Robberies unrelated, police say



A pizzeria, gas station and bank were the targets of armed robbers last week. Police believe the incidents, which took place in different parts of the city, are unrelated.

A lone gunman robbed a north Westland pizzeria Thursday night just 19 hours after another bandit, claiming to have a gun, held up a gas station attendant in the opposite end of town, police said.

The latest holdups raised to three the number of armed robberies re-

ported last week, alone, in Westland. They are believed to be unrelated, police said.

Shortly before 11 p.m. Thursday, a handgun-toting bandit robbed the Hungry Howie's pizzeria on Ann Arbor Trail, near Merriman, after slipping through a rear door that a worker left open for ventilation, police reports said.

The worker, a 25-year-old woman, was preparing to put a pizza in the oven when she saw a white male crouching nearby, pointing what she described as a "small dark gun" at her.

The intruder demanded money and escaped with \$400, according to police reports. He then fled through the rear door.

The pizzeria worker declined to comment when contacted Friday. A witness has told police that a possible suspect was seen running south from the pizzeria through the nearby Hawthorne Valley apartment com-

plex.

No arrests had been made as of Friday, and the robbery remains under investigation, said Lt. Al George, head of the Westland Police Department's detective bureau.

The suspect was described as a white male, 35 to 40 years old, weighing about 160 to 170. He had sandy-blond, shoulder-length hair and wore a dark-colored baseball cap, blue jeans, white sneakers, a white T-shirt and a blue jean jacket, the worker told police.

Planner guided city amid growth spurt

George Wilhelmi hasn't been a Westland public servant for long, but he will leave his post as planning director with the knowledge that he served during the most explosive development period in the city's history.

Wilhelmi will retire from the city April 30 after eight years in the planning department. As a member of the planning commission, Wilhelmi was appointed interim planning director by then Mayor Charles Pickering and was later hired for the post.

A degree in civil engineering, a stint with the U.S. Navy as an electrician's mate and a professional career in various positions relating to planning and urban renewal led Wilhelmi to this final step on his career path.

Much growth

Since his appointment in 1985, Westland has grown to be a commercial and residential development powerhouse in western Wayne County. As it's the 10th largest city in the state, Wilhelmi said he felt some pressure to keep up.

"You used to hear people call this Westland, but not anymore," Wilhelmi said. "The 1990 census shows Westland was one of the few Wayne County communities to gain in population, a fact that has some neighboring communities envious."

The implementation of the 1968 Master Plan for the city's downtown district is the accomplishment of which Wilhelmi is most proud. Working with city council and three different mayors, Central City Parkway was opened nearly three years ago.

"The opening of Central City Parkway was the key to fulfilling the 1968 Master Plan," Wilhelmi said. "It tied the city offices and the schools to the downtown commercial district. Development then really took off."

Central City Parkway was developed as part of a Downtown Development Authority and was financed through tax increment financing. Businesses locating in the downtown district would finance the construction of the road through their taxes.

The rapid increase in housing units in the city has also been an exciting change during Wilhelmi's tenure. Apartment, condominium and single-family home construction in the city has led to a jump in population and a slight boost in financial contributions for the school district. While other districts are losing students, Westland appears to be gaining a few, Wilhelmi said.

Market demands

The modest 66-year-old planner takes little credit for the

In case of fire, grab your cable box

When Dan and Maureen Boyd and their two children lost everything they owned in an apartment fire, the last thing they thought about was their cable converter box.

"I didn't even have time to grab shoes for my 4-year-old let alone get my cable box," wrote Dan Boyd in a letter to the Observer.

Continental Cablevision, however, has sent the Boyds a bill for \$350 to replace the cable box. Continental representatives later said they would accept \$101.50, their cost for the box.

Kay'ellen Perry, general manager for Continental, was unavailable for comment, but a customer service representative said the subscriber is always held responsible for any damage to the converter box. Another representative said that each case is handled individually, although the sub-

scriber agreement does indicate that the subscriber is responsible for any damage to the box.

The Boyds live in the Glenwood Orchard apartments. Sixteen families were forced from their homes last month when a fire started in one of the apartments.

The Boyds and many of the other families lost everything they owned.

"We have no insurance," said Maureen Boyd. "All we have are the things the Red Cross emergency fund gave us."

The Boyds were staying in a one-bedroom apartment at Glenwood Orchard until Thursday when a two-bed-

room unit became available.

Maureen Boyd said they are now faced with a shut-off notice on their electricity, the cable bill and other bills that are piling up as a result of lost wages during the week of the fire.

"We lost a week's pay because of the fire with running around and trying to get the kids settled," Maureen Boyd said.

The 4-year-old who was rescued from the blaze by his father is still traumatized by what he saw, Maureen Boyd said.

"Faced with all these things, the last thing I want to think about is

having to pay for that cable box," Maureen Boyd said. "The cable company should go after the guy who caused the fire in the first place. It wasn't our fault that the box was destroyed, and it was the last thing we would have thought to save from our home."

MetroVision, which serves nearby Livonia, Redford Township and Farmington/Farmington Hills; and Omnicon, which has the franchise in Plymouth, Canton and Northville, have similar policies regarding the damage and destruction of the cable converter boxes.

Bob McCann, general manager of MetroVision, said whether the subscriber is a renter or a homeowner and whether they've deliberately caused damage or inadvertently caused damage to the cable converter box, they are responsible for its replacement.

Pickup driver to be tried in death of pedestrian

A Wayne man accused of accidentally hitting and killing a Westland woman with his pickup truck has been ordered to stand trial in Detroit Recorder's Court on a charge of negligent homicide.

Thomas Lee Markham, 24, was ordered to trial after testimony Thursday implicated him in the Feb. 19 death of Sharon Ann Myers, 49, who was killed as she walked at night along Van Born, near Inkster Road.

Markham's Ford Ranger hit Myers, catapulted her into the air and passed under her before she fell to her death on the pavement in the city's far southeast end, Deputy Sheriff Gary Lutzman testified in court.

Markham stopped his truck and ran back to where Myers lay, said Lutzman, who had been on patrol on Van Born when he saw the 2:39 a.m. accident. Markham admitted to the deputy that he had earlier consumed four beers, Lutzman said.

"I could tell that the defendant was nervous," Lutzman testi-

fied during a preliminary examination in Westland's 18th District Court. "He was jittery."

Lutzman had been driving westbound on Van Born when he stopped for a traffic light that was changing from green to red, he said. But Markham, also westbound, drove through the yellow light, Lutzman said.

Testimony indicated that Markham didn't see Myers because he may have been looking in his rear-view mirror to see if the marked sheriff's patrol car was going to pursue him. Myers was walking in the middle of the road, not on the curb, police have said.

"He blew an amber light," Lutzman testified.

However, Lutzman added that Markham didn't appear to

be speeding in the 45 mph zone. Markham did not take the stand Thursday.

Westland police have said Markham's post-accident blood-alcohol test revealed a .09 level, just below the .10 level at which drivers are considered legally drunk in Michigan.

After Markham hit Myers, he pulled to the side of the road and ran back to where the woman lay face up on the pavement, Lutzman testified.

Markham could face a maximum sentence of two years in prison if convicted of negligent homicide. He has pleaded not guilty, and he remains free on a \$5,000 personal bond.

The victim had initially been identified as Sharon Ann Mullins, but Westland police officer Lynda Cox said Thursday that police have since learned that the woman's last name was Myers.

Myers apparently had been walking along Van Born to her Powers Street residence when she was hit, police have said.

The next step for Markham will be an arraignment in Recorder's Court. A trial date will be set later.

Molester sent to prison

A 34-year-old Westland man, accused of raping his 10-year-old son, has been sentenced to 10 to 30 years in prison.

Bert Wood's sentence in Detroit Recorder's Court came after he pleaded no contest to charges of first-degree criminal sexual conduct.

Wood has begun serving his term, according to court records. He could have faced a maximum sentence of life in prison.

Wood had been ordered to stand trial last year amid allegations that he sexually penetrated his son on two occasions in October of 1991. The son had remained quiet about the rape for several months.

The boy initially didn't tell

father. Wood was charged with two counts of first-degree criminal sexual conduct based on allegations that he raped his son at their Alpena Court residence, in the Norwayne neighborhood in south Westland.

about the rapes because he felt safe after his father was imprisoned — shortly after the rapes occurred — for an unrelated charge of unarmed robbery, Westland police Sgt. Laura Moore has said.

However, the boy went public with his accusations after Wood was moved from prison to a halfway house last year and came home for a visit, police said.

Moore had described the 10-year-old as being "terrified" of his

Wood's case was among many sex-related offenses that emerged last year in Westland, during a year that saw a dramatic increase in sex crimes in the city.

Westland police authorities have noted that reports of sex abuse of children have increased as victims have become more willing to report the incidents.

Sex offenses in Westland increased 23.6 percent in 1992, when 141 cases were reported. That compared to 114 reports during the previous year.

About 19 hours before the Hungry Howie's robbery, a lone bandit who claimed to be carrying a gun inside a brown paper bag held up the Speedway gas station at Merriam and Van Born, police reports said.

A 51-year-old female attendant reported that she had been mopping the floor — with the doors locked — when a man knocked and wanted to come inside at 4 a.m. to shop. The worker didn't initially see the brown bag.

After the worker let him in, the suspect went to the counter and asked for cigarettes, but then showed the worker the brown paper bag and implied he had a handgun hidden inside, police reports said.

The intruder then walked be-

hind the counter, shoved the worker to the ground, and grabbed about \$100 from the cash register before ordering the attendant into a back room, police reports said.

The suspect then fled, and the attendant left the back room and telephoned police, according to police reports.

The suspect was described as a white male, about 6 feet tall, 35 to

40 years old, with reddish blond hair, a mustache and freckles. He wore a royal blue and red coat, blue work pants and a black baseball cap, police reports said.

Thursday's holdups came just three days after a lone bandit who implied he had a gun in his pocket robbed Standard Federal Bank on Wayne Road, north of Cowan, escaping with \$3,900.

Also, the Hungry Howie's robbery marked the second Westland pizzeria to be struck by a robber since March 28. On that date, a gunman shot and wounded a worker at Domino's on Wayne Road, north of Ford, but escaped with no money.

Like the other robberies, that one, too, remains under investigation.

growth in the city. Market demands and concerned elected officials worked in a team-like fashion for the growth of the city, Wilhelm said.

He has worked with three mayors — Pickering, Charles "Trav" Griffin and Robert Thomas — and three different sets of priorities. Bickering between the mayors and councils has been common, but Wilhelm takes it all in stride doing his job with a sense of humor.

"They are all concerned, honest people with their own ideas of what is best with the city," Wilhelm said. "When it came down to it, though, they always seemed to put the best interest of the citizens first. It's really no different than any other family."

While he offered this profound statement of how to get things done, Wilhelm couldn't help but slip in his more humorous view of getting along with everyone.

"The trick is to own a fast horse and know how to disappear in a

hurry." As Wilhelm looks back at the past eight years, there are things he wishes were different or things he wanted that were out of his grasp, but his regrets are few.

Development in the city took place faster than some probably would have liked, but the growth was driven by the economy and there is little control over that, he said.

"I would have liked to have seen a 12-story office building go in for the city, but we are not in the corridor like Novi and so that's not likely to happen," Wilhelm said.

Wilhelmi is looking forward to a relaxing retirement with his wife, Alice, and his children and grandchildren. Alice Wilhelmi has worked with the city of Wayne for 24 years and will retire in August.

"We decided it would be less of a shock if we stretched things out a little," Wilhelmi said. He also hopes to do some fish-

ing with his grandson this summer and become better acquainted with his golf clubs.

