Student expelled in knife incident



Members of the Wayne-Westland board of education had hoped to finish the school year without expelling a student for a weapons violation. Unfortunately the board was presented with a student threatening another student with a knife.

A Stevenson Junior High eighth-grader, accused of threatening a classmate with a knife, has become the first Wayne-Westland district student expelled this school year for a weapons offense.

Shanon Causley, 15, was expelled from the district following a unanimous vote last Monday by the Wayne-Westland school board.

The expulsion stemmed from a March 28 incident, inside a classroom, in which he was accused of chasing and threatening another stu-

dent with a carving knife, said Greg Baracy, assistant superintendent for general administration.

No injuries were reported. Causley, who came to Wayne-Westland from another district in February, also could face felonious assault charges in juvenile court, Westland police officer Thomas Lesanau said.

The incident dashed hopes that the Wayne-Westland district could finish the school year without any weapons-related expulsions.

Still, the district's record is far better than last year, when 11 weapon-

toting students were expelled. Nine of those pupils were caught with guns.

Superintendent Larry Thomas and school board members have said they believe such incidents have dropped dramatically this year, in part because the district sent a strong message that weapons wouldn't be tolerated on school property.

In fact, the district routinely expelled weapon-toting students even before expulsion became mandatory this year under state law.

"We are pleased as a board that the

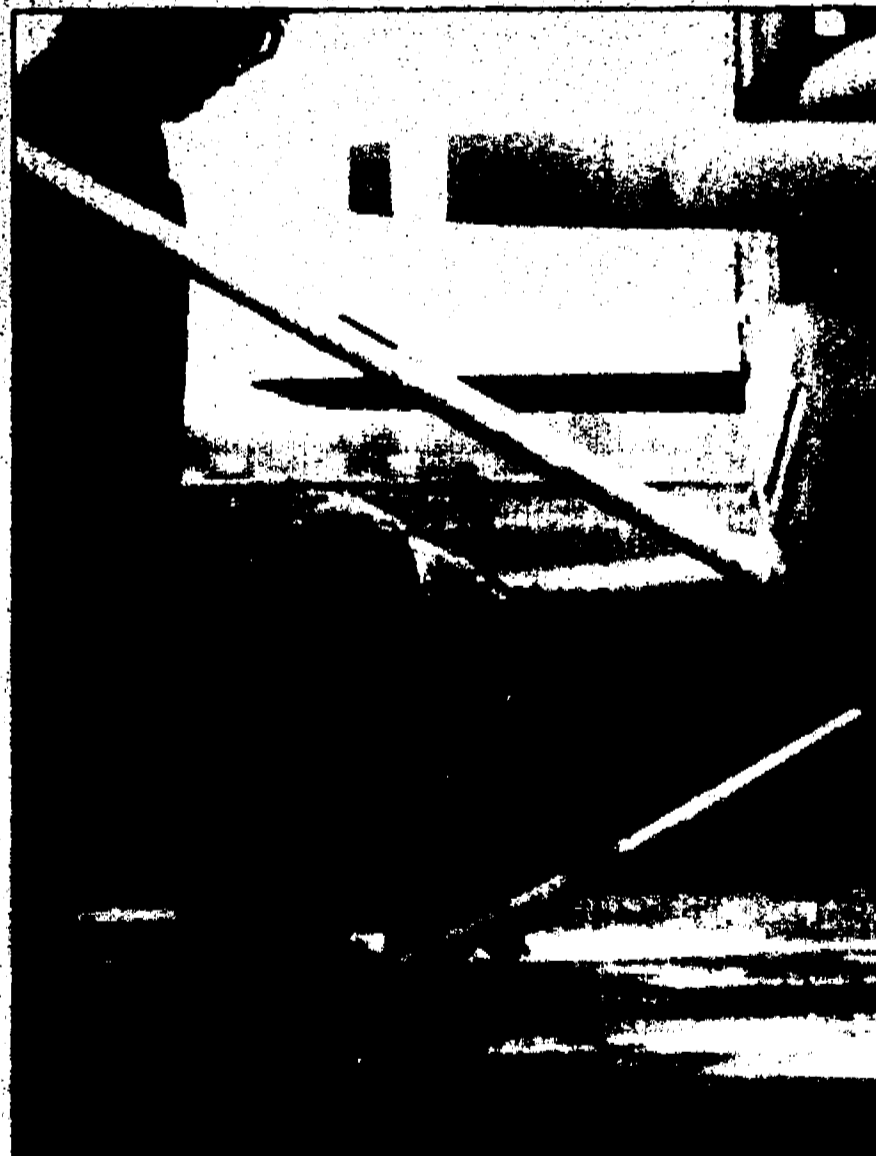

Safety program set for driver ed

Westland police are hoping that students in a summer driver education program will be safer on the roads after watching videos of actual scenes involving car accidents.

Westland police officers Jack McIntosh and Daniel Karrick plan to show videos and give lectures during the summer course in the Wayne-Westland school district.

Westland City Councilman David Cox said he proposed the program in hopes that teenage drivers will think twice before they run a red light, make an illegal turn or engage in other risky driving habits.

Younger drivers sometimes feel invincible after they get their licenses and climb behind the

steering wheel, Cox said.

The program, which will be called "Scared Safe," will focus not only on drunken driving, which causes many crashes, but on a wide range of problems that result in accidents by younger drivers, Cox said.

"Sometimes they just make a bad decision or don't keep their eyes open," he said.

Cox said he hopes the graphic videos of car accident scenes will leave an impression on teenage drivers.

Police Chief Emery Price said police officers have begun filming

accident scenes.

Cox said the police department will be working with city cable-TV consultant Diane Abbott to compile a video that will be shown during summer driver education courses.

The summer program is based at the Tinkham Center.

Price also said photographs from previous accidents will be used during the course.

Peter Brokas, head of the Westland Police Department's traffic bureau, said the program will try to show teens that "there are con-

sequences of not obeying the rules of the road."

It will focus on common causes of accidents, such as driving too close behind another motorist, Brokas said.

"We're trying to cut down on the number of accidents," he said. Price said he met with Cox, council president Thomas Brown and Mayor Robert Thomas and that "all are in agreement" that the program has merit.

Charlotte Sherman, the Wayne-Westland school district's executive director of secondary education, said she believes the program can be beneficial.

"We think it's another link between the schools and the community," she said, "and the kids will see some real life situations about what can happen" on the roads.

Gerrior is tried, convicted again

Garden City convicted murderer Ronald Gerrior, granted a new trial because of prosecutor misconduct, has been found guilty again in the shotgun slaying of his estranged wife and her Westland boyfriend.

Gerrior initially told Westland police that the Dec. 13, 1989, double slaying occurred after he

watched through a window as the two had sex at the male victim's residence on Fremont, near Middlebelt and Ann Arbor Trail in Westland's northeast end.

A jury on Thursday convicted Gerrior of being guilty of second-degree murder but mentally ill, according to a court clerk. The defendant also was convicted of a felony firearms charge.

The verdict came three days after the trial began in Wayne County Circuit Court.

Gerrior's original second-degree murder conviction in 1990 didn't attribute the killings to mental illness, but the sentencing guidelines are the same, with a possible life term.

The felony firearms charge carries a mandatory two-year prison term.

Gerrior originally received a 25-

30 year sentence for slaying his 37-year-old wife, Michele, and 27-year-old Jason LaCroix. Gerrior broke into the house and killed the victims with a 12-gauge shotgun after he saw them having sex through a window, according to court testimony.

His new sentencing date has been set for June 8 before Wayne County Circuit Court Judge Andrea Ferrara.

Authorities said Gerrior followed his wife to LaCroix's home after seeing the couple embrace at an Allen Park bowling alley on the evening of the shootings. The prosecution said he drove four miles to his residence on Marquette, got the shotgun and returned to LaCroix's home.

The Gerriors had been married nearly seven years when they separated in October 1989. Michele, a

Livonia mail carrier, had moved out of their residence.

