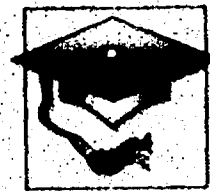

Finalist wants school board unity



Duane Moore, the only finalist for the Wayne-Westland school superintendency, isn't insisting on a unanimous school board vote, but wants something better than a 4-3 split.

The Wayne-Westland school board will have to show some unity if it hopes to hire a South Lyon administrator as the district's next superintendent.

South Lyon Superintendent Duane

Moore, responding to the Observer's question, said Thursday that he would likely refuse the Wayne-Westland job if the board voted 4-3 to offer him a contract.

Accepting the post on such a razor-thin vote would place him "on dangerous ground," Moore said, even if

two of the opposition votes came from board members "who don't plan to seek re-election in June."

"I think it sends a message," he said.

Moore's comments strongly indicated that he wants to avoid the same fate as departing Superintendent Larry Thomas, who was hired in 1992 on a 4-3 vote only to be pressured to resign when his three-year contract expires June 30.

Moore, 53, didn't rule out accepting the job on a 5-2 vote. His decision would hinge on the reasons cited for

the two opposing votes, he said.

Moore, the only finalist for Thomas' job, met with the seven-member board over dinner Thursday at the William Ford Vocational-Technical Center. It marked his second interview, which will be followed this week by board member visits to the South Lyon district.

The board is expected to decide whether to hire Moore during a special session scheduled for 6 p.m. April 20 at school board offices on Mar-

Voters decide 2 school proposals today

Westland voters in the Livonia school district will help decide the fate today (Monday) of two school money proposals. Polls will close at 8 tonight.

School administrators are getting

ready to count the vote tonight on an election which they say is critical to the long-term financial health of the district, which includes the northern portion of Westland.

Proposal A asks taxpayers to renew for five years two taxes that now generate an estimated \$26.8 million year-

ly for programs. Renewal will not result in a tax rate increase for anyone.

If the proposal passes, business and industry will continue to pay the 18 mills they now pay in property tax, and all taxpayers including homeowners will continue to pay the 1.1588 mills they now pay to finance

school programs.

Proposal B is a request for an additional 1 mill to be used only for building repairs and maintenance. The sinking fund created would generate \$3.3 million each year for five years.

High schools will get additional math books

Wayne-Westland school officials are addressing a math textbook shortage at John Glenn and Wayne Memorial senior high schools by spending \$129,242 for additional books.

Money for the books has become available through a concerted effort by the district's curriculum department to be frugal during

the last two-year spending cycle, said Jane Kuckel, assistant superintendent for instruction.

"I have been very frugal with all expenditures in our department in order to channel as many dollars as possible toward curriculum implementation," she said in a memo to the Wayne-Westland school board.

The belt-tightening efforts allowed Kuckel to carry over

\$70,000 from last year, and she told the school board that her department has another \$70,000 available this year.

The board's approval of Kuckel's book-buying request means that students will have enough textbooks at the two high schools for Integrated Mathematics I, Integrated Mathematics II and Mathematical Connections. Adams Junior High pupils also

will have more books for Mathematics: Structure & Method Book 2.

Some students and parents had been upset about the textbook shortage. One mother earlier contacted the Observer with complaints that her daughter didn't have a math book that she could bring home to study.

"We don't even have classroom sets for many of the ninth- and 10th-grade Integrated I and Inte-

grated II classes," Kuckel said in her memo to school board members.

The decision to correct the problem comes as Kuckel's department has been involved in a full-scale effort to improve the district's math curriculum at all grade levels.

A full math curriculum proposal is expected to be submitted to the school board in June, but

Kuckel wanted to buy some books now to address an immediate problem.

The board-approved proposal will bring in an additional 1,650 student books at John Glenn High School, 1,460 books at Wayne Memorial High School, and 149 books at Adams Junior High School, according to purchase orders approved by the board.

Cable rate hike possible

Westland cable television subscribers could see their basic monthly rates increase 56 cents, to \$10.88, following a decision by the Federal Communications Commission.

The rate hike is set to take effect May 1, though local officials say that other federal-level developments could change the scenario before then. Stay tuned.

Reluctantly complying with FCC orders, the Westland City Council approved the 56-cent rate hike Monday night.

The council had earlier refused

to approve the rate increase, prompting a lawsuit by Continental Cablevision. The city lost the legal battle, resulting in the FCC order.

"That's the only reason we're doing it," Councilman David Cox said Monday.

Cox noted that the city has no choice but to implement the rate hike following the FCC order.

Councilman Glenn Anderson expressed some consolation that the rate hikes at least won't be retroactive.

quette, east of Newburgh Road.

Moore's second interview followed hours of meetings with Wayne-Westland principals, employee union leaders and cabinet members. He said he came away from those talks with the impression that employees want a leader who can unite the district.

"I think there's some fear of what's going to happen," he told the board. "Certainly there's some apprehension."

During the board interview, Moore responded to questions about curriculum, his personal hobbies, his leadership abilities, millage campaigns, team-building efforts and superintendent-board relations, among other topics.

A Civil War buff who reads fiction and history, Moore also plays tennis and, sometimes, golf. He and his wife, a Plymouth-Canton principal, have two adult children.

Equal treatment

If hired, Moore pledged to treat board members equally, and he said he would expect "open, honest" relations.

"I think the board can expect me not to offer any surprises (in public sessions), but I would expect that in turn."

Moore, who received his doctorate from Michigan State University, was initially one of seven semifinalists for the Wayne-Westland job. But five candidates dropped out, and the board chose not to interview Allen Park Superintendent William Klefer a second time.

Among some of the highlights of Thursday's interview:

Moore said he didn't view it as a bad career move when he left the superintendentcy of an 18,000-student Indiana district in 1988 to lead the 2,000-pupil Spring Lake district in Michigan. The challenges were similar, he said;

size didn't matter. He moved to the 5,000-student South Lyon district in 1991. Wayne-Westland has 15,000 pupils.

He said Wayne-Westland officials will need to consider a future bond to improve classroom technology, which he said is crucial for preparing students for today's jobs.

One major concern is drug abuse in the schools. "I think it's rampant not only in my school district, but in yours and others," he said. Communities need to be supportive of programs such as DARE (Drug Abuse Resistance Education), he told the board.

Wayne-Westland's new superintendent will face "a major challenge" in trying to improve employee morale, he said.

If hired, Moore wants the board to wait until he begins his job to plan specific details, such as an election date, for an impending tax-increase proposal. Thomas

has already suggested a September election.

Move is promised

Moore promised to move to the Wayne-Westland district. Some board members were disappointed that Thomas remained in the Westland portion of the Livonia district.

"You have to be paying the taxes along with (residents)," he said. "That's my belief."

To improve the public's perception of teachers, Moore said, "I think you've got to get people into the schools to see what the teaching staff is doing."

Moore noted that school districts are seeing expenditures outpace revenues. At another point, he said employee contracts need to be carefully studied.

"I think there are going to be changes in how we arrive at our contracts and what they contain," he said.

For local residents, a 1-mill levy would mean an annual property tax increase of \$35 for a home valued at \$70,000.

One person who opposes Proposal B is former Livonia property assessor Ron Mardiros who mailed postcards to what he said were 400 persons on his Christmas mailing list, urging them to vote no on Proposal B.

Mardiros told the Observer said he backed Proposal A. But if school administrators need to raise money for building repairs, they should borrow the money when they need it instead of seeking additional millage, he said.

The district could borrow \$3.5 million and the cost would be 10 cents extra in property tax — not \$1 as the 1 mill would be," Mardiros said. "This is a more financially sound way to do it but, of

course, it's my own personal view."

By going for a millage, said Randy Liepa, assistant superintendent for business, the district won't have to pay interest charges.

Also, the district would borrow closer to \$15 million, the amount the millage would generate over five years, and that would increase interest charges, he said.

Additionally, he said, a bond issue also would generate legal, overhead, and other bonding costs.