"The league starts up May 1 and I'll be there. No one has ever called me a golfer. I'm just a guy who plays golf and I'm ready," he said.

He adds that he may slip in a little consulting work, but not enough to interfere with his fun.

Wilhelmi will continue his volunteer pursuits with the United Community Services, the Nankin Jaycees, the Wayne Metro Community Services Agency and the Episcopal Diocese of Michigan.

An interim planner has not been named by the city. If Mayor Thomas' plan is approved by the council, the position of planner and economic development director will be combined in an effort to cut costs.

A farewell party will be held in Wilhelmi's honor 5-8 p.m. Tuesday, April 27, at the Bailey Recreation Center behind city hall. The public is welcome to attend.

A healthy step

Westland Walkers get their exercise at shopping mall

About 500 area residents are "taking a step in the right direction" by joining the Westland Walkers.

When doctors began to issue warnings about the dangers of jogging, the craze hit and malls became crowded with walkers. People of all ages and all body types can burn calories and improve their cardiovascular condition by taking brisk walks on a regular basis.

Doctors recommend walking as the best exercise for patients recovering from heart attacks, hip conditions and other health problems.

"We want everyone to check with a doctor before they get into a real walking routine, but most doctors will recommend walking as the safest exercise," said Joseph Bratus, president of the Westland Walkers.

The club, with 200 active members currently, is sponsored by Westland Center and Garden City Hospital. It is estimated that another 300 people walk around the mall on a regular basis.

"The American Heart Association approached malls throughout the country suggesting that they get involved in a walking program," said Maureen Lewis, marketing secretary for Westland Center. "People have been walking in malls for a long time, but it's been fairly recent since we've been involved."

The mall was formed about five years ago and membership increases and decreases based on the season, the weather and participants' health, Bratus said.

The mall opens its doors at 7 a.m. to club members and most

walkers are gone by 9 a.m., according to Lewis. A trip around the mall (including the arcades) is three-quarters of a mile and most walkers make the trip more than once.

"One man has put in over 4,000 miles," Bratus said. "He walks seven days a week and has lost a lot of weight."

Walkers are responsible for keeping track of their own miles and they are eligible to receive gift such as T-shirts, sweatshirts, fanny packs and water bottles. The items are decorated with the "step in the right direction" logo.

It's the health benefits and the desire to remain active, however, that really motivates the walkers.

"We want people to get addicted to walking," said club secretary Shirley Mazzola. "I'm surprised what it does for you. It really gets me going and starting my day."

Mazzola joined the group to lose a little weight and to stay active when she retired.

Bratus and his wife started walking for health reasons. The couple has always exercised, but when Bratus' wife started having hip trouble, the doctor recommended walking.

"We walked on the outside of the mall until we learned of the walkers inside," Bratus said. "We've been coming here ever since."

The club's vice president Kathy Holwat started walking around her neighborhood with friends. The friends eventually dropped out of the routine, but Holwat wanted to continue. She said the mall offers a great environment for walking that is safe and relaxing.

"I meet a lot of people and have made new friends," Holwat said.

The American Heart Association continues to encourage mall-walking groups, but no longer offers any financial support to the effort.

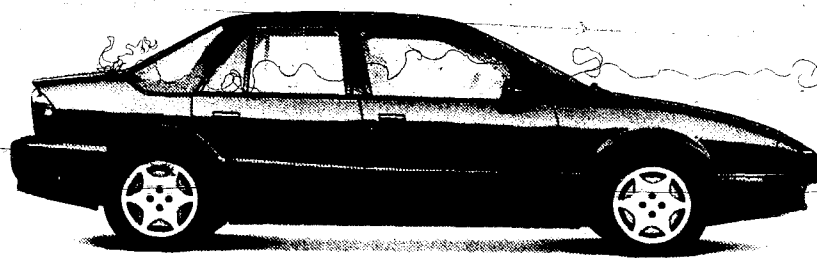

Model skis off with \$5,000 in cash, prizes

With a pocket full of prizes from a national pageant she recently won, Michelle Lee Kaczmarek has a lot more on her mind than smiling and posing.

At 20, her goals include getting an associate's degree in broadcast communications from Schoolcraft College and launching a program for underprivileged children.

Meanwhile, the Westland resident won first place in the national Miss Sun and Ski Patrol Pageant held late last month in Pennsylvania where she was judged in swimsuit, evening wear and ski wear events, and was asked one question: "Why would you make a good Miss Sun and Ski Patrol?"

The contestant, who has brown hair and blue eyes, said she prided herself on keeping physically fit, liked to deal with people and was prepared to travel to wherever her role as Miss Sun and Ski Patrol would take her.

The title came with \$50,000 in cash and prizes that included a \$2,000 savings bond, a cruise in the Bahamas, a sailboat, modeling contracts and an invitation to two other national pageants, Miss Fitness and the Bikini Open.

Before the national Miss Sun and Ski Patrol contest, Kaczmarek won the preliminary

pageant at Graffiti Night Club, on Merriman south of Cherry Hill, Westland.

The New York-styled bar replete with graffiti decor sponsored six weeks of contests with three finalists weekly who were eligible to compete in Pennsylvania.

The only criterion was that contestants had to be at least 18, according to Tony Duarte, Graffiti's promotions director. Tremors nightclub in Livonia also sent finalists to the national competition.

Like a lot of pageant contestants, Kaczmarek wants to model. But she's not putting all her aspirations into one dream.

"As far as modeling, I'd like to do catalog or print work for swimwear and lingerie," she said.

Other plans include continuing her education, which, she said, will include a bachelor's degree in psychology.

"Actually, I'll take it one day at a time and I'll keep working and where I end up I'll end up," Kaczmarek said. "I know how to focus and achieve my goals. And I have a positive attitude."

Another possibility, she said, is to start a government-backed program where underprivileged children could go for entertainment to keep them off the street and out of trouble.

She wasn't sure exactly how the

Two men cleared of abuse charges

A divorced Westland father has been cleared of charges of sexually abusing his 8-year-old daughter when she came to his house for a weekend visit.

Daniel John Banninger, 36, was acquitted of second-degree criminal sexual conduct during a bench trial that recently concluded in Detroit Recorder's Court.

In a separate case, another Westland man also has been cleared of charges of sexually molesting a young girl while he was babysitting her overnight at her Westland residence.

Robert Ray West, 25, was acquitted of seven counts of first-degree criminal sexual conduct stemming from a case in which the girl, 8, accused him of penetrating her, performing oral sex on her and forcing her to perform oral sex on him.

Both men had maintained their innocence from the time they were initially charged last year.

Banninger had been accused of going into a bedroom where his daughter was sleeping. In court, the girl accused him of waking her and sexually abusing her while her 4-year-old sister slept in another bed in the room.

Early on, defense attorney Mark Kriger had raised questions about the girl's credibility, saying she changed her story. The girl had initially claimed that the in-

cident occurred while her sister was in another room watching "Sesame Street" at the father's South Berry Street residence, Kriger has said.

The girl later testified in court that her father got into bed with her, pulled off his clothing and rubbed against her, though she said he never penetrated her.

Banninger's acquittal erased the possibility that he would be sentenced up to 15 years in prison.

In West's case, he had been accused of sexually molesting an 8-year-old girl while he was babysitting her and spending the night at her residence near Newburgh and Ford roads.

The girl had accused West of molesting her in her mother's bedroom and in the living room. She also testified that West had watched an adult video before he abused her.

But a Recorder's Court jury, after hearing testimony, sided with West, who had maintained his innocence since he was initially charged in February of last year.

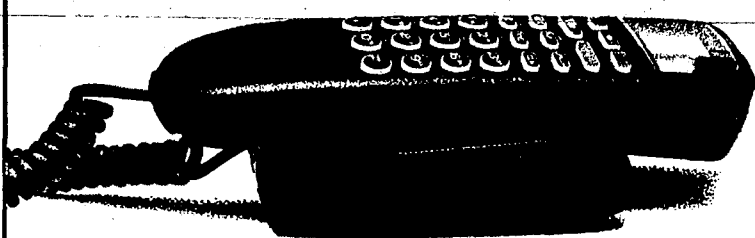

SC chef to be 'braised,' he's too tough to roast

Ask Schoolcraft College chef Richard Hans Benson to talk about himself, and he expounds on the college's primo culinary arts program and the joy of teaching cooking.

Benson, who will retire from Schoolcraft April 30 after 26 years of employment enjoyment, is one of those lucky few people whose vocation and avocation coincide like sour cream and chives on a twice-baked potato.

"It's kind of like a job and a hobby in the same thing," he said. "You hate to go home some days. I don't like to leave because there's always something new going on."

Indeed, with possession of four of the country's 27 master chefs, the Schoolcraft kitchen is well-known for having "something new going on" most of the time. Grad-

uates of the program, more than 4,000 of them taught by Benson, populate the kitchens of fine restaurants all over the Detroit area.

The students have likewise won several awards in cooking contests, often called "Culinary Olympics," and Benson thrills vicariously to an extent almost equaling the euphoria of the winners themselves.

Oh, what a feeling

"The feeling I get is almost as much as the feeling they get," he said.

Chris Moore is one of those award-winning students, having captured a silver medal at the last Culinary Olympics in Frankfurt, Germany. Benson loaned him the money to make the trip.

Moore, a chef at The Golden Mushroom in Southfield, said

that Benson is the best cooking teacher he's ever had. "When (former students) come back to visit, they come back to visit this guy," he said, gesturing to Benson. "The man is full of energy. He never stops. Even when he was sick he was here."

Larry Janes, an Observer & Eccentric Newspapers food columnist, is also a big Benson fan. "He has been one of my mentors," Janes said. "Always has a smile. I've never seen him down. He will be sadly missed at Schoolcraft."

Born in Detroit in 1936, Benson found it exciting early to "cook in the kitchen with my mother" and later began formal training as a 14-year-old Chadsey High School student.

Mayors bash county juvenile program

Five western Wayne County mayors plan to hand deliver a resolution to Wayne County Executive Edward McNamara detailing the massive misgivings the Conference of Western Wayne has for one of McNamara's projects.

The CWW, an alliance of 18 supervisors and mayors from western Wayne County, unanimously passed a resolution Friday regarding the way McNamara intends to spend money generated from one-tenth of a 10-year, 1-mill levy approved by voters in 1988.

The five mayors, including Westland's Robert Thomas and Plymouth's Robert Jones, will deliver the resolution to McNamara as soon as they can get an appointment.

Although the CWW doesn't have any legal authority as a public body, its opinions carry political clout because it represents

more than one-third of the communities in Wayne County.

The original ballot language says the 0.1 mill money (\$2.5 million a year) must be spent to "build and operate a juvenile offender work/training institution."

But McNamara intends to spend it on a program whereby non-violent juvenile offenders are dealt with in their homes instead of incarcerated in juvenile centers like the W.J. Maxey Boys Training School.

McNamara says he can do this instead of build a building because his lawyer says a "program" is the same thing as an "institution."

The CWW members believe that the legal opinion McNamara relies on is faulty. Northville Mayor Chris Johnson called it "a fairy tale."

The resolution passed Friday asks McNamara to put a ballot question to county voters asking

if it's OK for him to spend that 0.1 mill money on programs instead of a building. Failing that, the CWW wants McNamara to give back all the money that has been collected so far, more than \$10 million. Then each individual city and township could use its share of the money for local youth programs.

Livonia Mayor Robert Bennett, after reading the committee report on McNamara's program, said "the program as now outlined is not well-financed, not well-structured. I don't know that (McNamara) really knows what's happening."

Plymouth Mayor Jones, who was on the CWW committee that met with deputy executive Dale Jurcisin and youth services deputy director Lynn Burdell-Williams, said their "descriptions of the program were rather fuzzy." Jones also said he's unsure "whether (the money) is really

being used for programs."

