Arrests comfort victim's mother



A teenage girl has been charged with the murder of her mother and three others in a Gladwin County home last week. Two Westland persons were among the victims. After the four were shot, the house they were in was firebombed, police said.

A Westland woman whose daughter was killed during four execution-style murders in Gladwin County voiced relief Friday that four defendants have been arrested.

"I'm happy about the arrests. This

has taken a big weight off my shoulders," said Jean Rose, mother of Kathy Lane, 38, of Westland.

Lane and her longtime Westland boyfriend, Bruce Tufnell, 38, were found shot and burned beyond recognition on the morning of Aug. 8 in a

rural two-bedroom house in Bentley Township.

Also killed were Tufnell's cousin, Michael Tufnell, who owned the house, and his live-in companion, Vickie Sue Currie, 39, authorities said.

Currie's 16-year-old daughter, Tammy LaCross, has been charged with open murder, armed robbery, arson and felony firearms, among other related charges. Also arrested on identical charges were Paul Delbert Treece, 18, Charles Loran Treece, 20, and Michael David Elliott, 20, said

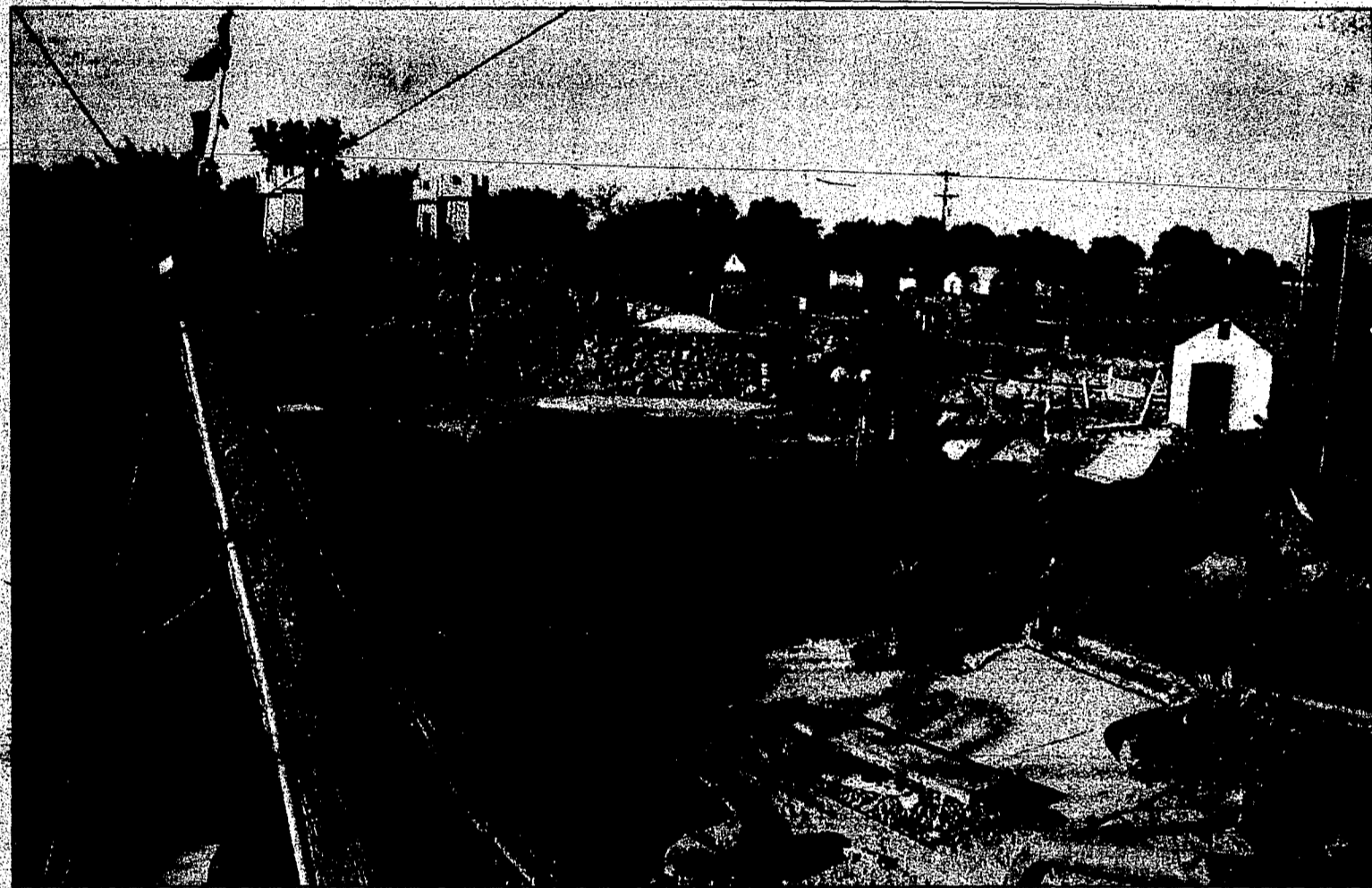
Gladwin County Sheriff Michael Hargrave.

Citing robbery as a possible motive, Hargrave indicated the slayings were drug-related, although he said he could not elaborate because of the continuing investigation. He did confirm, however, that authorities found \$250,000 during the investigation.

"We're still looking at possible motives, although robbery is certainly one," Hargrave said.

Local miniature golf course patrons have an elaborate new facility to enjoy in a few weeks.

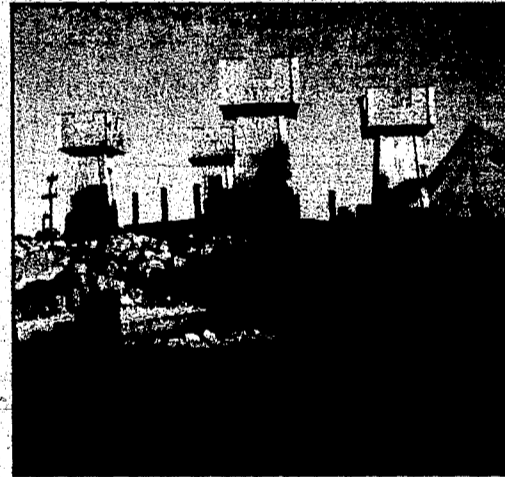
The Pirate's Island, a combination of a ship and castle surrounded by a moat is near completion on the north side of Ford between Hix and I-275 on Westland's western city limit.

Woman severely beaten in rape attempt

A Westland woman was attacked and beaten in a south Westland field but managed to thwart an attempted rape by fighting off her assailant, police said.

The woman, 27, was treated at Annapolis Hospital in Wayne after she was beaten about 3 a.m. Sunday, Aug. 8, in a field near Manistee, a small street southeast of Venoy and Palmer in Westland's Norwayne neighborhood, police said.

The woman was attacked after she left a nearby party with a man who had offered to give her a ride home, but an investigation revealed that the man didn't even have a car with him, Westland police Sgt. Laura Moore said.

"He grabbed her, threw her down, beat her up and tried to rape her," Moore said. "She was punched in the face eight or nine times. Her left eye was swollen shut, and her lips were swollen. She also had a fractured

middle finger and a bite mark on her wrist."

But the assailant fled after the woman continued to struggle, Moore said. The incident occurred not far from the woman's residence, but Moore declined to identify the woman's street in order to protect her identity.

A Westland man was arrested and arraigned the next day in Westland's 18th District Court on a charge of assault with intent to commit criminal sexual conduct involving attempted

penetration. The defendant, Eric Channing Trotter, 30, could face up to 10 years in prison if convicted, Moore said.

A plea of not guilty has been entered for Trotter in 18th District Court. He has been ordered to return to court Thursday for a preliminary hearing to determine if he should stand trial on the charge.

He remained in the county jail last week in lieu of a \$50,000 cash or surety bond, Moore said.

The court will resume regular business on Tuesday, Sept. 7. Transit manager dies unexpectedly

Charles Hunter, who headed a regional dial-a-ride agency since its birth 17 years ago, was remembered last week as a "unique individual" who was a "giver of time and effort to good causes."

That was how a former long-time co-worker, Martin Moore, described Hunter, who died unexpectedly Wednesday in University of Michigan Hospital, Ann Arbor.

"Chuck was head-strong but had a heart for people," said Moore, who knew Hunter for 14 years with the Nankin Transit Commission. Moore's position of supervisor of drivers was eliminated by the NTC board in April for financial reasons. Hunter resigned that same month.

"He was full of life and helped everyone he could," said Ruby Arntson, his mother-in-law. "He always had time for everyone no matter how young or old."

Supporting a VFW Post 3323 benefit for handicapped children, Hunter commented that the handicapped "don't get a fair shake in life and can't do the same things I can," commented Hunter's son-in-law Kevin Millar.

Hunter collapsed Tuesday at his Westland home while at his computer writing a letter to his

son Jacob, who discovered him a short time later.

He was rushed to Annapolis Hospital, Wayne, and then airlifted to University of Michigan Hospital, Ann Arbor, where he died the next day.

Hunter was a longtime member of the VFW Harris-Kehrer Post 3323 and a past commander. He was visible in his VFW uniform at numerous Memorial Day ceremonies and related community events.

Hunter, a 58-year-old Westland resident and avid golfer, was seen at the Wayne-Westland Family YMCA annual golf benefit July 29, just three weeks before his death.

He was also interviewed by the Observer in late July and asked to reflect on his career with the transit agency which serves elderly and handicapped persons in Westland, Garden City, Canton Township, Wayne and Inkster.

Hunter was in the news frequently to protest potential federal budget cuts for suburban transportation systems such as NTC, formed in 1976. In most cases, the money for the commission was restored.

The former director joined the commission in 1976 as a driver and was promoted later that year as supervisor, the top administrative position in the organization.

He had managed the program to its peak with 16,000 passengers a month riding 16 vans. Currently, the system has 10 vans serving 8,000 passengers monthly.

His biggest source of pride, he said in the Observer interview, was seeing the growth of the agency's ridership and having contact with people.

Hunter enjoyed handling complaints from passengers and being able in most cases "to see the person go away happy and understand what and why we are doing."

His biggest disappointment was his forced resignation in

April. He said the NTC board felt that with declining state and federal funds, the organization was too "top-heavy with administrators."

A major regret in leaving the commission is missing the contact with the agency's 12 drivers, three dispatchers and one secretary.

He said his forced resignation was a surprise, admitting that there has always been talk within the commission of money for his 17 years with the organization.

He told the Observer NTC "has a future but not as we currently know it. The personalized service will go. It (NTC) will be run for downtown (Detroit)," referring to the regional transit authority.

Hunter served in the Navy during the Korean War.

A memorial service was held Saturday evening at the Uht Funeral Home with Glenn Shaw, a former Westland city councilman who was instrumental in forming Nankin Transit, officiating. Hunter's remains were cremated and interred in United Memorial Gardens, Plymouth Township.

Survivors include: wife Nan; daughter Linda Hunter-Millar; sons John, Robert and Jacob; grandsons Joseph, Sean, James and Robert; and granddaughter Nicole.

Gunman robs Arbor Drugs

A lone gunman escaped with an undisclosed sum of money and three cartons of cigarettes during a holdup Wednesday afternoon at Arbor Drugs in Westland Plaza, on the northwest corner of Wayne Road and Hunter, police said.

No shots were fired and no injuries reported during the 2:45 p.m. robbery. The holdup remains under investigation, Westland Detective Sgt. Donald Haigh said.

The incident began when two Arbor Drugs employees working at the front cash register noticed a suspicious white male standing by a magazine rack, occasionally glancing toward the front of the store.

Moments later, the man walked up to the employees, asked for four cartons of cigarettes and then revealed what was described as a dull black, automatic handgun, police reports said.

