranteed that her

senior season would continue, putting on an awesome display of hitting by knocking in 11 runs on the day. Her three-run homer in the opener against Harrison bounced — on the fly — only 10 feet from the 250-foot fence.

In the championship final against the Falcons, she ripped a towering shot to left field for a grand slam, her seventh homer of the season.

"The pitchers were kind of slow and I got excited," said Lucas, who recently signed with Central Michigan University. "I try not to be anxious. It depends on what I see. I usually like them right down the middle."

Lucas made only one out in eight trips to the plate. (Harrison center fielder Kelley West robbed her of a hit in the fifth inning.)

"Her home run was the turning point," said Harrison coach Mike Teachman, who watched a 1-1 deadlock

disappear instantly in the third inning of the first semifinal game. "She's so intimidating, and she's just a monster hitter."

The Chargers put together the total package on Saturday.

They made only one error in the two games and received solid pitching from right-hander Karen Jose, who proved she could throw in back-to-back games.

"I was worried and I thought my arm would hurt, but it wasn't too bad," said the sophomore, who scattered four hits while walking only one and fanning 10 Harrison batters in the opener.

In the soggy nightcap against Farmington, Jose scattered three hits and walked five in five innings. (The game was halted because of the mercy rule.)

"We heard a rumor that she (Jose) could get wild, but she was not wild," Farmington coach Julie Ingalls said. "We started the game taking pitches, but that obviously didn't work."

"They're a good team and they beat us solidly."

Ironically, Farmington pulled off the real surprise of the day, knocking off rival North 7-6.

North, an upset winner in the predis-

trict a week earlier over Livonia Ladywood, was expected to reach the final against Churchill.

But Farmington jumped out to a 3-0 lead through four innings before North responded with five runs in the top of the fifth, keyed by Melonie Cheney's two-run single.

The Falcons answered with three runs in the bottom of the inning, the big hit coming from Danielle Salyer, whose slap-bunt single scored two runs. Marlo Walker's RBI single then put Farmington ahead 6-5.

Canton's junior forward Leah Hutko also had good timing, waiting until after she scored the game's only goal with 19:15 left to have an asthma attack. Ironically, Hutko was motioning to the Canton bench moments before the goal for a rest but couldn't exit without a stoppage of play.

Sophomore forward Mandy Salin picked up the assist on the goal after crossing the ball in front of the Stevenson net.

"I just put my foot out and redirected the ball into the net," Hutko said. "In big games, when my adrenalin is going, my asthma gets worse. I was trying to get off the field for a while but I

couldn't get a (substitute). I guess it was luck we couldn't get a sub."

Hutko played only about two minutes the rest of the game.

"She can't go real long — maybe 15 minutes at the most — without a rest because of the intensity she plays with," said Canton coach Don Smith. "Unless it's a slow-paced game. And this wasn't a slow-paced game."

Each team moved the ball well up-and-down the field but there were few goal-scoring opportunities on either side. Canton took advantage of a breakdown in the Stevenson defense to score the only goal, as the Spartans' senior defender Tracy Morrell was left as the only defender in front of the senior goalkeeper Alicia Smith.

"Someone (Hutko) ran through unmarked, they had two players in front of the box to our one defender, got the play and knocked it in," Stevenson coach Mary Kay Hussey said.

The loss ended Stevenson's season at 15-3-2 overall. Hussey said this was the first time she can remember a Stevenson team losing to anyone three times in one season.

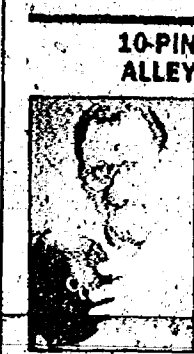

# Crusaders' coach falls for Valentino

There's a bit of rebuilding to do for Madonna University's baseball team, and coach Mike George has wasted no time tackling that task.

Some of the notable losses are pitchers Mike Hocking and all-NAIA District selection Chris Kloc; first baseman Ernie Bowling, a two-time all-district pick; shortstop Jeremy Krol; and part-time center fielder starter Kevin Learned. All have completed their eligibility.

But there's something else. George would like to lose — the poor attitude that infested certain members of the team the last half of the '92 campaign, during which the Crusaders slipped from 21-6 to a final 29-22, going 8-16 over the final three weeks.

"We're going to have a wholesale attitude change," George said.

He embarked on that mission by signing players possessing what he believes to be "fierce, competitive attitudes." Already committed to Madonna are Alpena natives Chad Zann, a pitcher-first baseman, and Tim Kasobowski, a second baseman.

