Sadler gets lengthy prison terms



Emotions ran high Friday as family members of slain jogger Caryn Casaz and her killer, Paul Raymond Sadler, addressed a Detroit judge. "Caryn was my baby," her father said. "My life has a void that can't be filled."

Mary Casaz often goes to bed early at night to escape the painful memories of losing her 24-year-old daughter Caryn, a Westland jogger killed by drunken driver Paul Raymond Sadler of Garden City.

"Often I go to sleep early so that I don't have to think at all," Casaz said Friday, bringing a packed courtroom to tears as she addressed Wayne County Circuit Court Judge Michael Talbot.

The emotionally shattered mother talked of the dreams that she and her

daughter will never see come true. "I will never be able to help her decorate her house, pick out a wedding dress or hold her babies in my arms," Casaz said, pleading on Sadler's sentencing day that he be shown no mercy.

Talbot sentenced Sadler to 10 to 20 years for second-degree murder, five to 15 years for driving drunk/causing a death, and two to five years for leaving the Hines Drive scene where he veered from the road and hit Casaz last Sept. 13.

Defense and prosecuting attorneys had said prior to Friday that, under a

plea agreement, Talbot would order Sadler to prison for no more than 20 years.

"If they had given him life, it wouldn't have sent enough of a message for me. Caryn is dead," Mary Casaz said after Sadler, 43, was led away by authorities.

Sadler's sentencing capped — but didn't end — a grueling period for Caryn Casaz's family and friends. In court, Mary Casaz described how she misses a daughter that worked as a Ford Motor Co. engineer, played vio-

Westland man rescued in Kentucky cave

A Livonia man was one of two cave explorers who led a Thursday rescue of five people trapped by floodwaters inside a Kentucky cave.

The rescuers, Larry Bean of Livonia and Steve Miller of Pontiac, were among seven people who had been exploring the Fisher Ridge Cave System, in western Kentucky's Hart County, beginning Feb. 16. Bean and Miller explored one part of the system over that weekend and returned to the Detroit area, while four men and one woman went to a base camp in the

cave, from which they planned to explore until Tuesday.

Instead, two inches of rain Feb. 19 brought rising waters that covered part of their return route. The five had planned to stay inside the cave until the waters receded from a passageway leading to an exit.

Bean, Miller and the five people who were trapped are members of Detroit Urban Grotto, a cave exploration club based in Royal Oak. Those trapped were Peter Quick of Superior Township, Brian Davis of Westland,

Leigh Ann Vaughn of Ann Arbor, Joe Meppellins of Ann Arbor and Eric Fehllaler of Northville. All are experienced cave explorers.

Bean and Miller returned to the cave Wednesday after learning the five had not yet emerged.

"We had confidence in their ability," Bean said. "We were confident they were in good shape and capable of waiting for the water to drop."

The group had enough food and other supplies, brought in over time, to last for two weeks. The main base

camp is five miles from the Fisher Ridge Cave entrance.

Of that five miles, Bean said, about a mile is through narrow passages that require a belly crawl, including a very rough portion called the "cheese grater."

The water blocking the explorers filled an area of the cave Bean compared to a trap in a drain. It was "sumped" or filled with water.

The five who were stranded had

Winter won't seek another board term

Wayne-Westland school board president Francis "Bud" Winter confirmed Thursday that he won't seek re-election to another four-year term.

That means at least one new board member will be elected in the June 10 race.

"The district now is heading in the right direction, and it's time for me to do what I want to do," Winter, 67, said.

Winter and his wife, Maggie, are planning to move from Canton Township to Chocoma, Ariz., in the fall to spend their retirement years.

Winter was elected to the school board four years ago, after retiring in 1990 from a 35-year education career in the Wayne-Westland district.

"His total contribution is one of dedication to the students and the parents of the district," veteran board member Matthew McCusker said. "The fact that he was willing to give four years of his retirement to serve on the board shows his dedication. "He will be difficult to replace,"

McCusker said.

Winter said the school district has achieved the goals that he cited as being instrumental in his decision to seek election in 1992. Specifically:

- Attendance boundaries have been redrawn
- Four elementary have been closed, a decision that Winter said was "painful" but necessary
- The district has shifted to a middle school structure and
- Numerous measures have been implemented to improve classroom instruction

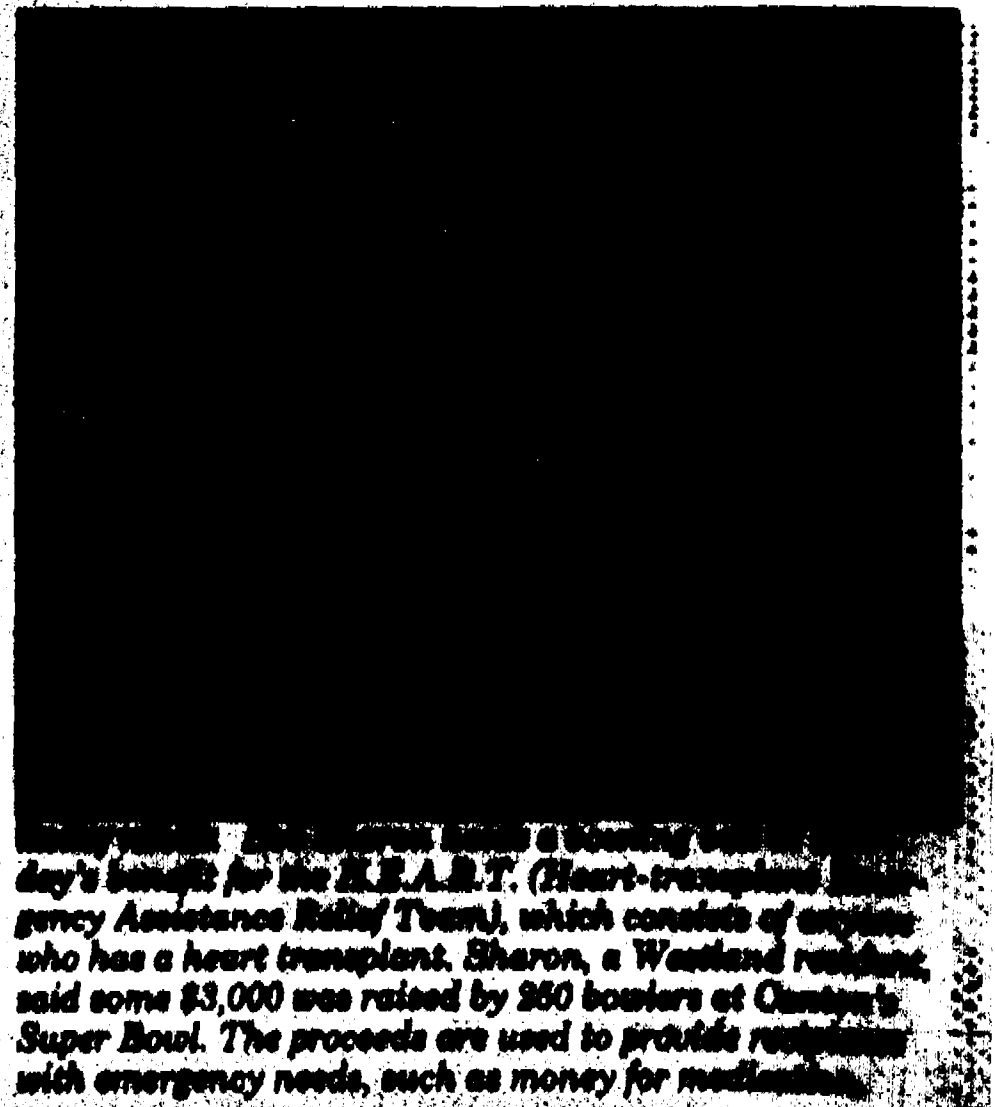
"There's no school district in the history of the country, I believe, that took on that many challenges at one time," Winter said.

Winter began his term when board members were still in the midst of political infighting.

In recent months, however, the board has appeared more united, and relations with Superintendent Duane Moore are, by all accounts, productive.

"I'm leaving at a time when I believe the district is in excellent hands," Winter said.

"I'm leaving with a lot of great memories," he said. "It's a good time to go, but it's a sad time, too."

He said his main worry is that the district will continue to face financial problems because of state-level cutbacks in education funding.

During his career, Winter taught at Walker and Madison elementaries and served as principal at five elementaries; Kettering, Walker, Monroe, Hoover and the old Sheldon School. He also was principal at Franklin Junior High and, most recently, Wayne Memorial High School.

A scholarship in his name was set up at Wayne Memorial, and he said he plans to return to the district each year to present the award.

"My spirit will always be here," he said.

Other than Winter, the only board member whose seat is at stake June 10 is appointee Ed Turner, who confirmed weeks ago that he will seek a four-year term.

Turner was appointed in January to fulfill the remaining six months of former board member Richard LeBlanc's term. LeBlanc stepped down after being elected to the Westland City Council.

lin and guitar, and excelled in athletics.

"Anything she attempted, she succeeded in," the mother said. "She loved life."

When she first heard that Caryn had been killed, she said, "I prayed, 'God, let this be wrong. Not my baby.'"

Mary Casaz said she can't enter Caryn's former bedroom without crying.

Several people spoke on behalf of Caryn Casaz and Sadler, who sat with his head bowed during much of Friday's proceedings. Sadler, a father of two, also repeated statements he made in a jail cell Feb. 12 during an interview with the Observer.

"I pray for Caryn's family and my wife and children every day," he said, adding that he is "terribly sorry and ashamed."

Christine Byndas, 20 months older than her sister Caryn, described how the two remained inseparable from their days of playing with Barbie dolls to their jobs at Ford Motor Co. She identified Caryn's body after the accident.

"That vision of my dead sister will forever be burned in my mind," Byndas said.

Byndas pleaded for a harsh penalty for Sadler and said, "My first thought was to give him the same sentence that he gave Caryn: death." But she told the judge she understood that the death penalty was not included in the sentencing guidelines.

Victor Casaz, Caryn's father, said he thinks every day about the physical pain his daughter must have endured when she was hit by Sadler, who was trailed home by another motorist who

notified authorities.

"My life has a void that can't be filled. My daughter is dead," Victor Casaz said. He asked that Sadler receive life in prison.

Sadler's family members, seeking leniency, described him as a churchgoing family man who had struggled to overcome his alcoholism.

"This is not a man who would hurt anybody," said his wife Patricia, principal of Hosanna Taber, a parochial school in Redford Township.

She supported Sadler's claims that he was so drunk that he didn't immediately realize he had hit Casaz.

"If he had been aware of the seriousness (of what had happened), he wouldn't have driven home," Patricia Sadler said.