The bandit pointed the gun at one of the workers, a 21-year-old Garden City man, and ordered him to put the cigarettes and money from the cash register into a bag, the reports said.

The Arbor employee complied and the gunman fled through the front door, bumping into a customer on the way out, police said.

A 37-year-old assistant manager who walked outside only seconds after the incident reported that a late-model van drove toward him at a high rate of speed, in what was believed to be the getaway vehicle, police reports said.

A woman in the parking lot told the store manager that she saw the apparent bandit come out the front door and flee along the

south side of the building, just before the van sped away, the reports said.

The bandit dropped one carton of cigarettes as he fled, but the employees put the carton back on the shelf and no fingerprints were obtained from it, Haigh said.

The intruder was described as a white male in his late 30s to early 40s, thin, about 6 feet tall, and weighing about 145 to 150. He had medium brown collar-length hair and wore sunglasses, a black and red flannel shirt and black pants, police reports said.

The van he was driving was believed to be a 1988 to 1990 model.

Wednesday's holdup came just 10 days after another Westland Arbor Drugs, on the northeast corner of Newburgh and Glenwood, was the target of an attempted robbery.

In that incident, a knife-wielding intruder came in a back door that had been propped open while an employee was taking out garbage. The bandit demanded money but left empty-handed when some workers fled the store and others locked themselves in an office.

A similar description was given of the intruder in that incident, but Westland police are not certain whether the same man committed both robberies, Haigh said.

LaCross and Paul Treece were arrested late Wednesday night in Grand Rapids, and Elliott and Charles Treece were arrested Thursday near Saginaw, the sheriff said.

Lane, a substitute Wayne-Westland school custodian, and Bruce Tufnell left their Crown Street residence in Westland on Aug. 7 and planned to stop overnight at the Bentley Township house before attending a Tufnell family reunion the following day in Harrison, said Rose, Lane's mother.

"They were in the wrong place at the wrong time," Rose said.

Gladwin County authorities found the bodies on Aug. 8 after a neighbor reported a fire that began shortly after 7 a.m. All four victims had received multiple shotgun wounds and had been burned beyond recognition by the fire, Hargrave said.

The bodies were taken to Sparrow Hospital in Lansing for examination by a pathologist, Hargrave said. Dental records had to be used to help identify the victims.

All four defendants have been

arraigned in 80th District Court in Gladwin County on charges of open murder, armed robbery, arson and felony firearms, among other related charges, Hargrave said. They could face life in prison if convicted.

All four are being held in custody, and Judge Gary Allen has denied bond, Hargrave said. The defendants have been scheduled for a preliminary hearing Aug. 24 to determine if they should stand trial on the charges.

Hargrave declined to elaborate on the killings other than to confirm that they appear to be drug-related and that robbery was a possible motive.

Jean Rose said she doesn't expect to attend the trial of the defendants accused of killing her daughter, a 1973 graduate of Wayne Memorial High School.

"I don't think I could handle that," she told the Observer on Friday.

Rose has called the killing of her daughter "devastating" and said, "I loved Bruce like a son, too."

Hargrave has indicated that earlier threats had been made to

the Bentley Township residence where Michael Tufnell and Vickie Sue Currie lived.

Lane left behind two children, Scott, 21, and Stacey, 18. She also had a 2½-year-old granddaughter, Shawna Marie.

Visitation for Lane will be from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. Wednesday at

Lents Funeral Home on Michigan Avenue, east of Wayne Road, in Wayne. Memorial services will be at 1 p.m. Wednesday.

Lane's body will be cremated, her mother has said. Interment will be at Cadillac Memorial Gardens West in Westland.

Miniature golf course to boast pirate ship, castle

Imagine getting lost in a wrecked pirate ship or a medieval castle on your way to the 13th hole.

It may sound a bit disconcerting, but owners of Sport-Way in Westland are banking that the experience will bring customers back for more. The amusement facility, located on Ford Road between Hix and I-275, is currently undergoing major remodeling with the addition of a second 18-hole miniature golf course.

Construction of a castle on Ford Road is tough for motorists to miss.

Medieval castle builders, however, should have had it so good. Bulldozers and overtime have helped to make this expansion of Sport-Way possible, according to general manager Bill McQueen Jr.

The new 18-hole miniature golf course involved the laying of 1,000 cubic yards of concrete and 10 tons of boulders and rocks were brought to the site. Bricklayers and construction workers are putting 10 hours a day on the job hoping to complete the project by Labor Day.

The new portion of the course is called Pirates Pointe and the individual playing holes are plotted along the steep sides of a man-made mountain. An existing course built in 1988 and located behind the new attraction features a shipwreck.

"People can come in and play 18 holes or they can play all 36,"

McQueen said. "It's an inexpensive way for families to have fun together."

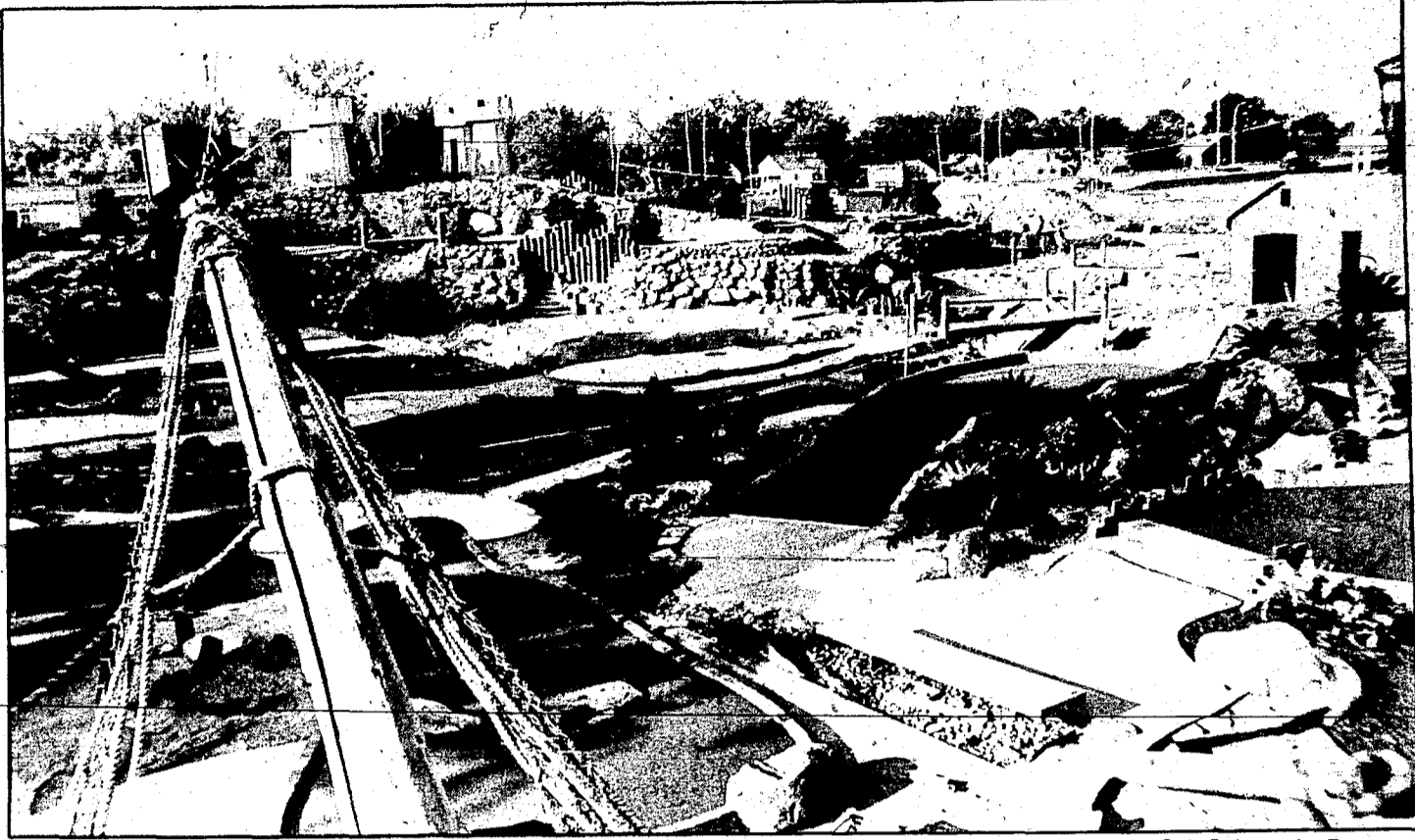
This is the ninth season for the Ford Road amusement facility, located just east of I-275 between Hix and Newburgh roads. Sport-Way also features seven automatic batting cages and a quarter-mile go-cart track. The entire complex takes up about five acres of land.

"We do a big business here," McQueen said. "We're slower during the days and the weather affects our business."

The new course will feature four waterfalls and 1,000 feet of waterways winding through the various holes. Pirate mannequins and cannons will add to the experience, McQueen said.

"We're just hoping people have a good time with it," he added.

Sport-Way is owned by a group of investors who own similar facilities in Brownstown and Waterford townships. McQueen said the Westland facility has grown so significantly over the nine seasons it has been in operation that he commits all his time to the one

location. His father is one of the owners.

Thirty more parking spaces will be added to parking lot.

McQueen is uncertain of the fee for playing the new course, but current prices are \$2.50 during the day and \$6 in the evening.

Area miniature golf courses help beat summer boredom

With only a few short weeks of summer left, children may be clamoring about boredom and parents may be running out of ideas.

