Parents view boundary changes



Parents are concerned about secondary school boundary changes recommended by a steering committee last week. Some fear that they may have siblings attending different high schools.

Wayne-Westland school district parents got their first look at proposed major changes in school attendance boundaries.

Some were curious about specifics while others weren't happy with the prospect of their sons and daughters

changing schools, possibly as early as next fall.

One problem that some families may face is that they may have their teens attending different high schools.

School Superintendent Larry Thomas told the estimated 80 parents a steering committee meeting

Wednesday that he would make a recommendation to the board of education in late November after reviewing the residents' comments.

Any change in attendance boundaries must be approved by the school board.

Part of the change involves a proposed switch to middle schools housing sixth, seventh and eighth graders instead of the current junior highs which have seventh-through-ninth graders.

If the middle school concept is approved by the board, ninth graders would be moved from the junior high

to either Wayne Memorial or John Glenn High.

There was no opposition to the committee's direction of balancing enrollments among the district's 21 elementary, four junior highs and two senior highs to provide more cost-efficiencies throughout the district.

All but one elementary will have revised attendance boundaries.

As previously reported, the committee is recommending the closing four elementarys: Stottlenyer, on Marquette east of Wayne Road;

Court race shifts gears

Westland judicial hopeful Sandra Cicirelli is criticizing Judge C. Charles Bokos for driving a Lincoln Continental at taxpayer expense, and she has vowed to drive her own car if elected.

Bokos responded by saying that he is trying to run his campaign on "a high plateau" and that the race should be decided on the candidates' merits, not "foolishness."

Cicirelli, a Westland City Council member since 1990, and Bokos, a former city attorney and judicial appointee since the summer of 1992, are competing for a two-year term. The 18th District seat is open in the Nov. 8 election because former Judge Thomas Smith retired early from his six-year term.

Mayor backs Bokos

Westland Mayor Robert Thomas has broken his public silence and announced that he is endorsing incumbent Judge C. Charles Bokos over Councilwoman Sandra Cicirelli for a two-year judicial term in 18th District Court.

"He's a personal friend of mine, and on a professional level the guy is just a great judge," Thomas told the Observer. "I think he's the better choice of the two for the community."

Bokos, appointed to the bench two years ago, immediately welcomed the mayor's support.

"I'm extremely pleased to be endorsed by the mayor of our community," he said. "I think it speaks well to the kind of court that Judge (Gail) McKnight and I have created. I'm grateful."

McKnight faces attorney Terry Spence in her re-election bid for a six-year term, but their race hasn't produced the crossfire of the Bokos-Cicirelli contest.

Bokos declined to speculate on whether the mayor's support might

Residents win fight against Technicolor

Westland residents who launched an unrelenting crusade against the local hiring practices of a corporate giant have won their battle.

Howling to pressure from residents near Palmer Road and Newburgh, officials for Technicolor Video Services have agreed to remove all temporary workers, including convicted felons, from the company's Westland plant.

"We're going to move a lot of jobs out of Westland into other communities," Paul Scott, senior vice president of operations, said during a joint meeting Thursday night between company officials and residents. The two sides met at resident Justice Labor's house, near the plant.

Technicolor — which says it is the world's largest video services provider with such clients as Walt Disney World Co. — will slash 800 temporary workers from its Westland plant and move some of the 400 full-time employees, Scott said.

The bulk of the transition will occur within two weeks and will be completed by the end of November, Scott promised residents.

The Westland plant, on Newburgh north of Palmer, is expected to employ 200 to 300 workers when the plan is finalized, he said.

Angry residents in recent weeks began demanding that Technicolor stop hiring temporary workers, including convicted felons. Homeowners accused the workers — some on work-release programs — of accosting school children, urinating in

public and making threats against residents.

Tensions escalated Oct. 12 when police said two temporary workers attacked a third employee inside the plant, stabbing him in the head with a footlong metal chisel. The victim survived.

"It could have been me or my child that was stabbed in the head with a chisel," resident Angela Martin told Technicolor officials during Thursday night's meeting.

The two sides issued a statement Friday saying the controversy had been resolved.

Residents have stopped a boycott of Disney videos, and Scott conceded Thursday that impending pressure from Disney played a role in the com-

Titus, 300 S. Henry Ruff, Fischer, on the district's most eastern section in Dearborn Heights, and Monroe, in the southern portion of the city of Wayne.