Sadler's blood-alcohol level was .21, more than twice the legal limit. He also had cocaine in his bloodstream.

Sadler's twin brother, Peter, described him as "a good father and husband. My brother would never intentionally hurt anyone."

Sadler family friend David Anderson, a police officer, told the judge that Sadler had found an Alcoholics Anonymous sponsor long before Casaz's death and that he had tried to battle his illness.

Judge Talbot said he wished he could ease the pain for both families.

"I wish I could have the right words, the right decision, that would heal everybody in this case," he said. "But I don't have that gift."

Run to honor jogger's memory

Caryn Casaz, killed by a drunk driver while jogging in Hines Park, will be remembered June 15 in a 3.1-mile run sponsored by the Wayne County chapter of Mothers Against Drunk Driving.

The chapter's first 5K "Run From The Heart" event in honor of Casaz, 24, will occur in the Merriman Hollow area of Hines Park, near the scene where Casaz was killed last Sept. 13.

Casaz's sister, Christine Byndas, said Thursday that family members agreed to have Casaz's name used for the MADD fund-raising event.

Casaz, a Ford Motor Co. employee, had been training to run in a marathon when she was struck and killed by Garden City resident Paul Sadler, who was sentenced in court Friday for her death. (See story on Page 1A.)

Sadler, who has said he lost consciousness while driving, veered off of Hines Drive and hit Casaz.

Casaz seemed a logical choice for being honored during the 5K run, said Carol Malepka, office secretary of the Westland-based Wayne County MADD chapter.

"Since Caryn was killed while she was jogging, this seemed like an appropriate way to keep her memory alive," Malepka said Thursday.

MADD organizers hope that the "Run From The Heart" competition will become an annual event.

The run and other fund-raising events are becoming increasingly important because of financial difficulties facing the Wayne County MADD chapter, Malepka said.

Each participant in the 5K run will pay a \$15 entry fee, but will

receive a MADD T-shirt, Malepka said. Medals also will be awarded to winners.

Both runners and walkers are welcome to participate, Malepka said.

Registration will begin at 8 a.m. on June 15. For more information, call the MADD office at 721-8181.

moved their base camp closer to the sumped area in order to keep an eye on it and work on it.

Bean and Miller were on the other side of this sump Thursday, building a dam and a trench to try to divert water that was flowing into it.

While this work was being done, Miller heard scraping on other side of the sump, where two of the stranded were working to drain water out of the sump.

Miller moved closer to check the area, and voice contact was

made. Slight visual contact was also made.

"They were sure glad to hear us on the other side of the sump," Bean said.

That the stranded explorers could hear Bean and Miller was important, Bean said, because if they hadn't been able to ascertain that the sumped area blocking them led to air, they would not have tried to get out just then because they may have risked drowning.

The stranded explorers had

been sleeping a lot and taking turns monitoring the sumped area and trying to divert water from it.

"They were in good shape. They were conserving energy by sleeping," said Bean. "They were prepared to wait."

Quick got out first, by going underwater through the sump. Wet and cold, Quick, and then Miller, headed toward the cave exit. Bean, in a wet suit, waited for the others coming from their alternate base camp.

Both the rescuers and the ex-

plorers were prepared for such an occurrence, Bean said.

"We knew the area. We knew the conditions of the cave," said Bean. "You have to know your limits. You have to know the environment of the cave."

Bean, a geologist with the state's Department of Environmental Quality, works in Livonia. He returned to work Friday after helping lead Thursday's rescue. "We drove through the night to get back," he said.

Bean and other club members have been surveying the Fisher Ridge system for 16 years. Bean, Quick and three others discovered the system in 1981. The cave is near Mammoth Cave National Park.

Club members so far have surveyed 78 miles of the cave system. Bean believes the system is 100 miles or more long, and that it could be connected to Mammoth Cave.

Older women can look forward to new challenges

Middle-aged and elderly women shouldn't be viewed as "leftovers but a brand new dish."

That was one of several points nationally known psychologist Dr. Sonya Friedman told 600 women attending the sixth annual "Turning Points" conference held recently by Oakwood Healthcare System, which owns and operates medical clinics in Garden City and Westland and an acute-care hospital in Wayne.

With the conference focusing on menopause, Friedman emphasized to her audience that the future years can be exciting in the post-menopause and post-widowhood years.

"Never say, 'I'm too old for that.' Say, 'I'm grown up.'"

Friedman added that the women in their 50s have "emotional and social liberations."

The keynote speaker stressed that women must remain active and avoid stagnation and self-defeating patterns.

A study shows that only 10 percent of women in their 50s or older have restraints that restrict their activities.

Quoting another author on women's issues, Friedman concluded with:

"Translate aging into saging" and that "I'm not having hot flashes -- I'm having power surges."

The psychologist added that not only are hot flashes a power surge, but also resemble a "boost and a rocket."

Women should have the view that "I'm not wearing down -- I'm wising up."

Local women attending the all-day conference in the Dearborn Inn made it clear that they not only learned from the speakers but were "energized" by Friedman's comments.

"A lot of us are growing older, and that's a powerful force for change," said Westland's Barbara Reynolds, 52.

The conference "reinforced what I've learned, that I am responsible for my own health."

Deborah Williams of Livonia,

who said she was "in my mid 40s," commented said she learned that "there a lot of options out there and that those options have to be looked at and discussed. Any decisions must be made by the patient and the physician jointly."

JoAnn Beyer, a Novi resident in her early 60s, said the conference "was an affirmation of what I'm going through isn't that unusual and that others are experiencing the same thing."

She felt Friedman's comments that the menopause years "are just the beginning" were inspiring and that she encouraged women to take care of themselves.

Another attendant, JoAnn Marsack, 62, of St. Clair Shores, said that Friedman's comments "energized" her.

Westland's Barbara Shaver echoed many of the comments of the other attendees.

Dr. John George, a psychologist who practices within the Oakwood system in Westland and Dearborn, was one of the conference's four speakers, focusing on how women can learn to manage stress.

He said a good, healthy diet is one key to remaining active in a person's later years and that the menopause is "a bridge to the second half of your life."

He strongly urged a diet consisting of carbohydrates, oat cereals, protein and fiber.

"Stress is a natural part of change," John said. "Without stress, there is death."

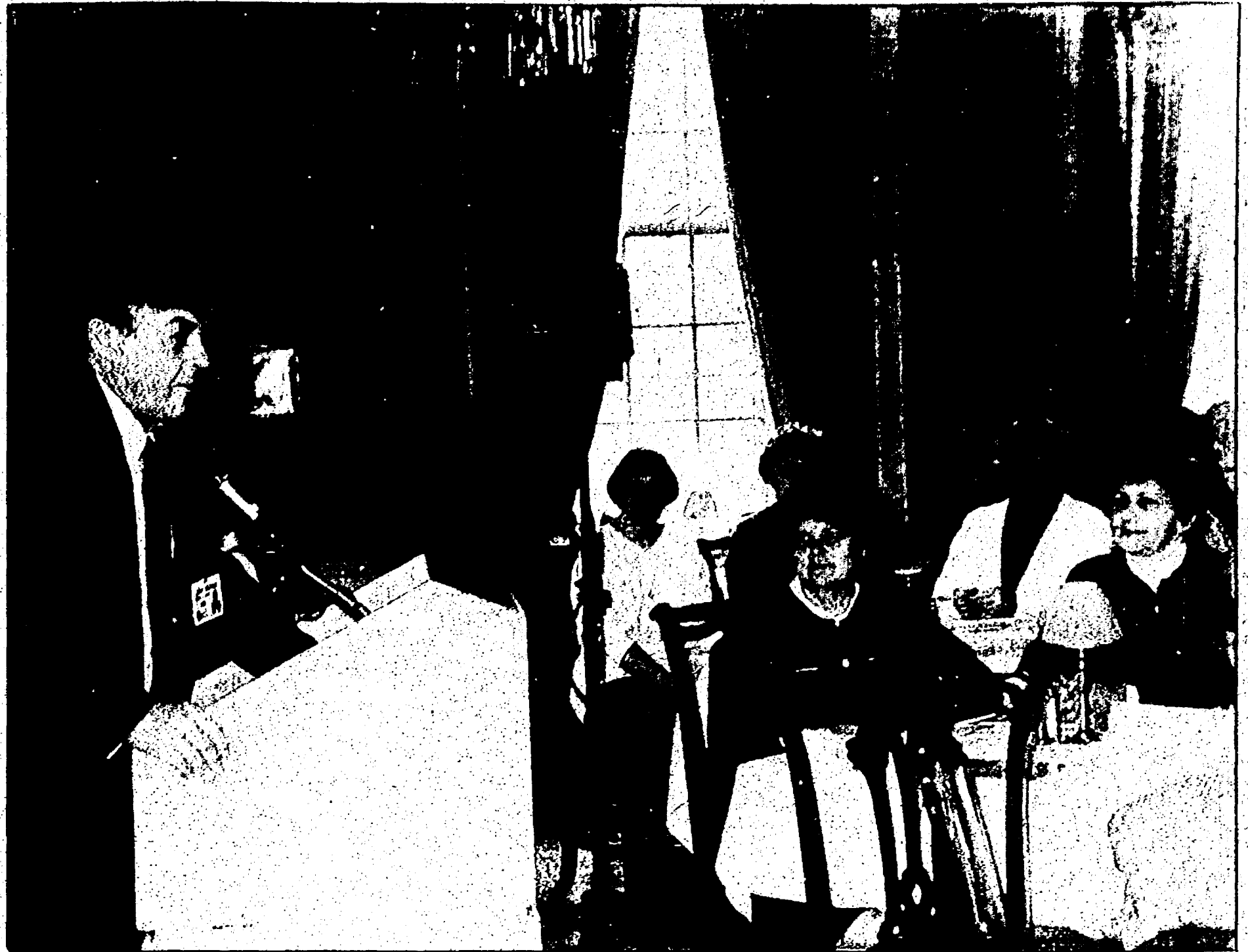
He said the key is to find ways to cope with stress.

"You must prioritize your time. First, do the essentials. Second, delegate important things. Third, ignore the trivial matters."

Women usually don't take time for themselves, he said.

Conference co-chairs Peggy Campbell and Linda Padgett, both active in the Oakwood Guild, said the annual conference is intended to educate women on health issues.

They said the menopause topic was the theme of the Oakwood system's first conference five

years ago. Other topics were cardiology, cancer and geriatrics.

When the conferences were initially planned, women's health issues were viewed as "a series of crises," they said.

"Now, it should be seen as a series of challenges and opportunities."

