After one year as Wayne-Westland school superintendent, Duane Moore continues to look forward to major challenges facing him and the district. His contract expires in 1998.

> boost student achievement test scores in recent years.

He hopes to influence Lansing legislators to tackle education-funding problems that sustain inequities between affluent districts and poorer ones.

Finally, he cites the desperate need for building repairs to schools. that have leaky roofs, buckling gymnasium floors, worn carpet and other problems.

Moore, 54, outlined his ambitions Wednesday during an interview in his office. He seemed confident and relaxed as he responded to questions about his first-year accomplishments and his vision for the remaining two years of his three-year contract.

When he talks of achievements, Moore is quick to share credit with other administrators, teachers, hourly employees and parents who helped to make his first year in Wayne-Westland a successful one.


We had a real good first year," he said.

Moore assumed his job last summer amid a whirlwind of changes initiated by his predecessor, Larry Thomas. Four of 21 elementary. schools had been closed, attendance boundaries had been redrawn, and the district was shifting to a middle school program.

At' the same time, a rapid turnover among employees meant that Moore's administration had to hire more than 100 teachers and replace half of the district's administrators, including many principals.

"That's a massive change," Moore



## **Sentencing set in**

## molesting case

#### BY DARRELL CLEM STAFF WRITER

A 24-year-old Westland man faces sentencing Thursday. Sept. 5, for molesting an 11year-old neighborhood boy.

Matthew Hanlon's sentencing comes after he pleaded no contest July 30 to one count of first-degree criminal sexual conduct.

In return, four other felony sex charges have been dropped, according to court records in Detroit.

Hanlon's plea averted a trial ordered in June after he voluntarily waived a preliminary hearing before Westland 18th District Judge C. Charles Bokos.

Bokos sent the case to Wayne County Circuit Court, where Judge Marvin Stempien is scheduled to announce Hanlon's sentence on Thursday.

The charge of first-degree criminal sexual conduct is punishable by a maximum sentence of life in prison.

Wayne County prosecutors charged Hanlon following allegations that he molested the 11-year-old boy on several occasions between October 1995 and March of this year.

Hanlon had originally pleaded not guilty to all five charges. The defendant had initially been jailed in lieu of a \$50,000 cash bond, but he has since been released and is awaiting

jail spokesman said Wednesday. Hanlon, who is married and has two teenage stepsons, was accused of molesting the boy at three locations, including Hanlon's residence on Montmorency near Palmer and Venoy, Westland police Sgt. Michael

Terry has said. Hanlon also was accused of sex crimes at the boy's home. several streets away, Terry said. Hanlon lived with the boy's family temporarily while he was apparently having marital problems that were later resolved, Terry has said.

The defendant was charged with molesting the boy after befriending him and having him perform odd jobs around the Hanlon residence, Terry said.

He was charged after the boy eventually reported the alleged incidents to family members who contacted Westland police, the sergeant said.

School board President Patricia Brown gave Moore high marks for implementing the changes initiated prior to his arrival from the South Lyon district.

Moreover, she commended him for having a calming effect on a school board that had earned a reputation for political bickering. Board member clashes tended to overshadow more positive deeds.

"He took the board of education off of the front pages," Brown said.

When asked Thursday to give the superintendent a grade, she gave him a "B."

"It was a pretty simple year for anybody," Brown said, noting that unpopular decisions such as school closings had already been made. "Now we're into the tough part."

Brown was referring specifically to impending financial difficulties that, in past years, caused school officials to eliminate student transportation and charge students a fee to play sports and participate in other extracurricular activities.

"That's the fun part of the job for me," he said.

Moore has seen few controversies as superintendent. The biggest potential for damaging community relations came from a recommendation that a 64-acre nature area, Sassafras Trails, be sold for residential development.

But board members retreated amid a storm of public protest, averting a backlash that officials said could have had long-term ramifications.

School officials will need public support if they ask voters to approve a bond proposal for building repairs and classroom technology. Moore said he may recommend a ballot plan next year.





## Accessibility issues concern area woman who is disabled

Rebecca Juntunen shakes her head as she remembers one of the most humiliating moments of her life.

It took place in a Livonia store, before the federal government passed the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA), a law that required public buildings and public restrooms be accessible to people with disabilities.

Juntunen has spina bifida, a malformation of her spine, and uses a wheelchair to get around. She has never known what it's like to walk unaided by either crutches, braces or a wheelchair.

While shopping one day in her wheelchair, Juntunen had to go to the bathroom. But her wheelchair was too wide to fit through the bathroom door.