Thomas said all 403 Fischer students will be transferred to Hicks, just south of Cherry Hill between Inkster Road and Harrison, while Titus pupils will go to either Hicks or Kettering, 1200 S. Hubbard.

Most Stottlemeyer students may go to Wildwood, on Wildwood north of Cherry Hill, with a small number to be assigned to Madison, on Carlsen near Avondale, the few youngsters north of Ford going to Edison, on Wildwood and Hunter.

To balance the enrollments at the junior highs, the school administration stressed that it wants to have classroom space at Stevenson, on Palmer near John Hix, for the planned residential expansion in adjacent Canton

Township. The high school boundaries are recommended to be changed to not only even out the enrollments at John Glenn and Wayne Memorial but also balance the number of African-American students.

Glenn now has 412 more students than Wayne, with about an 8 percent minority enrollment. Wayne Memorial now has a 23 percent minority count.

If the boundaries are changed by the school board for next fall, each high school will have from 2,169 to 2,179 students and each have 230 African-American students.

Greg Baracy, assistant superintendent for general education, and Thomas assured the parents that with the enrollment shifts, each school involved will be far under their capacity.

Thomas said that small enrollments are nice to have if the district had the money to pay for schools, of which some were only 50 percent used.

But the district faces a projected \$1.2 million budget deficit — down from nearly \$2 million — and it must find ways to be more cost efficient.

The superintendent also said a parent's comment about the perception that Glenn's programming is superior than Wayne "bothers me deeply."

"We have to get away from that," he said of the public views. "We have two good high schools."

Wayne principal Ronald Stratton commented that his school has advanced English and calculus programs, as does John Glenn, but not as many section because of its smaller enrollment.

School officials agreed with parents who strongly suggested that psychologists be called in to counsel students who may be changing schools.

"This is a very emotional time for the kids," a mother said. "Some are scared that they won't

be in Stottlemeyer for Christmas." On the middle school concept, the parents were told that teachers were told of the recommendation with some supportive and

Thomas: Closing schools always an emotional issue

Closing schools is one of the most emotional issues experienced by those involved, said Wayne-Westland school Superintendent Larry Thomas to a steering committee and parents Wednesday night.

"No one likes to talk about closing schools," Thomas said as part of remarks about the potential closing of four elementary and major revisions in junior and senior high school attendance boundaries.

The superintendent also discussed his recommendation to have middle schools of sixth, seventh and eighth graders replace the existing junior highs, which have seventh, eighth and ninth graders. If approved for next fall, ninth graders would be moved from the junior highs to either John Glenn

or Wayne Memorial High. Thomas stressed that while having schools only half used is nice to administer, the district can't continue to do that because of the need to be more cost-efficient.

He said the committee's proposed closing of Fischer, Stottlemeyer, Titus and Monroe Elementaries would save about \$1 million a year.

If the closings are implemented, Stottlemeyer, on Marquette east of Wayne Road, could be converted into the district's preschool programs center.

But several parents offered different views on the human impact of school closings.

A father of a John Glenn High student, who just spent more than \$600 for a school jacket and class ring for his son, was told by

the administration that the student may be switched to Wayne Memorial next fall.

A mother who grew up in the district said she attended four elementaries and didn't object until she entered junior high school.

In related comments, Thomas said all the former Nankin Mills School District buildings consolidated with Wayne-Westland district 25 years ago have been closed.

Since 1978, the district has shut 13 schools with the first being in 1970, followed by five in 1978, one in 1979 and three in 1983. In 1986, shortly after the consolidation with the smaller Cherry Hill district, the board of education closed the former district's senior and junior high.

Parents are divided on converting junior highs

A large majority of Wayne-Westland school district parents are aware of a move to convert junior high schools into middle schools, but are divided on its merits.

That was the conclusion of a district-sponsored survey of some 450 parents this summer on the administration's study of having middle schools of sixth, seventh and eighth graders instead of the existing junior highs of seventh, eighth and ninth graders.

The administration is hoping that the board of education will approve the change for the start of school next fall.

If implemented, district ninth graders would be moved into the senior high schools.

The survey, which had 13 questions dealing with middle schools and revised attendance boundaries, showed that nearly 81 percent of those answering were aware of the district's plan to im-

plement a new grade structure, but only 42.6 percent said that it is an "appropriate change." Some 34.2 percent disagreed with 23.2 percent having no opinion or response.

Jeff Rahmberg, representing the Plante & Moran accounting firm which compiled the survey, results for the district, told a parents' steering committee that the district needs to do a better job of teaching the community of the merits of middle schools.