One of the few men at the conference, Dr. Gerald Henn, a retired psychologist, commented that the event is very important as a form of health education.

In urging men and women both to learn more about health issues, Henn said "education has no boundaries."

Accreditation team visits

Improved student responsibility, increased exposure to technology and improved standardized test scores are a few of the improvements that have taken place at Wayne Memorial High School in the past five years.

Chris Bak, co-chair of the school's steering committee, said Wayne Memorial recently hosted its final team visit by an outside accreditation peer review team. It was part of the school's school improvement process as a member of the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools.

The team reviewed the school's accomplishments in targeted areas including: technology, self-esteem, communication, sense of responsibility and participation.

Bak said success was achieved, and now the school has the opportunity to share this with the external team. Additional successful improvements include students being provided with student planners and the staff inservice in their use.

Mastery instruction training was conducted for teachers and this process has occurred in many classes and in-school suspensions for non-violent or illegal offenses, Bak said.

■ The team reviewed the school's accomplishments in targeted areas including: technology, self-esteem, communication, sense of responsibility and participation.

Tutoring program was instituted. The grade point average of student athletes has increased and so has the school's standardized test scores.

Steering committee chairs Bak and Karen Palling, as well as the balance of the faculty and staff working as target area committees, implemented a series of interventions and strategies to improve student performance in the five target areas.

The committees showed the visiting team their successes, Bak said. "The NCA process has enhanced the academic commitment and educational atmosphere at Wayne Memorial. We are very proud of all we have accomplished."

Wayne Memorial has been accredited since 1927.

Five years ago, the staff elected a more demanding evaluation model to maximize learning for all students, Bak said.

This model is different from traditional accreditation. The school commits itself to a plan concentrating on student performance improvement in selected areas. It helps schools document the effectiveness of their programs.

A team of educators, chaired by Phillip Cusick, Department of Educational Administration at Michigan State University, has visited the school several times over the last five years to evaluate Wayne's success.

Wayne will have completed the eight-phase process when reviewed by the Michigan NCA State Committee in early March and then by a central reviewing committee at NCA's Annual Meeting, March 24-27, in Chicago.

If approved, it will be awarded the highest school improvement honor by the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools.

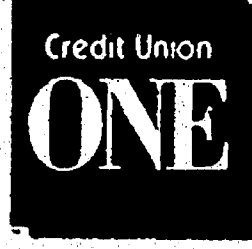

State nixes new I-275 exit

Michigan Department of Transportation officials say a new interchange at Cherry Hill and I-275 isn't a wise move.

The new interchange, hoped for by officials in neighboring Canton Township, could have eased traffic pains for Westland drivers who live in the south half of the city.

"In many areas the freeway carries more than 100,000 vehicles. Adding an additional access will cause the freeway to break down," said Tom Doyle, MDOT planner. "The problem is that the local roads can't disperse the traffic."

Canton Township officials were informed by letter of MDOT's decision that an interchange at Cherry Hill is not feasible. The decision came following a review, as requested by Canton Township officials.

"We have not been planning as though we were going to get an additional interchange," said Tom Casari, Canton Township engineer.

But the belief among township officials is that the additional interchange would have provided another east-west corridor, similar to Ford Road, to disperse some of the traffic entering and leaving burgeoning Canton. East of the Canton boundary, Cherry Hill Road is five lanes.

"We've been talking with them a couple of years," Casari said, referring to MDOT officials, adding

he doesn't know if it is possible to appeal the recent decision.

In a letter to the township, Louis Lambert, deputy director, bureau of transportation planning, said the interchange is not feasible for a number of reasons, including physical and financial constraints at the location, as well as existing grades and curves in the area.

At Cherry Hill and I-275, residential property, such as an apartment complex, stands in the way, as does the township-owned Fellows Creek Golf Club and associated wetlands in the northwest and southwest corners.

But Casari said township officials believe entrance and exit ramps could be built on the northeast and northwest corners of Cherry Hill and I-275. "The apartments aren't a problem," Casari added.

But MDOT officials also refer to the nearby rest area. "The proximity of the northbound rest area located a half-mile south of Cherry Hill would create potential operational problems related to insufficient weaving areas between ramps," according to the letter.

MDOT officials also maintain that it is not possible to build the type of ramp now required under state and federal requirements to supply all traffic movements. Partial interchanges are no longer acceptable.

When built, I-275 was designed

as a rural freeway for long-distance speeds. With interchanges at Ford Road and Michigan Avenue, a Cherry Hill exit would interfere with the flow of freeway traffic, Doyle said.

"It would encourage shorter trips," he said, adding that the shorter trips increase traffic volumes and hurt the freeway's operation.

"This simply means that it is not prudent from a traffic operations, safety, ethical or financial posture to create a new problem where one does not exist," Lambert said in his letter to the township.

With the design for a rural freeway, generally there are three to six miles between interchanges. "There's no problem with distance here. But what's happening at Ford Road (with traffic backing up into the freeway), it would cause a problem further down (with a Cherry Hill exit)," Doyle said.

Problems Canton is experiencing with traffic are not solved by an additional interchange as much as would be by improvements to the local road system, Doyle said.

"I think the township should work closely with Wayne County to realize the needs," Doyle said.

In 1995, Canton residents narrowly defeated a 15-year \$12 million bond issue for money to help make road improvements in partnership with Wayne County. Minimal money was set aside in 1996 by the township board for road improvements.

Township officials also were recently informed that only one of four projects planned by Wayne County in Canton is going forward this year. Federal cuts and Gov. John Engler's redistribution of road money have delayed the projects.

The only one planned to go forward is the realignment of Belleville and Canton Center roads. The other projects included the controversial extension of Morton Taylor, Warren to Ford, as well as the widening of Canton Center Road, Cherry to Ford, and Ford to Warren.

Local man found dead in Pontiac

Pontiac police are continuing their investigation of the death of a Westland man whose body was found in their city Friday, Feb. 16.

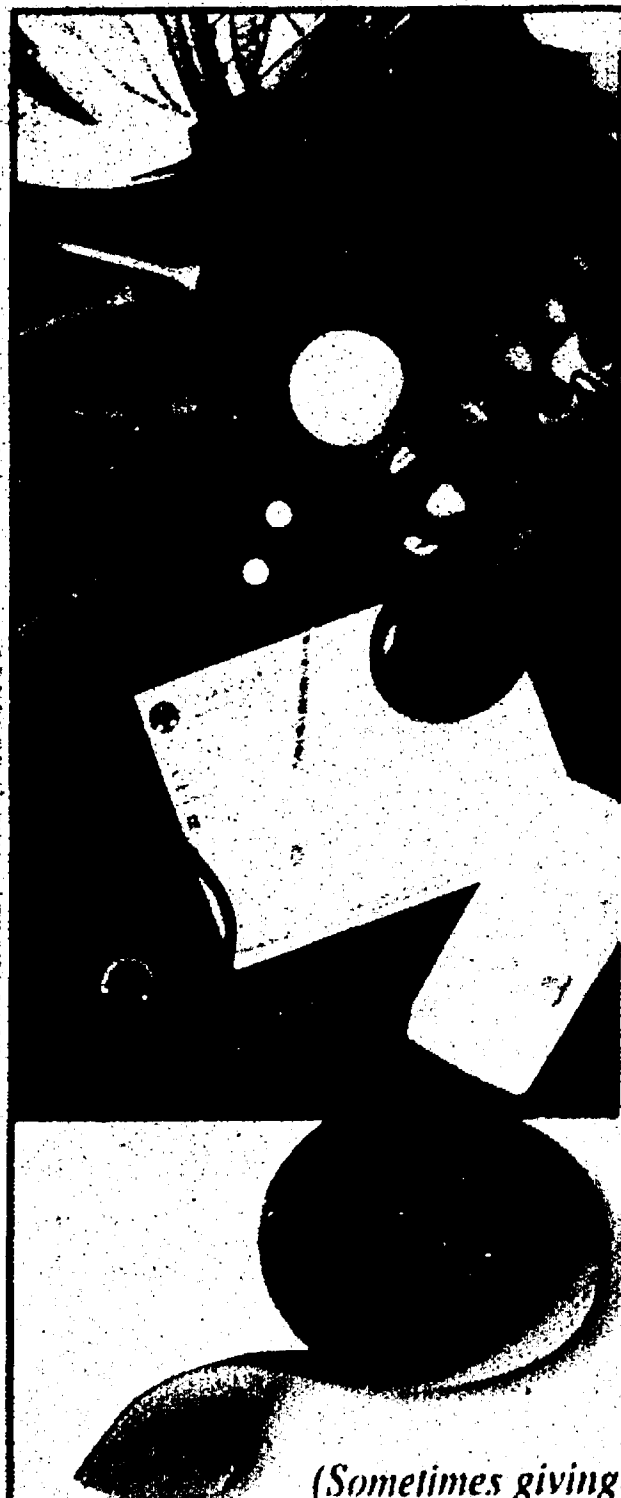
Middleton Lane Wilson, 39, was found with a gunshot wound to the head in the city's southeast corner, Pontiac police said.

A police spokesman told the Observer Friday that his investigation is still in the "preliminary

stages and that the department hasn't finished talking to Wilson's relatives.

Duggan a eyes cleaner Rouge River by 1998

Michael Duggan is a big fan of paddleboats.

He likes the idea of having them on the Rouge River.

Duggan, deputy Wayne County executive, who's taken on cleaning up the Rouge River and making it accessible to residents, wants to help people create memories. He shared his plans with members of the Rouge Remedial Action Plan Advisory Council at the council's meeting Wednesday.

Since the Rouge was polluted and Hines Park had gained a reputation for drugs, bikers and crime by the time he was growing up in Livonia in the late 1960s and early '70s, he wants people to be able to make memories like those of Russa Gronewelt, director of public services for the county. Gronewelt grew up in Livonia

about 15 years earlier than Duggan, Duggan said. His memories include canoeing on Newburgh Lake and ice skating on Wilcox Lake.

"What could we do to go back to that?" Duggan said he asked himself.

As a youth, going to Kensington Park was a family activity, but it's also a full day's activity, he said. Today, with both parents working, it hard to find time; it's easier to stick a tape in the video-cassette recorder, he said.

But lately with canoeing on parts of the Rouge, which started last year and ice skating on Wilcox and Newburgh lakes, which started this year, Duggan said it's been more convenient to take his kids out.

"Someday my kids will remember skating and canoeing with dad. I guarantee if we had just sat

down and watched TV we wouldn't have those memories," he said.

He said he has spent hours talking with James Murray, director of the county's Department of Environment, about recreational opportunities on the Rouge.

"There's something about this Rouge project, and you already know this, it's magical," he said.