So store employees came up with the only solution available at a time few public buildings had restroom doors wide enough for wheelchairs: They took her out of her wheelchair, put her in a desk chair and pushed the chair into the restroom.

"They dragged me in and then dragged me back out," said Juntunen, who lives in Livonia with parents Robert and Roberta Juntunen.

Most likely every disabled person has a similar story to tell about life before ADA and life before Michigan's Barrier Free Design Laws were passed.

Because of building designs now mandated by law, problems have lessened over the last few years, and will continue to lessen as older buildings are modernized.

#### Access is expensive

Hassles faced by handicapped people have been transferred to building owners, who must now pay heavy costs to meet very strict entrance, ramp, parking, stair, elevator, door and space requirements.

As Juntunen admits, "accessibility is expensive." If the biggest problem was accessing buildings and rest rooms, then it would appear their major problem had been solved.

But has it?

Each disabled person is unique. Some can't walk, but can push a wheelchair. Some can walk, but can't carry groceries into the house. Some can stand, but not for long periods of time. Some can't hear or see. Some have multiple disabilities.

As a child. Juntunen was always protected and helped by others. Only as an adult, seeking a college to attend, did she come face-to-face with her limitations. She needed to go to a college that was

Library, where she hooked into the computer and looked up stories on the subject.

To avoid problems in buildings, Juntunen learned long ago not to go to unfamiliar places. In making restaurant reservations, she mentions that one diner will be in a wheelchair. She shops and eats at places where she knows her wheelchair is welcome.

It's rare to throw caution to the wind, said Juntunen, a 1984 graduate of United Christian School in Garden City who attended William Tyndale College in Farmington Hills and graduated from the Pontiac Business Institute.

#### Changing attitudes

Juntunen has a different view of the words "handicap accessibility."

"Accessibility is more than being able to get into buildings. ADA has changed some things, but it hasn't changed people's attitudes toward disabilities

"ADA can require a \$15,000 renovation to make a building accessible. But ADA can't change people's minds and hearts.

"If I go into a place that is not easily accessible and I'm treated like a queen, I would rather go there than to go to the most accessible place and be treated like I'm invisible."

In a life filled with bugs that must be worked out, Juntunen points to those which vex her the most.

In her world, accessibility means having access to a livable income.

. It means being able to get in and out of cars and buildings in icy conditions, and thus be able to take a year-round job. What's accessible in the summer may not be so when snow is on the ground.

Research has shown that one of the biggest problems for a disabled person is either unemployment or simply earning enough to live on.

#### Question of work

Catch-22s abound in the world of the disabled.

Juntunen lives in her parents' home on \$436 a month from Social Security. As long as she receives SSI, government regulations only allow her to earn an extra \$85 a month before taking away \$1 for every \$2 she earns over her SSI income.

She also risks losing her federal medical benefits if she works.

"The big question for all disabled persons is this: Do you take a job and risk your check and benefits? They penalize you for wanting to earn more



## S'craft reports steady enrollment, budget surplus

#### BY BETH SUNDRLA JACHMAN STAFF WRITER

The fall semester is under way at Schoolcraft College and enrollment is holding steady compared to last year. The college also saw a \$1.2 million surplus in its 1995-96 budget.

Enrollment is "about even," at about 9,400 credit students this semester, Conway Jeffress, vice president for instruction, told the Schoolcraft College Board of <u>Trustees during its monthly</u> meeting Wednesday.

"That's better than it sounds. We're one of the few colleges that held their own in the last year," he said.

The college saw a slight enrollment increase during the winter

term. Colleges around the area are showing mixed résults, Jeffress said. Other colleges have been very aggressive with their advertising and recruitment efforts, he said.

Several weeks ago Schoolcraft was facing a "discrepancy" in enrollment, but about "7,000 phone calls" were made and many people came in to register, Jeffress said.

"It's going well," he said. The college is expected to meet its

#### budget, he said.

#### **Revenue** increase

In other action, trustees approved allocating a \$1.2 million increase over budgeted revenue in the 1995-96 fiscal year budget.

The money, which came from increases in the areas of tuition and fees, \$388,000; interest, \$438,000; property taxes, \$230,000; and state aid, \$144,000, will be allocated to the renovation of the bookstore, \$400,000; Waterman Center boiler, \$100,000; campus signs, \$210,000; computer replacement, \$350,000 and instructional expenses, \$140,000.