He said that the district mailed 40,000 surveys with about 450, or just over 1 percent, responding. A related sampling of a smaller number reflected the same conclusions of the larger survey, he said.

Another division was on whether middle schools would improve the environment, structure, curriculum and opportunity to assist students in learning and making the transition from late childhood to adolescence.

Nearly 48 percent agreed but 41.4 percent didn't.

There was also less than a majority view on whether the district should balance enrollments in elementary schools. Some 46.2 percent supported the balancing, compared to nearly 32 percent who disagreed.

The same attitude was reflected in the survey's responses regarding balancing enrollments in the junior and senior high schools.

Parents answering the survey weren't sure if balancing enrollments would assure "more equitable instructional opportunities and course offerings." Some 48.3 percent thought it would, but 38.5 percent disagreed.

A minority, or 39.5 percent, supported the view that boundary changes were in the best interests of the district even if meant that their elementary school students would be switched to a different school. Some 53.3 percent disagreed.

Woman says she feared for life

A Westland woman has accused her husband of pinning her down and grabbing her by the throat as he allegedly tried to rape her in a bedroom of their residence in the 1300 block of Portland, near Palmer and John Hix.

The woman testified in court Thursday that she feared possible death because of her husband's behavior.

"I was fearful for my life," she said during a preliminary examination before 18th District Judge C. Charles Bokos. "I was scared."

The hearing ended with defendant David Samuel Price, 40, being ordered to stand trial in Detroit Recorder's Court for attempted

criminal sexual conduct involving penetration. He could face 10 years in prison if convicted.

Price, accused by his wife of having a sex addiction, has pleaded not guilty to the criminal charge. He has been released from custody after posting a \$20,000 bond.

The woman testified that she was sitting in the living room at noon Oct. 2 when her husband walked into the room and asked her to follow him to his bedroom "to see something," she said. The two have had separate bedrooms for five years, she said.

"He threw me on the bed, grabbed me by the throat and proceeded to lift my nightgown up," the wife testified. "He bruised my breasts. He bruised my arms. He

tried to pry open my thighs. He bruised my thighs."

She said her husband held her down by putting his knees on her arms. She said she managed to kick him in the groin when he moved to pry apart her thighs.

After she managed to escape, the woman said, she went to check on her children, ages 5 and 6. She reported the alleged attack a couple of days later.

The woman said she was using prescription drugs because her husband "made me miserable."

"I told him (that) he had a sexual addiction and I was not happy, and unless he received counseling I wanted a divorce," she testified.

Police have said the Prices are now in the process of divorce.

Police arrest 4 suspects after break-in at business

Police are hoping a string of rooftop break-ins at businesses in Garden City, Westland, Livonia and other area communities has peaked with the arrest early Wednesday of four men outside a Garden City lumber yard.

A fifth suspect, Peter Chester Sonnenfeld, 48, of Garden City, already has been charged in burglaries of two Livonia stores last month.

On Wednesday, police arrested four men at 12:40 a.m. following a burglary at Maplewood Lumber & Hardware, 6332 Middlebelt.

Arrested Thursday in 21st District Court on felony charges of breaking and entering were Michael Robinson, 18, and Jason Campbell, 17, both of Garden City, Adam Littrell, 19, of Redford, and Bryon Whitehead, a former Garden City resident currently listing a Belleville address. Conviction for breaking

and entering carries a maximum sentence of 10 years in prison.

A \$10,000/10 percent bond was set on the men who are scheduled for preliminary examination Oct. 31.

Store merchandise and cash were recovered from a van driven by the men, who had been under police surveillance, following a traffic stop on Balmoral south of Garden, police said. Robinson fled on foot and was apprehended a short time later on a garage roof in the 28000 block of Elmwood.

"We're continuing our investigation to link the Garden City incident with burglaries in Livonia over the past month," said Livonia Police detective Lt. Pete Kunst.

"Right now we're seeking additional warrants for the pet shop burglary (Sept. 12). We need to get some lab work done prior to issuing the warrants."

Police believe the four may be involved in business burglaries

in Livonia, Garden City, Westland, Dearborn Heights and Inkster stretching back to September.

In each incident, burglars climbed into businesses through a rooftop exhaust fan or heating vent.

Many of the Livonia businesses in were small strip shopping centers, allowing burs access to adjacent stores.

