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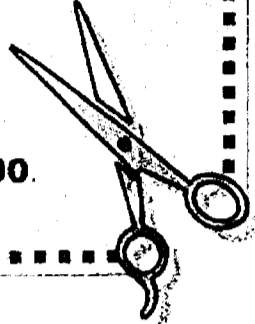

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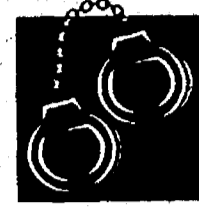
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Traffic spat ends in slaying



A Westland man was shot to death Sunday following an involved traffic altercation. A second Westland man faces second-degree murder and felony firearms charges.

A Westland man was shot to death Sunday night on a residential street — a killing that police have linked to an earlier traffic altercation between strangers.

Antonio Fillippo Maggio, 24, was

shot four times with an assault rifle and died of a head wound during the 7:28 p.m. shooting in the 2000 block of Christine, southeast of Wayne Road and Palmer, Westland Detective Sgt. Marc Stobbe said.

Another Westland man, Thomas Robert Woodhead, 18, was arraigned

Tuesday morning before 18th District Judge Gail McKnight on second-degree murder and felony firearms charges. He remains in custody and has been denied bond.

Maggio died amid a shower of 20 bullets from an assault rifle — an attack that Stobbe said stemmed from an earlier traffic dispute between Maggio and a friend of Woodhead's.

The incident began when Maggio and two 24-year-old Westland men, riding in a van on south Wayne Road near Palmer, became angry that a Camaro in front of them was moving

too slowly, Stobbe said. The men began blowing the horn of the van and flashing the high beams of the headlights, Stobbe said.

The driver of the Camaro responded by hitting his brakes, prompting the van to pass. But Maggio, a passenger in the van, got out of the van and approached the Camaro when the two vehicles stopped at the Wayne-Palmer traffic light, Stobbe said.

The Camaro driver, accompanied by a passenger, drove away and went

Schools expel gun-toting teens

Three students accused of bringing guns to school in separate incidents have been expelled from the Wayne-Westland school district.

The expulsions were approved Monday night in a unanimous vote of five school board members; two members were absent.

Expelled were Brian Nesbitt, a John Glenn 11th-grader, Phillip Rodriguez, an Adams Junior High eighth-grader, and Jamie Waldrop, a Stevenson Junior High ninth-grader.

The expulsions continued the board's policy of dealing harshly with students who bring weapons onto school property. No injuries were reported in any of the incidents.

The John Glenn incident occurred Jan. 14 when a student brought a loaded .38-caliber handgun to school, Greg Baracy, assistant superintendent for general administration, has said.

The gun was found in a student's duffel bag by school officials who investigated reports by another student that the gun was in school.

The Adams incident occurred Dec. 1 when a student brought a .45-caliber revolver to school, school officials have said. The school was tipped off about the gun by a neighbor who said she had earlier been the target of an attempted robbery.

The Stevenson incident occurred Dec. 2 when a student brought a BB gun to school. The gun was discharged in a lunchroom, but the BB hit a hamburger and no one was injured, Baracy has said.

Due process hearings were held for all three students — none of whom later appealed the expulsions, according to resolutions read at Monday's school board meeting.

Canton Township clerk sets sights on Senate seat

Less government and more common sense is the prescription Canton Township Clerk Loren Bennett wants to write for the state of Michigan.

He wants to win the Republican nomination this summer and run against Sen. William Faust, D-Westland, who has been in the state legislature since January, 1967. Faust, a former Nankin Township supervisor and senate majority leader, hasn't announced whether he will seek an eighth four-year term.

"There will be no one in the state Senate who will be more frugal than me. That's not campaign rhetoric. That's my record," said Bennett, who announced his candidacy last week.

The senate district includes

Westland, Canton Township and other southwestern Wayne County cities and townships.

"While I have an enormous amount of respect and admiration for Sen. Faust, I believe he is part of the problem. He has consistently supported more government, not less. He has all too often been willing to stick taxpayers with the tab for programs that don't work and often make Michigan's problems worse," said Bennett, who was first elected as clerk in 1988 and re-elected in November 1992.

Bennett said he will oppose tax increases and support budgets that reduce spending.

Bennett told the gathering of senior adults and township leaders that he supports the school finance reform proposal on the March 15 ballot. "I believe there

is a component of the argument that is not being talked about," he added.

That's the underground economy of legal activities — such as house cleaning services, paid for under-the-table — as well as illegal activities, such as drug trafficking. Neither of these groups pay income tax on their earnings. But they do pay sales tax for items purchased.

"When that occurs we're capturing that whole underground economy," said Bennett.

Bennett said he learned what he called his common sense management and budget trimming sensibility in the private sector when he worked as a manager for British Petroleum, a controller for the Plymouth Hilton and his own real estate business.

"I know the men and women

who live, work and raise their families here want a government that provides for the help and service they need and allows them the opportunities to prosper and provide for themselves, without having to shoulder the burden of a bloated bureaucracy," Bennett said.

He was recently elected vice chairman of the Michigan Underground Storage Tank Financial Assurance Policy Board and is a member of the Wayne County Solid Waste Implementation Committee. Bennett also has served as co-chairman of the Police Reorganization Committee, arbitrator for union grievances and member of a farmland preservation group.

Bennett and his wife, Terri, have two daughters, Wendy, 15, and Cindy, 10.

Teen imprisoned for robbery

A Garden City teen has been sentenced to prison for three to 10 years for robbing a 14-year-old Westland boy at gunpoint and taking his \$150 Miami Hurricanes coat.

Jason Krasson, 18, also has been sentenced to eight to 15 years for an attempted murder in which a Wayne apartment was sprayed with bullets while four people were inside. No one was injured.

The two incidents weren't related, said Wayne police Sgt. Christopher Johnson.

Krasson, who pleaded guilty to the charges last month, was sentenced Monday by Detroit Recorder's Court Judge Dalton Roberson. Krasson also received a mandatory two-year term for a felony firearms charge stemming from the Wayne incident.

Cases are still pending against two of Krasson's friends — co-defendants Michael Elkins, 17, and

Christopher Boyd, 18, both of Westland.

Krasson pleaded guilty Feb. 8 to the attempted killing in which a unit at the old Nankin Apartments, 35550 Michigan Ave. in Wayne, was sprayed with bullets from a .22-caliber rifle and a 12-gauge sawed-off shotgun. The incident occurred Dec. 6.

Krasson also pleaded guilty to armed robbery charges stemming from a Nov. 28 incident in which the 14-year-old boy was robbed at gunpoint near Wayne Road and Fairchild in Westland. The boy wasn't injured.

The Wayne shooting stemmed from a dispute between Krasson and acquaintances and had nothing to do with the Westland robbery, Johnson said.

Krasson was initially arrested on the Westland charge and was later linked to the Wayne incident. He could have faced a maximum sentence of life in prison when he was sentenced Monday.

Ford joins school restoration effort

The Perrinsville School restoration project has received a \$1,000 donation from North Brothers Ford.

Project coordinators and the Friends of the Helen C. Brown Westland Historical Museum were pleased with the donation, which was made to the "brick walkway" program, said Joseph Benyo, Westland City Council liaison.

To complete the restoration of the 1856 one-room schoolhouse, project organizers have decided to engrave donors' names on bricks

that form a walkway at the school, Benyo said. The school on Warren Road was the first brick-constructed school in Nankin Township, now Westland.

Those who wish to have an engraved brick to commemorate either themselves or a family member are being asked to donate \$100 for each brick, Benyo said. Part of the building has been completed, but a phase to rebuild the bell tower and to construct an outbuilding still has to be completed.

The ultimate goal is to have

teachers and students use the building for such events as field trips, so they can see how previous generations were educated.

North Brothers Ford hopes its donation of \$1,000 for 10 bricks will be matched by others in the community, Benyo said.

Individuals, groups or businesses wishing to "buy" a brick may contact Benyo, 467-3183. He has the necessary forms for the project.

No more than 20 letters total may be used for each brick.

Handicapped parking violators face stiffer fines, judges say

Able-bodied motorists who park illegally in handicapped spaces in Westland will now face stiffer fines.

Westland District Judges Gail McKnight and C. Charles Bokos have announced their joint decision to increase the fines to \$75 from \$50.

The decision comes on the heels of a crackdown by Westland police on the handicapped parking violations. Police officers have beefed up patrols of retail parking lots in the wake of citizen complaints.

The complaints began to surface in growing numbers during

the Christmas shopping season, but continued into 1994.

"This increase (in fines) is in response to the numerous complaints the police and the court have received regarding parking violators," Judge Bokos said in a press release.

Bokos added that violators who fail to respond to the citations will be brought to court for a contempt hearing. Arrest warrants will be issued for offenders who don't show for a hearing, Bokos said.

"The issuance of a warrant for these violations is something new for the court, but considering the volume of complaints the police are receiving and the numbers of persons not answering the charges, we be-

lieve that it is our only recourse in enforcing these violations," he said.

Bokos also noted that some motorists who have handicapped parking permits sometimes forget that the permits must be renewed, while some motorists don't have their permits properly displayed.

For those violators, the fines will be reduced to only \$10 if motorists submit proof of a valid permit to 18th District Court, Bokos said.

"These permits do expire, and permit holders should check their expiration dates to ensure they are in full compliance with the law," the press release said.

School officials praise departing finance director

Wayne-Westland's top school finance officer drew sweeping praise Monday during his first school board meeting since being lured to a new job in the Livonia district.

Randy Liepa, assistant superintendent for business and operations, will leave Wayne-Westland June 30 for a similar post in the Livonia school district.

"He has helped take us through the most difficult financial year in this district's history," Superintendent Larry Thomas said Monday.

School officials had to slash \$14 million from the district's budget after voters refused to approve a tax increase. Moreover, Liepa oversaw the budget during a whirlwind of state-level changes in school financing.

"We will never replace you," Thomas told Liepa. "We will get someone to come in and take over your job."

School board member Laurel Raisanen noted that Wayne-Westland's loss is Livonia's gain.

"They are very lucky people over there, and they have an excellent eye for talent," she said. "Randy will be missed very, very much."

Liepa, 31, was hired as Wayne-Westland's supervisor of accounting in 1987 and was later promoted to his current post. He is in his third year as the district's top finance official.

His financial expertise helped to restore some of the public trust that Wayne-Westland had lost in recent years, though voters continued to turn thumbs down on tax increases.

On Monday, the school board gave Thomas permission to post Liepa's job. Liepa said he hopes his successor will be hired early enough so that the two can prepare for a smooth transition in the finance department.

Gallery exhibits children's art

Youth Art Month is celebrated at Nelson's Gallery/Custom Framing in Livonia with 34 art pieces created by local elementary school students.

Hospital offers health screening

Project Health-O-Rama will be 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. Saturday, March 19, in the auditorium of St. Mary Hospital, Levan at Five Mile in Livonia.

The free health screening for those 18 and older includes a health hazard appraisal, height and weight measurement, blood pressure measurement, vision/glaucoma test, counseling/referral, medication counseling, skin cancer screening, and mental health awareness counseling.

Optional tests include: a take-home colorectal test for \$4; blood panel, a profile of 22 tests, for \$15 (fasting is advised for four hours prior to arrival; continue to take any prescribed medications); prostate specific antigen (PSA) test for \$25; and a pulmonary function test for \$5.

New this year is the addition of HDL (high-density lipoprotein cholesterol) to the blood panel. HDL is the lipid fraction known as "good cholesterol" because high levels are associated with a decreased risk of heart disease.

Project Health-O-Rama is an extensive community effort conducted Tuesday, March 1, through Thursday, March 31. Anyone 18 or older may take advantage of the free/low-cost screening tests and educational materials.

It is estimated that the average participant obtains eight health screening tests/services valued at more than \$200 per participant, totaling nearly \$10 million in services to all participants.

Those with abnormal test results are followed up by phone two or three months after the program to encourage continued good health.

Project Health-O-Rama is sponsored by Blue Cross/Blue Shield of Michigan, Blue Care Network of Southeast Michigan, WXYZ-TV, and the United Health Organization, a United Way agency.

Elevator shaft fire causes \$10,000 damage

Plymouth and Plymouth Township firefighters were called to put out an elevator shaft fire at 2:47 p.m. Monday at Adistra Corp. on Union Street.

An electrical motor apparently overheated and a wooden floor caught fire. No one was trapped in the building's elevator, nor was anyone injured in the blaze, extinguished within moments by firefighters using an aerial truck and other equipment.

The fire was unrelated to the three-week-old strike ongoing at Adistra, said Plymouth fire Chief Al Matthews.

"We had a concern about debris dropping

down to the shaft into wood structures below," said Matthews. The fire was contained before that happened.

As firefighters left the scene, they responded in their rigs to a call from Lina's Bridal Salon on Main Street. It turned out to be a false alarm.

Street residents was identified as Woodhead, Stobbe said.

When the men in the Mustang pulled behind Maggio, he put the stolen Camaro in reverse and slammed into the Mustang, Stobbe said. That prompted two of the men to get out of the Mustang, and one of them opened fire with the assault rifle and fired 20 shots, Stobbe said. The men fled the scene, but moments later police arrested two suspects.

One of the men was later released, but Woodhead was charged in the killing.

A not guilty plea was entered for him Tuesday morning in 18th District Court. He is scheduled for a preliminary examination

to the June Street residence where Woodhead lives to seek help, but they were trailed by the van, Stobbe said.