#### One for the books

Trustees also approved a purchase order with Redstone Tiseo Architects for \$20,260 to complete a bid specification package. The construction contract is

expected to be awarded in January with work to begin in March. The cost of the project is expected to be \$400,000.

The bookstore, built more than 20 years ago, will be remodeled to meet Americans with Disabilities Act requirements, improve floor space use and spruce up the sales floor.

Nearby development Trustees heard an update of a J.P. Properties proposal to build two hotels and an office building off of Six Mile Road near Schoolcraft College property.

The project is soon to come up at a Livonia City Council meeting, and Schoolcraft College will be asked to agree to improvements to an adjoining street, Adelard Raby, vice president for business services, told the board. A rezoning hearing is scheduled soon and construction is expected to begin in the spring, he said.

#### Written off

Trustees agreed to write off \$3,385.50 in delinquent student loans. The loan payments were due Oct. 30, 1994, and range from \$9 to \$225 from 18 students.

The list of delinquent loan amounts is longer this time, Adelard H. Raby III, vice president for business services, said.

College officials are looking at applying stricter standards to granting loans, Raby said.

Chapter 11 of the bankruptcy, code since March 31, 1995, announced the sales agreement with Spectrum last week, but it is subject to the results of an auction planned for Sept. 11.

On Aug. 23, the U.S. Bankruptcy Court ordered a hearing set for approval of the proposed sale to Spectrum subject to the receipt of higher and better offers at an auction to be held at 9 a.m. Sept. 11, at the offices of Miller, Canfield, Paddock and Stone, 150 West Jefferson, Suite 2500, Detroit 48226.

If the deal goes through Spectrum plans to relocate its headquarters there, according to Shirley Edwards, deputy director of Spectrum. "We're looking for a larger location," she said.

The agency's site in Livonia, at 34000 Plymouth Road, has already been up for sale for a couple weeks, she said.

The Montgomery Hospital building, 28303 Joy Road, was bought by one of Michigan Health Care Corp.'s subsidiaries in 1987, renovated and operated as a 60-bed mental health facility from 1988 until November 1995, when it was closed. The 10,000-square-foot facility sits on 10 acres of land, according to John Southworth, special project coordinator for Quorum, which is managing Michigan Health Care Corp. during the reorganization.


The building still has furnished patient rooms and a telephone system, Southworth said.

"We're hoping for a couple (bids)," Southworth said, adding he doesn't know if there will be any. Interested parties must file with Miller Canfield by Sept. 9 for the auction Sept. 11, he said.

Proposed bids are required to exceed Spectrum's price by at least \$50,000 and be subject to other terms and conditions in the notice of auction.

The corporation and its principal subsidiaries have filed a joint plan of reorganization,

Statistics show an aging American population entering the 21st century. So it's no wonder retail experts predict new and expanded markets in preventive care and medical supplies.

Leading the way is pharmacist F. Keyin Browett, 41, of Farmington Hills. His Southfield-based company MedMax just opened the area's first superstore specializing in health. and care products in Westland.

Later this year, two more Med-Max stores will open in Rochester Hills and Taylor. Next year, plans call for additional locations in Farmington and Troy.

Browett is no stranger to the health care industry. He spent 12 years as a pharmacist for Virginiabased People's Drugs, and the next four, as a general merchandising manager responsible for buying \$18

million worth of health care products for K-mart. He said today's consumers are educated about their health, and have the information they need to buy health care items for themselves.

MedMax sells more than 20,000 different health products in 18,000square feet of space. Shoppers can find merchandise devoted to helping bad backs, sports injuries, mobility, nutrition, maternity patients, and home environments.

There are also prescription medicines, vitamins, power drinks and bars, hand-held weights, exercise balls, wheelchairs, scooters and liftassisted loungers for sale. Many items make home environments less stressful for patients and caregivers.

Bed, bath and office vignettes display products that might make life easier for arthritic patients like right-angle utensils, suction-bottom bowls, pencil grippers, bath rails, and door knob extensions. Items such as oven and stove security knobs, cupboard latches and toilet seat locks insure safer home for children or loved-ones with diseases like Alzheimer's or Dementia.

Whether the need is for apparel with velcro closings, shoes designed for diabetes and gout patients, therapeutic massage items, bedding products to aid sleep, a Porta warm mattress for baby, or allergy-free pillows, MedMax stocks it all, and if they don't, the staff carries note cards to pass customer requests on to buyers. By the year 2002, the Southfield-based company hopes to open 200 more stores nation-wide.

