Barbs fly at candidate forum

There were plenty of fireworks and disagreements among state Rep. Eileen DeHart, a Democrat seeking a second term, and her GOP challenger, Dennis LeMaitre, at a candidates' forum.

When asked later to respond. LeMaitre called his commitment to education "unquestionable." He said he has led fund-raisers for DARE (Drug Abuse Resistance Education) and has been involved in an elementary school parentteacher group. On other school issues, DeHart and LeMaitre differed on the effects of adult education budget cuts and Proposal A, a 1994 voterapproved ballot plan that slashed property taxes and raised the state sales tax from 4 cents to 6 cents on the dollar. DeHart called it "criminal" that Gov. John Engler vetoed \$83 million in adult education funding,

but LeMaitre said Michigan had been spending tenfold the national average on a program that "was not working."

DeHart labeled Proposal A "a dismal failure" while LeMaitre said it was "a first step" that has eased the tax burden on such groups as senior citizens.

Democrat state Rep. Eileen DeHart attacked Republican challenger Dennis LeMaitre's voting scord Thursday, while LeMaitre accused her of being a liberal politician trying to portray herself as conservative.

Political attacks aside, DeHart and LeMaitre sparred on issues such as education funding, prison reform, political party pride and a suburban proposal to secede from Wayne County.

LeMaitre, a 38-year-old Westland business owner, is trying to unseat DeHart, 48, as she seeks a second two-year House term at the Nov. 5 election.

Defendant charged in rape of senior

BY LEONARD POGER

A \$1 million bond has been set for a young Westland man charged with raping a 79-year-old woman four times in her home last week.

The defendant, Kenneth M. Lies, 22, is charged with four counts of criminal sexual conduct/first degree, which involves penetration; one count of CSC/second degree, which involves contact; one count of home invasion; and one count of a felony in robbing and stealing.

If convicted on the home invasion charge, Lies

would face a 20-year prison term and/or \$5,000 fine.

On any of the sexual conduct charges, a conviction would result in a life prison term and a mandatory AIDS testing.

The robbery and stealing charge could lead to a 15-year prison sentence on conviction.

Lies' family members were in the 18th District Court of Judge Gail McKnight Friday morning to watch the defendant have the seven charges read to him.

The judge entered a not-guilty plea for the

defendant; ordered a court-appointed attorney to represent him and scheduled a preliminary exam for Thursday morning, Oct. 10.

At the exam, the prosecuting attorney and police department will present evidence which they hope will result in Lies being bound over for trial in Wayne County Circuit Court.

Detective Sgt. Michael Terry told McKnight that the elderly woman, the chief witness in the case, may not be available for Thursday's examination but he and the assistant prosecutor feel

District doesn't expect windfall from lawsuit

Wayne-Westland schools aren't expected to receive any money from the settlement of a 16-year-old lawsuit that leaves the state owing more than \$532 million to some districts, local officials said. What's worse, Wayne-Westland

Superintendent Duane Moore fears the district could lose money as the state seeks ways to pay the tab.

"Potentially it could have a negative impact on us," he said Friday.

"If the state is already having a difficult time funding education during good times, how are they going to pay for this?" she asked, referring to the lawsuit.

"They don't have the money-to fund this."

More cuts feared

That raises fears that the state could pay for the lawsuit by slashing education dollars in other areas, possibly foundation grants, a measure that Moore and Brand say could hurt Wayne-Westland.



The district already faces a deficit of about \$6 million when a 3-mill enhancement levy expires June 30.

"I'm concerned, because there's only one pot of money for public schools," Moore said, adding that the state could try to pay the \$532 million by "recovering money from other expenses."

In essence, the out-of-formula districts claimed in their suit that the Headlee Amendment prohibited the state from reducing aid to schools to below the pre-1978 levels.

Wayne-Westland, an in-formula district, didn't join the suit.

The case eventually made its way to the Michigan Court of Appeals, which remanded it to Macomb County Circuit Court. In 1989, Circuit Court Judge George Deneweth ruled that the state Department of Education cut categorical aid for such programs as drivers' education, special education transportation, school lunches and bilingual education to out-of-formula districts in order to help fund poorer, in-formula districts.

The districts said they should be entitled to be reimbursed for what they spent on the programs since 1979 when Headlee went into effect.

New funds not projected

In the Livonia school district, which serves northern Westland, Superintendent Ken Watson isn't betting on more money.

"I would be real pleased if we got a check, but it's not real likely," he said.

Watson said any or all of the following might now occur:

• The state could petition the Michigan Supreme Court to rehear the case.

• The state could attempt to negotiate a settlement, as it tried to do in the past but failed. The settlement wouldn't come close to what is owed the school districts because the state can't afford it, Watson said.

• The settlement could bring money into all school districts, not just the 84 that initiated the suit.

• To pay the settlement, the state could "rob Peter to pay Paul," perhaps cutting every school district's foundation grant, Watson said.

"It couldn't come at a worse time," said Lyn Bankes, R-Redford, a member of the House Appropriations subcommittee on school aid. She said the state was hoping to get two breaks from the federal government on welfare and Medicaid, but only the welfare break materialized.