He described an experience of years ago when he was asked to talk to citizens in Wyandotte concerned about the proposed construction of a retention basin. When he asked people what the

creek was like, they described it as smelly, flowing with sewage.

After asking if people would rather have the sewage removed and kept in the retention basin, he realized that people didn't understand what the basin would do, he said.

Now he's asking again what the county can do to make the public understand, to "show people that they're getting value for their money," he said.

Duggan described work done on the Rouge in Hines Park as a cooperative effort with Department of Public Works workers volun-

teering to clear log jams from the river.

Among plans to improve recreational facilities in Hines Park is dredging Newburgh Lake. A PCB site nearby still needs to be cleaned up, and the Department of Environmental Quality will start the cleanup this spring, he said.

Duggan said the potential for drowning in the lake because of the undertow near the dam has caused him concern. "We brought in the best dam engineers we could find," Duggan said to a round of laughter at the pun.

The result is that the slope of the dam will be changed to reduce undertow, he said.

"If we're going to bring water activities to Newburgh Lake, we have to make sure it's safe," he said.

He predicted that by 1998, it will be safe to eat fish caught in the Rouge. He also said he hopes to bring a beach back to a local

lake. Joan Lintelman, a member of the council, raised concerns that until sewage flowing into the Rouge is stopped, the water isn't safe even for canoeing because of the potential of people falling into the water.

"We're really concerned because we have met with people from the health department. We not always positive that it's real good for the public," she said.

Water is tested at the canoe launch sites, Duggan said. Only the Newburgh to Nankin area is safe, and canoe rentals won't occur when the water contamination levels are too high, Duggan said.

"We have signs that will be placed at both access sites," said Hurley Coleman, Parks director. County officials don't want people to use their own canoes, if the county is not operating the canoe sites, he said. "The signs will say why," he said. "But there are places along the river that we have no control over."

Area study to make Olympics safer

Thanks to a study headed by an orthopedic surgeon, breakaway bases will be used this summer in the Olympic Games in Atlanta, Ga.

"I was very happy and very pleased," said Dr. David Janda, upon hearing from Olympic organizers that the safer bases were being chosen. He is director of the Institute for Preventative Sports Medicine in Ann Arbor.

"They had seen our studies. It gives it worldwide exposure," said Janda, a Plymouth resident.

Breakaway bases are among several sports equipment items studied in recent years by the institute. Janda said the goal is not to interfere with the way sports are played, but to make them safer.

The studies show that use of breakaway bases reduced sliding-

into-base injuries by 96-98 percent for recreational players in Ann Arbor from 1988-91. A study of the bases used at the collegiate level showed an 80 percent drop in injuries, Janda said.

Stationary bases are bolted to a concrete-mounted post. The breakaway base, developed by Roger Hall of Pennsylvania, "looks just like a stationary base," Janda said. The base has suction cups underneath which attach to a stationary rubber mat flush with ground level. There are different models, from youth to adult, which require varying degrees of force to pop them off the base, Janda said.

Should the base be knocked off by a runner rounding second base, the square underneath can serve as the base for another runner rounding the bases.

"It's still in the ground, it just

has a low profile," Janda said.

To those who say the base popping off means delays, Janda responds, "If you want to hold up the game, wait for an ambulance to come take the person off the field."

Janda said a government study has concluded use of the breakaway base could prevent 1.7 million injuries a year and save more than \$2 billion in health care costs. Still, most leagues won't try the bases.

"If you can convince one mom or dad on the PTA board, that's the greatest ally you can have, they will demand to get it done," Janda said. "We've tried a number of different routes, we've tried to get to the powers that be and the insurance industry. They feel they'll do it when it's demanded that they'll do it."

"We have monitored over 5,000 games, the bottom line is a ration-

ale for not using it non-existent," Janda said. "It's easily implemented, it reduces injuries and costs significantly and it does not hurt enjoyment of the game."

Janda is scheduled to speak on sports injury prevention to an International Olympic Committee group this summer. He will also address the Mid-American Sports Medicine Symposium at the Ritz-Carlton Hotel in Dearborn March 28-30.

The Institute for Preventative Sports Medicine has also scheduled a program at the symposium to raise money for research. Tickets are \$10 and offered at a raffle will be sports equipment autographed by members of Detroit's professional sports teams, and other professional athletes.

Mall readies opening

■ Somerset North is six months away from a grand opening and tenants are announcing their leases. Here's an update, plus where to go for the jobs!

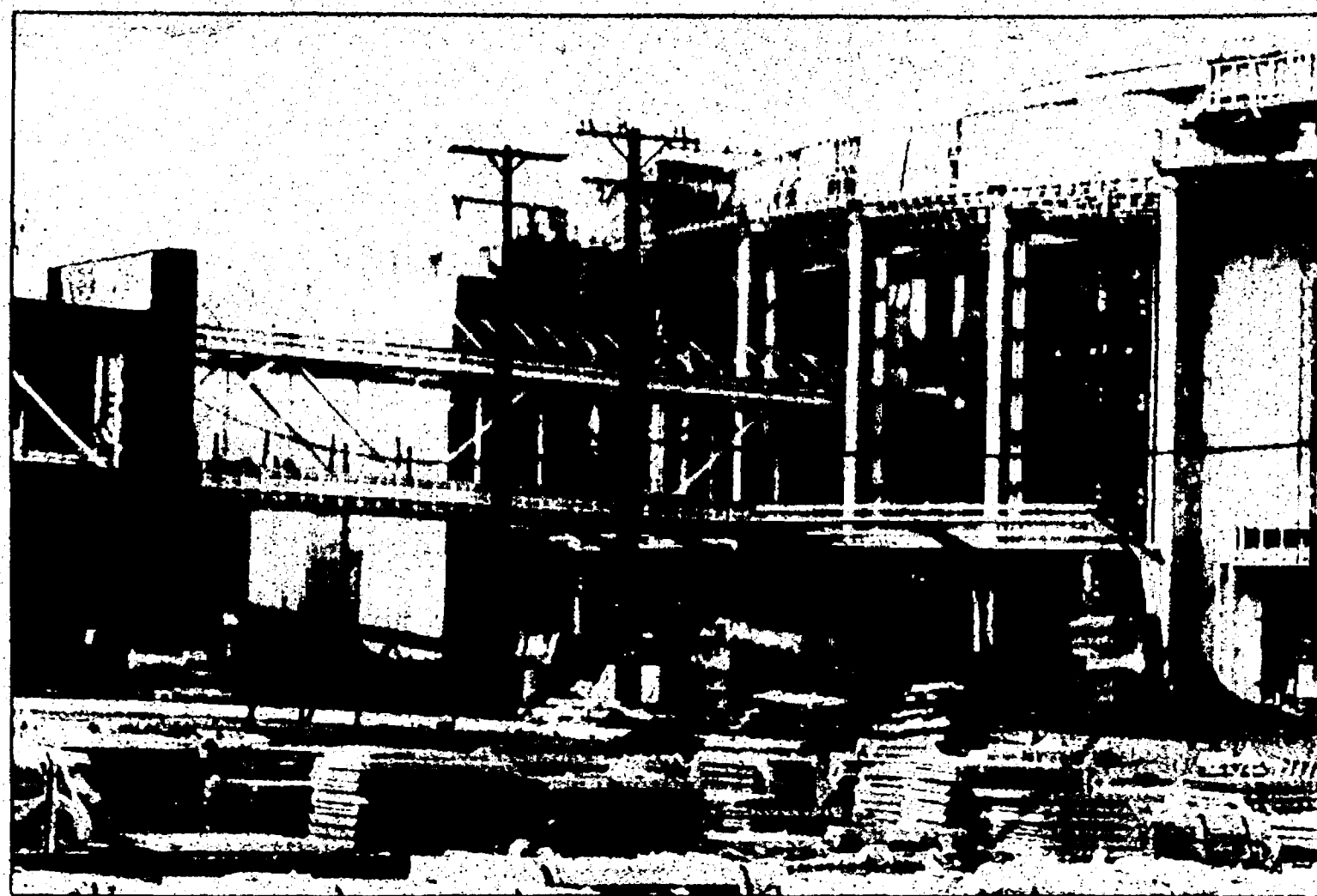

Shopping fever is spreading along Big Beaver at Coolidge in Troy and it's hard to drive by the massive mall under construction without catching it.

When the \$200-million Somerset North opens Aug. 16, it will add 3,500 full- and part-time jobs to the area, bring dozens of new dining and retailing adventures to town, and generate close to \$2 million in property taxes for the Troy Downtown Development Authority.

In 1994, the Somerset Collection across the street paid \$1,229,809 in property taxes which were earmarked for the Troy DDA and road improvements. The Oakland Mall, the city's other major retail center, paid \$1,800,608 in property taxes last year, shared by the schools, Oakland Community College and the city.

"The opening of Somerset North is a celebration for all because it puts Detroit on the big retail map," said Saks Fifth Avenue spokeswoman Cheryl Hall. "Detroit will become a shopping mecca. People used to leave town to shop at stores like Bendel's

and Nordstrom. Now they'll stay here and we'll draw shoppers from other cities."

The most eagerly anticipated mall attraction is the moving skywalk elevated 16-feet above Big Beaver that will transport shoppers between the Somerset Collection and Somerset North in three minutes. Ground-breaking took place in October 1994.

Throughout the summer before the Aug. 16 grand opening at Somerset North, shoppers will see an increase of promotions and special events at

Readers are hungry for more Crock-pot recipes

February has been full of frigid temperatures and occasional bouts with snow. Many of you have been cooking (and eating) up a storm.

This month's calls were heavily in favor of two columns that appeared in January. The first, a column on whatever happened to the "good old mom & pop" type restaurants of yesteryear prompted many calls from readers who told me about their favorite local restaurants.

Doris Dennison of Livonia called with kudos for a place called Don's of Traverse City at Grand River and Wixom Roads in Wixom, and Bode's in Plymouth. Doris said the milk shakes and burgers at Don's, and the corned beef hash at Bode's, always brings back memories.

An anonymous caller said there's still a "Clock" restaurant in Lapeer, and Jan McCellan of Livonia called and recommended Thomas' on Plymouth Road in Livonia. The response was so great, I'm working on a story that will highlight local old-fashioned menus sometime in March.

Your comments also came through loud and clear about my story on "cleaning your dinner plate," with many readers relating to my early life experiences of having to eat everything on your plate.

Finally, there must be some Crock-Pot lovers still out there because your numerous responses will prompt another slow cooker column in the future. Here's a little something to hold you over till then!

