Baracy: District as 'good' as others

Greg Baracy had a message for the more than 100 people in the audience: The Wayne-Westland schools are "as good as any schools in the state.'

The message was aimed at the Realtors in the audience and aimed at dispelling the perception that the district is of lesser quality than its neighbors to the north and west.

"I want to share with you that we have outstanding schools," said the Wayne-Westland superintendent. "We're right there at the state average overall, but many of our schools are above state average.

"Our grades are as good as any other school district and that should be shared with par-

Baracy made his comments during the district's annual Realtors luncheon, held at Taft-Galloway Elementary School in Wayne.

Realtors from throughout the district were invited to Taft-Galloway to see and hear about the Wayne-Westland schools. They also were entertained by a skit, Our Community, presented by first-graders, and thirdgrade musical performance of Home on the Range.

While Baracy reported that the state of the school district is "excellent," he expressed disappointment about its perception, noting that school officials over the last several years are hearing from more and more par-

Cicirelli: '... no gloom or doom here'

Mayor touts budget surplus, promises 'big plans' in 2005

The city of Westland is continuing to improve services, trim spending, boost its budget surplus and lure new businesses, despite cuts in state revenue, rising fuel bills and higher costs for employee health insurance.

That's the message Mayor Sandra Cicirelli delivered Wednesday to a crowd of 350-400 people who gave her a standing ovation during her fourth State of the City address at the city's Friendship Center.

There's no doom and gloom here in Westland," Cicirelli said, giving an upbeat, 30-minute speech just seven months before she hopes to win re-election to a second, four-year mayoral term.

Cicirelli reflected on a year of positive accomplishments despite tough economic times, and, she pledged, "we have big plans for the year ahead."

She touted her administration's ability to trim spending and boost a general budget surplus that is projected to reach

Teacher of the Year.


His students prepared the hors d'oeuvres for Wednesday's State of the City address, and he called his pupils on-stage with him after they yelled enthusiastically as his award was announced.

Westland motorcyclist dies in collision with car

A 31-year-old motorcyclist from Westland died as a result of injuries suffered in a Friday night crash at Telegraph and Schoolcraft Road in Redford.

Police say it appears Brandon Jaynes, driving a Kawasaki motorcycle, ran a red light while heading south on Telegraph about 10:45 p.m. The motorcycle struck the passenger-side rear fender area of a westbound 1998 Pontiac Grand Am, said Redford Capt. Kraig Brueck.

The Grand Am was driven by a Detroit woman who was heading through the intersection on a

green light, Brueck said.

Jaynes was thrown from the motorcycle. He was taken by ambulance to Garden City Hospital, where he was pronounced dead.

There were no indications at the scene that drugs or alcohol played a role in the crash, but police are awaiting toxicology tests, Brueck said.

The Grand Am's driver was not under the influence, Brueck said. There were no passengers in the

car, and the driver was not hurt. Police are also trying to determine the speed of

Jaynes' motorcycle at the time.

No charges are expected in the case. The victim appeared to be traveling with another motorcyclist who also ran the red light but didn't stop after the crash, Brueck said. Police are trying to find that person, but the only description they have

is of someone on a racing-style motorcycle. Anyone who knows the identity of the second motorcyclist can call Redford's police traffic bureau at (313) 387-2560.

Weathercaster Sonny Eliot joins journalism hall of fame

He's a Detroit area icon who lives in Farmington Hills. And, yes, Sonny Eliot still makes the Motor City giggle with his unique style of broadcasting the weather.

After more than 50 years in the business, he's still, unquestionably, Sonny — big smiles with quips and anecdotes

delivered in lightning speed. And now Eliot will be honored among his peers as he was scheduled to be inducted into the Michigan Journalism Hall of Fame this weekend.

For Eliot, who still forecasts the weather for WWJ-AM (950), the honor is touching.

"This has more meaning to me than any other award I've been given," he said. "I really am humbled by it. I'm delighted and grateful."

Eliot, who has lived with his wife, Annette, in Farmington Hills for the past 15 years, took a moment at the WWJ studios in Southfield to talk about his career, weather forecasting and what he thinks of TV news

WHEN TV WAS NEW

Eliot was around when television was a brand-new medium and news broadcasts were a novel concept. He managed to finagle his way in to host a golf show even though he never picked up a club before.

One thing led to another as local television started to blossom and news segments were born. He eventually landed the weather forecasting job for then WWJ-TV.