Gerrior won a new trial on appeal based on arguments of inappropriate courtroom behavior by assistant Wayne County prosecutor Kym Worthy.

McCusker suggested that Wayne County superintendents seek solutions to the problem.

Thomas said the issue "is being looked into."

This former Boy Scout is reliving his childhood

A former Garden City man is reliving the fun of his childhood and getting paid for it, too.

David Trottier, 28, joined the ranks of professional Boy Scouts Sept. 1 after 18 years of perfecting his skills. He hired on as the district executive for the down-river district.

"What I do is work with the volunteers to bring the Boy Scouts to any boy who wants it," said the Garden City High School graduate. "Since you have to attend the meetings to be a Scout, we have to make the meeting places available."

Trottier, now a Canton Township resident, had no intention of making a career in the Boy Scouts when he first began attending meetings at the age of 8. Instead, he was interested in making friends, building things and going on trips.

Even after receiving his Eagle status, the highest level attainable for Scouts, as a senior in high school, he had no idea he would one day be employed by the Boy Scouts of America.

"I thought all of it was volunteer until I started looking into it a year ago," he said.

Because Trottier remained a volunteer with his old Garden City Troop 715, he had many contacts after college. Three

years after graduating from Michigan State University, he used those contacts to help him find a permanent position.

"I was looking for a new job and talked to the Garden City Scout Master. He gave me a name and a number," he said. "I called and set up an informational interview."

When asked if Trottier ever missed his old position, a customs broker/freight forwarder, he replied without hesitation.

"Not in the slightest. When I had a bad day there, I would hate going into work the next morn-

ing. When I have a bad day here, there's always tomorrow," he said.

While the position is "different than what he had expected," Trottier said it's everything he wanted.

"It's challenging, it's rewarding and it's hectic" with all the meetings and outings, he said. "But it's not things I have to do. It's things I have the chance to do."

"I want to bring the Boy Scouts to them (anyone interested) because it helped me," he explained.

The job often requires night meetings and weekend responsibilities, but the lack of free time has not daunted Trottier.

"Pretty much every weekend there's something scouting going on, but I love what I do," he said. "I couldn't say that about my other job."

Weekend activities range from camping to rock climbing to skiing. It all depends on the group involved. And the Boy Scouts of America maintains three groups: the Cub Scouts, for boys in grades one through five; the Boy Scouts, for boys in grades six through 12; and the Explorers group, for boys and girls between the ages of 14 and 20.

"And you can be a Boy Scout and an Explorer," said Trottier, who admitted many Boy Scouts are attracted to the Explorer program, too, because it is co-ed.

Despite Trottier's busy schedule, he tries to stay active with his old Garden City Troop. He meets with the group three to five times every month and attempts to go on their weekend trips.

"I haven't been able to make it to many of their recent trips, but I plan to make time for their next trip," said the executive.

More than 45 boys and a handful of adults are currently involved in Garden City Troop 715. The group is one of four Garden City troops.

Smidgeon, owned by Marro Jedrusik of Westland, also won top prize in the micro-mini class.

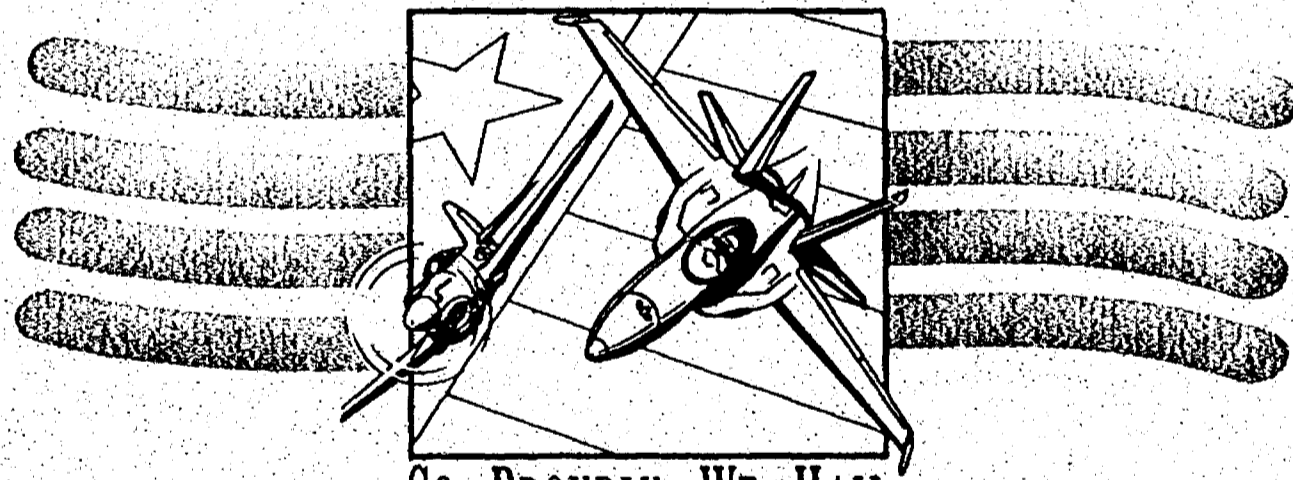
The real winner, though, was the animal rescue division of the Michigan Humane Society as more than \$6,200 was raised at the event to help fund the service.

Winging it: Area man promotes bird racing

It's just as compelling as horse racing, not quite as dangerous as car racing and a lot less expensive than boat racing.

It's pigeon racing, and according to a Garden City man who currently houses 100 pigeons, it's making a strong comeback.

"It's an old country sport with 20,000 fanciers, or pigeon racers, across the United States," said Ray Cesarz. "But the number is getting bigger."

A recent building project in Oklahoma proves the sport is gaining popularity.

"They just built the Pigeon Institute of America," he said, noting that pigeon racing had come a long way since its origination in Belgium over 200 years ago. "Although I've never been there, I understand they spent over \$1 million dollars on the institute. It's supposed to display memorabilia."

Just because Cesarz has not yet attended the institute does not mean he is less than committed to the sport. On the contrary, he spends his free time feeding, training and generally caring for the birds. He has even tried to involve his family.

"My son was into pigeon racing for a while. I built a (housing) loft for him in my backyard and everything," said the local man. "(And) my grandchildren, I'll take them into the loft (with me to feed the birds) and they cry when I try to take them out."

Ray Cesarz's wife, Betty, has also jumped on the pigeon bandwagon.

"I started with the club in 1980, when the kids were grown. I've been the club secretary, treasurer and mother to all pigeon fanciers," she said with a laugh as Ray Cesarz explained her motherly responsibilities.

"She's the liberator," he said. "She gives the trucker the OK to release the birds (at the race's starting point) if the weather is good or hold them up for an hour or two if the weather is bad. Then the fanciers call her to find out what time the birds were released."

Races vary in distance depending on the age of the birds. The farthest racing distance for young birds less than a year old is 350 miles, while older birds can travel up to 500 miles.

"The average bird flies 45 miles per hour, but they can fly up to 70 miles per hour if the weather is good and the wind is with them," said Ray Cesarz. "So, a pigeon can make 500 miles in eight hours on a good day."

In order to prepare them for their journey, Ray Cesarz follows a strict routine with the birds. At

seven days old, he bands them or puts an aluminum and plastic band around their foot for identification purposes. At 30 days old, he lets them out of the loft for orientation.

Once they hit two months old, he takes them two miles away from the loft and releases them.

"It's their first induction into racing," he said. "Then you increase their distance from two miles to five, to 20 and to 50."

This is the same routine Cesarz has followed for 40 years, when he was first introduced to pigeon racing at 16 years old. The technique, shown to him by a relative, has brought him more than 40 trophies and some cash prizes.

"This is a highly competitive sport," he said. "Just last week, I took the first six places in a race from Decatur, Ind. There were 495 birds entered."

Fanciers belonging to Cesarz's Salem Township club have traveled from as far away as Ann Arbor, Port Huron and Adrian to enter. They can enter as many birds as they want once a carrier fee is paid.