"It's sounder financially to pay as you go," Liepa said. "You have more dollars to use by not paying interest costs. We can set the money aside and instead earn interest on it. This is the most cost-effective way, and the only option we have other than bonding."

2 teens face trial after knife assault

What began as two carloads of teens staring each other down on Joy Road ended in a knife assault that prompted criminal charges against two teenage males, a Westland police sergeant said.

Earl Louis Gesch, 18, of Garden City and Roy Edward Simpson, 17, of Van Buren Township face trial in Detroit Recorder's Court on charges of assault with intent to do great bodily harm, less than murder.

The charges stem from an assault that Westland police Sgt.

Leonard West said occurred about 10 p.m. March 25, when the two carloads of teens pulled off of Joy Road near Middlebelt. The two groups had been involved in what West described as a "staring contest" on the five-lane road.

Simpson is accused of giving Gesch a knife that was used to slash a 19-year-old Westland man when some of the teens got out of their cars, West said. The victim suffered cuts on both legs and received 24 stitches, the sergeant said.

Although Gesch is accused of

cutting the victim, Simpson was also charged because of allegations that he gave the knife to Gesch, West said.

Simpson was knocked to the ground during the fight, and several teens disarmed him before he was able to flee in a car with Gesch, West said.

The pair was arrested about four hours later during a traffic stop by Westland police.

Gesch and Simpson were ordered to stand trial after they voluntarily waived a preliminary hearing Thursday before West-

land 18th District Court Judge Gail McKnight. Their decision to forego the hearing avoided pre-trial testimony that would have surfaced Thursday in court.

Not-guilty pleas were placed on record for both teens following their arrest. Both are free on personal bonds while the case is pending.

Gesch and Simpson could face a maximum 10-year prison term if convicted. Following McKnight's decision to order a trial, the defendants were scheduled for an April 20 arraignment in Recorder's Court.

Outstanding mother, dad, teacher are honored

Judy Curtis, Benjamin Brown and Vicki Sorensen have a special common denominator — they were honored by the Westland Kiwanis Club and the city of Westland for being the city's outstanding mother, father and teacher of the year, respectively.

The three received plaques at the first ceremony which was sponsored by the Kiwanis Club in conjunction with the "state of the city" address by Mayor Robert Thomas.

They were the center of attention for the estimated 300 persons who attended the ceremony in the Hellenic Cultural Center, on Joy between Wayne Road and Newburgh.

Besides the verbal recitation of the nominating entries, the three were also the center of separate videos played for the audience.

Kiwanis Club President George Dardorian said that the group would continue to sponsor the program in the future.

The recognition program was a "Salute to Excellence" activity of the club and the mayor's office.

Curtis, a registered nurse who works at Providence Hospital, was cited for her countless hours of volunteer time devoted to Wildwood School and its PTA and being a driver who delivers meals daily to home-bound seniors.

Former Wildwood principal Larry Waynick, one of the persons who nominated Curtis,

wrote that the woman has given unselfishly of her time to her children's school, Girl Scouts and the community for many years.

She was Wildwood PTA president for five years, a Girl Scout coordinator, and church volunteer.

"Judy Curtis fits the mold of the highest quality mother, volunteer and citizen," Waynick said.

Sharon Thomas-Brown, current Wildwood principal, also nominated Curtis, stressing her involvement in helping students in the school's computer and science rooms.

The winner's husband also pointed out that Curtis devotes some of her "spare time" working with the school district's schools of choice committee and a parents' panel which reviewed administrative recommendation for attendance boundary changes.

Brown was nominated by a stepson, Fred Michelsen, 11, who wrote the awards committee that his stepfather spends a lot of time with the family, especially motorcycle riding and hunt.

"He teaches us about God and most of all I am happy my mom found my dad. I couldn't want a better dad," the youngster wrote.

The boy added that Brown is his "best friend."

In the video shown the audience, Brown said he is involved with family activities "for fun, not to get recognition."

He said he wants to give his children a lesson on the impor-

ance of "honesty, responsibility, dependability and having good morals so I won't have to worry about them when they grow up."

Brown stressed "love, patience and understanding" within his family and has "no regrets" about the time spent with them.

Sorensen, a sixth grade teacher at Patchin Elementary School, had most of her class attend the recognition program. The day before, pupils presented her with yellow roses, a PTA mother told the Observer.

The teacher was nominated by two of her students, Nicole Simonian and Jessica Mattice.

They praised her for being a kind and giving teacher who "gives life to students in need."

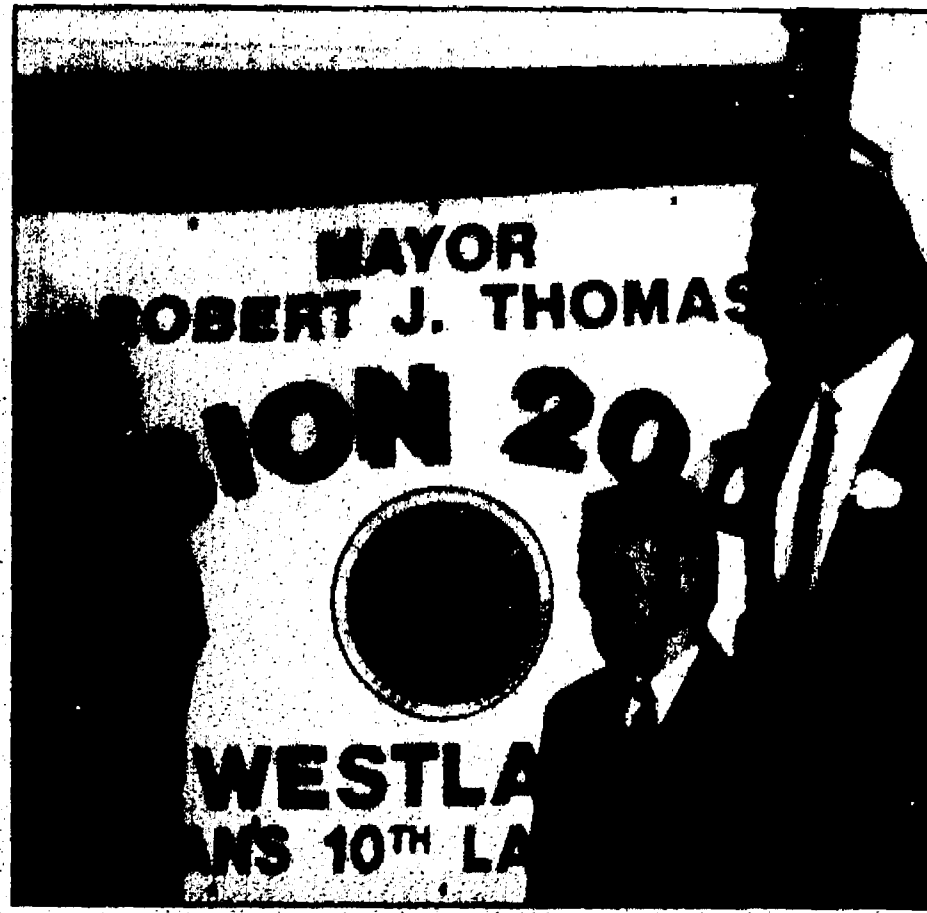
"There are three parts to my life — my family, me and my teacher," Jessica said in her nomination letter.

Nicole added that Sorensen is "the nicest and funniest teacher ever. If I could have her for my teacher the rest of my school years, I would be glad," she added.

compost station, a public safety millage to pay for the advanced life support system within the fire department, the community-policing program and a high-tech industrial park in the Michigan Avenue-Morrison area, across the street from a planned county golf course.

Other improvements, which are in the planning stages, are a Newburgh Road widened to five lanes north from Glenwood, a railroad underpass on that road between Palmer and Cherry Hill, and custom-built homes priced at \$250,000 in the city's northwest corner.

Westland Center will be expanded and renovated, according to the mayor's projection.

In other commercial developments, the Wayne Road corridor between Ford and Palmer will be upgraded.

Thomas also said that the city plans this summer to build a 33,000-square-foot library, the community's first, on the west side of Central City Parkway between Elmwood and Stacey.

