

## Makeover makes way for library programs at **Dorsey Center**

In what could potentially lead to a Westland library satellite branch, new programs will be unveiled this summer at the Dorsey Community Center, a building in the heart of the city's Norwayne neighborhood.

The center, on Dorsey east of Venoy, already is receiving decorative painting, including panda bear images, in an area where a children's storytime program will debut during an open house slated for 4 p.m. Wednesday, June 25, library Director Cheryl Napsha said.

Library employees involved in children's programming will read to youngsters and help them with arts and crafts projects related to the books, all part of this summer's theme of Catch the Reading Bug.

As early as September, library officials hope to move six computers with Internet access to the Dorsey Center, allowing adults to develop resuméwriting and job-hunting skills in the largely low-income neighborhood that first sprouted up as housing for wartime factory workers in World War II.

Many Norwayne residents don't have easy access to the main library on Central City Parkway north of Ford. We're really interested in serving

that neighborhood," Napsha said. Mayor William Wild has indicated possible support for an eventual satellite branch at the Dorsey Center. although the library board hasn't yet committed to a full-scale project. Officials say summer programs are a

start. "We kind of wanted to start small to gauge the participation level, with hopes it could grow into something more - possibly even a satellite location," Wild said Friday.

Library board members, employees and a professional painter have worked to spruce up two rooms and a hallway "that feels like a room" at the Dorsey

Center, Napsha said.

"It's not going to be a branch, but it will be a program area," she said. Library books and other materials haven't yet been allocated for the center, where the city's housing-assistance

programs also are based. Napsha has worked with Joanne Inglis, the city's housing and community development director, to start the pilot programs like the children's storytime project.

"She has been really awesome about everything with this partnership," Napsha said, adding that the mayor's vision for the Dorsey Center got the project rolling.

The public will be invited to the open house, scheduled for 4-5:30 p.m. June 25. Other times for storytime programs will be announced later, Napsha said.

"She's a bundle of energy," said Zgliczynski. "She does so much, I'm just awed by her."

sample cuisine from Italian to Mexican during the chamber's fifth annual Restaurant Rally, a popular event scheduled for 6-10 p.m. Tuesday, July 29. It's a mouth-watering, din-

ing-out adventure that guarantees a full tummy but not an empty wallet.

With all of the spectacu-



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
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# Westland Rotary honors top students

Ontko's "laser-like focus" that caught Zgliczynski's attention.

"She wants the center and the depot to be a success," said Zgliczynski.

The depot gives out some 250,000 pounds of food to people living throughout western Wayne County. Many of the clients come from the Norwayne subdivision and Inkster, but the needy also are coming from communities like Garden City, Redford, Livonia and Canton. According to Ontko, the center sees more than 20 families a day.

day.
"We give families food in
two-month intervals," said
Ontko. "We're a small place,
we're self-sufficient, We don't
get any state or federal assistance."

Ontko shops for the best deals that can keep the shelves of the depot stocked and meat in its nine freezers. Tomato and zucchini plants were given out to members of the St. Mary Parish to generate fresh produce during the summer months.

"People think about the poor at Thanksgiving and Christmas, but the poor still have to eat the rest of the year," Ontko said. "In the summer, we look at the shelves and wonder what we can do."

The depot purchases food through Gleaners, but each truckload costs \$10,000. Even with fund-raisers, it can only purchase truckloads twice a year. But if Ontko gets picked as a Hall of Fame finalist and gets the most online voting, she could win a cash prize of \$10,000 as well as \$5,000 to her favorite charity. It's not hard to guess what it will be.

"That \$5,000 is half way to buying a truckload of food," she said. "If I win, we might be able to do an extra truck this year."

Ontko will find out this weekend if she has made the cut. If she did, online voting at www.energizer.com\halloffame will start at noon on Thursday, June 12, and run through 11:59 p.m. July 25.

In fact, when Zgliczynski mentioned the Hall of Fame, Ontko wasn't all that keen on it. Her mind changed quickly as soon as she heard about the \$5,000 donation.

"I told Cori to go for it," she said.