The fee is paid to the trucker, who transports the birds to every race on a flatbed truck. Before the pigeons are loaded onto the truck however, they receive an elastic identification band to put around their foot.

Once the bird flies home and enters their coop, the elastic band is removed and dropped into a sealed timing box.

"A counter stamps the hour, minute and second on a paper tape," Ray Cesarz explained. "One person sets all of the clocks and also reads all of the times, in front of everyone. There is no room for (alterations) because one person handles everything and it's done out in the open."

In the event a bird flies off course and does not return to their loft, the identification number helps the finders locate the owners.

"But that is very rare," said Ray Cesarz. "Sometimes the young birds will get confused though and fly to someone else's loft."

According to the fancier, pigeons have an average racing life of five or six years, then they become breeders.

"I pick the birds to race from their bloodlines," he said, pointing to one of the pigeons. "That's Susie, she's 7-years-old. I just retired her. She won four major races for me."

More than likely Susie will be bred with one of the high profile pigeons Ray Cesarz bought solely for breeding purposes. Those birds can come from as far away as Holland, Belgium or Taiwan and cost upwards of \$33,000.

Disabled folks stranded as buses halt

Social service agencies serving developmentally disabled people in western Wayne County are scrambling to make up for the absence of about 10 drivers of SMART shuttle buses.

About 20 of SMART's drivers did not report to work Friday, May 5, because there is no money left to pay them, said SMART interim general manager Michael Duggan. Other SMART employees have agreed to work without pay until the May 23 millage election, which requests a .033-mill property tax for three years.

Half of the absent drivers had been assigned to drive the shuttle buses that move developmentally disabled people from place to place in western Wayne County. Those shuttle buses are now parked.

Elizabeth Gruits is the director of Plymouth Opportunity House, a group home containing 16 developmentally disabled people.

All but one of her clients need transportation to jobs, school, or job-training workshops. And she only has a 12-passenger van to

move them around since the buses stopped running.

"It's been difficult for us, but we managed because we have a dedicated staff," Gruits said.

Of the 450 developmentally disabled individuals served by STEP (Services To Enhance Potential, and formerly the Wayne County Association for the Retarded) and SMART, nearly 350 will be affected by the sudden lack of transportation, said STEP director Seymour Simons.

Some STEP clients who would otherwise be working or training to work are now staying home all day, Simons said. In other cases parents or guardians have agreed to provide transportation.

STEP personnel and clients are hoping the millage is approved. And STEP is participating in an effort to recruit the parents and guardians of clients to make phone calls encouraging a yes vote.

"Without (SMART) I've got to search out another source of transportation or go back into the business myself, and that would be a nightmare," Simons said.

STEP will hire another trans-

portation provider if SMART dies, but it will be more costly than contracting with SMART has been, Simons said.

A STEP meeting/rally in Wyandotte early last week produced 10 phone-bank volunteers, and a similar gathering in Dearborn Friday was expected to net more.

"We're recruiting everybody who deals with the system," Duggan said.

If the millage fails, the remainder of the buses will stop running and may then be reassigned elsewhere by the federal government, which holds the title for much of SMART's equipment, Duggan said. "If we stop operating the buses, they will reassign them very quickly."

Furthermore, Duggan said, there are no plans to try to keep the system alive if the millage proposal is defeated. "There's no contingency plan for anything," he said.

However, SMART's state subsidy is scheduled to arrive in October, so perhaps "something could be assembled on a scaled-back basis" then, but there is no

guarantee.

"Will there be a very skeletal service? Will there be no service? I just don't know," Duggan said. Several Wayne County communities have "opted out" of the Wayne County Transit Authority, which was formed to put the SMART millage on the ballot. Observer communities that have opted out are Plymouth, Plymouth Township and Canton Township.

Voters in those communities will not cast ballots May 23. They will also not be taxed if the millage passes. It is debatable as to whether they will lose SMART service.

Some people say that opting out of the transit authority is the same thing as "opting" out of SMART. Others disagree.

State Sen. Loren Bennett, R-Canton Township, is trying to get a law passed that would forbid SMART from cutting off the transit subsidy it gives to each community in Wayne County.

Duggan has said that these subsidies will be cut off in every community that opts out of the transit authority.

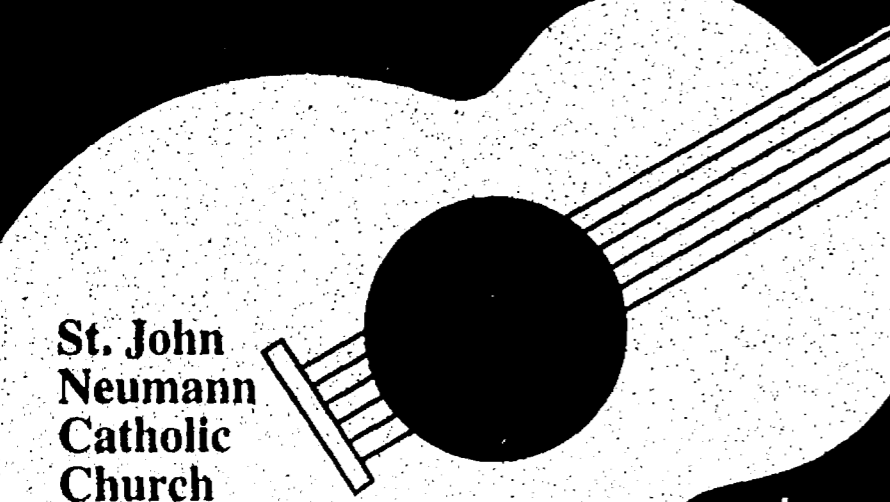

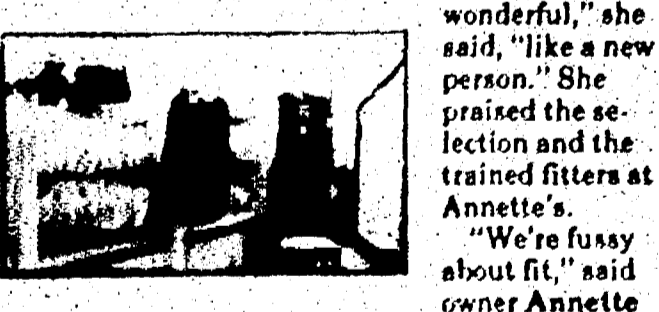
Don't confuse tightness with support. A bra should never bind or cut into your flesh. Bruises or red marks at the breastbone or around the frame indicate a bra is too tight.

Tailor gives primer on men's fashions

"Never yank off a tie. Treat your tie like a beautiful woman — very gently."

Handle retail rip-offs with these timely tips

Ever feel a retailer has not treated you properly?

Although most businesses in the area work hard to satisfy their customers, shoppers do run into disputes that can be very frustrating — and sometimes expensive. If you're in the middle of a problem with a company, here are a few tips from the Better Business Bureau based in Southfield:

- First, document your complaint. Take the time to sit down and put together a time line of the events and the attempts you have made to resolve it. Try to reconstruct the dates and times you talked to the company, names of the people you talked to, the promises you were given (and those that might have been broken.) This will become valuable if problems con-

tinue or someone disagrees with your version of the events.

Most complaints that get to the BBB are really a breakdown in communication, according to a spokesman. The company representative you deal with might not have the authority to offer an acceptable settlement. Consumers need to identify the company's management or top decision maker, then write or discuss the situation with that person.

When talking to a company decision maker, be polite and reasonable. If a customer becomes abusive or profane, a company may refuse to discuss the situation even if it has merit. Do not make demands that are so ex-

reme they can't be taken seriously.

If, despite all your best efforts, the problem still exists, get together your paperwork (contracts, receipts, etc.) and call the BBB at (810) 644-9100. Or, make copies of the papers (never send any agency the originals), and mail a letter to the BBB Office at 30555 Southfield Road, Suite 200, Southfield,

48076.

The BBB typically contacts the company to ask them for their side. Many times this initial step results in a fair settlement and everyone is happy.