The Camaro driver and passenger left the car running when they went to Woodhead's door to seek help, and Maggio got out of the van, stole the Camaro and drove away, Stobbe said. The other two men in the van left the scene.

The Camaro owner, joined by two June Street residents, then got into a 1983 Mustang and — armed with an assault rifle — began trailing Maggio to Christine Street, where he lived, the detective said. One of the June

Woodhead could face up to life in prison if convicted of second-degree murder. The felony firearms charge carries a mandatory two-year term upon conviction.

Services for Maggio, a welder, were scheduled for 1 p.m. today at Uht Funeral Home. Interment is to be at Cadillac Memorial Gardens West.

He is survived by a daughter, Desirae; parents, Philip and Anna Maggio; a brother, Philip Jr.; three sisters, Angela, Tonja and Meija Lee; and a grandfather, Philip.

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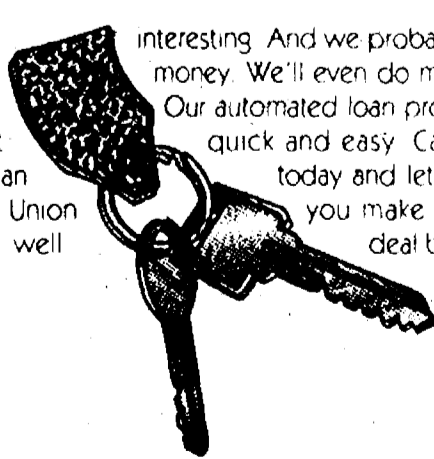

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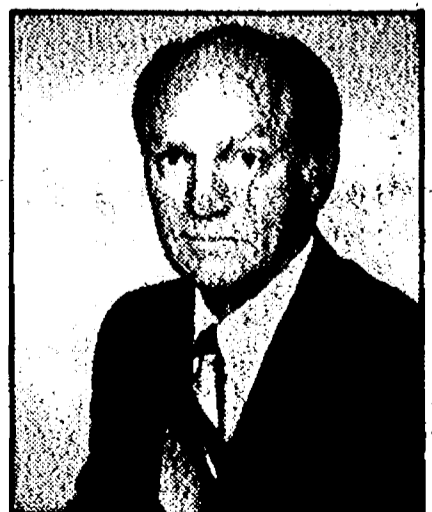
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New SC building still taking shape

After five months of construction work, Schoolcraft College's 61,000-square-foot, \$7.8-million student services center is on schedule and on budget for completion in October and occupation in January 1995, according to Adelard "Butch" Raby, Schoolcraft's vice president of business.

"It will really, in the next 60 days, begin to look like a building," Raby said.

Designed by Redstone Associates of Southfield, the new structure occupies an acre to the south and west of the library on Haggerty Road.

According to Raby, all underground utility work is complete. Water, gas and electric services are operable. Structural steel erection is complete, with all exterior concrete block in place. The exterior face brick is 30 percent complete. The roof membrane is complete.

Major equipment like boilers, chillers and cooling towers have been set in place. The rough plumbing for heating is installed. The interior masonry work is 70 percent complete. The rough plumbing is 50 percent complete. The fire suppression system is 50 percent complete. The electrical system is 25 percent complete. The ventilating system is 40 percent complete. Overall, the project is 40 percent finished.

Half of the construction cost is being paid by the state government. Schoolcraft pays the other half.

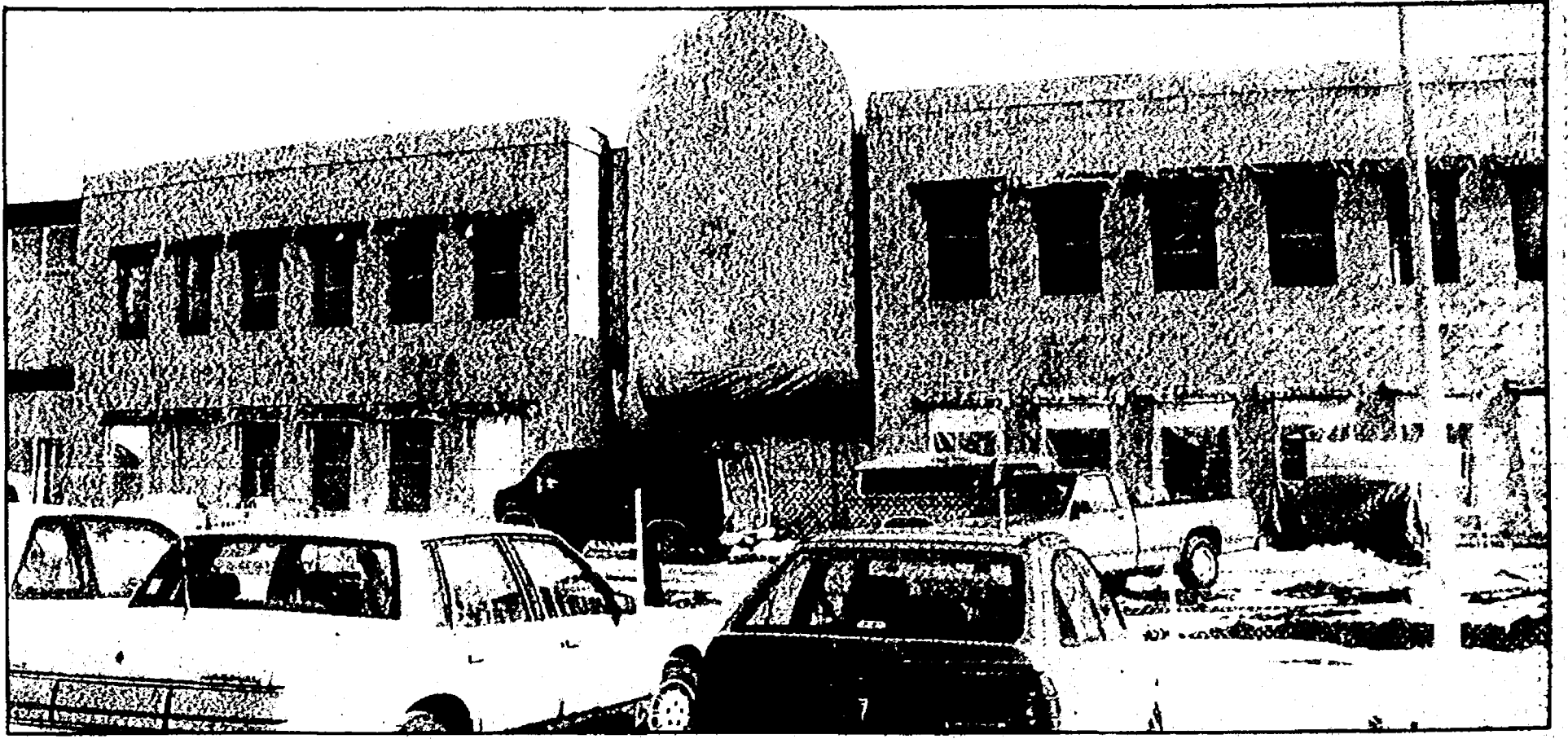

The offices of registration, admissions, cashier, learning assistance and counseling will move in, as will the placement office, accounting, purchasing, the Women's Resource Center and part of the business office.

The child care center, currently occupying a house, will move into the cinder-block building vacated by the counseling department. The four houses currently harboring the accounting office, purchasing office, women's center and child care center will be sold or razed.

The three-story building will also hold eight new classrooms and a computer lab with 90 computers. Five additional classrooms will be opened in the Liberal Arts Building when the learning assistance center moves.

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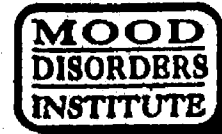


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Livonia man heads car seat drive for kids

Livonia resident James Mariani wants more people to restrain their children — out of love and concern.

Mariani, the regional vice president of Primerica Financial Services of Farmington Hills, is leading the Michigan portion of a nationwide Primerica campaign to provide child car seats to needy families.

Mariani, 28, and his wife Juliette hope to raise \$375,000 in the

next four years to buy 25,000 child car seats that would be distributed by area hospitals, health agencies and fire stations.

"It was just something that kind of hit us in the heart, because we've got kids ourselves," Mariani said.

The campaign is called "Operation Baby Buckle" and ties in with the release in June of "The Flintstones" movie. Hanna-Barbera Productions Inc. and the Ron McNair Foundation are also involved. Overall, Primerica

hopes to raise \$1.5 million in the next four years and buy 100,000 car seats.

The seats will be purchased wholesale for \$15 each from Century Carseats. These seats generally retail for \$45 to \$80.

County gives green light to 14 area roads

Wayne County government hopes to quicken the flow of traffic on 14 roads by installing fancy traffic signal systems.

Urban sprawl: SEMCOG report says slow it down

Without a peep of controversy, the Southeast Michigan Council of Governments has adopted a strategy report to slow down "urban sprawl" — the development of suburban open space with little population increase.

SEMCOG's General Assembly last week approved a 40-page strategy to save older cities and infrastructure, including reclaiming contaminated sites.

"Revitalizing Urban Communities" contained no hint of the charge of "racism," which deeply offended Oakland, western Wayne and Macomb delegates two years ago during debate over the Regional Development Initiative (RDI).

"The new document started in the RDI," said John Amberger, SEMCOG's executive director. "There were five major findings in RDI. One was that we need to do a better job at the suburban level of managing growth so it doesn't turn into sprawl."

"If we can have quality growth in the suburbs, and don't just suck out jobs, that's part of the equation," Amberger said. "It (the new report) is positive for older areas."

People shifted

Crux of the problem: SEMCOG expects the amount of developed land to increase 40 percent in the seven-county region in 20 years while population rises only 6 percent — a shifting of people without real growth.

Twin evils: abandonment of older, built-up areas and heavy taxpayer burdens to serve newly developed land.

"Cooperation between urban centers and their surrounding suburbs could be enhanced," the SEMCOG policy says. "By joining together, all communities in the region will enjoy greater economic success."

One recommendation calls for "quick take" laws allowing older communities to assemble the large land parcels required by modern industry. Another would allow property tax breaks to be given only by "disinvested areas" to end the bidding war between communities.

SEMCOG points a finger of blame at a law it once praised — PA 233 of 1990, the so-called "Polluters Pay" act. The planning agency now says the law "tightly restricts" redevelopment of land in urban areas.

SEMCOG continues its call for a stronger public transit system, noting 33 percent of Detroit families and 12 percent in the region have no auto.

Amberger said the "Revitalizing" report benefited from much suburban input. Task force members included Joan Buser, Oakland Township supervisor; Don Gross, Southfield community development director; Tim Pope, Novi councilman and aide to Sen. David Honigman of West Bloomfield; Nancy Bates, an aide to Rep. Jan Dolan of Farmington Hills; and officials from such Wayne County communities as Dearborn, Southgate and Grosse Pointe Farms.

'Superb work'

SEMCOG also unveiled its new handbook "Land Use Tools and Techniques."

"It's an absolutely superb work," said Amberger. "We'd like to get a copy into the hands of every zoning official in the region, and even the state."

Oakland Township's Buser, outlining the work, said it would help suburban officials retain open space and the character of their communities even as development arrives.

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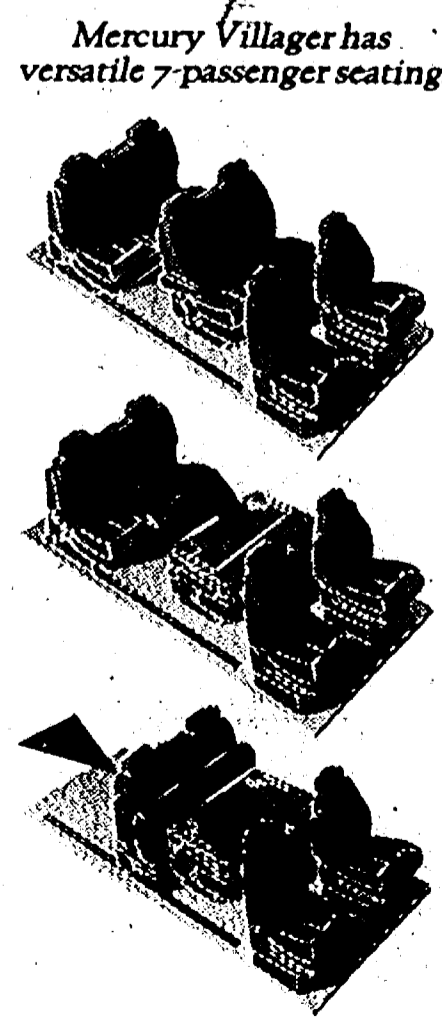

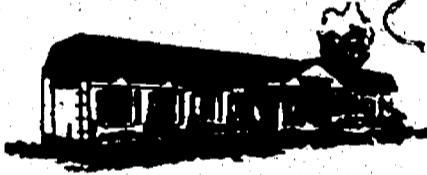

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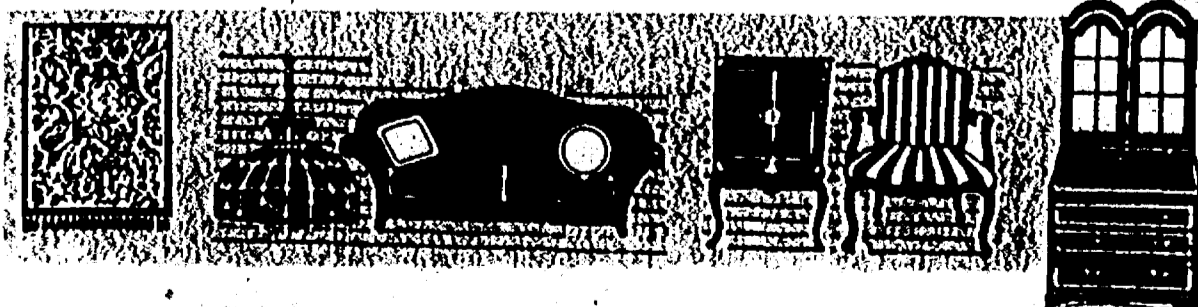

Young, old face greater risk of burns

A young child reaches up to the stove and pulls the handle of a pan that dumps boiling liquid on him. An elderly woman reaches across a front burner to check on something on the rear burner and her robe catches fire.