"This will have an impact on the K-12 fund," Bankes said. "But it will have more impact on the rainy day fund, which is about \$1.3 billion. This could wipe out the rainy day fund."

No surprise

Rick Simonson, assistant superintendent for state and local affairs for the Oakland Intermediate School District, said of the Supreme Court ruling: "It was not a surprise to us but it clearly was to the administration. I was surprised that he (Engler) was surprised."

Simonson said most of the legal questions along with the amount the state owed had been settled long ago.

Simonson said he consulted with Dennis Pollard, attorney for plaintiffs, and arrived at the \$600 million figure the state owed them.

But there are unresolved claims from other school districts that weren't part of the original case, Simonson said.

How much the school districts may get is unknown.

Engler's administration "offered a year ago to settle for 10 cents on the dollar. The school districts held a meeting in Okemos and decided not to settle," Simonson said.

Although no one would say so publicly, it's possible the school districts might settle for one year's worth of special aid money. There is a precedent for this. When Engler took office in 1991, he settled a lawsuit by Oakland County for mental health money on the basis of one year's worth. Although she is a Democrat, DeHart said she has supported numerous Republican bills.

"I've learned to vote on the issues, not whose idea it was." she said.

LeMaitre questioned DeHart's conservative-minded claims and noted that she receives her campaign money from "liberal groups."

DeHart labeled herself "a proud Democrat" and accused LeMaitre of being "afraid to put the word Republican on his signs and literature."

LeMaitre responded that most voters choose a candidate based on issues, rather than political party.

On crime, LeMaitre said he supports a "truth-in-sentencing" law that takes repeat offenders off the streets, and he implied that DeHart is soft on crime.

DeHart said she has opposed crime legislation only when it was part of a larger package that she couldn't support, and she said criminals shouldn't be "coddled."

In response to a question, LeMaitre blamed "a computer error" on a piece of his campaign literature that referred to Westland as "Wasteland." The mistake wasn't caught before the fliers went to voters, and LeMaitre followed up with an apology.

"It was a grave error. It embarrassed me," he said.

DeHart and LeMaitre also addressed statements made by some suburban Wayne County officials, including Westland Mayor Robert Thomas, who have voiced possible support for seceding from the county.

Officials are upset that Detroit voters have the muscle to pass some countywide taxes, even though local voters reject them.

DeHart said secession would come at a high cost and that suburban communities still would have to pay debts to Wayne County.

LeMaitre said the proposal "has a lot of merit," but added that he wants to see a cost analysis before he could support it. In the long term, he said, better representation in county government may be the answer.

Crime issues discussed

On the death penalty, LeMaitre said he isn't a big supporter, partly because he's not convinced of the deterrence.

DeHart said she supports the death penalty only for heinous crimes such as the killing of onduty police officers.

DeHart and LeMaitre agreed on some issues. Both supported tax cuts for small businesses and possible entrance/exit ramps for Warren Road and I-275.

DeHart and LeMaitre also said they oppose a gas tax.

The House district includes most of Westland and the northeast corner of Canton Township.





Parents fight to help daughter



Six-year old Laura Pope goes to Grant Elementary each day accompanied by a nurse.

Since birth, Laura has had a rare breathing disorder which requires 24-hour monitoring. A nurse, paid for by her mother's insurance carrier, sits in Laura's first grade classroom at Grant and guards her during the school day.

After school her parents, Trish and Alan Pope of Fairfield, take over. They, too, know what to do if their daughter's face turns blue and she stops breathing.

Turns blue: Ever since birth, Laura Pope has been hooked to a ventilator and other machines when she goes to bed at night. Laura suffers a rare breathing disorder. congenital central hypoventilation syndrome. She has a hole in her neck for a breathing tube.



Laura has breathed at night through a respirator ever since she was born. She turned blue in the delivery room minutes after she was born in Providence Hospital.

On Wednesday, Laura and her parents sat in front of a hearing

officer at the school district's curriculum office in the former Perrinville School, Westland.

Within the next few weeks, the hearing officer will decide whether the Livonia school district must provide a nurse for Laura while she is in school.

Parents want care

The Popes believe this care is required under federal law for special education students. They wonder how the nursing bill will get paid once their own insurance runs out.

As part of their treatment plan for their daughter, the Popeshave asked the district to hire a nurse and house her at Grant. The nurse would also care for other children in the district who have medical problems.

Trish Pope said the district has rejected this proposal. Citing student confidentiality, Robert Dietiker, director of the department of student services, declined to discuss the case.

"We attempt to meet a child's unique needs; occasionally, there is a disagreement. We attempt to resolve it in the best interest of the child and consistent with our legal responsibilities."

Pope said the district, which serves the northern section of Westland, has proposed that Laura be monitored by Grant's teacher's aide and support staff and that a nurse consultant based in Southfield be paged in an emergency. Trish Pope fears that paging a nurse in another community will take too long.

Dietiker said the district hires nurses on a contractual basis. Currently, some are under contract, he said.