Energizer launched the Keep Going Hall of Fame in 2006 as a way to share some of the most inspiring, encouraging and funny stories of Energizer Bunny spirit. This year's 100 Keep Going Hall of Fame semifinalists are being honored for "their energetic accomplishments and determination and unstoppable spirit, just like the Energizer Bunny."

"We all know people like this — ordinary people with extraordinary stories and unstoppable energy," said Betsy Laako, Energizer director of marketing. "We are excited to honor these unsung heroes through the Keep Going Hall of Fame."

And so is Ontko.

"We have practically empty shelves right now," she said. "I shop with coupons to get the stuff we need. Maybe that's why they think I'm the Energizer Bunny."

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


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

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# Lower-income investors can benefit by 0 capital gains tax

Dear Rick: I read that capital gains rates are reduced this year. In fact, someone told me you can actually pay no taxes on your capital gains. Is this true?

You are correct. The capital gains rate for many taxpayers is reduced to zero this year. Unfortunately, not all taxpayers get this break. If your ordinary income tax bracket is 10 or 15 percent, then your capital gain tax and the tax on qualified dividends is 5 percent. However, for 2008 through 2010, the capital gain rate is reduced to zero.

For taxpayers who are in higher tax brackets, their capital gain rate and tax on qualified dividends is 15 percent. Unfortunately, there is no reduction in taxes for those taxpayers.

Because of the reduction in capital gain rates for lowincome taxpayers, this could

taxes. In fact, you can turn around and re-buy the same investment if you choose. The wash-sale rules deal when you have losses, not gains.

In selling appreciated securities for children, one issue to consider is the kiddie tax which is the tax on a child's investment income. If a child's investment income is above the annual threshold amount, that income is taxed at their parents' highest bracket.

For 2008, the threshold

amount for children is \$1.800. In addition, in 2008 the rules with regard to the kiddie tax changed. Under the new rules, the kiddie tax applies to children who are under 19 or full-time students under age 24 if they are claimed as dependents. Therefore, the key to having the capital gains tax free and avoiding the kiddie tax is to keep a child's investment income below \$1,800.

Under current tax law, the zero capital gains rate will remain in effect through 2010, however, tax laws change all the time and there is no certainty that the zero bracket will remain in effect until 2010. For taxpayers who are in the 10 of 15 percent regular income tax bracket, this year

creates an excellent planning opportunity. Therefore, don't delay in taking advantage of this great opportunity. Dear Rick: I heard you say at the Observer ♂ Eccentric Senior Expo that certificates

of deposit were a good short-term but not a good long-term investment. I am a conservative investor and I cannot afford to lose my money. I have a \$75,000 CD coming due next month and I won't need the money for another couple of years. Is a CD OK?

Not only do I think that the CD is OK, I think it is the most appropriate investment for you. You have a short time horizon and you do not want to risk principal.

Shop your CD around. It

makes sense to shop around for competitive rates. After all, with a \$75,000 CD, a 1 percent difference in rates means \$750 a year or \$1,500 for the life of a two-year certificate of deposit.

Use the Internet to shop rates. One site I use is www. bankrate.com. If you don't mind using an online bank you can get even better rates of return.

I recognize that many people are nervous about buying CDs from out-of-state and online banks. The bottom line is that as long as the bank is federally insured, your money is safe. Therefore, the

only issue is comfort level. In that regard, just take a step back and look at how different the world is today than when it was just 10 years ago. All of us are now using more technology than ever before, whether it is direct deposit of checks or bill payment services online.

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
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# June 10 workshop focuses on annuities

# Time to 'Tip' your cap to Smathers

Tip Smathers last week jokingly recalled how long it took to get through an interview in 1967, a necessary step to win Redford Union's junior varsity boys basketball coaching job.

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
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slipped out with nothing done, nothing said."

## Studies show tart cherries may help prevent heart disease

Mitchell Seymour doesn't let a day go by without eating tart dried cherries. As a University of Michigan research assistant, he's learned about the health benefits derived from a diet rich in fruits and vegetables. The most recent study at the University of Michigan Cardiovascular Center showed that tart cherry powder reduced cholesterol, body fat and weight gain — risk factors for heart disease - when obesity-prone rats were fed the supplement along with a high-fat, American-style diet.

