Quake has family mourning

| BY SCOTT DAVIEL <br> STAFF WRITER sdanieleoe <br> Like millions around the world, Saet Kerimouski sat helpless this week unable to aid family and friends in earthquake-ravaged Turkey. <br> All the Canton man could do was to keep trying to reach loved ones via the telephone and wait for their calis. Finally, late Tuesday afternoon, a fuil day after the killer quake, he heard from his sister. <br> "My sister said they had to leave the area," Kerimouski said. "She was calling from a motel about 25 miles away." <br> His sister lives in the town of Yaloya, which sits well within the 400 -mile northwest region of Turkey affected by the earthquake. <br> "She said they had bad damages to lots of buildings," Kerimouski said. <br> A native of Macedonia, he has 50 fantily members living in Turkey. Four from his wife's side of the family were killed <br> Kerimouski, 46, said he also lost several friends to the quake, which registered 7.4 on the Richter scale. <br> "We lost four family nembers," he said, "and seven people I knew personally." <br> Ironically, Kerimouski and his family returned from a seven-week vacation in Turkey on Aug. 6 . <br> "It wasn't meant for us to be there", he said. <br> While he was in Turkey, it was hit by an earthquake registering 4.1. <br> "They are common in that area,". Very time an old building is torn ad. But he's not one to sit Beaton recreates the structures in brick reclaimed from the original buildings
You'd never know by looking at the d executive tower of he Hudson's building that Beaton couldn't even draw or paint during his early years when he lived in Livonia and then Farmington Station or his old elementary school in Station or his old elementary school
Ontario, the carving comes to life when Beaton takes the project into his hands.
"I can't stand to see these old places destroyed," said Beaton, who noi
lives in Chatham-Kent, Ont. "I remember all these growing up. Espe-

That's when he decided to turn his talents to carving.

of wall hanging depicting the ruins of an ancient brick building had stuck
in his mind since visiting an art store in Chicago in 1991. But it wasn't until they demolished Cody Elementary School in Sault Ste, Marie, Ontario in
1995 that the memory of that wall art began to.spark his creativity. After retrieving several bricks from Cody, his old school, as souvenirs, Beaton went to work carving the features of
the structure into the bricks that were once part of it.
Time-consuming art When the Hudson's building was on rescued 25 of the bricks. So far, he's carved seven of them. Using a dremel tool with various cutting wheels, grinding bits and diamond points, Beaton replicates the details of
the architecture.