Appeal process cited

The Popes are fighting the district under an appeal process which kicks in under law when a school district and parents disagree on a special education child's treatment plan.

"With Laura, time is of the essence," Trish Pope said. "She could be brain dead - or dead -

within four-to-seven minutes."

Compounding the problem is Laura herself. Except for the hole in her throat, into which a breathing tube is always inserted, a stranger would never suspect Laura has a life-threatening medical problem. Laura's clothing often covers the plastic tube. The tube also is covered by a cap.

"She is so normal looking we, too, have to remind ourselves that she is at risk," Trish Pope said. "We live on the edge; she is somewhere between special education and normal."

Laura was born with congenital central hypoventilation syndrome, a breathing disorder so rare there are only about 200 persons in the U.S. with it. Trish Pope says there is only one other child in Michigan with the syndrome.

While sleeping, and sometimes during her waking hours, Laura gets a blue streak down her face and stops breathing. Given oxygen, she returns to normal.

She spent the first three months of her life at Children's Hospital.

At six weeks, she got a tracheotomy, where the breathing tube was inserted in her neck. Doctors would not release her until her parents learned how to take care of her.

When she came home, she was accompanied by a myriad of machines — ventilators, oxygen tanks, oxymeters, suction machines, monitors — and a doctor's order for 24-hour nursing care.

The Popes found themselves not only with a new, medically fragile baby, but with strangers in their home who came every day in shifts.

Alan Pope works for United Parcel Service in Livonia. His company's medical insurance expired three years ago, after spending \$500,000 on nursing care.

Trish Pope works for Ford Motor Company. Her Selectcare insurance is now paying the bill

for a school nurse, about \$34 an hour. The Popes aren't sure when their Selectcare benefits will be exhausted.

The Popes want the district to pay future nursing costs, as well as reimburse Selectcare for the nurse they paid for in Laura's kindergarten year at Grant.

Each morning, a special education school bus picks up Laura and her nurse at home and transports them to Grant.

The nurse, either Marsha Bey of Detroit or Laurie Klimowicz of Warren, carry Laura's books and stuff. Laura sports a backpack carrying her survival gear: resuscitation equipment, suction catheters, extra trach tubes and ties, saline drops.

An oxygen tank permanently sits in Constance Kenty's first grade classroom.

There is no ventilator at school. When a breathing problem arises, the nurse uses the equipment in Laura's medi-bag. "The bag serves as a portable

ventilator," Trish Pope said. The hearing resumes Oct. 8.

District ponders property sale

Livonia Public Schools tonight (Monday) could approve selling a small sliver of land west of Stevenson High to Grand River Baptist Church, 34500 Six Mile.

The 0.74 acre of land would give the church road access to a landlocked piece of property it owns north of the church, thus enabling the church to sell the land to residential developer Daniel DiComo for homes.

"It's a good neighbor policy," said Superintendent Ken Watson, whose district servesd the northern section of Westland.

"If we don't sell, the church doesn't develop its land. There's no reason not to be a good neighbor."

The potential sale comes after months of negotiations and after the district rejected DiComo's first offer to buy nearly three acres of district-owned land west of Stevenson to build homes.

That rejection by the school board led trustees to put in place guidelines for the sale of school property.

Under the guidelines, the district does not favor the sale of school-owned land. But it will sell land if there's a compelling reason to do so, the policy reads.

DiComo has backed down from his original offer

to buy 2.9 acres for \$125,000. Instead, he has agreed to pay \$39,114 for a long, narrow, 60-foot by 530-foot strip of land that is essentially useless to the district.

"They are buying an access road," Watson said. "The church will sell the other land it owns so that houses can be built. And the school still keeps its two acres. Stevenson will continue to have its football practice field; we are not interested in relocating it. Nor are we interested in selling the total acreage."

DiComo originally planned to combine the school land with land bought from the church to build homes. He had proposed spending about \$12,000 to relocate the practice football field.

The land sale may lead to the extension of Vargo into the Stevenson High school lot and the possible expansion of the Stevenson parking lot, said David Watson, director of operations.

The district expects to finalize details of the sale for Monday's board meeting, Watson said.

DiComo's offer is subject to renegotiations with the church and to final approval by the city of Livonia.

After rejecting DiComo's first offer, the trustees decided to study the entire area of land sales and put in place a policy to guide them when the next offer surfaced. The district is one of the city's biggest property owners.



Voters to decide 6 statewide ballot proposals

Proposal A:

Political bingo

A "yes" vote will: Prohibit political parties and candidates from conducting bingo games as fund-raisers. (Churches and charitable groups would still be allowed to conduct games.)

Sought by: Democrats, who seek a "no" vote to overturn a 1994 Republican-passed bill in the Legislature. Party organizations, mostly Democratic, have been raising \$30 million to \$40 million a year. Democrats argue that political activity is a perfectly proper use for bingo proceeds, lessening the parties' dependence on lobbyists and cor-

porate backers.

Opponents say: Bingo players are duped into supporting Democratic organizations. Partisan bingos divert'money from churches and charities. The number of bingos would be little affected because political organizations account for only 5 percent of the take.