County Commission Vice Chairwoman Kay Beard, D-Westland, claims that the 0.1-mill money is just being funneled into the county's general fund to help balance the budget, whereas it's supposed to be kept in a separate account. "We're on the horns of a dilemma all the way around," Beard said. "They've been scofflaws on this."

The resolution that the CWW passed Friday comes as a surprise because members seemed sold on McNamara's plan after he personally pitched it to them in February.

Both Livonia's Bennett and Dearborn finance director Keith Archer said Friday that they agreed with McNamara in February, but have since changed their mind.

"I did buy what McNamara told us," Archer said. "It sounded great to me."

Retailer warns:

Malls must find their '90s niche

Before they renovated the old Somerset Mall, Frankel/Forbes/Cohen had a plan: just bring in the best.

To survive in the 1990s and beyond, shopping centers must specialize, and not try to be all things to all people, warned developer Nathan Forbes.

On the occasion of the Somerset Collection's six-month birthday, Forbes discussed the center's success story with the Fashion Group International's Detroit-area chapter.

Forbes is a partner in Forbes/Cohen properties, co-owners of Troy's upscale shopping center along with Frankel and Associates. He told a sell-out crowd of interested fashion retailers that the days of shopping

center grand openings are over.

"The department store industry has taken on a new shape in the last five years," he said. "Too much debt has forced stores like Macy's, Marshall Field's, Saks, the Federated Department stores which included Burdine's, Bullock's and I. Magnin's to reorganize. They had to sell their successful stores to raise capital. The future will be in expansion and renovation of existing successful centers."

Just like The Somerset Collection. Since its renovation and reopening in the fall with exclusive-to-Michigan stores like Tiffany's, Crate and Barrel, and Barneys New York, sales have been strong.

"The last six months have been difficult for everyone in retailing," Forbes said. "There is the threat from off-price competitors like Walmart and Kmart which plan to build shopping centers that hold their own stores like Sports Authority, Builders

Square, Borders and Walden bookstores. Suburban areas are reaching their retail saturation point."

Discount centers like those in Birch Run, Monroe and West Branch also pull shoppers dollars. Forbes said these centers serve as dumping grounds for seasonal goods that don't sell. They allow the manufacturer to mark down old merchandise, but not as drastically as a department store would at clearance time.

In planning the "new" Somerset Collection, Forbes said his team sat down and discussed how to take the tony center to the next level of merchandising without jeopardizing the clientele they had.

"We pre-identified the retailers we wanted to bring to Michigan, then we worked out the economic deals," he said. "When they punched Michigan Zip Codes into their computers, these

sales figures did the talking. Michigan sales from catalogs and Chicago stores impressed them. It was easy after that. The Detroit market is misunderstood. We've been overlooked."

The Frankel/Forbes/Cohen plan for Somerset also included an architectural renovation that extended the charm and classic beauty of the nearby Cranbrook educational community to the interior of the mall. The stone and wood used in the renovation was copied from Cranbrook.

Cop fight

Sheriff foiled as deputies join airport police

Wayne County Sheriff Robert Ficano's worst dream came true Friday as Metro Airport Director Robert Braun started taking away Ficano's cops.

With the final details ironed out in the labor agreements, Braun began swearing in sheriff's department officers as official Detroit Metro Airport Police Officers.

Most of the 95 sheriff's department officers assigned to Metro were expected to switch over to the airport police at press time.

Braun said it was necessary to form the airport police because Ficano had been interfering with Braun's authority over the airport deputies as laid down in federal law.

"(The officers) have a stressful enough job without having to worry about who they work for," Braun said.

Ficano has opposed the airport police plan all the way, calling it a power grab by county Executive Edward McNamara.

Nancy Mouradian, Ficano's chief of staff, says McNamara's aim is to get revenge on Ficano for beating Redford resident Kevin

Kelley (whom McNamara heavily supported) in the Democratic primary for sheriff last year.

Making himself unavailable to reporters, Ficano issued the following statement: "It is regrettable that the county executive has chosen to play politics with public safety and with the career path of

nearly 1,000 officers. He has absolutely no basis for this move other than wanting to play sheriff."

Moradian said the fight isn't over, but didn't get specific about what Ficano will do now. "I'm very confident there is much more to come," she said.

Braun said he wouldn't have started swearing in airport police officers "if we weren't confident this was within our legal authority."

Metro Airport now becomes the 13th of the 19 largest airports in the country to form an airport police department.

Braun said that he wanted to get the airport police established in a hurry because Ficano was escalating his alleged threats to the officers.

The sheriff has already gone on record in a March 16 letter to county commission Chairman Arthur Blackwell saying that "current members of this department electing to join with this newly formed agency will lose all rights to transfer back to the Sheriff's Department."

Braun is confident the officers will be able to transfer back and forth between the airport police and the sheriff's department, citing union contracts and county ordinances.

The two sheriff's department union presidents, Bob Sheldon of Local 3317 and Don Cox of Local 502, say Ficano has issued the same threat, and others, verbally to the deputies in various meetings of late.

Subsequently, Benson spent three years cooking simple meals for 1,000 Marines at Camp Pendleton near San Diego, Calif. Returning to Detroit in the late 1950s, Benson found work teaching cooking at his old high school, then switched to Schoolcraft in 1967, lured by the founder of the college's culinary arts program, Robert Breithaupt, who taught Benson how to cook at Chadsey.

Chez Dairy Queen?

Along the way, Benson has owned two restaurants, the first being a Dairy Queen in the days before those stores sold anything more than ice cream and milkshakes.

"I was one of the first (Dairy Queen owners) to have food," Benson said. "I could see an op-

portunity to make more money selling hamburgers and fries along with the milkshakes."

In 1985, Benson partnered up with a few former students and opened Park Haus, a German restaurant in Northville. Today, the restaurant is under new ownership and known as Riffle's.

Two months ago, Benson opened his third restaurant and catering business, Benson's Marion House, in Howell. Technically, he's retiring from Schoolcraft, but realistically the 56-year-old chef is trading one job for another and perhaps proving that those who teach, can often do, too.

Benson refers to the career move as "retiring to work more."

Watching Benson flit about the Schoolcraft kitchen, dispensing wisdom regarding everything from meatloaf to twice-baked potatoes,

it's obvious that he's an incurable culinary aficionado. "Like any other artist, you have to have a love for what you're doing," he said.

Judging by his circumference, it's easy to conclude that Benson enjoys more than just the aesthetic artistry of his student's creations.

"You have 50 students coming to you every day saying, 'Here, taste,'" he said. "Eight hours a day I have to taste, taste. My problem is that I swallow it all."

Benson will be honored with "The Chef Benson Braise, because he's too tough to roast" beginning 4 p.m. Sunday, April 25, at Schoolcraft's Waterman Center. The event includes chili tasting, champagne and roast tenderloin dinner. Tickets are \$25. For more information, call 462-4417.

S'craft recycles

College says participation high

Joining an ever-expanding roster of organizations that would rather preserve trees than fill landfills, Schoolcraft College has recently begun a paper recycling program.

Since October the college has been collecting cardboard for recycling, and now officials have added white paper to the list of material to rescue from landfills.

"I don't know if it's saving money, per se, but that's not our goal," said college spokeswoman Sandra "Sam" Florek. "(And) everybody has been very interested right from the start."

Bob Wielechowski, the college's director of physical plant, said he hopes the recycling effort can reduce the number of trash pickups from five days a week to three, which would save money.

Since October the college has been collecting cardboard for recycling, and now officials have added white paper to the list of material to rescue from landfills.

The recycling collection bins have been placed in all of Schoolcraft's offices, and participation is high, Florek said.

However, minor problems have arisen over the shape of the bins. "We don't like the bin itself," said an employee who requested anonymity. "It's like a wastebasket, and the paper doesn't fit in it properly."


In the office where this employee works, they've taken to setting the bin on its side so as to stack the paper inside.

Oakland Community College and Oakland University also have recycling collection systems. Like Schoolcraft, OCC collects white paper for recycling, but has been doing so for three years. This year OCC is adding polystyrene, aluminum, tin, cardboard and newspapers.

College spokesman George Carbonis said the cost is \$50 a month per campus, but that will be more than made up for in reduced garbage hauling costs.

The OCC program is expected to be in place at all five campuses and the administration center by September.

Oakland University plans to begin collecting white paper beginning in August or September.

Travelers find economic stress a beastly show

The beauty and the beast is more than just an entertaining movie; it's an apt description for the way we live.

Two colleagues besides myself were struck by this phenomenon as we traveled in recent weeks from points ranging from New York to Vietnam. The New York visitor and I enjoyed man-made creations: She scouted out museums and scoped plays. I rolled out of bed each morning, sniffing the daffodils at my bedside, to hunt for Virginia antiques or wander about the wonders of our nation's capital.

"She had a good time, she said, 'but, oh, the homelessness.' I winced, remembering the man who cringed under a tarp next to a statue in a D.C. park. It was raining. Hard. And at the time it seemed hard to justify my purchase of a perfectly useless piece of old furniture that I had to have."

The Vietnam veteran made his second return trip to the country, on a tour that included remarkable scenery and visit to a countryside monastery. Unlike the two of us, however, his mission was to take a group of physicians, showing them the conditions in the "country of children."

"No matter how bad you saw it,"

said veteran Steve Barnaby, O&E managing editor, "it wasn't as bad as it is in Vietnam."

Country of children

That's where most of the people we fought are dead, either from the war or from natural causes, according to Barnaby. Hence, he calls it a "country of children" and doesn't understand why the U.S. continues its embargo, prohibiting trade with the population of 70 million. Exports could include oil, minerals and "enough food to feed all of Asia."

Health care is "just unimaginable," he said. "People die prematurely and unnecessarily. . . . The worst case scenario here would be better over there."

The biggest problem is in the countryside, like mountain village tribal communities, which are so remote due to a crumbling infrastructure. Unfortunately, malnutrition is also a problem due to lack of roads and cultural practices, Barnaby said.

"They're just learning how to live together," he added, noting that 1975 was the first time the country was united.

Unlike travelers to other destinations, Barnaby is trying to do some-

thing about the situation. He has warehoused \$1 million in donations of medical equipment for Vietnam, but it's just sitting there, waiting for a winged angel(s) with about \$100,000 to help send it there.

Not many of us have that kind of resources to tap, nor do we have to travel far afield to find the need for our help.

Homelessness here

Detroit's COTS shelter director Che'row Johnson notes that the problem of homelessness is not just a winter phenomenon somewhere else. "It's year round. A year or so ago it (homeless residents) was up in the hot summer months (over winter)," she said.

Just this one shelter served 5,000 homeless persons last year, she added. However the face of the person in their program is changing. Their intake statistics show a decrease, but that's deceiving. While the previous length of stay used to be 13 days, it's now 33 days. Other shelters let the homeless stay for just one day before having to leave for a day. COTS lets a person stay as long as the person is "actively pursuing housing."

The economic climate has changed those who are homeless and coming into the shelter. Many are single because there are other programs for families. About 50 percent now have General Education Degrees, high school degrees or some college, Johnson said.

There is even a "percentage with Ph.D. and master's degrees or a 22-year work history of employment who have lost their job. If there is no paycheck. . . ."

COTS offers a learning center, a PALS literary center, child care center, job search program and a seven-unit transition center for families teaching budgeting and parenting skills.

While COTS relies on grants and city, state and federal funding sources, donations also play a big part of its budget. It does have a wish list, said

Johnson, which includes such small items as diapers, hygiene supplies and clean underwear for adults and children. Most clothes, however, aren't needed because the shelter already receives that.