A total of more than \$1,800 cash was stolen from eight stores Oct. 11-12, police said. At one store, Pet Connection on Five Mile, culprits coming down from the ceiling crushed an office desk valued at \$1,500.

Sonnenfeld has been charged with Sept. 12 burglaries at Discount Pet Supplies, 16320 Middlebelt, and an adjacent Tubby's submarine shop.

He waived a preliminary exam in front of Judge James R. McCann on Oct. 4 and is out on bond pending trial.

Campaign trail tough for judge

Incumbent 18th District Judge Gail McKnight sat behind her desk last week with makeup caked over two black eyes, her nose swollen large and four stitches lining the inside of her mouth.

But McKnight, 49, displayed a sense of humor despite a campaign-trail mishap that stopped her from knocking on doors for a few days.

"I'm not having any pictures taken this week," she said, smiling.

Not watching where she was walking, McKnight slipped and fell face first on a Dobson Street sidewalk last Monday after she

accidentally stepped on a rock. Campaign literature that she was carrying in her hands went flying through the air.

Some supporters joked with her that she "would do anything to stop knocking on doors," she said. "Actually, I love knocking on doors."

McKnight, who faces attorney Terry Spence for a six year judicial term, was treated at a local medical clinic. Fortunately, she said, her nose wasn't broken.

"I'm very lucky," she said.

She went to work last week even though her husband, Richard McKnight, lightheartedly told her that she "would scare the customers," she said.

On a more serious note, McKnight said she was somewhat concerned that people who say her might think that she is tough on domestic violence cases because her husband beats her. He doesn't.

The timing of McKnight's fall could have been worse. Had the mishap occurred a few days earlier, McKnight would have been bruised for her daughter's Oct. 7 wedding.

She joked that her appearance coincided nicely with Halloween. But she was hoping to return to the campaign trail Saturday.

"I'm hoping that I can go back out and not scare anybody," she said.

Engler; yes on roads, no on private school aid

Look for Gov. John Engler to ask for more road taxes if he's elected to a second term. And expect him to oppose "parochial" despite heavy pressures from the religious right inside his Republican Party.

"It has to be an option," Engler said when asked if he were softening his tune against tax increases. "People want high-quality roads." Michigan's fuel tax, 15 cents a gallon, hasn't changed since 1982, although other road-related fees have been raised.

Although he boasts of 11 tax cuts in his first four-year term, Engler is hearing from cities, the Southeast Michigan Council of Governments, and road-building agencies that they need more revenue.

"We've done over 1,000 miles of road a season. That's pretty good for us — an historic high. We used to do 500 miles. We want to continue to bring road work up, not have the old peaks and valleys. And we've had a major program on building bridges."

"It wouldn't make sense to do that with an income tax. We may be bringing down the income tax some more (it was 4.6 percent and is now at 4.4 percent). With a fuel tax, we pass some of it onto tourists."

Asked how much of an increase he would advocate in his state of the state address next year, Engler said, "We've made no decisions on that."

Patrick Nowak, the former deputy Oakland County executive who heads the Michigan Department of Transportation, has been under orders during the first term to squeeze as much out of existing money as possible, privatizing some maintenance services and using federal ISTEA (intermodal surface transportation) act money. But until this point in the campaign, Engler hasn't talked about a dose of new revenue.

The gasoline tax raises \$630 million a year, 10 percent for public transportation and the rest for roads. Each cent raises about \$42 million. A tax on diesel fuel raises another \$72 million a year.

A week earlier in a television debate, Engler had said, "We will have to look at higher fuel taxes."

In an interview in Guernsey Farms Dairy, a Novi coffee shop, Engler said he'd heard much from the locals that another exit from the I-96 freeway to Novi Center is "long over due."

The governor said he is targeting southern Oakland and western Wayne communities that have had population growth, benefited from school property tax cuts, and seen the good side of single business tax cuts.

"A stronger western Wayne County economy and John Engler's fortunes are linked together," he said.

Engler raised questions that he might support state aid to private, church-based schools a week earlier. During a debate with Democratic challenger Howard Wolpe, the governor said he wouldn't "lead" a pro-parochial fight. "I

would not be part of it," he added. A Detroit Free Press columnist accused Engler of "waffling," and a Detroit News columnist predicted Engler would comfort "the state's powerful, fundamentalist bloc by quietly helping to repeal the state's constitutional ban on parochial."

"Nobody has been able to present an argument to me that this (parochial) is needed," Engler replied.