On the concept of a new city hall, the mayor said he envisions a three- or four-story building with the first floor leased with the payments used by the city to pay off the new structure.

Thomas said he hopes the building would be a little closer to Ford Road than the existing city hall, a two-story building built in 1964.

"I hope to stand here in the year 2000 and bring a copy of tonight's talk and compare notes."

The mayor outlined his proposed spending plan, given to the city council last in the form of a budget for the fiscal year to start July 1.

The planned spending of \$33.8 million includes only a minimal increase over the current fiscal year and maintains the same levels of city services.

But the mayor said that the city will have a problem in keeping its share of state-shared revenues, which come from the state income tax and gasoline taxes.

Thomas said Westland and other communities are pushing for a state constitutional amendment to guarantee those revenues for cities.

On the financial front, the mayor had good news for his audience.

President Bill Clinton signed a new law March 22 which prohibits unfunded mandates by the federal government onto communities.

But the bad news is that the law doesn't affect past man-

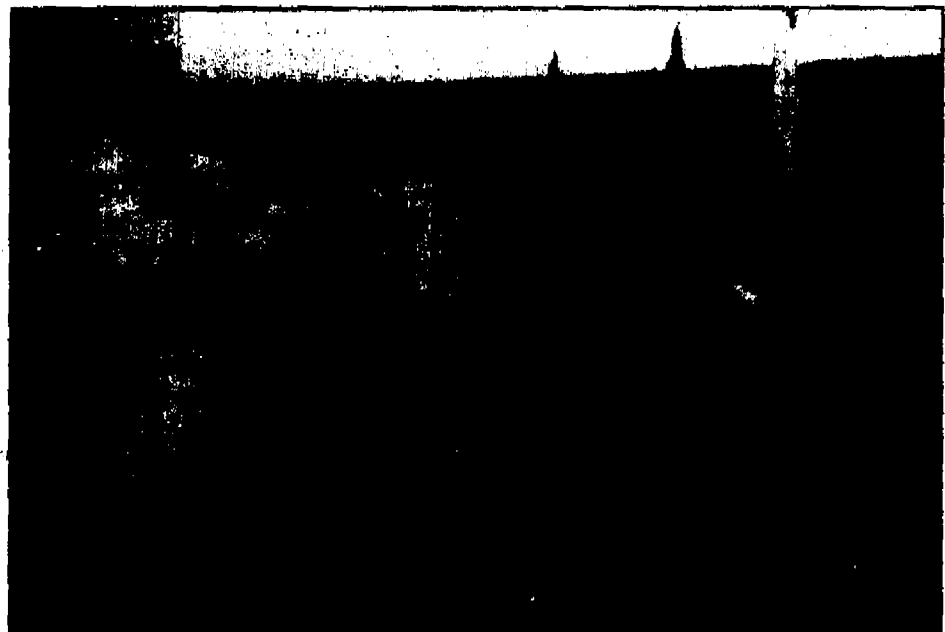
dates, such as a water system improvement for which the city recently approved a \$7.4 million bond sale.

Thomas warned that a city charter review committee is considering several changes which he feels would erode the powers of the mayor's office.

One suggestion would give the city council the power to confirm all of the mayor's recommendations for department heads. Currently, only three appointments — recreation director, planning director and city attorney — are subject to council confirmation.

The other suggestion being reviewed by the committee is to reduce the mayor's veto powers.

If those recommendations are eventually approved by the voters, the city's government would turn to a form of a "glorified city manager," Thomas said.

City to crack down on signs in right of way

The city of Westland is preparing a stepped-up enforcement program to remove signs placed illegally in road rights of way.

"We have always had somewhat of a problem with illegal signs on city right of way, but it has gotten much worse over the last year or so, and we have been receiving numerous complaints from residents," Mayor Robert Thomas said, in announcing the campaign.

Any sign, whether it is a garage sale sign, a craft show sign, a sign advertising a business or even the small signs that are nailed to utility poles, is illegal, he said.

"They cannot be placed on right of ways," the mayor said. "Not only are they unsightly, they create a traffic hazard by people trying to read them as they drive along."

The city realizes this may upset some residents who have garage sales and want to put out a sign, but there are ways they can legally display their signs, he said.

"They may put them in friends' or neighbors' yards (with permission) as long as they are within the property line and not on the

right of way."

Thomas said he has made many attempts to notify and warn residents about this stepped-up enforcement program through Town Hall Meetings, mayoral addresses, announcements at city council meetings and press releases.

"Unfortunately, there will still be some people who will not hear about this program, so I am hoping residents will share the infor-

mation with their neighbors and friends," Thomas said. "We don't want anyone to be surprised by waking up and finding their signs have been removed by the city."

City work crews will be assigned to remove the illegal signs from city right of way starting Friday, April 21.

The city is informing people that there should be no illegal signs posted on weekends.

"Quite often the city has work crews out working on weekends,

and they will be instructed to remove any illegal signs they spot in the city right of way while performing their work activities," he said.

Thomas is hoping for the community's cooperation.

"This will help clean up and beautify our city, and I am hoping our residents will help us by spreading the word."

Besides residents, the new campaign is also aimed at political campaign signs in city right of way.

"Candidates need to make their sign crews and volunteers aware of this ordinance, making sure they think twice before placing signs in the right of way. They will be picked up if improperly placed, and this could prove expensive to the candidate," Thomas said.

Arson plea accepted; other charges dropped

A Westland man originally charged with trying to kill his wife and children by setting the family house on fire has pleaded no contest to arson, and other criminal charges will be dropped, a court clerk said.

The sudden development came Thursday as a trial was to begin for Robert Michael Mulka, 28, who was accused by investigators of dousing the house with a flammable liquid and setting it afire the morning of May 23, 1993.

Mulka's wife, Wendy, and their two daughters, ages 8 and 2, were asleep at the time, but they escaped through a window when one of the girls awoke and alerted her mother, police said.

Wendy Mulka has stood by her husband and has denied that he would try to harm her or their children.

Mulka was originally charged with arson and three counts of assault with intent to murder. After a jury deadlocked during a trial last May, however, Detroit Recorder's Court Judge Vera Massey Jones reduced the attempted murder charges to three counts of

assault with intent to do great bodily harm, less than murder.

In the latest development, Mulka agreed to plead no contest to arson on Thursday, and all other charges will be dropped when he returns to court April 27 for sentencing, a court clerk said.

Mulka could face a maximum sentence of 20 years in prison for arson.

The couple now has a third child; Wendy Mulka was pregnant when the incident occurred.

Last May, Mulka phoned the Observer to emphatically deny that he tried to harm his family.

"I would never do anything to hurt my family," he said. "I would have no reason to do that. I love my family very much. I spend so much time with my children."

He had been free on bond pending the case's resolution.

Prosecutors had contended that Mulka set the house on fire before he went to work on the morning of May 23. Defense attorneys, however, had claimed that the fire started in a couch and was fueled by a nearby can of hairspray.

Mulka said he had been smoking a cigarette in the morning hours, before he went to work.

Murder hearing delayed

A preliminary hearing was delayed Thursday for a 27-year-old man charged with killing a Canton Township woman, who was strangled and beaten on the head while working at a Westland high-rise apartment building.

The hearing for Keith Lamont Burns, 27, was delayed after his attorney asked 18th District Judge Gail McKnight for more time to review the case. The hearing was rescheduled for this Thursday.

Meanwhile, police are continuing to investigate the March 29 death of Hoonahoon Andrews, a 50-year-old maintenance worker who was strangled with a bandanna she often wore to work at the Hunters West apartment complex.

Police suspect that Burns didn't act alone. Westland police Sgt. Tom Kubitskey has said.

A second suspect was questioned but later released.

The investigation has indicated that Andrews was in the wrong place at the wrong time. Police believe she walked into a situation where some type of illegal activity, possibly a gun sale, was in progress.

The killing occurred near a first-floor swimming pool at Hunters West, a high-rise complex at Yale and Hunter, a half mile south of Westland Center. Andrews was found about 9:15 a.m. March 29 by a co-worker.