#### **Professional Staff**

"It's more than a pharmacy," said manager Dave Sicheneder. "What's going to set MedMax apart is the wide variety of items for health and care, plus a staff of true professionals - a registered nurse, sports and nutrition therapist, audiologist, respiratory therapist, and soon-tocome, a dietician."

"And it's not just a sick store," he continued. "We're also offering our services and products to the fit and healthy. We're going to work with school athletic directors to prep them on keeping their students injury-free, and we're hosting hospital-sponsored lectures on preventative medicine."

Private rooms are available for mastectomy patients seeking prosthetics, and shoppers needing custom-fitted braces. A computerized body composition analysis, measures fat and muscle content, and then tailors nutrition and exercise programs to the individual under the direction of an athletic trainers, not a bad deal for \$40. Another computerized program caters to orthotics for podiatry needs.

A juice bar allows customers to rest and peruse the library of health-care books. A designated area incorporating a variety of surfaces from plush carpeting to ceramic tiles, provides walker patients with a place to try products before purchasing. MedMax is awaiting city approval for a drive-through pharmacy window.

"We've created a clinical setting in a retail environment," said Sicheneder.

## **Rivers shares personal** struggle at convention

CHICAGO - "I expected, when I walked to the podium, to be unnerved," said U.S. Rep. Lynn Rivers, who addressed the Democratic National Convention in prime time Tuesday.

"I was worried about the size of the audience (20,000-ish). I was worried about the TelePrompTer (which she never had used before). I was worried about my mom watching.

"It was fun," said Rivers, who four years ago was an obscure Ann Arbor school board member running for the state Legislature.

Now she's a member of Congress seeking a second term in the GOP-targeted 13th District (including western Wayne County) and getting a dose of national exposure.

It started a week earlier. "I got a call from (House minority leader Richard) Gephardt's office asking me to speak. I said yes instantly.

"The process was difficult for me - putting it on paper. Ordinarily I work with a few words of outline and speak extemporaneously. So I spent the weekend

writing it out. I worked (in at the end of the month, to have Chicago) with the TelePrompTer. Then I had to fly back Monday night for an event in the district.'

Convention producers argued over a few minor items in her text. Rivers wanted to say the lack of health insurance for families is "shameful." She changed to "it's a challenge."

She was asked to drop lines about how many doctors' visits were skipped and prescriptions unfilled because they dwelt too much on the problem and not enough on Clinton-Democratic solutions.

As she stood in the on-deck circle gazing up at several tiers of seats, a convention stage manager warned her against trying to shout over the din because "people listening at home to TV don't want you shouting."

C-Span and CNN viewers saw Rivers, but commercial TV cut her out. She opened with the familiar story about being married at 18 the day after getting out of high school, having two babies by 21 and struggling to survive. Excerpts:

"We learned what it was like,

to take pop bottles back in order to buy a gallon of milk. . .

"We learned what it was like to go without health insurance, because, if our jobs didn't provide it, we couldn't afford it. . . We learned what it was like to have to wait until payday to take a sick baby to the doctor. That took place nearly 20 years ago.

"In too many American families (today), both spouses work, and neither have health insurance. For families, this is devastating. For us as a nation, it is a challenge of the highest order.

"Today, finally, we have a president who understands our situation and is moving us in the right direction on health care. But he needs a Democratic Congress working with him to truly protect America's children. "I know how much guilt and silent second-guessing goes on in the hearts of parents who have to put off the visit to the doctor because the rent is due or the

cupboard is bare. . . the heartbreaking choice between milk or medicine for their children...

"By making low-cost, comprehensive children's health insur-

Rivers, told she looks noticeably thinner, laughed: "I've lost 44 pounds since Easter. This is the era of smaller government."





## Cookbook puts new spin on salads

alads have long taken a bad rap. To most people, salads are diet food; flavorless, low calorie bowls of boring greens and lifeless vegetables. Finally, someone has come up with something new, and refreshing. "Lettuce in Your Kitchen" by Chris Schlesinger and John Willoughby, (William Morrow Publishers, copyright 1996, \$22.50) redefines salads, and will forever change its negative image:

Schlesinger and Willoughby, who also wrote "The Thrill of the Grill," and "Big Flavors of the Hot Sun," have put together a book that gives salad a whole new spin, with dressings that do double duty. the best part about it, most of the recipes don't require turning on a stove, or microwave oven. The majority of these recipes are, as Maynard G. Krebs used to say, "cool, man."