Truth is, what they could use most is money. It's like this, Johnson said, "someone could go out and spend \$8.99 on diapers when we could go to another company and have some money left over." There are a lot of definitions to beauty. For me, there was real excitement at seeing someone putting in a dock on silvery Orchard Lake last week. And the antique is sitting out of harm's way. But whatever beast drove the man under the tarp in D.C. to homelessness may be with him still. There may not be anything I can do about that; closer to home, however, there are other beasts to slay.

It never does much good, but I go anyway. The trees are bare, the rivers cold, and sometimes snow is still in the woods. But the last Saturday in April is special; it's the opening of trout season.

You hope to spot a rising trout, but the only thing that comes to the top is the foam on the beer you order at the nearest tavern, where you've gone to console yourself. You wonder if the real reason for trout fishing is to give you an excuse to spend a Saturday afternoon in a northern Michigan bar with out your wife.

Whatever the reason, suburban Detroit fly fishermen are going to be better armed to do battle with the salmonoids this year because of a radio show put together by Farmington Hills resident Joe Derek.

Derek, a naturalist outdoor educator and fly fisherman, is doing something

new with a radio show, "Naturally Michigan Afield," which airs from 10-11 a.m. starting Wednesday on AM radio station WCAR, 1090-AM.

He's trying to take the products out of the reporting and produce a show that will appeal equally to the bird watchers and the bird hunters. "It's time to quit bickering," he said. "If we don't get the nature buffs together with the hunters and fishermen, we're going to lose what we all love."

He's right. Bird watchers and nature buffs are folks who have been able to give up their lust for blood, unlike folks like me.

And when it comes to overbuying gear to satisfy that lust, I'm guilty. I spend my winter Saturday mornings tuned to fishing shows on ESPN.

Most outdoors shows are a showcase for products. You've seen them. Joe Bonehead, a former NFL lineman,

looks at the camera, holding a large fish; and says: "I never could have done it without my Bozo reel."

Such outdoors shows create the impression that if you don't have your vest stuffed with at least \$500 worth of gear, you won't be able to catch that two-pound trout that sells for about \$3 in the grocery store.

Derek is on a crusade to straighten

things out. It's probably a losing battle. Fly fishing has become trendy, especially this year with the Robert Redford movie, "A River Runs Through It."

My own spending on piscatorial pursuits keeps the Visa to the max. There are waders, flies, the rod from L.L. Bean, a fancy wooden landing net, numerous silly hats and a vest filled with tools.

But I'm changing my ways, thanks to my son, John. It started on an Upper Peninsula river. My kid was 11 years old then and didn't like to be bothered with too much gear. He asked: "Have you ever caught a fish without a rod?"

As I prodded my bourbon-soaked brain for an answer, the kid pulled a brook trout out of the river without the use of his rod. All he used was a \$1.25 fly and about 15 cents worth of fishing line.

Fancy landing nets that sell for up to \$50 also aren't part of John's fishing outfit. He'll never be a cover boy on an Orvis catalog. He reached in the water, unhooked the fish and let it loose.

Fishing stories like that don't often make it on outdoors programs or into magazines. They don't sell equipment. But they'll be making it onto Derek's program.

But because he has to pay the bills — this isn't National Public Radio — there are sponsors. They include Backyard Birds, Wild Wing Galleries and Panetta's Landscaping of Livonia.

Let's just thank the hunting and fishing gods there are folks around like Derek and his sponsors. We need some honest reporting on this beat, and somebody who can get the nature buffs and hunting and fishing people together.

partner lose interest in sex.

Sponsored by the Michigan Lupus Foundation, the sessions will have Dr. Larry Silve, a rheumatologist, and social worker Donna Oram as leaders.

Michigan Lupus Foundation Add 1

Lupus is a chronic, inflammatory, auto immune disease in which the body's defense system, instead of serving its normal protective function, forms antibodies that attack healthy tissues and organs.

Common symptoms include joint pain, low-grade fever, chest pain, unusual swelling, fatigue

and sometimes a sun-sensitive rash. These symptoms are chronic — they come and go over a long period of time. The majority of patients have symptoms 3-10 years prior to diagnosis, and many have been labeled chronic complainers.

If not controlled, lupus can be life threatening. Because the characteristics and course of lupus may differ significantly among people, a thorough medical evaluation and ongoing medical supervision are essential to ensure proper diagnosis and treat-

ment.

Although there is yet no cure for lupus, medical treatment can usually control the disease. While persons of any age and sex can be affected by lupus, the majority of lupus patients are females. Between the ages of 13-45, lupus strikes one in 400 white women and one in 250 African-American women.

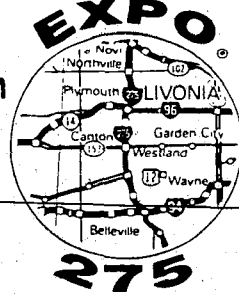

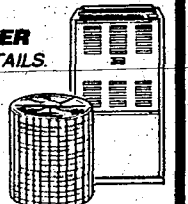

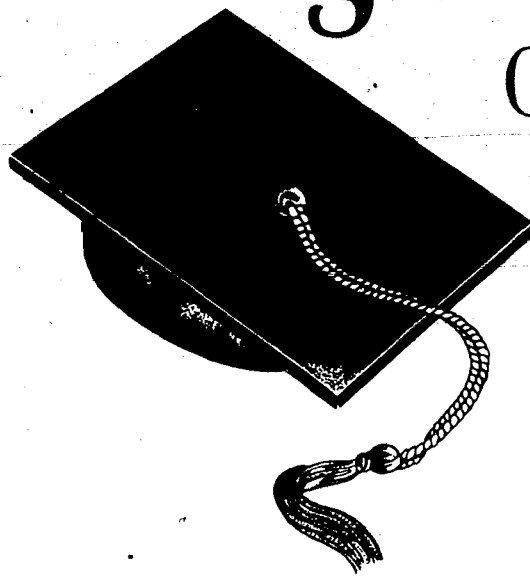

ROLL CALL REPORT

Local reps, except Knollenberg, OK Clinton budget

Here's how Observer & Eccentric-area members of Congress were recorded on major roll call votes in the week ending

HOUSE

Committee spending OK'd: The House voted 224 for and 196 against to approve the 1993 committee funding resolution (H Res. 107). The \$52.3 million budget is down 5 percent from last year, but

covers four fewer committees because special panels of narcotics, hunger, aging and children were abolished on April 1. The measure funds about half the cost of staff salaries and other expenses for 22 panels. Remaining committee costs are covered by the legislative branch appropriations bill. Supporter Norman Mineta, D-Calif., said "trying to make a big deal out of cutting this resolution is like trying to lighten the load of an airliner by emptying the ashtrays." Opponent John Boehner, R-Ohio,

said "the only reductions in this bill are as a result of the four select committees that were allowed to expire."

A yes vote was to approve the resolution. **Area representatives voting yes were: Bob Carr, D-Pontiac, Dale Kildee, D-Flint, Sander Levin, D-Southfield, William Ford, D-Ypsilanti. Voting no: Joseph Knollenberg, R-Birmingham.**

Committee cuts rejected:

The House rejected, 171 for 246 against, a Republican bid to cut the \$52.3 million committee budget (above) by 25 percent across the board and give Republicans a higher proportion of committee staff slots.

A yes vote was to reduce House committee funding by 25 percent. **Area representatives voting yes were: Knollenberg. Voting no: Carr, Kildee, Levin and Ford.**

Final budget OK'd:

By a vote of 240 for and 184 against, the House gave its final approval of President Clinton's five-year program (H Con Res 64) to retool the U.S. economy. All but 15 Democrats supported him, Republicans unanimously opposed him.

The plan is for Congress to enact massive spending slowdowns, entitlement curbs and tax hikes to slow the growth of red ink by nearly \$500 billion over five years. Still,

the national debt would swell by 25 percent to over \$5 trillion in fiscal 1998. In annual terms, Clinton would reduce the \$302 billion 1993 deficit he inherited to \$193 billion in his fourth year as president.

A yes vote supported the Clinton economic plan. **Area representatives voting yes were: Carr, Kildee, Levin and Ford. Voting no: Knollenberg.**

Debt ceiling increased:

The House passed, 237 for and 177 against, a bill (HR 1430) raising the government's borrowing authority from \$4.145 trillion to \$4.37 trillion. The \$225 billion increase will carry the Treasury until Oct. 1, when it will give way to a higher debt ceiling included in President Clinton's economic program (H Con Res 64).

A yes vote was for a \$225 billion hike in the national debt ceiling. **Area representatives voting yes were: Carr, Kildee, Levin and Ford. Voting no: Knollenberg.**

Motor voter changes retained:

By a vote of 192 for and 222 against, the House refused to accept Senate changes in a bill (HR 2) that spurs voter turnout by enabling people to register when applying for a driver's license and other public certificates. In part, the vote reaffirmed a House requirement that states allow regis-

tration at social service agencies such as welfare offices.

A yes vote was to strip a requirement for voter registration at social service agencies from the "motor voter" bill. **Area representatives voting yes were: Knollenberg. Voting no: Carr, Kildee, Levin and Ford.**

SENATE

Florida and California that contribute more to the highway trust fund through gasoline taxes than they get back in project grants. The vote occurred during debate on HR 1335 (above).

A yes vote was to keep the highway funds formula intact. **Levin and Riegle voted no.**

Amtrak funding preserved:

By a vote of 61 for and 38 against, the Senate tabled an amendment to strip HR 1335 (above) of \$188 million for capital improvements and rehiring by Amtrak, the federally subsidized rail passenger agency.

A no vote opposed emergency funding for Amtrak. **Levin and Riegle voted yes.**

Clinton's economic plan OK'd:

By a vote of 55 for and 45 against, the Senate sent President Clinton's economic program (see preceding vote) to the White House for his signature. All Democrats except Shelby of Alabama and Krueger of Texas voted yes and all Republicans voted no. For

fiscal 1994, the first year of the five-year plan, the blueprint is for spending of about \$1.5 trillion and an annual deficit of nearly \$250 billion.

A yes vote was to implement the president's economic plan. **Levin and Riegle voted yes.**



Don't let your spices, herbs lose their flavor

I think it was momma who taught me that if a recipe called for just a half teaspoon of something, it probably wasn't worth running out to buy it.

First, a call would be made to Aunt Phyllis, and if that failed, she might even try Stella and Louie next door, but never would she run to the store and pay top dollar for a lot of something she might never use again.

Fortunately, I seldom have that problem because when I go spice shopping, it's usually a trip to Rafael's Spice Company at the Eastern Market in Detroit where I can buy as little or as much of what I need.

Prior to the closings of most of the bulk food stores in my area, it was always nice to know that they could also fill my need for just a teaspoon of something or another.

So I was intrigued the other morning during my thrice weekly visit to the gym when I was approached by a lady who asked me to write a column on the many uses of cardamom.

Seems that Easter Saturday night while checking her ingredients for a vegetable recipe, she noticed that it called for a half teaspoon of cardamom. Not having any change, she sent her son to the store with \$10 and asked him to buy a small jar of that spice.

When he returned with the jar, and placed her change — a dollar and some coins on the counter next to the jar. She couldn't believe her eyes — the jar cost almost nine bucks! Now she has a 2½ ounce jar of powdered cardamom that in her own words "would certainly last till the day I die."

Well dear friend, cardamom is expensive and what's worse, anytime you buy spices that are already ground or powdered, they will lose much of their potency if not kept airtight and out of the light.

Spicy tips

Here are a few suggestions I offered — powdered spices can lose up to 15 percent of their flavor every year. If you don't have airtight jars, place a small piece of plastic wrap over the top then screw the lid on real tight. For optimum sealing, invert the jar upside down and keep in a cool dark space.

