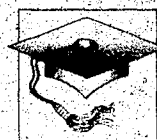
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Panel urges student shuffle



Wayne-Westland ninth graders will be shifted from four junior highs to two senior highs if school officials heed a task force recommendation. The administration admitted that many parents will be upset with any decision made by the school board.

Wayne-Westland will shift to a middle school plan and attendance boundaries will be redrawn across the district — if officials follow the rec-

ommendations of a 49-member task force.

The twofold changes — among the most sweeping in the district's history — would be implemented at the earliest in the 1995-96 school year.

But school officials already are conceding that the proposals will stir strong emotions among parents and students — especially when politically unpopular decisions are made that could force some children to switch schools.

"No matter what decisions are made . . . this room will be jammed with hundreds of people who will not be happy," Superintendent Larry Thomas said Wednesday during a school board study session at district offices on Marquette near Carlson.

In a major shift:

■ Ninth-graders would attend the district's two high schools, instead of the four junior highs.

■ Students in grades six, seven and eight would be placed in middle schools, shaving one grade level from the elementaries.

■ Children in kindergarten through fifth grade would remain in the elementaries, and some schools could be closed and consolidated due to

Teen remains free

Charged in the shooting death of his Westland friend, a Washtenaw County boy remains in his father's custody after pleading no contest to manslaughter.

Danny Haas, 15, apparently won't be placed in a juvenile facility for accidentally killing Robert MacMain, also 15, with a .50-caliber black-powder rifle, Westland police said.

The two boys hadn't argued but had been horsing around when Haas — believing the gun was unloaded —

aimed it at MacMain and shot him in the face on Easter Sunday, police said.

The afternoon killing occurred at MacMain's home in the 8200 block of Fremont, near Middlebelt and Ann Arbor Trail. At the time, MacMain was a freshman at Franklin High School, which serves the northeast section of Westland.

MacMain and his father, Bill, often went hunting together, and the boy was killed by a homemade rifle that the two built together, the father said.

On Wednesday, a Washtenaw County juvenile judge ruled that Haas could remain in his father's custody. The boy could have been placed in juvenile facilities until age 19.

Following Haas' no contest plea to manslaughter, a felony firearms charge was dropped. But Haas has been ordered not to possess any weapons.

Haas had remained in his father's custody pending the outcome of the case.

MacMain's death shocked neighbors in the usually quiet neighborhood in northeast Westland.

MacMain had been talking on the telephone and was resting on his brother's bed when Haas, visiting the neighborhood where he formerly lived, walked into the room.

"They were goofing off," Westland Detective Sgt. Russell Nowaczek said at the time.

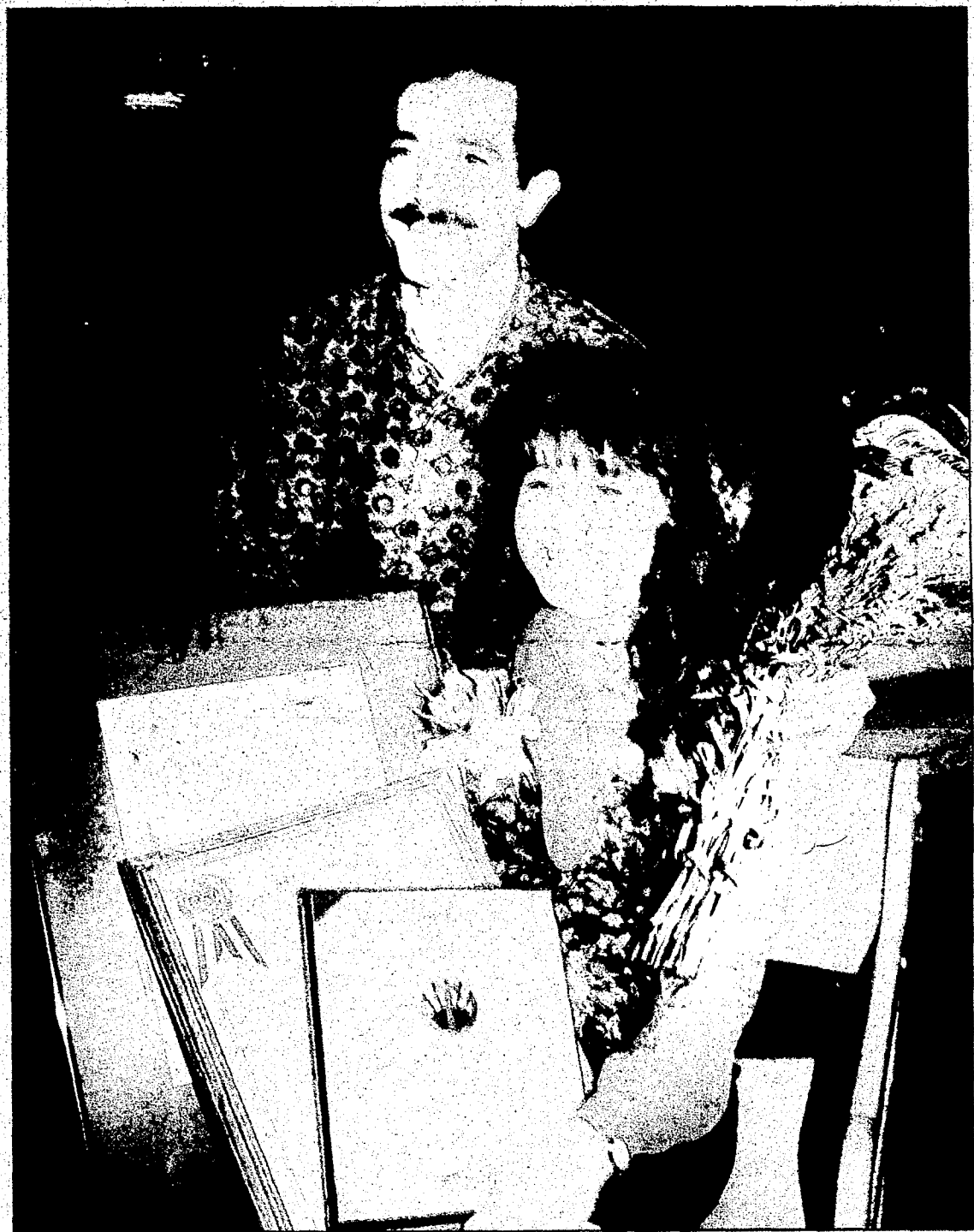
But then a shot rang out and MacMain's 19-year-old brother, William, ran into the bedroom and saw the boy wounded and bleeding. The older brother phoned 911, but Robert MacMain was dead when rescue workers arrived.

Neither drugs nor alcohol was involved, police said.

The killing ended MacMain's dream of joining the U.S. Air Force after high school. He also had talked about becoming a state police officer.

Man pleads guilty to assault

Attempted murder charges have been reduced for an Inkster man accused of trying to kill his Westland girlfriend by choking her and threatening to throw her from a second-story window of her home.

Darryl Denard Jackson, who attacked his girlfriend while in a drug-

induced rage, has pleaded guilty to aggravated assault and has been ordered to receive inpatient treatment for drug problems.

Jackson, 32, could have faced life in prison if convicted on an original charge of assault with intent to murder. Court testimony has indicated he attacked the woman as she feared for her life and the safety of her three

children, ages 20 months to 7 years.

But Jackson has accepted a prosecutor's offer to plead guilty to aggravated assault. Two charges of breaking into his girlfriend's house have been dropped.

Jackson has been placed on probation for two years, ordered to receive

Study shows fewer empty commercial buildings

There are fewer vacancies in Westland's strip malls, which makes the Westland city administration happy.

The number of vacant units is substantially lower since a survey by the economic development department was initiated three years ago.

The survey, released last week, showed that the number of retail units in strip malls has been slashed, although the rate of vacant retail square footage has remained about the same.

Mayor Robert Thomas and Scott Veldhuis, economic development director, were clearly pleased at the survey results. Thomas, in campaigning for his

first term four years ago, opposed any new retail strip malls because of the numerous vacancies in existing malls.

"There were no new strip malls built in the past four years and if I had my way, there would be none in the next four years," said Thomas, who was re-elected to a second term Nov. 2 by a 2-1 margin.

Thomas and Veldhuis pointed out that the current survey, done in October, has more detailed information than the previous three. The new one breaks down the city into four sections, showing the percentage of vacancies in each section based on square footage and retail units.

The survey shows a continuing pattern that there are more va-

cancies in the southern half of the city when compared to the northern half.

But Thomas noted that the strip mall on the northeast corner of Wayne Road and Glenwood is now 100 percent full. It was opened several years ago following demolition of the vacant Washington Elementary School.

The two administrators were also pleased that vacancies were down even with the closing of the 60,000-square foot Crowley's store in Wildwood Plaza last summer.

"Slow and steady improvements in the national and regional economies and lower local unemployment rates may be having a positive effect to reduce the number of commercial vacancies

in Westland," they said in a statement.

Veldhuis added that the local jobless rates have gone from 6.5 percent in 1990 to 7.9 percent in 1991, to 5.9 percent last year and 4 percent this year.

Added to the survey this fall, he said, is a computerized and detailed list of all local strip malls which is available to real estate brokers, developers and the public.

The number of vacant units in strip malls ranged from 21.6 percent three years ago to the current 12.3 percent.

Looking at the vacant square-footage, the vacancy rate fluctuated from 10.4 percent in 1990 to 11.9 last year and back to 10.4 percent this fall.

In analyzing the drop of vacant units, Thomas and Veldhuis said in their statement that "it appears that many of the available smaller units located in the older parts of the community are being leased."

In breaking down the survey's details, Veldhuis said the north-central section of the city has its unit vacancy rate cut to 11 percent from 16 percent, although the vacant square footage went up to 12 percent from 9 percent.

That was caused, he said, because of the Crowley's closing.

In the northwest section, the vacancy rate of units was slashed to 10 percent from 18 percent the previous year with the square footage vacancy rate being about the same.

In the northeastern section, the square footage-vacancy rate was cut nearly in half — to 4.9 percent from 8.7 percent — while the unit vacancy going down to 7.8 percent from 13.3 percent.

In the southern half of the city, there were similar changes. The square footage-vacancy rate went down to 13.4 percent from 23.1 percent. Looking at unit vacancies, the rate was cut to 18.7 percent from 26.7 percent.

Thomas said the administration is "bending over backwards" to help businesses move into vacant units while discouraging new strip malls.

He hopes to see another drop in vacancies when next fall's survey is completed.

He earned A's and B's at school and had many friends, his father told the Observer after the death. The boy also worked on cars as a hobby.

MacMain knew a lot about guns because his father, a former Minnesota police officer, used to take him hunting, the father has said. But the father said gun safety was always stressed.

The black-powder rifle used in MacMain's death was usually unloaded. But the father said his son may have loaded it because

he feared a neighbor who, according to the father, had made death threats against the boy.

After his son's death, Bill MacMain also found a large knife under his pillow, one under his bed and a set of tire irons nearby.

inpatient drug treatment and warned to have no contact with his girlfriend unless she consents, said Emily Wolfe, assistant Wayne County prosecutor.

Prosecutors consulted with the victim before offering Jackson the plea agreement, and the woman indicated that her primary concern was for Jackson to overcome his drug habit, Wolfe said.

"She did not want to prohibit him from having a job and being able to work," the prosecutor said Friday. She did not say whether Jackson has a job.

Jackson's plea came on Nov. 5 before Detroit Recorder's Court Judge Leonard Townsend. The decision averted his trial on a charge of trying to kill the victim.