If the first contact fails, the BBB may be able to offer skilled mediation or even binding arbitration. Both these programs do not require lawyers and are usual-

ly much faster than going through the courts, according to the BBB.

If the BBB feels a company is acting illegally, it will refer the situation to the appropriate law enforcement agency for investigation.

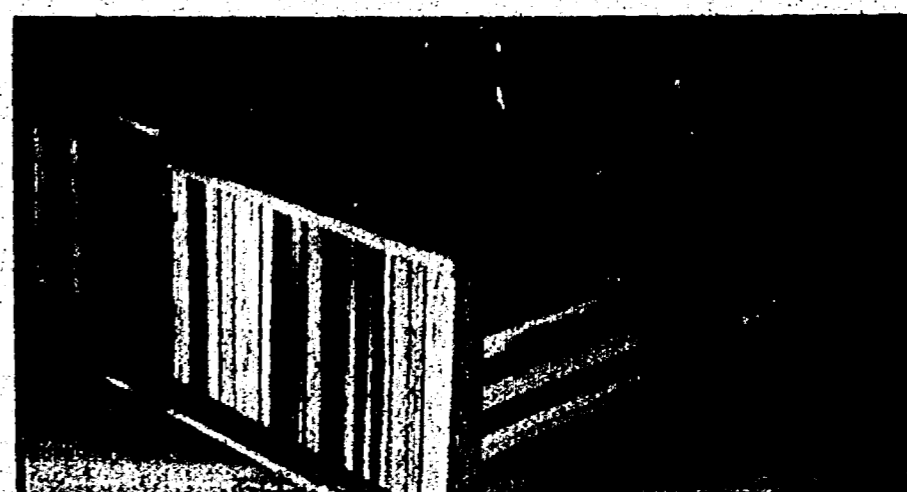

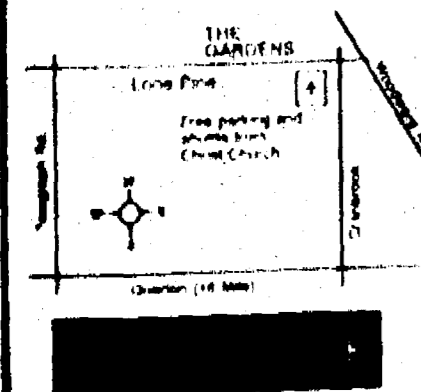

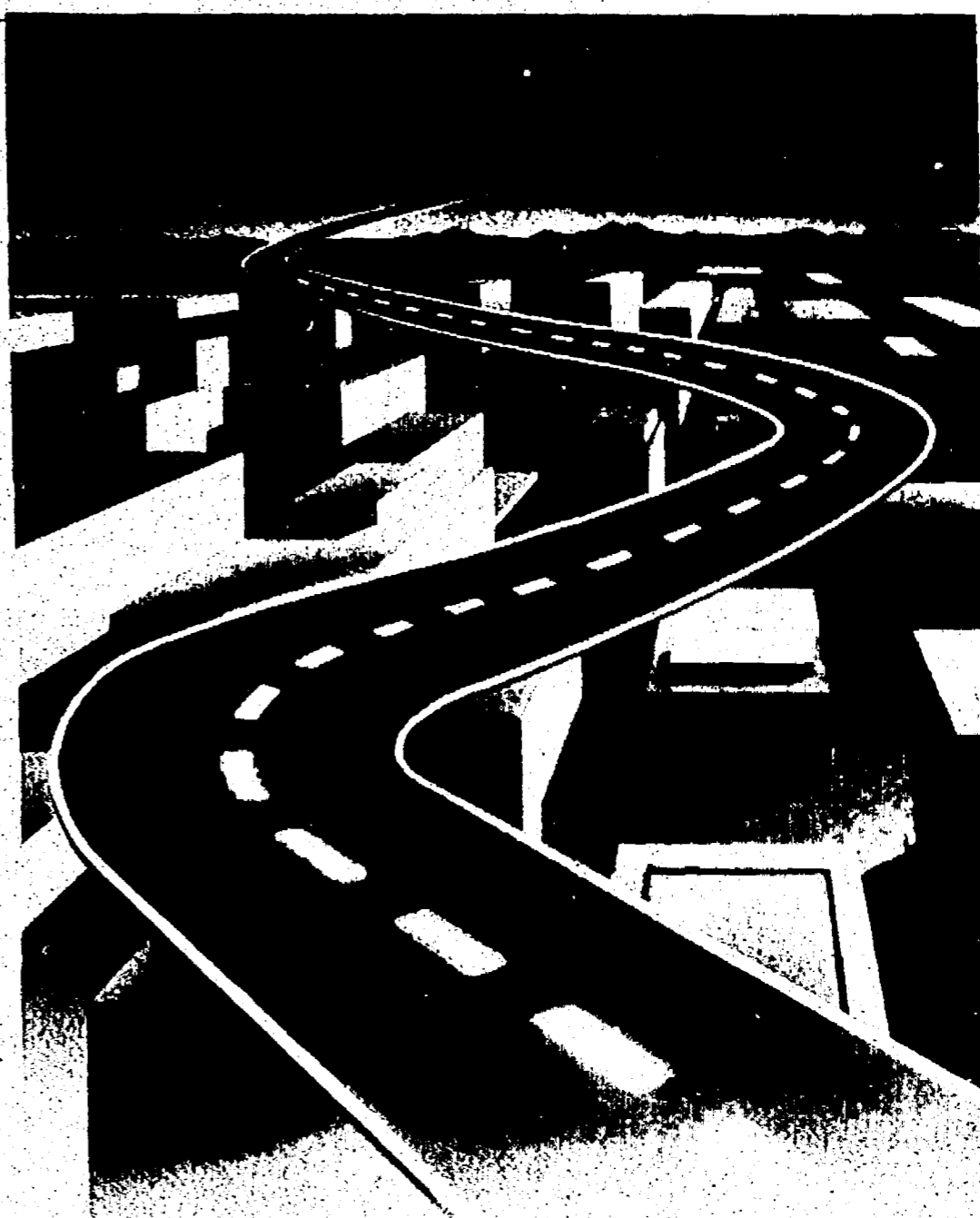

GOP bill would rein in product liability suits

State Senate Republicans performed aggravated assault on the Michigan Trial Lawyers Association by passing a bill to cut product liability suits.

"This is about restoration of common sense," said Sen. Mike Rogers, R-Howell, charging that "we clog the courts with people who should not be there and are taking valuable resources and valuable time away from the victims who deserve to be compensated."

"It wasn't until this week that it was the corporations that sold defective products that got away with murder," replied Sen. Alma Wheeler Smith, D-Salem.

The MTLA — whose members represent plaintiffs suing companies and local governments, and contribute heavily to Democrats — infuriated Republicans with full-page ads that said the bill would result in more Great Lakes pollution.

The GOP bill hit the lawyers by limiting "contingency" fees under which lawyers collect one-third of a jury award rather than an hourly rate.

Wednesday's vote was 22 to 14. The bill goes to the House, where Republicans have a 56-53 edge,

but a tighter battle is expected.

Voting yes were 21 Republicans and one Democrat. Republican David Honigman, an attorney from West Bloomfield, joined 13 Democrats in opposition. Two Detroit Democrats were absent. Except for Honigman, all area senators voted with their parties.

Senate Bill 344 will:
■ Limit so-called "jury shopping" by requiring most suits to be filed where the injury occurred, not in Wayne County where corporate offices are located and juries are more generous.

■ Allow juries to continue awarding economic damages (medical expenses and lost wages). But it will cap "pain and suffering" awards at \$500,000 for death or loss of a vital bodily function and \$280,000 for other injuries.

■ Junk the doctrine of "joint and several liability," under which a "deep pockets" defendant that was 20 percent at fault could be required to pay 100 percent of the damages if other defendants were uncollectible.

■ Prohibit recovery by a plaintiff who was 50 percent or more at fault because of alcohol or drug use.