PORK LOIN WITH DIJON MUSTARD AND WALNUTS

- 1 (3.4 pound) boneless pork loin
- 1/4 cup Dijon mustard
- 2 tablespoons olive oil
- 1 onion, chopped
- 2 cloves garlic, chopped
- 1/2 teaspoon rosemary
- 3 cups apple juice
- 1/4 cup balsamic vinegar
- 1/2 cup walnuts, chopped

In a heavy skillet, brown pork loin in olive oil until golden on 2 sides. Brush generously with Dijon mustard and place in a crock pot.

Saute onion and garlic in pan that the loin was browned in until tender, about 3-4 minutes. Add 1/2 cup apple juice to pan and scrape bottom to remove bits. Add remaining apple juice and bring to a boil. Remove from heat and stir in balsamic vinegar and rosemary. Pour this mixture over the pork loin in a Crock-Pot and cook on high for 4-6 hours, depending on size of loin or until thermometer reaches 180 degrees. Serves 6.

Doris Allen of Livonia called a few weeks back and commented on how much she loves eating the scalloped potatoes at Rocky's in Northville. Well Doris, here's the real thing, compliments of Chef Chuck Rachwitz.

SCALLOPED POTATOES

- 6 medium size whole Idaho potatoes, peeled
- 3/4 cup white onions, sliced thin, julienne cut
- 2 cloves garlic, chopped fine
- 1 quart heavy whipping cream
- 1 1/2 teaspoons salt
- 1 1/2 tablespoons ground black pepper

Preheat oven to 375 degrees F. Slice the peeled potatoes very thin (like a potato chip). Use a 10-inch casserole dish and mix the potatoes, onions, garlic, salt and pepper together. Place in the casserole dish. Pour heavy cream over all. Cover with foil and bake at 375 degrees F. for 1 hour. Remove foil and brown for 15 minutes. Serve immediately. Serves 6.

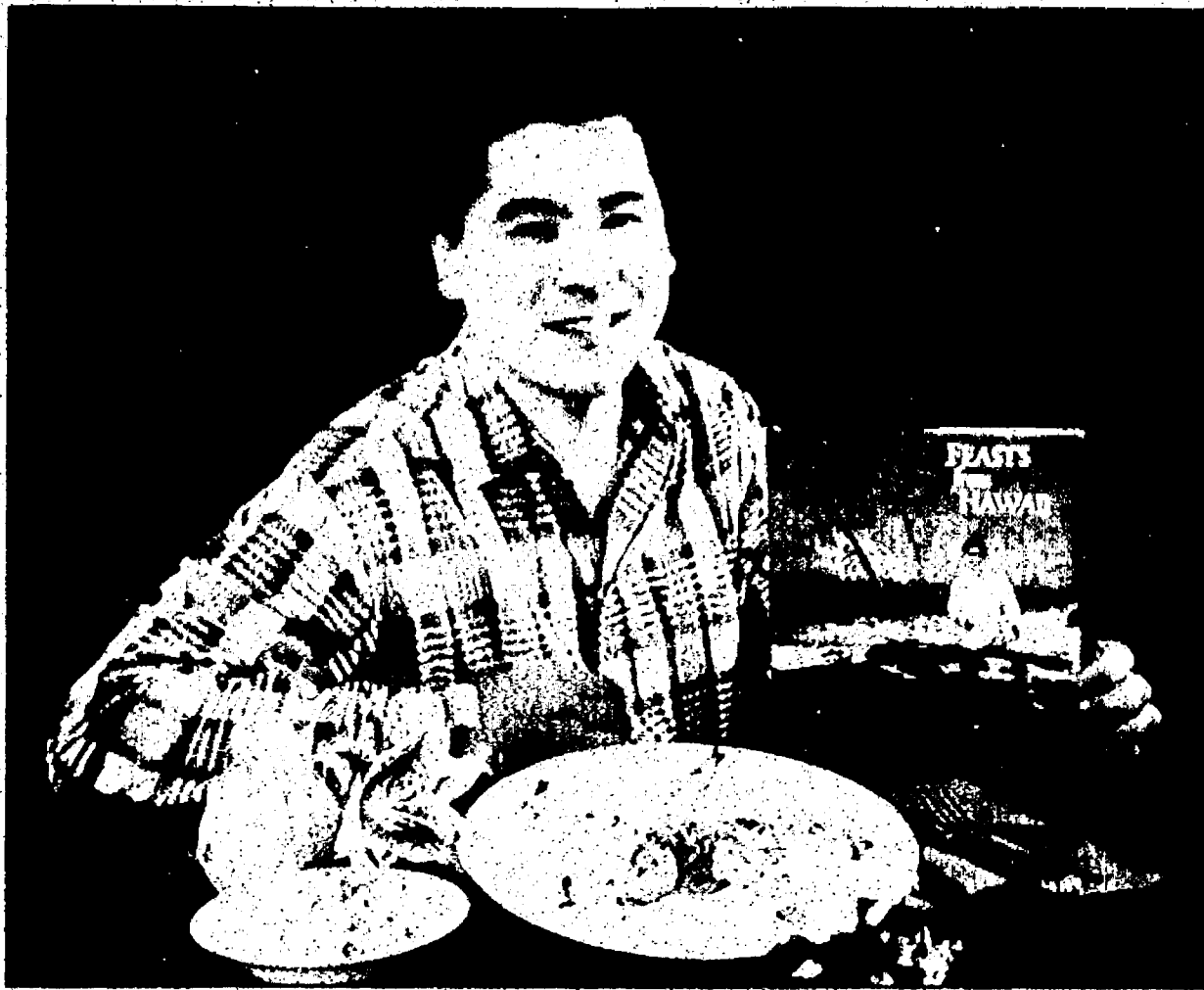

FEASTS FROM HAWAII

Warm, sunny Hawaii sounds good right now - but how many of us can afford the time or expense?

Chef and restaurateur Roy Yamaguchi brings "Feasts from Hawaii" home with his newly published cookbook - "Roy's Feasts from Hawaii" (Ten Speed Press, 1995, \$27.95). The book is co-authored with John Harrison.

Yamaguchi who is known for combining his classic French training with Asian spices and ingredients, recently visited the Observer offices in Livonia on a cold winter day to talk about Hawaii, and his new book, which is both a cookbook and travelogue of recipes, photographs, and stories of local growers, fish farms, and families.

"Cooking should come from your heart," he said. "To me, my parents cooking was the best because they made it out of love. I remember my mother watching me eat, and smile because I ate the food she made. Recipes in books are ideas people have. This is my inspiration."

Yamaguchi owns eight award-winning restaurants - Roy's in Honolulu; Roy's Kahana Bar and Grill and Roy's Nicolina on Maui; Roy's Poipu Bar and Grill on Kauai; Roy's Pebble Beach in the Inn at the Spanish Bay in California; Roy's in Tokyo, and Roy's on Guam in the Hilton Hotel, and is opening another one in Bangkok. Yet, "I start each day as if I have to prove myself all over again," he said.

Five minutes from his home in Honolulu's Hawaii Kai district - where he settled with his wife Janne and two children, Yamaguchi, 37, can be found laboring seven nights a week in the open kitchen of his first Roy's Restaurant.

"Cooking is my life," he said. "When I'm in the kitchen and I look out the window, I can't help but think that I must be one of the luckiest people in the world. It's very rewarding. In the restaurant you create a dish, serve it, and get immediate reaction, and see the outcome of what you made."

In "Feasts from Hawaii" Yamaguchi showcases some of the best Hawaii has to offer. He started the project in 1991, and finished in 1995. "My vision of food comes with what I can find in Hawaii," he said. "But this is 1996, and you basically get any ingredient you want. It's a question of how much you're into it. I encourage people to experiment with my recipes. They're not set in stone."

For example, you can substitute orange juice concentrate for passion fruit syrup.

"Roy's Feasts from Hawaii" offers more than 150 new and old favorites from Roy's restaurants. The 10 chapters include appetizers, soups, salads, pastas and Imu Pizzas, fish and shellfish, meat and poultry, side dishes and salsas, brunch, desserts and basic recipes.

Beautiful color photographs illustrate each recipe. Readers will learn that Hawaii has the highest per capita watermelon consumption of any state in the country, and meet Larry Jeffs who grows watermelons at his 1,600 acre farm on Molokai. They'll also visit the Honolulu fish auction (one of four in the U.S.) and learn about the island's other agricultural products including Kona coffee, Maui onions, and Macadamia nuts.

Yamaguchi, whose name has become synonymous with Hawaiian cuisine, first studied cooking in a high school home economics class "because I liked the odds of being the only boy in class," he said. "Even as a boy I loved to cook,

whether it was fried Portuguese sausage and eggs, or a Thanksgiving dinner - which I once prepared for my family growing up in the middle of Tokyo, Japan."

After completing high school, Yamaguchi enrolled in the Culinary Institute of America. After graduating in 1976 he worked in some of the finest kitchens in the Los Angeles area including L'Escoffier, L'Ermitage, and Michaels.

In 1984 he formed a partnership to create his own restaurant, 385 North in West Hollywood where his "Euro-Asian" style came into bloom.

In 1988 he moved to the original home of his father and grandparents - the Hawaiian Islands and opened the first "Roy's" in 1988. "My grandfather owned a restaurant and my father worked there," he said. "My dad was an excellent cook and prepared most of our family meals. We rarely ate out."

Cooking is a passion Yamaguchi enjoys sharing with others. He just began filming the third year of of Hawaii Public Television series, "Hawaii Cooks with Roy Yamaguchi." The first season, which debuted in Hawaii in the fall of 1993, is still being shown on more than 141 stations in 41 other states.

"I like to do it because it showcases Hawaii," he said.

As for the future, Yamaguchi is still experimenting, and innovating. "As I open restaurants throughout Asia I learn new things he said. I believe my cookbook is one of the best cookbooks about Hawaii. The recipes are innovative, and a lot of the dishes are favorites of our customers. You can really see Hawaii as you look at the book and read the stories.

 - 1 can (14 1/2 ounces) Italian style diced tomatoes
 - 1/2 cup (2 ounces) small soup pasta, such as tiny bowties, ditalini, or shells, uncooked
 - 8 ounces (1/2 of a 10 ounce bag) fresh spinach leaves, coarsely chopped (3 1/2 cups, packed)
 - 1/4 cup shredded Parmesan cheese
- Heat oven to 425 degrees F. Combine first seven ingredients in a bowl. Mix thoroughly. Shape into 1 1/4 inch meatballs. Place in shallow baking pan sprayed with non-stick cooking spray. Bake 10 minutes. Meanwhile, in large saucepan, combine broth and tomatoes. Cover, bring to a boil. Stir in pasta. Cover and simmer 5 minutes. Add meatballs. Simmer uncovered 5 minutes longer or until pasta is tender. Stir in spinach. Remove from heat. Let stand 2 to 3 minutes. Serve sprinkled with Parmesan cheese. Serves 6.