Under his probation terms, Jackson could be forced to spend two years in prison if he violates any of Townsend's orders, Wolfe said. Even after his release from a drug-treatment center, Jackson has been ordered to continue treatment on an outpatient basis.

house near Venoy and Palmer in Westland and attacking her while he was in a drug-induced rage, according to earlier testimony in Westland 18th District Court.

The woman testified that Jackson attacked her in her Ottawa Street home and continued to beat her even after she tried to defend herself by stabbing his right hand with a kitchen knife.

In tears, she testified that Jackson choked her, broke out an upstairs window and threatened to throw her through it, and then dragged her down the stairs of her home while he had his hands

around her neck.

The attack came after the woman tried to stop Jackson from taking money that her son had saved and was keeping in his room, she testified.

During the assault, the woman told one of her sons to run next door for help. Westland police came to the Ottawa Street house and arrested Jackson on the scene.

smaller enrollments.

Simultaneously, new attendance boundaries would be drawn across the 16,500-pupil district, though officials have vowed to maintain as much as possible the concept of neighborhood schools.

In suggesting boundary changes, the task force of educators has called for balanced enrollments among schools. Some buildings have seen an influx of students because of new housing spurts, while others have suffered declining enrollment.

The panel also has urged efforts to achieve a racial and ethnic balance among schools as new attendance boundaries are drawn.

"We know that is a concern, especially at our high schools, at this point," said Greg Baracy, assistant superintendent for general education.

School officials say the middle school concept — under study for a year — will better serve students age 10 to 14 who often have special difficulties making the transition from late childhood to adolescence.

Differences cited

"The curriculum is designed to accommodate the developmental stages of students during this time of intellectual, emotional, physical and social development," the task force wrote in a 52-page report.

Middle schools differ from junior highs in numerous ways — some of which were cited Wednesday.

Two examples:

■ Middle school class schedules

are more flexible than the rigid six-period junior high day, allowing for more creative approaches such as team-teaching.

■ In middle schools, time would be set aside each day for teacher advisors to meet with small groups of students, providing more personal attention than the children receive in junior highs.

If approved, the plan will demand extensive efforts to develop a middle school curriculum, said Charlotte Sherman, executive director of secondary education. Teachers also would have to be prepared for new ways of performing their jobs, officials said.

Wayne-Westland has lagged behind most Wayne County districts in moving to a middle school plan. Of 34 districts, only five have failed to make the transition — Wayne-Westland, Harper Woods, Lincoln Park, Riverview and Westwood, the task force report said.

Similar statistics hold true in Oakland and Macomb counties, the panel has learned.

The panel has spent a year on the middle school study, and educators concede that many specifics still need to be worked out. The transition could begin as early as 1995-96, but could take three

to five years to fully implement the plan, Sherman said.

Cost unclear

Among the major issues remaining: How much would the proposal cost? Would the money be available?

The Thomas administration has asked the school board for a vote of confidence to keep the plan rolling. The board is expected to consider a vote during a session scheduled for 7 p.m. Nov. 23, a Tuesday.

Board members appear receptive — even enthusiastic — about the potential for improving the district's educational structure, though budgetary concerns remain at the forefront.

"I want you to move ahead, personally, but I don't want to say to you in six months that we can't do it because we ain't got the money," board president Francis "Bud" Winter said.

Because the issues are complex, the task force recommended that the plan not be implemented any sooner than 1995-96. That would give officials time to redraw attendance boundaries and prepare for a middle school curriculum, among other duties.

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What's in store?

Students get real-life retail experience at school

In Franklin High School's mini-mall, sophomore Josh Miller keeps track of sales, senior Demir Lico sets up displays, and sophomore Stephanie Patterson mans a cash register.

In the same store — called the Franklin Square Mall — senior Mike Steczek sells candy, senior Brian Howes logs the day's sales into the computer and senior Shari Dickson, as mall manager, pays the bills.

The mini-mall is a popular spot where students descend on their lunch hour to buy candy, sweat shirts and even small gifts.

Hone sales skills

But the mall, in the center of the school, is also the place where students hone their sales techniques and learn how to operate a business.

In running the three stores in the mall from September to June, the students eventually work in every slot, from sales to maintenance to purchasing to stock clerk.

"The kids make the decisions about what to buy," said Diane Burk, who teaches the class in general merchandising. "The kids price it. If they buy a dog they have to learn how to deal with it, mark it down and get rid of it."

The mall is run by the 24 students enrolled in Burk's class, most of whom one day hope to take their place in the business world.

Each year, the mall begins anew, with a new group of students. At the end of the year, the students take everything down in the three stores and pack it away, to be used again by next year's students.

"Every year, we get better," Burk said. "Five years ago, when we first started, things were sparse. But money has been reinvested in the business. Now it has a look of quality and that look generates sales."

Rain or shine, winter or spring, the one moneymaker the merchandising students can count on every day is the Candy Connection. Here, students pop in for favorites such as Sweet Tarts and Wrigley's Gum.

"Most of our money comes in here," said senior Wayne Miers. "We have a \$500 candy order once a week."

Because it's still early in the year, the walls of the Candy Connection have yet to be decorated by this year's students. In the months ahead, the small room will be spruced up so that by the time the school year ends, the store will look as appealing as any candy store on Main Street.

Patriot popular

Next door, in the Kite and Key Clothing store, student buyers linger a little longer to look over the stock of hats, shorts, sweat shirts, T-shirts and pants that are arranged on shelves and wall displays. Ninety percent of the clothing bears the Franklin logo; the rest, the names of Michigan universities.

For his work assignment this

day, senior Grey Maple mans the cash register.

A quarterback on Franklin's football team, the Patriots, Maple hopes to mix both football and business in his college years.

"I've learned that a lot of stuff goes into making a sale instead of just a person buying something," Maple said. "It's a team effort, like football. One person can't do it all."

Last in the mini-mall is the Looking Glass, a store which specializes in small gift items needed for special occasions. Sold here are stuffed animals, picture frames and holiday gift items.

"There's not a lot of traffic now," said junior Jackie Derexson, standing behind the counter.

As mall operations manager, senior Katina Esse stands beside her, checking in on how the Looking Glass is doing on this day.

"This is fun; it's like playing grown-up," Esse said. "This is what it's like in the real world."

Analyzing sales

The class relies on Brian Howes' expertise on the computer to track the day's sales. In an instant, Howes can see how this day's sales compare to sales for the same day last year. Students

thus know if they're doing better or worse than their counterparts last year.

The class mixes one hour of business theory with one hour of actual work in the mini-mall.

The mall has its own tax license and its own line of credit through a bank.

Before ordering items from vendors to sell in the stores, the students learn to ask the important questions: Who will buy this? How much will they be willing to spend? What's the best time to sell this? How should it be displayed?

"It's not just a matter of buying something; the students have to consider how it will be merchandised," Burk said.

Shari Dickson serves as mall manager because she took the class last year and has gone on to a more advanced class this year. It's Dickson's job to keep the ledger, write checks and pass sales money on to the school bookkeeper for deposit in the bank.

These days, best sellers in the mall are "anything baggy."

"Baggy is in," Burk said. "But will this trend stay? How much longer should they be buying larger sizes? Part of the business is

knowing when the market is saturated. We can be too early or too late in a fad."

Burk recalled the fiasco former merchandising students endured when they bought 48 cardigan sweaters with the Franklin logo. The sweaters hit Franklin's store

months before they become popular.

"They sat there for a year and a half," Burk said. "They had to mark them down below cost. Finally, when they got to \$10, the sweaters started selling in stores, and we had them. Teachers in the

English and social studies departments came down and bought them for Spirit Week. Then the kitchen staff came. We sold 12 in one day. Then kids started wearing them. With each sale, the kids said, 'cha-ching.'"

"In sales, timing is everything."

Romney says she wants to 'save the nation'

At a luncheon on Veterans Day, former WXYT radio talk show host Ronna Romney told the Kiwanis Club of Colonial Plymouth it's time to step out from behind the microphone and take the people's message to Washington with her run for U.S. Senate.

Before introducing former U.S. Rep. Carl Pursell, also a candidate for U.S. Senate, Kiwanian master of ceremonies Buzz Bozell joked that "Carl has agreed to a very brief debate with Ronna. It will be on Larry King next week."

The tenor of the afternoon turned serious as the Republican National Committeewoman spoke about the national debt, crime, health care and career politicians at the Round Table Club.

Saying her campaign needs to raise \$1 million for the primary and \$6 or \$7 million for the general election, Romney said, "This is a difficult job to pursue, but a very important job to have because we really do need change in the way this nation operates."

"We've seen the largest tax increase in the nation under this administration. And you can call the proposed health care plan anything you want, but it's another tax increase. It's very, very wrong. I will fight against it tooth and nail. Hopefully I will get to Washington soon enough to save the nation."

Romney, 50, said the nation is almost bankrupt, and that "we can't fix what's wrong by using the same players. The defense department got \$28 billion more than they asked for. Thomas Jefferson believed the nation should be run by private citizens. I will run for Senate for two terms and then I'll come home. I believe in term limits."

Romney, formerly married to George Scott Romney and the mother of five, said she's learned from the "town meetings" she's had on radio that "people from Flint to Toledo are scared. They want to know where our nation is going. Our leaders don't seem to get it. In order to communicate,

you have to listen."

For too long, politicians have represented special interests and their own interests, she said; once elected, they never want to leave. "That's what's destroying us," she said.

Romney, who earned a bachelor's degree in education from Michigan State University in 1967, said we need to get tough on crime.

She quoted Gen. Norman Schwarzkopf who said, "Washington, D.C., is the only place in the nation where you can drive 10 miles in a straight line and never leave the scene of the crime. People want three things: security, opportunity and prosperity. If business isn't healthy, no one is healthy."

Romney opposes the North American Free Trade Agreement. "It's kind of like the Holy Roman Empire, which wasn't holy, nor Roman. NAFTA isn't pro-American and it won't bring free trade. I believe we need free trade in a world economy, but this has so many flaws that I'd like to see it go back to the drawing board. We need to take some more time with it."

Romney said she favors a balanced budget, the line-item veto and campaign reform.

Pursell said after the luncheon, "A balanced budget takes two-thirds of the House and Senate. It's an impossible dream. You have to talk about how to do it."

Among those in the ever-growing field of candidates, Romney said Macomb County Prosecutor Carl Marlinga would be the toughest Democratic challenger to beat.

Romney, of Bloomfield Hills, has worked as a CNN & Company commentator and as a political analyst for WXYT. She is the co-author of "Momentum: Women in American Politics Now" and "Giving Time a Chance."

Romney was employed as a teacher from 1969-70 at Hartwell School in Lincoln, Mass.

Drunk-driving patrols in peril

Members of Wayne County MADD are mad because county Executive Edward McNamara has proposed to eliminate the sheriff's drunken-driving patrol.

For the 1994 budget, McNamara has proposed to wipe out the four-man "OUIL" squad, a budget item worth \$312,000. Squad members patrol in the evening and early morning hours in search of drivers operating under the influence of liquor all over the county, but mostly in Hines Park.

In 1992 the squad made 564 drunken-driving arrests. This year officers have arrested more than 400 so far.

A spokeswoman for the McNamara administration said the budget item is still under consideration.

Sheriff Robert Ficano opposes McNamara's proposal. "It sends the wrong message to cut police officers off the street," he said.

Members of the Wayne County chapter of Mothers Against Drunken Driving are trying to convince everyone that the OUIL squad should be spared. On Friday, MADD representatives met

with county commissioners Thaddeus McCotter, R-Livonia; Michelle Plawecki, D-Dearborn Heights; state Rep. Jerry Vorva, R-Plymouth; and Livonia Councilwoman Laura Toy.