Steve Zann, a catcher and Chad's older brother, is expected to transfer from Central Michigan with three years of eligibility remaining starting next season.

George added three more to his list of recruits last week when he got commitments from Rob Valentino, a pitcher/outfielder from Dearborn Divine Child; Craig Peterson, a pitcher/outfielder from Milford; and Craig Overaitis, an outfielder from Livonia Franklin and Henry Ford Community College.

Of his two new pitchers, George said: "They've both got size, both are athletes. They're going to make an impact."

Valentino comes with star-quality talent. The 6-foot-3, 185-pound right-hander was 8-1 for the Falcons entering Saturday's district play.

"He'll go both ways for us," said George, insisting Valentino — also an outstanding basketball player — could play in the field when not pitching. "He's a very, very intense kid. He's a fastball pitcher and he's got a good overhand curve."

His coach at Divine Child, Coach Falvo, also serves as pitching coach

for Madonna. George said Falvo would work with Valentino on a split-finger fastball and a change-up.

Peterson is not only identical in size to Valentino, but his other attributes are mirror like, too. He was 7-1 for Milford this season and according to George, is "totally committed to the game. He's going to do what it takes to win." Peterson is a "relatively hard thrower" with good control.

Overaitis, a 5-10, 185-pound left-handed hitter, will have two years of eligibility left. George is hoping he can help replace departing slugger Bowling. "He's got some power,"

the Crusader coach said of Overaitis: "He's got some pop in his bat."

Last season, Overaitis hit six homers in 46 games for Henry Ford CC. He batted .437 with 29 runs batted in. "We've got to do something to replace Ernie," George said. "I don't know if we can, but we'll try."

New mound recruits Valentino, Peterson and Zann, combined with red-shirt freshman Mike Grahl and returnees Dennis Hamilton, Jeff Kugelmann and Lou McKaig should provide George with a solid corps of starters. "As far as pitching goes, we're in good shape," he said.

If he can replace Bowling's bat and infuse his team with a toughness to the finish attitude, the Crusaders may make more than a token one-day appearance in the 1993 District 23 tournament.

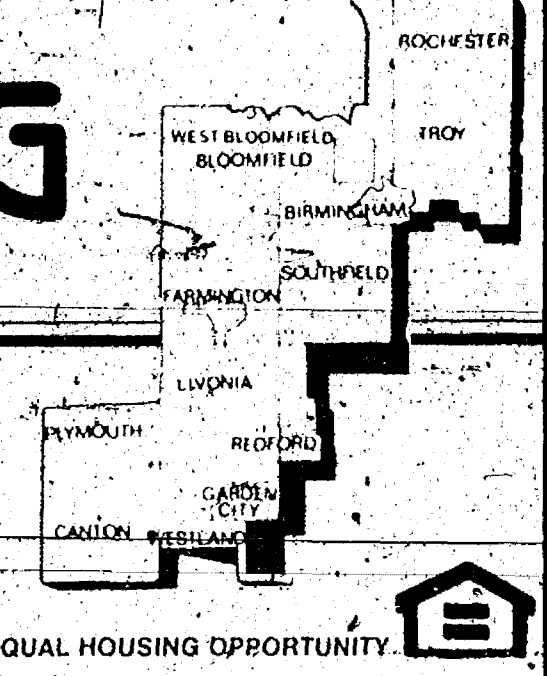

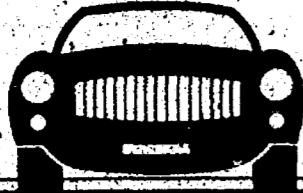




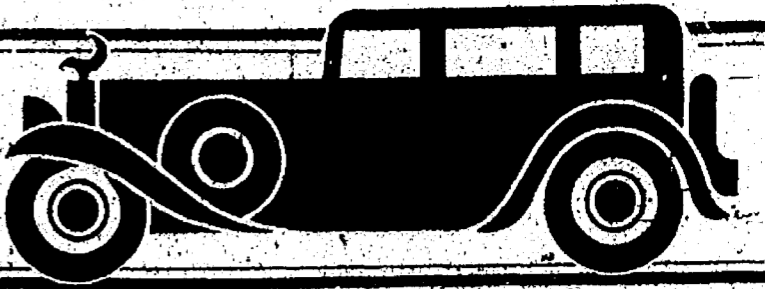