#### **Beyond tradition**

In "Lettuce in Your Kitchen," the authors widen the definition of salad, opening the door to creativity. They tell readers everything you may want to know about traditional greens like lettuce and spinach, and give a wide definition of spicy greens such as watercress, arugula, and cooking greens such as beet, turnip, kale and Asian greens.

I don't want you to think we're discussing rabbit food here folks, because after the chapter on greens, the book explains how to develop a salad, and add flavor combinations. Black beans lentils, chicken, seafood, fruits, nuts, and even lemon flavored bread crumbs, are suggested ingredients for cool, satisfying salad meals.

#### Nutrient rich

Lettuce and other greens have traditionally been a dietary staple in the U.S.. But now, we're finding that like grains and legumes, greens are very good for you. They are universally high in fiber, contain large amounts of vitamins C and E and beta-carotene, which are antioxidants, which supposedly help prevent cancer. In addition, the darker the green the greater amounts of folic acid, which help prevent certain birth defects, and may also assist in preventing some forms of cancer. Greens of all types are also rich in phytochemicals, the macro nutrients that aid in disease prevention.

There are some basic rules about salad making the authors suggest.

"The first rule is that there are no rules," writes Schlesinger, "just important things to keep in mind when choosing greens and vegetables."

Choose only the freshest ingredients. Leaves on greens should be crisp, free from dark spots, and when possible, purchased with the roots still attached.

John Willoughby claims the biggest problem when making salads are "wet greens because they prevent the dressing from clinging to leaves.'

Without a doubt, this book is particularly timely, but its appeal shouldn't be limited to the peak produce season. The authors have spun thrill back into salads, transforming them from a usually familiar course into an inventive, unexpected eating experience. You won't go wrong with this book on your cookbook shelf.

Here's a recipe to try:

#### **CUCUMBER MINT DRESSING**

1/3 cup peeled, seed and chopped cucumber

- 1/4 cup non fat plain yogurt
- 1/4 cup prepared mango chutney
- 2 tablespoons, olive oil
- 1/4 cup chopped fresh mint
- 1 tablespoon curry powder
- Salt and fresh ground black pepper to taste

In a blender or food processor, puree the cucumbers, yogurt, chutney and oil until smooth. Add mint and curry powder and pulse to blend. Transfer to a bowl and season with slat and pepper, Makes 2/3 cup.

boxes waiting to be filled and hungry kids waiting to eat their contents. Your child's school may or may not have a lunch program, but even if it does; there are good reasons for packing his or her lunch:

It saves money.

It allows your child to spend more time eating instead of waiting in line to buy lunch.

It assures that your child has food he or she likes and that you know it is a good nutritional choice.

The food that children eat affects their growth, their behavior and their ability to learn. A hungry child may get drowsy or restless and have difficulty focusing on classroom activities.

If you have a choosy eater in your household, it's OK to pack the same foods every day. Food likes and dislikes are often shaped by what foods are offered in the home, the way they are offered and how frequently they are offered. Keep this in mind as you pack lunches, you can occasionally try something new in the lunch box, but remember that kids need to see and taste food many times before they decide to like it. They also grow in and out of times when it is easier to introduce something new.

With a little planning, you can make it a treat for your child to open the lunch box. Try some of these healthful and practical ideas.

Jazz up peanut butter sandwiches with

sandwiches by adding pickles, sliced cucumber, chopped celery, grated carrots and/or pepper slices or rings.

Stuff pita halves; fill and roll low-fat tortilla skins or lettuce leaves or cut sandwiches into exciting shapes with cookie cutters.

■ Pack bright, colorful fruits and vegetables - carrots, peas, pepper rings, oranges, plums, kiwi, dried apricots, spinach leaves, cabbage slices, grapes, zucchini or turnip sticks.

Get kids involved in making their lunch. Play a game - "Guess who or what is going to lunch with you" - and let them cut the shape of the sandwich.

Make carrot curls and raisin eyes on sandwiches.

Choose fruit filled shredded cereals, pretzels, low-fat muffins or popcorn for treats.

Fill thermoses with low-fat or skim milk, orange juice, pineapple juice, apple cider or sparkling juice.

And don't forget to surprise your child with an occasional note or picture.

Remember a lunch box offers you a chance to shape foods your child eats for lunch. Make it full of healthful surprises that will keep him or her looking forward to tomorrow's treats.

## Michigan native makes stellar Lynmar wines

On a recent trip to California wine country, we visited Farmington, Mich. native Dan Moore at his new winemaking home, Lynmar Winery in Sonoma County's Russian River Valley appellation.