Back then, weather segments were considered throwaway items to fill up space, he said.

"I try to give it a little personality," Eliot said of his

patented style. "It's a dull numbers game otherwise."

For the broadcaster, doing anything besides reading temperatures was necessary to keep the listener paying atten-

The bottom line, he wanted to make it interesting and give people a reason to smile.

"I'd throw in lines and lead it to something regarding the weather," he said of his unmatched talent to segue bits into a forecast.

It took a while for station managers back in the early 1950s to realize that people really were interested in weath-

er after all. "Suddenly it became sell-

able," Eliot said,

His years of experience being a pilot in World War II made him knowledgeable of weather

forecast charts and the like. In the early days, forecasts only went up to three days at best.

He worked for former WWJ, now WDIV-TV (Channel 4), from 1949-81 then went to WJBK-TV (Channel 2) for a couple of years.

FUN IN THE PRODUCT

Roger Sherman, an account manager at WWJ, said people still love hearing Sonny deliver the weather forecast because he doesn't take it so seriously.

"He makes something fun out of 72 degrees and sunny," Sherman said. "He puts fun in the product."

Sherman said there aren't too many Detroit legends left. And Eliot is right up there with famed Detroit Tigers broadcaster Ernie Harwell and former news broadcaster Bill

Bonds. Not surprising, all three are friends.

Sherman also said he considers Eliot a true American hero as he was a B-24 bomber pilot during World War II. Eliot spent 18 months as a prisoner of war after he was shot down on a mission.

But for Eliot, the past is the

He'd rather talk about how news has changed since the good old days.

"They blur the line between entertainment and news," Eliot said of today's television news

Nonetheless, he said he's glad he's in radio, where real news still lives on.

"It's an enjoyable job," he





\$1.5 million during the next year, rebounding from the \$200,000 mark early in her

City employees will be implementing a new water meter-reading system that will streamline the service and help to pinpoint problem areas plagued by unusually high usage and costs, Cicirelli said.

Moreover, she has proposed a water-sewer rate increase of only 4 cents per 1,000 gallons, just enough to cover increases passed on to Westland from the city of Detroit. The minimal increase is smaller than rate hikes imposed in recent

Cicirelli pledged that residents will have a few more dollars in their wallets under her plan to reduce the city's garbage-disposal tax by a quarter-mill. Disposal costs have dropped from \$63 a ton to \$47 as Westland has shifted from incineration to a landfill.

"I think we should share these savings with our residents," the mayor said, drawing applause from her audience.

Cicirelli predicted that the old Cooper School, closed since 1991 on contaminated land on Ann Arbor Trail east of Middlebelt, will be demolished

this summer. She said state officials have approved a work plan to remediate the 37-acre site and prepare it for new development, including a senior citizen apartment complex, a medical office building and a golf driving range.

"We want to ensure that the cleanup is done properly and safely," she said, adding later, "We believe we are headed for a major success here.

On health care, Cicirelli lauded a discount prescription drug program, offered through the city, that she said has helped 900 residents save an average of 33 percent. She said the plan will be expanded this year to help small businesses.

In efforts to spruce up the city, the mayor will soon propose a blight-control ordinance intended to help officials tackle the problem of empty buildings. She said citations will be issued to delinquent property owners, and a review board will be established to resolve cases.

Cicirelli has proposed beefing up the public safety departments by buying 10 new police cars, refurbishing two emergency medical units and buying several new vehicles for the public service and building departments.

In another public safety measure, she vowed to jumpstart a citizens neighborhood watch program.

The mayor voiced pride that more than 60 new businesses chose to locate in Westland during the last year, and she said she is optimistic that the trend will continue. The Target store, on Warren Road west of Wayne, plans to add a pharmacy and grocery line in a vacant storefront next door.

Cicirelli pledged that efforts to improve roads will continue. One of the next projects will be resurfacing Henry Ruff Road between Cherry Hill and Palmer, she said.

Although Westland became one of Michigan's cities hardest hit by diseased ash trees, she praised Public Services Director Tom Wilson's department with an untiring effort to cut down all 3,200 city trees plagued by the disease.

To help the frail and elderly, the city already has benefited from a federal government program that provided vouchers to help seniors with housing and other needs. She said another 40 seniors will be helped during the coming year.

Westland will continue to face many of the problems it has weathered, the mayor said, including tight finances and rising expenses.