Local officials win control of transit authority

Control of the newly created Wayne County Transit Authority has been taken out of the hands of county Executive Edward McNamara and passed on to suburban Wayne County mayors and supervisors. The Wayne County Commission voted unanimously Thursday to make the change.

The original "articles of incorporation" of the authority established a three-member board with two of the members being McNamara and someone McNamara appoints. The new articles grant control to a nine-member board of which five members are from suburban communities.

The authority was formed by the commission March 10 so a 0.33-mill property tax proposal could be placed on the May 23 ballot to pay for the SMART bus system.

However, a provision in Public Act 196, under which the authority was formed, says cities and townships may "opt out" of the authority.

Communities that opt out will not be part of the May 23 tax vote.

By pre-arranged agreement, Detroit opted out because it has its own bus system and hopes eventually to merge with SMART.

SMART interim general manager Michael Duggan had hoped that the remaining cities and townships would stay involved.

He even promised transit subsidies for each city and township would be doubled if they remained. Conversely, he said communities opting out would lose their subsidies and bus service.

Still, township boards and city councils left the authority.

The list includes Plymouth, Plymouth Township, Canton Township, Northville, Northville Township, Van Buren Township, Huron Township, Woodhaven, Belleville, Sumpter Township and four of the five Grosse Pointes.

Livonia, Redford Township, Garden City and Westland are still in.

Mayors and supervisors were concerned about McNamara having control of the authority, in part because it would eventually be impossible for a city or township to leave the authority without a majority vote of the board, i.e. without McNamara's permission.

Other worries were:
■ SMART might have transferred its debt of more than \$16 million to the authority.

■ The authority would continue to exist even if the May 23 property tax ballot proposal fails.

Mayors and supervisors convinced Duggan to rewrite the articles of incorporation. The commission approved amendments Thursday that establish the nine-member board, protect authority members from SMART's debt, dissolve the authority if the tax proposal fails, and prohibit the authority from collecting a tax greater than 0.33 mill.

The 10-3 March 10 vote to establish the original articles of incorporation was supported by commission Vice Chair Kay Beard, D-Westland, who also represents Garden City, and commissioner Bruce Patterson, R-Canton Township.

Commissioner Michelle Plawecki, D-Dearborn Heights, who also represents Redford Township and Livonia east of Middlebelt, did not vote.

Commissioner Thaddeus McCotter, R-Livonia, who also represents Plymouth and Plymouth Township, voted against forming the authority and has been the chief advocate for revising the articles of incorporation since.

All Observer-area commissioners voted in favor of the amendments last week.

McCotter recommends communities that have opted out of the authority stay out.

He maintains that opting out of the transit authority isn't the same thing as opting out of SMART and that communities may still be entitled to bus service.

Duggan said, "Any community that opts out won't get any service after April 19."

State Sen. Loren Bennett, R-Canton Township, has introduced legislation that would prohibit SMART from cutting transit subsidies to communities that opt out.

Wayne County Executive Edward McNamara or someone he designates will be one member.

Eight additional members will be appointed by McNamara subject to approval of the Wayne County Commission:

■ One member will be a member of the general public.

■ Three members will be the nominees of the mayors and supervisors of the Conference of Western Wayne whose communities are within the area of

the authority.

■ Two members will be the nominees of the mayors and supervisors of the Downriver Community Conference whose communities are within the area of the authority.

■ One member will be the nominee of those mayors and supervisors whose communities lie in whole or in part east of Woodward Avenue and whose communities are within the area of the authority.

■ One member will be a member of the general public nominated by the six members who were nominated by the mayors and supervisors.

Ex Westland man says drug store aided drug habit

A former Westland man and his Southfield attorney could collect \$1.9 million if the Michigan Supreme Court rules a drugstore contributed to the man's drug addiction.

John J. Orzel, 37, now living in Garden City, is "psychotic and permanently schizophrenic," attorney Larry A. Smith told the high court last week. Orzel, a former General Motors factory worker who taught karate to Detroit police, will require lifelong care and intermittent hospitalization, Smith said.

They want Scott Drug Store, once located on Grand River in northwest Detroit, to pay a Wayne Circuit Court jury award. The jury put the figure at \$3.8 million, but a judge cut it in half, reasoning that Orzel's own "criminal activity" in taking illegal drugs contrib-

ed to his mental destruction. Orzel himself said during his trial: "I sort of became a product of society. My environment was drug, you know, infested, so I became like the rest."

He has been in Northville State Hospital, Providence, Oakwood and other hospitals 12 to 14 times from 1982 to 1988.

"There is absolutely no evidence that Orzel ever obtained Desoxyn from the appellant (Scott) without a prescription," replied John Highland, a Southfield attorney representing the store's insurer.

"As a matter of public policy, this court cannot turn our civil and criminal docket into a chaotic, overloaded circus of litigation where drug addicts are no longer criminally responsible for their conduct," Highland said.

Supreme court hears tax fight case

TACT, a Wayne County homeowners group, asked the Michigan Supreme Court to throw out a 1981 real estate transfer tax because voters never had a chance to decide it.

County attorneys asked the high court to uphold the tax because "we'd have to refund the tax for 14 years. The consequences to the state would be fiscal disaster," said Kevin Moody, attorney from the firm of Miller Canfield, representing Wayne County.

The seven justices have up to a year from Thursday's oral arguments to decide the question.

The case presents several thorny questions:

■ **Is it a local or state tax?**

In 1980 Michigan had a 55-cents-per-\$500 real estate transfer tax. The Legislature passed a law allowing counties of more than two million population to raise it to 75 cents. At the time, Chief Justice James Brickley presided over the state Senate as lieutenant governor.

Only one county, Wayne, fit the definition. The county Board of Commissioners raised the rate on Feb. 19, 1981.

Peter Macuga II, Detroit lawyer representing the homeowners group, Taxpayers Allied for Constitutional Taxation, pointed to the 1978 Headlee Amendment to the state constitution which says, "Units of local government are hereby prohibited from levying any tax . . . or from increasing the rate of an existing tax . . . without the approval of a majority of the qualified electors . . ." He said a vote is mandatory.

Moody said the question of state versus local tax hadn't been raised before Judge John R. Kirwan in Wayne Circuit Court and shouldn't be raised on appeal. But he contended it's a state tax.

■ **Does the statute of limitations bar taxpayers from seeking relief in the 1990s?**

Yes, said the county. Under the statute of limitations, taxpayers had a year from the effective date of the tax to challenge it and didn't until 1990.

"If taxpayers were allowed to bring claims years after a tax has been enacted by a local unit and it were ultimately found by the court that such a tax were a state tax, the consequences upon the state could be fiscal disaster,"

said Moody. The state would have exceeded its constitutional revenue cap. A court-ordered repayment "could severely damage the credit of the state and bar it from the nation's financial credit markets."

"There's no statute of limitations," replied Macuga. "If the drafters (of the Headlee Amendment) were that concise in not including a statute of limitations, isn't it possible they didn't want one included?"

Harper Woods homeowner David Pochmara didn't discover the tax hike until he sold in June of 1990. Macuga said the statute of limitations didn't begin running until after the tax actually was imposed on Pochmara, who filed suit in February of 1981.

Moody said many laws put time limits on constitutional rights. He cited the 180-day rule for petition signatures to be collected to seek a referendum and the time limit for a defendant to ask a jury trial.

"You are presumed to have knowledge of and notice of the laws," Moody added. Suppose a person living in Ohio in 1980 moved to Michigan and discovered the real estate transfer tax in

the year 2000. It would be ridiculous to throw out the tax at that point, he argued.

Justice Conrad Mallett found "a profound problem" in the case. "What if we found there were an unconstitutional tax local unit of government? Can we order an election, separate apart from the question of repayment?"

Justice Michael Cavanagh asked: "Is there any rein (county) government if it's challenged within one year?"

"Vote 'em out," replied Moody.


Attorney General Frank Kelley backed the county in an *amicus curiae* brief. "Claims for the refund of taxes often are subject to short statutes of limitations, even requirements that the tax be paid under protest," his brief said.