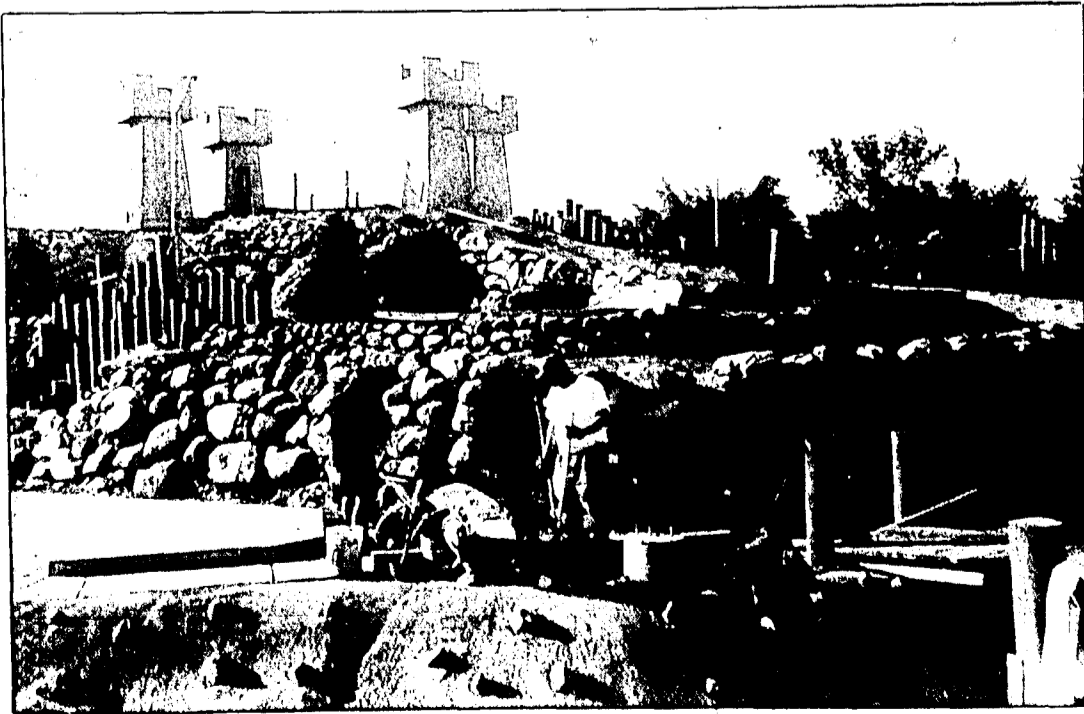
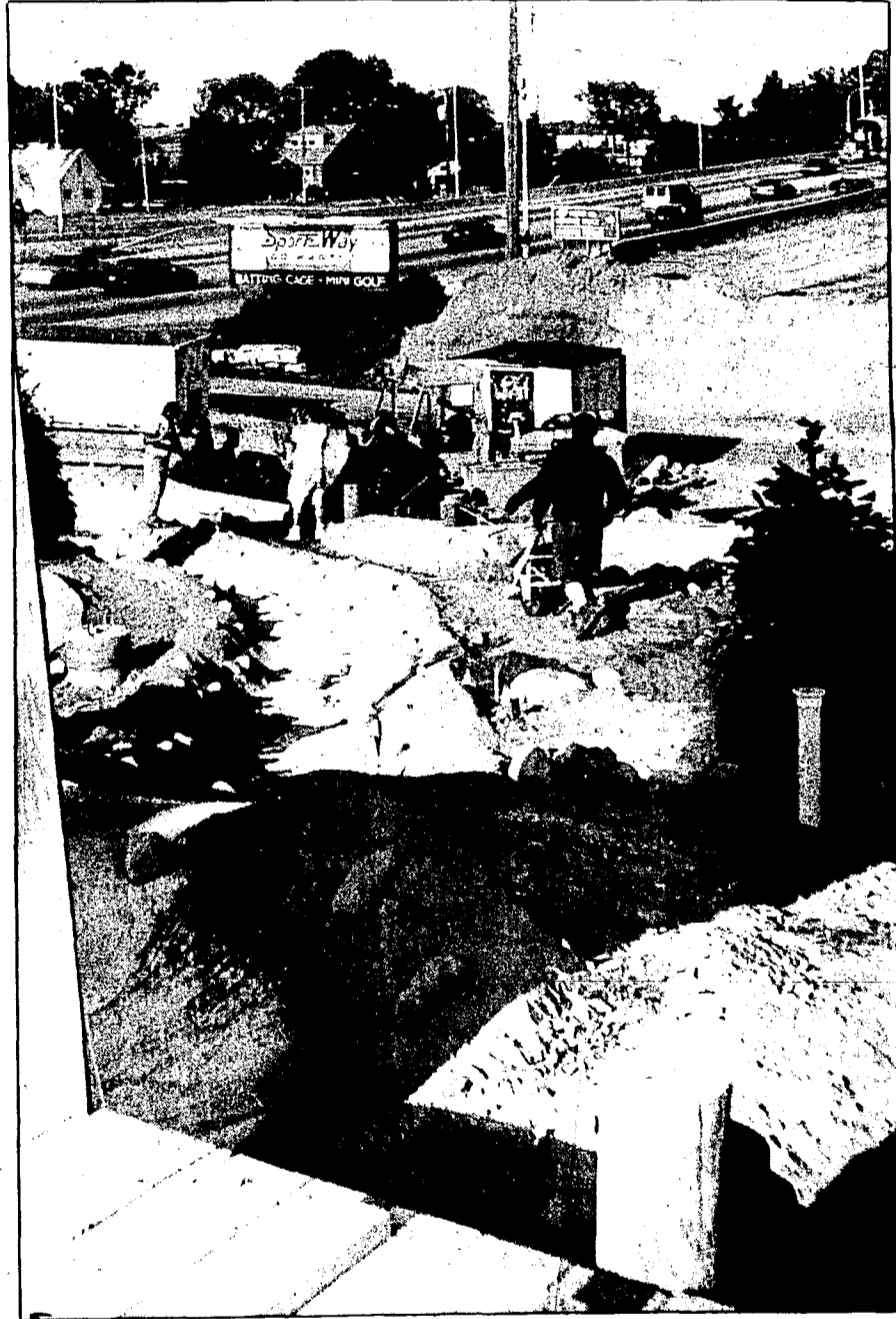

Trial ordered in beating of bill collector

A Westland man accused of beating a bill collector with a broom and threatening him with a 12-gauge shotgun has been ordered to stand trial in Detroit Recorder's Court.

Ladarin Best, 26, had hoped to be cleared on a charge of assault with a dangerous weapon that stemmed from allegations he beat the bill collector with a metal-handle broom on the afternoon of Aug. 4.

Instead, two more charges were lodged against Best when he appeared Thursday in 18th District Court for a preliminary hearing to determine if he should stand trial on the original charge.

Following testimony from bill collector Richard Lyle Miller, 35, Judge Gail McKnight added two charges — felonious assault and felony firearms — against Best. The new charges stem from allegations he threatened Miller with a 12-gauge shotgun.

Best could face up to four years in prison if convicted on the assault charges. He will face a mandatory two-year term if found guilty on the felony firearms charge.

Pending trial, Best remained in the county jail last week in lieu of posting \$2,500, or 10 percent of a \$25,000 bond.

Miller, manager of a rent-to-

own company, testified that he was attacked when he went to a residence in the 28900 block of McDonald, near Middlebelt and Annapolis, to collect payment for a rented television.

Miller had been seeking payment from a 26-year-old female resident when the woman's boyfriend, later identified as Best, arrived on the scene and allegedly began threatening Miller, said Westland Detective Sgt. Donald Haigh.

Police reports indicated that a man threatened Miller with a shotgun and told him, "I got a bullet for you."

Miller was then shoved from the residence to the front yard, where he was beaten with a metal-handle broom, police reports said. Nearby police officers were waved down by a co-worker of Miller's, police said.

Police reported that Miller had two large welts on his forehead and was treated by his personal physician.

According to police reports, the defendant told police that Miller was "out of hand" while trying to collect payment for the television.

One-time tomboy leads boy scouts

She couldn't be a Boy Scout as a kid, but Jennifer Litomisky wears the uniform proudly today.

Litomisky, 30, is climbing the ladder of scouting leadership and is one of only a few women to do that.

She is one of six female field directors for the Boy Scouts in the U.S., working with a group of nearly 8,000 scouts and 3,000 leaders in western Wayne County.

"I love what this organization is about," she said. "It's all about kids and helping them become leaders."

Litomisky grew up in a rural farming community in mid-Michigan and admits to being a tomboy most of her childhood. As a youngster she believed in the stigma attached to being a Girl Scout and didn't join.

"It's terrible, but I thought Girl Scouts were about cooking and sewing and that was something I wasn't interested in," she said. "I know that's wrong, but that is what I thought at the time."

Litomisky did say, however, that if she had been allowed in Boy Scouts she would have joined because she liked the idea of camping out and making things and being outside.

"I think I am at a disadvantage because I had never really been exposed to the scouting program," she said. "I'm now a coordinator for people who have been in scouting for longer than I've been alive."

Leadership is what the job is all about, however, and Litomisky learned those skills on the basketball court. She went to Eastern Michigan University on a basketball scholarship and graduated

with a degree in communications and journalism.

When she graduated in 1986 the placement office at EMU directed her to Boy Scouts for an interview. She landed a job with the Explorers program after nearly 16 hours of interviews. She gradually moved through the ranks and in November 1992 her big break came. Finally, Litomisky got to become a "Boy Scout."

"I beat the odds on this one," she said. "If you're a woman and you start out in Explorers you stay."

As a field director, Litomisky manages four male district executives and coordinates all fundraising activities. She also runs her own district which includes troops in Livonia, Redford, Northville, Plymouth and Canton. Perhaps her favorite part of the job, however, is working with

the volunteers.

"I love working with the volunteers. They are here for the long haul," she said. "Boy Scout professionals come and go, but the volunteers are here to stay."

Litomisky, a Westland resident, admits everyone involved was a little leery when she took over this job. She jumped in with a positive attitude and those in her district respected that.

Litomisky has long-term goals for a career with the Boy Scouts. She admits there is a special thrill about treading where no woman has gone before.

"Sometimes I think about doing public relations for a for-profit company, but then I will think what is the point in this," she said. "When I'm out recruiting and I sign up 800 kids I feel good about that because I'm making a difference in their lives."

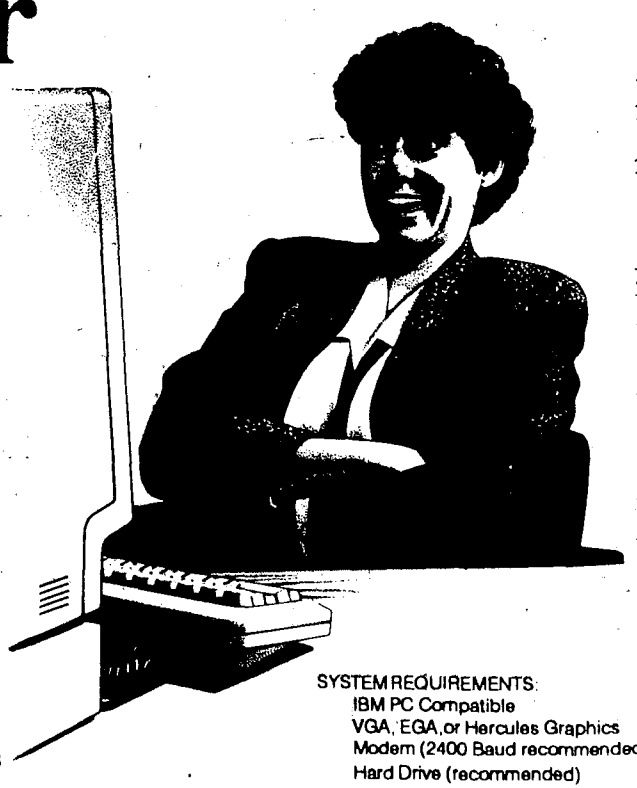

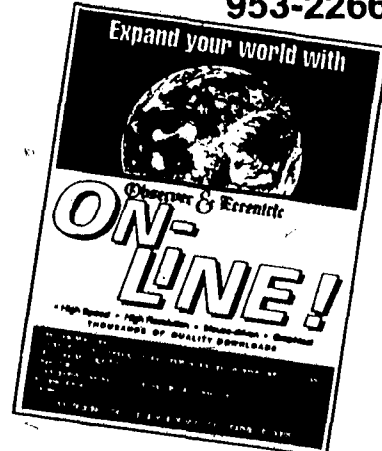

Lansing moves to subsidize art

The state's regulatory budget — with \$29 million for the arts — will become law despite many attempts to amend it in the House of Representatives.

The bill was passed 83 to 18 and sent to Gov. John Engler without major change from the Senate version.

It funds the Michigan Council for the Arts and Cultural Affairs, the Detroit Institute of Arts, Detroit Historical Museum, Detroit Zoo, Detroit Symphony Orchestra, Edison Institute at Greenfield Village and the Grand Rapids Public Museum.

"This complex bill was just presented Wednesday (one day earlier) at 4 p.m. I have not been able to study it," objected Rep. Penny Crissman, R-Rochester, who voted no.

Rep. Greg Kaza, R-Rochester, raised the philosophical question of "whether it is a legitimate function of Lansing to provide taxpayer subsidies for the arts."

Kaza quoted author Ernest Hemingway, sculptor Wheeler Williams painter Larry Rivers and novelist John Updike as opposing governmental interference in and support of their

arts. From the west side of the state, Rep. Harold Voorhees, R-Wyoming, opposed a state subsidy to regional facilities as lacking equity. "Regional facilities should be supported on a regional basis," said Voorhees, who lost an amendment to reduce Detroit area facilities and raise it for the Grand Rapids museum.

Rep. David Jaye, R-Utica, lost an amendment to withhold funds from the Detroit art institute, zoo and historical museum until the city lifts its ban on hiring suburban residents.