"This issue has been around 24 years or more. My priority is the children in public schools. We have 1.6 million of them. The whole effort (parochial question) by Howard Wolpe is to appeal to his base, the Michigan Education Association, to divert attention off the performance of public education. I think it's a red herring."

"If we were (supporting parochial), we'd be supporting a call for a constitutional convention (Proposal A on the Nov. 8 ballot) this time. I oppose that. I oppose amending the constitution."

Michigan voters have said no three times to state money for private and religious schools. The 1963 constitution prohibits state funds for "the support of any minister of the gospel or teacher of religion" or "any religious sect or society, theological or religious seminary."

In 1970 voters prohibited "parochial" state aid to non-public schools, by a 3-2 margin. Engler opposed that ban, saying it was "unduly restrictive and went too far."

In 1978 voters rejected, 3-1, a "voucher" system, where state aid would follow the student to any school.

The issue is alive this week as the religious right pushes for state aid to the Noah Webster Academy, a charter school set up in Ionia County.

The Webster academy was organized under the charter school law that Engler advocated. It reportedly plans to teach religious "creationism" to a statewide computer network of home instruction.

Looking at the Noah Webster

effort and Detroit efforts to set up African-American culture academies as charter schools, Engler said he saw no danger the law was backfiring. "I think the charter school movement represents the innovative, cutting-edge approach to educating children," he said.

"In the dozen or so that are coming in, you'll see all sorts of ideas. There's tremendous excitement and energy out there, people saying, 'What can I do? How can I make a difference?'"

"We didn't anticipate there'd be any one model. That's why there are 600 entities ready to grant charters. We thought there would be a proliferation of different approaches. As soon as it's better understood, you'll see many teachers saying, 'I want to do it differently than I'm being required to in the public school system.'"

"We have public school teachers supporting us exactly because there are charter schools, and they're opposing Wolpe because he's committing himself to repeal this law. Which, again, is one more example of his doing the bidding of the Michigan Education Association staff."

Engler made one 180-degree turnaround this year in the GOP's nominees for the State Board of Education. Two years ago, he supported Dorothy Beardmore, a veteran of the Rochester, Oakland Intermediate and State Board, for a new term, along with Harry Greenleaf, a longtime Schoolcraft College trustee.

This year Engler is backing Sharon Wise of Owosso and Detroit attorney Clark Durant, neither of whom has served in a public school capacity.

"I won't speak for the entire convention, but in Clark and Sharon we have two very able candidates who care about where education is headed in the state," he said.

"They realize making policy at the state level is not dependent on one's experience at the local level as a board member. It is quite dependent on one's experience as a parent and citizen."

Pistol-packing school children need education too, officials say

Lawmakers did just half a job when they decided kids who bring guns to school should be expelled, say school officials.

"Young people who bring guns to school do not belong in school, but they do not belong in the streets unattended," said Robert Schiller, superintendent of public instruction.

"They still need basic education on a neutral site. We have so advised the Legislature," Schiller told the State Board of Education Wednesday.

During the height of his campaign for a second term, Gov. John Engler signed Senate Bill

966, calling for the expulsion of gun-toting kids. The ceremony took place last week in Dearborn. The charter school law, strongly advocated and much touted by Engler, may not help, one board member observed.

"There's talk in one city of a charter school for expelled students," noted board co-president Annetta Miller, D-Huntington Woods. "But they have been expelled from public schools. Would the law have to be changed to allow it (charter school for gun-toters)?"

State Rep. Lynn Rivers, D-Ann Arbor, voted against SB 966. In her 13th District congressional campaign, she was accused of

being soft on crime. But Rivers argued that she offered amendments, rejected by Republicans, that would have provided alternative schooling for expelled students.

Rivers said Republicans told her that if the state mandated alternative schooling, the state would have to pay for it — impossible under the Headlee constitutional amendment limiting taxes to a percentage of personal incomes.

Meanwhile, Department of Education staffers told the State Board Wednesday that a special commission on violence and vandalism in the schools is preparing a report, due in November.

Commissioners form a coalition to elect chairman

A coalition of eight county commissioners from Detroit and the suburbs have banded together and intend to make commissioner Ricardo Solomon, D-Detroit, the next chairman of the commission, according to a highly placed commission source.

The Detroit commissioners in the coalition are supposed to be George Cushingberry, Otis Mathis, Charmie Currie and current Chairman Arthur Blackwell, who has already announced his resignation. He is expected to make it official next month.