In an interview in the Supreme Court lobby, Macuga said he had no idea how much revenue was at stake. Moody's 45-page brief didn't mention a figure, nor did the judges ask.

The county tax of 20 cents per \$500 of value, on a house selling for \$150,000, would be \$60.

She travels best with just one bag

Thirty years of international travel has made Lynn Portnoy a seasoned expert. Add to this her keen sense of style and fashion, and the boutique owner is eminently qualified to conduct a seminar on "Traveling In One Bag."

On March 30, the Village Woman's Club of Beverly Hills was treated to Portnoy's packing do's and don'ts at a presentation held in the courtyard behind her shop at 306 W. Fourth St. in Royal Oak.

Three club members were chosen to model clothing that would easily take them on a 10-day vacation anywhere in the world. "Just remember to dress for your locale," advises Portnoy. "Dress up in Paris and down in L.A. With a few additions to your basic wardrobe pieces, you can travel for days."

Here's a brief recap of her presentation: Start with a versatile piece of luggage. One large and one small carry-on are all Portnoy recommends. Savvy travelers hate waiting around the carousel at the airport. "If the plane arrives at noon, I'm hailing the taxi at 12:02," says Portnoy. Nix the robe

For a 10-day trip, Portnoy suggests taking five bottoms, two jackets, eight tops and a raincoat. "A trench coat pulls together an ensemble," she says. And there's no need to pack a robe. Just throw on your trench if the hotel room is chilly. She also recommends three pairs of shoes and socks in lieu of slippers. When packing, "put the socks over your shoes and tuck your hosiery inside the toe of the shoe."

Sneakers are a no-no, according to Portnoy. They target you as a tourist, especially in Europe. Wear a cute and comfortable rubber-soled suede sandal instead.

Plan your wardrobe in three coordinating colors — two neutrals and one accent color. That way everything will mix and match.

No wrinkle woes

Packable fabrics are key. "Silk or cotton knits work best," says Portnoy. "Never pack an iron. Lightly steam your clothes in the shower or have the hotel press for you."

To eliminate wrinkles, Portnoy has a tried-and-true packing tip: Layer folded clothes on men's suit hangers from the cleaners. Cover the hanger with a plastic bag, making sure to squeeze all the air out of the bag. Then put in suitcase.

Irene Davis wowed the audience in rust, taupe and beige coordinates. A Japanese-style long tunic by Moschino over cotton pants was interchangeable with a taupe silk cardigan, beige pants and silk walking shorts.

Sazy Osman's ivory cotton coat covered ivory, brown and blue travel-friendly pieces. She built on a base of brown cotton pants, an ivory tunic and a sky blue shirt jacket.

Liz Hurbie's wardrobe flattered in peach, bone and black. Her bone wool crepe suit was accented with a taupe cotton sweater and peach chiffon scarf. Scarves are perfect accessories to tie outfits together and give them a dressed-up look, as are simple silk ties and vests. A straw hat is a must.

Patricia Underwood's delicate horsehair straw brims with rayon knit crowns are chic and easy to pack. \$375-\$450 at Neiman Marcus in the Homewood Collection, Troy.

Finally, take small, soft-cover travel guides and sample-size cosmetics. Travel light and travel smart. Bon Voyage!

'Comfort dressing' rules the workplace



Whether you call it business casual, work day casual, dressing down or relaxing the fit, the revolution has begun to less traditional, formal outfits in the work place. Confused? You're not alone.

It really bothers businessman Bruce McAvoy of East Lansing that Bill Gates, president of Microsoft holds press conferences to announce multi-million dollar deals on international television wearing a golf shirt.

But like it or not, Gates' fashion statement sends a message that echoes through the halls of corporate America giving new meaning to phrase "dress for success."

The Wall Street Journal recently reported that employees who don't go along with casual dress codes are often teased by co-workers who do.

"The change has definitely triggered its own brand of stress, leaving people somewhat confused about the best way to dress down and still look like they mean business," said Ava Demonia marketing director for the Fairlane Town Center in Dearborn. The mall sits in the heart of Ford Motor Country which recently converted to full-time business casual for all of its executives and office workers.

"People know they can't go from suits to slovenly, but they're not exactly sure what to wear."

To help, Demonia interviewed fashion retailers at the center for tips on casual dressing.

"Their biggest guideline was to remember that "home casual" and "work casual" are two different

styles," she reported. "The sweatshirts and jeans that feel so good on a Saturday afternoon do not work in the office."

She advised workers to "start at the dressier end of casual and work down if you feel you're over-dressed."

"The trick is to choose versatile clothing that is a little softer, and a little more relaxed — in styling and fabric — while maintaining an overall coordinated image."

Arlene Goldstein, director of fashion for Parisian stores, said that "casual" does not mean "sloppy."

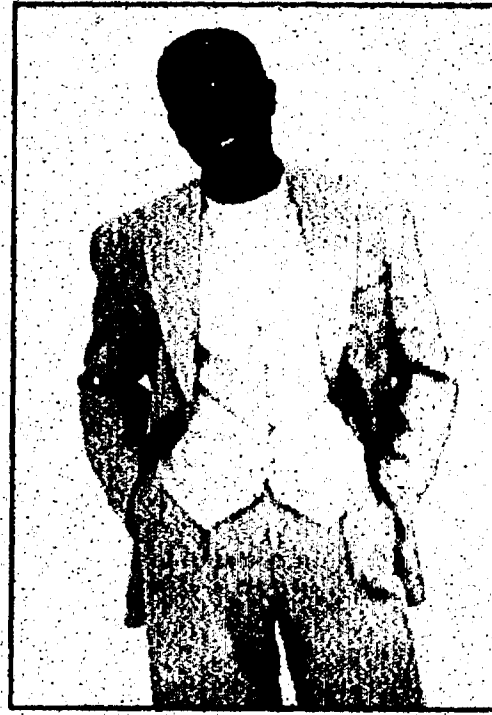
"Casual business attire is clothing that allows you to feel comfortable at work yet always looks neat and professional," she said adding that two-thirds of American employers now allow casual clothing in the work place.

"However if your job requires you to meet with clients, be prepared for unscheduled client visits. Men, keep a dress shirt, tie and sportcoat in the office and women, store a simple coat dress and pumps."

Colby McWilliams of Neiman Marcus said business casual is no longer a "fashion trend," but rather an international change in lifestyle that has been coming over the last two decades.

"The work world has changed," he pointed out. "Most people don't sit in meetings, they work through their

Constantine Kallas, a Bloomfield Hills attorney representing the Michigan Association of Insurance Companies, added in an *amicus* brief, that Orzel "cannot maintain a cause of action for damages arising out of plaintiff's own illegal, intentional and wrongful conduct."

"Insanity is not exception to the rule that a plaintiff may not bring an action to recover damages for injuries that result from plaintiff's own intentional wrongdoings," Kallas said.

A state Court of Appeals panel last year ruled for Orzel, saying his criminal

activity should not bar his suit.

Smith admitted Orzel was "no angel" but contended the drugstore was part of a system that fed his client's habits.

As an eighth-grader at Sts. Peter and Paul Catholic school, Orzel drank alcohol and used marijuana, LSD and mescaline, among other substances. By ninth grade he was on PCP and "angel dust." Orzel had a brief marriage during which he lived in Westland and consumed hashish and cocaine, according to Highland's brief.

Orzel got off drugs, earned a 2.7 grade

point average by the time he graduated from Cody High in 1978, and earned a black belt in karate in less than two years, Smith's brief said.

When Orzel worked for GM Hydramatic in Ypsilanti, co-workers introduced him to Desoxyn. Orzel in August of 1981 began going to Figure 8 Weight Loss Clinic, where doctors gave him prescriptions. A co-worker's family owned the clinic.

Orzel had the prescriptions filled at pharmacies in Redford, Inkster and Detroit. Attorney Smith said Scott person-

nel knew the drug was for weight loss and could see that Orzel, at five-foot-10 and 160 pounds, needed no such drug.