These are just two of the common instances that cause serious burns that could easily have been avoided. That's what medical and public safety professionals are emphasizing to the public.

"The greatest risks seem to be to the young and the old," said Lt. Mike Garr, a fire prevention specialist.

In fact, fire and burn injuries are the second-leading cause of accidental deaths in children from ages 1 to 4 and the third-leading cause of injury and death for ages 1 to 18.

Health professionals are trying to make parents, and those who care for children such as grandparents and baby sitters, aware of the dangers, especially in the kitchen.

"About 80 percent of those accidents happen in kitchens," said Claudella Jones, director of the National Institute for Burn Medicine in Ann Arbor. "That's where there is a lot of exposure to hot water and flame. And it's usually older adults and children 0 to 4."

Burns, which can be severe, don't necessarily come as a result of catching fire or having scalding water spill on a child. A water heater that heats to 140 degrees can cause a serious burn in five seconds with water from a tap

while the same damage would take five minutes with the water temperature at 120 degrees, Jones said. Another common type of burn involves drinking liquid or eating food that is too hot after it is boiled on the stove or in the microwave, where heating can be uneven and deceptive.

Burn patients require specific treatments that most hospitals cannot deal with beyond immediate first aid. For that reason, most serious burn patients in southeastern Michigan are taken to either the University of Michigan Burn Center in Ann Arbor or Detroit Receiving Hospital's burn unit.

Although burn treatment has come a long way over the years, serious burns are not only some of the most painful injuries, but often leave lasting scars.

Dawn Lang, a community relations specialist with Receiving who has also worked at the U-M Burn Center, said a camping accident that caused third-degree burns over 45 percent of her body was devastating in more than one way.

"We were camping in the U.P.," she said. "A camping stove exploded. They had to take me to U of M. I was there for 18 weeks."

Not only was her recovery a long one, Lang was 10 when the accident took place. Her teen years, a time when acceptance is important for girls, was especially difficult.

"I went through a lot of pain," she said. "It was a difficult time of my life to have to adjust."

That experience led Lang to a career in educating the public about burn prevention and treatment.

"I'm an advocate for burn awareness," she said. "And I can base it on my experience."

The best immediate first aid for burns is cold water, Garr said. Other "home remedies," such as butter or other treatments either worsen the problem, lead to infection or must be removed — a painful process — before the area can be examined and treated at a medical facility.

Children playing with matches is a problem, but one that parents can have some control over, Jones said.

"Parents can teach their kids how to use matches," she said. "Let them light birthday candles and talk about what ways it is appropriate to use matches."

Many families have both parents working, leaving the children on their own and giving them the opportunity to play with fire, Jones said. That's why guidance is important.

Older adults are often the victims of fires caused by smoking in bed. Burning trash, where the wind can shift, is also a dangerous situation for older adults who cannot respond quickly to the shift.

People should have two routes of escape, use smoke detectors and have a place to meet outside, so that no one goes back into a fire looking for someone who already may have escaped.

Science program wins award for innovation

Ignited by a mother's concern about her young daughter's science education, Lawrence Technological University's Partnership for Science Literacy was named one of eight programs nationwide to win a Merck Innovation Award in Science Teaching and a portion of the \$200,000 in grants.

Lawrence Tech's partnership program was cited by Merck because it "provides workshops for Detroit area elementary and middle-school teachers to increase their knowledge of physics concepts and develop their skills in teaching physics through hands-on activities."

Maria Vaz, director of natural sciences at Lawrence Tech, has seen the partnership program

through its first five years and said this national recognition is a happy milestone for the partnership.

"I think this is a measure of our success," said Vaz.

The key to the workshops, which attract more than 60 teachers from throughout the metropolitan Detroit area every year, is offering practical, hands-on exercises using inexpensive equipment that can be used in the classroom by third- to eighth-grade teachers.

The workshops touch on various scientific disciplines and principles, and provide help for teachers who feel overwhelmed in trying to make science interesting to their students.

"The problem is not that physics and chemistry are ill-suited to

certain students or age groups, but that teachers themselves felt unprepared and unable to teach physical sciences creatively, in a way that connects with these students," Vaz said.

This year the Society of Automotive Engineers has joined the partnership as a sponsor and will introduce portions of its popular World in Motion program. The partnership was opened to private and parochial schools last year.

Women and minority students at Lawrence Tech also are a vital part of the partnership team. They visit the schools to wow elementary and middle school students with scientific demonstrations. The Lawrence Tech students are fulfilling one of the

most important components of the partnership, Vaz said.

"They are role models who give the school children a little extra attention and motivation," Vaz said. "The Lawrence Tech students get a lot out of doing the demonstrations. They enjoy it because the children interact with them so well."

The partnership program, which is also funded by a Higher Education Competitive Grant from the Dwight D. Eisenhower Mathematics and Science Education Act, is staffed by Marilyn Rands, associate professor of physics; Scott Schneider, assistant professor of physics, and Ronald Livingston, of the Barbour Magnet Middle School in Detroit.

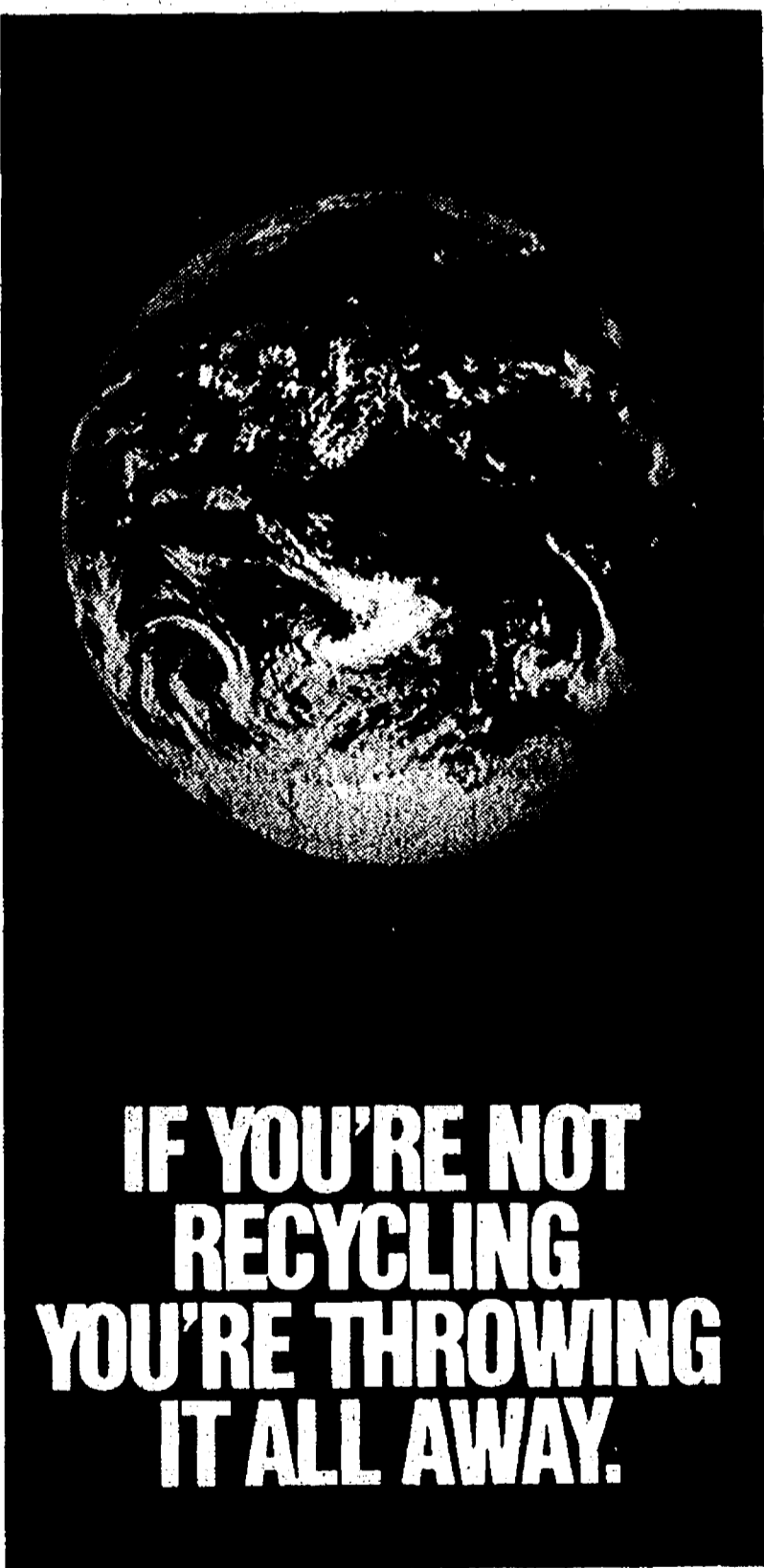

Council fuss

Brown wrong in gavel-passing

City Council president Thomas Brown has been in government a long time. And he certainly knows parliamentary procedures. Since the late 1950s, he has been a Nankin Township trustee, treasurer and supervisor; served as Westland's first mayor; and later represented half of the city in the state Legislature.

He was named to a city council vacancy in early 1986, won election to a four-year term in 1987, and was re-elected to a second term in 1991.

But he was caught in his political underwear last week by Dorothy Smith, a longtime political watchdog and council-watcher.

She claimed that Brown violated the city charter by passing his gavel to another council member, who then presided over the council session.

While Brown vehemently denied any wrongdoing, Smith gained a surprising ally — city attorney Angelo Plakas.

The attorney, in a written legal opinion on the issue, concluded that the council president must chair council meetings. There are two narrow exceptions which are spelled out in the charter.

But the exceptions didn't mesh with what Brown was doing in allowing Councilwoman Sandra Cicirelli, who is also council president pro-tem, to chair most of a recent business meeting.

"Since this is an election year for judge, I just wondered if it was a matter of exposure," Smith commented without directly accusing anyone.

Plakas confirmed that Brown should preside over council meetings, though Cicirelli could step in during his absence.

■ Council watchdog Dorothy Smith's complaint that council president Tom Brown was wrong in allowing a colleague to chair meetings was supported by a legal opinion by the city attorney.

As lawyers would say, the most telling evidence in the political dispute comes from Plakas, who said that "the president pro tem may only chair an entire meeting of the council when the council president is absent . . ."

Smith's complaint was based on a belief that Brown was attempting to give Cicirelli greater public visibility in her planned fall campaign as a district judge candidate, opposing Judge C. Charles Bokos.

Brown and Cicirelli denied the claim. But it appears that Smith was on target.

The bottom line is that Brown, one of the longest-serving public officials in the community's history, and Cicirelli, an attorney in private practice, should have known better than to get involved in a questionable handling of a council session.

If they had any questions about the gavel-passing change, they could have done two things: read the charter concerning the council president's duties and/or consulted with the city attorney.

In the end, Brown said the city attorney's opinion will be reviewed, and "we will conduct these meetings as prescribed."

We certainly hope so.

In the meantime, Smith and the Observer will continue to keep an eye on the gavel.

DCL to OU: A good move

Detroit College of Law is thinking about hitting Eight Mile, a phrase that has come to hold very negative connotations. This move, though, to Oakland University is one that affects Detroit little and could have a tremendous impact on Oakland County.

In the hub of Detroit are currently three law schools — the University of Detroit on Jefferson, DCL on Elizabeth and the Wayne State University Law School. Those three are more than half of the law schools in the entire state. (The other two are the University of Michigan Law School in Ann Arbor and Cooley Law School in Lansing.) Losing one law school in Detroit would have little impact on the city.

Although it's still in its earliest stage of talks, DCL is thinking of being an independent college located on the Oakland University campus in Rochester Hills. There is no law school currently in Oakland County, and a third of DCL's student body is composed of Oakland County residents. We see it as an added convenience for Oakland County residents who don't want to travel 20 or 30 miles to class each day.

Additionally, should the law school stay in Detroit and the new Tiger stadium be built, DCL officials worry about the impact on its students. DCL Dean Dave Favre already is concerned that a stadium so close to the Elizabeth Street campus would make it difficult for night students to attend night classes.

The move would also be a feather in the cap of Oakland University. The campus would offer a variety of opportunities to Oakland County residents, offering everything from bachelor's

degrees to law degrees without ever having to seek new surroundings.

The reason that this is a "win-win" for both Oakland University and for Detroit is that moving the law school would free up land for another purpose. DCL sits on land that currently is rumored for the location of the proposed new Tiger stadium. The DCL land is relatively tight for a campus but spacious enough for added parking or other stadium-related uses.