By the way, the old spice rack hung over the stove is probably the worst place to keep your spices because of all the heat and humidity generated when cooking.

When possible, buy spices in their whole form. Cardamom comes in powdered and pod form. The pods are very easy to grind or grate.

In addition to a very low cost electric coffee grinder that doubles as a spice grinder, I invested in a small marble mortar and pestle that is just perfect for grinding and mashing, especially more flavorful spices that might linger in an electric mill or wooden bowl.

If all else fails, a small plastic bag and a rolling pin will pretty much do the same thing.

Flavorful soups

You don't always have to grind whole spices. When making soups or a sauce, for optimum flavor, place whole spices in a homemade cloth bag or stainless tea ball.

Cheesecloth works best but an old towel that now finds its home in the rag box can be cut into squares and then tied with kite string or kitchen twine. When the soup or sauce is done, simply remove the bag or tea ball and toss the used spices!

Fresh herbs

Now that summer is fast approaching, good cooks can grow their own herbs and spices. Nothing beats the fresh flavor of parsley and chives and basil, oregano, thyme and rosemary grows well in any sunny garden or window sill.

A good source for fresh herbs locally is Gray's Greenhouse located across the street from Mettetal Airport on the southern fringes of Plymouth.

Two fresh herb growers have stalls at Eastern Market in Detroit. Shoppers were flocking there last week to buy them so get there early for the best selection.

Fresh herbs dry and freeze well. Many upscale grocery stores and fruit markets are now selling freshly picked herbs and plants. Shopping Center/Food Emporium always has a nice selection of fresh dill, basil, oregano, thyme and cilantro as well as Joe's Produce on Seven Mile just east of Farmington Road in Livonia.

Hang the herbs upside down in a sunny dry window for a week to dry or freeze them in marked, sealed plastic bags and use before defrosting in the same amounts you would use fresh herbs.

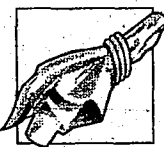

Salads in Seconds

PRECUT
VEGGIES:
A HEALTHY
CONVENIENCE



Precut salad mixes and vegetables are perfect for singles, two-career families, and people who don't have time to fuss with cutting, cleaning, and shredding vegetables for salads, side dishes and stir-fries.

Every once in a while, economic, technological and cultural paths converge and produce radical changes in everyday life. There was the auto, the computer, the compact disc, and, now, veggies — rabbit food has gone low tech.

Goaded by the new United States Department of Agriculture's "Five-a-Day" program, which urges all of us to eat at least five servings of fresh fruits and vegetables daily, Americans have become more diet conscious.

Precut carrot and celery sticks, salad mixes, and other ready-to-eat produce items are perfect for a single person, a two-career family, or anyone who's short on the time (or patience) it takes to wash, scrape, peel, trim, cut, or otherwise process fresh produce.

"I'm not a cook," said Cathy Corozon, of Livonia who works full-time and copes with a lively 17-month-old child in her spare time. "Salad mixes are the answer to my prayers. It's hard to come up with something different for dinner every

day, but salad mixes are something that I can count on. I can add different items, like onions and tomatoes or cheese or leftover meat to vary the flavor, or to create a main course. And when I go to my mom's house for dinner, I always volunteer a salad."

Salad mixes also make it possible for Corzon to incorporate works of mercy into her schedule. "At St. Genevieve's Parish we provide a funeral luncheon for the bereaved family. Obviously, there isn't much advance notice, so I always pick up an extra bag of salad mix, as a potential contribution to the luncheon."

Salad mixes are popular with customers who shop at Joe's Produce in Livonia, said co-owner Joe Maiorana, Jr. "Older people like it because they can enjoy several varieties of greens right out of the bag, with no waste. Working people like it because it's quick — they just open the bag, empty it into a bowl, and add dressing. Most people add refinements for color and flavor, but it's a matter of taste."

Precuts, such as broccoli and cau-

liflower florets and carrot sticks are prepared at the store to keep the price as reasonable as possible. A sign of the times, adds Maiorana, is the "fantastic" demand for vegetable and fruit trays for holidays and special occasions.

"Just as a thoughtful host provides non-alcoholic beverages, he or she provides an alternative to potato chips and cold cuts. Health-conscious guests appreciate the choice."

Emily Murphy of West Bloomfield, host of the "Emily Murphy Show" which airs on PBS Channel 56, and volunteer publicity chairperson for the Village Antique Show and Sale at Greenfield Village in Dearborn, relies on salad mixes to distract her from coffee and cookies.

"If a salad mix is in the vegetable drawer, I'll eat it," she said. "If it isn't, I'll opt for a sugar fix. These mixes are wonderful for busy people. There's no waste, and they encourage healthy habits just because they're there. I've never had one that wasn't really fresh."

Murphy said she believes that every meal should be a special occasion. Even when she's dining alone she puts a place mat and linen napkin on the table, and uses a salad bowl from her collection. "Some people collect teapots — I collect salad bowls," she said.

"Phenomenal!" is how Phil Riggio of Rochester, president of Aunt

Mid's describes the demand for the venerable Detroit firm's celery and carrot sticks, and broccoli and cauliflower florets. "We entered the pre-cut market two years ago and sales have increased by 150 percent since 1991," he said.

"It's a convenience item that busy people appreciate. The consumer gets 12 ounces of ready-to-eat product. It's a very labor-intensive product. Every piece is cut by hand to assure a standard size, there's no mechanization." Aunt Mids will be offering cut fruits soon.

Jean Wass, catering manager for Nino Salvaggio's strawberry Hills, has been in the catering business for 15 years, five of them at the Farmington Hills market.

"People are increasingly aware of good nutrition," she said. "Vegetables used to be secondary at a meal. Now, people are making a meal out of a prepared salad. The trend is toward emphasis on vegetables, and meat is secondary."

"We prepare all of our salad mixes and precuts in-house. The precuts are especially popular on weekends when people entertain and serve them with a spinach or Mexicali dip. They're great for stir-fries, as well."

Similar qualities create wine, food harmony

FOCUS ON WINE

In California's North Coast wine country, the name John Ash is synonymous with expert food and wine harmonies. His Sonoma County restaurant John Ash and Co

has been touted as having "the best California cuisine in San Francisco" (even though the restaurant is an hour's drive north of the city!). In addition to supervising his restaurant, Ash is Culinary Director at Fetzer Vineyards.

He was in metro Detroit recently hosting several charity dinners, in particular two connected with WineFest, the annual fund-raiser for the Ann Arbor Art Association in which Fetzer Vineyards is making significant contributions.

We caught up with Ash during his visit to discuss our favorite topic — wine and food. Ash didn't waste any time explaining easy ways for people to pair wine and food at home.

"There are five tastes, not just four," he said. "They are bitter, sweet, sour, salt (the four we knew) and pungent or pepper. The pepper taste varies most from person to person. That's why some people really like hot-spicy food and others don't."

Ash suggests pairing food and wines according to their similarities. If the food has sweetness, the wine should have some sweetness. If the food contains citrus or lemon, be sure the wine exhibits some tartness or lemony qualities.

If the food is salty or smoky, the wine should be

low alcohol and off-dry. Spicy or peppery foods require low alcohol, off-dry wines that are low in tannin. Rich, fatty foods need a wine with richness and body.

"One of the great failings of restaurants is they usually present the customer with the wine list before seeing the menu," said Ash. "Restaurants need to help the diner make a good wine and food match. A restaurant patron cannot know what the food will taste like by reading the menu. What I describe on my menu as being hot and spicy and what you may describe as hot and spicy may be two entirely different things."

Ash suggests that restaurants need to make wine recommendations on the menu. For each menu item, at least three wine recommendations should be included. If not specific wines, then at least, a style recommendation. Ash's point is that the chef spends significant time and effort creating a dish that people will enjoy, but then allows it to be ruined by a poor wine selection.

"Restaurants should offer a small wine tasting with the entree," he suggests. "A taste of three wines, selected to complement the food, would allow the diner to make an experienced selection when ordering wine by the bottle or by the glass."

Ash contends that cabernet sauvignon and chardonnay are much more difficult to pair with food than gamay, riesling, chenin blanc, sauvignon blanc or gewurztraminer.

"The worst wines to serve with spicy Thai or Latin foods are cabernet and chardonnay because they have too much alcohol and tannin," Ash said. "The fruitier the wines, the better they match with food."

Try your hand at preparing some of Ash's recipes inside, and match them with the recommended wine.

At Fetzer's Valley Oaks testing kitchens, John Ash keeps referencing wines like gamay and gewurztraminer because of their great versatility with food.

"French food is heavy with one-dimensional flavors," he said. "With the infusion of Latin, Asian and Mediterranean foods, our American table features a light, flavorful, healthy cuisine. The same thing is reflected in the wines of America with their lower alcohol and tannins."

We then asked Ash to make specific wine and food recommendations using the Fetzer wines with which he is so familiar.

The Fetzer Sundial Chardonnay (\$9) has clean, citrus flavors with apple overtones. Ash takes his own advice about pairing similar flavors in wine and food by suggesting a grilled chicken breast marinated in an apple cider-citrus sauce.

The Fetzer Barrel Fermented

WINE SELECTIONS

1991 Lyeth Chardonnay (\$12) is a textbook perfect wine with sensational aromas and complete integration of fruit and oak flavors. The lengthy finish keeps you coming back for more. It's superior to many priced at twice its price.

Chardonnay (\$13) is a big, round wine with noticeable malolactic character. Ash selected an oyster stew prepared with butter and cream to bring out the buttery character of the wine. He also suggested fresh pasta with pine nuts or hazelnuts, cream and basil, topped with grated Asiago.

These foods emphasize the toasty flavors of barrel aging.

Ash recommends a gratin of salmon prepared with gruyere to accompany the Fetzer Reserve Chardonnay (\$18). The nuttiness and richness of the wine and food make a great match. If the salmon is grilled, Ash prefers the Fetzer Reserve Pinot Noir (\$17). He recommends painting the salmon with olive oil infused with roasted garlic and grilling over charcoal. "Toss a little rosemary on the hot coals near the end of cooking time," he said.

Ash said he prefers Fetzer Gewurztraminer (\$6.25) with Asian food. He is partial to soy steamed chicken or game hen. Prepare a bouillon containing fresh ginger, chili, soy, sugar, white wine, a cinnamon stick and star anise. Steam the fowl in the liquid and then let it rest in the pot to absorb the spices.

He likes a clean, crisp sauvignon blanc, such as the Valley

Oaks Fume (\$6.25), with grilled fresh fennel and roasted peppers with grilled scallops in a lemon-tarragon vinaigrette.

His favorite meal to accompany Fetzer Gamay Beaujolais (\$6.25) is a Mexican pot roast (beef brisket) covered with tomato and peppers and served with crisp roasted potatoes. Ash said tomatoes and tomato sauces go best with red wines that are low in tannin. The acid in tomatoes serves to magnify the tannins in a big red wine.

Nino Salvaggio's offers several salad mixes. The most popular mix is an assortment of baby greens, flown in daily from California.

Jeffrey Thompson of Troy, manager of Fabrique of Birmingham, munches on carrot sticks instead of peanuts while he's watching television. "And I have a big salad from Kroger's salad bar for supper," he said. "Before I discovered the convenience of ready-to-eat veggies I ate an awful lot of pizza. Who wants to cook after working all day? Now, I feel better and I'm not consuming as many calories." "There just isn't a typical salad bar customer," said Mike Layne, spokesperson for Kroger's.

"Prepared fresh produce is popular with everybody. Of the 77 Kroger stores, 38 have salad

bars, typically offering a variety of 60 fresh vegetables and fruits. Clearly, people on the go like the convenience."