Here is how area lawmakers voted on final passage:

Yes — Republicans Lyn Bankes of Redford, Barbara Dobb of Union Lake, Jan Dolan of Farmington Hills, John Jamian of Bloomfield Township, Shirley Johnson of Royal Oak and Jerry Vorva of Plymouth; and Democrats Maxine Berman of Southfield, William Keith of Garden City and Richard Young of Dearborn Heights.

No — Republicans Crissman of Rochester, Kaza of Rochester Hills and Debora Whyman of Canton.

Blackwell's power cut deeply

Wayne County Commission Chairman Arthur Blackwell, D-Detroit, presented no opposition recently when a group of commissioners moved to strip him of a good deal of his power as chairman.

The changes approved in Rule 14 of the commission's Rules of Procedure make it very difficult for the chairman to favor friendly commissioners with committee chairmanships and increased office budgets.

Introduced by commissioner William O'Neil, D-Allen Park, the amendment to Rule 14 was supported technically by all 15 commissioners, who voted unanimously to adopt it Aug. 5.

But the main supporters were suburban

commissioners like Bryan Amann, D-Wayne, and Edward Boike, D-Taylor, who have often been denied committee chairmanships by Blackwell. The rebel commissioners have also questioned Blackwell's practice of granting larger office budgets to his favorites.

A prime example is commissioner George Cushingberry, D-Detroit, whose staff included 25 people in 1992 who were paid \$173,000.

Blackwell employed 19 staff members in 1992, paying them \$245,000.

By contrast, the staff of commissioner Kay Beard, D-Westland, comprised just two people in 1992 who were paid \$62,000. (Beard also represents Garden City.)

The new Rule 14 says that a majority of the commissioners must ratify the chairman's appointment of committee chairs. The rule also

requires majority approval of everyone's office budget and makes it very difficult for commissioners to overspend in their office budgets, or for the chairman to grant larger office budgets to selected commissioners.

Some commissioners have speculated that Blackwell went along with the changes to Rule 14 only because he's running for Detroit mayor this year and doesn't want the negative publicity O'Neil promised to deliver if anyone stood in his way.

"If this rule is not voted properly, you will hear an awful lot from me," O'Neil said last March. "I will be the most hated commissioner."

Also, Blackwell has reportedly told two commissioners that he plans to give up his chairmanship even if he isn't elected mayor.

Business index says area economy is improving

The Detroit Area Business Activity Index for June hit an all-time high of 166, 10 points above May's level and 14.6 percent above the year-earlier-June index number of 145.

Year-to-date through the first half of 1993, the Detroit area economy is running 10 percent higher than the same period in 1992. The previous high, 160, occurred in March of this

year.

"Seven of eight components in the business activity index rose between May and June, underscoring the general local economic improvements," said David L. Littmann, first vice president and senior economist of Comerica Bank.

"The fact that Michigan's motor vehicle

output through June is up 25 percent from one year ago emphasizes the greatest single source of momentum in 1993."

Since 1957 Comerica Bank has compiled the Detroit Area Business Activity Index monthly from eight measures of regional activity which are seasonally adjusted, corrected for inflation, and expressed as an index with 1982 as base year equal to 100.

Ed Kelly has Windsor start, Detroit finish

Proving the old adage that things can indeed come full circle, Ed Kelly considers himself at home.

A Windsor, Ont., native, Kelly has bounced around Canada and the United States, leading a charmed radio life. Armed with an arsenal of voices few can match and the ability to write airwave friendly comedy, Kelly now finds himself teamed with Ken Calvert for the morning shift at WLLZ-FM in Farmington Hills.

Given where he has ended up, it is ironic that the place where Kelly got his first radio break was also a place known as "Wheels" — a Windsor roller rink. Kelly had been working there as a disc jockey when CKWW, a small 500-watt station in town, happened to be doing a live remote broadcast. The program director spotted him and asked him if he was interested in working at the station.

Initially, the self-proclaimed "blue collar kid" chickened out at the opportunity, preferring a job at a local General Motors trim plant. But about a year later, he ran into the program director again — and this time decided to give it a go. His first shift, on a weekend at three in the morning, was not particularly memorable.

"It was like me and my Mom listening," Kelly said.

Continually passed over when more appealing shifts opened up, Kelly ended up doing the overnight show for three years. He then made a jump not normally made in radio — a job in Sarnia doing a morning show. There was no looking back.

After bouncing around some Canadian markets during the mid-'80s, Kelly was hired as a writer and performer by the American Comedy Network in New York City in 1988. ACN is the preeminent supplier of pre-produced radio comedy bits, parody songs and celebrity impressions in the country, feeding material to morning shows in more than 300 markets.

Thanks in part to fax machines, digital audio tape and overnight delivery services, Kelly is still employed by ACN as a principle performer, in addition to his current position at WLLZ. Therefore, morning commuters in cities all over the United States have the opportunity to enjoy Kelly's stalwart impressions of Eddie Murphy, Tom Brokaw, Regis Philbin, David Lee Roth and others.

Brought back to the Detroit/Windsor area from the Hartford market by CKLW-AM, Kelly admits that he was ready to try his hand at the talk format after seeing the successes of larger-than-life personalities like Howard Stern and Rush Limbaugh.

However, a contract snafu at CKLW suddenly gave Kelly the opportunity to look for a new position. His agent had possibilities in New York and Los Angeles — but Ken Calvert and WLLZ were also interested. Calvert made numerous one-on-one calls to Kelly to convince him, and chemistry began to develop.

"The key to success in this business is finding the right partner," Kelly said. "I am the gimmick. Some partners don't like to share that spotlight. Ken Calvert is what we in the business call a prime quarterback. He's able to draw the best out of other people.

"I've been on a quest for 12 years to find this guy, and he found me."

And so, Calvert and Kelly have become a team. Expectations at the station are high that the duo will raise WLLZ's sagging fortunes of late, which were brought about by a combination of factors — including bad publicity surround Calvert's January move to the morning slot and the exiting of long-time J.J. and the Morning Crew (Jim Johnson and George Baier).

Asking therapist to party could harm treatment



STREET SENSE

Voice mail message: Barbara, I have seen a therapist for two years and I like him very much. My 30th birthday party is in three months, and I want to invite him to it. My girlfriend says it's not right for me to do that. She says it will put him in an uncomfortable position for me to even ask him.

This whole thing is complicated by the fact that neither one of us is married, and he is around my age. But my girlfriend says that's not the problem. She says that even if we were both married, I should not ask him.

Can you tell me if there are rules regarding social interactions with one's therapist? Should I ask him to my birthday party? If both, or one of us were married, would your answer be different? How about presents, are those allowed?

Dear Caller, Many therapists confront the dilemmas posed by your questions. Psychologists are guided by the American Psychological Association's Ethics Code when deciding what they should do. The code says that a psychologist must be sensitive to the potential harmful effects on the client of another relationship besides the therapeutic one. In other words, if you ask your therapist, you put him on the spot. So, the answer is no, do not invite your therapist to your party. If one or both of you were married, the answer is still no. Presents are not allowed.

Let's look at the dilemma the therapist is in if you ask him to your party. If he says yes, there may be no way to prevent your relationship from becoming confused. You might

expect him to become your social friend. If he does, he is further breaking the rules, and if he does not, then how will you feel? Will you be angry, and will this negatively affect your therapy?

Because you may experience his refusal as rejection, you have put him in an uncomfortable position, even if he says no. Although, he does not deserve it, you may react with hurt and anger.

About presents, the answer is the same. If he accepts the present you may expect an unrealistic repayment, and if he doesn't accept it, we are back to you experiencing a narcissistic injury with an undesired reaction of hurt and anger toward him.

Although on the surface what you are contemplating seems innocent, it is not. It is a resistance to your treatment. What you should be doing in treatment is working hard to change yourself, not finding ways to manipulate the therapeutic structure.

Your girlfriend appears to be a sensible person. It sounds as if you asked her for advice, and then planned to ignore it. How will that make her feel?

Barbara, My mother has been depressed for many years. She is deathly afraid of medication, so that my father and I cannot make her see a doctor or any kind of a therapist. I am hoping that the letters of Aug. 9 and July 5 will convince her to seek help. I want to thank those callers for educating me and giving me a new approach to helping my mother.

Woo, Van Damme team up for fun

Call it a guilty pleasure, but "Hard Target," the new Jean-Claude Van Damme action film, has more firepower than any movie this summer. It's an appropriately mindless burst of adolescent energy where bad guys run with clothes aflame, heroes strike obscenely macho poses, and guns rarely require reloading.

Van Damme, in Dearborn last week to promote the Friday release, aptly calls it "a ballet of action, of guns, kicks and punches."

Remember "The Most Dangerous Game," the short story you probably read in high school about a crazed hunter who stalks human prey on a private island? It's here, updated to modern-day New Orleans, where sportsmen pay \$500,000 to track homeless men.

"It's like a drug isn't it, to bring a man down?" hisses the evil urban safari guide played by Lance Henriksen. "It's always been the privilege of the few to hunt the many."

The victims are usually Viet-

nam veterans without families. But when a young woman (Yancy Butler) shows up searching for her father and Van Damme offers to help, the high-stakes hunters want the meddlers out of the way.

For once, there's a plausible reason for the action star's French accent. He's a tough Cajun merchant marine named Chance, able to take on a half dozen thugs at once, which he does with ease in his first few minutes on screen.

What makes "Hard Target" so watchable is Hong Kong director John Woo, who has set the standard for over-the-top action in the movies. A household name among moviegoers internationally, Woo makes ample use of visual effects — slow motion, a constantly moving camera — and dissolves not only between scenes but also between the many shots within a scene.

Of the dozen or so films he's made, only "The Killer" (1989) has surfaced locally, and then only for a night at the Detroit

Film Theatre. "Bullet in the Head," Woo's 1990 epic about three friends' journey through the hell of Vietnam, played in Ann Arbor earlier this year.

The trip to America was partly orchestrated by executive producers Sam Raimi and Rob Tapert, formerly of Ferndale and now Hollywood hot shots. "Army of Darkness," the third in their trilogy of "Evil Dead" movies, replaced The Three Stooges with John Woo as their most predominant influence.

Woo returns the compliment here. In fact, you might think you're watching a Sam Raimi movie when the camera appears mounted to the spike of an arrow in flight. In the climax, Van Damme and the bad guys battle it out in a warehouse full of papier-mache Mardi Gras props.

While Woo often edits and directs his pictures, Raimi alumnus Bob Murawski takes editing credit for "Hard Target." Rumors have also circulated that Van Damme, outfitted with his own private editing suite, had a heavy hand in the final product.

"I start from low, low, low budget movies, you know from 'Kickboxer' and 'Bloodsport,'" he said. "It became a habit to be involved in everything just to have a decent career."

The MPAA rating folks also had their say, insisting on seven different cutting sessions (mostly for violence) before they'd grant "Hard Target" the R rating needed for wide release.

"The poor guy," Van Damme said. "John was very depressed. They cut so much of his movie."

The experience obviously hasn't soured Woo on Hollywood, where he now resides. While Van Damme would like to work with Woo again, he said that the director has a project in the works with Quentin Tarantino ("Reservoir Dogs") and is also taking meetings with Sylvester Stallone.

"If people like a band right away, then they're a pop artist and it's probably 12-year-olds who are freaking out over them. I think Soundgarden is a highly sophisticated band."

Smith is also "freaking out" over the chance to open for Neil Young for close to a month. Following that, the band will tour with Lenny Kravitz, beginning Sept. 14.

"Neil Young, Lenny Kravitz. What more can you ask for? I listened to that cat (Young) years ago and then when I moved to Los Angeles," he said.

Prior to these tours, Blind Melon opened for Guns 'N Roses and Ozzy Osbourne and headlined its own club tour. Smith

said he found that the club audiences could better relate to their folk-rock sound.