The transformation of the land from school to business puts the land back on the city of Detroit's tax rolls, since educational institutions are tax-exempt. The added available space also gives Tigers' owner Mike Ilitch a more concentrated center of development.

Freeing up the land will also give Detroit the opportunity to establish the area with its own identity. The area near Woodward Avenue easily could become the entertainment center of Detroit, providing everything from baseball to theater to a major comedy club.

Surviving sexual abuse

Counseling can help ease pain, restore dignity

A child's piercing cry as he awakens from a nightmare. A lack of trust in others. Fears of getting hurt or killed. Anger at the world. Inappropriate touching. A feeling of lack of control over one's body and life. There are behavior problems as well as depression and feelings of guilt and shame.

There is also a denial of what has happened. Headaches and stomach aches won't go away.

There is a rage that is close to spilling over the edge.

These are just a few of the symptoms which may result from the trauma of childhood sexual abuse.

Sexual abuse can be defined as any sexual contact where one individual uses his power and control in a relationship to make a victim submit to sexual demands.

Sexual abuse includes but isn't limited to fondling, exploitation for pornography or prostitution, and sexual penetration.

Research has shown that in a majority

of cases, the victim knows the sexual abuser or perpetrator.

The perpetrator may be known either as a family member or as someone who has contact with the family and the child.

Childhood sexual abuse affects not only the child and his or her family but the entire community.

Left untreated, sexual abuse survivors may endure many of the symptoms listed above.

They may live with shattered expectations and hopes in a world where others cannot be trusted.

They may lack feelings of self-worth and dignity, be unable to pursue productive goals, and exist in the shadows of despair, loss and trauma.

Whether you are trying to help a child or if you are a childhood sexual abuse survivor, realize that it is never easy to deal with the abuse.

However, there are many positive steps

you can take. Admit to yourself that you or your child was sexually abused.

This takes a lot of courage as it may feel easier to tuck your experiences and feelings inside and pretend you and your family are OK even if they are not.

Believe in yourself and your child. Sexual abuse survivors rarely lie about their abuse.

Be supportive and encouraging. Seek professional help so you and your child can have a safe place to express feelings and heal from the abuse.

Place blame for what has happened where it belongs — on the perpetrator. Don't blame yourself or your family.

If you suspect your child has been abused, see a physician immediately. Call protective services and/or your local police department. Sexual abuse is a crime and needs to be reported to the proper authorities.

Make sure your child does not have continued contact with the perpetrator. You are innocent unless you are the

abuser.

You could not have seen the abuse coming or magically made it stop. Be good to yourself and your family. Believe in how special you are and get the help you need.

Having counseled many sexual abuse survivors and their families, I realize the pain can be devastating.

It can feel like your whole world is being torn apart and nothing feels good anymore. However, no matter how much pain you feel now, it does get better. Children and families do heal. Have faith.

Remember that help is only a phone call away.

Farmers catch huge break if Proposal A passes

U usually I answer readers' questions about Proposal A in the news columns.

But last week one question called for both facts and opinion, which I herewith supply.

I live in Detroit and own 19 acres on Buno Road (Milford Township). I see a bias in this school finance reform plan against a person who owns agricultural property . . .

Count them, and you will find agri-business people have many advantages over their city and suburban cousins under the new school finance laws.

Not only do agri-business people get the lower residential property tax rate (6 or 12 mills) on their homesteads, but they also get it on contiguous and adjacent farmland that is unoccupied — the business part of their property.

They will pay the full 24 mills only on non-contiguous land and on land they rent to someone else.

Contrast this with the treatment given city folks:

The small-town Main Street merchant who lives upstairs from his store

pays 24 mills on the downstairs portion of his property.

The college-town widow who rents a couple of rooms to students gets the homestead rate only on the part of the home she occupies.

The students' quarters will be taxed the full 24 mills.

All along, agri-businesses have had special advantages.

Remember the Robin Hood act in which property taxes on city and suburban commerce and industry were to be shared?

Rural districts would take a share of city and suburban business taxes, but farmers wouldn't have to share taxes on agri-businesses, which are considered residential.

The school finance reform movement was fueled on the farm.

Remember that comparison of poor districts spending \$2,500 per student while rich ones spent \$9,000?

The poorest districts were all in the farm counties of The Thumb.

Many poor districts' problems could

have been alleviated by consolidation — sharing of taxes and administrative costs. Give Midland County farmers a cut of the Dow plant by making a countywide district.

Give Berrien County farmers a cut of the nuclear plant's taxes by consolidating the rural districts around Bridgman.

Two state senators who suggested such a common-sense solution got burned.

Suburbanite Jack Faxon of Farmington Hills and city man John Schwarz of Battle Creek learned the hard way that small town politics are extremely important to agri-business people, and consolidation is heresy, even if their kids got better-run and better-financed schools.

Well, the Robin Hood law was tied up in court, and now we have a reform plan that shares all property taxes statewide.

It's a whopping victory for agri-business.

The cap on assessments in Proposal A will benefit lakelake homeowners,

but we tend to overlook its special benefit to agri-business in growth corridors.

Assessment growth would be limited to 5 percent until the agri-business person sells to an industrial park developer or mega-fact.

Such are the facts. You also asked for an opinion.

Not content with these advantages, agri-businessmen are demanding that all farm property be taxed as residential — even disjointed pieces, even farms owned as investments, even rented farm land.

The Farm Bureau endorsed Proposal A but got a concession from Gov. John Engler (who was raised on a farm) to support amendments giving the agri-business lobby everything it wants.

My opinion is that any further picking of the public pocket by agri-business would be immoral and selfish beyond belief.

U-M flower and garden show brings spring a little bit closer

When I was younger, winters didn't seem to go on this long.

There was hockey on the pond, with hot cocoa afterward. I looked forward to the occasional snowstorm, if only because there would be skiing afterward. And there was always a fire in the fireplace and a warm spot to sit and read.

But this year, it seems winter has gone on forever. Here we are at the beginning of March, the snow is still on the ground, and the deep frost is still freezing the water pipes.

Worse, the flower and vegetable catalogs start fluttering through the mail at this time of the year. Looking at the bright pictures on the newest rose or thinking about planting strawberries take on a certain fictional quality when it's below-zero outside.

Coming up, however, is a good reality check: The Flower and Garden Show, sponsored by the University of Michigan's Matthaei Botanical Gardens, will open March 24 for four days at the Washtenaw Farm Council Grounds east of Ann Arbor.

I've been to past shows; they're fun and they make concrete the assertion that spring is coming.

This year's show will feature an acre of professionally designed landscapes and more than 500 horticultural and floral design exhibits. For those who are serious about their gardening, there is also a Standard Flower Show produced in cooperation with the Federated Garden Clubs of Michigan.

The show also benefits a very good and very under-reported cause, the Matthaei Botanical Gardens. Located on an enormous piece of land given to the U-M years ago by former Regent Frederick C. Matthaei, the gardens started out as a fairly standard academic collection of greenhouses and research plots.

But with Patricia Hopkinson's arrival as acting director, the place started to get with it.

New gardens were planted, this time with the interests of the average Michigan gardener in mind. Adult education classes taught pruning,

plant identification and garden design. This year's perennial sale will offer 25,000 plants in early May, and wildflower tours and nature walks happen throughout the year.

The gardens adopted a new statement of purpose: "We aim to contribute to a better quality of life for the world community by maintaining a living museum and plant sanctuary where a dynamic interaction of scientific, educational and aesthetic pursuits can take place within the context of a world-class university." A Friends organization was launched to raise money. Birmingham's Frederick Matthaei Jr., son of the original donor, has continued his family's tradition of generous giving.

So if you want to get a jump on spring, get a few gardening tips and at the same time give support to a good cause, you might want to check out the Flower and Garden Show. I'll see you there.

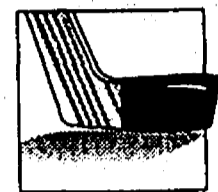

The meet was over and, for many of the swimmers, the three-day affair ended the season, too.

But long before North Farmington's 400-yard freestyle relay

squad overtook its counterpart from Farmington to win the final event, the outcome was known.

Plymouth Salem, meet host and defending champion in the Western Lakes Activities Association, had won once again.

This was old stuff to coach Chuck Olson, who had guided the Rocks to seven previous championships. So the traditional post-meet dunking was out of the question, certainly.

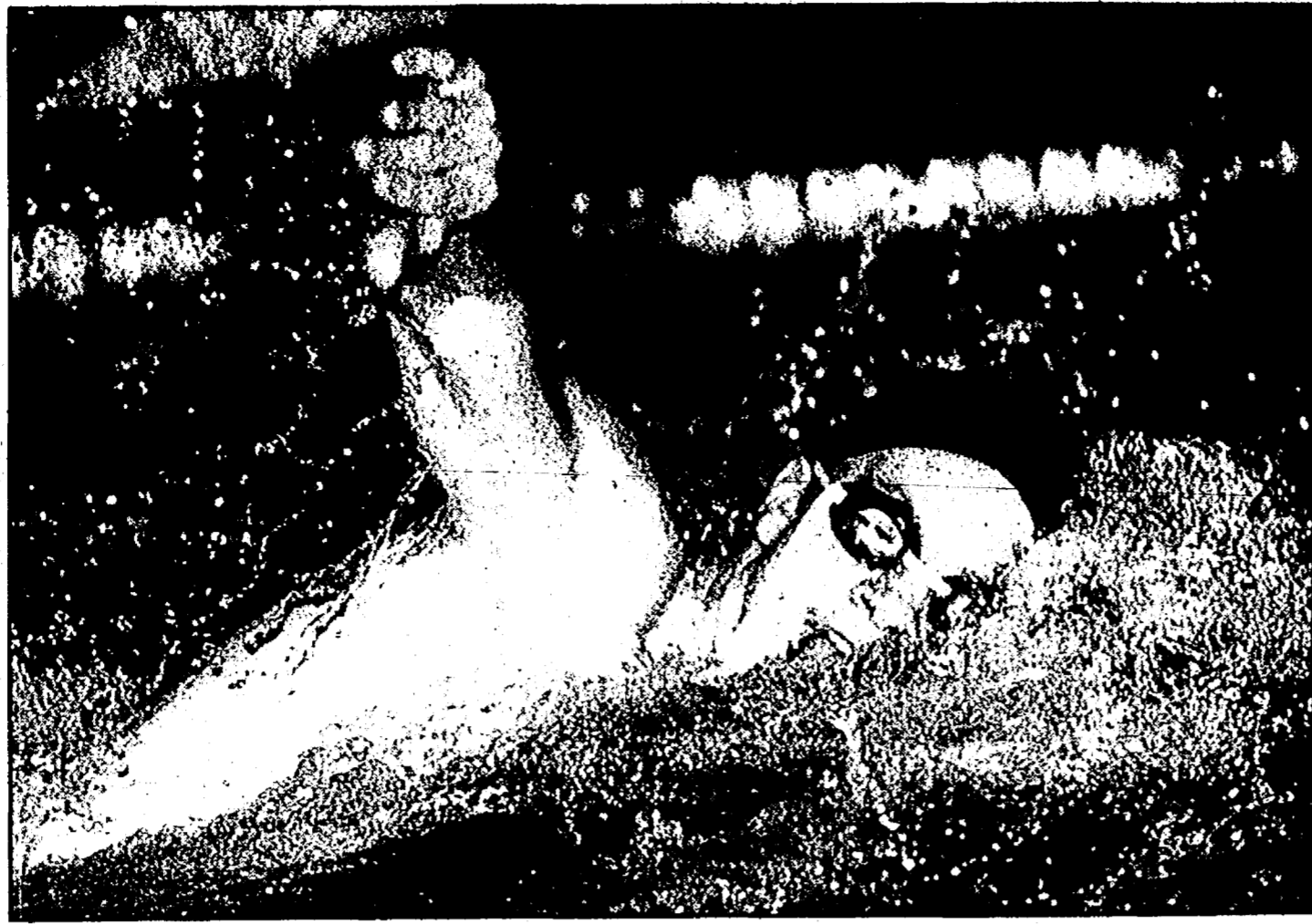
"Nah, not anymore," Olson agreed. "I'm too old for that."

Less than five minutes later, the Salem coach was bobbing in the pool — which bolsters the belief that while Olson rates among the state's best swimming coaches, he should steer away from career aspirations in the dial-a-psychic business.

Remember, it was Olson who predicted prior to the season that whichever team won the WLA Relays to open the season usually ended up winning the league at the end. Well, Farmington collected the Relays title, but the Falcons could not keep pace with a very deep Salem squad.

"Our depth and our speed was the difference," Olson said while toweling off. "The guys worked hard to fill every event."

As proof, Olson offered this: The Rocks had 36 individuals en-

tered in the WLA Meet. Thirty-three of them finished among the top 18, scoring points.

Salem totaled 496 points, easily outdistancing Farmington's second-place 418. North's strong performance in the 400 free relay narrowed the gap between second and third; the Raiders had 410.5, followed by Northville (357), Plymouth Canton (294), Livonia Stevenson (293) and Livonia Churchill (223) to round out the top seven. See statistical summary.

The Rocks' only win came in the 200 free relay, with the foursome of Dave Bracht, Joe Ervin, Eric Seidelman and Fred Locke clocking a 1:30.23. Salem was fourth in both the 200 medley and 400 free relays.