McCotter also represents Plymouth and Plymouth Township. Plawecki also represents Redford Township. Vorva also represents Plymouth Township and the western half of Livonia.

The idea was to convince the officials that the OUIL squad should be continued.

"We're in it for lives," said MADD first vice president Carole Ravicchio. "We're not in it for any kind of games."

The officials agreed that the OUIL squad is a good thing to have, but taxpayers might not be able to afford it.

"I can't come in and say we're going to find the money," McCotter said. "I would like to see this program continue, but I don't know if it's going to be easy or if it's going to be done. The sheriff has been in a constant battle with (McNamara)."

Plawecki noted that much of the county spending is for services the state and federal govern-

ments require the county to provide. It's illegal to cut those services, so officials must find savings elsewhere when revenue shrinks. The OUIL squad is a candidate for death because it's not a mandated program.

Besides, Plawecki said, "(McNamara) cut a lot of departments to the bone this year," so there's not a lot left to cut.

Vorva, who used to be a Plymouth police officer, said that even if every police officer in a given department was assigned to work full time arresting drunken drivers, there would still be drunken drivers on the road.

"There are people out there; you could stick a Breathalyzer in their face anytime of the day or night and they'd still blow a drunk," Vorva said.

These people, Vorva said, are "functioning addicts" who can often drive in a relatively safe manner even though they're legally drunk.

McCotter told the MADD people that "we will try to help the best we can," but he would make no additional promises.

Airport gets fifth runway

Wayne County opened a second crosswind runway on Nov. 11 at Metro Airport. The addition of the second runway is expected to significantly reduce flight delays caused by bad wind conditions.

The \$90 million, 8,500-foot runway is part of an ongoing expansion and modernization of Metro that includes a new tower (complete), new fire station (complete), maintenance buildings

(complete), parking deck (under construction), terminal (not begun) and fourth parallel runway (not begun).

Metro operates on three major parallel runways more than 95 percent of the time, with aircraft traffic flowing either north or south, depending on wind conditions. About 5 percent of the time it's necessary to land planes east to west when strong west winds

blow. Now with a second crosswind runway, the airport can move planes in and out twice as fast as it used to when the west winds blow.

The runway is 150 feet wide and 17 inches thick, built with 236,000 tons of asphalt and 318,000 square yards of cement. The primary contractor was Ajax Paving of Madison Heights.



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
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

Bill would force disclosure of secret suit settlements

Local governments would no longer be able to hide lawsuit settlements — but businesses could — under a bill before the state House of Representatives.

Recommended by the House Judiciary Committee last week, the bill declares that any secret settlement "is against public policy and is void."

The bill by Rep. Michael Griffin, D-Jackson, is aimed against the practice of governmental units paying off plaintiffs, requiring that the payment be kept secret, and asking the circuit court to seal the records.

The government then hides the payment by including it in a lump sum payment to its attorney. The attorney writes the plaintiff a check — not a public record — under Michigan's Freedom of Information Act.

■ The bill would stop governmental units that pay off plaintiffs, then require that the payment be kept secret.

The bill applies to counties, cities, villages, townships, special authorities, public universities, community colleges, special assessment districts and all other boards created by either state law or municipal charter.

Griffin introduced the bill two years ago after public outcry when the Jackson County Board of Commissioners made a secret settlement with two prisoners who had been beaten up in the jail.

Rep. David Gubow, D-Hunt-

ington Woods, sought to expand the bill to all parties, including businesses. With 10 votes needed in committee, Republicans rejected Gubow's amendment, five yes to six no with one abstention and six absent.

The issue was brought to light nationally in December 1991 by Texas attorney Bob Gibbins in the American Bar Association Journal.

"In 'Secrecy versus Safety,' Gibbins argued that companies like Upjohn, Dow Corning, McNeillab Inc. and Cessna Aircraft not only hid their payouts from stockholders, but the gag orders prohibited public release of product safety information. Even scientific journals were prohibited from discussing adverse effects of painkilling medicines, Gibbins said.

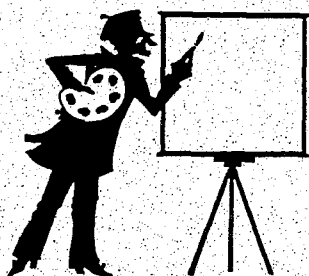
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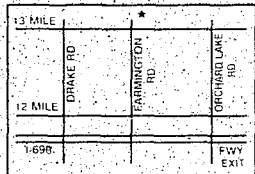
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Whyman's first bill seeks to curb food stamp fraud

State Rep. Deborah Whyman's bill to put the clamps on food stamp fraud has been signed into law by Gov. John Engler.

"It's Public Act 230. I remember that number because that was nap time in my earlier life," said Whyman, R-Canton, a freshman lawmaker.

Her bill sailed quickly through both chambers of the Legislature with no significant opposition. It already is illegal to buy federal

food stamps from recipients. The new law:

- Lowers the threshold for felony trafficking in food stamps from \$1,000 to \$250.

- Establishes second offense and repeat offender sanctions for both misdemeanor and felony convictions.

- Allows prosecutors to use a 12-month "aggregate" period in

which offenses may accumulate to be considered a felony.

An estimated 5 to 10 percent of some \$850 million in food stamps distributed by the state are diverted into the illegal market, Engler said.

The law "protects food stamp recipients from con artists preying on them, and makes the tax-funded, federal food stamp program more accountable to taxpayers," he said.

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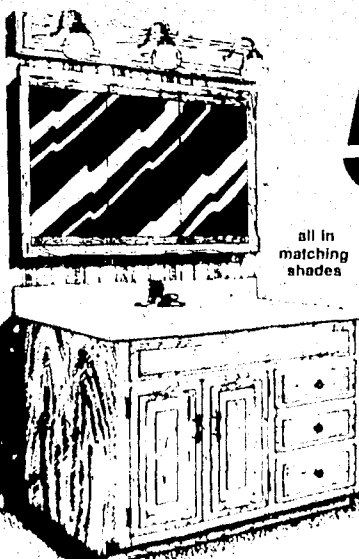
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Professor outlines case

College vents racial grudge, he says

A Schoolcraft College economics professor has filed a complaint with the Michigan Civil Rights Commission claiming that college officials are discriminating against him based on his age, 63, and ethnic origin, Indian.

"Because of my national origin, I belong to an ethnic minority group without any political clout or influence. Even the faculty union leadership, which is supposed to protect me, has aligned with the administration. I am the weakest link in the chain and therefore an easy victim," wrote Prantosh Nag in a long statement delivered to the Observer.

College President Richard McDowell declined to comment on Nag's case because there are grievances pending, plus the recent Civil Rights Commission complaint.

Conway Jeffress, the vice president for instruction, would only say, "Our attorneys have advised us that we should not comment on the case because there may be pending litigation."

But Nag will talk extensively. Schoolcraft employee believes officials are conspiring to fire him because he's an Indian in his 60s.

According to Nag's written statement, his trouble began in 1990, when an assistant dean supervising the instructors who

teach courses on television questioned his teaching practices because several students had complained about tests and homework.

Nag said he is a tough instructor and the students who complained were getting poor grades. Eventually, Nag said he was forbidden from teaching TV courses, so he filed his first grievance.

Nag said he asked to see the written complaints from students but never has been shown the complaints.

After a heart attack in January 1991, Nag said, his dean tried to steer him into a research position

that would keep him out of the classroom. Nag said a college official told him that the dean and the vice president for instruction didn't want him to return to the classroom because he would cause "a disruption."

In the fall 1992 semester, Nag said he was permitted to teach a TV economics class again. At semester's end he was again removed from the ranks of the TV instructors, allegedly for not following the guidelines for TV instructors. A second grievance was filed, but is still pending because, Nag said, the administration and union are stalling.

A third grievance was filed last April when one of Nag's classes was singled out, he said, for administrative audit and student evaluation. "I believe they want to punish me by raising the question about my teaching abilities because of my age and national origin," Nag wrote.

In an Observer interview last Wednesday, Nag said the Schoolcraft administration is "looking for some excuse to fire me."

Nag, a Northville resident, holds a bachelor's degree from Calcutta University. He has a master's degree and doctorate from the University of Minnesota. He has also taken classes at Wayne State University. Before coming to Schoolcraft, he taught economics at Bay de Noc Community College in Escanaba.

Nag believes the Schoolcraft teachers union "has become an extension of the administration, an agent of the administration."

Then why doesn't the rank and file overthrow the union leadership? "Nobody else is interested to step in and take that responsibility."

Why would the union turn against Nag? "I am expendable."

Although Schoolcraft officials are reticent regarding Nag's case, an official at another local college agreed to speak anonymously on the subject of academic discrimination in general.

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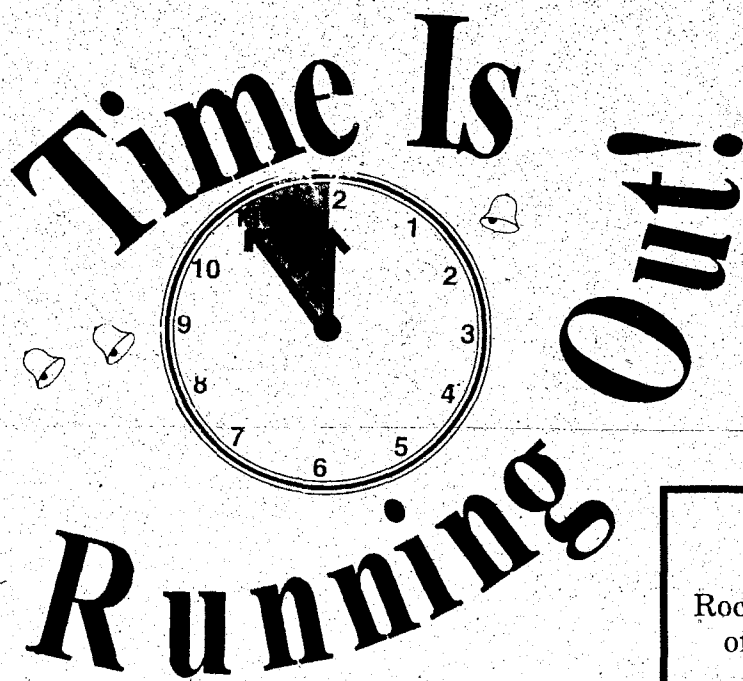

History lesson

The past comes alive in stories from individuals

Some big stories never make the history books.

Last spring I wrote about the 1927 school explosion in Bath, a village 10 miles north of Lansing. Andrew Kehoe, a school board trustee, dynamited the school and his own farm buildings, killing 45 people, including himself, the superintendent and three dozen children. I noted how several history books either failed to mention the enormous disaster or kissed it off in half a sentence.

Next day Howard Walker called and left a message. The 93-year-old retiree had visited the site, and would I like to see his 1927 snapshots? Yes, indeed. And was I interested in his view of the train wreck near Plymouth that was the worst in Michigan history? Yes, again.

Walker lives in Plymouth. During that fateful week in 1927 — the same

week Charles Lindbergh flew solo across the Atlantic — he had been teaching in Lake Odessa, not far west of Bath, and drove to the disaster site. He snapped pictures of the bombed consolidated school and the tiny graves decorated with flowers. The photos, still crystal clear, make you choke up.