Anthocyanin, the bright red pigment in cherries, is a flavonoid known for its antioxidant activity. Antioxidants have been shown to prevent free radicals from damaging cells in the body. Flavonoids are part of a group of antioxidants found in fruits, vegetables, green tea, red wine and cocoa. Cherries, blueberries, cranberries, blackberries, eggplant, red wine and red cabbage are all rich in anthocyanins. Tart red cherries were studied rather than the darker sweet Bings because of the sour fruit's higher levels of anthocyanins.


"We think as a class, anthocyanin-rich fruits and vegetables could be a component for preventing cardiovascular disease and diabetes. Cherries as part of an anthocyanin-rich diet are really helpful," said Seymour, a U-M research associate under the direction of Dr. Steven Bolling, a U-M cardiac surgeon and director of the laboratory. Seymour was senior scientist on the project.

"We're interested in a compound in anthocyanins because of some promising research where it was tested in test tubes for its effect on individual cells. It affected some enzymes related to inflammation and cholesterol."

The latest study at the U-M Cardiovascular Center followed research done on lean rats fed a low-fat diet with or without cherries. The animals who received cherries had lower blood sugar, cholesterol and fat storage in the liver. The findings from both studies were revealed at annual Experimental Biology meetings.

"We were looking at effects of cherry in otherwise healthy animals," Seymour said. "When tested in normally lean rats, we found it lowered cholesterol and triglycerides, basically affected a fat accumulation in the liver, reduced fatty liver. We thought what if we tested this in an obese rat and looked at other tissues

"In the second study, we found that the dose of cherries, only one percent of the diet from whole cherries, reduced body fat in the abdomen of these animals,



which is an increased risk for cardiovascular disease. We also found reduced markers of inflammation in the plasma. We also found the same thing in the first study, that the cherries lowered triglycerides and cholesterol. These animals were genetically prone to obesity and eating a Western-style diet like humans with saturated fat and cholesterol."

Seymour says previous research. which looked at blueberries containing similar compounds, was encouraging and led to the U-M studies.

"These studies are going to help support the evidence," Seymour said. "At this point, we only have anecdotal evidence. We want to back that up. We think cher-

ries are acting through this particular target for treating metabolic syndrome and could be complementary to standard medical treatment."

The U-M Cardiovascular Center is currently in the midst of studying the effects of cherries on humans in a clinical trial, with results expected this fall. The center is also studying grapes and apples as they pertain to heart disease. Grapes were the first fruit studied by the center, in 2003.

"The cherries first worked in lean animals, but we're talking about impacting humans. We're going to put the cherry to the test from that standpoint," Seymour said. "We have a clinical study

under way now, similar to the first study, with relatively healthy individuals with a dose equivalent to what we gave the rats. We're looking in blood and urine for what compounds are there. For the human study, we're using whole cherries, frozen tart cherries, doing two different doses, 45 cherries, the other 90 cherries or about two cups.

We need to know the long-term effects. We know the short-term effects. We know you're going to have a lower blood pressure eating fruits and vegetables, but we don't understand the mechanism, how is this working."





years ago when Morelock judged one of the competitions she entered.


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and what's the potential market for the book," he said.

In the end, the publisher wanted a book that covered the whole state, including Detroit and other urban areas.

The Explorer's Guide publisher asks their writers to veer away from chain lodgings, restaurants and stores to find the unique and local. They pay all expenses, writers are not allowed to take complimentary meals, admissions or lodging.

But Counts wasn't sure Michigan fit the "New England" model of other Explorer books.

"You can't swing a dead cat in New England without hitting a bed and breakfast or a cute little inn or quaint country store," he said.

#### DIFFERENT LURE

While Michigan has its share of B&Bs and quaint stores, it also has towns where the only place to shop is an IGA and the only places to stay ing used to be the major lures for visitors from outside the state, but Counts says that times have changed.

"Hunting and fishing are down, but even hunting and fishing have changed," he said. "More couples are involved. Hunting and fishing used be Bud and Fred in a bass boat and how much you could fill your freezer or did you get five deer this year. There is still some of that, but now people are traveling for a lesser amount of time but for a better experience."