"Our relays swam well," said Olson. But did anyone in particular, in any event, look particularly good? "Just pick a name out," he

answered. OK, here's a prime example. In the 100 breast stroke, Salem's Scott Allen was seeded 17th after Thursday's preliminaries with a 1:09.26. In the best swim of his Salem career, he finished 13th in 1:08.34.

"He's a four-year swimmer who really stepped up," said Olson. "That's what our team is all about."

North's Karl Kozicki and Jon Kershaw and Northville's Jeff Sieving all enjoyed outstanding finals. Each won two individual events.

Kozicki's firsts came in the 200 individual medley (1:57.12) and the 500 free (4:41.18 — breaking his own league record of 4:42.62, set last year). Kershaw won the 200 free (1:44.16) and the 100 free (47.80), outdueling sprinters Locke from Salem and Jeff Clark from Canton in the latter.

Sieving, a sophomore, was a bit of a surprise, collecting firsts in the 100 butterfly (55.07) and the 100 breast stroke (1:00.85). Sieving was seeded sixth in the 100 breast going into the final, but beat highly regarded Falk Rooding of Stevenson and Randy Cobb of Livonia Franklin.

Canton's Clark did get a win in his specialty, the 50 free (21.72 — a league record, topping Jeff Seifert of Walled Lake Central's 21.88 set in 1988). Other individual wins went to Northville's Jason Fisher in the 100 backstroke (54.14) and Canton's Jason Fowler in the diving (442 points).

In the 200 medley relay, Northville's Fisher, Peter Anthony, Sieving and Jason Lennig were winners (1:38.32 — a league record, bettering North's '92 mark of 1:38.72), and in the 400 free relay, North's Kershaw, Kozicki, Drew Sopha and Jason Speer took first (3:17.19).

Spring Arbor (20-10 overall) got 23 points from Enzley Mitchell.

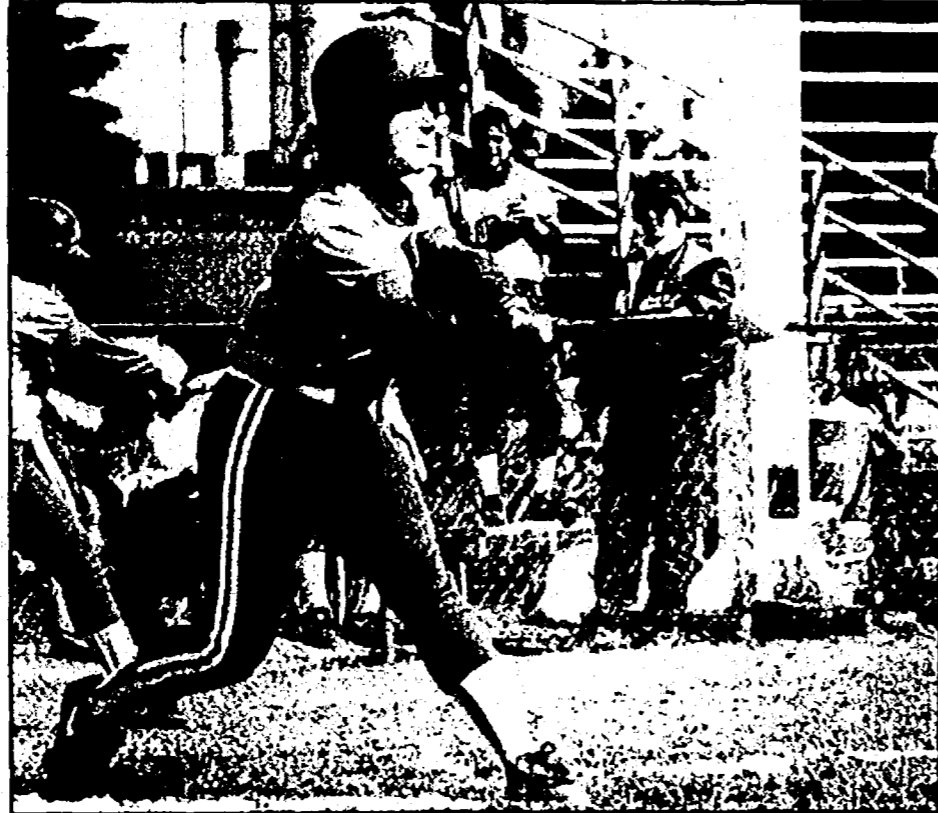
On the bright side, the Crusaders outboarded their opponent, 48-46.

Madonna's promising: Abraham

There are lots of changes facing a team that reached the NAIA District 23 championship softball game last year.

First and foremost is the new face coaching the team: Jerry Abraham. While his face may be new to Madonna softball, it's hardly new to Madonna — or to softball, for that matter.

Abraham has coached the Lady Crusaders' volleyball program for seven years, guiding them to a top-five finish at the NAIA Tournament last December. And he has coached Taylor Center's softball team for the past six years, posting a 132-49 record and winning four Tri-River League titles. The Rams reached the state semifinals in '89 and '90.

He also coached softball for two years at Redford Bishop Borgess, taking the Spartans to a Catholic League title in '84.

Abraham, who succeeds Dave Racer (forced to resign due to personal reasons), now must see if he can take his success with Madonna's volleyball and in high school softball to another level.

"I'm trying to establish a team concept here," said Abraham, who will also continue to coach Taylor Center's team. "Since I've taken over, the kids have worked hard. They've responded."

The overall record last season wasn't good — 18-26. But the Crusaders were 7-7 in the district's regular season, and made a strong run in the district tournament.

Although the coaching has changed, several experienced players return, bolstering Madonna's hopes. Leading the veterans are pitchers Dawn Terrasi, a senior, and Lynda Weichel, a junior.

Abraham's guideline for building a team is time-tested: "Strong up the middle." With his pitching and second baseman Mandi Armstrong, a senior, and shortstop Michelle Birchmeier, a sophomore, both returning, Madonna should fill that requirement.

His greatest concern is behind the plate. "I think catching is critical at this level — at any level," Abraham said. Jennifer Pinter, a sophomore, started and returns.

Providing leadership in the field are seniors Jill Burt at third base and Holly Jondro in the out-

field. Both are three-year starters.

Three newcomers that could have an immediate impact are Mo Paulin, a junior; Ronnie Ronco, a senior; and Jeanie Baxter, a freshman. Paulin was a four-year starter and an all-league pitcher while at Farmington Hills Mercy; she's played on Madonna's volleyball team for three years.

Baxter, an outfielder, was all-league at Redford St. Agatha last season. Ronco, a utility player, was with Abraham at Center and played two seasons at Wayne State before transferring.

There are others, some recruited from Madonna's other teams: freshmen Becca Bloch (Livonia Franklin) and Maria Liwag, both basketball players, and Jenny Czach; and Christy Pydyn.

Crusaders taking aim

There's no doubting the losses are considerable for Madonna University's baseball squad, which departs Friday on its 12-game trip to Florida.

One from last season's 43-22 team, a team that won the NAIA District 23 regular-season title with a 22-4 mark, are six key players — three of them all-district performers.

"I don't think we had a weakness," coach Mike George said in examining last year's accomplishments. "I think it was as good a team as the team that won the national championship."

That says a lot. But it doesn't say much about this year's team. Can the Fighting Crusaders match that performance?

George thinks yes. Sure, he has lost pitchers Shaun Hayward (three-time all-district pick, 7-0 record, 1.45 earned run average) and Mike Coleman (2-4, 3.83); second baseman Joe Brusseau (three times all-district, .310 batting average, 13 doubles, three triples, five home runs, 26 runs batted in, 60 runs scored, 17 stolen bases); right-fielder Rich Roy (Madonna's Mr. Baseball, all-district, .338, 11 doubles, eight homers, 40 RBI); outfielder Bill Terksi (.270, 25 RBI); and catcher Steve Coffell (.217).

But the cupboard is hardly bare. Quite the opposite.

"This year's team has all the makings of last year's," said George. "I know they're good. They have a chance to be very good."

BASEBALL

Even with the losses of Hayward and Coleman, George figures this team will feature better pitching. The defense should be improved, too.

And there's still plenty of experience. George could start seven seniors.

"I've told them we'll only go as far as the pitching and seniors will take us," he said.

On the mound, Madonna returns junior left-hander Jeff Kugelmann (from Plymouth Canton; 5-2, 2.77); senior right-hander Lou McKaig (Southfield-Lathrup; 7-2, 2.51); junior right-hander Ryan Grabetz (4-2, 3.18); junior right-hander J.J. Jentzer (4-2, 2.48); and senior right-hander T.C. Raptis (3-2, 3.72).

Bolstering that nucleus is junior right-hander Sean Henkel (Livonia Stevenson; 0-2, 3.93, school-record four saves), who injured his shoulder one game after last year's Florida trip and was fed-shirted; junior right-hander Jim Solak (Redford/Divine Child), who played outfield all last season but will pitch more this year; and freshman right-hander Craig Benedict (Canton).

The team's everyday lineup seems strong too, with senior George Leung at first base (.292, 10 RBI), senior Jeff Miller at shortstop (.313, 13 doubles, three triples, three homers, 32 RBI, 36 errors), senior Jeff Pendell at third (Livonia Churchill; .322, 27 RBI, 15 errors); senior Craig Overaitis in left field (Livonia Franklin; .273, seven homers, 33 RBI); junior Scott Anderson in center (.365, 14 stolen bases); and Solak in right (.291, 11 doubles, nine homers, 26 RBI).

A pair of freshmen, Tim Kasubowski and Kurt Wilczynski, will split time at second base.

The key to Madonna's season, according to George, is at catcher. Chris Gajewski returns for his senior season (.264, 10 RBI); the question is how much catching he can do. There are no experienced substitutes — backing him up are Steve Zann (20 at-bats in '93) and freshman Craig Peterson.

"Catching's the key," said George. "If (Gajewski) gets hurt, we won't be nearly as good."

It seems to be the only question mark, however.

If the snow melts by April, this could be George's finest team in his six years as Madonna coach.

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Homeowner affidavit deadline extended

Homeowners will have until May 1 to file affidavits for a reduced property tax rate.

The state Legislature finished action March 1 — deadline under the original school finance reform laws — by extending the filing date two months. Senate action came on a 34-0 vote Tuesday.

The House last Thursday gave the bill 102-0 approval, although the bill had been opposed in the Taxation Committee by Democratic gubernatorial hopeful Lyn Jondahl of Okemos.

Gov. John Engler promised to

sign the measure.

The reform laws place a 24-mill state property tax on all property except the principal homestead. If voters approve Proposal A on March 15, the homestead rate will be six mills; if A is rejected, 12 mills.

The postponement was prompted by slow delivery of affidavit forms to homeowners in some sections of the state and by the need to get the word to Michiganders on long Sun Belt vacations. The affidavit takes less than a minute to fill out.

I-94 airport ramp work begins

Construction that started last year is resuming this week to improve the interchange of Merriman Road and I-94 near Metro Airport.

On I-94 from Middlebelt to Merriman until Sept. 1 through traffic will use the newly constructed collector-distributor roads parallel to I-94, according to

a press release from the Michigan Department of Transportation.

On Merriman Road, one lane of traffic in each direction will be maintained at all times.

The result will be two larger interchanges serving Metro Airport. The Merriman and Middlebelt bridges over I-94 will be reconstructed.

Alternative to assisted suicide offered

The Michigan Senate has bought the idea of "pain management" as an alternative to assisted suicide.

"We're making hospices and pain management the priority. We're attempting to break new ground," said Sen. Fred Dillingham, R-Fowlerville, sponsor of five bills that won Senate approval by 33-0 and 34-0 votes Tuesday. The bills go to the House.

Dillingham has been leading Lansing's hottest battles to regulate abortion and outlaw physician-assisted suicide. This time, however, he had a consensus to:

- Require medical schools to have a core curriculum on pain and symptom management.
- Continuing education for already-licensed physicians and other health professionals

would be required.

- Tell the Department of Public Health to develop a written outline of pain and symptom management and to increase public awareness of pain management.

- Ensure offering of hospice care in three bills regulating different types of health insurers.

All area senators voted yes except the absent George Z. Hart, D-Dearborn, and David Honigman, R-West Bloomfield. Honigman Tuesday was reported undergoing surgery.

During hearings, the bills were scoffed at by Hemlock of Michigan, which advocates physician-assisted suicide, and Friends of Dr. Jack Kevoorkian, who said "there is no such thing as pain management."

The only debate was over amendments to the three insurance bills by Sen. John Kelly,

D-Grosse Pointe Farms. Kelly wanted to mandate hospice coverage.

"I know many on the other side of the aisle don't like mandates," Kelly said, nodding toward Republicans, "but there are no costs associated with this — only savings." Every \$1 spent on hospice care saves \$1.26 in other medical institutions, Kelly said.

"If I didn't have to worry about a consensus," replied Dillingham, "I could support his amendments." But he vowed to watch insurers to make sure they were offering hospice coverage.

Senators voted 16 in favor and 18 against all three Kelly amendments.

Supporting Kelly were Republican Mat Dunaskiss of Lake Orion and Democrats William Faust of Westland and Jack Faxon of Farmington Hills.

Backing Dillingham were Republicans Michael Bouchard of Birmingham and Robert Geake of Northville.

Dillingham's bills grew out of discussions of the state Commission on Death and Dying, an expert panel appointed to recommend state policy when the law outlawing assisted suicide expires.