Perhaps memories of the Bath explosion are so horrifying that historians, like village residents, go into denial. Townsfolk have a simple memorial but to this day are touchy about discussing the tragedy, I hear. Kehoe's wife was buried under her maiden name. "The maniac" himself was buried in an unmarked grave in the pauper's corner of a different cemetery.

Walker was 6 when the state's biggest train wreck occurred not far from his boyhood home. The current issue of Michigan History magazine, devoted entirely to our railroad heritage, con-

tains a two-page spread of photos on the wreck in Salem Township, just west of Plymouth. Says writer Tiffany Dzurman:

"Michigan's worst train wreck occurred near Salem on 20 July 1907. The crew of a westbound local freight ignored an order giving them 'the right of way over everything but first class passenger trains.' They forgot about a

running eastbound special Pere Marquette passenger and proceeded on the tracks. The resulting collision killed 31 people and seriously injured 100 others."

Walker was raised on a farm near Gotfredson Road and M-14 freeway in Salem Township and walked with his father to the site. "It was a head-on crash. One engine was on its side. Cars were on top of each other. There was a pile of (victims') shoes," he recalled.

The passengers were bound to Detroit's Belle Isle from Ionia. "A lot were from Howell," Walker said.

I checked indexes of two authoritative histories of Michigan. Guess what. Nothing about that wreck. Lots of material about railroad safety problems and workers' compensation, but nothing about any of the disasters.

So who is this gracious gentleman with the nearly perfect memory who

had viewed the aftermath of two of Michigan's worst human disasters?

The farm boy often visited Plymouth and recalled the John Gale store. Later Watkins went to Ypsilanti State Normal School, now Eastern Michigan University, and took the Lake Odessa job for a year.

He spent most of his adult years in the Five Points area of old Redford in northwest Detroit and taught drafting, English, social studies and math in the Detroit public schools. A daughter, Donna Grater, was recently widowed. Walker told some great yarns about how teachers dealt with discipline problems in the schools, but that's beyond the scope of today's column.

I guess the moral is that history is more than political events and social movements. There are thousands of individuals' stories. It's valuable that we have the Howard Walkers to refresh our memories.

Europe shows political, monetary unions don't work

Despite the drumbeat for NAFTA, a troubling question remains as to what NAFTA proponents plan next if Congress passes NAFTA.

If, as is the case in Europe, eventual political or monetary union among the NAFTA countries is the eventual goal, we must debate the impact that would have on our sovereignty and our society before Congress votes on NAFTA.

Europe provides a stark example of how a free trade agreement will likely evolve into monetary and eventual political union, a truly borderless continent.

In 1957, six European countries, among them France and West Germany, formed the Common Market to reduce and later eliminate tariffs among its members — much like NAFTA would for the U.S., Canada and Mexico. The Common Market evolved into the 12-member European Economic Community. The EEC permitted worker access to jobs throughout the com-

munity and later began to control currency valuation through the European Monetary System.

With economies battered by high German interest rates, Britain and Italy this past summer withdrew from the monetary system. Britain, especially, fears closer monetary union in Europe will drastically limit its options in dealing with structural unemployment and stagnant growth. Since Denmark rejected the Maastricht treaty that would create a common European currency, debate has raged in Europe over the wisdom of joining the disparate cultures and histories of the western European nations into a monetary and political union.

Europe has drawn the picture of where a trade union like NAFTA will eventually lead. What differs the European experience from our own will be that, unlike Europe, the U.S. and Canada will be joining into a trade union with an undeveloped economy, Mexico, having weak social and physical infrastructures, while the EEC formed with

nations having comparably advanced economies. Because there have not been any comparable unions in history from which to make a judgment, no one can accurately predict what impact an ECC-type union will have on any of the NAFTA nations' economies.

If the plan is to meld Mexico eventually into the U.S. and Canada like the nations of the EEC plan, we must debate the impact of the union before it

happens or run the risk of seriously undermining the U.S. economy. It is not fear nor attacks on opponents that should drive the NAFTA debate. Rather, there must be a full, open debate on where NAFTA is to lead us and how we can best adapt to the changes in our economy that NAFTA and what comes after NAFTA will bring.

If, on the other hand, political or monetary union is not a long-range objective, there is little question the only beneficiaries of NAFTA are large multinational businesses. No small business or individual could invest any substantial sums of money in Mexico because NAFTA does not include a private dispute resolution mechanism. A company facing legal problems in Mexico would have to write off its loss or risk dealing with the vagaries of Mexican law and its court system.

At a conference on NAFTA sponsored by the University of New Mexico held in Santa Fe Oct. 29-30, 1993, Mexican lawyers warned that even arbitration, the preferred method of dispute-

resolution in international business transactions, has significant drawbacks when it comes to dealing with Mexican courts against a Mexican business refusing to pay an arbitration award against it.

Large businesses, though, have the leverage to prevent any substantial investment loss by the threat of moving out of Mexico if confronted with expropriation, theft or other losses. With no national industrial policy to promote and nurture U.S. businesses, wage earners lose with NAFTA because there are no assurances their jobs might not eventually go to Mexico.

NAFTA cannot help but accelerate the pace at which wages will seek their lowest level, moving jobs that millions of Americans have counted on to the lowest wage NAFTA country, Mexico.

As jobs go south, our standard of living might go that way as well.

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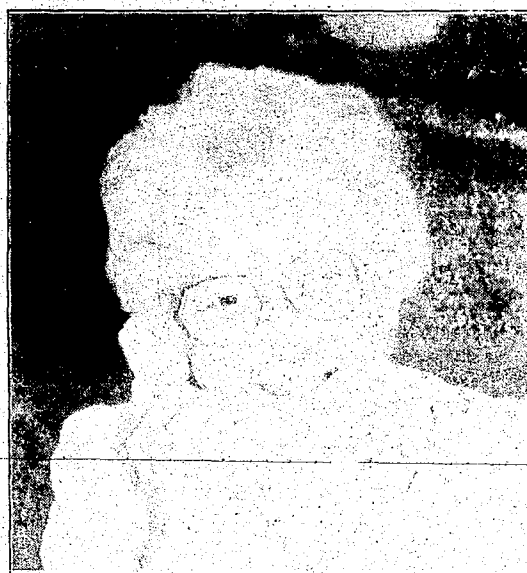
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Study says older women choose to be home alone

More than 67 percent of the elderly widows in the United States lived alone in 1980, whereas only about 12 percent did so in 1910, according to a University of Michigan researcher who is studying the reasons for this dramatic change.

"Older women may be living alone as much because they want to as because they have to," said Ellen A. Kramarow, a sociologist at the U-M Population Studies Center.

For her study, Kramarow used U.S. Census data to compare two groups of women: those who were 65 or older in 1910 and those of the same ages in 1980. She analyzed various factors, including

income, number of children, home ownership and age, that are likely to be related to living alone.

"I assumed that if you have enough money, own your own home, and are not yet physically frail and extremely old, you're more likely to live alone," said Kramarow. "If you have several adult children, however, you may be more likely to live with them."

What Kramarow found, however, was that the increase in the proportion of older women living

alone could not be accounted for based solely on these factors.

"It's not simply that women today have fewer children or more money in the form of pensions, social security or savings," she said. "There also seems to be a change in residential preferences."

A post-doctoral fellow supported by the National Institute on Aging, Kramarow cautions that since none of the women were interviewed, conclusions about their

reasons for living alone are speculative. Still, she noted that the rise in a preference for independent living among today's elderly women has many possible causes.

"Many of the forces at work may be no different from the forces leading young people to move away from the homes of their parents," she said of the study, presented this summer at the meeting of the American Sociological Association. "Like young women, many older women

today seem to place a high value on privacy and independence."

While how most elderly Americans in 1910 felt about their living arrangements is unknown, it is known that most elderly widows with surviving children did live with at least one child, in contrast to today, where the majority live alone, Kramarow said.

"Changing expectations on the part of children and their aging parents about the nature of intergenerational obligations to each

other may be partly responsible for this change," she added. "So may the increase in the number of middle-aged women working outside the home. Sharing a home with an adult child may not make sense if no one is home all day then is busy doing chores and errands half the evening."

In any event, Kramarow's findings counter the stereotype that living alone is a fall-back position that no older woman would choose.

Anyone over the age of 16 is welcome to volunteer. Volunteers are asked to work at least two hours a week for at least a year. Call 559-9209.

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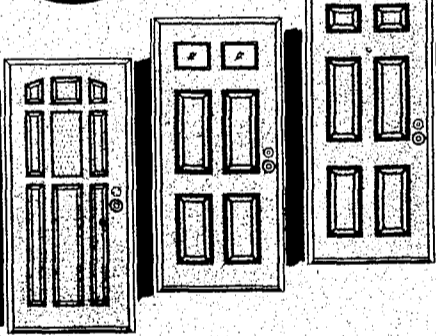
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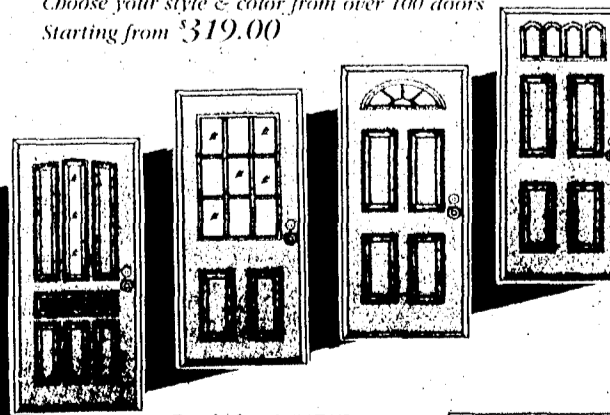
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ROLL CALL REPORT

Levin, Ford back biological survey

Here's how *Observer & Eccentric-area members of Congress* were recorded on major roll call votes in the week ending Oct. 29

HOUSE

Biological Survey: By a vote of 255 for and 165 against, the House sent the Senate a bill (HR 1845) to establish a National Biological Survey at a fiscal 1994 cost of \$171.5 million. The Interior Department bureau will consolidate biological sciences operations now scattered throughout the department.

In part, it will inventory the nation's animal and plant species and habitat, with the government obtaining written consent from owners before entering private property. Data from the exhaustive survey would guide policies in areas such as preserving wetlands and protecting endangered species.

A yes vote was to pass the bill. **Area representatives voting yes were: Dale Kildee, D-Flint, Sander Levin, D-Southfield, William Ford, D-Ypsilanti. Voting no: Bob Carr, D-Pontiac and Joseph Knollenberg, R-Birmingham.**

Lumbee Indians: By a vote of 228 for and 184 against, the

House sent the Senate a bill (HR 334) granting federal recognition to the 40,000-member Lumbee Tribe of Cheraw Indians of North Carolina. This would qualify the tribe for Bureau of Indian Affairs and the Indian Health Service benefits at an estimated cost of \$80 million to \$100 million annually.

While North Carolina has recognized the Lumbees as an Indian tribe since 1855, the Department of the Interior has never given federal certification.

A yes vote was to pass the bill. **Area representatives voting yes were: Bob Carr, Dale Kildee, Sander Levin and William Ford. Voting no: Joseph Knollenberg.**

D.C. Budget: By a vote of 225 for and 201 against, the House approved a \$3.7 billion District of Columbia budget for fiscal 1994. The bill (HR 2492) provides about \$700 million in U.S. Treasury funding, including a \$630 million "federal payment" to Washington for revenue potential it loses as a result of the federal enclave occupying much of the city's tax base. More than \$3 billion in the bill is locally raised by the district, mainly by taxation.

Criticism centered on the city's crime problem, the performance of the D.C. government and the fact that the bill allows locally raised money to fund abortions, lifting a six-year ban on such funding.