Proposal B:

Qualified judges

A "yes" vote will: Amend the Michigan Constitution to require that judicial candidates be licensed attorneys for at least five years. (Currently, the Constitution requires only that they

be licensed and may not run after reaching age 70.)

Sought by: The Legislature, which put the proposal on the ballot by a two-thirds vote of each chamber. Purpose is to assure judges have legal experience before deciding others' cases. Supporters say inexperienced "name" candidates, fresh from law school, have been winning judicial elections on bedsheet ballots, notably in Wayne

County **Opponents say:** The proposal doesn't guarantee experience because it says a candidate need only be "licensed" five years. A smart candidate with four years of experience in major litigation would be excluded from the ballot. No group, however, has openly opposed the proposals.

Proposal C:

Vets' trust fund

A "yes" vote will: Amend the

Michigan Constitution to prohibit the veterans' trust fund from downturns. Most of the fund being used for anything but emergency grants to military veterans, their widows or dependents.

Sought by: The Legislature, which established the fund at \$50 million in 1946 but has borrowed from it during the economic downturns of 1959 and 1976.

Opponents say: No known opposition has developed. Intellectually, it can be argued that the Legislature is tying its own hands and making tax increases

more necessary during economic that was borrowed was used for veterans' programs anyway.

Proposal D:

Bear restrictions

(See also Proposal G below.) A "yes" vote will: Prohibit the use of bait piles and dogs for hunting black bear in Michigan. It also will shorten the bear season to three weeks in September. Sought by: CUB (Citizens)

Judge throws out lawsuit, **McMaster** seeks appeal

A tax crusader charging Wayne County officials with undermining laws to push forward the Detroit Lions-Tiger stadium deal said politics influenced a judge's ruling last week that his lawsuit was frivolous.

Circuit Court Judge Cynthia Stephens said the lawsuit filed by William McMaster, chairman of the Michigan Taxpayers United, was "at best groundless and at worst bad faith.'

The suit argued, among many allegations, that the Wayne County Commission violated the Open Meetings Act when it approved a legal agreement for a new dual stadium.

"The error on the part of the judge is so blatant that it should be short work on the Michigan Court of Appeals," McMaster said. "In an appeal we will at least have a three-judge panel and it will be out of the influence of the Wayne County Democrats." Mike Duggan, Deputy Wayne County executive, said he will seek legal fees, some \$10,000, for Wayne County attorneys working on the case. "We don't think the taxpayers should have to pay for a frivolous case," Duggan said. "I think the people in Wayne County should be comfortable that everything that we did was perfectly legal." Duggan charged McMaster with using the courts to get free publicity for his fight against a ballot proposal for the Nov. 5 election asking voters to use tax dollars to pay the \$505 million for the dual Lions-Tiger stadium. The proposal calls for 52 percent of costs to come from private entities and 48 percent from public funding. It is misleading to call it the "tourist tax," McMaster said, because it will include taxes on car rentals, as well as truck rentals, which are primarily used by Wayne County residents.





Grant paves way for Lincoln collection

Those hoping to bring a whopping collection of Abraham Lincoln items to Plymouth just got a boost from Ford Motor Co.

"We are very excited and happy to report that we received our grant from the Ford Motor Company Fund for \$50,000 toward the Petz Lincoln Acquisition," said Plymouth Historical Museum Director Beth Stewart.

Since museum backers had already raised \$27,000, money raised so far totals just more than half of the \$150,000 they've targeted to raise in the next year.

"We're working on other grants. We have a grant request into the State Bar of Michigan, we're looking at other possibilities," Stewart said.

The Ford grant was secured with the help of Plymouth Historical Society President Dan LeBlond, who works at the Ford

plant's community relations committee.

The Plymouth museum is trying to obtain the collection of approximately 20,000 Lincolnrelated items compiled by Oakland County's Weldon Petz.

His collection has twice been exhibited at the Plymouth museum. The last showing was last spring and summer.

"The size of the collection is pretty incredible," Stewart said. "It includes exhibit items as well as documents, photographs and research material."

Among some standout pieces are a book Lincoln owned as a child and a plaster cast or mask of Lincoln's face and hands. "It also includes some of the greatest in-depth research material on Lincoln compiled in one place," Stewart said.

Hooper and the female passenger were both transported to Annapolis Hospital for treatment. Branum wasn't injured. Matheny said alcohol and drugs were not a factor in the accident, which occurred at 10:15 p.m.

"At this time it appears that both of the drivers were equally responsible," said Matheny. Branum and Hooper are both scheduled for preliminary examination on Monday, Oct. 14.

Backers say Casino Windsor, in Ontario, is attracting 19,000 customers a day, 76 percent from the U.S. An 18 percent tax on casinos' gross would be split with 55 percent going to the city, 45 percent to the school aid fund. Issues dominate local ed forum

BY TIM RICHARD STAFF WRITER

Candidates for trustees of Michigan State University disagree on charter schools and whether MSU has done enough to hold down tuition for the middle class.

Most favor open meetings except when it comes to interviewing candidates for president.