"I love clubs much better. We left a lot of people at Guns 'N Roses and Ozzy going, 'Huh?'" Smith said. "The people we meet, they're people we have a pre-nuptial pact with. They hear our music, and click with us. I could hang out all night with these people, spend the night with them and have a barbecue with them the next day."

But since his record has been certified gold and the video for the song "No Rain" was added to the MTV "Buzz Bin," Smith's having a hard time remembering who he meets.

"I used to remember everyone I

meet. (Now) I can't possibly remember everyone. That's a good feeling. It's definitely an interesting thing that's been ripping through my head."

He also finds it interesting that fans are just now catching on to Blind Melon.

"I think we were there but the public wasn't with us," Smith said. "I think if people will buy the record for 'No Rain' they're going to be pleasantly surprised. If they're not, then they aren't Melon fans. The big thing about our band is diversity."

Smith's musical diversity begins with his post-Blind Melon career aspiration — writing songs about letters for Sesame Street.

"I keep writing songs that

sound like 'Sesame Street' (theme)," said Smith as he interchangeably hummed "Sesame Street" and "No Rain."

"Like 'Little Rebel L.' They had this Billy Idol puppet. 'With the Rebel L.'" Smith sang in this bad English accent.

"By the time I'm 30, I hope I can have some kind of cool career so I can write songs about letters."

Savor the suburban coffee house experience

I don't like coffee. It's a vice I've always wanted, but never more so than recently. That's because I can't thoroughly experience the coffeehouses that are springing up in many of our communi-

ties — in Rochester and Plymouth, in Birmingham and Farmington, and two along restaurant row in West Bloomfield.

They have finally reached the mid-west from their Seattle roots — at least

this round in their history. I know, I know. They serve teas and chocolates, juices and exotic sodas, and even pop. But I feel I'm really missing something when I see people order cappuccino, flavored coffees or lattes — which come decaffeinated as well.

There they sit over their newspaper or book, casually sipping some exotic brew, or listening to a guest poet, or earnestly discussing the state of the universe with friends.

In that setting, a Diet Coke just doesn't do it.

Despite my discomfort, it's so nice to see people gather to talk and relax over coffee, rather than alcohol. In particular, it gives young people a chance to socialize without having to put up with the bar scene. And no TV screens flash sports scores from above.

Chris Everson of Birmingham, who's done some poetry readings in area coffeehouses, is impressed with the atmosphere. "The coffeehouse scene is much better. People in bars get pretty drunk and pretty weird. It's easier to meet people and talk to them."

"It's a neat thing," said Sandy Altman of West Bloomfield. "We're kind of catching up with the coast. It's nice

chitchat. Of course, history repeats itself. It took until the coffee bean reached Europe in the 1600s for coffeehouses to develop and become centers of literary and political discussion, which so worried King Charles II that he banned them as "seminars of sedition."

Before newspapers came along, people visited coffeehouses to learn the news of the day. Later, reporters found them a natural source of news and gossip.

Today, a lot of people associate coffeehouses with the '60s, when beatniks and hippies sipped espresso and listened to activists make their social comments in poetry and music.

So the question becomes, what is the function of the coffeehouse, particularly as it sits in our suburbs of today?

In an era characterized by sound bites, fast food, McNewspapers and a fast pace, maybe it's just a place to take some time out: to sip that cup of coffee, to read the Times or Journal, to have that in-depth discussion with friends, or to make a new acquaintance.

State Fair gets new look, new attractions for '93

Dick Allen knows he has a unique thing on his hands — the oldest state fair in the country, that has its roots firmly planted on urban ground.

And as general manager of the Michigan State Fair, he also knows he has the job of convincing people to come and see the cows, chickens and pigs in... an urban setting. But from the sounds of it, he's got at least one convert — Oakland County Executive L. Brooks Patterson.

"Hey, L. Brooks Patterson plans to cross Eight Mile Road for Oakland County Day at the fair," Allen said. "All Oakland County employees will be admitted free on the first Sunday (Aug. 29), and Brooks is looking for companies to provide the lunch."

Getting Patterson to cross the geographical division between Wayne and Oakland counties may not seem like much, but attracting residents of the county's more upscale communities is a major endeavor.

Allen, you see, is trying to boost fair attendance to what it was in its heyday of the 1960s. Back then, more than one million people would flock to the fairgrounds to see the animals, eat the food and be entertained. These days Allen hopes to reach half that

amount. "I'd love to see a half-million people," Allen said of the 1993 state fair, which opens Friday, Aug. 27 for a 10-day run. A good gate and corporate sponsors are just what the fair needs.

Helping out

Allen has the the sponsorships. Companies like Blue Cross-Blue Shield; Health Alliance Plan, Stroh's, Little Caesars Pizza, Builder's Square and Michigan Bell have provided more than \$600,000 for this year's state fair. Their support is bringing a lot of new and unusual sights and sounds to the fair.

Rest assured, the animals will still be a part of the fair, as will the carnival attractions, concession stands and entertainment. But there will be more '90s-ish things to capture fairgoers' attention.

For starters, there's the community art fence, sponsored by Pepsi, Vernor's, Builders Square and Mercury Paints. Artists from throughout the state are transforming the fairground's fence at its Woodward Avenue entrance into a half-mile-long work of art.

On the grounds, the biggest attention-getter will be the 20-foot-tall video wall that will serve up non-stop programming from com-

ing attractions at the fair to the latest and greatest video games to a cultural ethnic festival.

"We're trying to reach the MTV crowd," said Carol Marvin, the fair's director of marketing and public relations. "We're bringing out things at the fair that are of interest to everyone; we're bringing things that are traditional to fairs into the '90s."

At the Stroh's Sports Center, participants will have a chance to play three-on-three basketball and volleyball, hurl themselves at a Velcro wall, scale a giant climbing wall, try aumo wrestling or join in an aerobics class.

There also will be in-line skating demonstrations and team days featuring the Detroit Tigers, Red Wings, Rockers and Drive and activities for kids including a fantasy day, when they have a chance to actually play with their favorite players.

A bit of culture

To add a little education to the fair, Blue Cross-Blue Shield is sponsoring the "Miracle of Life" birthing center, where visitors can watch baby cows and pigs being born. There also will be exhibits on birds of prey and wetlands. In all, there will be 18 educational centers, focusing on science, art, music and other relevant sub-

jects, scattered throughout the fairgrounds.

The idea is to have school groups from throughout the metropolitan area tap into the educational aspect by visiting the state fair.

"We're trying to join agriculture with cultural," Marvin said.

The fair also will have three stages serving up entertainment for everyone. At the band shell, the lineup includes Ska Fest '93 with nationally known Bim Skala

Bim on Sept. 3, rhythm and blues diva Chaka Khan on Sept. 4, two of rap's youngest stars Kris Kross on Sept. 5, and country legend Lorrie Morgan on Sept. 6.

HAP is sponsoring Fair Jam '93 on the HAPpening Music Stage in the Coliseum Grove. Detroit's best bands and many genres of music — jazz, R&B, hip-hop, Motown — will be featured nightly. HAP also is bringing the best foot-stomping country bands to the fair to fill the Hot Country

Music Stage in the agricultural area.

And if you're looking for more than chicken, pigs and cows, you can be part of an old state fair tradition — marriage. Couples can tie the knot at the fair on Saturday, Sept. 4, in the Historic Park, sponsored by Consumers' Power. A minister will be on hand, much like the traveling ministers who would visit earlier fairs to perform wedding ceremonies.

House agrees to regulate, tax private trade schools

There were a few dissents as the state House of Representatives put the finishing touches on Sen. Michael Bouchard's bills to regulate proprietary schools.

"I oppose this bill because it includes a fee increase," said freshman Rep. Greg Kaza, R-Rochester Hills, in a speech he made frequently as the Legislature belatedly wrapped up its spring session.

The key bill won 66-to-32 support and was sent to Gov. John Engler. It will become law immediately when he signs it.

Other lawmakers objected to the bills as "an unwarranted extension of state power over legitimate, well-meaning, law-abiding, public-spirited people."

Proprietary schools are private trade and business schools. The bills provide for higher license fees to pay for greater inspection by the state Department of Education.

They also cover the procedure for tuition refunds if the school closes shop. State officials could arrange for "teachout" opportuni-

ties for students enrolled in schools that ceased operations.

"It's the few fly-by-night operators that spoil it for the large majority of proprietary schools, which do an outstanding job of providing skills for thousands of Michigan residents each year," said Bouchard, R-Birmingham, chair of the Senate Higher Education Committee.

The stronger effort to regulate proprietary schools began three years ago in the House when then-Rep. James Kosteva, D-Canton, chaired the House Colleges Committee.

Students complained that bad schools switched course offerings, didn't offer promised courses to complete a curriculum, hired unqualified teachers, and went out of business after taking their tuition money.

Many of the students were young mothers trying to get off welfare. Often they dropped out in

frustration, leaving the schools with their money and themselves untrained. The federal government had provided many of the training grants.

Legitimate school operators reluctantly agreed to license fee increases because the Department of Education lacked general-fund money to hire regulatory staff.

Voting yes on Senate Bill 661 were: Democrats William Keith of Garden City and Maxine Berman of Southfield; and Republicans Lyn Bankes of Redford, Barbara Dobb of Union Lake, Jan Dolan of Farmington Hills and John Jamian of Bloomfield Township.

Opposed were Penny Crissman of Rochester, Shirley Johnson of Royal Oak, Kaza of Rochester Hills, Jerry Vorva of Plymouth and Deborah Whyman of Canton.

Missing the vote were Democrats Justine Barns of Westland and Richard Young of Dearborn Heights.

Dinner's just a thaw away when you plan

OK, I'll be honest. Slaving over a hot stove boiling jars, blanching vegetables, simmering sauces and cooking jams is not my idea of how to spend a summer vacation. Not that I haven't tried all of the above and surely can appreciate the taste of summer in the middle of winter by walking down to the fruit cellar.

But canning has never been my forte. I can admit, however, to being a freezer junkie. Blueberries, frozen and thawed in February with just enough juice to make a cobbler perfection, literally send shivers of delight down my spine. Ditto for the fresh taste of shredded zucchini, garden fresh carrots, strawberries and luscious sweet breads.

There's something about the aroma of cinnamon from fresh zucchini-carrot bread as it warms slowly in the oven for a winter's breakfast treat.

My freezer has been a godsend. Not only does it house the fruits of my garden and summertime visits from the farmers' market, but it also offers me much-needed time savings. When I make lasagna, I always make an extra for the freezer. The same goes for meatballs. When I make bread, I could easily eat all five loaves, but when I freeze the extra three loaves, I simply having to heat them up to enjoy later.

Appetizers are stored in freezer bags, tightly sealed, just waiting to be plucked from the depths of my freezer when unexpected guests pop in on the Janes Gang. Family day trips are considerably less hassle, especially when I know that upon returning, a frozen batch of goulash will be waiting in the oven. It will be defrosted and with my oven's programmable temperature settings, piping hot and ready for dinner after a daylong trek to the zoo.

Freezer management

Last month's turkey I grilled and spent 20 minutes cutting into chunks for frozen leftovers is a two-hour defrost away from turning into this afternoon's turkey salad sandwich. The first rule for superior freezer management is to keep foods going in and coming out while keeping track of the flow.

The second rule is to make the freezer do part of your work. There are a few steps that I have found work best when stocking my freezer. I always begin with foods of top quality. The freezer does not improve the quality of the food; its function is to preserve the quality and the nutrients. Its value is to success in freezing foods depends a great deal upon proper packaging, wrapping and sealing of foods. In the dry zero degree temperature of the freezer, solidly frozen foods can lose moisture; they must be protected by wrapping and/or the use of containers that are moisture proof, vapor proof and airtight. Moreover, the wrappings must be tight, with no pockets of air trapped between the food and wrapping material. Air draws moisture from foods, resulting in freezer burn.