BANANA-MACADAMIA NUT BREAD

- 1/2 cup unsalted butter, at room temperature
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup brown sugar
- 1 pound overripe bananas, peeled and mashed (about 1 1/2 cups)
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- 2 teaspoons baking soda
- 3 1/2 cups flour
- 2 eggs
- 1/2 cup water
- 1/2 cup chopped macadamia nuts, (reserve 2 tablespoons for the topping)
- 1/4 cup raisins (optional)
- 1/4 cup shredded coconut (optional)

Preheat the oven to 350 degrees F. Grease and flour a 9-inch round cake pan or a loaf pan.

In the bowl of an electric mixer, cream together the butter and sugars until smooth. Add the bananas and beat for 1 minute. Sift the bak-

ing powder and baking soda into the flour, and stir into the banana-butter mixture. Add the eggs and the water, and beat for 1 minute. Stir in the nuts, and the raisins and coconut, if desired.

Pour the batter into the prepared pan and sprinkle with the reserved nuts. Bake on the middle rack of the oven for 35-45 minutes, or until a toothpick inserted in the middle comes out clean. Remove from the oven and let cool on a wire rack. Yield 1 loaf.

KAHUKA SHRIMP ON A STICK WITH WASABI COCKTAIL SAUCE AND PAPAYA-MINT RELISH

- 1 cup Papaya-Mint Relish (recipe follows)
- 1 pound extra-large shrimp (about 16 to 20), peeled and deveined
- Salt and freshly ground pepper to taste
- 1/4 cup peanut oil
- Wasabi Cocktail Sauce:
- 2 tablespoons powdered wasabi
- 2 tablespoons water
- 1/4 cup ketchup
- 2 tablespoons prepared horseradish

Prepare the Papaya-Mint Relish and set aside.

Prepare the grill and soak 16 to 20 short bamboo or wooden skewers in water. Skewer the shrimp, tail end first, and slide the shrimp down the skewers, with the head end pointed toward the pointed end of the skewer. Season with salt and pepper, coat with the peanut oil, and keep refrigerated.

To prepare the sauce, combine the wasabi powder with the water to form a paste. Cover and let stand for 15 minutes. Combine the ketchup and horseradish in a separate dish and add the wasabi paste, and mix well.

Sear the shrimp on the grill for about 1 minute per side, or until cooked through. Place 2 tablespoons of cocktail sauce in each serving bowl and arrange 4 or 5 skewers in each bowl. Serve with the Papaya-Mint Relish on the side. Serves 4.

PAPAYA-MINT RELISH

- 1 large ripe papaya, peeled and seeded, and diced
- 1 tablespoon julienned fresh mint leaves
- 1 tablespoon julienned fresh cilantro
- 1 tablespoon seeded and minced jalapeno
- 1 to 2 teaspoons seeded and diced red bell pepper
- 1 teaspoon finely minced Maui (or sweet) onion
- Juice of 1 lime
- Salt and freshly ground pepper to taste

Thoroughly combine all ingredients in a mixing bowl. Refrigerate for 1 hour. Makes about 1 cup.

SEARED AHI WITH PASSION-FRUIT SHRIMP SALSA

- Passion-Fruit Shrimp Salsa (recipe follows)
- 4 ahi tuna steaks, about 7 ounces each
- 3 tablespoons peanut oil
- Salt and freshly ground pepper to taste

Prepare the salsa and set aside. Coat the ahi steaks with salt and pepper. Heat a dry cast-iron skillet and sear the ahi over high heat for about 15 to 20 seconds each side for rare (about 1 minute each side for medium-rare). Place the steaks on serving plates and spoon the salsa over the tuna, letting the juices from the salsa run onto the plates. Serves 4.

PASSION FRUIT-SHRIMP SALSA

- 1 ripe passion fruit
- 4 or 5 extra-large shrimp (about 4 ounces), peeled, deveined, and diced
- 2 teaspoons olive oil
- 1/4 cup finely minced Maui onion (can substitute OSO Sweet or other sweet onion)
- 1/2 cup peeled, seeded, and finely diced tomatoes
- 2 tablespoons finely sliced scallions
- 1 tablespoon finely minced fresh cilantro
- 1 teaspoon Tabasco sauce
- Salt and freshly ground pepper to taste

Scoop out the pulp from the passion fruit and press through a fine sieve. Reserve the juice (about 1 tablespoon).

Coat the shrimp in the olive oil and sear in a skillet over high heat until cooked through. Transfer to a stainless steel mixing bowl, add the passion fruit juice and the remaining ingredients, and toss well to combine. Makes about 1 cup.

Make it a muffin morning

Muffins are the perfect breakfast bread for busy mornings because you can bake a batch on the weekend and tuck them into the freezer. Thirty seconds in the microwave oven, and you're out the door with a warm homemade muffin in hand.

Here's a recipe from Quaker Oats.

BANANA-ORANGE OATMEAL MUFFINS

- 1 1/2 cups oatmeal quick or old-fashioned, uncooked
- 1 cup all-purpose flour
- 1/2 cup firmly packed brown sugar

- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon baking soda
- 1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1/4 teaspoon salt (optional)
- 1/2 cup chopped dates or raisins
- 1 carton (8 ounces) plain non-fat yogurt
- 1/4 cup mashed ripe banana (about two medium)
- 2 egg whites or 1 egg, lightly beaten
- 2 tablespoons vegetable oil
- 1 1/2 teaspoons grated orange peel

Heat oven to 400 degrees F. Line 12 medium muffin cups with paper

baking cups or spray bottoms only with non-stick cooking spray. Combine dry ingredients including dates; mix well.

Add combined yogurt, banana, egg whites, oil and orange peel; mix until dry ingredients are moistened. Fill muffin cups almost full. Sprinkle with additional oats, if desired.

Bake 20-22 minutes or until golden brown. Makes 12.

To freeze: Wrap muffins securely in foil or place in freezer bag; label and freeze.

To reheat: Place one muffin on microwave-safe plate. Microwave at High about 30 seconds.

Try these tips for better braising

Here are some tips for better braising from the Michigan Beef Industry Commission.

Browning the beef first gives the roast its rich color and flavor, but resist the temptation to turn up the heat and brown it quickly. The key is to brown the meat slowly and evenly.

Use just a small amount of liquid, usually no more than 1 1/2 to 1 3/4 cups.

Be sure to cover the pan tightly

and keep it covered, so the steam can gently cook the meat until tender. Braising does take time, but very little attention. There's no need to stir or even lift the cover while the beef cooks.

Remember to simmer; do not let the liquid boil or the meat will toughen. When properly simmering, bubbles will form slowly and break apart just below the surface. To simmer, cook over low heat on top of the range or in the

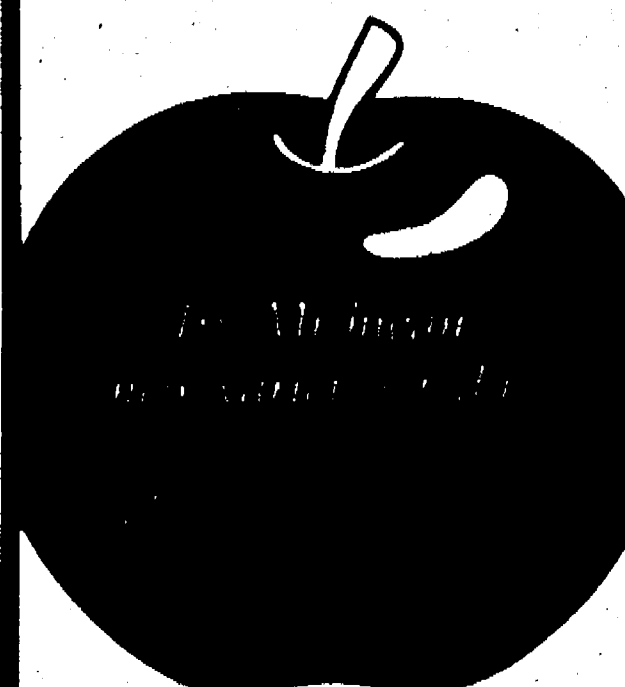
oven at 300 to 325 degrees F.

The meat is done when it's fork tender. Insert a fork toward the end of the cooking time; if it goes in easily, the roast is ready to serve.

Flavor it your way! The cooking liquid can be your choice of water, broth, fruit or vegetable juice, wine, prepared sauce or a combination of these.

Beth from Canton called after reading a recipe in Taste for a low-fat chocolate cake calling for Dutch processed cocoa.

She wanted to know what it is, and where she could get some. Dutch processed cocoa is alkalinized to make the cocoa less bitter and much darker in color. It's available at Kitchen Glamour stores and at cake decorating

shops. It also might be available at some of the better upscale grocery stores.

Speaking of great cake decorating shops, check out the Baker's Acre in Wayne on Michigan Avenue (just east of Wayne Road) for a great selection of cake decorating supplies and real friendly service. (313) 722-4110.

Ida Baxter of Southfield called hoping I might shed a little light on making some homemade chicken stock. Well Ida, if you have the time, it's well worth it.

CHICKEN STOCK

- 1 old stewing hen, about 4-5 pounds
- 2 gallons fresh cold water
- ½ bunch celery, with leaves, chopped
- ½ pound carrots, unpeeled, chopped
- 3 large onions, quartered; with skin left on
- 2 cloves garlic
- 7-9 whole peppercorns
- 2 bay leaves

A handful of fresh parsley
Combine all ingredients in the largest pot you can find. Bring to a boil. Reduce heat to lowest setting and simmer, uncovered, for 8 hours, skimming foam off the top if necessary.

To make a heartier stock, cook for 10 hours. Strain through a colander. Place strained stock in a refrigerator or cover and chill outside on a cold day until the fat rises to the top. Skim off fat and remove. Heat broth until barely warm.

Strain through a fine sieve or through 3-4 layers of cheesecloth to remove any bits of sediment. Keep refrigerated until ready to use. Makes about 4 quarts.

Diane Sands of Farmington called requesting a recipe she and a friend enjoyed for Friendship Tea. Well Diane, here's a recipe from days gone by when I had my own cooking shop in downtown Plymouth. We ran a class with one of the area's best home economists, Loreta Mirro, now of Birmingham, who originally gave me this recipe.

FRIENDSHIP TEA

- 1 cup Tang
 - ¼ cup instant tea (plain)
 - 1 (3 ounce) package instant dry lemonade mix
 - 1 cup sugar
 - 1 teaspoon cinnamon
 - ½ teaspoon cloves
- Combine all ingredients together and store in an airtight container. To make one cup, place one tablespoon of the mix in a cup of boiling water and stir until dissolved. Great hot or iced.