Counts said a Michigan traveler can be fishing a trout stream one day and attending a wine tasting in Traverse City the next. The state has hip urban communities, pristine beaches, bike trails, vast forests and legendary trout streams.

The book is organized geographically to include every section of the state with interesting facts, places to stay, places to eat for fine dining and casual lunches, recreation opportunities, cultural and entertainment venues, museums and more. In addition to

providing lively commentary, Counts also took the numerous black and white photos. The book also includes maps for each section of the state.

#### **WANDERING AROUND**

Counts, publisher of the outdoor magazine Streamside Journal, has some strong opinions about different parts of the state that he admits don't fit with the views of oth-

"My favorites are not the favorites in the book," he said. "My favorites are the quirky places. The publisher lets you be honest.

He says that Traverse City, the urban center of Up North Michigan, is "overrated," but he enjoys the quieter, nearby Lake Michigan towns of Ludington, Manistee and Frankfort. And he loves the UP and devotes a large section to Michigan's rich wilderness land from Grand Marais to the Keweenaw.

Counts said it is the vast amount of public land that makes the UP so special.

"In the UP we have thou-

the towns are cheap, rent a hotel room or camp. You can bird watch or canoe or camp, mountain bike all over the place. It's that old 19th century thing where you can wander. That's been lost in modern day society."

Counts says the state government hasn't been doing a good enough job promoting the state's recreational resources to other parts of the country and he thinks his book might help spread the word about our special place.







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

event from as far away as West Branch, Indiana and Ohio.

"We're looking for any Navy or Coast Guard who served aboard tin cans. In the old days that only covered the destroyer then they built the destroyer escort," said Kramer, 75, of Livonia. "The destroyer is a tin can, it's how you're bounced around. More guys serve on destroyers than anything else, but it's for any sailor Nursing in 1990 at the University of that served aboard a destroyer, destroyer escort, APD ship which hauls the frog man, or fast frigate which is taking the place of the destroyer. The Bull Session we get together for the camaraderie, yak away, tell sea stories. We sell merchandise too, shirts and jackets with Navy insignias and children's stuff, belt buckles and rank insignias." Kramer delights in spouting

off in sea terminology saying a bubblehead is a submariner. snipes an engineer and the poop deck is as far forward as a sailor can go on a ship. It's apparent that Kramer, who was a deputy sheriff for Wayne County for 25 years, never lost his love for destroyers. He belongs to seven Navy-related organizations and twice a year works on a museum ship in Albany, N.Y. The U.S.S. Slater was built in 1943 and is one of seven museum ships around the country which are sup-

ported by Tin Can Sailors. Bill Biggerstaff attended his first Bull Session 20 years ago in Jackson. The 84-yearold Wayne man served during World War II on convoy duty with the Reuben James which was sunk by torpedo off of western Iceland in October 1940. The Sturtevant DD 240 was later sunk in April 1942 off Marquesas Key, Fla., but he survived to spend the next 30 years as a Wayne police officer. Biggerstaff served a total of 42 years in the Navy and reserves as a chief torpedo man.

"When the war started all the merchant ships were taking cargo to Europe. The Sturtevant had sonar for submarines so they could drop depth charges on enemy submarines," said Biggerstaff. "There were 60 ships in the convoys. Some had big bombers strapped on the ship. We were taking everything we could to England. They weren't doing too good. They were losing the war and we were in the North Atlantic taking convoys across. This was before Pearl Harbor and German U boats and Hitler sent the Bismarck. "When you think of most

of the ships in the Navy, you think of big battleships, but then they started building destroyers, but they're small and they started calling them tin cans even though you're 300 feet long.

Biggerstaff likes telling and listening to stories, that's why he's attended not only Michigan Bull Sessions but events in San Diego, Denver and New York.

"You meet different people. Once a year they hold the national this year in August in Pittsburgh. You meet a lot of sailors but they're fading

away. They're dying away," said Biggerstaff. "I like the Navy people and they're all old timers like me, but Tin Can a lot of younger guys go to it." Ted King won't be attending

the bull session because of his emphysema but enjoys talking about his Navy days as well. When he was younger, the 86year-old Alpena man served in World War II with Biggerstaff. He remembers the day the U.S.S. Sturtevant was sunk, April 26, 1942. He'd been on the boat 13 months to the day.