In the balcony were Barbara Listing, president of Right to Life of Michigan, who called the bills "a positive care package that shows the Legislature has a deep interest in addressing the issue of suffering and pain," and members of Visiting Nurse Home Care & Hospice, who held a convention in Lansing that day.

"Bensonhurst is a subculture in the true sense of the word," explains producer Larry Brezner. "It has its own distinctive sound, style of dress, entertainment values and cultural aspects. A large part of the intensity that makes the community what it is, is due to it being a tightly-knit neighborhood where everyone knows each other. The Italian language is still spoken from every street corner, and some of the people go as far as to live on the same street blocks with others who have immigrated or are descendants from a particular Italian village." Still, top priority was given to carefully delineating the film's two leading characters: the fugitive Jack Hammond and his initially reluctant passenger, Natalie Voss. "We have to care about who's in the car," said Rifkin. "They're real underdogs, and we want the audience to be rooting for them."

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

Photographs capture life of homeless

They are images of life in America that shatter the belief of it being the land of plenty. They are the images of people living on the edge with nowhere to go. They are the images of America's homeless.

The plight of the homeless of this country hits home in a series of documentary photographs by photographer Guy Warren on exhibit Friday, March 11, through Monday, April 4, at the Urban Park-Detroit Art Center.

The exhibit's at the gallery. The opening reception will be 6-9 p.m. Friday, March 11. At that time, Warren, a Westland resident, will talk about the stories behind the haunting images.

Using the stark, sometimes harsh elements of black and white photography, Warren shows what it means to tough it out on the streets of America's major cities. Detroit, Boston, New York City, Washington, D.C., Seattle, San Diego and San Francisco serve as backdrops for the men, women and children without homes.

From disabled Vietnam veterans to the elderly, they carry all their worldly possessions in plastic bags or packed in shopping carts. From New York City to Rodeo Drive in Los Angeles, they pick through city trash bins in search of food.

They sleep in laundry carts, in homes made from cardboard boxes and in the subways of lower Manhattan. Others, unable to find an available bed in area shelters, wander the streets in search of a safe place to lay their heads at night.

Warren originated the series of photographs focusing on the homeless as a book project in the spring of 1991 because he "recognized the need to bring a greater awareness to the problem of homelessness in the U.S."

"I also felt a need to contribute whatever I could to help," he said.

Warren is asking that those who view the exhibit bring a donation of canned food, blankets or money which will be distributed to the homeless in the Detroit area.

Thanks to the generosity of Urban Park-Detroit Art Center and Laura Hardy of Nelson's Gallery in Livonia, who provided framing materials at cost and donated the labor, 50 percent of the proceeds from the sale of the prints will also benefit the homeless.

Warren has been a freelance photojournalist since 1984. It was his photographs of individuals visiting a center providing food, clothing and furniture for the needy and accompanying stories on the poor in suburbia, "Poverty: A Case of Mistaken Identity," by Observer & Eccentric staff writer Sue Mason that landed them a first-place award for best feature in 1990 from Suburban Newspapers of America.

"Granted, the problem of homelessness is of enormous proportion all across the United States," said Warren. "It is obvious that I can't even begin to scratch the surface of the problem but I can help."

Urban Park is at 508 Monroe in Greektown's Trapper's Alley.

Live theater in your neighborhood



Performers of Parlour Theatre Productions will take their act just about anywhere. A Farmington Hills couple began flirting with theater in their teens and years later began the traveling production company.

If you enjoy live theater but hesitate to patronize fine area companies because it seems you have to drive a long way to see a production, sit back and relax. Parlour Theatre Productions will bring the stage to you.

The traveling theater company delivers the stage, set and performers to retirement centers, church or civic group gatherings, dinner theaters and just about anywhere you can imagine.

"We can go into a fairly small area," said PTP founder Ed Meade of Farmington Hills.

"Our purpose is to make drama available at your convenience, which means that we bring the stage to you," a PTP brochure said. "We believe that whatever your mood, the stage is the ideal way to amuse, enlighten, move,

challenge or maybe bring a tear. Comedy and tragedy often go hand-in-hand in theater and we try and bring a little of both."

Love blooms

Meade came up with the idea for PTP after a lifetime fascination with the theater. In fact, he met his wife, Jeannine, while they both performed in a high school production in 1947.

They continued flirting with theater through college at Eastern Michigan University. They also performed in musical variety shows with the St. Damian's Singers and Players in Garden City and an Indian Village theater group in Detroit, Meade said.

And when they retired they decided to continue their passion for theater by starting PTP. Jeannine is retired from National Bank of Detroit.

Meade comes to the task as a

retired music and drama teacher from Dearborn Heights. He also has a traveling chorus, Voices in Time, which has been running about 14 years under various names.

Group flourishes

One year after their first performance with PTP, Meade said, the group goes most often in retirement centers.

"Older people still like theater, but they don't have a chance to get out much," Meade said. "So we bring it into them."

PTP recently had a sold-out performance at Botsford Inn in Farmington, Meade said, adding that he is working with Botsford management to bring PTP there on a regular basis.

The usual charge is \$150 for each performance, which lasts about two hours. Meade said PTP just about breaks even when considering costs.

"Actually we're just getting out of the red," he said. "We try to meet the (performers') expenses."

Expanding repertoire

Currently, PTP performs "Bedroom Farce," a British come-

She brews up a flavorful lecture

"Good to the last drop" aptly describes the Women's Resource Center's luncheon where Diana Dimitroff of the Coffee Beanery spoke of her trade.

Women who attended the luncheon were so enthusiastic that Dimitroff nearly ran out of the Mocha Cinnamon Swirl and Vanilla Almond coffees that were served during the meal. They went through more than 100 cups of the coffees.

Dimitroff took the chill off winter, opening the winter luncheon series sponsored by the Women's Resource Center at Schoolcraft College. As Dimitroff traced the history and traditions of coffee, the 100 guests passed around a basket filled with different kinds of coffee beans. They compared the smells of Guatemalan Coban, Supreme Extra Fancy, Green beans, Breakfast Blend, Espresso Roast, Vienna Roast and Kenya AM beans.

Meanwhile Dimitroff spoke of the beverage's origins in Ethiopia. At first, the beans were consumed; they weren't "brewed as a beverage," she said. Since then, coffee has become the second most traded commodity, the first being gold.

She also served up some coffee trivia.

■ One tree produces five pounds of coffee beans but only one-fifth of the beans are of good enough quality to be used.

"We drink a lot more coffee than many of the trees are able to produce," said Dimitroff, who runs the Coffee Beanery store in Laurel Park Place in Livonia.

■ Soil and rain water result in different tasting coffee.

■ Coffee beans can be kept for one to two months in an airtight container. However, don't think about freezing them. Coffee beans don't freeze because there isn't enough water in them.

■ There's no such thing as naturally decaffeinated coffee. Chemicals are used to get rid of most of the caffeine.

more samples of coffee — Cafe Caramel (regular coffee with caramel syrup) and Hot Spiced Viennese (regular coffee with cinnamon).

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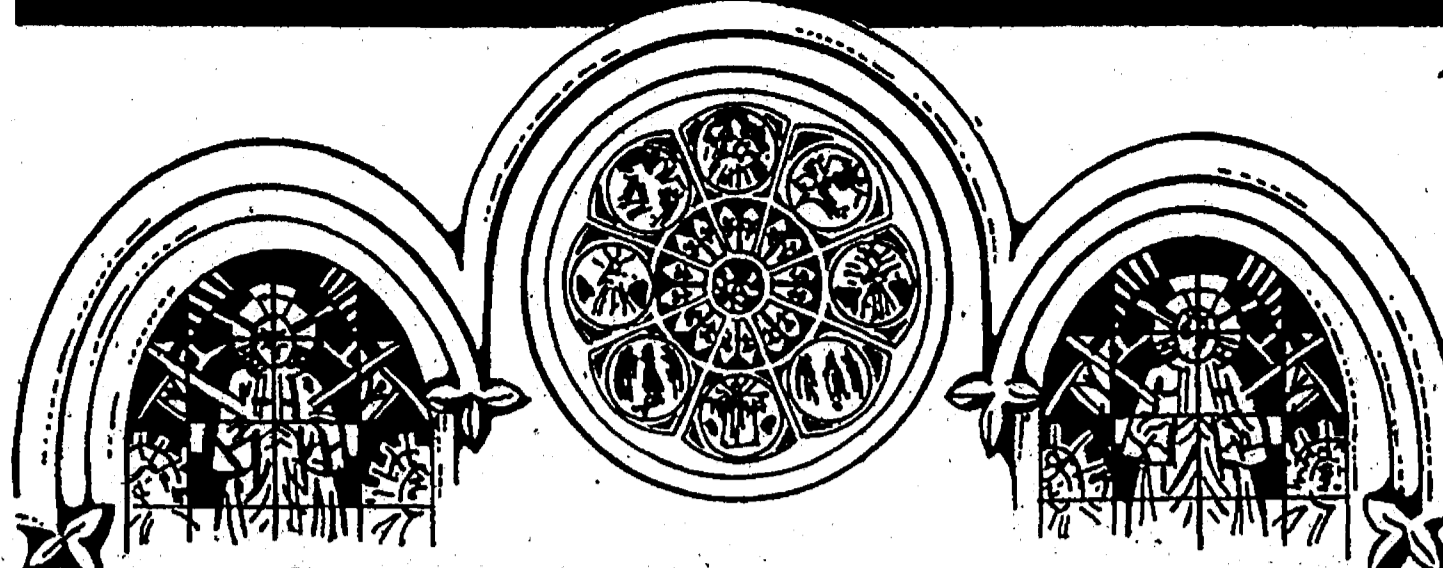

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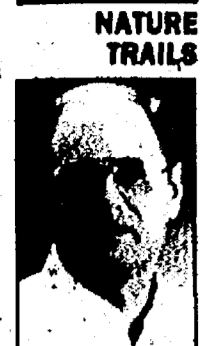

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Nothing in outer space is named after a plant

SKY WATCH
Last month's thaw induced spring fever in nearly everyone. One scrutinizes the ground in search of the first green shoots that herald the emergence of tulips, daffodils and crocus.

Looking in the opposite direction (upwards, that is), one looks for constellations that honor plants and flowers. One looks in vain, for of the 88 constellations, not one is named for a plant. OK, so Virgo holds a sheaf of wheat; but where's the constellation of Orchis the orchid; Semperlorens the begonia; or Smilax the asparagus?

Considering the vital importance of agriculture to the ancient Greeks and Romans, it's remarkable that none of the constellations were named for plants.

Now, to be perfectly honest, there is the constellation of Apus in the southern hemisphere sky. Apus means "The Bird of Paradise," but this represents the avian bird, not the floral one. Apus was invented by Johann Bayer in 1603. Bayer, who obviously had a lot of idle time on his hands, published a star chart in which he added 12 new constellations to the 48 that were in use at the time. It was Bayer who assigned Greek letters of the alphabet to identify stars, a system that is still in use today.

There are a lot of plants that can be traced to celestial objects, and I don't necessarily mean the Venus flytrap. I refer, of course, to the Moonflower and the ever popular Moonwort, to name just two. So what better place to begin a

tour of the sky than with the moon.

The moon will be at last-quarter phase at 11:53 a.m. on March 4. On this day, 15 years ago, the probe Voyager I made the remarkable discovery of narrow rings orbiting around Jupiter.

The bright star four degrees below the moon before sunrise on the 4th will be Antares, the orange-red "heart" of Scorpius the scorpion. As long as we're at it, it can be mentioned that Scorpion grass is related to the forget-me-not.

The moon will have moved from Scorpius into Sagittarius on the 5th, and it will be located directly above the "teapot" of Sagittarius. At least, the star pattern looks a lot more like a teapot than an archer, and what better vessel to use to water our celestial garden?

Another interesting, "ringing" anniversary will occur on March 11. On that date, in 1799, the rings of the planet were discovered telescopically from the earth. Uranus was undergoing observation because it was going to occult (cover) a star. Such a rare event offers a great opportunity to learn a lot about a planet (as the subsequent event showed), so the occultation was receiving a great deal of attention from the scientific community.

Surprisingly, prior to, and immediately after, the occultation, the star was noticed to flicker. This only could be attributed to the presence of an invisible ring system passing in front of the star. Voyager confirmed the existence of the ring system during its fly-by of Uranus.

New moon officially will occur at 2:05 a.m. The moon will be located between the earth and the sun and will not be visible. An eclipse does not occur because the alignment is not perfect this time around.

Why mention that at all? Because in two months there will be a perfect alignment and we will be privileged to witness an eclipse of the sun. Considerably more information will be forthcoming in the May Skywatch, but now is a good time to start spreading the word.

Yet another anniversary involving Uranus will occur on March 13. Astronomer William Herschel discovered that planet in 1781. Herschel's first impulse was to name the planet Georgium Sidus, in honor of his royal patron. (Herschel was no fool!) However wiser heads prevailed, and the name Uranus was adopted in keeping with mythology. That was 213 years ago, and people have been trying to figure how to pronounce the name ever since.

Notice the "smiling" crescent moon in the west on the evening of the 13th. The bright star below the moon will be Venus, of "flytrap" fame. The official name of that plant is Dionaea muscipula, Dionaea being the Greek name for Venus. Since the plant is native only to North and South Carolina, it is safe to assume the ancient Greeks never saw one!

Coming up in the next Skywatch: Yet another anniversary, and spring officially arrives!