Sponsor Joel Gougeon, R-Bay City, cited a suit against Westland's city ice arena as a horrible

example of how courts have turned business and government into "a form of social insurance."

In an April 21 decision, the state Court of Appeals ordered a trial in the case of Gary Singerman, who was playing goalie without a mask, struck in the eye by a deflected puck and injured. He charged the arena's lighting was defective. A circuit judge dismissed the case. Appellate Judge Marilyn Kelly of Bloomfield Hills wrote the 3-0 opinion that sent the case back for trial.

"You and I know," said Gougeon, "the real cause of the injury was not wearing a face mask and not using reasonable judgment. But not one to take responsibility for a stupid act, we can pass that off on product liability . . . and collect on that."

Sen. Gary Peters, D-Bloomfield Township, said Republicans failed to show there was a general problem in Michigan and relied

solely on anecdotes. His dissent was joined by Smith and George Z. Hart of Dearborn.

"Folks will remember the Ford Pinto with the exploding gas

tank," said Peters — "27 deaths, 24 serious burn injuries . . . It all could have been prevented for \$11 per car. The outrageous part is the Ford Motor Co. knew very well there were probably some problems with that gas tank, but they did not worry because it met government standards," a defense under SB 344. "But government standards at the time dealt only with front-end collisions, not back-end collisions."

Peters said the manufacturer of the Dalkon shield intrauterine

device may have escaped 300,000 claims under the "sophisticated user" defense in SB 344.

"And the reason (baby) pajamas have flame retardant material on them is because of a lawsuit," Peters said, concluding: "Michigan can be a dumping ground for defective products from around the world, whether they're from Taiwan, Dominican Republic or Hong Kong" because of the strong legal defenses given manufacturers.

Today's lean pork cooks in less time

Succulent pork chops, breaded and baked in a covered casserole until they nearly fall off the bone, are momma's specialty.

Momma can also whip up a pretty mean pork roast resplendent with all the trimmings for a Janes Gang family dinner.

When I was growing up, there were always requests for seconds when she baked her fabled ribs generously doused with a tawny orange color that mysteriously came from a Kraft bottle.

Those were the days when pork had the reputation of being a hearty, fatty meat. Everyone believed that pork should always be cooked well done, or in momma's words "very well done." But a look at pork's nutritional profile today demonstrates that its fat content has been lowered significantly.

Lean meat

An average piece of lean, trimmed pork is no less than seven percent fat. A loin chop trimmed of its fat, contains just three percent fat, about the same as a skinless chicken breast. And if pork producers have their way, the fat percentage will fall even further. Welcome as this trend may be to those trying to limit their fat intake, it has caused problems for those who want to enjoy the luscious, moist meat they remember from the past.

New cooking guidelines

Do you know why momma's pork roast was always so juicy and tender, even when cooked well done? It was the fat. Numbers don't lie. In 1955, a 237-pound hog yielded almost 35 pounds of lard; today, a hog that is 10 pounds heavier produces a little more than 10 pounds of lard. Without fat's protective layer, tough and dry meat frequently result when cooking is too long or too intense.

Even Momma, who rarely asks me anything about cooking, wanted to know how to keep her pork roast from drying out. It's a simple fact folks, both flavor and tenderness are destroyed by overcooking pork.

Nowadays, pork should be cooked "a little on the pink side," said Ken Prusa, associate professor of food nutrition at Iowa State University. This, according to my momma who surely thinks that I am going to die of salmonella poisoning because I happen to favor pork pink, is totally illogical, and almost unheard of.

"Cook it until it registers 185 degrees F. on the meat thermometer," said momma shaking her wooden spoon while extolling the wrath of God at the thought of undercooking pork. Even the U.S. Department of Agriculture, which once insisted that pork be cooked to 185 degrees F. to kill trichinella, now maintains that 160 degrees F. is sufficient. But is trichinosis a culinary concern? Although it still exists, the disease has all but been eliminated by laws prohibiting the feeding of raw garbage to swine.

Personally, I have found that when I cook a pork roast to 145 degrees F., after removing it from the oven and allowing it to stand for 10-15 minutes before carving (as you should with all roasts) the internal temperature rose to 160 degrees F. Further testing on this in the Janes Gang kitchen proved that for optimum results, a pork roast should be removed from the oven at 135 degrees F. and allowed to stand for 10-15 minutes. The temperature rose to 147-150 degrees F. This made, by far, the best, juiciest, most tender roast. The roast cooked to 160 degrees F. and allowed to stand to 175 degrees F. was dry and tasted like sawdust.

As with the raw egg in the Caesar salad controversy, the decision to cook a pork roast to any temperature must be a personal one. For the record, momma stated she will continue to cook her pork as she always has. Not that I still can't appreciate the taste of a great baked pork chop, but lately the Janes Gang has been enjoying pork grilled shish kebab style.

Favorites are center cut pork loins sliced thin and pounded almost paper thin with a meat mallet, lightly dusted in seasoned flour and quickly pan fried and doused with a little dry white or sweet red (Marsala) wine.

Marvelous muffins

Gutsy gals batter up

They're gutsy. They're confident. They're successful. Pam Salba and Marilyn Rice are the co-owners and operators of SunShine Treats, a company that manufactures frozen muffin batter, and freshly baked muffins. These two women proudly state: they have never let each other down or disappointed a customer.

SunShine Treats (their plant/store) is in Farmington Hills on 12 Mile Road across from Harrison High School.

Pam, 49, a resident of Farmington Hills, started the business in her home. Then she worked in the back of someone else's muffin shop making batter. Soon she put an ad in the paper for someone to help her.

Marilyn Rice, 46, answered the ad. The day she applied for the job, she found Pam with a bowl in her hand creating a muffin recipe. Pam recalls, "I had batter all over me. Everywhere."

Marilyn took the bowl out of Pam's hand, washed it and said to her, "I don't want your \$5.00 an hour. But if you trust me, I'll have you in your own plant in six months."

Pam did trust her. That same day Marilyn applied for the job, they became instant partners, and co-owners. And their husbands voiced understandable doubts about this instant partnership. Pam recalls some of their husbands' comments: "You don't know anything about this person. How can you form a partnership?"

Pam's response to her husband: "It's done (the partnership)."

Six months later, just like Marilyn said, they were in their own plant.

And with their own plant, they each have special jobs, although they do a little of everything. Pam creatively whips up muffin recipes for customers; Marilyn enjoys sell-

ing and being out in the field with the companies.

The two are a perfect blend, just like their products.

Their main product is a frozen muffin batter that they sell in 16-pound pails. Retail businesses and institutions buy it, thaw it, scoop it, and bake it to make their own muffins or cakes or cookies. One customer who owns a deli is even using the batter to make pancakes.

Pam, with lots of pride in her voice, says, "We don't put anything in our products that you wouldn't put on your table at home. We make everything from scratch."

They also pride themselves that it has the "homemade touch."

In addition, their muffin batter comes in regular, reduced fat and 99 percent fat free. Pam also says that 90 percent of their products are cholesterol free.

Even though their main product is the frozen muffin batter,

they also sell freshly baked muffins at their store as a convenience to their customers, who have been with them since they opened. One such loyal customer is Phillip Clervi. He said not only are the muffins a treat, but "the people (staff) are just as delightful."

Their 12 employees play an important part in SunShine Treat's success. Marilyn says, "We have excellent help. We have had the same help for six years."

Even with a great staff, there still must be a lot of stress running the business. How do they handle the stress? What do they do with their leisure time?

Marilyn says, "This is our leisure time." Pam interrupts, "We escape to here (the store)." Marilyn adds with little delighted giggles, "If we could have a little apartment in the back, it would probably be ideal." Pam agrees, "People don't understand that this is our

relaxation."

But they eventually admit there is stress with their jobs, but they agree it is "good stress." Marilyn says they have had a lot of disasters. But she wisely says, "Disasters are growing experiences. For every disaster, we learn 10 things from it."

Their great attitudes, products, staff and partnership have paid off in success. Co-owner Marilyn said, "we have had tremendous growth in six years." Pam adds they also have an excellent reputation and following.