The four answered questions at a Sept. 26 forum sponsored by the Livonia branch of the American Association of University Women,

Charter schools

They were asked by moderator Yvonne Constas why MSU hasn't joined Central Michigan University in the parade to issue charters to public school academies.

David Porteous (R), incumbent, called Michigan "a leader in charter schools" and said MSU should charter agricultural high schools because many local school districts have ended agricultural offerings. "We have a long partnership with agriculture," he said.

Joel Ferguson (D) said he's "opposed to charter schools across the board. We should strengthen public schools."

Colleen Pero (R) supports charter schools. "They can enhance public education. Charter schools will force public schools to be the best they can be.'

Robert Weiss (D), incumbent, is "opposed to charter schools

that are not under a local (K-12) system with an elected board. Charter schools will try to take the cream (good students) off the top. We need better public education, and charter schools are not conducive to that."

Tuition hikes

Candidates were asked about years of tuition increases that have exceeded inflation.

Pero (R): "Tuition is up tremendously; it's almost unaffordable. It should rise no more than the cost of inflation. We (the board) need to look at cost containment. . . We have to be affordable. We should never put athletics ahead of academics."

Weiss (D): "Eight years ago, I ran on this issue. I have voted against more tuition increases than any other trustee." MSU guarantees it will not increase tuition faster than the rate of general price inflation as long as state appropriations keep pace. The state provided 60 percent of MSU's operating budget eight years ago; now it provides 50 percent. "The pack has shifted to the backs of the middle class. . . I will fight for lower tuition."

Porteous (R): "Tuition has

ugson have been on the board." He approved of the policy of guaranteeing tuition won't rise faster than the rate of inflation as long as state aid keeps pace. "Tuition increases should be kept at a minimum."

Ferguson (D): "The most important step was in picking a president (who would hold down costs). I called a banker, a businessman (to be president.) Pete McPherson did many sound things and is a sound manager. ... I picked a lifelong Republican to be president who will go down in history as another John Hannah."

Open interviews

MSU trustees face a suit for holding closed meetings prior to hiring a president. The Open Meetings Act requires that all deliberations, and all interviews of presidential candidates, be conducted in public. Candidates were asked their views on the law.

Porteous (R): "As an attorney, I've represented municipalities on the Open Meetings Act. I've never known a municipality to get in trouble with open meetings."

Ferguson (D): "I hope Mr. Porbeen a spiraling cost. There teous will never have the oppor10 or final seven (be interviewed in the open). We shouldn't be destroying individuals' careers."

Pero (R): "Meetings must be open. But I agree with Ferugson: We need a period to have preliminary discussions without putting people's lives on hold; you endanger their present job (with open interviews). When selecting a president, preliminary discussions should be behind closed doors."

Weiss (D): "It's the people's business. But in selecting a president, allegations are made but not proven. . . to destroy ' that person's life. The three " finalists should be interviewed in the open."

Cooperation

Can Michigan's 15 institutions of higher education cooperate?

Ferguson (D): "The greatest failure was for MSU to think it's the University of Michigan. As we work with our agricultural component, we have undertaken an urban component (in Flint). We should recognize our own niche."

Pero (R): "Chinese studies is " not big at MSU; it is at U-M. Some of these decisions (winnowing out duplicative programs) are going to be tough."

Weiss (D): MSU has 41,000 students. Of those, 30,000 are . undergraduates. Our primary purpose is undergraduate education. We can't lose sight of that; 85 percent of our students are from Michigan."

Porteous (R): "A partnership is long over due. The adversarial relationship (between universities) has to change. We have a partnership with Northwestern Michigan Community College in Traverse City in offering classes."



"I can offer a woman very private, very customized wardrobe service at her convenience," she said. "This is investment dressing at its finest."


Jacqueline Fleming of Scotland, stopped by to check out Madeleine's fall collection. Her husband recently transferred the family to Michigan on business.







After dinner, Bianca brought out an assortment of luscious desserts, which included a homemade-looking cherry pie. Needless to say, the pie looked irresistible. Kudos were offered to the baker, and in my ubiquitous wisdom, I announced that it was one of the best "homemade" cherry pies I had ever tasted.

I was partially correct, it was homemade, but made with frozen pie crust and canned pie filling.

When people feel they must make a "real" dessert, they are usually looking for something simple and wonderful, two qualities often seen as mutually exclusive. I like a cake that takes about four seconds to put together and gives somewhat of an ambrosial result on the tongue. Fortunately, such cakes exist and are generally found at someone else's home.

Recipes

You then ask for the recipe and serve it to other friends who, in turn, pass it on to yet others. This is the way families and friends are unified and relationships made solid.

Undoubtedly you know of what I speak if you've ever asked for the recipe for Hot Artichoke Dip, "Better than Sex" Cake, or the latest craze, an Oriental salad made with Ramen noodles, shredded cabbage, sesame oil and chopped nuts.

My dear friend Jane Brown of Canton, whose idea of cooking dinner is making reservations, brought the Oriental salad to a summer barbecue and not only received raves but also requests for the recipe.