Storage containers

During a few of my cooking demonstrations, folks have a tendency to giggle when I mention that momma was a Tupperware lady. Personally, I disdain the use of foil and butchers wrap and have a tendency to rely on those burpable containers and plastic baggies that have a seal. Fill plastic bags and containers as full as possible when freezing, leaving necessary space for expansion. Use your hands or "burp" those containers to remove as much of the air as possible. Label packages clearly and carefully, specifying contents and date frozen.

When freezing more than a few packages, always spread out the items, allowing at least one inch between them for circulation of the cold air. Allow at least 12 hours for the food to freeze solidly before stacking and packing in the depths of the freezer. If you are lucky enough to have a freezer or have a refrigerator-freezer large enough to hold your freezer offerings, there are other jobs that a freezer can accomplish to make your life easier.

Defrosting

In her latest book "All New Hints From Heloise," (copyright 1990, \$9.95), Heloise suggests that when frost begins to form about 1/4 inch thick, it's time to defrost. It's easy to do even with a freezer full of food. Line a sink or washtub with damp newspapers, fill the sinks with the frozen food, topping with more newspapers and then cover with ice.

Heloise claims that cooling efficiency decreases the more frost that builds up and a simple washing using a baking soda wash (1/2 cup baking soda to a gallon warm water) keeps the freezer clean and fresh smelling. Speaking of baking soda, she also swears by the practice of using a box of soda in the freezer at all time (or using charcoal briquettes).

So keep cool this summer and let your freezer do its job; it's a lot cooler than slaving over the stove and you'll reap the benefits for months to come.

Freezer jams and jellies are the perfect way to savor homegrown fruits and veggies all winter. They're easy for beginners to make.

juicy tomatoes, and bunches of basil and parsley.

And don't forget fruit — raspberries, peaches and plums. You can't possibly eat them all, and most of us don't have time to can. So what's a weekend gardener to do?

Why not make some freezer jellies and jams to enjoy in the winter when you can't get fresh produce, or give as gifts?

Even if you're not a gardener, but someone who swears you can't beat the taste of homegrown fruits and vegetables, freezer jam is the perfect way savor those tasty memories all winter long. Produce markets and roadside stands are brimming with freshly picked fruits and vegetables. Now is the time to jam.

When you think of jams and jellies, don't just consider the familiar fruit versions.

Herb jelly variations with fresh basil, minced fresh parsley and grated lemon peel is the perfect accompaniment to meat and poultry. Use it as a glaze for pork roast or spread it on crackers and top with thinly sliced meat or mild cheese or an appetizer.

Salsa jam, made with ripe plum tomatoes, onions, cilantro, hot peppers and lime, adds zest

If you're a gardener, soon you'll be bringing neighbors, relatives, and co-workers gifts of vine-ripened,

to fajitas or quesadillas.

Freezer jams and jellies are easy enough for beginners to make. The ingredients are simple — crushed fruit or vegetables, sugar, water, and powdered pectin, a natural substance found in fruit that boosts the jelling process in jam-making.

"Freezer jam doesn't take all day to make," said Sandy Garcia of Farmington Hills. "It has a homemade flavor. I don't notice a difference in flavor and texture from cooked jams."

Like cooked jams, making freezer jam is a science. "The biggest mistake people make is they don't follow the directions," said Garcia.

"They don't boil it long enough so it doesn't thicken. They try to double the recipe, and you can't

You can't use sugar substitutes either. Use regular granulated sugar. Use glass or plastic containers with a good seal and sterilize jars in the dishwasher."

Lisa Van Riper, a spokeswoman for the Sure-Jell brand of fruit pectin, agrees. "Making jams and jellies is an exact science," she said. "Stick to the recipe and you won't have any problems. Don't substitute ingredients. Use the type of pectin the recipe calls for. Each brand of fruit pectin has a different formulation."

It's also important to use fully ripened fruits and vegetables that are thoroughly rinsed with clear water. Crush berries one cup at a time. A potato masher works best, said Van Riper. If you use a food processor, pulse to chop the fruit. Do not puree. The jam

should contain pieces of fruit.

You can substitute unsweetened frozen fruit for fresh fruit. Thaw the fruit to room temperature before crushing to equal the same amount of crushed fresh fruit. Do not drain off excess juice.

Keep in mind that a full rolling boil is a boil that does not stop when stirred. It is essential to get a full rolling boil for jam or jelly to set. Boil for the amount of time specified.

Sure-Jell Light is perfect for people who are counting calories and want to reduce the amount of sugar in the products they use. Van Riper said Sure-Jell light contains 1/4 less sugar than Sure-Jell and was formulated to meet

"I can't speak for the entire state, but I know that sales of St. Julian wines are up 10 percent this year," said owner Dave Braganini.

Annually, we've taken stock of the progress of Michigan's wine industry. It's healthy even after the disastrous 1992 growing season that could hardly be called summer.

"St. Julian's sales are booming outside Michigan in Illinois, Indiana and Nebraska," Braganini said. "For some producers up north, 1992 was a tough year because the crop never ripened, but our 1992 Riesling is the best we've made. The future continues to look bright. In 1993, we'll have a significant number of new plantings coming into production to bring our chardonnay close to 2,000 cases."

"People are buying our wines because they perceive value. In the \$5 range, we're as good as they get. Simply Red is our best seller at \$5."

In September, Great White will be introduced as a counterpart to Simply Red. It, too, will be \$5 and is a blend of chardonnay, vignoles and riesling.

While Braganini deservedly touts his 1992 Riesling (\$8.50), we're putting all red wine lovers on alert for the 1991 St. Julian Chambourcin (\$8.50). Both wines are hard to beat at this price.

From Traverse City, take M-37 (Center Road) 8.5 miles north on the Old Mission Peninsula to Seven Hills Road and turn left. Continue a half-mile and turn left on Bowers Harbor Road. The winery is on the left.

The Stegengas believe, as all vintners in that region do, that Old Mission Peninsula is a natural

vineyard haven. The winery is producing chardonnay, Riesling and a methode champenoise Brut sparkling wine. Most impressive of all Bowers Harbor bottlings is the 1991 Reserve Chardonnay (\$12.75). Vanilla oakiness harmonizes well with gentle fruit. If you like your chardonnay with defined oak impressions, you'll find it attractive.

Grower Bob Begin has teamed up with Mark Johnson, former Chateau Grand Traverse winemaker for 10 years, to open Chateau Chantal

(15900 Rue de Vin, Traverse City, (616) 223-4110) in July. The unusual, retreat-like development is a 65-acre site replete with winery, vineyards, orchards, bed and breakfast, residence and six private homesites. At the bed and breakfast, suites are \$115 and the Queen Room is \$85. A two-night minimum stay is required on weekends, June 15 to Oct. 30. From Traverse City, drive north 11 miles on M-37 and look for Chateau Chantal on the right. "While the estate offers one of the most unique settings in northern Michigan, our business is wine," Johnson said. "Chateau Chantal is a must-see, must-visit wine retreat."

Fenn Valley Vineyards, but the winery's tasting room is in an 1881 post and beam bank barn. There you can taste more than 20 varieties of sparkling, white, blush and red wines crafted by Moersch. It's hard for us to pick just one winner from among Moersch's offerings. They're all unusual. "With some of the wines, I only make a minuscule amount, he said. "It keeps me from getting bored. has introduced a new blended off-dry white dubbed Moira (\$7.80) after the Greek goddess of fate because as Mawby put it "it reflects the fate of the vintage." A red blend (also reflective of the fate of the 1992 vintage), and as yet unnamed, will be introduced in September. Brut Cuvee 5, Brut Cremant and Brut Rose (all \$15) continue to beat the socks off any sparkler in this price range. To leave a message on the Healds' voice mail — dial 953-2047, mailbox 1864.

ORANGE GLAZED FREEZER CARROTS

1 1/2 pounds carrots, peeled and cut into strips
2 teaspoons flour
1/4 cup brown sugar, firmly packed
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 tablespoon vinegar
1 tablespoon lemon juice
1/2 cup orange juice
1 tablespoon fresh grated orange peel
2 tablespoons butter

Blanch carrots in a boiling water for 5 minutes. Drain. Blend together the flour, sugar and salt. Add yi-

negar, juices and orange peel. Bring to a boil. Add butter. Cook 5 minutes. Pour over carrots in a 1 quart foil-lined pan; freeze. Remove from pan, wrap, label, date and store in the freezer. OATMEAL ZUCCHINI BREAD

2 cups sifted flour
3 teaspoons baking powder
1 teaspoon salt

3/4 cup sugar
1 cup rolled oats
2 eggs

1/4 cup vegetable oil
1 cup milk
2 cups shredded zucchini
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
1 cup chopped walnuts

Sift together the dry ingredients. Stir in the oats. Beat eggs, oil and milk. Add to dry ingredients and

 6 cups sugar
 3/4 cup water
 1 box Sure-Jell fruit pectin
 Mix water, basil, parsley and lemon peel in large bowl; cover. Let stand 15 minutes. Place 3 layers damp cheesecloth or jelly bag in another bowl. Pour herb infusion into cheesecloth. Just freeze fresh bounty

Making jams and jellies isn't the only way to save your surplus produce. You can simply freeze it without a lot of prep work.

For help on the best way to freeze foods, pick up the 32nd edition of the Ball "Blue Book."

According to the authors, freezing is a good way to preserve foods because freezing retains the flavor, natural color and nutritive qualities of most foods better than other methods.

Most vegetables should be blanched and then frozen. Some fruits can be frozen whole without sugar, while others should be stored either in a sugar pack or syrup pack — a mixture of water or juice, sugar, ascorbic acid and citric acid to prevent discoloration.

Nothing could be easier than freezing berries. Use this method for blueberries, cranberries, strawberries and raspberries. Wash thoroughly, drain, pat dry, and put on cookie sheet in the freezer.

When berries are frozen, dump them into a resealable plastic freezer bag. While you're doing this, imagine how delicious fresh blueberry muffins will taste on a cold Sunday morning in February.

Plums can also be frozen whole without sugar. Wash, halve and pit plums. Pack the washed and drained plums in a plastic freezer bag, attempting to fill all space, seal and freeze.

For the best-tasting frozen vegetables, process on the day they're picked or bought. Vegetables to be stored or frozen for more than four weeks, except green onions, hot peppers and herbs, should be scalded. This cleanses the vegetables of dirt and organisms, brightens the color, helps retain vitamins and reduces the action of enzymes that would destroy the fresh flavor after about four weeks. Scalding also shrinks vegetables, making packing easier.

Before scalding, wash, drain, sort and trim vegetables as you would if you were cooking them fresh.

Use 1 gallon of water per pound of vegetables. Put vegetables into a blancher (wire basket, coarse mesh bag or perforated metal container) and lower it into vigorously boiling water.

Begin counting the time as soon as the vegetable is placed in the boiling water. Keep the heat on high and stir water, or keep container covered during blanching.

Cool the vegetables by immersing in ice water when scalding is complete. Pouring hot vegetables into a cool colander that's placed in ice water helps the vegetables cool quickly. Package, label and place in freezer.

Consult the Ball "Blue Book" or a basic cookbook, such as a Betty Crocker book, for vegetable-blanching times and more information on freezing fruits.

Easy steps to lower food-poisoning risks

Every year between \$5 and \$17 billion are spent on medical costs and lost productivity as a result of food borne illnesses. Slaughter practices, limited inspections and food processing techniques can't be blamed for these high numbers. Blame some of this on us, the consumer.

One-third of food poisoning cases are caused by food prepared at home. We have the basic equipment in our kitchens to prevent most food borne illnesses; the stove, refrigerator and running water, but still forget the precautions.