The vote for a new chairman to serve out the remainder of Blackwell's term (until January) is expected to occur Nov. 17.

Commissioner Thaddeus McCotter, R-Livonia, who also represents Plymouth and Plymouth Township, said Friday he supports Solomon.

"I believe we need a biracial, bi-

partisan coalition," McCotter said.

Another group of commissioners is supporting William O'Neil, D-Allen Park, for chairman. However, this group doesn't yet have the eight votes needed to make O'Neil chairman.

McCotter said a winning coalition for O'Neil would have to be all white, which would racially polarize the commission.

"Eight whites voting against seven blacks will lead to nothing but warfare and poor government," McCotter said.

Commissioner Bryan Amann, D-Wayne, who also represents Canton Township, is not running for re-election this year, but his vote for chairman is much sought after.

"I've somehow become the lame duck who laid the golden egg," he said.

Amann agreed that there would be trouble if eight white commissioners elected O'Neil chairman.



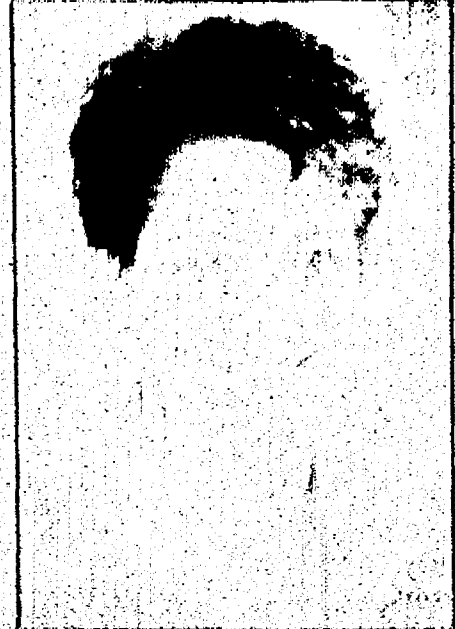

"Racial divisiveness serves nobody well."

O'Neil's secretary said Friday that O'Neil was in a meeting with county Executive Edward McNamara.

Commissioner Michelle Plawecki, D-Dearborn Heights, who also represents Redford Township and Livonia east of Middlebelt, said she hasn't thrown her support to anyone for chairman yet.

"I would be willing to support a bipartisan, biracial leadership," she said. "I'll support whoever can help me provide the most for my community."

Whoever gets the job will receive an annual salary of about \$55,000. The base annual salary for county commissioners is about \$43,000.

Blackwell, 40, has been chairman since 1989.

He said he will continue as a commissioner representing the Third District, which comprises Highland Park, Hamtramck and adjacent parts of Detroit.

Blackwell said he wants to "really say what I feel" as a commissioner, but he can't do that as chairman. "A chairman is supposed to be above the fray and at the same time express his political will," he said. "I want to ex-

ercise my independence."

Commission Vice Chair Kay Beard, D-Westland, who also represents Garden City, said Blackwell has been talking about giving up the chairmanship for a year. "The only real surprise was the timing of it," she said, adding that she expected Blackwell to serve out his two-year term.

McNamara did not return the Observer's phone calls by press time.

Anti-abortion display gets reactions

An anti-abortion display of 4,000 small, white crosses on the front lawn of Lutheran High School Westland is attracting a reaction from motorists -- mostly positive, according to a school employee.

The crosses, at the school on Cowan between Wildwood and Venoy were planted in the lawn by students last week and will be up through Wednesday, Nov. 2.

An office bulletin board tally shows that of Friday morning, the school received eight supportive comments, two in opposition and one that was "in between," said

secretary Barbara Morawa.

She added that the two persons objecting to the anti-abortion display weren't angry, but just wanted to express their opinion.

The only one to voice his concern in person commented to her that the school should have spent its energy more on an anti-smoking campaign.

Principal Steve Schwecke told the Observer Friday that the idea for the display came from Jim Aumann, a junior and senior religion teacher, in late August, after the teacher learned that other schools had a display of crosses on their

front lawns showing the daily number of abortions in the country.

Aumann, with Schwecke's support, then contacted the Lutherans for Life of Michigan organization which provides the crosses.

The crosses were then placed on the school's front lawn by members of the school's Christian Growth Committee, which works under the student council.

It took the students, working after school, six to seven hours to complete the project.

Aumann said Dan Grams, Christian Growth Committee,

who did the telephoning and related work, should get the credit for the project.