These are the types of recipes that turn up most at bridal and baby showers, the types of recipes that belong in church or civic organization cookbooks. These are tried-and-true recipes that, if nothing else, are what we remember our grandmas, aunts and long-departed friends by.

The recipes are usually made with canned soups, packaged noodles, enough butter to evoke a warning from the Surgeon General's office, and most of all, with minimal effort.

Yes, I must admit, I'll be willing to wait for dessert until the proverbial cows come home. I belong to the group of cooks whose one claim to fame is that if we go to the trouble of making dinner, then why not go the distance and make dessert?

After one has trussed the chicken, washed the lettuce, made the dressing, mashed the potatoes, chopped or peeled the vegetables, the dessert is the fun part.

A store-bought dessert is definitely cheating, but you don't have to be a pastry chef to prepare a luscious dessert. It's perfectly acceptable to use store-bought ingredients like frozen pie crusts and canned pie filling to make desserts with minimal effort that taste like homemade. Be creative: There are lots of options. Box cake mixes can be dressed up with chocolate chips and cherries.

HOT STUFF!

Chili peppers like tomatoes, corn, potatoes and tobacco were a gift to the rest of the world from Native Americans.

When Columbus returned to Spain in 1493, he took chili peppers; these peppers were more pungent than anything then known in that part of the world.

Will Rogers called chili "the bowl of blessedness." He believed that more Pilgrims would have survived that first winter on the Cape if they would have had chili as part of their diet.

Great debates have been waged over what constitutes authentic chili, and only the presence of chili peppers is undisputed.

Chili peppers aren't peppers. Technically they are fruits, members of the genus Capsicum. The distinguishing characteristic of peppers comes from the presence of capsicum, a clear highly pungent substance; the more of this stuff, the hotter the pepper. A tremendous number of medicinal values have been attributed to chilies. People believed chili peppers relieved gas, eased childbirth, removed warts and pimples, healed stings, and prevented cavities. In fact, chilies are a good source of vitamins A and C, and it is thought that regular chili consumption might be helpful in regulating cholesterol levels in the blood. True chili lovers need no scientific validations; they know that true chili induces a sense of spiritual and physical well-being that transcends analysis.

Chilies are harvested in September. The brilliant flame of chili ristras (strings) hanging from porches and rafters is said to rival the beauty of fall leaves.
 True chili cooks know that chili recipes are really like the melodies heard at a jazz performance. One starts with the basic structure (the chili pepper) and improvises by adding a variety of ingredients. The final blend is unique and like jazz, each rendition is like no other.

Amador Foothill wines offer value

We're sure you've noticed escalation in the price of California wines, especially those carrying prestigious Napa and Sonoma County appellations. We've talked to top winery personnel. Among their explanations are: grape supply down 25 percent due to short crops and vineyards not bearing due to phylloxera-caused replanting. They don't deny that because they're selling every drop of wine they make, they're reacting to the supply and demand law of economics and raising prices.

Whatever, we're not going to see prices come down until replanted vineyards are in full production or California has a mediocre, but large harvest, such as it had in 1989 or there's an economic recession. None of these operatives are at work for the 1996 harvest, so it may be two to three years before we see prices heading south.

What's a California wine lover to do? Among the many suggestions (and we will be presenting more as future columns take shape) is to look for wines especially for sauvignon blanc, zinfandel (and this variety has really been affected by skyrocketing prices elsewhere), sangiovese and other Cal-Ital wines (Italian varieties planted in California).

If you've not heard about or tried the wines of Amador Foothill Winery in Amador County, let us introduce you. The winery is on western slopes of the Sierra Nevada mountains. Owners are the husband and wife team of Ben Zeitman and Katie Quinn. Ben, a former NASA chemist, founded the 9,000 case per year winery in 1980. Katie, armed with a master's degree in enology from the University of California at Davis, joined in 1986 when she and Ben were married. With her, she brought several years of winemaking experience. Today, they do most of the vineyard work themselves and are passionate about sangiovese.

In 1991, they grafted over four acres of 12-year-old cabernet sauvignon (not the greatest grape from Amador) to three clonal selections of sangiovese. This is one of the best managed sangiovese vineyards in all of California. The goal here is to produce Tuscan character fer with Italian winemakers.

"We like sangiovese on its own from our property and have no intention of blending with another varietal such as cabernet sauvignon," Katie said. "We like the purity of the fruit and its distinctive character."

But it is zinfandel that is famed in Amador and Amador Foothills Winery makes two vineyard-designates, Ferrero, carrying the Shenandoah Valley appellation and Eschen, from the Fiddletown area. Two whites are particularly stylish; Amador Fume (a blend of 75 percent sauvignon blanc and 25 percent semillon) and 100 percent barrelfermented Semillon. All wines show tremendous flavor depth.

You're reading on for the prices aren't you? The 1994 Amador Fume is \$8.50; 1994 Semillon is \$10; 1994 Sangiovese (released October 1) is \$14, but you may still be able to find the 1993 at some shops for \$12. Both 1993 Zinfandels are \$12.