Supporter Eleanor Norton, D-D.C., said: "The District of Columbia is cutting money these days. This is not a time to complain about spending. Everything in the district is being cut."

Opponent Dan Burton, R-Ind., accused D.C. officials of "squandering, in my view, large amounts of money that they are not accountable for because the monies are not raised here."

A yes vote was to approve the D.C. budget. **Area representatives voting yes were: Carr, Levin, Ford. Voting no: Kildee and Knollenberg.**

SENATE

Native Hawaiians: By a vote of 65 for and 34 against, the Senate sent the House a resolution acknowledging the 100th anniversary of the U.S.-aided coup that ended the Hawaiian monarchy and set the stage for Hawaii becoming an American territory. The measure (SJ Res 19) apologizes to native Hawaiians for the U.S. military and diplomatic intervention against the Kingdom of Hawaii. Natives were defined in Senate debate as descendants of those who lived in what is now Hawaii before 1778.

Sponsor Daniel Akaka, D-Hawaii, said: "Now until our nation understands the... 1893 overthrow of the Kingdom of Hawaii will Ameri-

can people appreciate the meaning of the native Hawaiians rights movement, which grows each day."

Opponent Slade Gorton, R-Wash., called the resolution a "signpost" to ethnic conflict, dividing "the citizens of the state of Hawaii who are of course citizens of the United States into two distinct groups, native Hawaiians and all other citizens."

A yes vote supported the resolution. **Michigan senators Carl Levin, D, and Donald Riegler, D, voted yes.**

Jobless Benefits: By a vote of 76 for and 20 against, the Senate passed a bill extending until Feb. 5, 1994, the period in which the long-term unemployed can qualify for an additional seven or 13 weeks of unemployment checks. This would benefit more than 750,000 persons who exhaust their initial 26-week check allotment between Oct. 1, 1993, and the February date. To offset the estimated \$1.1 billion cost, the bill relies mostly on requirements that states do a better job of retraining the jobless and returning them to work.

A yes vote was to pass the bill. **Carl Levin and Donald Riegler both voted yes.**

How to pick, store and cook potatoes

Responses on my voice mail are any indication: quite a few of you love potatoes. The big question was "what are Yukon Gold potatoes?"

For the uninitiated, Yukon Golds are specialty potatoes with a slight golden color. You can find them at most better grocery stores. I have seen, and bought, them at Kroger.

Reference was made to the mashed potato story in the November/December issue of "Cook's Illustrated" magazine that claims Yukon Golds make the "ultimate mashed potato."

Without a doubt, Yukon Golds are tops, especially with their high starch content and rich flavor. Common Russets, also known for their starch, will suffice.

Don't underestimate the Yukon Gold for baking. It doesn't need a ton of butter. Just a warning though, the best potato also comes with one of the best price tags. Yukon Golds aren't cheap; they're not something you would choose to use too frequently. But once you taste them, you'll be a convert and will search them out whenever you grocery shop.

Yukon Golds aside, personal favorites are also the sweet potato and yam. These are two rather distinct types of potato. Both are tubers and hail from the morning glory plant. What you know as a sweet potato is a rather dry type with pinky-yellow flesh.

A yam, on the other hand is sweeter, softer, much more moist and vividly orange colored. Generally speaking, a sweet potato will look like an orangy potato with a point for a bottom. Yams generally have a more rounded bottom and more closely resemble an Irish potato.

Sweet potatoes and yams can be baked, boiled, fried or roasted like Irish potatoes. The sweet potato lends itself a little more to casseroles that are sweetened with brown sugar, honey, molasses and marshmallows, especially during the holidays.

There are two other basic choices, other than canned, frozen or dehydrated for potato lovers. The two types generally found in markets across the country are the thin skinned, rounded whites and the oblong russet Burbanks or Idahos.

The potatoes with the highest starch make the best all around cooking potatoes, so russets top the list of Janes Gang favorites. A little-known fact you might be interested in regarding potatoes is that the older they are, the better they are. Seems that the older potatoes have a tendency to dry out in cold storage, making them starchier.

New baby red skins should be boiled only and can be lightly roasted if parboiled.

Storing and choosing

When it comes to choosing and storing potatoes, you should avoid potatoes that have sprouted or have a green tinge. The green tinge means that those potatoes have been exposed to a lot of sunlight. Never eat the sprouted eyes or the green tinge of a potato because those parts are poisonous. Also, if you have ever cut into a potato and noticed a black ring under the skin, those potatoes have been frost-bitten and, again, should not be used.

Potatoes do not lend themselves to freezing very well. To store potatoes, keep them in their mesh bag you bought them in. Never attempt to store potatoes in those plastic deli-type bags as they do need air to circulate. The cooler the temperatures, the longer the potatoes will stay fresh. A garage or cool sunporch inside a potato crate from your local produce store is best.

Last, but certainly not least, it's best not to attempt to store any leftover potatoes. "The Joy of Cooking" says that potatoes lose their mealiness and their subtle down-to-earth flavor and at best, leftover potatoes should be incorporated into a soup base. Not one to disagree with the likes of Irma Rombauer and Marion Becker, I always save leftover mashed potatoes for potato pancakes and any leftover baked potatoes always make it into the frypan for fried potatoes. Yes, I have, on occasion, thickened a soup with leftover mashed potatoes and when stirred into milk or buttermilk, those instant potatoes make for rich thickening agent. They dissolve without the slightest hint of a lump and add a stick-to-your-ribs heartiness that you'll enjoy.

Also, if you love baked potatoes as much as we do, never wrap them in foil as the foil inhibits flakiness because too much of the moisture is retained. The best baked potatoes are often placed on a bed of rock salt to draw out the moisture.

So when it comes to planning your Thanksgiving dinner, you now have all the facts about potatoes you'll ever need.

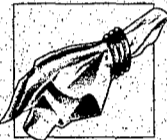

Meet some people who will be serving a delicious variety of dishes on Thanksgiving Day. Vegetables are the centerpiece of their meal.

It's time for the Thanksgiving feast. The table is laden with such traditional dishes as stuffing, potatoes, gravy and, of course, sweet potatoes. Also, there's something with pumpkin, and something with cranberries. Now for the piece de resistance. Waiting to be carved - make that "cut" - is a large, nicely browned, meatless loaf.

Meatless loaf? Did someone say "meatless loaf?"

"Certain types of cancer have been found to have a direct link to animal meat, and animal fat is a culprit in heart disease," he said. "Besides, a healthy vegetarian diet has allowed me to maintain my proper weight over the years."

Janie Weaver is also concerned about health. That is one reason she and

her family are vegetarians. Another reason stems from their religious beliefs. "Some Seventh-day Adventists, like us, believe that we should follow a vegetarian lifestyle," she said.

Over the next several weeks, area wine merchants will be promoting Ports because the 1991 vintage Ports are arriving. The 1991 vintage is the first to be declared since 1985. Pre-release

tastings we've done show the 1991 Ports to be overtly fruity in their youth, but with the requisite richness to mature to the quality of the acclaimed 1977 vintage.

Arrival of the 1991 Ports offers an opportunity to buy a case for cellaring and enjoyment well into the next century. But what Ports can be drunk now, especially as holiday liquid desserts?

To answer that question, it's necessary to understand that Port (Porto) is divided into two categories: wood-matured Port, aged in wood as the name implies, and vintage Port, which ages in the characteristic black glass bottle. Vintage Ports are produced in years with nearly perfect weather conditions. They represent just 2 percent of Port production. Their rarity makes them expensive.

Wood-matured Ports, on the other hand, are the norm of Port production and come in a variety of styles. They are bottled at optimum drinking potential and should be consumed within 18 months to two years after bottling. They retain their freshness for several weeks after being opened. They do not need decanting because any sediment (crust) was thrown in the cask during the wood maturation period.

To make a study of which styles you prefer, we sug-

gest focusing on one producer and working your way, bottle by bottle, through the line to gain an understanding. Warre's Ports, which are medium weight, offer a tasty challenge for such a learning adventure. Warre's, founded in 1670 and today owned by the Symington family, is the oldest of all British Port shippers. The Symingtons have been Port producers and shippers from father to son for more than a century. They also own Graham, Dow, Gould Campbell, Smith Woodhouse and Quarles Harris Port houses.

We're limiting our discussion in this column to Ports produced from red grapes. They fall into the following types - Ruby, Tawny, Vintage Character, Late

know this is a very healthy way of eating," said the granddaughter of an Arkansas cattle rancher.

"I was raised on meat and Southern cooking, a very high fat and highly processed diet," she said. "Studies have shown that this kind of diet is no longer healthy nor fashionable. Vegetarians have always known that meat is not the best thing for the body."

Her three young children are even aware of the benefits of a vegetarian diet. "My 10-year-old son says that 'body brushes' keep his insides cleaned out. I have explained to the children how a regular high-fiber diet of vegetables and fruits is like brushes that keep impurities out of their bodies."

Although Jeanie, and her husband Robert, an oral surgeon at St. Mary Hospital in Livonia, have chosen to be vegetarians, they do not restrict the choices of their children.

"We also teach the children that persons who don't follow a

vegetarian lifestyle are not 'bad' nor is food, such as meat, 'bad.' It's just that we have a different way of eating."

There won't be a turkey on their Thanksgiving table, but there will be a wide assortment of dishes that will make it a special meal.

"One favorite dish that I serve on Thanksgiving is Southern Sweet Potato Casserole," she said. "This dish reminds me of my Southern origins. The only difference between my casserole and what I ate as a child is that I cut out the fat, and I cut down on the sugar. My way is a little bit healthier than traditional Southern cooking."

Weaver said the secret to good vegetarian cooking is using seasonings to increase flavor.

Jennifer Thomas of Farmington is also a vegetarian and is also still learning how to prepare good vegetarian meals. This young career woman became a vegetarian 11 years ago as a protest against the slaughter of animals. "But

I've stayed with this way of eating because it's so healthy," she said.

Thomas said her parents were upset when she first told them about her decision. "My father was 'Mr. Meat and Potatoes,' and he thought I was nuts. And my mother said that she was not going to fix any special meals for me.

"But they've changed. They have accepted my way of eating and have even enjoyed many vegetarian dishes. My mother accommodates my diet on special occasions, such as Thanksgiving, by serving meatless dishes that I can eat—I especially like my mom's vegetable chowder."

Thomas added that restaurants are also accommodating the special dietary needs of its customers, including vegetarians, by offering more food choices. "It's easier to be a vegetarian these days. Everyone is interested in healthy foods, and vegetarian foods fit the bill."

Tawny Ports are light and elegant and may have aged longer than Ruby Ports. This is the reason for their amber tones. "Tawny's should be served slightly chilled," advises Dominic Symington. Warre's King's Tawny (\$11) is mellow with nutty hints — a good introduction to Tawny Ports in general. Warre's Sir William (\$19) is a 10-Year Tawny with nutty, black cherry and vanilla flavors. Warre's Nimrod (\$26.50), a 20-Year Tawny, is a step up in flavor, elegance and richness.

Warre's 1968 Reserve Tawny (\$48) is an exceptional Tawny that's full of fruit, nuts and vanilla flavors with a mellow and delicious finish.

"We bottled the first of this wine about four years ago," Symington said. "We bottle it periodically. The consumer should know that this type of Port should not be cellared for longer than two years. It is a good practice, therefore, to check the bottling date on the back label."