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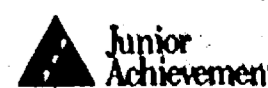

Plymouth scriptwriter fulfills 10-year dream

These days, he seems a little distracted. He worries he'll run late for appointments. Sometimes, he misses them altogether. For a recent meeting, he arrives slightly breathless, his glasses just a bit askew.

His conversation tumbles out, riddled with exclamation points, bristling with italics. There's a sense he's keeping his fingers crossed, somehow holding his breath — most of all, counting the days.

Welcome to the world of Plymouth's screenwriter-in-residence Jim Burnstein.

One evening this summer, he and his wife, Cynny, will get all dressed up and go out to a movie. The movie, titled "Renaissance Man," won't be just any movie, however. It will star Danny DeVito. It will be directed by Penny Marshall. It will be released through Touchstone, a division of Disney Studios. And it will mark Burnstein's debut as a screenwriter.

"I don't plan to be excited," he deadpanned recently, over a quick lunch at a popular Plymouth eatery. He means, of course, that as the lights go down in the theater that night and the movie at last begins, he will feel as if he is just about the most excited person on Earth.

More than 10 years ago, he wrote a screenplay about a man who teaches Shakespeare to a group of young soldiers on a U.S. Army base. He didn't have to go far for his idea.

Burnstein, a University of Michigan graduate, taught Shakespeare (still does) to military personnel at Selfridge ANG base. He had gleaned from his classroom experiences a story he felt he was compelled to tell, about the value of education.

On its completion, several film folk showed interest in the script, but somehow "Renaissance Man" never reached the screen. Burnstein performed numerous rewrites, wrote other screenplays (none were produced, although most sold), one stage play ("Learn To Fall," performed at the Attic Theatre in 1988), and kept hoping.

Then, one day last May, a call came from Hollywood producer Sara Colleton, informing Burnstein that Penny Marshall, who had been considering the script for some time, was definitely interested in the film if she could get actor Danny DeVito to play the lead.

Within 48 hours, DeVito had read the script and quickly agreed to join the crew. With the actor's signature on the dotted line, "Renaissance Man" was headed for the screen.

When the film crew arrived in Detroit for a week's shooting last September, Burnstein was on hand each day, doing brief, last-minute revisions, and generally making himself available for any questions Marshall might have. He watched as the company filmed a traffic jam on Jefferson Avenue, the opening scene at the Renaissance Center, plus another shot at a brokerage firm on Griswold.

He also went along when the crew traveled to the Port Huron area for a scene on the Blue Water Bridge. (From Michigan, the company headed for Ft. Jackson, S.C., and then back to Los Angeles to complete filming.)

"Except for the producer, Sara Colleton, who came into the picture in 1989, I've spent roughly 10 years nearly alone with this project," says Burnstein. "And then, on the first day of shooting, it's like the circus comes to town. You see all those people and all those cameras, and you really realize then that, ultimately, this is a collaborative effort."

As a matter of fact, Burnstein ended up collaborating during shooting in a way he never anticipated. At a special request from Marshall, he and his wife and two of their three children ("the baby didn't make it") actually make an appearance in the film.

If their big moment survives the cutting room, you'll spot them in the Tiger Stadium scene, seated just behind DeVito, cheering on the home team. "We had to be out there before the game at night to shoot and because the scene is set in summer, we had to be dressed for summer," says the screenwriter. "It was 35 degrees and I was in T-shirt and shorts for 13 hours! That's the coldest I've ever been."

While it doesn't look like he'll be appearing before the cameras again, Burnstein is already looking toward his next big screenwriting project.

"Once you get a movie in production, you suddenly get the kind of film offers you never saw before," he says. "You want to say yes to so many."

Plymouth home to new arts co-op

Michigan Art Exchange kicks off the opening of the first artists cooperative gallery in Plymouth with a live auction Sunday, March 6.

Fun, families and reasonably priced artwork — that's the concept behind Michigan Art Exchange, an artists cooperative

gallery in Plymouth.

The fine arts enterprise opened Feb. 13 to provide a place for artists to show their work, demonstrate how it's created and teach others about the process.

Inside Forest Place Mall, the gallery boasts nearly 1,100 square feet for exhibiting two- and three-dimensional artworks. A separate area is set aside for hands-on types of learning activities: classes, workshops and lectures.

"It's strictly Michigan artists, a group of local fine artists interested in showing their work and making it a working gallery," said co-director Frank Kuszak of Plymouth.

"The concept is not a new one. We're just approaching it differently. We want it to be fun. We want people to come in as a family. In Plymouth, it has to be an event. People come to see things happening."

Knowing most people feel uncomfortable entering a gallery, extra steps were taken to welcome visitors.

"We wanted it to be well-lit, open, a comfortable atmosphere — not to intimidate people," said co-director Clifford Holdhampf of Farmington Hills.

The gallery fare includes glass by Don Schneider, paintings by Andrea DeZell and sculpture by Judith Shellhaas of Plymouth; paintings by Diane Tasselmyer of Westland, Marie Tuthill of Livonia and Shirley Mohout of Redford; wheel-thrown raku by Melissa Emery of Southfield; fiber art by Terri Wilva Jurewicz of Dexter; mixed media by Lisa Miller of Northville; graphic art by Amy Conner of Belleville; and textiles by Sylvia Stetev of Pinckney.

"We've been very selective," said Holdhampf. "We're really happy with the quality of artists in the gallery."

Eventually, the coop, which is still looking for more members, hopes to show between 15 to 30 fine artists. Initially, Kuszak and Holdhampf juried artists into the gallery. Now that a membership of artists exists, they will serve as jurors.

"We are, for the most part, non-profit. We're trying to make it so it's profitable for the artists," said Kuszak.

Local art adorns Garden City mayor's office

When Garden City Mayor Michael Breen took office in January, the walls of his city hall office were stark and empty.

Instead of spending tax dollars to decorate the space, Breen chose to put into play an innovative concept to display a local artist's work without cost.

Today, four acrylic paintings by

Norma McQueen, one of which features the lush greenery of the Caribbean, adds warmth to an otherwise cold office environment.

"Norma McQueen is one of our fine local artists," Breen said. "I believe her paintings deserve to be shown in a public place where people are able to enjoy them."

The idea to ask McQueen to display her paintings in the mayor's office originated with Winnie Wiacek.

Once contacted, McQueen had a few ideas of her own. Before long, she had rescued an old couch from storage and rearranged the existing furniture. What began as a concept for furnishing the office without a budget evolved into McQueen providing full interior design services.

McQueen had one final suggestion to showcase other artists' works.

"When Mike first moved into the office the walls were bare. He didn't

want to invest any money to redecorate the office," said Breen's wife, Elissa.

"Councilman Wiacek's wife suggested we contact Norma. Since artwork is already displayed on the one wall in city hall, it just sort of naturally extended down the hall. It was Norma's idea to rotate the work every three to four months. The public is

antiques and historic Ford-related artifacts. Lunch and inner are available in the warm atmosphere of the inn's dining room.

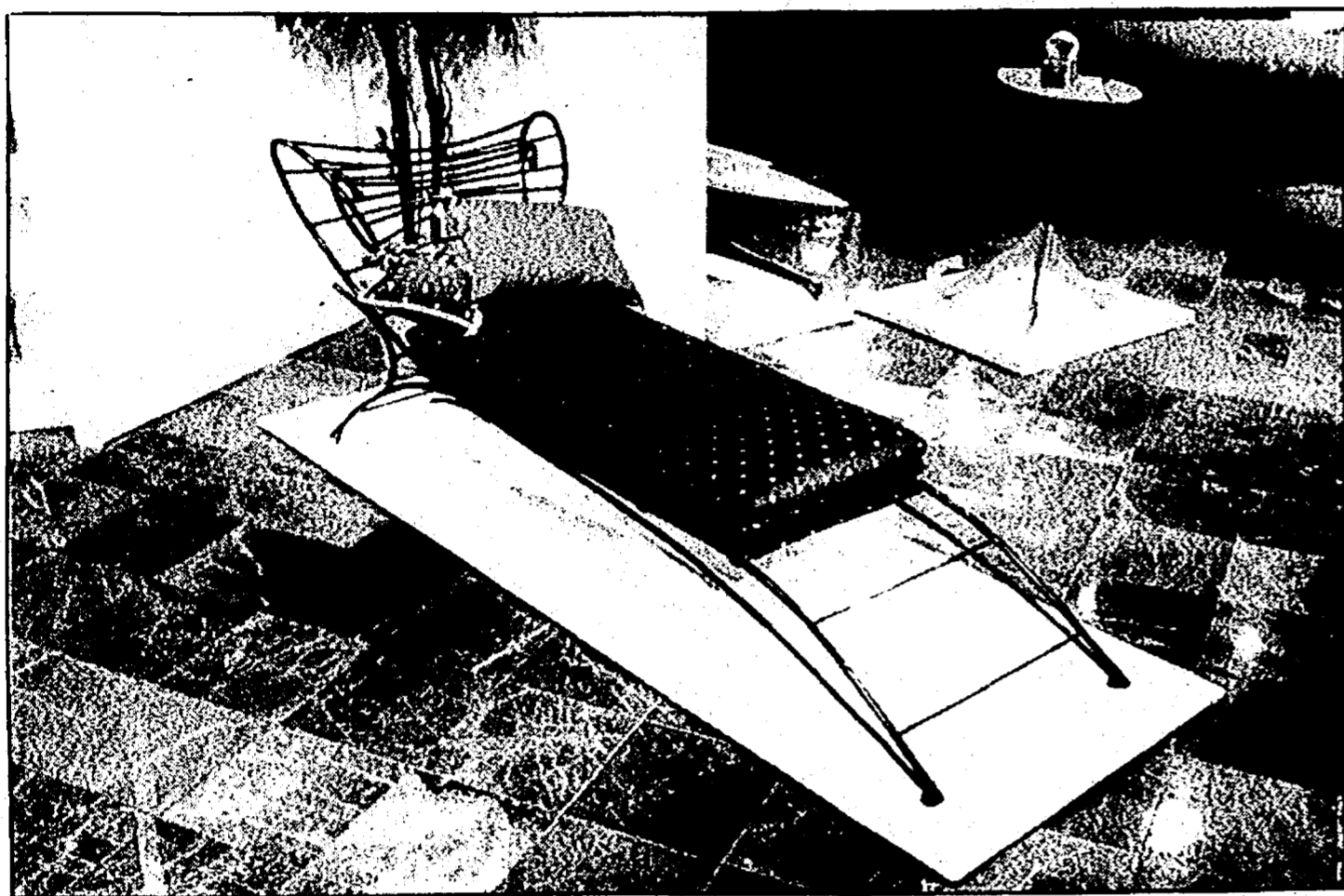
During the first few years of the show, half of the dealer booths were placed in a canvas-covered structure attached to the inn's carriage house. Snow and rain leaked in through holes in the roof and the wind howled through the dikes of the tent. The roof-mounted heaters smelled so bad that they had to be frequently turned off and then it became uncomfortably cold. Today, the structure is replaced by a modern banquet room.

When the show's founder, the late Marge Kulifay, attempted to sign up dealers to do the first couple of shows, all of the well-established, long-time dealers refused to participate. They said the show was not commercial enough and would not survive. Today, after 82 events it still draws shoulder-to-shoulder crowds at its opening.

The first participating dealers were all new to the business and were entering the antiques field on a part-time basis. The established dealers referred to it as the "Housewife's show."

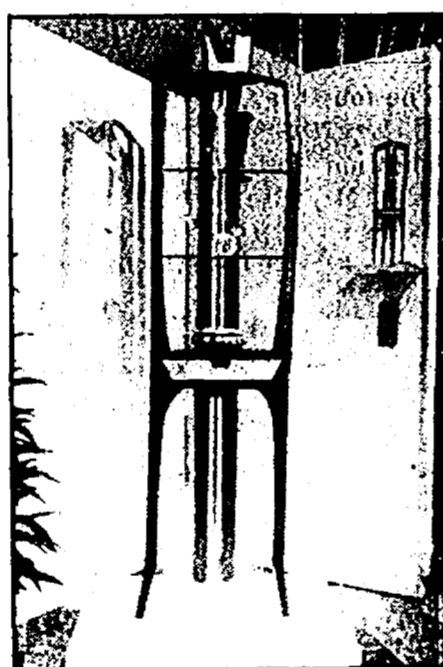
with flashing swirls in the surface.

"It's our business, but it's their gallery."

Michigan Art Exchange is next to Francis Jewelers, which Kuszak and Holdampf opened last July. Both design contemporary fine jewelry.

The idea for the gallery sprang from plans to hold an annual jewelry show. When space next to the jewelry shop became available last spring, the brainstorming began.

"We wanted to have a jewelry show and decided why not keep the space open all year long and exhibit fine art," said Holdampf, who's been designing jewelry 17 years.

Unlike regular retail galleries, which take up to 50-percent commission from the sale of a work, MAE takes only 9 percent.

"Great exposure without great expense" — that's the gallery motto. However, artists must work two days a week for four hours a session in addition to paying a monthly maintenance fee of \$65.

As varied as the media of the artists, so too are the reasons why artists signed up with the Michi-

gan Art Exchange.

Shellhaas became a member of the cooperative not only to be able to sell her work in a gallery setting but to network with fellow artists.

"Art is such a personal experience. I wanted the input of other artists," said Shellhaas, who graduated with a bachelor's of fine arts degree from Eastern Michigan University in 1991.