You may recall that Moore and his wife Natalie Zuccarelli were owners of Z Moore Winery, a small, hands-on operation crafting dry gewurztraminer and an off-dry style called Quaff. In the early 1990s, Moore made acquaintance with shipping magnate Lynn Fritz and his wife Mara (thus the winery name Lynmar) who own Quail Hill Ranch, 43 acres planted to chardonnay and pinot noir.

"Making wine from this property was the chance of a lifetime," Moore said. With Lynmar winemaking success in vintages. 1992 through 1995, Dan and Natalie decided their future was with Lynmar and closed Z Moore Winery earlier this year.

After earning a degree in food science from Michigan State University, Moore moved to California because as he said, "It was the only place where I could swim and ski in the same season." He admitted that he was a white zinfandel drinker who learned winemaking from his hose hauling days in the cellars of Milano Winery in Mendocino County. He got turned on to

expanded my horizons and I'm now passionate about pinot noir," he said. "There's no better place for it than Sonoma County's Russian River area."

Lynmar wines are in limited production, but more vines were planted this year. Plans for a new winery are on the drawing board. The splendid pinot noir character stems from the Quail Hill Ranch location where long hang time between bud break and harvest are combined with moderately warm days and cooling, evening fog intrusions that build in great fruit characters. Additionally, vineyard blocks have been identified as offering distinct qualities to a blend.

After assessing barrels from the 1992 production of pinot noir, Moore and Lynmar's owners decided that they would buy barrels exclusively from Tonnellerie Sirugue, a small cooper in Burgundy's Nuits-Saint-Georges. Great decision. The spicy elements from these barrels are in total harmony with the estate's fruit and yield wines of dynamic fruit prowess, but finishing with elegance, grace and finesse.

While only the very good 1993 Lynmar wincs are in our market currently, vintage 1994 was nearly perfect in the Russian River and Lynmar's 1994 offerings demonstrate this. A cool, long harvest gave grapes extra hang time to develop flavor intensity and concentration. All fruit is hand-picke


Fermentation of pinot noir is done in small open-top fermenters where the cap is gently treated and gravity racking and bottling all maintain the wine's natural character,

The 1994 Lynmar Quail Hill Pinot Noir (\$21) was just released. Made from 100 percent free-run juice, it is a blend of all the vineyard blocks. When 16 months barrel aging in the Sirugue barrels which were 70 percent new is added in, the sum is a dynamic harmony of aromas and flavors. The 1994 Lynmar Quail Hill Reserve Pinot Noir will be released before Christmas. It represents the culmination of a four-year study of the pinot noir blocks for the best soil and exposure profile. The very limited quantity is a blend of only five 100 percent new Sirugue barrels. The powerful, extracted fruit is complemented by the new wood and matches it in a seamless whole,

While we've raved about pinot noir, Moore's handling of fully-mature chardonnay fruit is noteworthy. The 1994 Lynmar Chardonnay (\$25) has depthful flavors from both barrel and malolactic fermentations, extended aging on the lees and 15 months in 30 percent new French oak.

## Salt and herbs enhance flavor of snapper fillets

Using more herbs and less salt throughout the year, could be one of the healthier steps you can take to improve your diet. When you lower your salt intake. you can reduce your risk of diseases, such as hypertension and heart disease. By simultaneously increasing your consumption of herbs, you may also lower your chances of getting certain cancers by receiving a host of hytochemicals - plant substances that research shows may assist our bodies in the fight against disease, according to the American Institute for Cancer Research.

Once you know the main sources of salt in your diet, it's easy to reduce your daily intake. Use fewer processed foods, a major source of hidden salt, and read labels to spot the word sodium in the ingredient list. Buy fresh or frozen vegetables instead of canned and look for the reduced-sodium versions of popular high-salt seasonings such as broth, spaghetti sauce, or soy sauce. Try not to cook with salt and, if needed, add it

shown that people use less salt from the shaker than they would have used in cooking.

Retain flavor in food when reducing salt by boosting your se of herbs and spices as flavoring agents. The growing popularity of ethnic cuisines has sparked great interest in the use of herbs and exotic seasonings, as a way to add delicious flavor without salt. Italian dishes are known for their use of basil, oregano, rosemary, sage and parsley. French cooking relies heavily on thyme, savory, tarragon, rosemary and chives. Create a Greek-style marinade by combining lemon juice, oil, garlic, oregano, parsley and pepper in a shallow glass bowl. Add skinless, boneless chicken breasts to the dish and allow them to marinate in the refrigerator for at least I hour. Transfer the chicken to another pan and broil for 4 minutes on each side, basting with the marinade after turning the meat. Discard marinade and serve the chicken garnished with lemon slices and chopped parsley.