Even so, she said, "we have made a lot of progress, and we plan to keep that momentum going."



AN ORDINANCE RENEWING A CABLE FRANCHISE WITH MACLEAN HUNTER CABLE TV INC., WHOSE NAME HAS CHANGED TO COMCAST OF TAYLOR, LLC.

WHEREAS, in July, 1982 the City of Garden City ("City") awarded a cable franchise to Maclean Hunter Cable TV, Inc., a Michigan corporation whose name has now changed to Comcast of Taylor, LLC ("Comcast"), which franchise now includes the Cable Communications System Franchise Agreement by and between the City and Maclean Hunter Cable TV, Inc. effective July 26, 1982; the Agreement between the City, Comcast MH Holdings, Inc. and Maclean Hunter Cable TV, Inc. entered into on December 22, 1994; the Agreement and Release between the City, Rogers Communications, Inc., and Maclean Hunter, Ltd. entered into on December 22, 1994; the letter from Thomas Nathan on behalf of Comcast Cable Communications, Inc. to the City dated December 13, 1994; The City's 1994 Resolution consenting to a change of ownership and control; and the City's Ordinances 97-005, 98-015. 02-010, 03-006, 03-013, 04-001 and 05-001 extending the term of the preceding (collectively, the "Franchise"); and

WHEREAS, the Franchise was originally due to expire on July 26, 1987 and its term has since been extended to July 31,

WHEREAS, Comcast wishes to continue to provide cable service in the City and has requested a renewal franchise agreement in order to do same, and

WHEREAS, the City is authorized to grant or renew one or more non-exclusive franchises for the provision of cable service. within the City by means of a cable system, and

Pursuant to Section 5.02 of the City Charter and Chapter 123 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Garden City, the City Council of Garden City hereby authorizes the renewal of a non-exclusive cable television franchise with Comcast of Taylor, LLC, pursuant to the terms set forth in the City of Garden City, Michigan, Nonexclusive 2005 Cable Television Franchise Agreement with Comcast of Taylor, LLC ("Renewal Franchise") attached hereto.

Effect. Section 2.

The Mayor and Clerk are hereby authorized and directed to sign the Renewal Franchise, and the Manager, Mayor, Clerk, Attorney and Special Counsel and other City officials are hereby authorized and directed to take all actions necessary to place the Renewal Franchise into effect and implement it.

Section 3. Date to Sign.

This ordinance shall be null, void and of no effect if by July 31, 2005 Comcast has not signed the Renewal Franchise as provided for therein.

Maybe now kids will know lighting up isn't 'cool'

"Smoke, smoke, smoke that cigarette Puff, puff, puff until you smoke yourself to death. Tell St. Peter at the Golden Gate That you hate to make him wait, But you just gotta have another cigarette."

n June 15, Wayne County's "Clean Indoor Air Regulation" smoking ban goes into effect. The regulation is part of a trend toward eliminating second-hand

inhalation of tobacco smoke by setting restrictions on where people can smoke (though bars, restaurants and other exceptions somewhat dilute the purpose).

On Wednesday, students at Garden City Middle School paraded around with signs against smoking as part of a Kick Butts campaign. One sign read

'There's cooler ways to die." The verdict seems to be

unanimous - smoking isn't good for you or the guy next to you, either.

Once upon a time, smoking was thought to be "very cool." I've been listening to some old radio programs (TV without the pictures), complete with commercials. One program was sponsored by Camel cigarettes ("preferred by four out 10 doctors who smoke"). Medical endorsements and claims of "smooothness" were the primary themes in the late '40s and early '50s.

Later television advertising emphasized smoking as part of happy times. Young people playing games, frolicking on the beach, enjoying dinner at a swinging night spot. In some of the old Salem ads, the young people looked suspiciously like teenagers, though the tobacco companies always denied using underage models.

Camel, the medically preferred puff, also created a mascot, Joe Camel, a cartoon with an obvious appeal to children (or the child in all of us), complete with a line of nifty, active lifestyle toys (for adults of course). But, they never marketed to children, never ... really, never.

Tobacco was a big industry and for a long while it was able to buy a fair share of politicians, the way energy companies buy them today (no. I'm sorry, that doesn't happen, does it?). But time, medical science and a coughing nation finally turned the tables of tobacco.

Tobacco companies can't sell their poison on radio and television. Cigarettes and other tobacco products carry a warning label. Even the tobacco companies have to hold seminars on the dangers of their product.

