ment. I was driving on Milford Road just past Kroger's. I looked to my right toward the swamp, and I saw a massive bird flying with what looked like a straw hat in its
mouth. I never seen such a large amount of sticks in a bird's mouth before, so I had to pull to the side of the road and watch this large bird fly to the top of the cell phone My jaw gaping open as I watched this bird fly circling the towers base with such strength could hardly believe my eyes. I
never in my life seen such a bird do this in Michigan except maybe the bald eagle. I. couldn't figure out what type of raptor it was, but I knew it was a bird of prey. All I
could see was a silhouette of this huge bird and I watched it fly from the base to the very top of a 150 -foot tower.
I figured it could've been a turkey,
buzzard, and I went on to my doctor, buzzard, and went on to my doctor when I see this bird again, and this time he was flying over Milford Road low enough to be Identified. It certainly was a bird of prey and he was huge. It was my first glimpse of this bird of prey so close.
He was flying just above the power lines so I got a real good look at him. Brown on black with white colors stood out like a sore thumb, so I had to pull off the road into the Kroger parking lot to pro--
cess what I really saw. I had seen a male Osprey flying to its hunting grounds. I couldn't believe my eyes.

I kept watching these magnificent birds every morning until August. Then I saw both the male and the female flying with their chicks about 200 feet up with the juveniles circling downtown Milford. 1 prey above me as I was walking downtown. I looked up and was amazed to see the whole family flying. Goosebumps ran up and down my arms as I watched these beautiful birds sore with their young.
This is how it's been for the last three years and it seems this year will be no different. I had the privilege to see the huge maie today fying toward Camp Dearborn right behind cow. 1 am a bit concerned, climbing the tower and those men may have destroyed the nesting grounds for these two Osprey. I know Osprey return from their winter migration and build off the old nest which results into being one

FOLLOWING THE PATH

The iabyrinth is in symbol consisting of
a meandering path that loops and circles a meandering path that loops and circles inward to the images center.
Walkers follow the path from its entrance to the center of the symbol, then simply reverse direction and take the same way back to the entrance. Outdoor labyrinths are made of brick, stone or grass and may be landscaped flowers. Portable labyrinths for indoor us are painted on cloth or canvas. Theyre different from mazes, which have walled pathways that dead end and
confront the walker with choices.

FOCUS ON GOD
Farmington First United Methodist Church acquired its labyrinth about 10 years ago.