Winter fillings make shortcake a year-round favorite

Most folks think about enjoying shortcake only in the summer. What a shame to relegate such a treat to one short season. By taking advantage of winter fruits like pears, apples, cranberries and dried apricots, shortcake can be a winter highlight.

"Many people call any kind of cake topped with fruit and whipped cream shortcake," said Linda Carman, Martha White baking expert. "However, in the South, traditional shortcake is simply a dressed-up biscuit. It's buttery, sweet and enriched with an egg. And shortcake, which is really just fruit and biscuits, can be served anytime, not just for dessert. They make a festive statement for breakfast, brunch, late lunch or light supper."

Here are some recipes to try.

RICH BISCUIT SHORTCAKES

- 2 cups sifted Martha White Self-Rising Flour
 - 3 tablespoons sugar
 - ½ cup butter or margarine
 - 1 egg
 - About ½ cup milk
- Preheat oven to 450 degrees F.

Combine flour and sugar. Cut in butter until mixture resembles coarse crumbs. Beat egg in measuring cup; add enough milk to make ½ cup. Add to flour mixture and stir with a fork. Turn out onto a lightly floured board or pastry cloth; knead just until smooth. Roll dough out about ¼-inch thick and cut with floured cutter or with a knife in desired shapes. Place on lightly greased baking sheet. Bake 9 to 12 minutes. Makes 8 to 10 shortcakes.

Note: If using Martha White All Purpose Flour, sift 1 tablespoon baking powder and ¼ teaspoon salt with flour. For drop biscuit shortcakes, add 1 tablespoon additional milk to form a soft dough. Drop by spoonfuls onto baking sheet.

Tip: Sprinkle shortcakes with 2 tablespoons sliced almonds before baking, if desired.

APRICOT CREAM CHEESE SHORTCAKE

- 1 package (6 ounces) dried apricots, snipped into bite-size pieces

- 2 cups water
- ½ cup sugar
- 2 tablespoons butter or margarine
- ½ teaspoon vanilla
- Rich Biscuit Shortcakes (prepared with Tip for almonds and Note for drop biscuits)
- Cream Cheese Filling (follows)

Combine apricots and water in medium saucepan. Bring to a boil. Reduce heat, cover and cook until apricots are tender, about 15 minutes. Stir in sugar and butter. Simmer until thickened, about 30 to 40 minutes. Cool to room temperature. Stir in vanilla. Split shortcakes; fill and top with fruit and cream cheese filling. Makes 8 servings.

Cream Cheese Filling: In small

ng bowl, combine 6 ounces cream cheese (softened), 6 tablespoons heavy cream, 2 tablespoons sugar and ½ teaspoon vanilla with a fork until smooth and creamy.

PEAR CRANBERRY SHORTCAKE

- 2 tablespoons butter or margarine

- 4 medium pears, peeled, cored and sliced
- 1 cup fresh or frozen cranberries
- ½ cup sugar
- ¼ cup orange juice
- Rich Biscuit Shortcakes
- Heavy cream

Melt butter in large skillet. Stir in pears, cranberries, sugar and orange juice. Simmer, stirring occasionally, until pears are tender and juice is thickened, about 20 to 25 minutes. Split shortcakes; fill and top with fruit mixture. Drizzle each serving with cream. Makes 8 servings.

APPLE SAUSAGE SHORTCAKE

- 1 package (10 to 12 ounces) breakfast sausage links, cut into 1-inch pieces
- 3 large Golden Delicious apples, peeled, cored and coarsely chopped
- ½ cup maple or maple-flavored syrup
- Rich Biscuit Shortcakes

- Warm maple or maple-flavored syrup, if desired

Cook sausage in large skillet until browned; drain. Stir in apples and cook until tender, about 5 minutes; keep warm. Just before serving stir

in ½ cup maple syrup. Split shortcakes; fill and top with apple sausage mixture. Serve with additional warm maple syrup. Makes 8 servings.

Here are some tips on how to cool foods safely

"Winter winds and whirling snowflakes may inspire you to cook up a large pot of homemade soup," said Sylvia Treitman, home economist for the Michigan State University Extension Service, Oakland County.

"But, improper cooling can be a potential source of food poison-

ing." An old wives tale has made many people believe that it is not a good idea to put hot food in the refrigerator until it is thoroughly cooled, for fear of it turning "sour."

This myth is confusing and dangerous! Leaving food out long-

er than two hours is a real no-no!

Here are some easy and quick ways to cool foods safely:

- Take large pot off burner when food is cooked. Stir entire contents with a large utensil frequently during first 10 minutes of cooling.

- Set large pot of cooked food in a sink or large pan of ice water to hasten cooling.
- Divide contents of pot into several smaller utensils no deeper than about two inches.
- Refrigerate the smaller utensils quickly allowing plenty of space

in the refrigerator for air circulation. If food is to be frozen divide into freezer containers and allow ample space in freezer. Food should be refrigerated promptly.

Do not leave cooked food out until it cools completely by itself. It may take many hours for a large pot of soup to cool, and by

this time it may have grown bacteria which will cause food poisoning.

Jones nets 33, Glenn advances

With 1:40 remaining in Friday's game against visiting Plymouth Salem, Westland John Glenn nursed a 79-67 lead.

The Rockets' Louis Hartwig, fresh off the bench, heaved up a three-pointer to the chagrin of Glenn coach Mike Schuette, who wanted his Rockets to take time off the clock.

With Schuette turning away to the crowd with a disgruntled look on his face, the shot swished through.

It was that kind of night for the Rockets.

Glenn's offense was in high gear as it beat Salem 88-71 and advanced to Tuesday's second round of the Western Lakes Activities Association boys

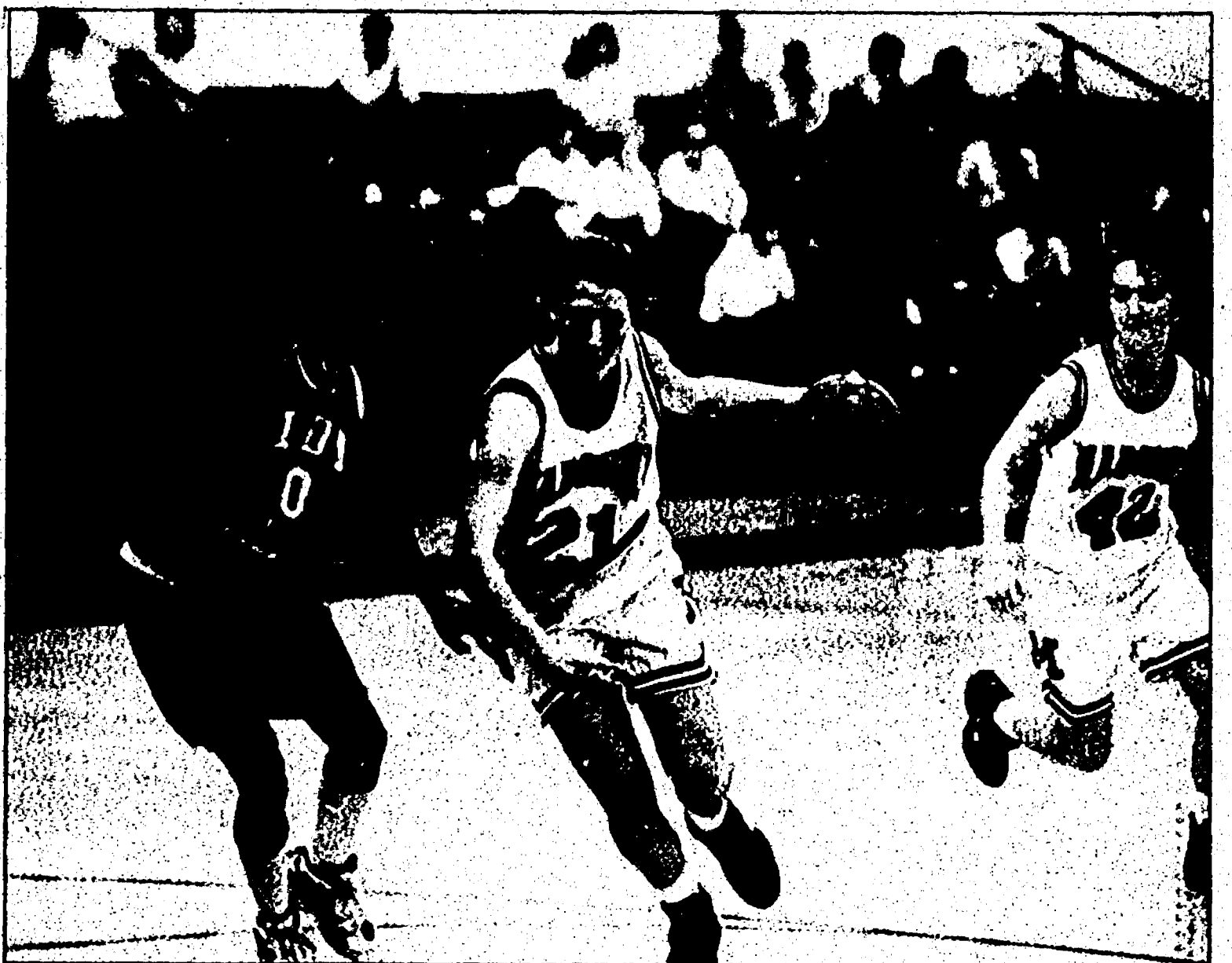

Stevenson sniper breaks record

Kyle McNeillance wasn't even born when Frank Finn set the Livonia Stevenson High School hockey single-season record for goals and total points.



McNeillance But all records are made to be broken.

Twenty years later, a new name will be entered the books.

McNeillance, a 5-foot-10, 170-pound center and right winger, enters tonight's state Class A regional tournament opener against Wyandotte with 44 goals and 42 assists for a school-record 86 points.

He also needs one more assist to catch Kevin Berger's 1995 mark of 43.

In a regular season finale Wednesday at Edgar Arena,

McNeillance finished with two goals and four assists in a 10-2 non-league victory over Jackson Lumen-Christi.

McNeillance's 44th goal of the season came on a two-on-one situation early in the second period. It was fitting that senior linemate Brian Calka, who has been McNeillance's set-up man all season, drew the assist.

"Calka is a great player, a guy with great playmaking ability," McNeillance said. "I probably wouldn't have set the record without him. We're pretty close."

McNeillance, however, had known about the Stevenson offensive marks since his freshman year. He began his varsity career as a sophomore after playing as a ninth-grader for the Lakeland Bantam AA club.