In our opinion, the best value overall is represented by the Warre's 1981 Traditional Late Bottled Vintage Port (\$19). Late Bottled Vintage Ports (LBV) are Ports of a single year of better-than-average quality, but less than a declared year. They are matured in cask and bottled between their fourth and sixth year. They are similar in style to a vintage character Port but carry the signature of the vintage rather than the "house" blend. The 1981 LBV offers a big, rich, generous fruit impression, finishing balanced and delicious.

Warre's 1982 Quinta da Cavadinha (\$25) showcases one of the finest properties in the Alto Douro region of Portugal. This single quinta wine is rich and fruity with a velvety, chocolaty mouth feel.

Warre's 1991 Vintage Port will retail for about \$25 upon release. Other Warre's Vintage Ports still available are 1960 (\$120), 1963 (\$170), 1977 (\$58), 1980 (\$39) and 1985 (\$42).

For desserts in a hurry during the holidays, serve Ports after dinner with freshly shelled nuts and Cheddar or Stilton cheese.

Rushed food preparations can result in poisonings that can easily be prevented.

Questions about food preparation can be directed to 858-0904. Some basic tips for safe turkey

preparation include: don't stuff the turkey the night before it's cooked, defrost turkey in the refrigerator or in the microwave, plan fresh turkey purchases carefully, and keep fresh raw turkey in refrigerator for one or two days only.

- 1/2 teaspoon ginger
- 2 tablespoons butter or margarine

- 3 egg whites
- 1/4 cup sugar

Mix graham cracker crumbs, 1/4 cup sugar and margarine and pat into slightly greased 9 by 13-inch

pan. Beat and pour over crumbs; eggs, cream cheese and 1/2 cup sugar. Bake at 350 degrees for 20 minutes. Cool well. Mix pumpkin, egg yolks, 1/2 cup sugar, milk, salt, cinnamon and cloves.

Cook over medium heat until thickened (about 10 minutes). Remove from heat and add dissolved gelatin to pumpkin mixture. Cool thoroughly. Beat egg whites until stiff, slowly adding 1/4 cup sugar.

Fold into cooled pumpkin. Pour over cream cheese mixture. (If desired, bake at 400 degrees for 15 minutes to cook egg whites). Chill until firm. Top with layer of Cool Whip.

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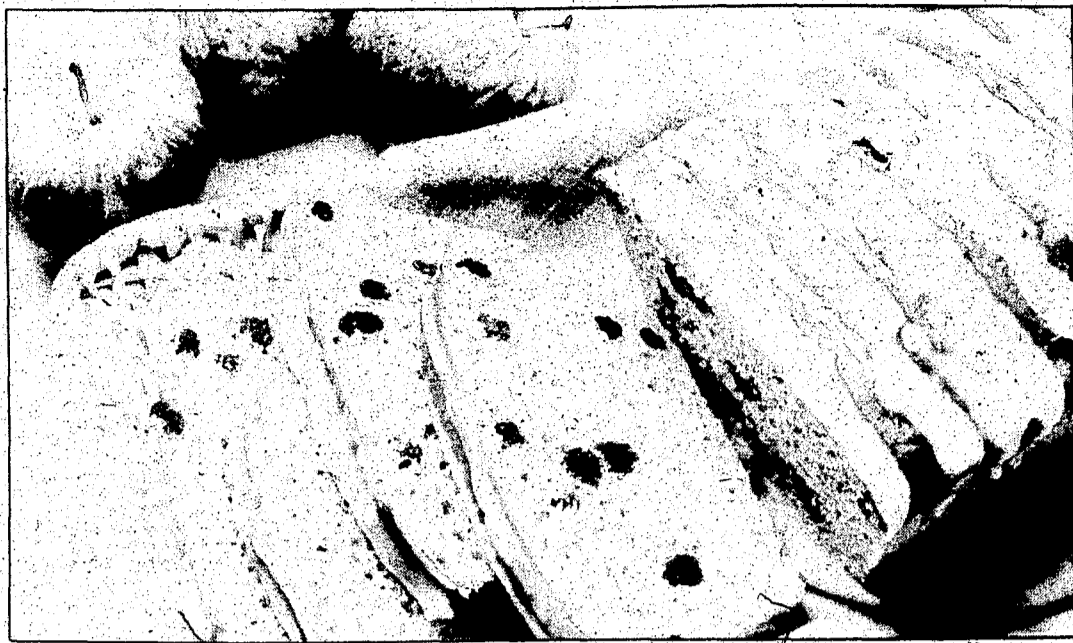
Another option for apples

APPLESAUCE-RAISIN BATTER BREAD

- 3 cups all-purpose flour, divided
- 2 tablespoons brown sugar
- ¼ teaspoon salt
- 2 teaspoons apple pie spice
- 1 package (¼-ounce) active dry yeast
- 1¼ cups unsweetened Michigan applesauce
- ¼ cup honey
- 2 tablespoons margarine
- 1 egg
- ½ cup raisins
- ½ cup confectioners sugar
- 1 tablespoon milk

In a large mixer bowl, combine 1½ cups of the flour, sugar, salt, apple pie spice and yeast.



Breakfast treat: Made with Michigan applesauce, Applesauce Raisin Batter Bread is a delicious way to start the day.

Heat applesauce, honey and margarine until very warm (120-130 degrees F). Add to flour mixture with egg, beating on low speed until combined. Beat 3 minutes longer, on medium speed, scraping bowl occasionally. Stir in remaining flour and raisins.

Spread batter evenly in a 9 by 5 by 3-inch loaf pan sprayed with no-stick cooking spray. Cover loosely with waxed paper and let rise about 1 hour or until double in bulk. Carefully remove paper.

Bake in 350 degree oven about 40 minutes or until golden brown. Cool

10 minutes before removing from pan. Cool completely on wire rack. Frost with mixture of confectioners sugar and milk. Yield: 1 loaf, 16 slices.

Per serving: 1 slice 160 calories; 1 g dietary fiber, 2 g fat, 57 mg sodium.

Microwave 'hot spots'

"The microwave oven has become a common household item which can be a real boon for saving time," said Sylvia Treitman, home economist for the Oakland County Cooperative Extension Service. "There are some very simple yet effective tips to help you cook safely with your microwave."

The main concern is ensuring that food is completely cooked, yet not so hot that it may burn a baby's mouth. Cold spots can occur because of the irregular way the microwaves enter the oven and are absorbed by various foods.

"Learning placement and special microwave techniques is a

good idea," adds Treitman, who suggests either buying a microwave book or taking a class. Some tips to help with safe microwave cooking:

- Arrange food items uniformly.
- Turn food several times — or stir or rotate dish during cooking.
- Observe standing time when called for.
- Use utensils made for the microwave.
- Avoid use of cold storage containers, like margarine tubs — they can melt.
- Never use brown bags or newspapers which can catch on fire.
- Heat leftovers to at least 165 degrees.

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First aid attempts may save some real kitchen disasters

Not every food problem has a solution. Some turn out to be total failures, but there are some first aid measures that can be applied that may save others. Quick repair work can avoid disasters and turn the food into a new creation.

There are some emergency supplies to have on hand for sudden catastrophes. Dried onions can get you out of many unexpected crisis. Bland vegetables can be helped with the addition of dried onion, or a topping can be made for casseroles when combined with crushed chips or corn flakes, besides you may have just run out of fresh onions.

Parmesan cheese can hide a multitude of problems as it tastes good on salads, cooked vegetables, fish and meats. An emergency

meal can be made with a can of cheese sauce or cheese soup. Heat and pour on toast for instant Welsh Rarebit, or pour over vegetables or stir into a tasteless casserole.

Lemon juice livens up "tired" vegetables and fish. Use lemon juice on fruit slices, avocados, parsnips or any food that will darken after cutting. A box of instant mashed potatoes is handy for a thickener for watery soup or stew.

A box of unflavored gelatin will help a "weepy" aspic, thin pudding or pie fillings. Always keep a can of evaporated milk on the shelf for an emergency. Besides using it in desserts or sauces you can make whipped topping. Keep lots of spices and herbs on hand to improve most any dish that needs a "pick me up."

Baking failures

What to do with possible failures. When your cake bakes unevenly, the edges look done but the

center looks soggy, lower the temperature by 50 degrees and increase the baking time. Check it again in 15 or 20 minutes and see how it's progressing. If the cake is flat or soggy, you may have forgotten to put in baking powder. A fallen cake tastes okay so be creative. Cut the fallen cake into small chunks and mix with applesauce and serve with whipped topping. If a finished cake is lopsided, slice the top off even and turn it upside down before frosting.

Cookies stuck to the cookie sheet can be fixed by running the sheet over a hot burner on the stove, or wrap the cooking sheet in a towel and let stand for a few minutes and try again. If the dough is sticking to the rolling pin and you don't want to add more flour, chill the rolling pin in the freezer. Sometimes cookies will become too hard, so store them in an airtight container with a glass of water, it should help soften them.

Beads of moisture appear on cream puffs if they are under-baked. Return to a turned off oven and let stand a few minutes with the oven door open. If the cream puffs collapse, slice off the top and remove the moist dough from the inside, put the top back on and return to the hot oven. Make sure the oven is turned off and leave the oven door open, wait a few minutes, they should dry out a little more.

Boiled icing that becomes too thick can be made thinner if you stir in a few drops of lemon juice or boiling water. Too thin boiled icing can be saved by adding a little powdered sugar. A few drops of vinegar will help a boiled icing that becomes sugary. A meringue that "weeps" has been cooled too fast. To avoid the weeping, turn

the oven off and leave the meringue in the oven, it will cool as the oven cools.

Soggy bottoms on muffin or rolls can be avoided by putting the muffins on a rack to cool so the moisture doesn't settle to the bottoms. If they stick to the pan, set the muffin tin on a wet towel for a few minutes and try to remove muffins again.

A pinch or two of baking powder added to potatoes that you are mashing help make them fluffy. A slice of lemon added to the boiling water of old potatoes will prevent discoloring and helps to bring out the flavor. Raw potatoes can be used to absorb some of the salt from too salty soup. A few pinches of brown sugar will help cover up the salt taste without sweetening the soup. If possible, add a can of

tomatoes to help the saltiness of soup.

Burned foods

Burned foods may or may not be a total failure. Speed is of the essence when dealing with burnt foods. Stop the food from cooking by setting the pan in cold water to stop the cooking fast. Then using a wooden spoon, remove all the food that doesn't cling to the pot and transfer to another pan. Scrape out only that which comes easily. If the food has a burnt taste, cover the pan with a damp cloth and let stand about a half hour and taste again.

A woman's comedian: Diane Ford

Diane Ford: Jokes meant for a woman

Diane Ford does not fit in the mold of the conventional female comic. She is a brash, opinionated, earthy performer who rarely minces — or is at a loss for — words.

"I'm a woman's comedian," Ford said in an interview last week from a hotel room in West Palm Beach, Fla., where she was performing her newest concept, a one-woman show called "Anatomy of a Woman."

"I think I really speak for women," she said. "I don't sugarcoat it; I say what women say when they're alone. A lot of my comedy comes out of the relationships I've had with my closest friends. I've said things in mixed company that women don't like to admit to."

Unfortunately, Detroit audiences will not have the chance to see Ford's "Anatomy of a Woman" when she stops at the Comedy Castle in Royal Oak later this week.

"Anatomy" is a more elaborate stage production than the typical 45-minute club headliner set; it runs around 90 minutes. Ford admits that she's still working out the kinks in the show, having only been performing it for the past month. Eventually, she would like to take her comedic tour de force to New York for an extended run.

"This is the culmination of my 15 years of stand-up," Ford said. "It's got a little more of those poignant theatrical moments, like menopause, how many eggs a woman is born with, and things like that."