Highland said Desoxyn's side effects were hallucinations, especially when Orzel popped 10 to 16 pills a day instead of the prescribed one — more evidence his problems were self-caused.

Smith said Figure 8 personnel wrote out blank prescriptions for Desoxyn, leaving the name and address blank. "Figure 8 was really in the prescription business," he said.

Smith said federal Drug Enforcement

Administration officials investigated Scott Drug "due to its status as the number one purchaser of Desoxyn in the nation" and made seizures there. The store was closed down.

Orzel's original suit also named Abbott Laboratories, Figure 8, two of its doctors and another drugstore. Figure 8 went out of business about the time Orzel's suit was started. Court records indicated those defendants settled their cases for undisclosed amounts. Only the Scott Drug case is before the Supreme Court.

Home at the ranch, he's a dude in the kitchen

Bob Ray wasn't around to hear the plea "Go west, young man!" when it was first issued in 1851, but he did adhere to it about 10 years ago.

That's when the Birmingham resident turned to just about everything "western," including the furnishings in his home and his cuisine. That's also when he began his transformation from an aircraft salesman to "Cowboy Trader."

Ray and his wife, Suzanne, a teacher in the Livonia Public Schools, acquired a taste for western artifacts and antiques in the mid-1980s after vacationing at a dude ranch in Arizona.

"We had such a wonderful experience at the ranch that we decided to start collecting such truly "American" items as chaps and spurs. We wanted to capture some of the exhilaration we experienced by meeting, conversing and riding with the wranglers and cowboys during this trip," Ray said.

That vacation to the western United States was the first of many for the Rays. They have returned to

Arizona and the west often, adding trips to Wyoming, New Mexico, Colorado and Montana.

In addition, Bob, who is also a history buff, began some serious research into his new passion.

"The more I learned about western culture, the more I became interested in all aspects of the west. And as my interest grew, so did our collection of artifacts and antiques," he said.

It didn't take long for the Rays' ranch style home to become overtaken by their western acquisitions. That's when Ray became a dealer and started his business, the "Cowboy Trader."

At first he ran his art and antique business from various shows throughout the United States. However, with the growing popularity of all things western, Ray opened his first gallery in Birmingham three years ago. A month ago, he relocated to 251 Merrill Street in the city's downtown business district.

"While I have a busy schedule, and have had since I became a dealer, I enjoy cooking," Ray said. "This is why I make dinner almost every

night. Also, my wife never cooks."

According to Ray, he acquired his interest in cooking from his mother, Frances Ray of Canton, "who has always been a fantastic cook."

"I used to cook more traditional fare, following my mother's recipes. However, I now cook many 'western' dishes, because, with all our trips out

west, we have acquired a taste for foods from this region of the country."

Ray said that one of his favorite meals is "Texas Red Chili" (he claims this chili "will make your spurs jingle") accompanied by chunks of bread dipped into his "The Best All Around Salsa."

Anderson was brought into the business by her parents Lou, president of the company, and Mary Jane Schmidt, Lou's secretary, who represent one-fourth of the corporation. They live in West Bloomfield. Anderson's three aunts and their husbands operate other stores outside of Michigan.

"We are a very traditional family," she said, explaining that each of the 250 stores in 35 states are family operated. "And before we advanced to a corporate level we had to work the stores. We did everything everyone else did."

The fact that the business, which employees more than 40 family members nationwide, is not available to franchisees also supports the family only argument. In fact, the company is full of cousins, aunts and uncles working in marketing to support systems (computers) to public relations in the individual stores.

"We want it to be family. We don't want to lose sight of the product," she said.

That idea is unlikely however, because the HoneyBaked meats, ham and turkey; breads and spreads have been prepared the

same way for years. The meat, after it is smoked and glazed, can be purchased as a meal or on party trays.

In addition, Lou and Mary Jane Schmidt continue to guide the company in the same fashion as the founder. "He (Lou) wants to make sure the tradition is carried through," said Anderson.

HoneyBaked Ham Co. started, almost by accident, in 1955 when Hoenselaar went to a meat convention in hopes of selling his invention — a spiral slicing machine. When he was laughed out of the convention, he felt the only thing to do with this machine was use it in his own business. He opened his own store in Detroit. The company's first sales receipt, dated 1957, is framed in the corporate conference room. "It's a very prideful feeling (looking at all we've accomplished)," said Anderson. "I'm just sorry Grandpa never saw it."

Hoenselaar died from ALS Lou Gehrig's disease when there were less than 100 stores. However, his 85-year-old wife, Josephine, is able to rejoice in her family's success from Florida.

She is also invited to enjoy a HoneyBaked ham every Easter, since that is the only ham served at family get-togethers. "My daughter, she knows no other (ham)," said Anderson, who indicated Kelly even had the baby-sitter eating HoneyBaked Ham. "We always have some of it around."

Because every HoneyBaked employee is family, through blood and friendships, loyalty to the company and its customers is a top priority.

"Everyone is so dedicated and loyal to the company... we are a leader in customer service," said Anderson, who recited a motto held by the company. "Treat people how you want to be treated."

According to customers in and around the Troy store, at 1081 East Long Lake Road, they do feel catered to. "They're very nice, and they make a good ham sandwich," said Arlene Martone of Troy, who indicated that she has served HoneyBaked Ham for Easter.

Tom Anderson, a Troy business owner not related to the HoneyBaked family, said he

"loves their ham and always buys it for Christmas."

"And the people are friendly and quick. They make sure you get what you want," he added.

Julie Mayo of Westland said the best thing about the HoneyBaked Ham Co. is the glazing on their ham and turkey. The good taste brings her to the stores for Easter, Christmas and all the months in between.

Anderson indicated most of their customers hit the store at least one or two times a year, Christmas and Easter, but there is a strong effort enticing people to one of the 13 Michigan locations on a regular basis.

The company communicates with their customers through newsletters, mailings, calendars with coupons in them and monthly raffles. Years ago, they even held a contest asking people from all over the country to mail in their best HoneyBaked recipes.

Seven hundred entries and a kitchen full of dirty kitchenware later (since they made the food themselves at corporate headquarters), they narrowed the field down to a dozen favorites.

HAM AND ASPARAGUS CASSEROLE

1 pound HoneyBaked brand ham slices
1 pound fresh asparagus, trimmed, rinsed and steamed until tender
4 tablespoons butter or margarine
4 tablespoons flour
2 cups whole milk

1 teaspoon salt
Fresh ground pepper to taste (about 1/2 teaspoon)
1/2 teaspoon cayenne pepper
3 tablespoons butter or margarine
2 tablespoons olive oil
1 pound perch filets

In a large bowl, combine flour with the herbs and spices and mix well. Place a medium fry pan over moderate heat. Melt the butter or margarine with the olive oil and heat.

Coat the fish in the seasoned flour and shake off the excess. When the fat is hot, place the fish in the pan skin side down. Cook for 2 minutes. Using a spatula, flip the fish in the pan and continue cooking for 1 minute.

Remove fish from pan and keep warm on a baking sheet in a low oven. Repeat with remaining perch. Serve with lemon wedges and

garnish with parsley sprigs. Serves 2-3.

Here's a low fat recipe everyone will enjoy!

BAKED FISH IN PARCHMENT

1 pound fish filets or steaks (cod, orange roughy, salmon, etc.)
4 pieces parchment paper cut into 16 by 16-inch squares
4 tablespoons non-fat mayonnaise
1 tablespoon lemon, lime or orange peel
The juice from that lemon, lime or orange

Place each fish fillet or steak separately on a piece of parchment paper. Set aside. Preheat oven to 375 degrees. In a small bowl, combine non-fat mayonnaise with citrus rind and juice and mix well.

Spread 1 heaping tablespoon of flavored mayonnaise over the fish fillet or steak. Wrap parchment tightly around the fish and place it on a baking sheet. Bake in preheated oven for 30 minutes.

Check fish for doneness. If it does not flake easily when pierced in the center with a fork, re-wrap and continue baking for 15 more minutes. Serves 3-4.