## Launch pad: **Rockets ready** to orbit in '96


Call it training camp, boot camp or whatever, Westland John Glenn football coach Chuck Gordon has left nothing for chance as the Rockets take on Detroit Mackenzie in their season opener on Friday.

Glenn is coming off a respectable 6-3 season, but it wasn't quite up to Gordon's playoff-type expectations.

He wants his Rockets to make amends for the 1995 season when they dropped three tight games \_ 21-20 to Walled Lake Central; 14-7 to Livonia Stevenson; and 26-21 to Wayne Memorial.

"It's been a long time since we've worked a team harder in preseason," said Gordon, one of the area's winningest coaches with a 19-year mark of 142-45. "Since we started doubles (practice sessions), we've really pushed this team and they've responded. The attitude has been excellent and we're as ready as we can be."

Glenn lost tailback Jay Jackson, who gained over 1,000 yards, along with two first-team All-Area offensive linemen, Mike Sosnowski and Jeff Cook, to graduation. But five starters return on offense, led by 6foot-6, 200-pound junior quarterback Justin Berent, who started eight games a year ago. "He's vastly improved and he has a better knowledge of the game," Gordon said. "He's got good arm strength and he's got enough speed and quickness to run the bootleg stuff. He's just a much better player. Last year we didn't make as many of demands on him. This year we expect more from Justin."

Also returning is senior tight end Jon Becher (6-4, 217), senior tackle Eric Jachym (6-1, 275), senior guard Bryan Schwesing (6-0, 195) and senior fullback Matt Griglio (5-11, 204), the latter whom could split time with junior Antonio Gibson (5-10, 182).

Becher, Griglio and Jachym are three-year varsity performers.

"Jon Becher has had very good early practices," Gordon said. "He's an excellent blocker and a capable receiver.

"Griglio and Gibson are both good blockers with good speed and they run hard."

Rounding out the offensive line is senior tackle Marc Dugas (6-2, 260), senior guard Jason Sterioff (5-9, 203) and senior center Rich Jordan (6-0, 221).

"That group in doubles have had a good camp, they're in good shape, and have excellent work habits," said the Glenn coach. "We think it's a

pretty good group." The Rockets will also look to a quartet of senior wide receivers, led by David Jarrett (6-3, 195). He is joined by Lou Hartwig (6-3, 170), Steve Hester (5-3, 130) and Paul Merandi (5-10, 160).

"We think we're much-improved there because we have good speed and size," Gordon said.

The key to the offense, however, may rest with sophomore tailback Reggie Spearmon (5-8, 170), who played a year ago on the JV squad as a freshman.

"He's the best tailback in our program, regardless of grade," Gordon said. "And we have a lot of confidence in him. He runs hard and has good speed."

The Rockets will play their standard 5-2 defense

Leading the down-three linemen is senior tackle Ira Bargon (6-0, 217), a third-year varsity player. He will be flanked by senior nose guard Steve Paling (6-1, 220) and senior Jim Stafford (6.0, 201).

"Ira is one of the best workers in the program, a quality kid who will give you everything he's got in a game." Gordon said.

The ends will be Becher and senior Nick Neshiewat (5-11, 175).

Griglio, a third-year starter at linebacker and first-team All-Observer choice, will be at linebacker along with junior Sean Heard (5-9, 215), the latter whom played on the varsity as a sophomore.

Griglio has led the Rockets in tackles the past two seasons.

"The thing we like about Griglio is that he works as hard today as he did as a sophomore," Gordon said. "He's very determined to finish his

career at the highest, possible level." The secondary includes four seniors, Todd Viecelli (5-8, 168), Steve Waller.(5-11, 185), Charles Bailey (5-7, 151) and Jarrett.

## Livonia cyclist realizes dream in gruelling race

"A man's got to know his limitations," actor Clint Eastwood once said in a classic movie line.

Livonian John Buffington, however, may have taken it one spoke further in the Race Across America, a mind-boggling 2,905mile cycling event from Irvine, Calif. to Savannah, Ga. (Aug. 1 through 11).

You could say Buffington, the 43-yearold store manager from Office Depot took on several East-



wood-like roles at once, riding 300 miles-plus per day on the backroads of Arizona, Colorado, O k l a h o m a , Arkansas, Ten-nessee, as well as California and Georgia.