Ford's comedy reflects truthfully on the many differences between men and women and how that is played out every day in living Technicolor.

"Men and women think differently. Men go linear, like A to B. Women go from A to P to Q to D to Z and ask if men see the connection. Men say 'No, it looks like an eye chart.'"

When asked if she is to female comedy what Tim Allen is for men, Ford liked the analogy.

"I really like Tim. He's a very good friend. I guess I represent the ultimate female perspective. He represents the ultimate male perspective."

Surprisingly, men make up an increasing amount of Ford's audiences and are highly supportive of her.

A cellist and a violinist are the last things you'd expect to see in hazy lounges.

Working with both ends of the musical spectrum shows the artists' diversity. The possibilities for expanding Caelum Bliss's sound are endless, Hamera said.

"I knew it was gonna be no holds barred," Hamera said. "Everything goes. In Noc Barrage, there's really no chance for that. Noc Barrage has a definite sound and direction."

That is part of what attracted Emily to the group.

"I was really ready for something new. I wanted to be the front person.

I learned a lot (through Blue Nation) like to write melodies around everything," said Emily who speaks in a barely audible whisper.

Recently the band, which cites among its influences Miranda Sex Garden and the Cranes, held a record release party an Industry in Pontiac complete with a string section. At other shows, including one earlier this year at St. Andrew's Hall, the band has used candles and white sheets to create the complimentary moody atmosphere.

Most bands insist that what they're doing is original. But this

time, it applies.

"No one is doing anything that we're doing," Hamera said.

The band, which also includes Surge to Union's Dave Johnson on guitar, drummer Bill King and bassist Mark Nowakowski, intends on keeping it that way.

"We're not going to adapt the music to get signed (to a record label). We go with how we feel," she said.

That counts for the audience as well.

"If they don't like us, they can't say we suck as a band. We put a lot into whatever we do," Hamera said.

MacColl finally gets chance to sing in U.S.

Although English singer Kirsty MacColl considers herself "fairly militant" about political causes,

don't ask her to be involved in any charity records. She's not interested.

"I won't do one of those charity records with loads of celebrities who are singing a really bad song," she said via telephone from New York City.

Aside from that, she's skeptical.

"You never really know where the money is going and if it's just to get them (the organizer) on TV to further their career."

She did, however, lend her musical support to the "Red, Hot and Blue" Cole Porter tribute/AIDS benefit project with her two duets with the Pogues.

"That one was good; I got to do a Cole Porter song which offers many possibilities."

MacColl is in the United States for her first tour of the country. She'll play this area on Thursday, Nov. 18, at the Blind Pig in Ann Arbor with David Gray. She was scheduled to tour the U.S. in 1991 but her record company (Charisma) blew it out at the last minute. "It was unfortunate because her record, "Electric Landlady" and the single "Walking Down Madison" were turning heads.

That was the beginning of the end of her relationship with Charisma Records. The result was MacColl without a record label. She recorded her latest effort, "Titanic Days," before signing to I.R.S. Records in May.

"I had a few (labels interested), but this one was by far the most realistic," she said.

She describes "Titanic Days" as "that dual fear and excitement of a huge tide where everything is

constantly changing." The album is along the same vein of "Electric Landlady" which blends MacColl's wit and sometimes dark lyrics with brilliant melody. The first single "Can't Stop Killing You" finds MacColl collaborating with Johnny Marr of the Smiths. Electronic and The The. In other words, she has also performed with on record or on stage with Talking Heads, Robert Plant and Morrissey. She laughs when the diversity between Plant and Morrissey is noted.

"I'm not doing anymore. I might do something. I really haven't got a lot of time. I'm doing more of my own thing now. When you're on tour, time is precious."

She prefers to spend her time with her children, age 7 and 8, and in her home studio. Back at home, she's also more politically active. She hosted a BBC documentary on water pollution, entitled "Don't Go Near the Water."

MacColl prefers to be recognized for her music rather than for making public statements on particular causes, however.

"For me, it's important that people view me as a songwriter and singer, not as someone standing on the sidewalk telling people what to think."

Romper' skinheads pack a wallop

They despise the growing number of Vietnamese immigrants that arrive in their Melbourne, Australia, neighborhood. They keep a map on the wall of the newcomers' infiltration. Whenever they can get one alone in a dark alley, they savagely beat him or her as a message to the others.

The world of neo-Nazi skinheads isn't pretty and "Romper Stomper," premiering at the Magic Bag Theatre in Ferndale this weekend, doesn't blink or flinch. Deemed racist propaganda by some and an objective chronicle

of violent times by others, the movie actually uses fairly tried-and-true movie conventions to portray a sickly fascinating subculture.

Looking beyond their political agenda, these skinheads are little more than '90s versions of rebel heroes like Brando and Dean. All are alienated and uneducated,

though a few register a spark of intelligence.

One at least, Davey (Daniel Pollock), has second thoughts about his chosen lifestyle when he meets Gabe (Jacqueline McKenzie), a screwed-up girl from the suburbs. This doesn't sit well with Hando (Russell Crowe), the unofficial leader of the pack and the most ravenous when it comes to towing the party line.

Crowe, who won the Australian Film Institute Award for best actor last year, carries much of the movie's intensity beneath his cold blue eyes. He forms the third edge of a classic love triangle that is one of the least effective parts of the movie, which broke box office records overseas last year.

Visually, "Romper Stomper" runs the gamut from quick-cut scenes of gang violence to lengthy, often ponderous conversations between the skinheads. The low-

budget quality of the film drags you deeper into a world you may have just as soon left alone.

Writer/director Geoffrey Wright, a former Australian movie critic, finds his characters "dramatically worthy" and isn't ashamed about bringing their stories to the screen.

"My characters are evil," he says, "but they are not glamorized and they are not quaint."

These are characters who are desperate, who want something and who have a very clear — if demented — point of view. Anybody who wants something that badly, and who has so much strength of will, becomes magnetic.

The Vietnamese aren't the only ones to suffer the skinheads' wrath. After barely escaping from the fury of fed-up immigrants, they head out to the suburbs and the home of a wealthy advertising executive. Gaining entrance through Gabe, who once apparently had an affair with the man,

they trash the place "Clockwork Orange" style.

"We're going to destroy your house and your life," one of the skinheads announces matter-of-factly. The big difference between this and the Stanley Kubrick classic is that the neo-Nazis have none of the creativity or personality that made Malcolm MacDowell's character such a controversial one.

Far from glamorizing these punks, Wright and his talented cast depict skinheads as pathetic losers who, in terms of traditional movie morality, meet with unpleasant ends. You just hope that the guy sitting next to you sees the movie the same way.

'Sleeper' — Godstar

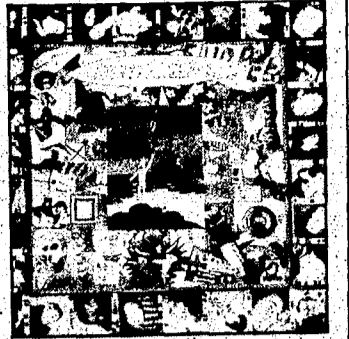
Believe it or not, Evan Dando isn't the only member of the Lemonheads. Nic Dalton accompanies Dando on bass and is one of the founders of the Australian-based band Godstar.

This time, Dalton takes over guitar and vocal duties on the 14-song album; playing bass on only four tracks. The two bands have a lot in common — addictive pop melodies and tongue-in-cheek lyrics.

The classic track is "Single," a song that women can relate to. "I just want to be single, but I want to see you every single day" sings Dalton, who joined the Lemonheads after the "It's a Shame About Ray" EP.

The sweet acoustic ballad "Forgotten Night" takes a close second. ("I just put it down as a forgotten night, but I don't want to. I just want to see you now, if it's all right, if we got time, time for the forgotten night.")

Quirky pop songs are the band's forte, however. On "Everything You Give Me Breaks," he sings: "Give me a reason why I should fall back down on you, but you made me so happy when you fainted on my shoes."



The quartet, which also includes guitarist Tom Morgan, bassist Robyn St. Claire and drummer Alison Galloway, recorded at Fort Apache studios in Massachusetts which also helped launch the careers of Juliana Hatfield, the Lemonheads and Detroit's favorite smiling hillbillies Goober & The Peas.

Godstar is temporarily on hold while Dalton tours with the Lemonheads. Incidentally, the third Lemonhead is David Ryan, drummer. You can catch Dalton, Ryan and occasional Godstar drummer Dando in town on Saturday, Nov. 20, at the State Theatre in Detroit with Redd Kroos and Magnapop.

If you rouse them enough, maybe they'll even break into a Godstar tune. That would definitely be worthwhile.

Scots Pirates — Scots Pirates

Detroit's music scene has a reputation for producing some of the most uniquely stylistic rock musicians, such as Mitch Ryder and Bob Seger. With the release of "Scots Pirates," artist Scott Morgan shows the potential to join the troops.

Morgan is no newcomer to the music industry, having performed during the last three decades with the Rationals, the Sonic's Rendezvous Band and the MC5. Now he heads the latest four-piece concoction with what Detroit-bred rock 'n' roll should be.

"Scots Pirates" (Schoolkids' Records, 1993) is — for the lack of a better word — rough, at times abrasive and unglossy — all the things that put rock into roll.

The release kicks off with the bouncy "Misery" and slides through to "Dante," a strong, bass-filled piece that stirs emotions over social di-



lemmas. "Pirates" continues with the rock/blues "Running Away" and "Out of Our Minds," a typical rock/love song but saved by strong guitar and bass lines to the rockabilly "I'm The Man."

Morgan shares the vocals with bandmate Kathy Deschaine, which adds texture to the pieces, but overall "Scots Pirates" is a beefy example of the Motor City's rock sound.

Boot scootin' around in style

This winter's wardrobe essential is the boot. Short or high-rise, lace-up grannies or lug-soled work boots, it's the shoe of choice for the well-heeled this season.

The good news is that most boot styles can be worn with anything in your wardrobe. Wear the rugged heavy-duty construction styles with jeans or long skirts and swingy dresses. Don't forget a pair of slouchy, scrunchy socks. Clunky-heeled platform shoe-boots look great with wide-legged pants but give the classic suit a contemporary edge. ...Granny boots? The funky lace-ups with sculptured heels redefine the Victorian look when paired with slim skirts and ruffled blouses.

Then there are motorcycle boots and cowboy boots and a must-have for Michigan winters, apres-ski boots. The choice is endless, but local shops may help you narrow the field.

Strong roots

Twenty years ago, Detroit natives Michael Budman and Don Green opened their first store in Toronto. They named the counter-culture shoe store *Roots*, symbolizing the feet as the ultimate foundation. "It's a good, strong, earthy word," says Budman. Their funny-looking, negative heel earth shoes were cutting-edge footwear in 1973 and immediately inspired a cult following.

Two decades later, *Roots* is an international clothing and accessory empire, specializing in sweat shirts, leather and award jackets (many sporting celebrity names), T-shirts, jeans, leather bags and a line of Baby *Roots* knitwear. But the



root of the business is shoes, and today's hot commodity is the Tuff Boot, a rugged hiking shoe available in wheat, blue, black and gaucho nubuck (\$115). Big bookstores battle for bucks

It's enough to make Mark Twain sit up and smile. Mammoth suburban bookstores are reporting sales in the billions of dollars. Locally, Barnes & Noble, Borders and Waldenbooks are providing titles never offered before locally.

They are the Big Three of the book world, according to the American Booksellers Association. And their latest adventures, pardon the pun, would make a good book.