TEXAS RED CHILI

3 pounds boneless beef round steak, cut into 1-inch cubes
1 large onion, finely chopped
4 cloves garlic, finely chopped
1/2 cup vegetable oil
2 cups tomato puree
2-3 tablespoons ground red chilies
1 teaspoon ground cumin seed
1 teaspoon ground coriander
4 jalapeno peppers, seeded and chopped
Shredded cheddar cheese
1 (16 ounce) can pinto beans, drained
Flour tortillas

Cook and stir beef, onion and garlic in oil in 4-quart Dutch oven until browned. Stir in remaining ingredients, except cheese, beans and tortillas.

Heat to boiling; reduce heat. Cover and simmer, stirring occasionally until beef is tender, about 2 hours. Add desired amount of beans to

each serving; sprinkle with cheese; serve with tortillas. Makes 6-8 servings.

THE BEST ALL AROUND SALSA

4 Italian vine-ripened plum tomatoes, finely chopped
1 medium red onion, finely chopped
Juice of one lime
1/2 cup chopped cilantro
2 jalapeno peppers, finely chopped
3 garlic cloves, finely chopped
1/2 teaspoon salt

Mix ingredients together and refrigerate for two to three hours. Makes approximately two cups. This salsa is also great with grilled chicken breasts.

COWBOY CAVIAR

1 (15 ounce) can black beans, drained, chopped
1 (4 ounce) can chopped ripe olives, drained
1 small onion, finely chopped
1 clove garlic, finely chopped
2 tablespoons vegetable oil

2 tablespoons lime juice
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon crushed red pepper
1/4 teaspoon ground cumin
1/4 teaspoon black pepper
1 (8 ounce) package cream cheese, softened
2 hard-cooked eggs, peeled and chopped
1 green onion (with green top) chopped

Mix all ingredients together, except cream cheese, eggs and green onion. Cover and refrigerate for at least two hours.

Spread cream cheese on serving plate. Spoon bean mixture evenly over cream cheese. Arrange eggs in ring around bean mixture. Sprinkle with green onion. Serve as dip with corn tortillas. Makes approximately three cups.

Ham is more than Easter tradition

Along with pastel-colored eggs and baskets of goodies, Easter in America has always meant ham. But aside from upholding tradition, there are many reasons for making ham the centerpiece of your holiday table this year.

Ham is a food-lover's favorite. Its mildly sweet, smoky taste complements many other flavors. Perhaps because it is so tasty and versatile, many cooks (and would-be cooks) lose sight of ham's biggest asset: It's easy to prepare.

"Most people think of holiday meal preparation as a complicated, daylong process, and maybe with the Thanksgiving bird that's true. But preparing a ham is a breeze," said Robin Kline, a regis-

tered dietitian and director of the Pork Information Bureau for the National Pork Producers Council. "It's precooked so it just needs heating up. Even novice cooks, who are often intimidated by a 'hunk of meat,' can fix a ham."

And, as if taste and ease of preparation aren't enough, cooks and "eaters" alike may be surprised to find that ham is low in fat and calories. "Because ham is so delightfully tasty, many people assume it's high in fat," said Kline. "But the great news is that it's very lean — a great Easter treat."

In fact, a 3-ounce serving of extra lean ham has only 116 calories and 4.1 grams of fat.

To ensure the perfect Easter dinner, Kline offers some simple tips for selecting, storing and preparing ham:

- How much is enough? — When serving boneless ham, plan on four to five servings per pound. Count on two to three servings per pound with a bone-in ham. For the dollar-conscious cook, the boneless ham delivers superior value, according to Kline, and also offers hassle-free carving.
- Not too cold, not too hot — Don't freeze a ham before you use it — refrigerate instead. Both bone-in and boneless hams, in their original packaging, will keep several weeks in the refrigerator.
- Is it done yet? — Virtually all

hams on the market today are precooked, so they only need to be reheated to an internal temperature of 140 degrees F. for serving. An uncooked ham will be labeled "cook before eating" and requires an internal temperature of 160 degrees F. for doneness. If you don't have a meat thermometer, you can generally plan on cooking an uncooked ham 30 minutes per pound. For a precooked ham, just follow the directions on the label, and heat in a moderate (325 to 350 degree F) oven.

■ How long to keep leftovers? — Refrigerate a ham within two hours of serving and you can enjoy the leftovers for up to five days.

Tennis fires burn bright

Is tennis dying? If you live in and around the Detroit metropolitan area, some may have started to wonder if Sports Illustrated was indeed right.

But there's still hope. Tennis promoter Glenn Healey, along with some life support from pros like Jimmy Arias and pro Luke Jensen, renewed my faith in this game I played as a collegian.

When was the last time Detroit hosted a big-time tennis event?

Try the WCT in 1989. But thanks to Healey and his Sports Club of West Bloomfield, area fans were treated to some much-needed resuscitation during the last weekend in March. The event was called the MCF Partners Tennis Challenge.

"There's a void we're trying to fill because we feel there's a demand for spectator tennis," Healey said. "Plus, our club serves four different areas — fitness, martial arts, swimming and tennis. To keep the sport healthy, spectator tennis is good for the sport in our area. There are a lot of tennis enthusiasts who came. That's the reason we were doing it."

The event has grown tremendously in three years. Prize money has climbed from \$500 — when the event was stocked with all local players — to \$16,000 this year featuring world-ranked players.

Arias, once ranked No. 5 in the world, was there for the second straight year. Ludington's Luke and Murphy Jensen, the 1993 French Open doubles champions and the tour's version of Van Halen, became Healey's big coup this year.

"These two guys are very much in demand," Healey said. "We called their agent, John Mayotte, and he said they wanted to come in for a charity event like this. And this was a perfect time for them to come in and play because it was close to home. A month later we couldn't have done this because the timing was dictated by the Jensens' schedule. They were going to be in Europe."

Other tour players included Detroit's Steve Campbell, a Redford Catholic Central High product who played in this year's Australian Open. He was joined in the 16-man field by Bloomfield Hills' Steve Herdoiza (Lahser High) and Richard Matuszewski, the latter of whom reached the fourth-round of Wimbledon two years ago before losing to Stefan Edberg.

Attendance was mixed during the four-day event. Tickets were \$10 Thursday and Friday, \$15 on Saturday and Sunday.

Friday night was well attended, but Saturday afternoon's entertaining semifinal between Arias and Luke Jensen drew a sparse turnout because it ran head-on with the CBS telecasts of the NCAA men's basketball Final Four.

"The basketball hurt us," Healey said. "Last year we didn't charge admission, but the reason why we charged admission this year was because it was for a charitable cause. The proceeds were going to the Michigan Cancer Foundation."

The event virtually received no play from either of Detroit's major daily newspapers.

"It was not sold out, but the crowds were in the acceptable range," Healey said. "It was hard to predict. It's a little disappointing, but these things take a while to build up."

Healey also had a British company, Arena Seats Inc., set up and construct a temporary stadium center court inside the Sports Club, equipped with special boxes for corporate sponsors. The main event sponsors included Farmington Hills Chrysler-Plymouth/Jeep Eagle and Infiniti of Farmington Hills.

"With labor costs, the seating probably ran us about \$12,000, but it was worth it because you can see it's a professional set-up," Healey said. "It looks fantastic."

In the future, Healey would like to build the tournament around Michigan players such as Aaron Krickstein, Todd Martin or a Malaval Washington.

"We'll assess the format," said Healey, who has made his fortune in the cable television business. "We'd like to make improvements. We've talked to the USTA (U.S. Tennis Association) about making it a Challenger event. But it takes more time when you have a draw of 32. We'd like to have the Jensens back. We'll be able to attract higher ranked players as the prize money increases."