"I saw the records in the showcase and I've known about them since my freshman year," he said. "I came close last year with 38 (goals) and it made me think about it. But I really didn't think I could break it until recently."

McNeillance nearly opted to

play Junior B last season after being drafted by the Motor City Chiefs, but is satisfied he stuck with the Spartans.

"I didn't know which would help me more, high school or Junior B," McNeillance said. "You get more recognition in articles by playing high school. The high school game is growing, and Junior A teams are now taking more and more high school players."

McNeillance would like a shot at the Junior A level next year and eventually earn a Division I college hockey scholarship.

"Kyle is the most intense and motivated player I've been associated with," Stevenson coach Mike Harris said. "He has explosive speed and one of the hardest and most accurate shots I've seen from an 18-year-old. He has one of the quick releases with his shot."

"He's just a coach's dream and will be a success at any level. He can go to Junior A and has ability to play at the Division I level."

McNeillance started playing hockey at age 7, spending three

years at the mite level before moving into travel.

"I really didn't develop in mite until my third year," said McNeillance, who carries a 2.8 grade-point average and counts Philadelphia Flyer player Eric Lindros as his favorite NHL player. "But it's something I've always wanted to do when I was young. And my dad (John, a lieutenant with the Oak Park Police Department), encouraged me to keep playing."

Kyle, however, is only keeping up with the rest of the family.

Younger sisters Kelly and Kim McNeillance are both first-team members of the All-Observer cross country team. They were instrumental in leading the Stevenson girls to a second-place finish in the state Class A finals last fall.

"They've been to a few games," Kyle said of his sisters. "But we kind of go our separate ways."

But it seems the only route for the McNeillance family, which includes mother Sandy, is the way into the record books.

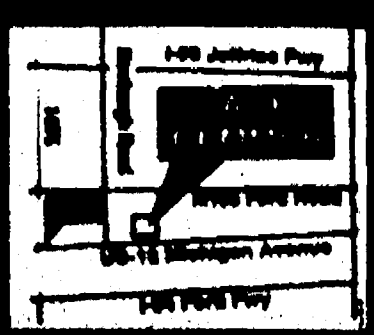

Lexus SC 400 delivers a good time

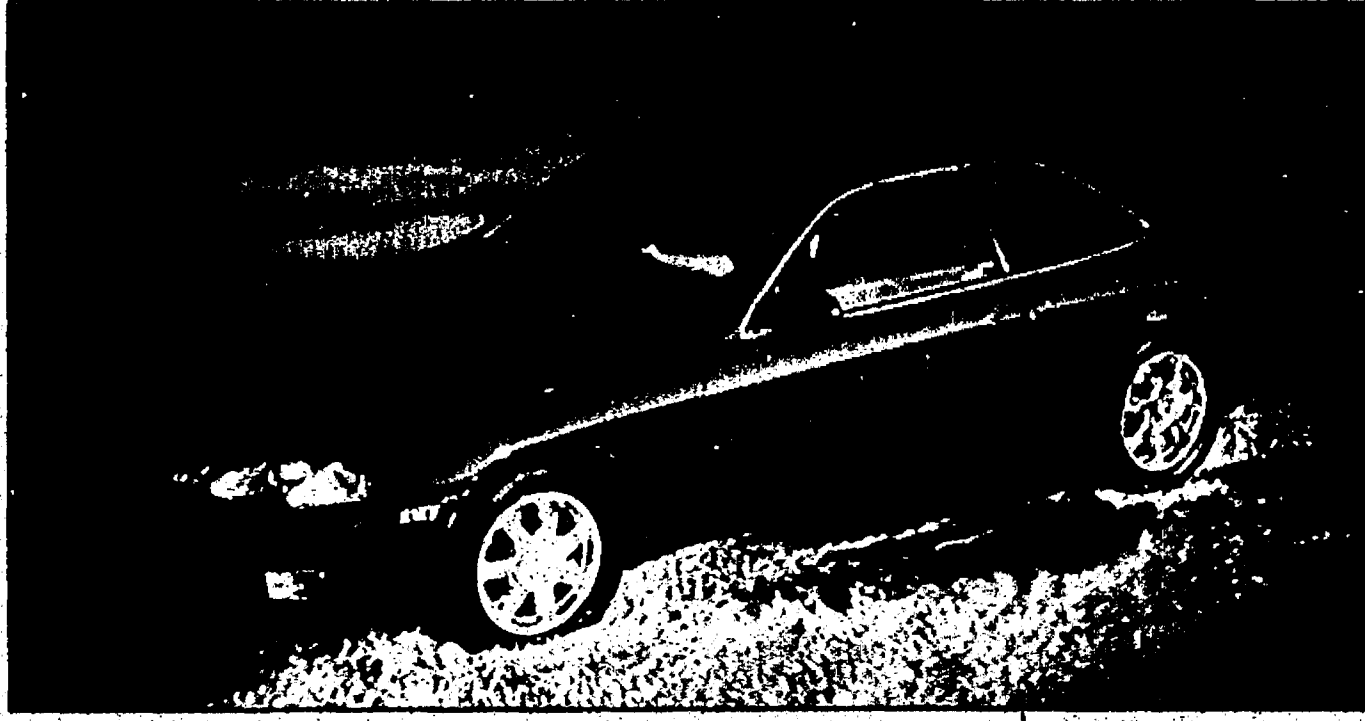
When it was first hinted that Lexus would soon unveil a sports coupe, skeptics theorized it would be exactly what every other luxury carmaker had accomplished — just sticking two fewer doors on a sedan and giving it a couple of upgraded, sleek lines.

But hold your breath. The sporty SC 400 doesn't have the feel or look of a two-door sedan, or drive like one. The 1996 model is better than the average two-door sedan could ever dream of being.

Lexus' SC 400 is revolutionary enough to rearrange the way auto-makers design vehicles for the 1990s and beyond. Sort of what Ford Motor Co. accomplished with the aerodynamic, wrap-around look of the 1986 Taurus and Sable.

When Lexus and Toyota officials introduced their SC 400 a few years ago, they gave us a car that in years to come could become the symbol of unconventional design and innovation.

The traditional method of designing a car is to put it all on paper first, sketch after sketch, drawing

after drawing, clay model after clay model and fiberglass rendering after fiberglass rendering — all the while enduring approval processes from designers, engineers, more designers and engineers and finally from the big guys at the top.

The SC 400's development team sidestepped more than 90 percent of the standard bureaucratic mumbo-jumbo and effectively and efficiently came up with a vehicle that's pure in design and flawless in execution.

The team succeeded in achieving a bold, distinct, unique design that was created by human touch — and,

accomplish this, started with clay models. Pencil never hit paper on this project.

And, instead of design teams arguing and compromising with engineering teams, both worked together to assure the design was functional and fun.

"This sort of cooperation just seems like common sense, but just take a look at some of the new cars on the road with humped fenders and hood bulges because the designers and engineers weren't talking to each other," said Dave Illingworth, a former Lexus general manager who moved up the corporate ladder at Toyota.

"As a result of this cooperation, we have one of the most dramatic designs ever to travel from the modeling studio to the production line — without losing an ounce of artistry, emotion or beauty."

Artistic, emotional and beautiful this SC 400 is, that's for sure. Chief Designer Dennis Campbell, who headed the project at Toyota's Cally Design Research team headquarters in California, said when a portion of the vehicle didn't fit the design, engineers simply found somewhere

else to put that part.

Quite an accomplishment. This is truly a four-wheel work of art. And the process that made it a reality and a machine to be driven on American soil may be remembered as a modern-day miracle.

A drive around city streets with this head-turning SC 400 can be an eye-opener. Front engine. Rear-wheel-drive. A 4.0-liter V8 EFI with 32 valves. Power has jumped to 260 horses. Zero-to-60 time is a mere 6.8 seconds. Redlines at 6,250 rpms. Eighteen city, 23 highway. U.S. designed, built in Japan. And ABS is standard.

It's billed as a four-passenger, but realistically it's a two-passenger coupe. The SC 400 is marketed toward those who would like to move up from a mid-level Cadillac or low-end BMW, but can't afford an LS 400.

Everything under the sun is standard equipment in the SC 400, but don't faint from sticker shock. The high-thirty something price is something an on-the-move executive should try to afford.

Listen to Your Car When You Think Something's Wrong

(NU) - Little kids cry when they're not feeling well. Adults wheeze or groan. How does your car tell you when something's wrong? In lots of ways, according to the Automotive Service Association.

If you suspect your car's not at its best, listen carefully. Describing the sounds you hear will help your automotive technician begin to diagnose the problem.

ASA suggests listening for...

- Booms that sound like a bass drum.

- Grinding, like metal rubbing against metal.

- Buzzing that sounds like a bee.

- Hisses, like the sound of air escaping from a tire.

- Rattling that sounds just like a child's toy.

- Squeaks, like rubbing on a glass surface.

Of course, be sure to pay attention to your dashboard malfunction indicator lights, strange smells, and handling and performance difficulties.

Here are some more signs of car trouble:

- Black, blue, gray or white smoke coming from the rear of the car or from under the hood.

- The car hesitates or there's a delayed response when you push the accelerator pedal.

- The car stalls at stop signs or red lights.

- The vehicle tends to pull to one side when traveling.

- The car vibrates.
- A sweet and steamy smell could be coming from leaking antifreeze.
- A sulfur-like odor (rotten eggs) could indicate emissions problems.

Car Talk

When you talk with your technician, describe all the symptoms, no matter how large or small, and be sure to answer all of the technician's questions, no matter how irrelevant they may seem.

Be precise when describing your car's problem and use simple language. Technical jargon is best left to the technicians. Like a doctor, the technician will consider all the symptoms and begin to diagnose the problem.

Here's one more thing to keep in mind. Like people, cars benefit from regular checkups. Routine maintenance will save you time and money, and may prevent severe problems in the future.

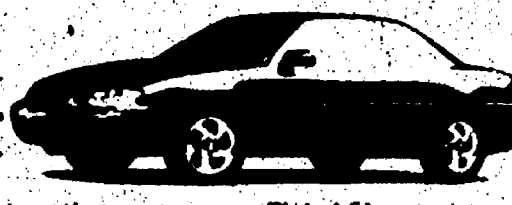

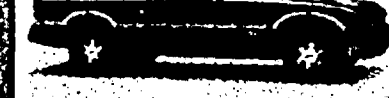

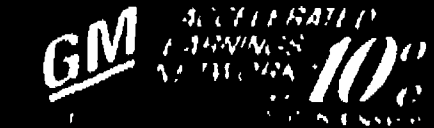