Stylish look can't save 'Rich Man's Wife'

Worthy contenders in the Worst Movie of the Year sweepstakes, and Hollywood Pictures' "The Rich Man's Wife" rates as a 2-1 entry.

Supposedly a sexy excursion in murder and double-cross, the movie amounts to little more than a laughable flop, replete with cliche-challenged dialogue and plot elements that borrow from every film-noir movie as well as all thrillers involving spousal murder and life among the rich.

"The Rich Man's Wife" was written by Amy Holden Jones. who wrote the wonderful "Mystic Pizza." Then again, she also made her directorial debut with "Slumber Party Massacre" and wrote the unbelievable screenplay for "Indecent Proposal." (How many women would actually leave handsome, charming and rich Robert Redford for loser Woody Harrelson?)

The movie opens as a flashback. Beautiful Josie Potenza (Halle Berry) sits in a police station, waives all her rights to silence and having an attorney (get real) and announces she wants "to tell the truth." How cute. So she tells us the story of how her wealthy, alcoholic, beerbelly husband Tony gets murdered.

in a gorgeous home in the Pacific Palisades, is surrounded by beautiful art, wears expensive jewelry and clothes, and can have anything she wants _ except her husband's attention. Tony (Christopher McDonald) is a slave to his work at a TV studio _ and he's a womanizer.

Josie, meanwhile, is having an affair with a British restaurateur, Jake (Clive Owen), in whose business Tony has invested. But Josie won't leave him because she signed a prenuptial agreement in which she gets nothing if she leaves Tony.

But Josie is a plucky gal. She decides to forgive Tony, try to make things better, and stick it out. "I love my husband," she repeats often in the movie.

Tony, in his own sloppy way. also loves Josie. She persuades him to go away to the mountains with her for an intimate vacation. It all falls apart when Tony decides to rush back to his office. Josie, forlorn and angry, heads for the nearest bar where she meets a psycho named Cole (Peter Greene).

Against all good judgment, she that's good.

to lead a wonderful life. She lives headlights and speeds along a curvy mountain road. Once home, he tries to rape Josie and she pulls a gun on him, nicking him in the cheek.

> Bad move. Cole murders Tony. He then visits Josie demanding \$30,000 or else he'll go to the police and tell them that she had hired him. Josie goes along with the demand and takes Jake into her confidence. Another bad move.

> With a series of dumb decisions, predictable plots twists and totally unrealistic police procedure, "The Rich Man's Wife" tumbles to its logical conclusion. There's an ending that's supposed to be a surprise. But you can smell it a mile away.

"The Rich Man's Wife" has a stylish look and Berry is a beautiful adornment. But neither can save the movie.

A positive note to the filmmakers: It is good to see race isn't an issue in this movie. Josie is a role that could be filled by a white actress or black actress, as Berry is. Josie also could be European, Asian, Latin, Arab or African. Doesn't matter. And

Madonna spikers shine

Livonia Stevenson's 28-21 victory Friday night at Walled Lake Central can be summed up on paper in two words: Gade Clark. On paper, the senior running back carried the load, rushing for 239 yards and four touchdowns on 42 carries. But Clark was the first to admit that although the numbers look nice, he didn't do it all by himself.

"We've got a big line and they were giving me some nice holes,' said Clark, who rushed for 238 yards on 38 carries last week in Stevenson's 34-13 victory over Farmington. "Their defensive ends were flying outside so we just ran our power. The line was opening the holes and (senior fullback) Mike Allison was blocking well, too."

Central coach Darrell Harper had nothing but praise for the 5-foot-9, 200-pound Clark.

"He's a horse," said Harper. "He's so compact and strong. That's the best I've seen him play. He's just physical and he overpowered us tonight. Many times we had him in the hole, but he just kept going."

Although Clark carried the load offensively, it was Stevenson's defense that set up three of the four Spartan touchdowns. Junior defensive end Courtney Reed recovered a Central fumble at the Viking 40yard-line early in the game, which led to a 5-yard touchdown run by Clark. Senior defensive tackle Ehren Kuespert recovered a Central fumble at the Walled Lake 25-yard-line on Central's opening possession of the second half, which led to a 1yard TD run by Clark. And with the score tied at 21-21 with 2:50 left in the game, Stevenson senior defensive back Matt Allison came up with an interception at the Central 40, which led to the winning TD on a 2yard run by Clark. Clark's other touchdown came on a 3-yard run and tied the score at 21-21 with 3:01 remaining in the fourth quarter. Senior place-kicker Seth Carriere kicked all four extra points.

"You can't discount our defensive effort tonight," said Stevenson coach Tim Gabel. "Central has an explosive offense. They run Darrell's system very well. Our defense played a good game and they came up with some big plays, especially Allison's interception."

That interception ended what was otherwise a brilliant night for Central quarterback Adam Bruce. The senior signal-caller had completed 17-of-19 passes for 144 yards and a touchdown up to the point of the interception. He finished 17-of-22.

"With three minutes to go we didr't want to sit on it. We didn't want to hold the ball and wait for overtime, we wanted to win the game," explained Harper. "Adam had a great game, he just threw that one a little too tall."