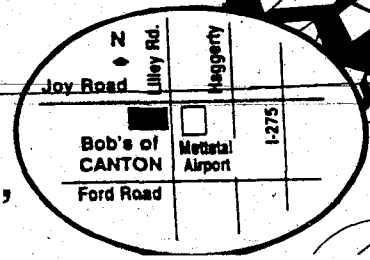
Just a few years ago, if you had told John Lang, produce manager of Shopping Center Market in Bloomfield Hills, that sales of prepared produce would reach the current height of popularity, he wouldn't have believed you.

"I can't think of anything prepared that doesn't sell," he said. "A couple of weeks ago, I introduced a julienne mix of carrots, cabbage and broccoli, and it's a big seller already. Working women run in and buy a bag of prepared salad mix. They just don't have the time to prepare it themselves. You're a life saver, they call over their shoulder, as they dash out of the store."

Chef shares recipes, harmonizes wine with food

WARM RED CABBAGE SALAD WITH PANCETTA AND CALIFORNIA GOAT CHEESE

1/2 pound good quality pancetta, sliced in rounds
1 teaspoon peeled and minced garlic
1/2 cup olive oil
1 1/2 tablespoons wild honey
1/2 cup red wine vinegar
sea salt and fresh ground black pepper to taste
1 pound red cabbage, cored and finely shredded
5 ounces fresh California goat cheese

Cook pancetta until just beginning to color. Remove. Coarsely chop and set aside. Reserve the fat and combine in a bowl with the garlic, olive oil, honey, vinegar, salt and pepper. Taste and correct seasoning.

In a large saute pan over moderately high heat, briefly warm the olive oil mixture, add the cabbage and toss quickly for a minute or two just to warm through. Add chopped pancetta and place on warm plates.

Thinly slice goat cheese and arrange attractively on top along with baby frisee, mache or watercress, and nasturtium flowers. Serves 6-8.

This recipe pairs handsomely with the 1991 Fetzer Vineyards Barrel Select Chardonnay (\$13) or the 1989 Fetzer Barrel Select Zinfandel (\$10.50).

GRILLED SCALLOPS, FENNEL AND LEMON-TARRAGON VINAIGRETTE

1 large fennel bulb, tops removed
olive oil
1/2 medium, fresh jumbo sea scallops
salt and freshly ground pepper to taste
Lemon-Tarragon Vinaigrette (recipe follows)

Slice fennel lengthwise into 1/4-inch thick slices. Lightly oil and season and grill over coals until attractively marked and crisp-tender. Arrange on warm plates. Lightly oil and season scallops and grill until just done. Be careful not to overcook — centers should still be slightly translucent. Arrange on top of fennel along with garnish ingredients. Drizzle vinaigrette over to taste and serve immediately. Serves 4.

Garnish: Roasted red pepper strips; salmon caviar and tarragon sprigs along with available baby vegetables such as asparagus, carrots and peas.

Pairs with Fetzer Barrel Select Sauvignon Blanc (\$10.50)

LEMON-TARRAGON VINAIGRETTE

1/2 cup fresh lemon juice
1 teaspoon grated lemon zest
2 tablespoons white wine vinegar
1 tablespoon minced shallot
2 tablespoons minced fresh tarragon
2 teaspoons honey (or to taste)
1/2 to 1 cup olive oil
salt and freshly ground white pepper to taste

Either whisking by hand or in a food processor combine all ingredients except oil and salt and pepper. Whisk in oil slowly or pulse 2 or 3 times in the processor to form the vinaigrette. If using the processor be careful not to emulsify. Vinaigrette should be very light in body. Season to taste with salt and pepper. Yields approximately 2 cups.

Note: Reduced defatted chicken stock can be substituted for part of the oil to reduce fat. Store refrigerated for up to 3 days.

CREAMY POLENTA WITH WILD MUSHROOMS

1 cup finely chopped yellow onion
1/2 cup coarsely chopped mushrooms
1 tablespoon finely chopped garlic
1 ounce dried porcini or ceps mushrooms, rinsed, soaked in 1 cup water for one hour, drained and roughly chopped
1/4 cup olive oil
2 teaspoons finely chopped fresh basil
1/2 teaspoon finely chopped fresh oregano
4 cups flavorful chicken or vegetable stock
1 cup coarse polenta meal
salt and freshly ground white pepper to taste
1 cup heavy cream
1/2 cup finely grated aged Asiago or Fontina cheeses

In a large sauce pan, saute the onion, mushrooms, garlic and porcini in olive oil until very lightly col-

SPICED NUTS

- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1/4 cup cornstarch
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon cardamom
- 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1/2 teaspoon ginger
- 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
- 1 egg white
- 2 tablespoons cold water
- 1/4 pound nutmeats (walnuts, almonds, pecans, etc.)

Combine dry ingredients and mix well. Set aside. Combine egg white with the water and beat slightly. Dip nuts into the egg white wash, then roll in spices. Shake off excess and place nuts on a baking sheet, separated.

Bake at 250 degrees for 1 hour. Remove from oven, shake off excess sugar and store in a tightly covered container. Makes 1/2 pound.

SCANDINAVIAN COFFEE CAKE

- 2 eggs
- 3/4 cup warm water
- 1 package active dry yeast
- 4 cups flour
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 2 tablespoons sugar
- 1/2 cup butter
- 1 1/2 teaspoons powdered cardamom
- 1/2 cup butter
- 1 1/2 cups butter

Beat the eggs and add the warm water. Dissolve the active dry yeast in this mixture. Allow to stand for 15 minutes.

Meanwhile, blend with a pastry blender or by hand the flour, salt, sugar, 1/2 cup of the butter and the cardamom. Make a ring of the flour mixture in a large bowl and pour the egg/yeast mixture in the center.

Work this gradually into the flour mixture and knead until smooth,

about 2 minutes. Form the dough into a ball and allow it to rest, covered in the refrigerator, for 20 minutes. Roll out the dough as lightly as possible into a rectangle about 1/4-inch thick.

Beat remaining 1 1/2 cups butter until creamy and spread onto pastry leaving 1/2-inch on all sides. Fold the dough and roll again. Do this 4 times (layering). Roll the dough into a rectangle and fill with any rich streusel topping — ground nuts with cinnamon, sugar and 1/4 teaspoon powdered cardamom or poppy seed pie filling, available at most markets.

Gently roll the dough into a log shape. Cut the dough in 2-inch intervals to make slits on each side. Place on a lightly greased baking sheet and brush with beaten egg. Bake for 25 minutes at 375 degrees. Serves 8.

Get acquainted with beans

AP — Jack was smarter than he realized when he started his climb up the beanstalk, yet even he couldn't have guessed what a giant beans would become.

Far from being the poor man's food of fairy tales, beans today are lauded for their high fiber content and for being an inexpensive, low-fat source of protein. They also offer lots of room for creativity. In restaurants across the country, beans are starring in salads, soups, pilafs and exciting entrees. Chefs are experimenting with beans of different sizes, shapes and colors. You can, too, once you bone up on beans.

Stalking Beans

You can tell a bean by its size, color (black, brown, red, white, or speckled), and shape (round, oval, or kidney-shaped). The different kinds are sold either in bags or in bulk at the supermarket. If you buy them in bulk, choose plump beans and discard any that are shriveled. Store beans in a covered container at room temperature for up to 1 year or in your freezer indefinitely. Choose from the following varieties:

■ Black: Small, black and oval. Cook them for 1 to 1 1/2 hours.

■ Black-eyed pea: Small, cream-colored and oval. One side has a black oval with a cream-colored dot in the center. Do not precook or soak. Cook them for 45 to 60 minutes.

■ Chick pea or garbanzo: Medium, yellow or golden, round and irregular. Cook them for 1 1/2 to 2 hours.

■ Cranberry: Small, tan-colored (with specks and streaks of burgundy) and oval. Cook them for 1 1/2 to 1 3/4 hours.

■ Fava: Large, brown, flat oval. Cook them for 15 to 30 minutes, then cool and peel. Cook for 45 to 60 minutes more.

■ Great Northern: Small to medium, white, kidney-shaped. Cook them for 1 to 1 1/2 hours.

■ Lima, baby: Small, off-white and wide oval in shape. Cook them for 45 to 60 minutes. Lima, large and butter: Medium, off-white and wide oval in shape. Cook them for 1 to 1 1/2 hours.

■ Navy or pea: Small, off-white and oval. Cook them for 1 to 1 1/2 hours.

■ Pinto: Small, tan-colored (with brown specks) and oval. Cook them for 1 1/2 to 1 3/4 hours.

■ Red kidney: Medium to large, brownish red and kidney-shaped. Cook them for 1 to 1 1/2 hours.

■ Soybean: Small, cream-colored and oval. Cook them for 2 to 2 1/2 hours.

Cooking dried beans

It's best to simmer dried beans slowly so they will retain their shape. If you're using a recipe that calls for an acid food, such as tomatoes or vinegar, these ingredients will slow down the cooking process. Add the acid food as near the end of the cooking time as possible.

Most beans, unless otherwise noted, must first be soaked. To soak, rinse beans. In a 4 1/2-quart Dutch oven, combine 1 pound beans and 8 cups cold water. Bring to boiling; reduce heat. Simmer for 2 minutes. Remove from heat. Cover and let stand for 1 hour. (Or, omit simmering; soak beans in cold water overnight in a covered pan.) Drain and rinse.

To cook, in the same pan combine beans and 8 cups fresh water. Bring to boiling; reduce heat. Cover and simmer until the beans are tender, using the timings given above as a guide for each bean. Stir occasionally during cooking.

One pound of dry beans (2 1/2 cups) will yield 6 to 7 cups of cooked beans.

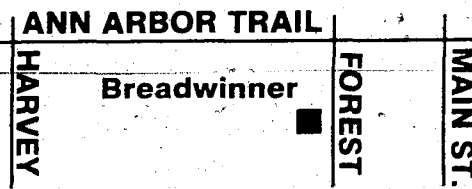

It's no secret that the best sources of nutrients are vegetables. But you may not know that the new food pyramid recommends that we consume three to five servings of vegetables each day.

Jazz up your plate with some color! Did you know that brighter and deeper-colored vegetables are healthier for you? When preparing vegetables, it's also important to remember that you get the most nutrients from fresh, raw vegetables. If cooked, they should be steamed for best results.

Vegetables can be included in your diet in a variety of ways. Cut up celery and carrot sticks to take to the office, dice green pepper into an omelet, have a salad for lunch or stir-fry spring's very best. One thing is for sure, eating your vegetables does not have to be boring — especially if you're serving Broccoli Cornbread, Mexican-Style Gazpacho or Marinated Vegetable Salad.

So, eat your vegetables and stay healthy.

BROCCOLI CORNBREAD

- 2 cups frozen chopped broccoli (one 10-ounce package), thawed and well-drained
- ½ cup nonfat cottage cheese
- ½ cup chopped onion
- ½ cup egg substitute
- 2 tablespoons plus 2 teaspoons margarine, softened
- ¼ teaspoon salt
- 6 ounces self-rising white cornmeal

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Spray a 9-inch glass pie plate with nonstick cooking spray; set aside. In large mixing bowl, combine broccoli, cottage cheese, onion, egg substitute, margarine and salt until blended; stir in cornmeal.

Be a budget gourmet

AP — If April 15 brought thoughts of belt-tightening, you can save money deliciously in the food department.

Learn how to be a budget gourmet. Shop the supermarket for values; use unit pricing to determine which choices are the best buys. Stock up on sale items that your family likes — and that you have space to store properly. Make use of seasonal produce — it's less expensive than out-of-season items.