CHICAGO MANN BROKES IN VALIDACE

Philip Morris is practically a crusader in the fight against smoking.

That's OK, they just take the product overseas. While adult smoking in the United States has declined, Europeans and Asians

still smoke with abandon. And yet, while the students at Garden City Middle School are doing their part to warn their classmates (and any adults who haven't gotten the word), young people continue to start smoking at still alarming rates.

Data from the Center for Chronic Disease Prevention and Health Promotion shows that in 2003, 22.9 percent of high school students were cigarette smokers, with boys only slightly higher than girls — 24.6 percent to 21.6 percent. Among middle schoolers, 10.4 percent are smoking, about evenly divided between boys and girls.

Go around any school or afterschool hangout and you'll see many students puffing away. No doubt they've seen the pictures of the rotted lungs and the deformed lips, they've gotten the facts on how many years will be burned away for every cigarette they light and they've been told by numerous celebrities that tobacco "stinks."

And still they smoke. They still think it's "cool." The Center points to such factors as low socio-economic status, use of tobacco by peers or siblings, lack of parental support.

The tentative first steps taken by Wayne County might help these young people understand just how dangerous and definitely un-hip smoking is.

At least they don't have the example of Tiger Woods following in the footsteps of Ben Hogan, who enjoyed the smoooooth taste of a Camel whenever he lit up after a big tournament.

Tiger's cool, he knows better. And so do they kids at Garden City Middle School. Kick Butts!

This house belongs to all who need it

andy Narowitz knows something about the trauma inflicted on a family when a member is seriously ill.

As chief operating officer for Total Health Care, the Bloomfield Hills resident has made a comfortable living dealing with clients who count on his firm's insurance to help with at least the financial strain caused by illness and injury.

But it was a medical crisis involving his own child nearly a decade ago that brought Narowitz to understand how a good deed and a kind gesture can make an otherwise unbearable experience at least a little more tolerable.

"We used the Ronald McDonald House while our child was recuperating from major surgery

and it made all the difference in the world," Narowitz said. "Having that supportive environment, and being able to interact with others who were going through the same thing you were and understood what you were feeling, was a real blessing."

So grateful was Narowitz to the organization for the help and support his family received, he decided shortly after his experience to return the favor and began volunteering for the group. Today, that desire to give

back has grown to the point where Narowitz now serves as president of the board of directors for the Ronald McDonald House of Detroit.

"I believe in the organization because of my personal experience," Narowitz said as he guided a tour of the Detroit house, located next to Children's Hospital on Beaubien. "It truly is a remarkable facility."

There are four Ronald McDonald Houses in the state of Michigan. The Detroit house, which serves families who have a loved one being treated at Children's Hospital, is celebrating its 25th anniversary.

Narowitz said the board and staff is working hard this year to spread the word about the House, and make sure it has the necessary finances to keep its doors open for another 25 years and beyond.

The mission of each Ronald McDonald House is simple: To provide a "home away from home" for the families of seriously ill children. The Detroit house provides aid and comfort for about 1,000 families per year, which use its 25 bedrooms and communal kitchen, laundry and living areas.

Each family is asked to pay a nominal fee of \$10 per night, but no one is turned away because of an inability to pay. Guests can be from a couple of miles away or from another state.

Narowitz said there is no minimum or maximum length of stay. Some families have stayed for nearly a year, while others simply stop by for a hot shower and nap. Like all nonprofit entities, the backbone of the

favor by serving on the Detroit chapter's board of

Cooper "lived" at the Detroit house for months' while her daughter was being treated for a critical illness. On weekends, she would be joined by her husband and other children, which maintained some normalcy during a very difficult time.

Cooper said she has no idea how her family would have survived without the facility, which provided not only a place to sleep and eat, but most importantly, a caring environment.

"The support system was the most important part of being here," she said. "Just having someone else to cry with who knew exactly what you were going through was an unbelievable help."

There are now 244 Ronald McDonald Houses worldwide. The centers receive seed. expansion and emergency grants through the Ronald McDonald House Charities, but each house is responsible for raising its own operating funds.

Locally, a good chunk of the support comes from area owner-operators of McDonald restaurants. Folks like Teresa Saputo, who finds time to help spearhead fund-raisers for the House, despite having the day job of running nine area restaurants with her husband.

Saputo is on the planning committee for the House's most ambitious fund-raiser to date.