Their construction, stocking and staffing of book and music superstores, complete with espresso cafes, literary events and educated sales consultants, are a reader's paradise.

In first place with 1992 sales of \$1.14 billion is Waldenbooks, owned by Kmart Corp., which is based in Troy. The number-two player with 1992 sales of \$1 billion is New York-based Barnes & Noble, which also owns the B. Dalton and Doubleday mall bookstores. Barnes & Noble went public in mid-October.

Entering the third spot is Ann Arbor-based Borders Books with 1992 sales of \$400 million, acquired by Kmart in a stock swap in 1992. A future public offering is being considered.

Borders just announced it will move its headquarters into the old Jacobson's building on State Street in Ann Arbor, simultaneously open-

ing a 40,000-square-foot flagship store with more than 200,000 book and music titles in summer 1994.

A typical Borders superstore offers 130,000 book titles in 36,000 square feet. Borders stores can be found in Beverly Hills, Novi, Utica, Ann Arbor and next year, Farmington Hills, West Bloomfield and Novi. They have stores across the nation as well.

Barnes & Noble superstores try not to be out-booked and provide 100,000 titles in 15,000 square feet of selling space. Spokeswoman Kim Becker said the Rochester Hills at Rochester and Auburn and Bloomfield Hills store at Maple and Telegraph are doing so well that a third metro store will open in Ann Arbor on Wash-tenaw by the end of November. There also are stores in Grosse Pointe and Lansing.

The small but mighty Waldenbooks stores sit in 3,000-square-foot mall stores with 15,000 to 20,000 titles. Waldenbooks and More Books, the freestanding version of a Walden superstore, is scouting new locations although no specifics have been announced, according to Susan Arnold.

spokeswoman for Waldenbooks.

Money for growth

Fresh capital combined with their profits have given these companies the fuel to open superstores to match the untapped demand for books and music revealed in a series of studies by Time-Warner, said Robert DiRomualdo, Borders Books president. "Studies showed that 70 percent of the American population considered music very important in their lives, yet, as we aged, our music purchases declined," he said. "However, as we age, the financial ability to purchase music increases. There's a demand right there that wasn't being satisfied. Maybe because the only music stores in town are hard-driven rock stores, which are an unpleasant experience for most adults."

The light went on at both Borders and Barnes & Noble, and well-stocked music rooms were added to all their newest stores. Espresso cafes (which also sell other beverages) were added to add ambience and encourage shoppers to linger.

DiRomualdo discussed his views on the reasons for the big bookstore phenomenon:

"First of all, the number of college graduates on the streets goes up every year, creating a greater demand for books. These people are readers.

"Next, the baby boomers are having kids, and they want books and the joy of reading to be a part of their children's lives."

"Third, since we're purveyors of information in a world hungry for knowledge, we've got it made. We sell a lot of medical reference books, psychology titles, law books."

Finally, he mentioned the home improvement craze:

"Everybody shopping at all those new home improvement superstores stops in here sooner or later for a book to tell them how-to. Have you seen our selection of plumbing, remodeling and refinishing titles?"

Winning shopper praise

Customers had nothing but words of praise for the arts-oriented superstores.

"Now this is how a music store should be," said Graham Brown of Novi as he selected a compact disk containing a Paul Simon retrospective at the Borders store in Novi.

"There's got to be 20,000 tapes and CDs here to choose from. The artists are marked according their category of music. The sales staff is up front to answer questions; quiet jazz plays in the background. I've been in here for 45 minutes, and no one has bugged me. It's a class operation."

A customer at the Barnes and Noble store in Bloomfield Township, who did not wish to reveal her name, said since the store opened a few months ago, she stops in once a week to have lunch at the espresso cafe and buy a book or magazine. "It's just a nice place to be. I feel as though I'm surrounded by great thoughts and lofty ideas. I get inspired."

The flip side

The first casualty of the big bookstore wars is Metro News, an independent bookseller across the street from Barnes & Noble. It announced its decision to close.

The Little Professor Book Shop in downtown Plymouth said its fate might be the same "if a Barnes and Noble moved in a few blocks away. But right now, we're doing fine," said Rob Tiplady, sales associate. "Our customer base is strong, and we have lots of local shoppers."

Cannie Mannino, owner of the popular children's book shop Half-Way Down the Stairs in downtown Rochester, said the first two months that Barnes & Noble opened a few miles down the road, her business fell drastically.

"But we've rebounded," she said, "because they can't touch us in terms of personal hand-selling of book titles by well-informed

salespeople, and they can't touch us in terms of the breadth of our selection of quality children's books." Mannino lamented the dawn of the book superstores.

"I've personally grown weary of explaining to customers why I can't give discounts and sales like the chain stores. We just don't buy in the quantities that they do to offer such prices."

Mannino cautioned book lovers against the "bottom-line buying" of the bookstore chains, which could affect the publishing world and its ability to introduce new or alternative authors.

"Books have become a commodity and not the means of communicating ideas from one human being to another," she said. "The independents have always taken chances on new or unknown authors. I wonder if the corporate-buying teams of national bookstore chains will do the same?"

Barnes and Nobles' Becker said the concern was unfounded. "Of our 100,000 titles, all are not best-sellers. What else comprises our inventory but local authors, small publishing houses and university presses? Each store has racks of off-the-beaten-path books. Every angle, every subject, every viewpoint is represented at Barnes and Noble."

Pilots deny Stevenson in finale

Warren DeLaSalle's denied Livonia Stevenson its sixth state boys soccer championship in school history with a 2-1 victory in sudden-death overtime.

Up until there was 1:33 left in the game, Livonia Stevenson and Warren DeLaSalle held joint ownership of Class A boys soccer championship Saturday.

The Pilots' Paul Mueller ceremoniously severed the tie, ripping a shot into the top left-hand corner during sudden-death overtime in the final at Bloomfield Hills Andover High School. The goal made the score 2-1 and gave DeLaSalle (20-2-2) its third title in four years.

With one shot, the Spartans (17-2-3) were both disenfranchised and dejected. A tie would have made Stevenson and DeLaSalle co-champions.

Mueller's goal brought Walt Barrett's side crashing to reality after a wonderful regular season and playoff run. The Spartans corralled the Pilots' explosive front line for a majority of the match.

"Up until 1:33, we kept them in check," Barrett said. "That job was done."

So it seemed in regulation time. Senior midfielder Chris Grodzicki hammered home the go-ahead goal for Stevenson with 12 minutes left in regulation. The Spartans then withstood a Pilot return attack during the next few minutes, which was highlighted by junior midfielder Anthony Vettrano heading a sure equalizer off the goal line.

After DeLaSalle was quelled, things turned quirky. Pilot defender Jordan Vassallo spun and hooked a low left-footed shot from well outside the 18-yard box. Stevenson goalkeeper Mike Lanspeary, whose heroics kept his side in this match, stood still as the ball hit the back of the net.

The goal scored with nine minutes left in regulation sent the proceedings into overtime.

"I think everyone in the park including our keeper thought it was going wide," Barrett said. "It obviously took a weird bounce and went in." He (Lanspeary) played well and kept us in there during some tight spots. Tight spots were what Stevenson's leading scorer, Nick Deren, found himself in. Deren, who was marked by the Pilots' Mike McCarron, managed only a couple of shots during the overtime sessions.

Stevenson tried to push up during the first overtime. The Spartans

"I thought that really fired us up," DeLaSalle coach Thair Mukhtar

said. "It just seemed our kids were not going to settle for a tie."

A co-championship wouldn't have looked bad in the Stevenson trophy case. The team was one of only two teams to tie against powerhouse Detroit Country Day (which drew in its Class B final against Richmond Gull Lake).

The Spartans lost their opening match against Troy and went unbeaten until Saturday. With only six seniors, a good portion return next season, including Deren, who led the team with 25 goals and six assists.

"Our team overachieving all year, along with a lineup of underclassmen in most every position, we had a great effort from everybody," Barrett said.

Rockets orbit into Final 4

Matt Howton pushed the big button at master control on Saturday.

The 5-foot-9, 150-pound senior provided ignition and lift-off with a spectacular 75-yard third-quarter punt return, sparking Westland John Glenn to a 24-6 victory over visiting Brighton in the Class AA-Region II championship game.

The win sends the Rockets (10-1 overall) into state semifinals against Flint Central (11-0). The Michigan High School Athletic Association was to determine the site and time for Saturday's game Sunday.

Howton's TD punt return, his fourth of the season, broke a 6-6 tie with 3:35 left in the third quarter. It was a play that sent Brighton home with an 8-2 record.

"My guys set up a wall outside and there was no one over there," said Howton, who also has a TD kickoff return to his credit this season. "I just saw the hole and took off. I looked back to see if there were any (penalty) flags. Derek Besco said there were no flags and it just felt awesome looking back. Everyone on the sideline just went nuts."

With the help of blocks from Jason

Fuller, Jim Tenant and Jason Batchelder, Howton raced down the sideline and into the end zone.

"My job is to peel back and hit the first guy I see," said Tenant, a 6-foot, 215-pound senior. "I guess I got the guy up in the air. It was a pretty good block."

"We take a lot of pride in special teams because it's the most important part of the game."

Following Howton's TD, quarterback Brian Morrison connected with Besco for the two-point conversion, giving Glenn an eight-point lead.

With 11:55 left in the fourth quarter, Brian Kolb tackled on a 30-yard field goal to make it 17-6.

Glenn put it away with 8:19 remaining on a 5-yard run by senior fullback Jeromey Cosby (60 yards on seven carries).

"When we took the lead for the first time everything changed on the sideline," said Glenn coach Chuck Gordon, who is making his second state semifinal appearance. "We had made three big plays in the first half... the blocked punt, the blocked extra point and the blocked field goal. We needed one more big play for the second half and that return really ignited us."

The Bulldogs, behind the bruising running of 6-foot-4, 218-pound tailback Clint Copenhaver (96 yards on 11 carries), controlled the ball and the clock for much of the first half.

But the Bulldogs could only muster six points — a 27-yard TD pass from Mike Martin to Jim Ettig with 10:37 left in the second period.

Glenn answered with 3-yard TD run from junior tailback Tariq Horne with 2:27 left. (Horne finished with 100 yards in 21 carries.)

The touchdown was set up when Besco recovered a John Blake fumble at the Brighton 32.

Glenn's defense was able to hold the fort despite giving up 210 total yards in the first half. The Rockets, meanwhile, had a total of 101.

But the Rockets' defense buckled up for the second half as Copenhaver was held to 13 yards on the ground.

"We made some halftime adjustments," Gordon said. "We had to tackle Copenhaver low because we were wasting our time trying to take him down high. Plus, they were blocking down on our inside line-

backers and we had to make a slight adjustment there."

Brighton coach Bill Murray, however, said Howton's punt return was the game's pivotal play.

"When you generate a play like that it changes the momentum," he said. "Offensively I thought Glenn ran the same type of game plan, but maybe they just blocked and tackled better in the second half."

Tenant, a tackle and one of Glenn's unsung heroes on defense, could sense that the team's intensity level changed during intermission.

"The coaches said we had to battle some more," he said. "The defense

stepped up a lot. I think we picked it up a notch."

Derek Besco, a potent combination along with twin brother Bryan, had two fumble recoveries and a blocked punt. Howton also blocked an extra point, while middle linebacker Mike Birt recovered a fumble to stop a Brighton scoring drive in the first quarter.

"We felt at halftime that we had survived their best shot," Gordon said. "They had the ball and moved the ball, but it was still 6-6."

"We had some breaks, but perhaps we created some of it, too. Maybe we knocked some of those balls loose."