The teacher added that three motorists stopped in front of the school when the crosses were being placed on the lawn to express their support.

"One man clapped and said 'I want to applaud you,'" Aumann quoted the driver.

One motorist thought at first the display was a Halloween activity until he noticed the accompanying sign that said that there are 4,500 abortions a day in the country.

Have a ball with popcorn this fall

If you take a walk through any farm market this time of year you'll see plenty of corn husks in addition to pumpkins, squash, apples, pears and potatoes. Now that Michigan's corn on the cob season has departed for another 10 months, I find myself looking forward to another type of corn - popcorn.

Old-fashioned method

The Janes Gang were ravenous popcorn eaters. Growing up in Wyandotte, we never had a microwave oven or Orville Redenbacher's popcorn, let alone hot air poppers and Pop Secret. Momma's secret for making the best popped corn was a humungous 8-quart aluminum saucepan that must have weighed in at nearly 10 pounds. It had a good lid that fit around the inside rim.

All you had to do was coat the bottom of the pot with just enough Crisco to cover it and heat it, as momma would say "till you can see the ripples in the grease." Then, and only then, could the old Tupperware measuring cup of kernels be added.

We would then shake the pot with one hand while holding onto the lid with a pot holder in the other hand. I can't imagine the irreparable harm done to the burner top because while shakin' the pot which never left the surface of the burner.

Once the kernels began a good steady pop, we would then turn the flame down by half and slowly proceed till we heard no more "pops." There was seldom an unpopped kernel, let alone a burnt batch.

We enjoyed munching popcorn while sitting around watching television, especially on Sunday nights way before "60 Minutes" was ever popular. Remember who we watched? He always had "a really BIG show," and to this day, I can still remember eating popcorn and watching the Beatles on their first televised appearance on the Ed Sullivan Show.

Seasonal treat

Momma might have taught us kids the proper way to pop good corn, but it was from Oct. 15 through Christmas that momma herself would begin to perform magic with popcorn that even had my dad asking for more.

About two weeks before Halloween, momma would begin making up a batch of her home-made popcorn balls. If you were a neighborhood kid our house knew, in addition to the three pennies momma would drop into your sack, you would be lucky to get one of momma's famed popcorn balls, wrapped in Cut-Rite waxed paper and tied with a piece of kitchen twine.

Those were the popcorn balls that were incredibly crunchy, made with a hard drop home-made candy. Momma could judge when the candy was heated just right without the use of a candy thermometer.

But after Halloween and just before Thanksgiving, momma would slip on her housecoat (she never wore an apron) and after popping what must have been about 10 batches of popcorn, she would make a caramel corn ball that was sticky, crunchy, gooey and even more flavorful than her Halloween balls.

Instead of making a hard drop sugar candy coating, I would watch her "burn" a few cups of sugar in her heavy cast iron fry pan till it transformed itself from a pale white color to that of a crisp amber colored falling leaf.

Again, she would whisk up a fury stirring in vanilla and a pinch of salt in the last few seconds and we would all ooh and ahh and wonder how her gloved hands weren't burning from the hot caramel coating.

Christmas specials

Then after Thanksgiving, she would get really creative. The family would hop into the old Ford Fairlane for a trip downtown to see Hudson's 12th floor Christmas extravaganza and on the way home, momma would stop at the Rocky Mount Company in the Eastern Market searching for dried fruits for her upcoming holiday fruitcakes.

Before we knew it, and between batches of fruitcakes, momma would whip up a batch of popcorn balls, a little less crunchy, and made with a simple sugar coating. She would surprise us by tossing in handfuls of chopped dried fruit and nuts. These holiday popcorn balls were too good, and way too pretty to be wrapped in waxed paper, so momma would splurge and buy a box of "Baggies" for the special treats. They were usually reserved for the postman, our parish priest, the butcher, baker and the guy who sold us lunch meat at Jack & Jim's meat market.

Healthy treats trick 'cookie monsters'



Treats are fine once in awhile, but studies show that Michigan has more overweight children than the national average. You can serve special treats that taste great, but are low in fat. Making Halloween snacks can be fun.

Calm your excited cookie monsters this weekend, spend some time together in the kitchen making Halloween treats.

"Try the Heart Smart trick this year by making treats with less fat and sugar," said Roxolana Karencac, a dietitian with the Henry Ford Heart and Vascular Institute.