For example, at this time of year, fresh asparagus is in season. Stretch it by pairing with other ingredients to make a one-dish meal, complete with sausage, vegetables and pasta. Dried pasta is only pennies per serving. You can vary the flavor of the dish by choosing mild or hot Italian sausage. Check the store brands of sausage — many supermarkets make their own, and it's sometimes less expensive. Italian bread or garlic toast is all you need to round out the menu.

SAUSAGE PASTA PRIMAVERA

- 1 pound fresh Italian sausage, cut into 2-inch pieces
- 1 medium onion, cut into 16 wedges
- ¼ cup water
- 1 cup uncooked spiral or wagon wheel-shaped pasta
- 8 ounces asparagus, cut diagonally into 1-inch pieces, or 10-ounce package frozen cut asparagus, thawed
- 1 clove garlic, crushed
- 1 teaspoon dried basil leaves
- 2 medium tomatoes, coarsely chopped
- 2 tablespoons freshly grated Parmesan cheese

Place Italian sausage, onion and water in a large skillet. Cover lightly; cook over medium heat 11 to 13 minutes, turning once. Meanwhile, cook pasta according to package directions; drain and keep hot. Stir asparagus, garlic and basil into skillet with sausage.

Continue cooking 7 to 9 minutes or until sausage is cooked through and browned and asparagus is crisp-tender, stirring occasionally. Add tomatoes and reserved pasta, tossing lightly to combine. Cook 1 minute or just until heated through. Sprinkle with Parmesan cheese. Makes 4 servings.

Healthy, low-fat grains energize

Eating more grains. You know it's the smart thing to do because in addition to being low in fat and calories, grains are a great source of energizing complex carbohydrates. Yet, getting the recommended number of servings may seem more challenging than it needs to be.

"When consumers look at the USDA Food Guide Pyramid and see the six to 11 grain servings, their first thought is 'I can't possibly eat that many servings and still have room for all of the other foods I need each day,'" said Mary Mullen, a Chicago-area dietitian who counsels consumers interested in improving their eating habits. "What they often don't understand is how many servings are right for them.

"The Food Guide Pyramid gives a range of servings because the number of servings each of us requires depends upon our calorie needs. And, calorie needs are based upon a variety of factors such as age, sex, size and activity level. Many older adults, for example, need about 1,600 calories which can be obtained by eating the lowest number of servings from each of the five major groups."

According to Mullen, many consumers also don't realize that at least some of the grain servings they're already eating are actually two servings. One grain serving is equivalent to — 1/2 a bagel, hamburger or hot dog roll; 1 slice of bread; 1/2 cup cooked rice or pasta; 1/2 cup cooked cereal or grits; 1 tortilla; 1 whole grain waffle; and 2 tablespoons of wheat germ. This means that a sandwich, many pasta entrees and a bagel all count as two grain servings.

One way to get in the habit of eating more grains is to think of cereals and other grain-based foods as ingredients and snacks. Here are some ideas from the Quaker Kitchens.

■ Use nutrient-rich wheat germ to coat chicken and as an extender when making meatloaf and meatballs.

■ Sprinkle wheat germ over salads, soups, baked potatoes and frozen entrees for a nutrition boost.

■ When the urge to snack strikes, reach for unbuttered popcorn, pretzels, mini bagels, rice cakes, bread sticks or graham crackers. Or, combine peanut butter and wheat germ and spread over apple, pear or banana slices and raw vegetables.

Wheat germ can also add a nutrition boost to homemade muffins and yeast breads. A serving of wheat germ (2 tablespoons) contributes 2 grams of fiber, is a good source of six essential vitamins and minerals and provides 50 calories.

Here are some recipes from Kretschmer — wheat germ. Wheat germ also adds nutty flavor and whole grain texture to the hot roll mix used to make onion-topped Easy Herb Focaccia.

Muffins are one of the most popular members of the grain group, and hearty Garden Patch Muffins, feature the goodness of corn meal and wheat germ. Flecks of zucchini, carrot and green onion along with zesty seasonings and Parmesan cheese make these muffins perfect accompaniments to soup, salads, pasta dishes and broiled meat, poultry and fish.

EASY HERB FOCACCIA

- One 16 ounce package hot roll mix
- 1 1/4 cups water
- 1 egg
- 2 tablespoons margarine, softened
- 1/2 cup wheat germ
- 1 tablespoon fresh basil or 1 teaspoon dried basil
- 1 tablespoon chopped fresh oregano, or 1 teaspoon dried oregano
- 1 1/2 teaspoons garlic, minced or 1 teaspoon garlic powder
- 1 cup thinly sliced onion rings
- 1 tablespoon olive oil

Heat oven to 375 degrees F. Lightly spray 2 large baking sheets with no-stick cooking spray. Prepare hot roll mix according to package directions, stirring in wheat germ, basil, oregano and garlic with water, egg and margarine.

In nonstick skillet, saute onion in olive oil about 1 minute. Divide dough in half. Pat dough out into 8-inch circles on prepared baking sheets. Lightly press cooked onions on top of loaves. Sprinkle with additional wheat germ, if desired. Bake 20 to 25 minutes or until golden brown. Yield 2 loaves.

He puts the mix in mixed drinks

■ He does more spins than a Waring blender and twirls and whirls like a dervish... all for the sake of a mixed drink. Dan Kotwicki's show easily explains why he's rated the best bartender in the metro area.

Dan Kotwicki always wanted to be in a hard core rock band. When he couldn't realize that dream, he did the next best thing.

He became a bartender.

Unless you've seen Kotwicki at work at Industry in Pontiac or the Shelter below St. Andrew's Hall in Detroit, you probably wouldn't see the correlation. He leans over the steel bartops screaming, yelling, jumping or twirling around, pointing at people—and of course sticking out his tongue. He's always obnoxious—in a fun way—but never rude.

"It's a loud, angry, aggressive thing," Kotwicki said comparing his job to his former passion. I can't play any instruments, so I scream and yell and tell kid stories of what goes on in my head."

Besides screaming, he also tells his stories through his newsletter, "Big Hard News." All copies are personally signed and numbered. In his one-page production, he sometimes gives away prizes and urges readers not to "accept imitations."

He started "Big Hard News" to let his fans know a little bit more about his energetic self.

"I could only spend so much time with each customer; I was getting away from the zaniness," he said. "I was bartending more than the performing thing. I wanted to let people know why I act the way I do and include a little about myself."

Copies of his newsletter have become collector's items. Soon, copies may be even more scarce. He's cutting down the number of copies and distributing them at clubs and his favorite record store, Play It Again Records in Royal Oak.

"Only the really close followers will get one. If you have one, hopefully, you enjoyed it and lucked out."

But don't worry, he always keeps a few on hand for those who miss an issue.

Asylum," he uses some of the spectacles that he created when he manned the VIP bar at The Love Club, Saturdays in The Shelter. That includes sing-alongs to older rock tunes like "Angel Is a Centerfold" by J.Geils, or serving drinks with remote control cars.

He offers an often-changing menu of goodies, all concocted by on his own time, such as spiked pudding and Jell-O, and his special Formula 44-D and Gray Matter.

Concocting things isn't new to Kotwicki. He's been messing around with "recipes" since he was growing up in Macomb County.

"I had a dumb chemistry set in my basement when I was like 8 years old. I wanted to blow up stuff, but I never had the right chemicals," he said with a laugh.

The modest Kotwicki doesn't take all the credit for his success. He gets some of his ideas from customers and is thankful that the two clubs allowed him to create his show. Whether he likes it or not, Kotwicki and his protruding goatee have become a cult figure in the area.

"It's like crazy because it's almost too big. I never wanted it to get that big... It started out as a joke. A joke I thought would be cool for some people to enjoy."

Chip Pepitone is well aware that the U.S. spends millions every year for famine relief and military aid to countries around the globe. That's great, but he also knows that there are needs right here, right now, in his own community.

Make decision from a position of confidence

Voice Mail Message: Barbara,

I am very upset about what I am about to tell you. I feel anxious about it, even panicked. I am 30 and have been dating a man my age for about a year.

Our relationship is quite flawed but we are both in therapy and so I have hoped that enough would change that we could be happier and more intimate together.

This week my boyfriend's sister called. She told me that she, too, has been in therapy and through it has discovered that she was repeatedly sexually abused as a child and teenager by her father. She believes my boyfriend experienced similar treatment. She told me that she recovered memories of abuse when her therapist gave her "The Courage to Heal," a book by women who have suffered this treatment.

She called to tell me all of this because she was afraid my 3-year-old daughter would not be safe with her father. She wanted to warn me.

I feel so confused. I called my boyfriend's therapist to tell him what I had learned. He thanked me for the information but would not discuss it with me further. My own therapist will only say that there is no way to know if this information is true. She says that I must make decisions about my relationship with him based on what I know about him, not on what his sister says. She also says that memories of abuse that are recovered after reading "The Courage to Heal" are not necessarily valid.

If I knew for sure that his father abused him, I would want to break off the relationship. I feel that kind of treatment in childhood is too hard to overcome. I would never feel that my daughter was safe with him. He is a nice man but often flat and not involved. He has been very nice to my daughter but sometimes he avoids her. Can you give me any insight into this mess?

Dear Caller,
You ask a number of questions; most importantly, you don't know if you want to be with the man you are dating or if you want to break up with him. This is crucial because of what it says about you. It says you do not know yourself well enough to be confident about what makes you happy or unhappy.

Choosing a partner is inadvisable from that position of relative weakness. The disturbing information you have just learned about your boyfriend and his family looms large because of your lack of confidence in yourself. It is not necessarily because of the information itself.

In your panic, you are declaring that you do not feel the freedom of choice. Freedom and confidence are based on the ability to keep trying new ways of solving problems until a satisfactory answer is found.

In your current situation that means that you could be fine without your boyfriend, if you don't like him enough to stay with him. Or, that you could make a relationship with him work if that is the course you decide to take. In either situation, there is no cause for panic because you are in control of yourself and can manage well with different outcomes. That is freedom.

You have brought up some current issues surrounding sexual abuse. First, when "The Courage to Heal" has been read before memories of sexual abuse have been recovered, such memories are often not accepted in a court of law. Legally, the book is considered so suggestive that it can plant memories that are not true. There are children and adults who are prone to suggestibility and fail to distinguish between what really happened and what was suggested to them.

Second, you think that early sexual abuse cannot be overcome so that a person could live a normal life. I have seen many cases where you are right. I have also witnessed a few when a person conquered his or her past to become fully functioning and possibly even deeper because of his or her past experiences.

If you decide to stay with your boyfriend, you will need to be vigilant when your daughter is with your boyfriend's father. I hope I will hear from many of you who are familiar with the depression and anxiety that sexual abuse causes. I am especially interested in whether you can become whole, despite it.

The moral question that frames "Indecent Proposal" has heated up conversation around the office water cooler. Chances are many of those gab sessions prove far more fascinating than what unfolds on the screen.

Woody Harrelson and Demi Moore play young marrieds madly in love since high school. David, an architect, starts to build his California dream house while Diana peddles real estate. When recession hits and jobs grow scarce, the two scramble to make payments on the property while the house is stalled in mid-construction.

So, like any intelligent couple with financial problems, they hot-foot it out to Vegas with their remaining savings.

Enter John Gage (Robert Redford), the handsome financier and gambler who poses the \$1 million

question: Will Diana sleep with him for a seven-digit check? Moreover, will David let him do it?

Director Adrian Lyne and producer Sherry Lansing, who last collaborated on "Fatal Attraction," recognize a hot property when they see one. Unfortunately, the movie's slickness only proves how out-of-touch Hollywood is with real life and real people.

Lyne, who also made "Flashdance" and "9½ Weeks," left his heart and head in MTV. A story like this should work on script and acting alone, but he jazzes up virtually every shot with quick-cutting and fancy camera tricks choreographed to popular music.