So with those excellent credentials in business, what advice would they give to women who want to start their own business? Pam says, "You have to love what you're doing because it has to be fun."

Add 1993 vintage Burgundies to your cellar

Predictions offered a few months ago by some U.S. wine critics proclaimed 1993 French Burgundy wines less than stellar. Our recent tastings have shown these premature assessments to be incorrect.

Two weeks ago, we had the opportunity to taste a number of 1993 Maison Louis Jadot white and red Burgundies. While the whites are more acidic and slightly thinner than the 1992s, they are quite good and well priced. The reds, however, are very good, certainly not as wonderfully opulent as the 1990s, the vintage of a century, but then most of us may never again see red Burgundy wines this good in our lifetime.

If you're a neophyte at the Burgundy game or a connoisseur wishing to add to a cellar collection, don't miss purchasing some Burgundies from the 1993 vintage. You will not be disappointed. If you're just beginning to understand French wines, the following is a general guide: white Burgundies are 100 percent chardonnay and red Burgundies are 100 percent pinot noir.

We have always found the wines of Louis Jadot to be superior buys. When purchasing Burgundies, it's not so much the vintage as the producer that counts. Jadot ranks high in this respect. The firm is not an ordinary negotiant, buying wines from small producers and then blending them to make some reasonable bottling. Jadot is different. The house buys grapes from vineyards managed by the firm to supplement its own growing number of estates.

Having visited a significant number of these

properties, we feel confident in saying that they are among the best managed in the region. Jadot has been in the Burgundy business since 1859 and is not likely to jeopardize its reputation with inferior wines.

If we've captured your interest, here are the 1993 Louis Jadot white Burgundies with brief tasting notes we recommend:

- Santenay Clos de Malte Blanc (\$16): balanced flavors mirror aromas.
- Auxey-Duresses Blanc, Domaine du Duc de Magenta (\$16.50) - good balance of fruit and oak. Racy acidity makes it an ideal complement to seafood.
- Puligny-Montrachet (\$25) - floral, delicate, finesseful.
- Beaune-Greves Blanc Premier Cru (\$32.50) - toasty oak and spice highlight fruit with high-toned acidity.

Among the red Burgundies, we pick:

- Santenay Clos de Malte (\$15) - attractive wine with cherries, spice and hints of oak.
- Savigny-Les-Beaune (\$16.75) - brighter fruit flavors and greater complexity than the previous wine. Good value.
- Beaune Premier Cru (\$20) - dark cherry aromas with hints of rose petals, balanced flavors and smooth finish.
- Beaune Clos du Couchereaux (\$22.50) - stylish, complex with bright flavors and lengthy finish.
- Gevrey-Chambertin, Clos Saint-Jacques (\$46.50).
- Corton Pougets Grand Cru (\$41.50): big wine.

Buy for extended cellaring.

- Beaune Premier Cru Vignes Franches, Clos des Uraules Monopole (\$31.50) - because of its reputation, we buy this wine without tasting in every good vintage. A monopole is a vineyard with a single owner, very rare in Burgundy. In this case, the owner is Jadot, and we are certain you will be delighted.

Prices quoted are from the Merchant of Vino, but you may wish to check with your favorite wine shop. At the Merchant, you may order these wines through the month of May and pay when wines are delivered in November 1995. The 1993 white Burgundies will drink best in 1997. Reds should be cellared at least until 1997 and will drink optimally early in the new millennium.

Roasted or grilled, pork is quick and easy

PAN ROASTED PORK CHOPS

- 4 pork loin chops, about 1 1/4-inch thick (2 pounds)
- 4 medium garlic cloves, halved lengthwise
- 1 small onion, chopped fine
- 1/2 teaspoon each thyme and rosemary
- 1 teaspoon coarse cracked pepper
- 1/4 cup olive oil

Rub the entire surface of the pork chops with a garlic clove. Set chops

aside. Mix these garlic cloves with the onion, thyme, rosemary, pepper and olive oil.

Pour into a glass baking dish and add chops to marinade. Cover with plastic wrap and allow to stand for 2 hours. (You can cover and refrigerate overnight, if desired).

Preheat oven to 400 degrees F. Remove pork chops from marinade. Sprinkle chops with a pinch of salt and fresh ground pepper. Heat a small amount of butter in a large oven proof skillet. Sauté chops, turning once, till browned on both sides, about 4 minutes. Transfer skillet to the oven and roast until a

meat thermometer inserted in the center registers 150 degrees F. (about 15 minutes). Serve. Makes 4 servings.

GRILLED PORK WITH THAI SAUCE

- 4 pork loin medallions (1-1/2 inch thick) about 1 1/2 pounds

- Sauce:
- 1 silver fresh ginger root
 - 1/4 cup plum wine (a sweet red wine can be substituted)
 - 1/4 cup cashews
 - 2 tablespoons peanut oil

- 2 green onions, chopped
- 1/2 cup cilantro, chopped
- 3 cloves garlic, chopped
- 1 medium jalapeno pepper, seeded and chopped fine
- Pinch turmeric (optional)
- 1 tablespoon honey
- 1 tablespoon balsamic vinegar
- 1/2 teaspoon cumin
- Salt and pepper to taste
- 1 tablespoon lime juice

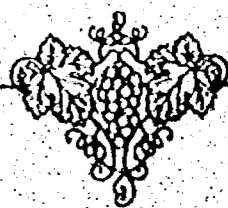
Bring ginger and wine to a boil in a small saucepan. Simmer until wine reduces to about 1 tablespoon. Remove ginger. In a food proces-

sor or a blender, place reduced wine, cashews, oil, green onions, cilantro, garlic, jalapeno, turmeric, honey, sesame oil, vinegar and cumin and process until smooth or until ingredients form a paste.

Transfer paste to a bowl and set aside. Preheat grill or oven broiler. Sprinkle pork medallions with salt and pepper. Cook pork medallions as desired while brushing occasionally with prepared paste. When chops are cooked as desired, transfer to a warm plate. Stir lime juice in remaining paste and serve with grilled chops. Serves 4.

crease calories by 500 or burn 500 calories with exercise.

Fats, oils, foods high in sugar and fat, soft drinks and alcoholic beverages are all extra sources of calories. If you can't avoid them, at least limit the amount you eat. If rich desserts are a problem, eat a very small portion, or fresh fruit instead. Avoid seconds of high-calorie food and gradually cut back on the serving size. Instead of sauces, butter or margarine, flavor foods with spices and herbs.

Bread, potatoes and pasta are not fattening. A baked potato has 100 calories, but if you add one tablespoon of butter it's 200 calories, add another tablespoon of butter, and you have 300 calories.

Choose a "naked" potato instead of french fries, 320 calories. Think of it this way, 10 french fries equal one medium baked potato plus two teaspoons of fat. If you choose a plain baked potato instead of french fries, you'll save calories and 14 grams of fat.

Try putting salad dressing in a spray bottle and mist your salads. You'll get lots of flavor, but not as many calories. Eat them "naked" occasionally, use lots of vegetables, herbs and spices and no dressing. Remember to drink eight glasses of water a day, it's not a magic bullet, but it does fill you up and aid digestion. Trick your body into feeling satisfied with less fat and fewer calories.

Salsa can be used instead of mayonnaise on sandwiches or as a marinade for chicken and fish. Baked white potatoes probably need some butter or sour cream but not, sweet potatoes, which have a rich taste and creamy texture.

Medium-sized cinnamon raisin bagels are sweet enough without butter. Snack on an orange. It takes time to peel and eat, and

the body will think it is full. Air-popped popcorn has just 100 calories, and one gram of fat for four cups. Compare that to four cups of potato chips, which contain 600 calories and 40 grams of fat.

Make a skinny pizza. Use a thin crust, oil-free sauce, lots of garlic and oregano, a variety of vegetables and no cheese. Toast chickpeas and eat as roasted peanuts. Drain canned chickpeas (garbanzo beans) spread on a cookie sheet then roast in a 400-degree oven for five to 10 minutes. Season with salt, chili pepper or garlic salt.