After Stevenson opened the scoring, Central tied the game at 7-7 on a 1-yard run by Bruce. Stevenson took a 14-7 lead on Clark's 1-yard TD, but the Vikings again rebounded with a 67-yard scoring drive on its next possession. Senior Billy Sanders capped the drive with a 19yard touchdown run around left end. Central jumped ahead 21-14 with 9:10 left in the game when Bruce connected with his sophomore brother Nathan with an 8-yard touchdown pass.

Both teams are 3-2 overall and 2-1 in the Lakes Division of the Western Lakes Activities Association.

Madonna University's volleyball team got into sync in the second game and put away host Wayne State Thursday, 12-15, 15-8, 15-11, 15-12.

"This was a big win for us," said Madonna coach Jerry Abraham.

The win pushed Madonna's record to 21-2. The NCAA Division II Tartars slipped to 9-4 overall.

Once again, strong play in the middle from Julie Martin (from Livonia Stevenson) and Kelly McCausland (Redford Union), and on the outside from Heather Steinhelper and Karin Sisung, combined with Meg Paris' superb setting to provide the Lady Crusaders with the offensive edge.

Martin finished with a team-high 19 kills and 14 blocks. Lutheran Westland escapes, 14-13

Injuries, suspensions and turnovers couldn't prevent Lutheran High Westland from winning its fourth straight football game Friday night.

The Warriors had a close shave, holding off a determined Livonia Clarenceville football team, 14-13. The win gives Lutheran Westland

a 4-1 record in the Metro Conference. It's also the best start in school history.

Clarenceville, although 1-4 on the year, put up quite a struggle and nearly pulled out the win during the final minute of action before its homecoming crowd.

The Trojans drove 77 yards in 10 plays, capped by Donahue Fulton's 8-yard touchdown run with 1:00 to go, pulling the Trojans to within one, 14-13.

Clarenceville coach Chuck Donaldson then called timeout and didn't hesitate going for the win, especially after the Trojans earlier muffed a pair of short field goal attempts.

Clarenceville quarterback Paulo Hernandez, who kept the drive alive with a clutch 13-yard scramble, lined his team up for the go-ahead two-pointer.

He took the snap, but never had a chance to make a play as nose guard Bill Garlick and linebacker Albert Cook stopped him dead in his tracks.

"We really couldn't put our goal" line defense in," said Lutheran Westland second-year coach Scott Wiemer, who switched from a six- retake the lead when King's 29-yard

Lutheran Westland, using emergency starter Gordon Engel, a sophomore filling in for the suspended Luke Horton, engineered a 54yard, eight-play drive

Engel hit Kevin Wade out of the backfield for a key 10-yard gain on fourth down and tossed a 19-yard TD strike to Cook the senior tailback, with 7:42 to go in the half, for a TD.

Cook, who led all rushers with 118 yards in 14 carries, then ran in for the two-pointer for an 8-7 Warriors' advantage.

The sport utility vehicle craze is far from over. More and more families with kids over the age of 5 are finding sport utes fill the bill better than any other vehicle.

The only problem I see, however, is the price. Most sport utes cost over \$25,000. But then again, so do quite a few minivans on the market today.

Nonetheless, sport utilities are the smart choice for most families. And nearly every auto manufacturer offers one, so the choice is vast. One feature everyone loves is four wheel drive on their sport utes.

Enter the 1997 Oldsmobile Bravada. Well engineered, quiet, a good ride, pretty good performance, a smart interior and fulltime four-wheel-drive make the front engined Bravada a force to reckon with in the sport utility marketplace.

Bravada is now outfitted with a retractable rear cargo cover, a convenient cargo net to keep everything in place and a really neat protective cargo area mat to keep everything clean. The mat also has molded sides, so that if anything spills, it's all contained within the mat. Really great idea.

Under the hood there's a 4.3 liter V6 capable of 190 horsepower mated to a electronically controlled 4-speed automatic transmission with SmartTrak. The shifter is on the floor, by the way. You can't race that Mitsubishi 3000GT next to you revving up at access. Oldsmobile incorporated a the light, but it does provide adeone piece liftgate that includes quate power for driving around

town. To help in reduced theft Oldsmobile has Bravada's VIN markings to the engine, transmission, front fenders, doors, tailgate, bumpers, hood and both bodyside assemblies.

Safety features include driver's side air bag, anti-lock brake system; remote keyless lock control, illuminated entry, rear door child security locks and intermittent wipers with rear wiper/washer.

Other standard features include a luggage rack with adjustable cross bars, AM/FM cassette with 6 speakers, air conditioning, cruise control, power door locks and liftgate release, power mirrors, fog lamps, leather tilt steering wheel, deep tinted glass in the rear doors and tailgate, daytime running lamps, driver and passenger illuminated front visor mirrors, floor mats both front and rear, front side window defoggers and electric rear window defogger, power side windows with driver automatic down and power lockout, solar treated windshield, two front towing hooks and five wire trailer towing harness.

The Oldsmobile Bravada is a true contender in the sport utility ring. A bit pricey at almost \$30,000, but with all that equipment, you're not getting short-. changed.
