## Salvation Army begins work on community center

| Local residents will get a new Salvation Army facility next spring to house a variety of educational, social and neighborhood services. <br> For low-income persons and retirees, the facility on Venoy near Dorsey in Westland will be a privately owned and operated community center. <br> For the Salvation Army, which held a groundbreaking ceremony last week for its new center, the $\$ 1.15$-million building represents "an opportunity for hope as well as development of a new sense of good will and spirit," said Lt. Col. Clarence Harvey, the organization's divisional commander. <br> "We are committed to the physical and spiritual needs of western Wayne County," Harvey said. <br> When the building is opened by its planned completion next March, it will house senior citizens' activities; youth programs; community recreation; latchkey; parent-child relationship programs; emergency food, clothing and shelter assistance; counseling, life and work skills; and afterschool activities for school-age children. <br> The Salvation Army has promised to pay $\$ 750,000$ of the estimated cost, with $\$ 400,000$ to come from a major fund-raising effort in the communities to be served by the center. The fundraising will end by Thanksgiving, said a Salvation Army spokes- |

## Will meteor shower turn out to be a storm?




the orbit of a meteor swarm, many
more meteors than usual can be
seen, and we can predict precisely
when that will happen.
It just so happens, Comet
Swift-Tuttle, the comet which is
associated with the Perseids,
came through the inner solar sys.
tem in December 199. On
Wednesday evening, the earth
will cross the orbit of the comet
and be located very near where
the comet was on Dec. 30. This
will take us through what ought
to be the main swarm of the
debris, and the resulting display
of meteors could be truly spectac-
ular.
A "meteor storm,", when many
meteors per SECOND are visible,
is extremely rare. The last one oc-
in November 1966, and was best seen from the western United States. Comet Swift-Tuttle takes
130 years to complete an orbit 130 years to complete an orbit
around the sun, so the last time it came through the solar system

trails can be traced back to Per-
seus. Meteors burn up about 20 mil above the surface of the earth but if an exceptionally large meteor fails to burn completely, it could strike the earth and produce a crater. Most of Earth is covered
with water, so any meteor impact with water, 80 any meteor impact
is more likely to produce a big is more likely to produce a big
splash than a big crater. Is it possible to be hit by a meteor? Well, the chances of that happening are ruly "astronomical!" Perseids on Thursday morning, look for the waning crescent moon in the southeast. Below and to the right, of the moon will be the

Right ingredients
In order to make the best pic
start with the right ingredients.
 Sting do cucumbers, grown for salads and fresh cumbers from the local grocer are totally unac

Immature cucumbers make the best pickles and the pros agree that it's best to can them immedi picking.
Cucumbers that have been picked more than 24 hours before canning make pickles that are hollow, shriveled and tough. A secret Grandma Lory cumbers that float in the water while you're wash ing them; they're usually hollow.
Pros also use good dry onions in the pickling process as fresh onions do not pickle well. As any good pickler can tell you, always use clear vinega grains. This information should be on the bottle
White distilled vinegar gives pickles the best color. Cider vinegar may darken pickles, but some
home canners prefer its fliavor and aroma. Salt is the major ingredient in brine and pros prefer a pickling or canning salt over table salt. The add tives in table salt to prevent caking make the brine cloudy while formentation and retard fermentation.
the best flavor. Whole spices help produce pickles of superior color. Fresh dill as opposed to dry is preferred. The use of sugar or other sweetening should use pure sugar, cane or beet, unless the recipe specifies other sweeteners.
Lastly, it is important that you have good, soft water. The minerals in hard water interfere with

Canning equipment
As far as the correct equipment is concerned, professional canners use only stainless steel conk ware and utensils.
Aluminum reacts with pickling liquids and cas iron, unlined copper or galvanized steel combine
with pickling acids and salts to form very small
quantities of harmful substances.
Experienced canners know it's important to have good jars. They check jars for chips and
cracks, and scrutinize lids for rust, bends and
cracked rubber seals.
Jars should be sterilized for any pickle recipe that calls for processing the pickles less than 15
 ready to use them.
Open-kettle canning is no longer considered safe for canning pickles and reliahes. There is always the danger of spoilage organisms entering the food after filling them destroys yeasts and molds and also helpr achieve a good seal.