"Children need to learn healthy habits at an early age, and special occasions such as Halloween are great opportunities to reinforce these habits," she said.

Michigan children need to develop better eating habits. Statistics show that Michigan has more overweight children with higher

cholesterol levels than the national average. Both problems are the result of diets too high in fat and calories and too little exercise.

According to the American Institute for Cancer Research, one national survey found that 34 percent of American children are overweight - almost one-third more than 10 years ago. Another scientific report found that obese kids did not necessarily eat larger quantities, but did eat more high-fat foods.

Sweets are high in fat and/or sugar and therefore calories. "For example, one ounce of plain milk chocolate contains 150 calories, 2 teaspoons of fat and 3 teaspoons of sugar," said Karencac. "Sugar type candies such as gum drops do not contain fat. However, one ounce does contain

nearly 5 teaspoons of sugar."

"Getting control of Halloween treats is a good place to start," said Karencac. "You can serve special treats that taste great, but are still low in fat and calories. For Halloween parties, start a 'spooktacular' tradition by serving fun and healthy snacks such as raisins, pretzels, dried fruit or popcorn."

Replacing high-fat foods with naturally low-fat fruits, vegetables and grains give kids better concentration in school, provides better coordination in sports, plus longer-lasting energy and lower blood cholesterol. And when kids feel better from a more nutritious diet, they usually develop more confidence and self-esteem.

Instead of counting calories or forbidding favorite foods, the Institute for Cancer Research recommends making high-fat foods an occasional treat for kids, and fill them up each day on foods that have less fat and more fiber and nutrients, especially fruits and vegetables.

Turn off the TV, and get mov-

ing. Making Halloween treats is something fun you can do with your children.

Heart disease is scary, take steps to lower risk

Here's a scary statistic - cardiovascular disease kills one of every two people in Michigan.

According to the American Heart Association, cardiovascular disease is the number one killer in Michigan. Ours is the worst state for overweight children and adults and third worst for smoking.

Some risk factors for developing heart disease can not be changed including increasing age, family history and race. African-Americans, Puerto Ricans, Cuban- and Mexican-Americans are more likely to suffer from high blood pressure than Anglo-Americans.

But there are some things you can do to lower your heart disease risk - quit smoking, start exercising, and eat a low-fat, low salt diet.

This week is HeartFest, the American Heart Association's nationally designated nutrition week, and a good time to re-evaluate your diet.

"High cholesterol, hypertension, diabetes, and some other diseases are partly due to genetics," said Linda DeVore a registered dietitian at St. Mary's Hospital in Livonia. "But obesity increases

your risks. Improving your dietary habits helps your children and you."

DeVore recommends that families gradually ease into a healthier eating plan. "Only introduce one new food at a time," said DeVore who is married and has two daughters ages 11 and 14.

"Most people hit the panic button and say, 'OK it's Monday, time to diet.' We're creatures of our habits, it's tough to modify them."

DeVore prefers to take people from where they are to a "progressively" healthier meal plan (see chart). Slow changes are lasting changes, and make peace in the home.

In her LifeSteps Weight Loss program at St. Mary's Hospital, she teaches students how to take small steps toward change, instead of giant steps, which often make people want to give up. "You need to be enjoying what you're doing today to stick with positive improvements," said DeVore.

Menu Improvement Progression

- From deep-fried chicken to tightly breaded baked chicken to chicken with no breading
- From fat packed tuna with salad dressing to water packed tuna with salad dressing to water packed tuna with light or fat-free salad dressing
- From large hamburgers (3 burgers per pound) to medium size (4 burgers per pound) to economy size (five burgers per pound) meats with ground turkey or turkey
- From cream cheese country ribs to lean center cut pork chops, well broiled
- From regular cheddar to low-fat cheddar to fat-free cheddar
- From 2% milk to 1% or 1/2% milk to skim milk

Vore. "The motivator should be to feel better, not look better."

It has worked for Judy Kral of Plymouth, and Janet Doady of Livonia.

"I wanted to improve my health, and learn low-fat cooking methods," said Kral explaining why she took the class. "I learned to cut the fat out of my recipes, and how to read labels," said Kral who is married and the mother of two grown children.

"I try to make things that are good. I don't refer to them as 'low-fat' or 'diet food.' That way my husband doesn't notice a difference."

He did complain about only eating chicken and fish so Kral found a low-fat way to satisfy his craving for beef. "I shop at Bob's Farm Market in Canton. I buy an English cut roast and ask them