Germs accumulate on your hands as you go from task to task. It is reported that most cases of diarrhea and vomiting are caused by inadequate handwashing. By not washing your hands thoroughly you can pass on a host of ailments to friends and family. These can range from the common cold to dysentery or hepatitis. The simplest way to avoid these infections is with a little soap and water. Just running water over your hands doesn't count as a washing.

Apply soap or detergent to your hands and rub vigorously for 10-20 seconds, then rinse. Germs tend to accumulate around cuticles, under fingernails and creases in your hands. It is critical to

wash your hands before handling or eating food; after handling raw food, especially meat; after a visit to the bathroom; after blowing your nose or sneezing or coughing into your hand; after handling garbage; after playing with a pet; after changing a diaper or after handling money. Make vigorous hand washing a habit to stay healthy.

Next step to food safety is to keep your refrigerator set below 40 degrees and the freezer at or below 0 degrees. Slip meat packages into another plastic bag or container prior to refrigeration. Juices from raw meat or poultry may leak from the original package and contaminate other foods or surfaces.

Ground meat tends to spoil faster than other cuts, so store ground beef, pork, lamb, turkey or poultry two days at the most. If you purchase jumbo-sized or family-sized packages of meat, make sure you follow the two day guideline from the refrigerator or freeze it or cook it all and then freeze it.

Store raw roasts and steaks in the refrigerator no longer than three to five days, raw chicken or turkey no longer than one to two days and leftover meats no longer than three or four days.

Never thaw foods, especially meat, at room temperature. The outside surface thaws before the inside, leaving the outside vulnerable to bacterial contamination and growth. Cook food frozen or thaw in the refrigerator.

Marinate meats and poultry

only in the refrigerator. Don't put cooked meat back into uncooked marinade or on a plate that previously held raw meat. If you do you're passing the bacteria back and forth. Don't trust your nose to pick up bacteria smell. Bacteria is odorless.

Never use utensils that have touched raw meat or poultry without a thorough washing. Everything that comes in contact with the raw meat should be washed immediately. Don't contaminate other foods or hands by re-using towels or sponges that have been used to clean up drippings from raw meat.

Wash your cutting board with hot soapy water or put it in the dishwasher. Occasionally wash it with a mild bleach solution and rinse with clean water. Cross contamination from raw to a cooked product is a common mistake that can be avoided with some thought.

Some foods can be eaten raw but meat and poultry aren't on that list. Steak tartare may be considered a delight to your taste buds; however, it could be dangerous to your health. Most health authorities discourage any consumption of raw meat.

Cook hamburger meat thoroughly. Hamburger meat is riskier than steaks or other cuts because of so much surface area. Cook until no pink shows in the center. Rare beef does carry some bacterial risk so, you make the choice. Cook meat to an internal temperature of at least 160 de-

grees. Red meat when done is brown or grey inside and the juices in poultry run clear.

Cooking meat perfectly means careful timing and temperature. A very high heat will harden the protein and make meat tough and dry. When grilling or broiling, the timing is extremely important.

Recent deaths and serious illnesses from fast food hamburger really underscore the importance of food safety at home and away. Heat destroys most bacteria so use good judgement when cooking meats and keep your work space and hands clear.

Proper food handling will help eliminate food borne illnesses. Who needs a headache or stomachache anyhow?

Grill seafood or vegetables for memorable appetizers

AP — Grilled appetizers provide the perfect opening for a summer meal. Among the possibilities: grilled tomatoes, oysters, pineapple boats, pizza and vegetable kebabs. For health reasons, always cook foods according to the recommended times, and never use the same utensils or platters for raw and cooked foods.

PATIO TOMATOES

- 6 medium tomatoes
- 6 slices bacon, diced
- ¼ cup chopped onions
- 1½ cups cooked rice
- 1 cup shredded Monterey Jack or Cheddar cheese (4 ounces)
- 2 tablespoons snipped fresh parsley or 2 teaspoons dried parsley flakes
- ¼ teaspoon salt
- ¼ teaspoon dried thyme, crushed
- ½ teaspoon pepper

Cut a thin slice off the stem end of tomatoes. Hollow out tomatoes, leaving a ¼-inch-thick shell. Reserve pulp for another use. Drain tomato shells upside down on paper towels. Set aside.

In a large skillet cook bacon until crisp. Drain bacon on paper towels, reserving 1 tablespoon of the bacon

drippings in skillet. Add onions to reserved drippings; cook until tender but not brown.

In a medium mixing bowl combine cooked rice, cheese, parsley, salt, thyme and pepper. Stir in bacon and onions.

Turn tomato shells right side up. Spoon about ½ cup of the rice mixture into each tomato. Place each filled tomato in the center of a 6-inch square of heavy foil. Fold up foil around each tomato, leaving top open.

Place tomatoes in foil in center of the cooking grill. Grill about 25 minutes or until heated through. Makes 6 servings.

OYSTERS ROCKEFELLER

- Rock salt
- 12 oysters in shells
- 1 teaspoon finely chopped green onion
- 1 small clove garlic, minced
- 2 tablespoons margarine or butter
- ½ cup fine dry bread crumbs
- 1 tablespoon snipped parsley
- ½ teaspoon dried tarragon, crushed
- Dash pepper

Line a 13- by 9-inch aluminum pan with rock salt to a depth of

about 1¼ inch. Dampen the salt with water. Place pan on the cooking grill to heat.

Thoroughly wash oysters. Open shells with an oyster knife or other blunt-tipped knife. Remove oysters and dry. Discard flat top shells. Wash each oyster in a bottom shell.

In a small saucepan cook onion and garlic in margarine over medium heat about 1 minute. Remove from heat. Stir in bread crumbs, parsley, tarragon and pepper. Sprinkle crumb mixture over oysters in shells.

Carefully arrange oyster shells in rock salt. Grill 5 to 8 minutes or until edges of oysters begin to curl and crumbs are lightly toasted. Makes 12 servings.

RUM PINEAPPLE BOATS

- 1 pineapple
- ½ cup margarine or butter
- ¼ cup packed brown sugar
- 3 tablespoons rum
- ½ teaspoon ground cinnamon
- ½ teaspoon ground cloves
- ½ teaspoon ground nutmeg

Use a sharp knife to quarter the fresh pineapple lengthwise. (Do not remove crown.) Remove hard core from pineapple quarters. Loosen

pineapple flesh from shell. Cut the flesh of each quarter into ¼-inch-thick slices.

In a small saucepan melt margarine. Stir in brown sugar, rum, cinnamon and cloves.

Wrap pineapple crowns in heavy foil to prevent burning. Place pineapple, shell side down, in center of the cooking grill. Grill about 15 minutes or until pineapple is heated through, basting every 5 minutes with the rum mixture. Just before serving, remove foil from crowns. Sprinkle each serving with nutmeg. Makes 4 servings.

APPETIZER PIZZAS

- 1 tablespoon olive oil
- 1 clove garlic, minced
- 10-ounce package refrigerated pizza dough
- 8-ounce can pizza sauce
- 4 ounces Canadian-style bacon or thinly sliced salami, cut into pieces
- ½ cup sliced mushrooms or chopped sweet red or green pepper

- ¼ cup sliced green onions
- 1 cup shredded mozzarella or Monterey Jack cheese (4 ounces)
- ¼ teaspoon dried oregano, crushed

Combine olive oil and garlic; set aside. Cut roll of refrigerated dough into quarters. Place each quarter into a 5¼- to 6-inch circle. Brush both sides of circles with the oil mixture.

Place dough circles in center of the cooking grill. Grill 6 minutes. Transfer circles, grilled side up, to a piece of heavy foil. Spread each with some of the pizza sauce. Top with bacon, mushrooms and green onions. Sprinkle with cheese and oregano.

Return pizzas on the foil to the cooking grill. Grill 7 to 9 minutes more or until cheese melts and bottoms are light brown. Cut each pizza into quarters. Makes 16 servings.

SQUASH AND PEPPER KEBABS

- 1 small green pepper, cut into 1-inch pieces

- 1 small sweet red pepper, cut into 1-inch pieces
- 1 small zucchini, sliced ½-inch thick
- 1 small yellow squash, cut into 1-inch pieces
- ½ cup bottled clear Italian salad dressing

Place all vegetables in a plastic bag set into a shallow dish. Pour Italian dressing over vegetables. Close bag. Marinate at room temperature 30 to 60 minutes, turning bag occasionally to distribute marinade.

Drain vegetables, reserving dressing. On four 12-inch skewers alternately thread green pepper, red pepper, zucchini and yellow squash, leaving space between pieces.

Place kebabs on the cooking grill. Grill 10 to 12 minutes or until vegetables are tender, turning once halfway through grilling time and brushing occasionally with reserved dressing. Makes 4 servings.

Malls are alert to any gang activity

Police warnings about the growth and development of metro-area youth gangs have mall security officers and local police forces on their toes.

However, youth officer Gregory Winn of the Livonia Police Department said the "big problem" the experts predicted hasn't materialized.

Still, to keep abreast of this new, highly sensitive mall security issue, local affiliates of the International Council of Shopping Centers will attend a workshop on gangs in the malls next month.

"As we watched the gangs move their activities from southwest Detroit to the downriver communities, we went on alert," Winn said. "Redford, Westland, Garden City and Livonia police officials came together to discuss the issue. We want to be prepared, not caught off guard. It's strictly a fringes problem right now. The big gang takeover of our local kids never developed."

Winn suggested that gang stories in the media give these groups the notoriety they seek, and only serve to bolster gang membership.

But Sgt. Dale Hawkes of the Westland Police Department was a little more cautious. Although he insisted that Westland Mall and other shopping areas in the city are absolutely safe, he warned everyone to keep their guard up and cooperate to control youth gangs.

"They are out there"

"They are out there. You see it in

their graffiti, which they use to mark their territories — much like dogs," he said. He went on to say that youth groups have left this graffiti all over Westland schools, some malls and abandoned buildings, resulting in thousands of dollars in property damage.

"We can't allow these gangs to become organized, so through strict enforcement of no-smoking, loitering or trespassing laws we harass their leaders, moving them along, until the gangs are forced to dissolve," he said. "We've asked any mall, business or neighborhood coming in contact with these groups to report their names and activities to police so we can monitor their activity through the computer files we've started."

Winn said gang graffiti — the first sign that gang activity has invaded a community — was reported in several communities in January and February. This prompted the police departments to hold seminars with mall security officials to advise and educate them about a possible summer problem, but the problem has been minimal.

"We're staying on top of the issue with the help of the police department," said Donna McQuaid, director of security at Livonia Mall. "We have evidence of gang members being in the mall from time to time because we've been taught to recognize their colors, their trademarks like beads or handkerchiefs. When we noticed mall graffiti on our exterior walls we photographed it, sent the photos to po-

lice, then removed it. But we haven't had any altercations or fights.

"We found out that one store employee was a member of a gang, but she's since left the mall. We enforce our banning practice with its strict guidelines to keep any troublemakers out of the shopping center."

Teens welcome

At the Westland and Wonderland Malls, security has been beefed up, with plainclothes and uniformed po-

Wonderland Mall, prepared a statement about the issue.

"All shopping centers have become a natural community gathering place for today's youth," he said. "Wonderland Mall is no exception, but we are not aware of any problems associated with organized gangs or graffiti that is a common gang trademark."

"The security staff at all our properties is trained to recognize gang colors, beads, tattoos, and other identifiable insignias. We work closely with

lice officers on regular patrol. There are always uniformed officers at Wonderland Mall on the weekends, according to Winn.

Mall security officers walk a thin line when approaching young shoppers suspected of mischief.

"They have a right to be in the mall, and we welcome teenage shoppers," McQuaid said. "However, larger groups that may be intimidating to shoppers are asked to disperse. If they cause trouble they are ordered to stay out for a day. Most of our young shoppers are not a problem. They are here to see a movie, buy new clothes or have lunch with friends. We just want kids to know we're staying on top of their activities."