People trying to cut down on calories tend to eat the same things every day, and this leads to boredom. Start making changes by reading food labels to see where hidden fats are, serving sizes, and calories per serving, this will make a difference.

There is a food saying, "H - A - L - T!!!!" This means to ask your-

self, "Am I Hungry? Angry? Lonely? Tired?." Eat only if you are hungry!

The refrigerator can be a magnet when you are in the kitchen and you're trying to cut back. The refrigerator is a good place to hide tasty morsels. Put these goodies in hard-to-see and hard-to-reach places, like the bottom or back corner. Tape the lids on tightly so it's a hassle to open. Freeze leftovers, it's hard to eat them if they are frozen solid.

No one hears about anyone sitting down to eat 20 apples, but 20 cookies or a bag of chips go down pretty quickly! Reward weight loss with a movie or something other than cookies or chips, but don't forget the exercise, they go together.

Pasta dishes can be quick and satisfying

AP — Pasta can form the base for a quick, satisfying meal. In the following recipe, yellow peppers and onions are cooked in bacon drippings until crisp-tender. Chopped fresh tomatoes and seasonings are added for a homemade sauce. The sauce is served over penne, a short tubular pasta.

PASTA WITH TOMATO, CHICORY AND BACON SAUCE

- 4 large (about 2 pounds) fresh tomatoes
- 6 slices bacon
- 2 cups sliced yellow bell peppers
- 1 cup sliced onion
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 1/2 teaspoon ground black pepper
- 3 cups chicory (curly endive), torn in bite-size pieces
- 1 tablespoon balsamic or wine vinegar
- 8 ounces penne (short tubular pasta), cooked and drained

Use tomatoes held at room temperature until fully ripe. Core tomatoes; chop (makes about 6 cups); set aside. In a large skillet fry bacon until crisp, about 5 minutes; drain on paper towels. Break into small pieces; set aside. Remove all but 2 tablespoons bacon drippings from skillet; add yellow peppers and onions; cook and stir until crisp-tender, about 5 minutes. Add reserved tomatoes, salt and black pepper; cook, uncovered, until a thick sauce forms, 8 to 10 minutes. Stir in chicory, vinegar and reserved bacon. Cook until chicory is wilted, about 1 minute. Place hot penne in a serving bowl; add tomato sauce; toss gently. Serve hot or at room temperature. Garnish with tomato wedges, if desired. Makes 4 servings.

Soda, candy, many cakes, cookies, and crackers may be classified as "empty calorie," snacks because they provide little nutrient value yet are high in calories, said Sylvia Treitman, home economist for Michigan State University Extension of Oakland County.

Choose snacks that are low in fat, sugar and salt. Foods from the fruit and vegetable group make excellent snacks as well as many low fat whole grain selections.

Here are some of Treitman's

smart snacking tips:

- Keep snacks small. Serve your snacks on a plate or dish to control the amount.
- Avoid eating out of the bag — you lose track of how much you've eaten.
- Plan ahead — keep healthful snacks on hand. Good choices are fresh or dried fruit, air popped corn, low salted pretzels, baked tortilla chips and salsa, fat free yogurt, graham crackers, animal crackers, ginger snaps, and low fat whole grain crackers.

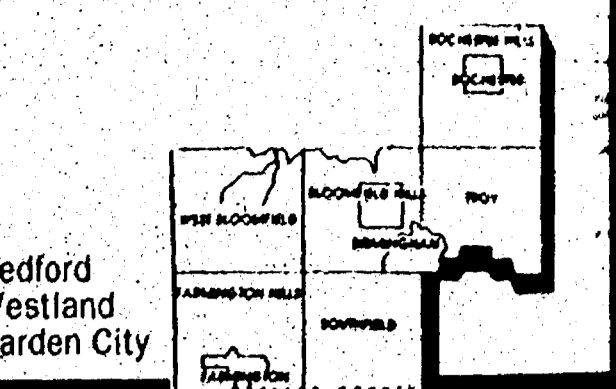

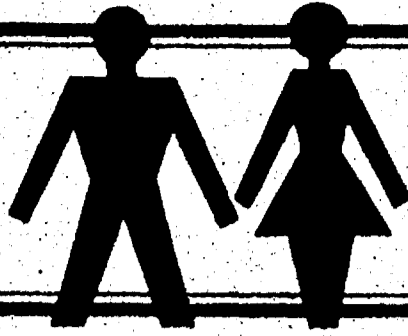

get them to try and throw the ball around a bit, to make things happen."

The strategy was a sound one, particularly after Madonna's 9-6 win over the Yellow Jackets in Friday's semifinal, a game in which West Virginia (34-12) committed five errors.

The triumph gives the Crusaders, now 37-23, their first-ever berth in the NAIA Regionals. They play in the six-team, double-elimination Great Lakes Regional Tournament in Battle Creek beginning Wednesday. Opponent and game time had not been determined as of Saturday.

Madonna trailed 2-1 entering the fifth inning of Saturday's game, thanks to a two-run home run by West Virginia's Matt Domer. The Crusaders scored their first run in the first, on a leadoff single by Dan Taylor, a stolen base and an error by Yellow Jacket second baseman Shawn Hamilton.

The Crusaders manufactured three runs in the fifth while hitting just one ball out of the infield. Shawn Penczak walked and Taylor reached base on a bunt single. An infield hit by Kurt Wilczynski loaded it up for Jim Solak, whose long fly to right scored the game-tying run.

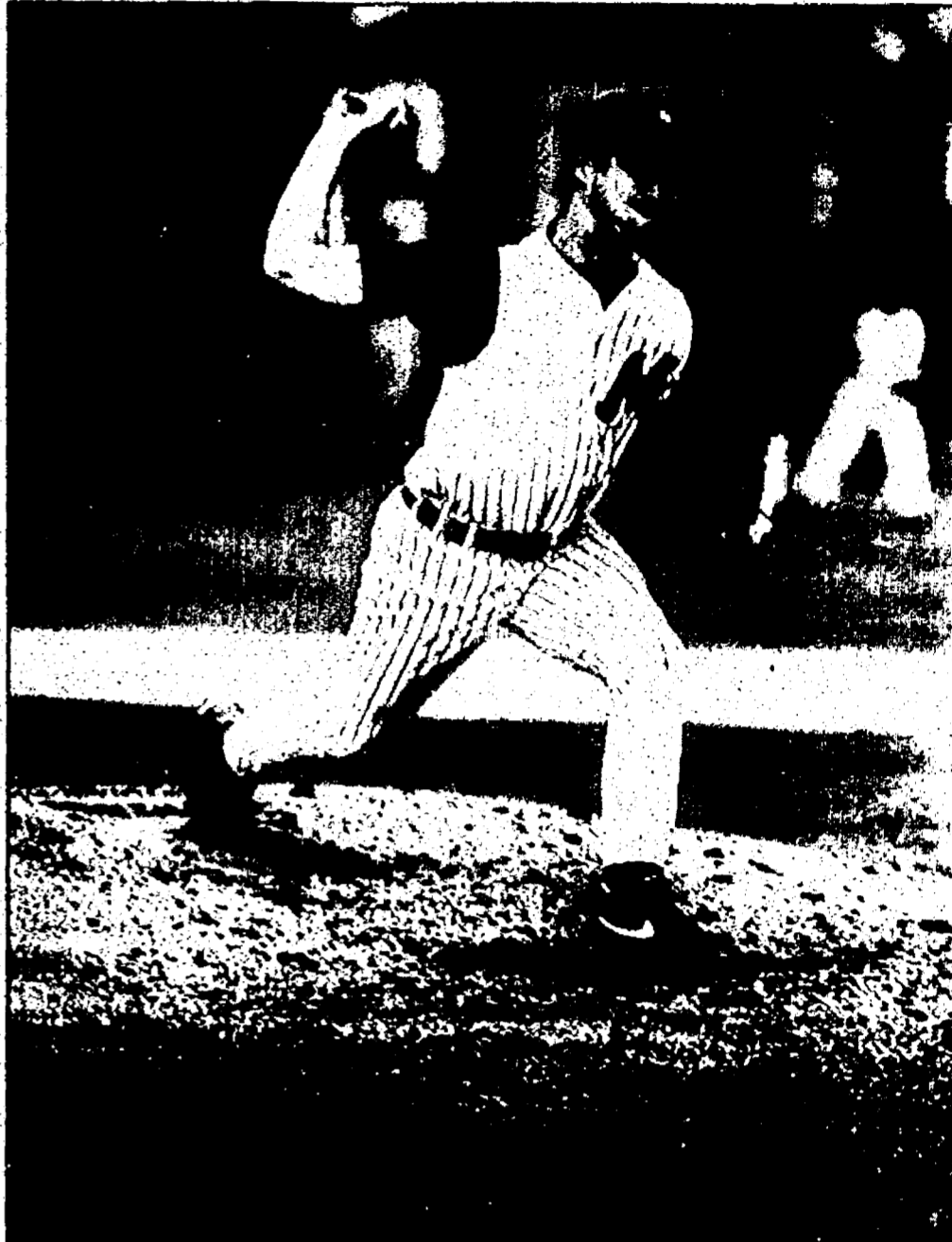
Aaron Jones followed with a walk to reload the bases for Scott Anderson, who — like Jones — walked on four pitches, forcing in the go-ahead run. Craig Petersen's groundout brought home another run, making it 4-2.