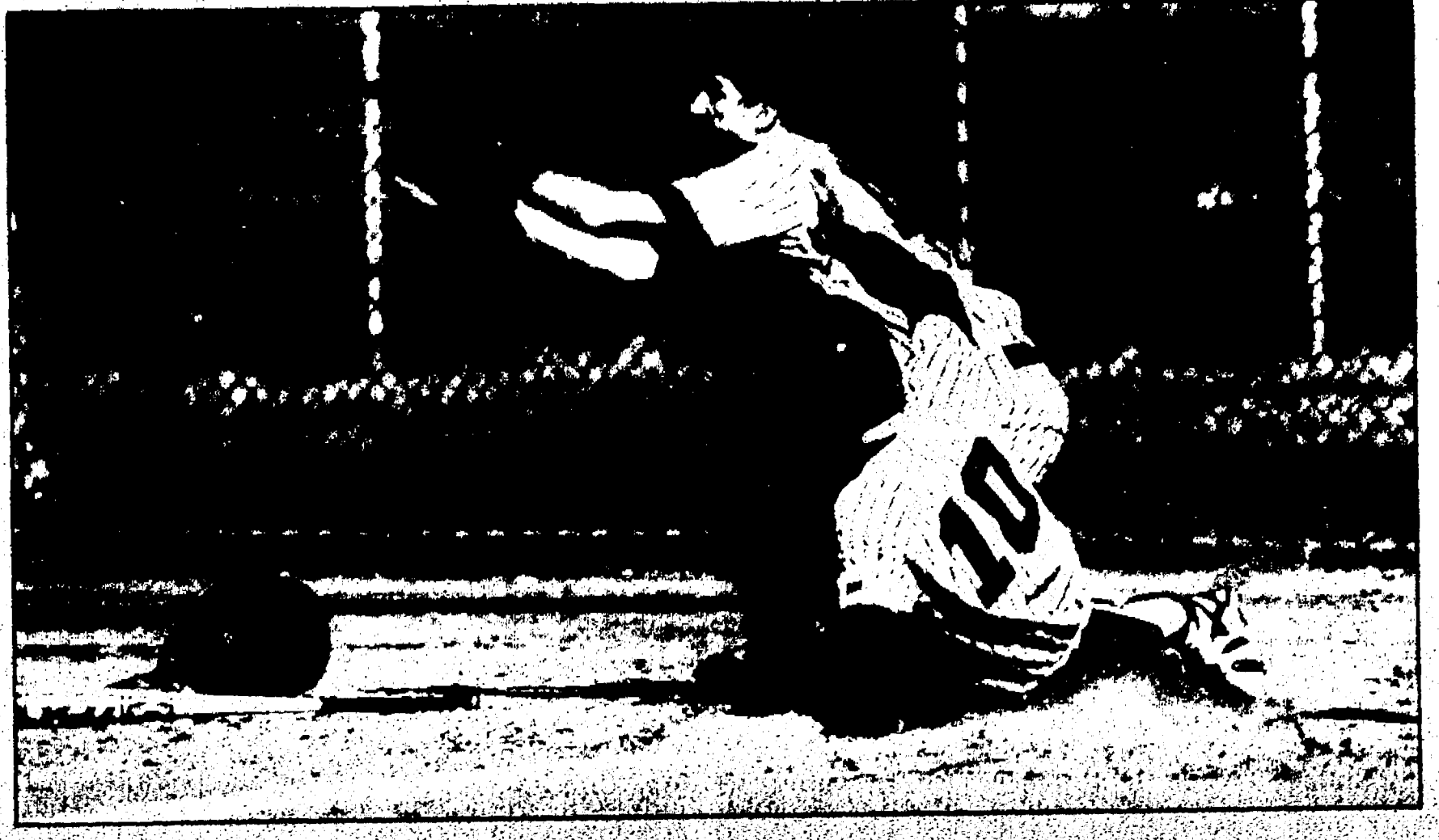
And there's no better ambassador than Luke Jensen, who came away with the first place prize money in singles and doubles. It was his first title of any kind since the 1993 French.

He was appreciative of the fans, intermingling with everybody and anybody, before and after his matches. He fired up the crowd and became buddies with the ballboys. Arias, meanwhile, brought back some memories by playing with a wood racquet, an old Wilson Pro Staff model.

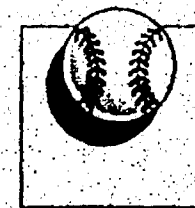

Wolverines elude Madonna



Madonna University took on Big Ten opponent Michigan, forcing the Wolverines to 10 innings before losing, 5-4, at Fisher Stadium in Ann Arbor. The Crusaders bounced back with two wins Friday.

If first impressions are long-lasting, the University of Michigan's baseball team may never want a rematch with Madonna University.

Thursday in Ann Arbor, Madonna and U-M met for the first time ever. The result: a 5-4 triumph for the Wolverines in 10 innings.

The game-winner scored after two were out. Brian Simmons singled off Madonna reliever Jim Solak, and Mike Muir followed with a walk. Scott Niemiec (from Plymouth Salem) was hit by a pitch, loading the bases for Sean Coston. Coston popped a ball up into short center

field, and two Madonna fielders watched it drop in as the game-winning run scored.

Although the Fighting Crusaders made the NCAA Division I Wolverines earn the victory, it wasn't quite good enough for coach Mike George. "I hate to lose any time," George said. "I hate to lose by giving them four unearned runs. That's disappointing."

U-M threw four freshmen hurlers at Madonna, with Mike Hribenek starting and going the first three innings. He was followed by Chris Hess (three innings), Derek Besco (West-

land John Glenn, 1½ innings) and John Arvai (2½ innings). Arvai got the win.

Craig Benedict (Plymouth Canton) started and tossed three scoreless innings for Madonna. Dan Pydyn went the next two, giving up one run, with Sean Henkel following, allowing two unearned runs. Solak also gave up two unearned runs in 2½ innings.

The loss overshadowed a valiant effort for Madonna. Aaron Jones belted a two-run homer in the eighth inning to put the Crusaders up 4-3; he finished with two hits. Craig Peterson and Tim Kaubowski also had two hits apiece.

Super heavyweight Reggie Thomas heads a group of six Livonia Boxing Club members who will fight in Wednesday's Metro Detroit Golden Gloves tournament at the Burton Manor in Redford.

The card begins at 7:30 p.m. Thomas, 3-0, is the lone LBC regular competing in the Open division and club director Paul Soucy puts the pressure on his big guy by saying he expects his fighter will win and go to the Nationals in Lowell, Mass., this May.

Thomas was the Diamond Gloves winner in 1994.

Soucy has an experienced super heavyweight in the Novice division, Nathan Shelton. Novice winners do not advance.

Forrest Neal, 2-0, fights in the light heavyweight category, while John Morrow, winner of an earlier Golden Gloves show, and Hank O'Dierna, 2-2, fight at 166 pounds. Tom Iedesma, 3-1 and winner in an earlier show, is in the 114-pound Novice weight division.

BOXING

O'Dierna is the kind of fighter the boxing world used to be full of. This was back when amateurs — real amateurs, not today's highly paid non-professionals — used to box for the sheer joy of competition.

That doesn't make the Livonia native a dinosaur, although at age 31 he is getting there in the boxing world.

"I'm right on the cusp," O'Dierna said. "You know, of my useful years as a fighter."

O'Dierna said followers of Livonia Stevenson High football more than a decade ago might remember him as a defensive back, running back or end.

He got into boxing through martial arts.

"You get trained to a level to compete, but it wasn't full contact," O'Dierna said. "And as I got older, I got interested in the historical aspect of the sport. I'm older now and I can tell you this is the most physically demanding sport there is."

"In the martial arts, there are a lot of abilities levels. In boxing, at the end of a fight it's 'This person won. And this person lost.'"

"Once you become conditioned and acquire the skills, then it becomes a matter of analyzing, outthinking your opponent. It's like a chess match, although I know people won't relate to that."

"There's a certain amount of satisfaction, when you work out, prepare for a bout, set a goal, then complete it . . . It's satisfying."

But now that O'Dierna can see the sun setting on the horizon, he's getting out his night glasses.

The unemployed O'Dierna now has his coach's license. What he's learned, he's thinking of passing on to others.

"I find it satisfying to work with younger guys — and I call anybody up to about 21 a kid — pass on the skills and learning I've acquired. I didn't anticipate I would enjoy that as much as I do."

Which, in some people's book, makes O'Dierna a winner whether the