Harrelson, perfectly suited to the jock comedy "White Men Can't Jump," simply doesn't handle drama well. Despite his much-publicized off-screen affairs, he's too gangly and goofy to make a

believable romantic lead or architect.

In one especially hokey scene, and one that might sum up the entire movie, starry-eyed architecture students hang on every word of David's inspirational slide presentation. We might be similarly captivated with "Indecent Proposal" until we realize that the movie, like the lecture, is all slickly delivered emotion with no substance behind it.

Redford, meanwhile, gets another chance to play "The Great Gatsby" and does it just as weakly. Dressed in a white suit, leaning against the railing of his yacht, he gazes dreamily at a flickering light across the bay. And like Jay Gatsby, Gage's background and the origins of his wealth remain shadowed in mystery.

The part would be played far less woodenly had it been given to Seymour Cassel (so clever as a flamboyant moneybags in "In the Soup"), here relegated to the role of the millionaire's bodyguard.

Demi Moore is the only performer who leaves a mark on "Indecent Proposal." She sheds that irritating squeak from her voice and depicts a believable woman facing complex choices, even though her final decision between the two men revives the most overworked cliché in movies.

As stupid as it was, last year's "Honeymoon in Vegas" delivered basically the same theme and story in an entertaining and less pretentious package.

five-piece techno-metal band, with two powerful lead guitarists, a commanding drum/bass combination, and a vocalist who is an austere mix between Ronny James Dio and Rob Halford of Judas Priest. Together they unleash a primal sound with a technical structure.

A pinnacle of their performance was an epic original, called "Withered Stone," a moving piece that starts out dulcet and crescendos into a raucous dual guitar performance.

"This was our second live performance as a group," said Ron

Rollins, the band's drummer. "Although I wasn't sure until after the show what charity it was we were performing for, I was just happy to help and be out in public again."

Mr. Know It All kicked off their segment of the performance with a couple well-harmonized cover songs from Kansas and Van Halen.

Then they performed a canny pop style original "Mirror, Mirror" that ignited the stage. They're a foursome that packs some punch.

"When we were called upon to

do the show, we kind of all said sure we'd love the chance to do a charity spot," said Mike Conception, the band's guitarist, who incidentally placed second in the 1992 Motor City Guitarist Contest.

The benefit performances are a dream come true for their organizer.

"I have been working to get this thing off the ground for a while, having had about five other charity shows in the past," said Pepitone. "I plan to set up a few more in the spring too."

"Some of the other local fund-

raising performances have been around town at Skateland and at Ashley's and we plan to have more on the west side."

In the future, there are plans to work for other charities like the Red Cross and the Salvation Army, Pepitone said.

All in all, the concerts are entertaining evenings with a good cause.

They may be tired from Saturday's "Race for the Cure" at the Detroit Zoo, but members of a Westland-based breast cancer support group already are planning other events.

Following Saturday's fundraiser, women in the 160-member group Encore have set their sights on Washington, D.C., and Lansing, where marches and rallies have been planned to draw attention to breast cancer.

During a May 2 march on the nation's capital, Encore members from Westland, Garden City, Livonia and other local communities are planning to join women from all 50 states. Their goal: To

try to get breast cancer declared a national epidemic.

Encore and other breast cancer support groups have learned to become more politically involved. They want more government action — more funding — to fight the disease that affects one in eight women.

The women who attend the Washington, D.C., rally will get little rest before they go to Lansing on May 8 for a march and rally aimed at drawing the attention of state legislators.

In that march, each woman will be bringing a red flower that represents a person living with breast cancer, according to Encore members. They also will be carry-

ing white flowers in memory of those who have died.

Many local women have become more politically active — and they've also found personal support — through Encore, which has weekly meetings in a room provided by The Forum health club in Westland.

In addition to the May rallies, the group also will be celebrating its 15th anniversary on May 23, said member Yvonne Chavis. Encore has grown during those years, drawing new members each year.

Leader Sharon Morris, who has won numerous awards for her leadership, receives ongoing training and certification to keep the group aware of the latest goings-

on in the breast cancer movement.

Some Encore members told the Observer that when they learned they had breast cancer, they felt alone, isolated, until they met other women like themselves. Some voiced frustration that even their family members don't seem to understand what they are dealing with — both emotionally and physically.

Encore members have encouraged women with breast cancer to attend their meetings at The Forum, on Ford at Wildwood. Chavis said the women swim, have meetings and exercise. They also discuss their experiences.

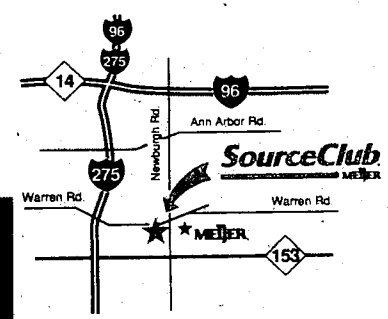

Maggy Zidar, 42, from Pontiac won the women's race in 29:53.

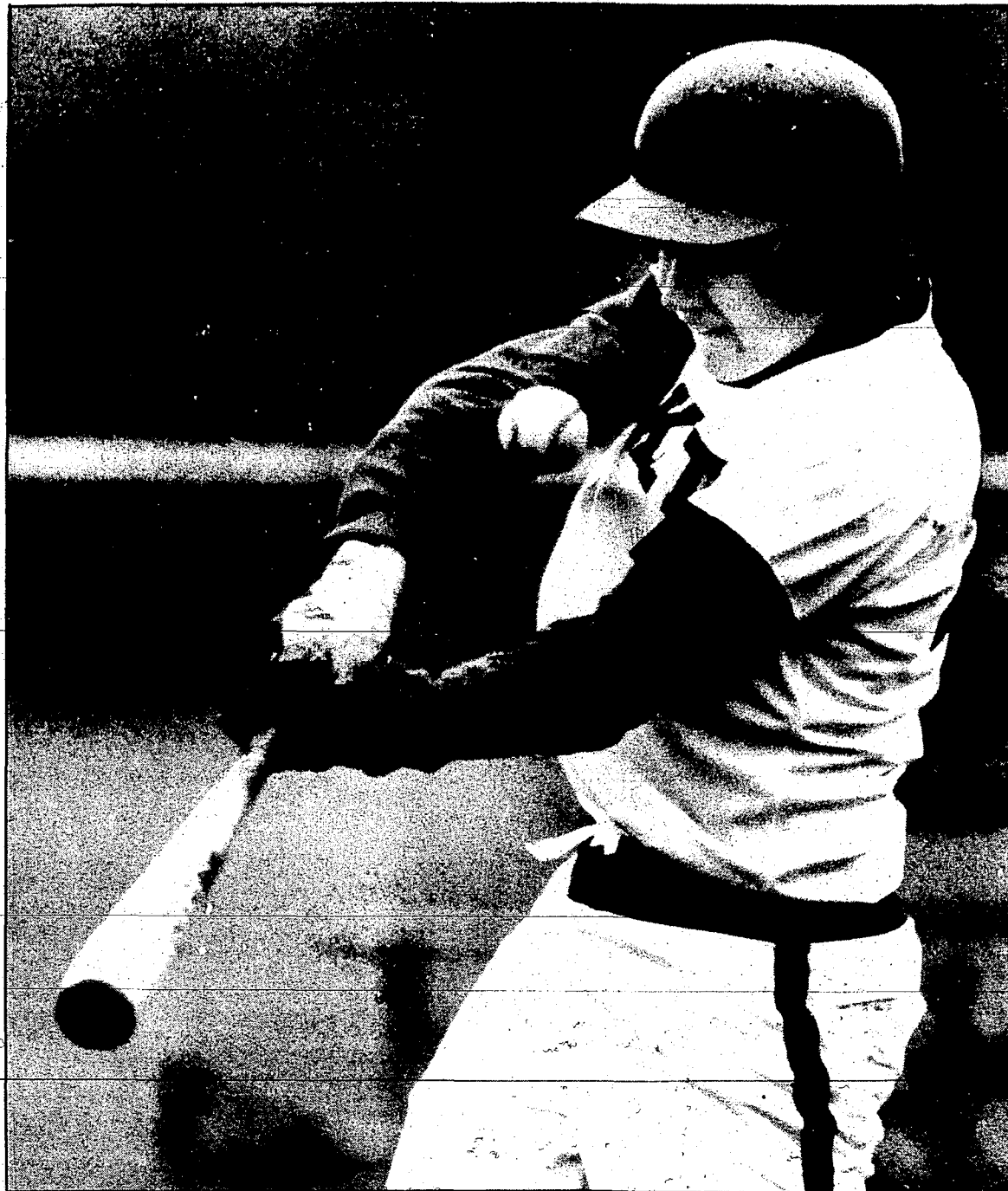

Whether it was lack of conditioning or lack of preparation, Steve Bond, stumbled out of the Golden Gloves semifinals Wednesday.

"I lost my balance and he chased me down," Bond said. "I couldn't get the momentum back after that. He never hurt me but he threw more of them."

Pearson believed that Bond's trip was the key for him gaining the momentum.

"That was the turning point," said Pearson, 20. "He was taking it to me in the first round but he never hurt me. My trainer was telling me to throw my jab."

Bond escaped the second round but stumbled again early in the third round. Pearson again capitalized by connecting on several right jabs. Bond finished the round with a strong right uppercut to Pearson's chin but it proved much too little, too late.

Pearson advanced to the Golden Glove finals Wednesday at the Light Guard Armory on Eight Mile Road in Detroit.

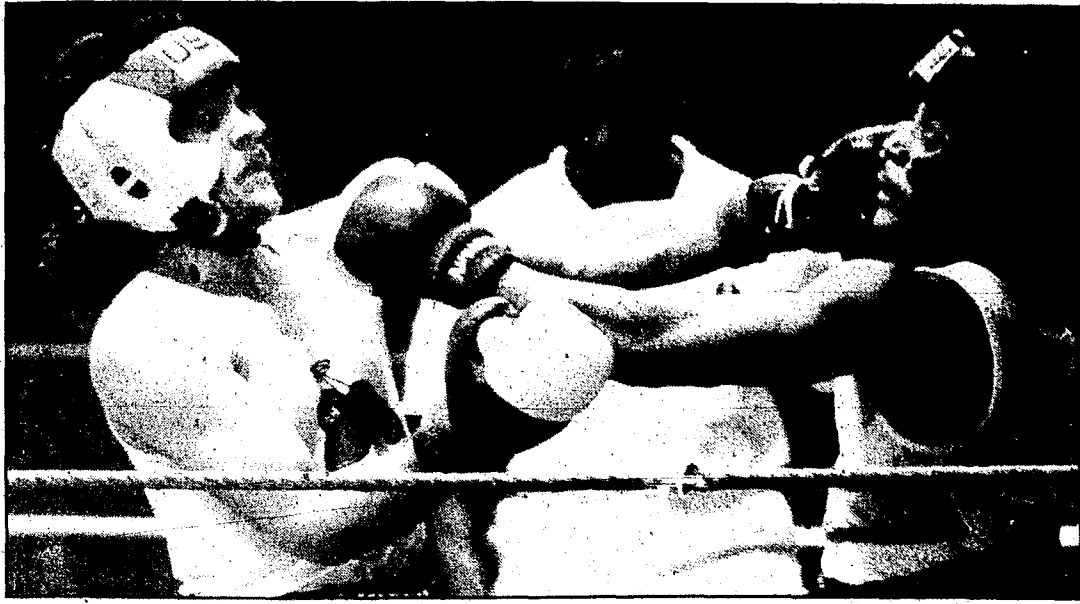
In the second game, Joe Jentzer (2-1) blanked Concordia on six hits, winning 4-0.

Lally fight planned