Madonna got two more runs in the eighth in much the same fashion: infield hits by Pete Quinn, Tim Kasubowski, Taylor and Wilczynski delivered the runs, making it 6-2. A Kasubowski single in the eighth scored the game's final run.

Taylor and Kasubowski each had three singles and a run batted in, while Anderson and Wilczynski added two hits and an RBI apiece. Quinn also had two hits.

Which was far more than Henkel needed. The pitching win bettered the Livonia Stevenson graduate's season record to 8-3, tying him with current teammate Dan Pydyn for the school record for most wins in a season. Henkel went all nine innings, allowing six hits and two walks and striking out six.

The Crusaders won earlier Thursday, defeating Greenville (Ill.), 10-3, in the completion of a game suspended by rain Wednesday.

Scheffer possesses big bat for Titans

Lawrence Scheffer looked forward to showing professional baseball scouts what he could do this season as a first baseman for the University of Detroit.



But after the Titans' spring trip to Florida where Scheffer played first base, coach Bob Miller decided to return Scheffer to the outfield and move Ed Gundry to first.

Instead of pouting, Scheffer accepted the move with grace.

It showed Scheffer has become a team player, which might not mean much to scouts, but means a lot to the Titans.

"I'm a captain and had to show leadership," said Scheffer, a 1991 Westland John Glenn graduate. "I knew I'd play somewhere, whatever is best for the team. It's like a family here."

Scheffer never has to worry about a spot in the Titans' batting lineup. He bats cleanup, between the No. 3 hitter, shortstop Jamie Lopiccolo, and the No. 5 batter, left fielder Kevin Dotson. The senior trio have combined for 44 home runs, 147 RBI and 138 runs scored.

Dotson leads the Titans with a U-D single season record 18 homers, followed by Scheffer with 16 and Lopiccolo with 10.

Scheffer was batting .377 heading into last weekend's Midwestern Col-

legiate Conference Tournament at Notre Dame. He has a team-high 53 RBI, one better than Dotson; and also leads the Titans with a .790 slugging percentage.

Scheffer and Lopiccolo lead with five game-winning hits and both will finish in the top five in several categories for career records at U-D.

The Titans won the Eastern Division of the MCC with a 12-2 record and finished the regular season with a 27-16 overall record.

"Lawrence was at first base, and he wasn't struggling, but we said we've got to get Lawrence back in the outfield," Miller said. "We want Lawrence to worry about hitting, not pickoffs and bunt defenses. The team is winning and it's a contagious thing. He's the happiest he's ever been and has had one heck of a season."

If Scheffer has a future in professional baseball, it likely will be as a first baseman or catcher. His brother, Aaron, was undrafted and signed as a free agent pitcher out of high school in 1993.

Despite his 6-foot-2, 210-pound build and power at the plate, Scheffer is also prepared to be bypassed in the June major league draft because of his average speed and throwing arm.

"Look at Jamie (Lopiccolo), last year he hit 17 home runs, 67 RBI and he didn't get drafted at all or get signed as a free agent," said Scheffer, who is six classes shy of a criminal justice degree. "Like anyone else, it's my dream to sign and have a shot to

Lady Crusaders finish 2-2 in Indy

No, there was no repeat performance.

No stunning upset of a top-ranked team.

In truth, Madonna University's softball team never maneuvered its way into that sort of position at last week's NAIA Great Lakes Regional Tournament, hosted by Indiana University-Purdue University-Indianapolis.

The Fighting Crusaders never reached a showdown against Shawnee State, the team they sent packing a year earlier in a magnificent upset, a win that got them a berth in the '94 NAIA World Series.

But Madonna still turned in an admirable performance in the most difficult of circumstances — particularly for a young team like the Crusaders, who had six freshmen starting and no seniors in the lineup.

After losing its first game in the six-team, double-elimination tournament by a 9-1 margin Wednesday to Bethel College

(Ind.), Madonna rallied for two wins on Thursday, 3-2 over Edgewood College (Madison, Wis.) and 1-0 over 14th-ranked College of St. Francis (Joliet, Ill.).

Alas, that's as far as the Crusaders got. On Friday, they were beaten by Siena Heights 9-1.

"We could not stop them," Madonna coach Jerry Abraham said of Siena Heights, which advanced to play Shawnee State (Portsmouth, Ohio) for the regional title. "They hit the ball all over the place. They unleashed their bats against us."

And against freshman Shanna Streng, the MVP of the Great Lakes Independent Section and the hero a day earlier against St. Francis. "I think she pitched a magnificent game," said Abraham of Streng's performance against St. Francis. "I think

that was the highlight of our season, knocking the 14th-ranked team out of the tournament."

Streng stopped St. Francis on two hits; she faced 23 batters and did not issue a walk, striking out three. Madonna got the game's only run in the sixth. Michelle Birchmeier (from Redford Thurston) tripled to start the rally, and scored on Courtney Senger's sacrifice fly.

Senger and Jeanie Baxter (Redford St. Agatha) had two of Madonna's six hits.

The Crusaders didn't fare as well against Siena Heights. Streng lasted just 2 1/2 innings; she gave up six runs (two earned) on six hits, with one strikeout. Lynda Welch relieved and went the final 5 1/2 innings, allowing three runs (two earned) on four hits and two walks, with one strikeout.

The Saints scored twice in the second inning and added six more in the third, ending Madonna's season at 25-18.

In their first game Thursday, the Crusaders rallied for two

runs in the seventh inning to edge Edgewood, 3-2. Welch was the winning pitcher; she surrendered two runs (none earned) on two hits and three walks, striking out two.

Jennifer Pinter supplied the game-winning hit. With the score 2-1 Edgewood in the seventh, Birchmeier and Jennifer Czach singled to start things. Pinter followed with a double, scoring Birchmeier and, when the ball was mishandled, bringing in Czach with the winner.

In the loss to Bethel, Birchmeier had two of Madonna's five hits but the only run was scored by Jamie Cook, on a sacrifice fly by Erin Comment. Streng took the loss, giving up nine runs (six earned) on 11 hits and a walk, with two strikeouts.

"We should learn from this season," Abraham said. "We have no seniors, so they should all be back. They're a young team and were a bit inconsistent, but they played a tough schedule. With a good recruiting class, we should be even better next year."

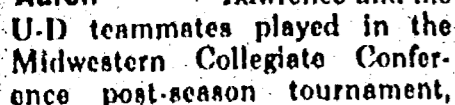
Even the times of the game, at least on Saturday, were accommodating for the parents.