Tasselmeyer, who paints vibrant watercolor still lifes, joined the cooperative because it allows her to paint while putting in her time at the gallery. "I can bring my paints and paint away."

Formerly a clay modeler for Ford Motor Co. for 14 years, Tasselmeyer added, "Frank's enthusiasm for what they're doing turned

me so that I want to be part of something now."

Stetetz, formerly of Plymouth, needed exposure for her work. She constructs and machine embellishes clothing. Stetetz took first place in national competition by Vogue-Butterick Pattern Co. and Pfaff Sewing Machine Co. for a two-piece outfit on display at Michigan Art Exchange.

"I like to work with natural fibers. This is all done on silk with metallic threads," said Stetetz, motioning to a white Oriental-style jacket. "The gallery enables me to get my work out to the public."

Study up to know if assessment's wrong

Mary, a Livonia resident, owned a ranch in a neighborhood of colonials. She couldn't obtain the original listing price when she put her house for sale.

Mary eventually lowered her asking price. Then she started looking around and became convinced that her property was over-assessed for tax purposes. However, she eventually sold the house before she could appeal to the board of review.

Mary was probably right in her assessment of her assessment and definitely not alone, said Robert E. Mattler, an attorney who specializes in real estate law in Southfield.

"I have found, and I've been in the business about five years, that proba-

bly one in three properties, residential and commercial, one way or another is assessed improperly," he said.

The most common mistake? "Over-generalization in sales studies," Mattler said. "Assessors take a whole neighborhood and slap a rate on it and not every house is the same."

The window of opportunity for error actually can open much earlier in the process, Mattler said.

Mistakes arise on field cards filed in city, village and township halls that describe physical attributes of buildings. Then there's the possibility of mathematical miscalculations.

Sometimes, mistakes are made in a homeowner's favor, like when improvements are made without a per-

son or entity.

Indeed, one of the questions you may ask of the management company is how many associations that management company is involved in with the contractors and/or professionals involved to determine whether there is an arm's-length relationship between the parties.

You should also do your own investigation as to whom you wish to hire and make sure they are independent from any influence from the developer and/or the management company that would inhibit the ability of the association to pursue its interests in behalf of its members.

owner to do? "The first thing to do is ask for a copy of the field sheet, the property record card," Mattler said. "Make sure it's all right. Make sure the calculations are right."

"If you believe the assessment is still out of whack, pull your neighbors' field sheets and other houses like yours. You have to compare apples to apples. If you have a ranch with three bedrooms and two baths, you want to look at others."

"If there's a big disparity, I think you have a good argument based on uniformity," he said.

Ask a Realtor for a comparative market analysis for recent listings and selling prices of houses similar to yours in the neighborhood, Mattler advised. "If all listed or sold for less, I think you have a great argument for lowering your assessment."

"A recent sale or a recent appraisal if you refinancing is the best evidence you can give an assessor for a reduction," Mattler said.

It doesn't pay to get emotional and rant and rave about taxes in general at board of review hearings.

"You have to understand the intense pressures and problems of assessing people," Mattler said. "They're underpaid and overburdened."

"Values are never stagnant. They either go up or down. An assessor's task is to try and conduct studies, mail out surveys and keep up with values."

"Just don't take the assessor's word for it," Mattler said. "He's not trying to screw you. He's overburdened and doesn't have time to look at every house."

"You have to make sure you aren't swallowed up in these studies. That's your job. You have to be well informed and have the right arguments. Do research. Be well prepared."

"People need to know we're always willing to talk to them," Nagy said.

And don't be afraid to appeal to the Michigan Tax Tribunal if you're unhappy with a local decision, Mattler said. Upwards of 70 percent who continue the fight get some kind of reduction in Lansing.

Independent relationships a must

Q. We are in the process of preparing for turnover and the managing agent retained by the developer is recommending certain contractors and an attorney to us.

One of the members of the steering committee is somewhat suspect because he believes the developer wants the management company to recommend persons who will not aggressively pursue the developer and is using the excuse that he can find "inexpensive contractors and professionals with whom he has worked in the past to assist the association." How do I investigate this matter?

A. It is not clear from the question whether the managing agent retained by the developer is a subsidiary of the developer or a so-called independent management company.

Even in the latter case, there may be some implied or express understand-

standing between the management company and the developer regarding the retention of personnel by the association after turnover, particularly if the management company has worked with the developer in the past and wants to get business in the future.

Obviously, the choosing of contractors, legal counsel and other professionals necessary to assist the association should be made by the board of directors elected from the homeowners, independently from any other

person or entity.

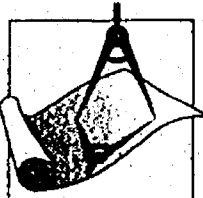

Plymouth Commons: big and luxurious



Not every residential subdivision moves problem free from start to finish. Outside events intervene. But seasoned builders ride out storms and continue to offer quality products that eventually sell when confident buyers return to the market.

Sometimes, plans take a little longer to materialize than first anticipated.

A. Rossi & Son Builders, for instance, started erecting spacious houses in Plymouth Commons - off Ridge between North Territorial and Powell in Plymouth Township - in 1989. Shortly thereafter, the economy soured. Then war broke out in the Middle East. Orders tapered off.

Business picked up again last year. Now, only about 18 building sites and three sales models remain available in the initial phase of the subdivision.

Rossi & Son offers 10 different models, all two stories, and all with a choice of four possible exterior appearances. The watchwords are big and luxurious.

Prices, including lots, range from \$259,900 for 3,300 square feet (Sherwood) to \$309,900 for 3,400 square feet (Dynasty) to \$319,900

for 3,575 square feet (Nottingham) to \$409,700 for about 4,000 square feet (LaMirage).

The three models on site, all with upgraded features, range from \$345,050 to \$592,250.

"We give our customers a lot of choices, so you're not tied down to what you see is what you get," said Claudio Rossi, construction manager. "That's why we're custom builders."

The typical buyer here already has owned a couple of new houses, Rossi said. "Most are executives, people who work for Ford or GM, some doctors, people in the upper echelon, so to say, or self-employed."

The Sherwood model, with four bedrooms, 3 1/2 baths, a double staircase, two-story foyer on a 3/4-acre

lot is especially popular now.

"It's a real nice layout, a real low price," Rossi said.

Quality construction, attention to detail and the opportunity to deal directly with family members throughout the process from start to finish make his company stand out, Rossi said.

"It's a family-run business," he said. "We do our own sales, our own supervision. When you deal directly with a builder face-to-face, you know what you're getting."

"We put in a lot of custom touches - a more expensive interior door, crown moldings, oak staircases. Our craftsmanship is really good," Rossi said. "Personally, I think we're very quality oriented."

Students work masonry into building designs

The challenge was direct - to design a building utilizing masonry that would showcase modular housing models and include administrative offices, a daycare center, lecture hall, library and a small restaurant.

Juniors at Lawrence Technological University's college of architecture in Southfield stepped up to the task as part of their academic program and a biennial competition sponsored by the Masonry Institute of Michigan.

Laura Clary of Northville placed second, Todd Rankine of Livonia third.

"It's always fun and impressive to see students' work like that," said Victor Saroki, a Birmingham architect, who chaired the judging panel. "The overall effort was excellent, the level of drawings and models quite high."

Clary, 25, produced a fan-shaped design that features a retractable nylon roof over four modular houses, offices on either side of models, the lecture hall behind the models off the main entrance and the daycare and restaurant on a second level overlooking the models.

"The most challenging part is combining the civic center and community of homes," she said. "You're incorporating two functions - large areas for display and small spaces for individual offices."

Clary utilized precast concrete panels and brick on the exterior.

Rankine, 22, designed a single-story, T-shaped building with the restaurant, conference center, daycare, and meeting rooms along the long corridor leading from the front entrance and the models at the top.

A skylight runs along the spine of the structure. Precast granite panels and brick were used on the exterior.

"Our class almost had a bad attitude about buying a house in a mall," Rankine said. "I was going to try to make it a little more personal than it appeared to be."

Clary prefers to create by working with models, while

Rankine vacillates between drawings and models. Both said they prefer to sketch by hand rather than use computer-aided design systems. They enjoy that personal, artistic touch.

Rankine currently works part time drafting and dispatching for Siegal/Tuomaala Associates in Farmington Hills, Clary as an assistant designer doing kitchens and baths for Living Spaces in Sylvan Lake.

Both are optimistic about future professional prospects.

"I'd like to teach as well as practice . . . perhaps publish as well," Clary said. "I see myself doing a variety of things."

"I basically want to design," Rankine said. "An architect always has a tool that can be used. There's always going to be someone even in down turns that wants something built, remodeled or fixed."

Daniel S. Zechmeister, executive director of the masonry institute in Livonia, said the main purpose of the competition is to introduce students to working with brick, block and stone.

"The biggest problem we have is masonry isn't a required course for architects and engineers," Zechmeister said. "Our goal is to promote masonry. Before we do that, we have to educate."

"They're getting better and better every year," Zechmeister said of the student entries.

"They work very hard," said Betty Lee Sweatt, assistant dean at LTU. "Requirements included plans, elevations and a model so they (judges) had a sense of what the building was like."

All of the lots are at least 100 feet wide. A premium foundation waterproofing system for basement walls is standard. The exterior has brick on all four sides, including the entire front, and wood siding.

All garages are side entry. Plymouth Commons is serviced by city water and sewers. The subdivision is off a gravel road but just a short drive to the M-14 freeway.

Buyers still look for a wide-open feeling of spaciousness, especially at this level of construction, Rossi said.

"Everyone is looking more and more for privacy — private bath, walk-in closet," he said. "That seems to be the in thing on larger houses."

Dave and Vicki Williams moved their family to Plymouth Commons from another neighborhood in Plymouth Township about three years ago. The LaMirage model is their third new house.

"We liked the floor plan — it's open, the way it flows," Vicki said. "We were ready to

move up. There was nothing else in the Plymouth area with this quality, this size lots.

"All of their houses, especially this house, the quality is outstanding," Vicki said. "They're great. We've had no problems with them. They were here when we needed them. They're small and family, not a big construction company. They have a lot of pride in what they do."

Richard and Kathryn Topolewski bought LeChateau, a model with the master suite on the main floor and three bedrooms upstairs.

"The first house I built was a ranch, the second a colonial with all the bedrooms upstairs," Richard said. "As I get older, I may want all my belongings on the main level and not go up and down steps."

"Naturally, when you build homes you build for what you want, but you have resale in mind," he continued. "I got all the amenities I could afford."

Those extras included a private bath in each bedroom and an oversized three-car ga-

rage.

"He (Rossi) puts a lot of extras in a house," Richard said. "I, myself, have a residential builders license and he does it right."

Topolewski has two major concerns — the quality of construction by other builders in subsequent phases and the unpaved condition of Ridge Road.

Plymouth Commons is serviced by the Plymouth-Canton Community Schools.

The current property tax rate including schools, township and county is \$52.22 per \$1,000 of state equalized valuation, half of market value.

That means the owner of a \$300,000 house in the subdivision would pay about \$7,800 annually in property taxes. But that will change pending the result of the statewide March 15 school financing ballot proposal.

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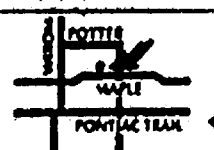


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Home Depot opens 1st Midwest store in Pontiac

Atlanta-based Home Depot Inc., the nation's biggest retail home improvement center, today opened its first Midwest store at 545 S. Telegraph, Pontiac, near the borders of both Bloomfield and West Bloomfield townships.

The sprawling 122,000-square-foot, warehouse-style store employs about 200 people. It's one of five locations the retailer plans to open in metro-Detroit this year, a spokesman said. Other stores are planned in Canton, Redford,

Northville Township and Warren.

The Warren store will open Thursday, March 10, at 25879 Hoover. The Canton store is planned at the southeast corner of Ford and Lutz; the Redford store will be on Inkster Road, between Plymouth Road and I-96. The Northville store will go in at Seven Mile and Haggerty.

By the end of 1999, another 15 stores could be built in metro-Detroit, providing about 3,000 more jobs. Another 10 stores are planned elsewhere in Michigan by the end of 1997, the retailer said.

The Pontiac store, managed by Gregg Gerstenburger, is a boon to the city, which didn't have much hope for the location at Orchard Lake Road and Old Telegraph, said Richard Hahn, Pontiac city planner. To build its expansive warehouse, Home Depot razed an old concrete block manufacturing plant that was "out-of-place in the business district" and did extensive excavating, Hahn said.

"Just by the nature of its business, the plant wasn't sightly and we had problems with it for years. There was always gravel spread

on Orchard Lake. It was a non-conforming site that didn't fit the city's long-range plan," he said.

Since the retailer started landscaping, a nearby business owner has spruced up his storefront, Hahn said.

Every Home Depot conducts free in-store home improvement clinics geared for the growing do-it-yourself market.

The warehouse's inventory includes more than 30,000 kinds of building materials, home improvement supplies and lawn and garden materials. The in-store de-

sign center is staffed with professional designers who give free consultation for home improvement projects that range from lighting placement to computer-assisted design for kitchens and bathrooms.

Simply indicate which delivery method is desired and give the complete mailing address or the 10-digit fax telephone number. If the caller doesn't know the specific item number of the tax form desired, federal or Michigan directories (which list all available forms) can be requested for \$1.95 each.