Jim Lamphear, vice president and director of property management at

the Livonia Police Department on a pro-active basis in dealing with issues that all regional shopping centers encounter in today's society."

Malls spend thousands of dollars on video surveillance, security personnel and alarm systems to protect their merchants, merchandise and shoppers. Any "incident" could cost revenue. Summer is a busy time for security officers, Hawkes said, because school is out and kids have more free time to fill.

However, Winn said gang activity breeds in the schools where the groups are organized, not in local restaurants and malls — although members can be recruited there. Kids join gangs for protection and "to belong to

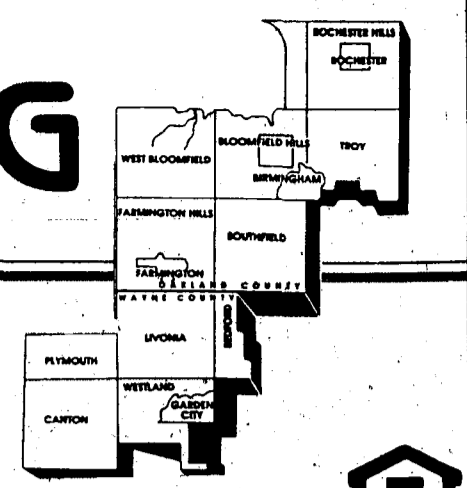

6-foot-10."

"So we recruited some women from the community to represent the image of the mall for an entire year," Kah said. "These women participate in fashion-related events as models and hostesses, and join workshops designed to enhance the potential of each member. They receive tips on grooming, makeup and hairstyling. They receive runway modeling training and enjoy motiva-

tional seminars."

Women of past guilds have spun off into Glad Rags Productions, producing their own shows with ex-guild members, Kah said. Friendships continue at brunches, barbecues and guild reunions.

Women interested in joining the 1993-94 guild have until Sunday to submit a brief biography and non-returnable color photo to the Twelve Oaks Mall manage-

ment office. Forty women over the age of 21 will be selected by a special committee after personal interviews the following week.

At Laurel Park Place in Livonia, Fashion Group members (also known as Fashion Panelists) will be recruited in February. Members act as informal models for mall-sponsored shows. They serve as greeters during promotions. They act as hostesses during special events, handing out

gifts and store directories.

"We've had a Fashion Group for four years now," said Mike Buescher, director of marketing at Laurel Park Place. "Our members range in age from 16 to 60. From the mall's standpoint, it's great because we get real people from the community to support the center's activities and wear the center's fashions. In return, members get valuable experience, personal image consultations and

modeling lessons. Many of the women have made good friends through the group and certainly plenty of new friends."

The Fairlane Town Center is considering a Fashion Guild in September. Vicki Howard of Tah-Dah! Productions in Berkley coordinates a few of these mall panels.

"The purpose is really self-enhancement for each member," Howard said. "I want each member, no matter what age, to gain

new insights, experiences and satisfactions. I've had women tell me that it's a dream of a lifetime to get the chance to be a runway model after years as a housewife, teacher or grandmother. They get a taste of the business. A few have even gone back to school to become cosmetologists or learn how to dress fashion shows."

Howard, a model for more than 20 years, says she now wants to be a "guardian angel."

something." Assaults often result from initiations, when someone wants to leave a gang, or when someone targeted for membership won't join.

Gangs sometimes turn to criminal activity to support themselves via drug sales or street robberies. Initiation rites for both male and female gangs can include sexual or criminal acts. In many instances, members are armed.

Letter to parents

Starting September, Westland police will warn parents of suspected gang members about the activities of their children through a form letter. Parents will be instructed to look for the tell-tale signs of gang affiliation: the

wearing of specific colors, tattoos or beads.

Gangs recruit members as young as 11 and up to people in their 20s, according to Hawkes.

"These kids are typically the losers," Hawkes said. "They feel powerless against other kids with more talents and abilities. Gang membership gives them a sense of power, identity, brotherhood and security."

Wonderland's Lamphear concluded that "the young customer is a very important segment of our consumer demographic. We encourage teen shoppers and it is unfortunate how isolated incidents in the metropolitan area tend to tarnish the image of all teenagers."

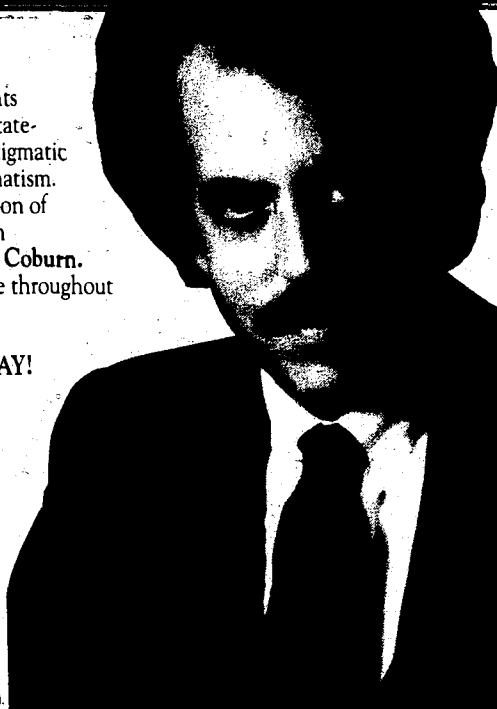

Skating through

Beaufait makes Olympic cut despite ankle injury

When Mark Beaufait was a youngster, a poster of the 1980 gold medal U.S. Olympic hockey team adorned a wall in his bedroom.

"He dreamed about it all the time," recalled his father, Robert. "He always said he'd love to do that."

Despite getting a late start at the U.S. Olympic trials (Aug. 3-15 in Cromwell, Conn.) because of an ankle injury, the Livonia native is one step closer to reality.

The 5-foot-10, 173-pound center, who helped lead Northern Michigan University to the 1991 NCAA title, is a member of the 25-man U.S. squad, which flies today to Europe to play in a series of exhibition games during a three-week stretch in Germany and Finland.

"It's a big thrill," said Beaufait, a

graduate of Stevenson High. "These people really treat you well. I'm ready for Europe. I worked out hard this summer, lifting and skating, so I should be in good shape."

(Beaufait spent time working out at NMU with Detroit Red Wings Jim Hiller and Dallas Drake. The trio also played a lot of softball.)

Beaufait missed a week of training camp because of the ankle (injured while jogging in Marquette), but must have made a favorable impression despite a short stint on head coach Tim Taylor (of Yale) and the selection committee.

"The first game I didn't play too well," Beaufait said. "It was tough being off, but I really didn't think about it. I just went out and tried to do the best job I could."

The next day, Beaufait notched a goal and one assist. He was one of

three Michigan players to make the squad; the others were Brian Rolston of Lake Superior and Jim Storm of Michigan Tech. (Redford's Patrick Neaton, a defenseman from Michigan, played well but did not make the cut.)

"I'm not sure what role I'll play," said Beaufait, who is known for his defensive abilities as well as scoring. "If they want me to kill penalties, I'll do that. Right now I just have to play my game."

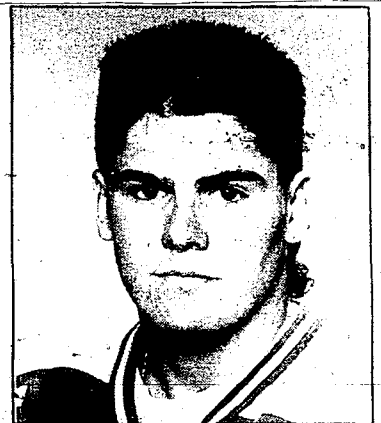
Beaufait spent the past season playing for Kansas City, the San Jose Sharks' top farm club, in the International Hockey League.

He was voted the IHL's top American rookie and was an All-Star. He also spent the final few games with San Jose (getting his first NHL goal) before going back to KC for the IHL playoffs.

Beaufait is currently under contract with San Jose.

After returning from Europe, Beaufait must report to the Sharks' training camp beginning Sept. 9 in San Francisco.

"The Sharks are pretty well set on

If the Sharks don't bite this fall, Beaufait may ultimately wind up next February in Lillehammer, Norway, for the 1994 Winter Olympic Games.

Elezovic confident he belongs at U-M

It's Pete Elezovic's last shot, so the Redford Catholic Central High product won't be holding back when it comes to kicking the football during his final season as a Michigan Wolverine.

Elezovic, who started his career in 1989 as a walk-on, is now a scholarship player trying to hold onto the No. 1 job as placekicker.

He welcomes challenges from holdovers Erik Lovell and Remy Hamilton, along with highly touted freshman Nate DeLong, the latter who could also make a bid for the starting punting job against incumbent Chris Stapleton.

Competition doesn't hurt

"I had some field goals last year that I should have made," admitted Elezovic, who hit seven of 12 a year ago. "I think it helped me to kick in the big games. And with the competition this year, it puts more pressure

on me, but that's what I like.

"They (the coaches) are going to wait to see if I improve. They want to see what I'm made of. I'd rather have it that way."

A closer look at the 1992 statistics shows that Elezovic's first full season as kicker was far from a disaster.

He made 52 of 55 PATs, three shy of a Michigan record. He also had a field goal in Michigan's 17-17 tie with Notre Dame and opened the Rose Bowl against Washington with a career-long 41-yarder.

His last-second 39-yard boot earned Michigan a 22-22 tie with Illinois, which clinched a second straight Big Ten championship. And if that wasn't enough, Elezovic recovered a fumble in a victory over Oklahoma State. He also ranked third on the team in total points (73) behind Tyrone Wheatley and Derrick Alexander.

Not all went well

But others point to his extra-point misses against Ohio State (a 13-13 tie) and Illinois as negatives, along with another major downfall — short kickoffs.

"The kickoffs, I've worked on that this summer," said the Farmington Hills native. "But even more important than that is consistency. I feel I have the ability to make it, but I need to be more consistent. That's the thing I need to improve upon each

Albion's Montico armed for repeat

No one could relate to a life as the bulls-eye better than Albion College quarterback Mike Montico.

He's been it since he became the Britons' starter as a freshman. It wasn't so easy. As the Detroit Country Day graduate recalled: "I still remember in my first league game as a freshman fumbling my first snap. I think coach (Pete) Schmidt has a lot more confidence in me now."

Sure Schmidt does. He should. As Montico enters his senior year, he's started every game in his career. He was the Michigan Intercollegiate Athletic Association's MVP last year, has led the conference in passing efficiency and has tossed a school-record 40 touchdown passes (in 28 games) in his career.

But most importantly, he has guided Albion to three-straight MIAA titles. His return, combined with the return of 18 other starters from last year's 8-1 squad, made choosing the pre-season favorite at Thursday's media day in Alma a no-brainer.

The coaches picked Hope College to finish second, followed by Adrian, Olivet, Kalamazoo and Alma.

Sure, the pressure is on at Al-

bion. But Montico can live with it — by now, he's used to it.

Besides, goals remain. There's still the matter of the NCAA III championship.

Albion has made the playoffs once in Montico's tenure, losing to then-defending NCAA III champ Allegheny (Meadville, Pa.) 24-21 in 1991. This year, the Britons are ranked anywhere from 10th to 17th in major national publications.

"I think everybody should be shooting for a national championship," reasoned Montico, who completed 122 of 202 passes (60.4 percent) for 1,613 yards and 14 touchdowns, with nine interceptions, last season.

Doesn't that sound overconfident? What about the league season? Replied Montico: "Well, we aren't going to get a shot at a national title if we don't win the MIAA. And coach Schmidt takes a real good perspective. He keeps us focused on one game at a time."

Despite the overwhelming factors favoring Albion, winning the MIAA and reaching the NCAA III playoffs won't be easy. The Brits

and every day."