"There were a lot of German subs in the gulf (off Florida)," said King. "The month of April '42 merchant ships were sunk and the beaches were covered with oil. Miami Beach was nothing but oil."

Donald Smith is one of the

younger Tin Can Sailors who likes listening to the stories of old salts like King, Smith served from 1960 to 1963 on a destroyer tender, a repair ship, and then a destrover. the U.S.S. Turner, an escort ship to aircraft ships which is used for close in combat where other ships can't go and for anti-submarine warfare. He's been to the bull sessions four times. He sailed all over the Atlantic, Mediterranean and Caribbean.

"It's interesting to talk to people on different ships and different times," said Smith of South Lyon. "Sailors from the late 1930s to early 2000s attend. Some were in the Second World War, Korean War, at Vietnam or around Vietnam."

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
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



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## CIRCUMVENTING A NARCISSISTIC BOSS

You're bound to run into narcissistic bosses at some point in your career, because they gravitate toward leadership. "Most public leaders have a large streak of narcissism in them or I don't think they d be

able to lead," says psychologist and executive coach Randall White, principal at The Executive Development Group L.L.C., in the Greensboro, N.C., location. "They tend to be perceived as overly ambitious . . . (with) an 'it's all about me'-quality, becoming extremely harsh with employees."

He maintains that this self-orientation shapes a view of the world that colors everything they do and say. It also sets agenda as theirs alone. Most are task-oriented, "letting the crumbs fall down on employees to make the boss look good," White adds.

David Nour, CEO of BeOne Now Inc., in Atlanta, a coaching firm specializing in relationship economics, points out that narcissists "actually get joy or, perhaps, attention from creating discomfort for others."Also a coach, he believes further that narcissists can be skilled manipulators who think that they can get others to

perform by manipulating them. Unfortunately, sometimes the tactic works. BEHAVIOR

It's easier to avoid the traps than to get out of them, but you have to learn how to spot them. While you might think that conversation alone -- virtual or face-to-face -- can ensnare you, that's not the case. Bill Krug, associate professor in the Organizational Leadership Department of Purdue University in West Lafayette, Ind., reports that bosses with impossible performance demands might well be narcissists, endlessly "nitpicking, no matter what you bring. They're never satisfied. After the fifth change, you bring your original . . . " and they accept it.

Krug says to watch the nature of their assignments to you. Meaningless ones, such as personal errands, tasks completely outside of your job description, and burdensome duties requiring "unreasonable hours for your position"suggest that you're their "step 'n fetch it." And that won't change.

Nour observes that the fact that they're narcissistic is evident in the manner in which "they telegraph" it to you. You don't get a critical memo or an invitation to a key meeting until it's too late for you to add it to your schedule. "They use delay tactics," he continues, "blame tactics to intentionally disrupt, cause stress within the team and the organization. They tend to target individuals they're threatened by, such as the high performer who might

outshine them.

Fortunately, there are several ways to get out of the trap. Leaving -- getting promoted or completely moving: -- might be an option, if you can get a good

recommendation, according to Nour. But there might be compelling personal or professional reasons to keep your

In this case, you must come up with something that won't get you fired, because, as Nour emphasizes, "It ten! to get worse before it gets better. Narcissistic bosses will not stop."But before you take action, Krug recommends, document incidents, because harassment is a possibility. Then, consider your options:

-- Reconsider. "In this global war for talent, I don't think anyone should have to deal with narcissistic bosses

-- "Learn to expect a temper tantrum and let him do that if you can, but not if you're the only person being belittled in front of others" (Krug). -- "Realize that this is a learning opportunity for you, if

only that you'll never treat people this way." (White) You have one final option in an individual case, which is to confront the person. White advocates "appealing to the person's potential enlightened self-interest by saying something like 'If I can do my best work, I can make you look better." In other words, creep, it does you no good to

make me feel incompetent, bad or something else, because it will keep me from doing my best job for you.

You'll put the jerk on notice that, as White indicates, you won't "punish yourself for the person's behavior" by quitting. You also won't submit.