It was the Gauntlet and Heartbreak Ridge all rolled into one.

And there were the dark moments,

were he was playing real-live parts in the Unforgiven, The Dead Pool, High Plains Drifter or Hang Em High.

Buffington, however, took the Any Which Way You Can approach, climbing to Where Eagles Dare.

Averaging more than 12 miles per hour and over 300 miles per day, the former Purdue University defensive back was one of only 12 of 30 individual riders to make it through the hellacious trip. (Sixty-other competitors took part in four-man relay teams, which included crews from such countries as Germany, Italy, Switzerland and Australia.)

He completed all 64 check-points, finishing ninth overall, clocking a respectable time of 9 days, 23 hours and 3 minutes.

The winner, Danny Chew of Pittsburgh, Pa., won in 8 days, 17 hours. He averaged 13.5 MPH.


"This is the pinnacle of ultra endurance," Buffington said. "An outdoor magazine said this is the toughest race in the world, and that includes the Iditarod (dog sled) in Alaska, Ironman Triathlon (in Hawaii) and the Western States 50-miler (run).

"I can't close my eyes at night and not dream about it. It was more mentally exhausting than anything. It has left and indelible impression on me. The experience is indescribable."

Buffington has been off the bike now for two weeks, catching up on his job duties and sleep.



"My daughter (Katie) just got said. "It was 3 a.m. and I rolled her license and she has trouble finding her way around Livonia, but she really arose to the occasion on this trip," Beth said.

Buffington said the key to completing the gruelling trek was to "stay focused."

Easier said than done, considering he was on the bike continuously 22 of the 24 hours each day.

"Sleep deprivation was a problem and I was fighting a lot of demons," Buffington said. "At times you become delirious, almost in a dream state."

Buffington spent nearly two days riding through the deserts of California and Arizona with temperatures reaching 130 because it's the most awesome degrees. Once through Colorado, Buffington reached the desolate Oklahoma Pandhandle where he saw "A lot of dead armadillos on the road."

Somehow, someway Buffington completed the nearly 3,000mile race with a banquet awaiting in Savannah for the survivors.

By the halfway point, 1,441 miles in Slapout, Okla., Buffington got his second wind and climbed all the way to fifth position.

"That was the most exhilarating feeling," he said. "I was felling pretty good."

Going on an 80 percent liquid and 20 percent solid food diet (including numerous power bars and energy drinks), Buffington headed through muggy Arkansas and the hills of Tennessee.

Once again the mental battle raged.

"I got disoriented and got fuzzy," Buffington recalled. "Over the intercom they started asking me if I remembered by daughters, and if I was married. I remembered those things, but then they asked me about our dog Duke, and I said I couldn't remember and it kind of crushed one of my daughters."

Lack of sufficient oxygen while in the mountains of Tennessee led to even a more bizarre turn of events.

"I had three major climbs there," Buffington said. "The mind plays tricks when you're in thin air.

"I started getting hallucinations. I was seeing 12-inch green leafy guys in the road trying to get in my way."

Buffington, who stands 5-feetdashed when he was hit by a car on his bike while riding to work en route to Madison Heights. He suffered broken ribs and a punctured lung.

He began riding seven years ago and progressed well enough to win the 1994 Boston-Montreal-Boston and Illinois Road Series. In 1995, he was co-winner of the Bike-Across-Missouri and was a division champ in the National 24-Hour Challenge (1993 and 1996). He has also been four-time consecutive winner in the Beat the Boats Challenge from Port Huron to Mackinac Island.

"I've kind of metamorphisized as an athlete and I've always gravitated toward extremes," Buffington said. "Five or six years after college I tried to qualify for the Ironman Triathlon and I came close. Then I started running. I did seven marathons, including the Free Press and I missed qualifying for Boston.

"Then running injuries set in, the knees, ankles and hips, so I turned to biking. It's something where you can compete and any level against any age level.

"I did a lot of training this year for the RAM, more training than I've done in previous years. About seven weeks before I made my mind up I was going to do the Race Across America."

Along with his family and relatives, Buffington credits family doctor Randall Bickle for giving him helpful advice on dealing with saddle sores and oxygen use (while in the Colorado Rockies). He also received financial support from Cole Brothers Spring Water of Peru, Ind. (his hometown), along with Aerospoke Bicycle Wheels of Milford, Spiz Engery Food, Dr. Lynn Babcock of Grant Elementary School in Livonia, Chaf-ceze and Office Depot ("Who helped pay some of my gas money," Buffington said.)
